# New HyperCard 1.2

HyperCard version 1.2, the second update since the product's debut in August 1987, is expected to become available this summer through Apple dealers and user groups. Unlike the 1.1 update, which primarily fixed bugs, version 1.2 adds new features and performance enhancements particularly aimed at creators of HyperTalk scripts.

At the user level, version 1.2 adds a Find Whole option, which lets you search for exactly matching text anywhere in a stack; a Text Arrows option, which allows the arrow keys to control the cursor rather than the cards; and a Write-Protect feature that makes stacks read-only. The Write-Protect feature gives HyperCard the requisites for use with CD ROM and file servers.

At the scripting level, version 1.2 adds new objects, commands, properties, functions, synonyms, speed improvements, and keyboard shortcuts. The new users options can be implemented via the scripting language. In addition, a new picture object allows you to hide or show a card's picture and new functions permit improved text and card manipulation.

# Large Screen for Less

Nutmeg is offering a 19inch monochrome monitor with a universal video card for only \$1495. The Nutmeg 19's 1024-by-768-pixel resolution at 75 pixels per inch is about the same as that of a standard Mac screen. A separately available adapter enables you to configure the Nutmeg video card for a Plus, an SE, or a Mac II.

Another new product, the Nutmeg 256, is a 1024-by-768 video card that makes available 256 colors or 16 levels of gray. Combining the video card with monitors that can take advantage of its 80 Hz refresh rate should all but eliminate flicker. In addition, the Nutmeg 256 will speed up presentation of color images by connecting to a video accelerator board Nutmeg plans to bring out. List price is \$1595. For more information. call Nutmeg at 203/966-3226.

# Most Powerful Development System

Tektronix has announced a Motorola 88000-based development board for the Mac II. The TL88K-P, which contains a reduced instructionset computer (RISC) chip set and 8MB of memory, promises to transform the Mac into the most powerful personalcomputer-based development system to date. The three-chip set, consisting of an 88100 RISC CPU with a floatingpoint processor and two 88200 cache memory-management chips, is capable of executing up to 17 million instructions per second (MIPS). In comparison, the Mac II executes roughly 1 MIPS. For further information, call Tektronix at 503/627-7111.

# **Apple's Suit Challenged**

The lawsuit Apple filed in March against Microsoft and Hewlett-Packard, alleging that the two companies are infringing on the "look and feel" of Apple's software, has been challenged in a counterclaim filed by Microsoft. Microsoft claims Apple's legal action violates Microsoft's contract with Apple and damages Microsoft's prospective business and contractural relationships. HP received a 60day extension for filing its own response to Apple's suit.

Microsoft president Bill
Gates said his company remains committed to the Macintosh and will produce new versions of all its major Macintosh software in 1988. For instance, Word 4.0 and Excel 1.5 have already been announced. Excel's major upgrade, version 2.0, is expected by the end of the year. Both PowerPoint 2.0 and File 2.0 are shipping. Works 2.0 will be out by August, predicts Microsoft.

# TOPS with DataFrames

SuperMac is now including TOPS (which normally sells for \$189), the largest-selling network software for the Macintosh, with each of the SuperMac large-capacity DataFrame hard drives ranging in size from 60 to 150 megabytes. This offer is effective from June 15 to September 30, 1988, through authorized SuperMac dealers.

# **Hunting Viruses**

Apple's new freeware program, Virus Rx, searches your disks for virus-damaged documents and applications, and then labels any damaged files with a "Dangerous" or "Fatal" designation. Virus Rx, along with two pages of instructions, is free and available on AppleLink and many other public bulletin boards.

# Minitel Comes to the U.S.

Minitel, the French nationwide videotex system, is now available to United States residents through MinitelNet. Minitel has become the world's largest commercial online service, with several million users receiving and sending electronic mail and taking advantage of some 1500 services. All menus and information are in French.

Minitel services include the French news wire; information on exhibitions, trade shows, and fairs in France; French standards and specifications; French stock exchange (Bourse) quotations; and information on export, legal, and tax matters.

MinitelNet users must pay in advance for the service. The \$163.50 minimum initial payment is for six hours (approximately \$27 per hour). For more information on MinitelNet, contact Computer Sciences in El Segundo, California, or call 800/822-6638.

# Competition for A/UX

With the introduction of the Sun386i computer, Sun Microsystems becomes the first vendor to offer a fully developed, icon-based user interface for the UNIX operating system. In doing so, Sun beats Apple to the punch since Apple is still working on an icon-based interface for its Macintosh II A/UX computer system.

Sun developed its interface, called Open Look, for AT&T, which owns UNIX. Open Look will become AT&T's standard user interface for all UNIX System V computer systems, replacing UNIX's present, often criticized, text-based interface. Sun's design is based on technology licensed from Xerox, the company that also developed much of the Mac user interface.

Among the icons in Open Look are push-pins to "pin" important menus to the screen, and an elevator to move up or down in text. Clicking a mouse on labeled buttons prints and saves files.

AT&T's announcement that it will standardize Open Look for all UNIX System V systems could throw a wrench into Apple's plans for A/UX because all System V software—which A/UX is—must undergo testing to ensure compatibility with AT&T standards.

# dBase Mac Free Upgrade

Ashton-Tate is offering a free dBase Mac upgrade to registered users. The upgrade allows you to run external programs from within the relational database using external commands and external functions, like those used

with HyperCard. For instance, a retail sales system written in dBase Mac might use external commands to receive data from a bar-code reader, open a cash drawer, print a receipt, and display the amount of a customer's change.

To encourage developers to write finished applications using dBase Mac, Ashton-Tate is also offering an execute-only version called dBase Mac Runtime. Registered dBase Mac owners can purchase the Runtime version for the list price of \$300. Developers may include Runtime on unlimited copies of their applications. # Storage Capacity Takes Another Leap

For a long time, users have been hearing about optical disks that will combine hard disk capacities with floppy removability—like a CD ROM or WORM (write-once, read-many) optical disk, only erasable.

After all the talk, Maxtor has introduced two SCSI erasable optical disk drives: the 5 ¼-inch Tahiti I, which provides up to 1 gigabyte of storage on one double-sided optical disk; and the 3½-inch Fiji I, which holds 160 megabytes of data on a single-sided disk.

Maxtor expects to ship both drives by the end of this year. They'll be used both as components in storage subsystems and as stand-alone peripherals. For example, the Tahiti I could act as a network file server; the Fiji I could replace a tape drive as a backup device. Prices will probably start around \$2500 for a standalone Fiji I. # Scoop without Target?

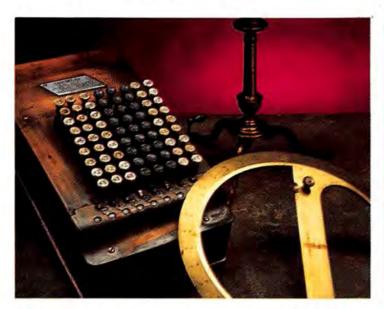

# The Big-Chilling Effect



Creativity and innovation in our industry are being threatened by a rash of reckless lawsuits. Enough already.

Most personal computer industry observers agree that Apple Computer's recent surprise lawsuit against Microsoft Corporation and Hewlett-Packard jeopardizes future software and even hardware development. Apple claims that Microsoft's Windows and HP's NewWave graphic user interfaces are illegal copies of Apple's Macintosh system

If Apple prevails in this suit, further development of a windows interface for the IBM PC may be seriously delayed, or even killed.

There is yet another, but less-publicized, lawsuit on the horizon that may have a much greater effect on us than the Apple affair. ComputerLand Corporation founder William Millard has filed suit against Micro-Pro International Corporation as well as former MicroPro chairman Seymour Rubinstein and former MicroPro programmer John Barnaby.

Millard's suit alleges that MicroPro's wildly successful word processor, Word-Star, was first developed at one of his companies, IMSAI Manufacturing Corporation, over ten years ago. Both Rubinstein and Barnaby were working for IMSAI at the time, and Barnaby developed a text-editing program called NED. Rubinstein left IMSAI to start MicroPro and immediately hired Barnaby, who had left IMSAI two weeks earlier. Millard claims they used NED code to write MicroPro's early text editor Word-Master, which evolved into the phenomenal WordStar, Meanwhile, in 1979 IMSAI went bankrupt and disappeared from the scene.

Until recently, that is. Terry Giles, Millard's chief attorney, claims to have stumbled across the NED-WordMaster-WordStar connection while sifting through documents from an unrelated case. Giles maintains that the statute of limitationsthree years from the time of his "discovery" in 1986-is still in effect.

Furthermore, Giles and Millard claim that WordMaster's patent information reveals that 98 percent of its source code is "identical" to NED's, Millard is seeking punitive damages and royalties from any and

all programs derived from NED. This would include WordStar, which is estimated to have grossed \$200 million to \$300 million for MicroPro over the past ten years.

According to Giles, Millard-who sold his controlling stake in ComputerLand last year and now lives on the South Pacific island of Saipan—is bringing this action against MicroPro and its two former officials as "a matter of principle." Millard would use any punitive damages awarded to pay IMSAI's remaining creditors, who are collectively owed about \$1 million. If he is awarded damages in the form of rovalties, however, tens of millions of dollars will be at stake. Millard says he would distribute this money to various charities through a foundation administered by the Millard family.

"I'm about as concerned about [Millard's succeeding in this lawsuit as [I am about] an iceberg hitting the Golden Gate Bridge," insists Leon Williams, MicroPro's current CEO. "[In] 1979, there were an awful lot of companies starting up, and a few of them were successful," he recalls. "I think it's a miracle there haven't been more lawsuits."

Williams, who began his own career as a programmer, notes the difficulty facing software developers, whose craft is constantly evolving. "Whenever you work on a particular algorithm, and you change jobs, it's impossible to unlearn all you've learned," he says. "Programming is a creative path. All artists are inspired by previous artists. They take their techniques and visions, and they evolve them to a higher level of art."

Though he discusses the Millard suit in less lofty terms, Seymour Rubinstein is also convinced that it will be thrown out of court on a summary judgment, because the statute of limitations has already expired. "It's clear that the program or programs that allegedly contained whatever [Millard]

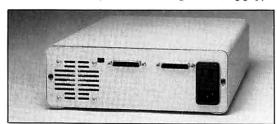

is concerned about were well publicized, and he certainly didn't do anything about it for ten years," Rubinstein asserts.

Giles is prepared for a long haul, however. "We will be involved in the technical aspects of the lawsuit for a couple of years at least," he predicts. "It will probably get to trial—if we're really lucky—in 1989, or in the first part of 1990."

No matter what the outcome, and no matter who's right or who's wrong, one thing is certain: we'll all pay a price. A lot of software, as well as hardware, is based on existing products. Just as in the television industry, developers create new programs based on past hits. If developers and companies can no longer do that because they'll be sued, then new programs or even new versions will be slow to emerge. If consumers buy fewer products, less frequently, the industry will slump, and eventually even our computing productivity will take a nosedive.

Just think: Digital Research, the creator of CP/M, could sue Microsoft for releasing MS-DOS, because much of its code is based on CP/M. The creator of VisiCalc could sue Lotus because 1-2-3 is basically an advanced form of VisiCalc. In fact, most database, spreadsheet, project-management, and word processing programs on the market today are based both on earlier versions and on other programs.

The fact is that Millard's company, IMSAI, went out of business years ago. Nothing was going to happen to that code at IMSAI; NED was dead. Rubinstein and Barnaby allegedly gave it new life at Micro-Pro. If that was the case, apparently no one else had the imagination to develop Word-Master into WordStar.

"The success of the [WordStar] business came 150,000 instructions later," Leon Williams explains. "That has much more to do [with its success] than with the code of the product called NED." In fact, WordStar also benefited from very effective marketing and promotion.

I'm not making a judgment about whether the Millard case has any legal merit, although it's not obvious to me that NED, the source code that may have led to WordStar, is really worth \$200 million to \$300 million. I'm concerned that if this case is won, consumers and companies alike might become immobilized by a legal ice age that would freeze a lot of the creativity and innovation that currently exist in personal computing. Glaciers are just fine in Alaska, but I don't want them coming to Silicon Valley.

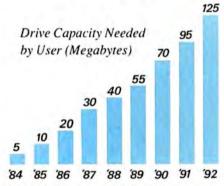

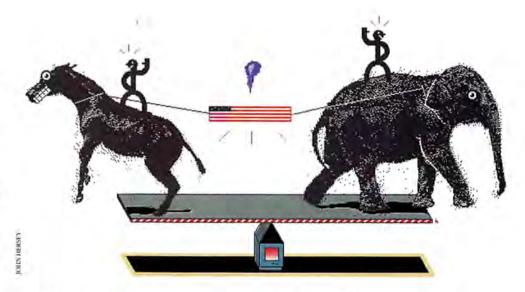

We were disturbed by Bruce Webster's unsupported conclusion ("The Mac II in Black and White," May 1988) that he was unable to recommend our monitor, The Big Picture, because it "had the most visual defects" and was "very tiring on the eyes." Earlier in the article he admitted that "visually, The Big Picture is generally good but has some deficiencies." He also termed The Big Picture a 15-inch monitor (it's actually a 17-inch) and claimed it has a 90-dots-per-inch display (it's 85 dpi). After our agency received a rash of complaints involving Software to Go, Programming International, and other Dixon companies mentioned in your article, we filed suit against those companies and the Dixons. Subsequently, we decided to sponsor a bill that would strengthen the existing California mail-order statute. The new statute covers telephone orders by credit card or check and specifies that orders must be shipped within 30 days or within the time stated in the seller's ads.

Educational articles such as yours help consumers make informed choices and reduce the need for enforcement activities by government agencies.

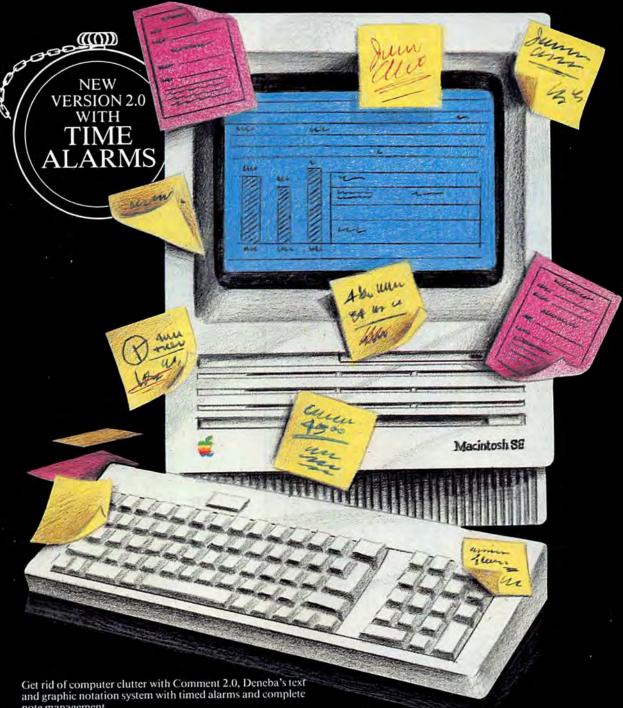

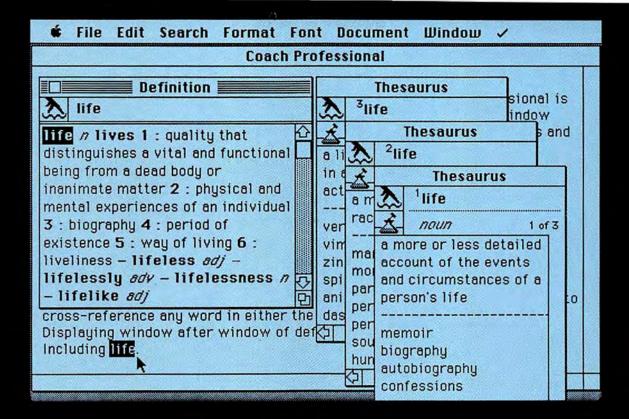

# Selling Sushi to Yokohama

(With apologies to Jean-Louis Gassée)

"Say what?" "2500 ven."

We stared at each other for a moment, the sushi chef and I, while I contemplated the cost of the snack and drink I had consumed. Before this revelation it had seemed the appropriate break in a day-long trek through Tokyo's electronics district.

That's \$20 U.S.! Nearly twice what I'd pay for the same meal in San Francisco. And the fish is fresher at home.

Some things had obviously changed since the first time I visited Japan. Seven years ago I went there on assignment to produce a report on manufacturers in the field of computer graphics. My predictions for Japan Inc.'s entry into the United States graphics markets were somewhat overblown-Japanese manufacturers have, to be certain, taken market share from U.S. makers, but they do not dominate the industry. Nor have any Pacific Rim countries made progress in U.S. markets with personal computers of their own design, that is, non-clones,

My task on this trip was easier: to assess the growth of Macintosh sales and use in Japan, Hong Kong, and Singapore. And the answer: the Mac is doing surprisingly well there. According to Apple Japan president Sandy Van Eyck, the Mac SE is becoming a success in Pacific Rim countries.

As before, I found myself standing on a factory floor where personal computers are manufactured. High ceilings, surprisingly little noise, bright, airy; floors so clean you might not fear eating off them.

This time, however, the factory was in Singapore, not Japan. All the young workers wore street clothes, not the uniforms common in Japanese firms. Nor did supervisors stand out by their special dress or by the deference paid them by their subordinates. The plant seemed rather collegial for a manufacturing concern.

I was not prepared for this informality, nor for the importance of robotics. The plant is automated throughout; robot transport vehicles deliver pallets of parts to flexible manufacturing lines, where the components are assembled, tested, packaged, and shipped by other robots. Many of the robots had been custom built to assemble the computers. Unlike a PBS film's speculation about the impact of robotics in the future, these robots actually picked, placed, nudged, tapped, and completed a small personal computer. More than 7500 roll off the lines every day. JIT (just-in-time) manufacturing goes without saying. There is no inventory of parts or finished CPUs.

This, I thought, is the future. Just as Japan earlier brought vast improvements to manufacturing processes, now the "four tigers"—Taiwan, Korea, Singapore, and Hong Kong-are finding ways to keep manufacturing in their countries as their labor costs rise.

Sound like an all-too-familiar story? With one exception: the plant is owned by Apple Computer. For me, Apple's Singapore plant represents the ability of American manufacturers to compete with any other country's in terms of labor, automation, or innovation. Not only that, it also portends the ability of a young company-

with plants in Singapore; Cork, Ireland; and Fremont, California-to participate in world commerce.

Meanwhile on Hong Kong television a group of architects in a beer commercial quaff a brew after solving a problem with their Mac II. Not a problem that the Mac might actually solve, but never mind that, the point is that the Macintosh is the fashionable personal computer in a part of the world that's dominated by IBM PCs and PC clones.

Can the upstart from Cupertino become as important as AT&T, General Electric, and IBM? Certainly the vision is there. John Sculley has taken to making speeches about the Knowledge Navigator, his idea of the compact personal computer for the year 2010. The videotapes bringing his idea to life were the talk of the January Macworld Expo and the first Apple media hit to equal its 1984 Super Bowl TV commercial.

To realize the vision, Apple continues to invest in research and developmentinternationally. Recently (shades of IBM) Apple formed a research and development group in Paris. Will the day ever come when Apple scientists in a foreign country win a Nobel prize for their work, as did two IBM researchers in Switzerland?

Apple's R&D investment may well pay off in the future, but at this stage can Apple compete with NEC? That company dominates Japanese personal computing, with

## The Unbearable Heaviness of Being in the Computer Industry

Not long ago I was conducting a telephone interview with Phil Lipetz, then the president of Ann Arbor Software. We were discussing the implications of the extreme tardiness of his firm's product, the word processor FullWrite Professional. Lipetz had been stung by a few personal attacks resulting from the product's failure to appear in the marketplace when promised, and in his defense he explained why he decided to become a software executive, when he could have made more money as a venture capitalist.

Lipetz explained that he wanted to do something for people. FullWrite was to be his contribution to the planet's well-being.

Great scenes of compassion and sacrifice fast-forwarded in the VCR of my mind. Florence Nightingale, treating the Crimean War wounded. Mahatma Gandhi, challenging the British with nonviolent protest. Albert Schweitzer, ministering to the African ill. Bob Geldof, organizing concerts to feed the Ethiopian starving. And now, Phil Lipetz, working day and night to deliver a word processor that performs some desktop publishing functions and sells for \$295.

The reason I did not drop the telephone and double over—either in laughter or gastric distress—was that I'd heard that pitch before. In fact, it is so common these days that I feel compelled to apologize to Phil Lipetz; I am unfairly singling him out as the sole perpetrator of a widely committed transgression. (Especially since MANY SEVENKEII

I have learned that he has taken his share of the booty earned by selling FullWrite to Ashton-Tate and used the money for a project to bring spreadsheets to the jungles of Ghana.) For a variety of reasons, some vague equation has been drawn between working in the computer field and improving the lot of humanity. And no branch of computerdom suffers from this illusion more thoroughly than that of the Macintosh.

Hype Tech

It all started with the superbly crafted hype associated with the original Apple II computer, which was presented not simply as a machine, but as a friend who could empower you to do amazing tasks. People who worked in the field back then were in-

deed trailblazers. When some outsiders dared to call them artists, the description was eagerly accepted. When delighted users went out of their way to thank those who made computers and marketed them. it was only natural for recipients of those kudos to think that they were not only making money, but also doing something important. And they were. They had introduced a product that had no precedent, and it was tremendously useful.

Then the Macintosh came out, and the rhetoric became deafening. It is true that the original Mac was a breakthrough that would eventually improve a lot of lives (mine included), but to hear the promotion surrounding it, you would have thought that it was not just a product designed to make a return on investment for the manufacturer, but an altruistic statement on the future of humanity. This was a computer "for the rest of us," we were told. The statement conveniently ignored the fact that the computer for all of them could be had for a thousand dollars or so less.

Meanwhile, the press (myself included) indulged itself in an orgy of celebritymaking. The hackers of the Mac team itself usually refrained from outrageous claims. In their view, they were building a computer they wanted to own themselves. As Andy Hertzfeld put it, something you could love as much as your stereo set. But Steve Jobs was telling all and sundry that Apple's success was tantamount to a crusade. The world depended on the Mac's success, he insisted. If Macintosh failed, we would be plunged into a Dark Age, ever in the shadow of the A> prompt that characterizes IBM PC software. If this came to pass, our very souls would be impoverished. We would be like the drones in the famous "1984" commercial.

As that philosophy permeated the Macintosh community, Apple's "mission" blurred with any activity good for the planet. Criticizing Apple was like bad-mouthing arms control.

I remember doing a story about college students buying Macs at bargain prices and then "flipping" them-selling them at a slight profit to friends or relatives who didn't have the chance to buy the machine at student rates. Apple was trying to convince college administrators to suspend, or even expel, students caught doing this. When I wondered aloud whether this measure might not be too harsh, an Apple apparatchik replied as follows: "We think there's a moral issue involved. . . . We have to believe in people or the world won't

win." The sense was that the believers in question were not "we at Apple," but "we Americans," or perhaps "we human beings." The right of Apple Computer to protect its profit margins had become entwined with apple pie, hot dogs, and the prevention of nuclear winter.

So is it any wonder that even thirdparty developers for the Macintosh consider themselves not only businesspeople but protectors of truth, justice, and the American way? According to this wisdom, a word processor is not simply a writing tool but the means by which language is liberated and the human spirit is allowed free rein. That same uplifted human spirit is unleashed in graphics programs? Page layout programs? It seems every single one of them drags poor Leonardo da Vinci out of the grave to assure potential buyers that the newsletters, manuals, and brochures they create will be on a par with the Madrid Codices.

#### Greed as Art

I don't mean to imply that this sort of thing is limited to the computer world. Even as the positive image of the businessperson peaked in recent years, business leaders in general seem dissatisfied with their role. It is not enough for them "merely" to be involved in commerce. Formerly, those who enriched themselves as captains of industry or in similar occupations were content to run the economy and indulge in more ethereal pursuits only as observers or donors. Now they want it all. Thus Donald Trump, one of our premier real estage moguls, has a book ghostwritten entitled The Art of the Deal. Winning through negotiation is insufficient; Donald Trump is an artist, too. Therefore, he can doubly sneer through his limousine window at struggling painters, musicians, and actors-not only is he richer than they can possibly imagine, but he's just as creative as they are.

Still, I think the computer world and Apple in particular are in the vanguard of this trend toward self-aggrandizement. Where else but at Apple do workers have business cards that read "Wizard" and "Ninja?" The company has its "champions" and its "evangelists." Is there anyone in the entire company whose card reads simply "salesperson?"

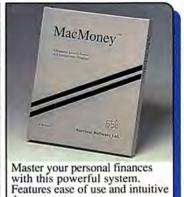

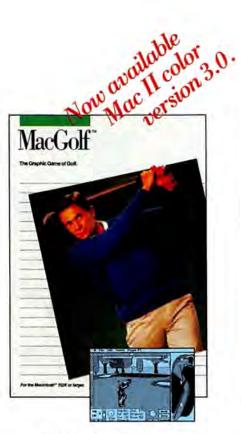

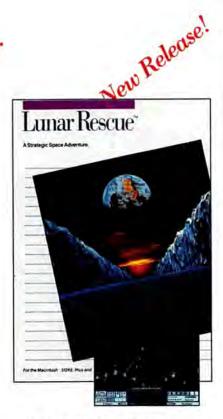

At the top, of course, is John Sculley, an executive who proved his superb management skills by rescuing the company from its 1985 nadir and rallying the troops to the current boom years. But even Scullev feels it necessary to make a case that he's much more than a businessman whose strong suit is marketing. Sculley originally studied as an architect and seems to want people to view his current post as equally creative. It is no surprise that he was lured to Apple by headhunter Gerry Roche's promise that contemporary Silicon Valley occupies the same place in Western culture as the city of Florence did in the Renaissance.

In Sculley's recent autobiography, there is one unforgettable passage that epitomizes this bizarre syndrome. Sculley speaks of touring the galleries of the great museums in New York City. Painters, he postulates, have the same relationship to the world as those in another occupation: marketing. "Marketing is an art form," he writes. "When I go through the Museum of Modern Art, I see not only paintings but artists who were driven by powerful ideas, and who went through the identical process to what we do in marketing. . . . " As the architect (ahem) of the Pepsi Challenge ad campaign, in his previous incarnation as a soft drink executive, Sculley claims to have made a profound impact on his culture-just like the impact of Picasso and Klee and the rest of those hustlers. And now, as the head of Apple, a company he identifies as the technological force behind what he predicts will be the New Renaissance, he can presumably exercise the same creative force as an Italian painter in the fifteenth century.

Now, I can understand why people in the computer industry take this leap from business to the arts and humanities. Personal computers are extremely useful tools that can change people's lives, mainly by giving them the power to do things that would otherwise be prohibitively expensive. But that does not mean that people in the personal computer field can accurately say that helping people is their job. And with the exception of certain engineers and programmers whose skills elevate them to the level of artist—much in the same way that some furniture makers have

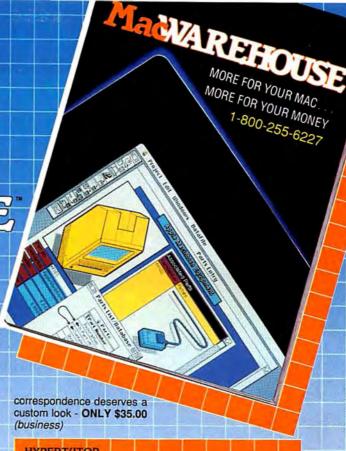

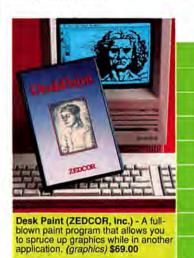

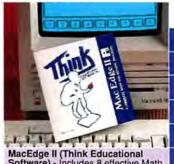

honed their craft to the realm of art—few in the computer field can claim that their jobs in marketing, management, advertising, quality control, international sales, and developer relations are more than business positions that might allow creativity but are essentially devoted to making a profit for a corporation. Which is nothing to be ashamed of, since that's the way our economy is structured.

I don't mean to belittle the significance of personal computers. They have had a profound effect on our society, almost overwhelmingly positive. But as computers become more integrated into our lives, and we take the amazing things they do for granted, the industry becomes more and more like any commodity industry. Computers will ultimately be generic, like pencils. One can create wonderful things with a pencil: write a scientific equation that could change the world, draw something to take your breath away, create a poem that stands for eternity. But you don't see the folks at Acme Pencil Company puffing their chests out and telling us what they're doing for the world. Not to put too

fine a point on it, my guess is that they'll just tell you that they sell pencils, and leave it at that.

The guy who invented the pencil, however—be improved the world.

#### A Modest Proposal

So allow me to make a few humble suggestions for those in the Macintosh community. If these are carefully followed, we can be an example to the rest of the world of commerce, and perhaps prevent abominations ranging from another Donald Trump book to a possible Lee Iacocca run for president.

First of all, let's not assume that the best possible uses of a Macintosh characterize the way people will actually use them: Macs are more likely to help design weapons systems than write a novel that tops the work of James Joyce.

Secondly, let's not say we're involved in work synonymous with improving the lot of humanity when actually all we do is make or sell computer equipment.

Finally, we should force the following code on all computer executives:

Don't try to get your company's employees to work days, nights, and weekends—giving up all pretense to an outside life—to further some sort of "cause" that the product represents. Cut them into the action, or at least pay overtime.

Don't construct your annual corporate report like a coffee-table art book.

Use descriptive titles for employees, daring to call salespeople salespeople and secretaries secretaries.

Don't promise that your product will have the approximate effect on civilization of Copernicus's theories, or any other set of ideas that caused a revolution in the world of science, art, or any other field. In fact, let's cut out the word *revolution* altogether.

Don't put any of the following dead people in your advertisements: Einstein, da Vinci, Gutenberg, Picasso, Hemingway, Galileo, van Gogh, or Charlie Chaplin.

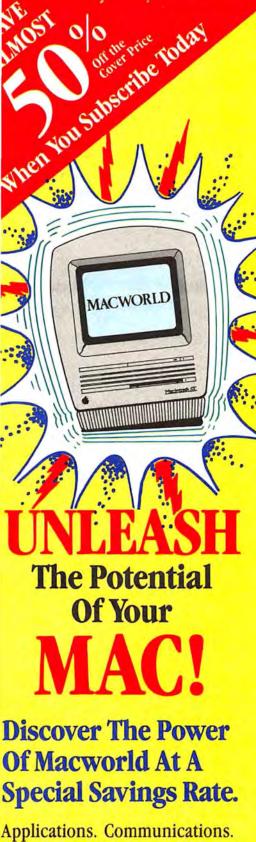
Never name a product after any of those luminaries.

If these strictures are faithfully adhered to, I believe the world will be a better place to live. Does this qualify *me* for a Nobel prize?



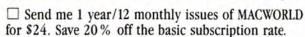

## An interview with Bill Campbell, president and CEO of Claris Corporation



On April 28, 1987, Apple Computer announced it would form a software subsidiary that would eventually spin off on its own. That announcement led to what we now know as Claris Corporation, the best known Macintosh software start-up ever. The company has released upgrades for formerly Apple-labeled programs: MacPaint, MacWrite, MacProject, and AppleWorks, with a new version of Mac-Draw expected out by this summer. Claris's first new programs, SmartForm Designer and SmartForm Manager, are expected out by the end of this year. As executive vice president and group executive for sales and marketing at Apple, Campbell had been part of the team that conceived Claris. Once a Columbia University football coach, Campbell was director of marketing for Kodak's film division before joining Apple. After four years with Apple he went on to lead the new offshoot, which now has its own quarters in Mountain View, California, with more than 140 employees.

How did Claris form?

Basically, Apple was in the application software business. Even after MacWrite and MacPaint were unbundled from the Macintosh, there was still some consternation among third-party developers about Apple competing in some areas of software. It was a low level of complaints; Apple really did not market the products aggressively, nor did it support them. And Apple did not have a commitment to continually upgrade those products, either. But then Apple brought Silver Surfer [now 4th Dimension] in-house, and the complaints grew to a very high level. It was seen as a symbol that Apple was going to remain in the software market. To make a long story short, we just said, "Let's not do it," and gave the product back to its developers.

After that, the point of view there was if we can't market that product, why is Apple in the software business? So Apple decided to exit the business. The company could have sold off its products individually, or as a group, but we decided to use them as a core group of products to start a software company.

What is Claris's status vis-à-vis Apple now?

Apple has 82 percent of the company; the Claris employees have 18 percent. Apple has provided to me and my team, through Claris's board of directors, a capitalization plan, approved by both Claris's board and Apple's board. It provides for a transfer of technology, those products that Apple has owned. It provides working capital and a fund, separate from working capital, that could be used for developing technology and acquisitions. As our cash flow increases, the fund diminishes; by the end of two years we'll be out of it.

People think that Apple's operation and our operation are the same. Somebody said to me, "It must be nice to be able to reach into Apple and take the money that you need," but that's just not a true picture. We have to live within our approved plan. There's nothing we do that isn't rigorously monitored by Apple's financial people.

The gaps in the product family you've released so far have raised many questions; how do you expect the product line to mature?

There are customer expectations, industry expectations, and *our* expectations. We have to have enough courage to make sure that our own expectations are met first.

What will our product line look like in a year? In two years? I'm not willing to talk about that at this point. But let me say this: we will not get into a category just to have a placeholder there. Coming in with merely a better product against PageMaker or against Excel is not a great decision. If it's a significantly better product—and if you have really put strong marketing arms and legs behind it—then you may have a chance.

So that means people in the industry are saying, "Ho hum. Four worn products plus AppleWorks and a new category. Ho hum." And we're willing to accept that response for now.

You describe your forms packages as a new category; it sounds as if you are expecting another desktop publishing success story.

That's an overstatement. People think every new application segment, every new metaphor, can be brought to that level. I

think that's just a dream. The metaphor in our SmartForm packages is a kind of information presenter, not just a forms-design tool. We expect that forms software will create a horizontal market, meaning the products will be very widely used. Just as desktop publishing started as a replacement for pasteup for professionals and then became popular with people who need to do a newsletter here, a flier there, first we'll see SmartForm Designer used in traditional forms design. And once it's accepted by the forms designers, it can come down to people in offices to replicate the forms that they've traditionally sent out to a designer and a typesetter.

With the ability to fill in the form and then send it around the office electronically, it really begins to look like a horizontal product.

You talk about wanting to develop products around core technology. What do you mean by that?

A couple of things. We want to provide a solid core that makes our products unique, that's durable and sustaining, and that can be extended over product families. Say for instance one of the cores is text. The text core could be used in a word processer, in a page-layout package, in MacDraw, in a forms package, in a presentation package. And every time you go out and do another product that includes text you don't have to reinvent the wheel.

The second part of the core idea is to create technologies that help bring products to market faster. Some consistency across all of your applications—a software platform—makes the development process more efficient.

Claris marketing vice president John Zeisler has been quoted as saying that Claris's role in life is to optimize the Macintosh platform. Is that a fair statement?

That's what our mission is. Back in April 1987 when Claris was conceived and created, the PS/2 and OS/2 had just been announced, and a lot of people said, "As soon as OS/2 Presentation Manager is available, Apple loses its advantage." And if you're Apple you sit back and think, wait a minute, the Macintosh platform will still provide advantages over OS/2—if software developers optimize for Macintosh.

Our role is not to do lowest-commondenominator code that can be brought to Windows. Such programs may look the same on both machines—and that would seem to help users—but we think it actu-

ally helps developers instead. We can make a great application just for the Macintosh, and we think ours will sell better than one that's been compromised by development for two machines.

Apple bundled MacPaint and MacWrite with the Mac in the early days partly to show what a good Macintosh program looked like and acted like. Is that part of your charter?

That's not part of our charter, nor do I think it's necessary. Guy Kawasaki and his band of evangelists at Apple accomplished that; software developers and users really believe in the consistency of the Macintosh software interface.

You now own AppleWorks. Does Claris intend to produce more software for the Apple II line?

We have no intention of producing more Apple II software. We have a true standard in AppleWorks, and we intend to improve and extend that product so it becomes as great a standard tomorrow on the Apple IIGS as it is now on the Apple II. You'll see some evolution of AppleWorks to take advantage of graphics and other features provided on the Apple HGS.

#### What about HyperCard?

We believe that HyperCard will be an important part of Apple's System software in the long term. Our applications will be very HyperCard-aware. On the other hand, we're not going to do stacks. We're not sure that we can make money doing HyperCard stacks.

How do you recognize good software?

The first thing we look for is simplicity. If you think, for example, of what Gerard Schutten has done with MacDraw II, you'll see that he has literally taken out a whole layer of menu commands. It's up to ten times more powerful than the previous MacDraw, yet it's simpler.

Simplicity for us allows accessibility. Accessibility allows for horizontal markets, or at least potential for that if we can convince people that the metaphor is good.

How does simplicity open those doors?

What we really need to do is bring along the people out there who have not even begun-perish the thought-to use microcomputers. There are people in offices who don't use them. Apple's original premise—Steve Jobs's original premisewas that computers ought to be accessible to everyone. Now that Apple has done its

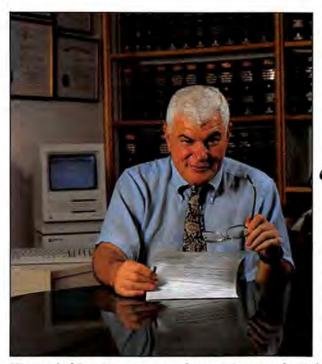

job, Claris has to create applications that are going to bring new people into the computing environment.

What products would you recommend to someone who asked you what to buy to put a small business on the Mac?

I can't make specific recommendations without knowing something about the person's business. But in general I'd say, first know that your company is going to be bigger tomorrow than it is today, so plan for that. And number two, the sooner you recognize that the computer is going to be as ubiquitous as the telephone, the better off you'll be. And plan that eventually everyone in the company will use the system

you buy. For any small business starting out, including the sole proprietorship, the Macintosh is the best choice.

Do you think that there will continue to be a place for integrated software products as MultiFinder takes hold?

Yes, there's a place for integrated products. We have had too much success with AppleWorks over time to think that there wouldn't be. With MultiFinder, people have predicted the demise of integrated software, but I think that Microsoft Works and Lotus's Modern Jazz will both do well. They're entry-level programs that allow people to grow with them.

We've become so concerned about the advanced user that we're forgetting that every day more people are coming into our market. The people who are coming in today may be a little afraid, and they need a package they'll feel comfortable with where the interface is consistent and going between applications is pretty easy.

And integrated software is more affordable than a battery of programs.

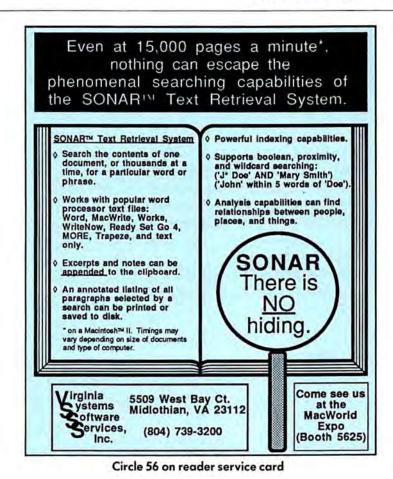
We in the industry become insensitive about price. The average person goes out there and shops around. If price weren't important we wouldn't see all the price-point advertising that dealers use. You go out there and pay \$1995 or \$2495 for a machine—and then you have to figure out what software to buy to become productive.

What about the price of the Mac itself? Would it help if there were a lower-priced version?

I think the value Apple provides for the price is quite good.

Would it help if Apple had an entrylevel product that could get into the price range of the IBM PC-compatible clones?

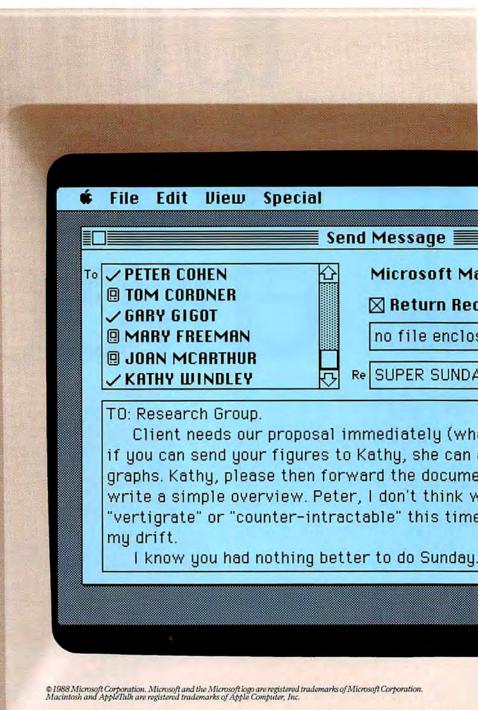




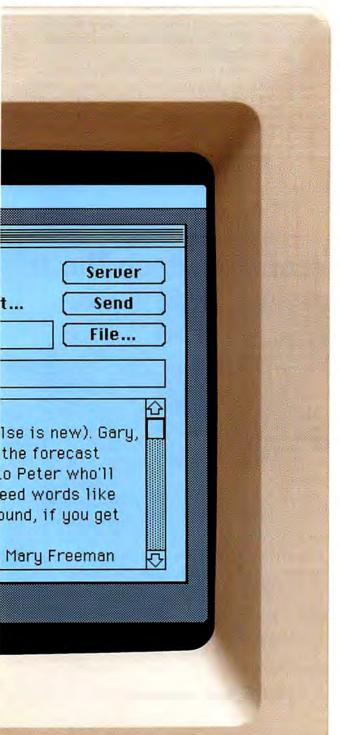

Yes, I think it would. But it might compromise what Apple is providing. If Apple could provide an affordable, entry-level machine, that would be great, but I would not cripple the machine to do it.

As a software developer, what would you hope for in hardware development?

I'd like to see something between an SE and a Mac II-maybe a modular SE or a lower-cost Mac II or both.

Do you think vaporware is a problem?

Only for the companies that offer it. We're going to try to avoid it. Many factors contribute to delays. Today testing has become a major problem. All the innovations in the Mac market force companies like ours to test and test and test before we release our programs. The testing cycle has increased enormously—color, new screens, new printers have all had a major impact. When you see a lot of software publishers taking longer to get their applications out, it's because of the enormous variety of thirdparty offerings that developers have to accommodate.

Claris provides customer support for programs that essentially have not had support direct from the publisher before. What do you consider good customer support and how did you decide what to set up?

The first thing to do is hire someone who's done it before. We did not want to cut our teeth on the customer. We got Bob Gafford as our director of support—an industry veteran who had been at Ashton-Tate. He's very flexible; he listens to what the customer wants. He put together a strong team of industry veterans. Bob and his team researched customer needs and developed a technical support and customer relations

We're providing free support for all of the products, whether they were purchased as Apple products or under the Claris label. We're accepting technical support calls 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. The volume of calls already has been shocking. We think Claris support is good today and will be great tomorrow.

Part of our customer support philosophy is our upgrade policy. It allows people who've had no upgrade since 1984 to get a new version at a reasonable price; it gives us a chance to collect their names and provides an opportunity to communicate with them. It has had phenomenal response.

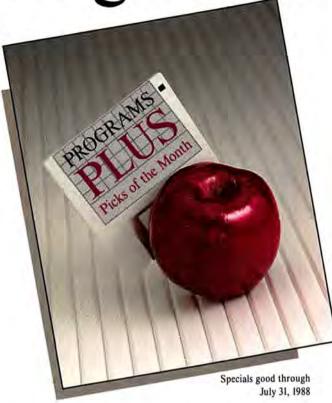

I really like to bear a lot of ideas, so my organization borders on anarchy.

Do you have a management philosophy?

Yes. First, put fundamentals in place. Then allow the organization to contribute. Don't be too rigid about anything and allow a lot of ideas to emerge. I really like to hear a lot of ideas, so my organization always borders on anarchy. If you allow some openness in the environment, you'll get people who are not going to be afraid to question and to inject new ideas.

How will you measure Claris's success?

There are two things, one that I can control and one that I can't. One measure is our business plan, a strategic and financial plan. If I can meet or exceed that then we will be successful. The second measure, our place

in the industry, is much more difficult; our competitors have a lot to do with that. We could be financially successful and not industry successful, because the way Macintosh is growing right now we could meet our goals without becoming a leader in the

To become important in the industry means engineering and marketing leadership. If the SmartForm products are well received upon their release, if we can turn that technology into a window into the database, then we can become important in the industry for having introduced a new metaphor into the marketplace. And if we can put a development organization in place that can bring out products that break new ground in other electronic metaphors and exceed the industry's expectations then, again, we'll become important.

Speaking of competition, how do you intend to meet your financial goals, and eventually shareholder goals, without participating at all in the IBM software market, when so many other developers find it necessary to produce software for both machines?

What you do is recognize the business opportunity that the Macintosh market provides, figure out what your place in that will be, and show an adequate return. It is a sound model.

We must be very good at the Macintosh side. And we just feel that, contrary to what a lot of these other developers feel, the Macintosh customer and the IBM customer are different—attitudinally and in their purchase needs. We think we know the Macintosh customer and how to market to that customer.

I have not seen anything in the evolution of the Mac that suggests a slowdown. I look at the market as a businessman, but I also went into this as a Macintosh devotee, someone who really feels that what Macintosh provides for users is very important.

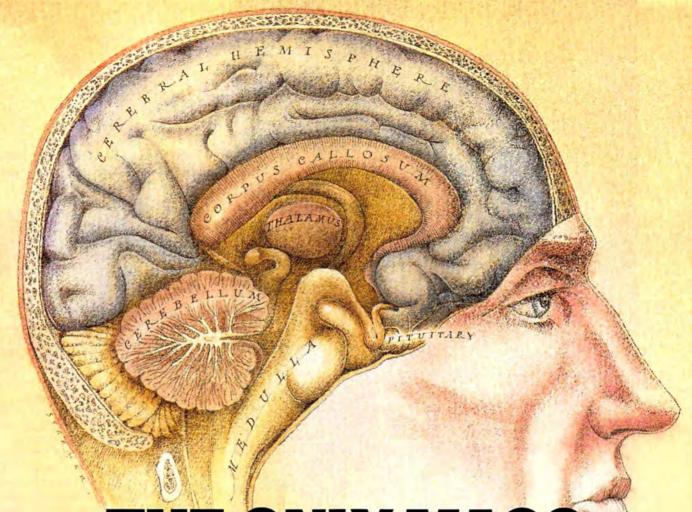

# Seven for **HyperTalk**



When dynamic and complex new products like HyperCard are re-

leased, the first few books about them are usually inadequate in important respects.

HyperCard is no exception. HyperTalk, HyperCard's programming language, is particularly in need of documentation.

■ HyperCard User's Guide (Apple Computer, 1987) comes with the product and is by far the best way to learn about HyperCard. The book's design is thoughtful and the ideas are explained clearly and succinctly. HyperCard Script Language Guide (Apple Computer, 1988) is available only to members of the Apple Programmer's and Developer's Association, a fine organization with a friendly and knowledgeable staff. However, HyperCard is not being sold as a developer's tool; I would like to see this documentation made available to all HyperCard users.

The two Apple guides, although of unquestionable value, are not enough to quench a HyperTalk script writer's thirst for a readable text that addresses such issues as program size, instruction speed, internal message handling, code optimizations, and external commands. Though also lacking in these "insider" concepts, a number of other first-wave books are helping HyperCard users survive the drought.

■ HyperCard Scripting (Jeff Stoddard, Walking Shadow Press, 1988). Strengths: Terrific explanations of object hierarchies and user-defined commands—both crucial to good HyperTalk programming. Weaknesses: The explanations

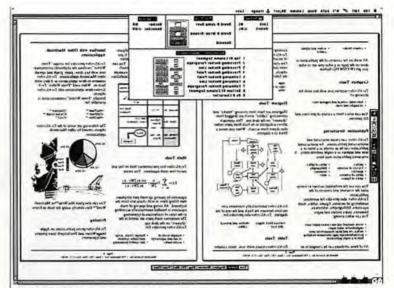

### Modular DTP



Still can't find a Mac desktop publishing program with all the

features you need? Perhaps you'll want to wait for the software millennium promised by TechScriber, a new WYSIWYG document processor under development at Mansfield Systems in Palo Alto, California.

Even in its infancy, TechScriber can rightfully claim an innovative modular structure. It consists of six feature-rich modules, which you can mix and match to fit your publishing needs and your budget.

TechScriber's core program is a page-oriented word processor to which you'll be able to add a page-layout module, offering fine control over text and graphics, and a structured document module intended for manuals and books. Three special-purpose modules—for tables, math symbols, and flow charts—complete the list of options.

When you need capabilities that TechScriber doesn't offer, such as graphics editing and spreadsheet analysis, you can run other programs as if they were part of the package. For instance, while working on a TechScriber document you can open MacDraw, create an illustration, and merge it into your document—all without exiting TechScriber or running a special importation routine.

Initially, Mansfield plans to bundle TechScriber modules in sets targeted for specific markets; the company will eventually sell the modules individually. While a release date and pricing structure haven't been fixed, you can expect to pay under \$1000 for the complete package, and \$200 to \$300 for a single module.—Steve Cummings

## Computer Chronicles



When Stewart Cheifet talks about the Macintosh on the television

program "Computer Chronicles," he's watched by about 825,000 viewers in 180 cities served by the PBS network.

For the past four years the "Computer Chronicles" news broadcast had been mostly MS-DOS oriented. But last September things changed. Since then, nearly half of the coverage has been about the Mac.

The change occured when the show's producers found they couldn't cover their topics without mentioning the Macintosh. Cheifet attributes the Mac's increased popularity to more public awareness of its graphics capabilities. He also observes that students who used the Mac in college are now going to work and demanding Macs.

"Computer Chronicles" devoted an entire show to Hyper-Card. The program featured

Bill Atkinson and brought the largest response any episode has had. According to Cheifet. people were saying, "I've got to buy a Mac to have HyperCard."

In spite of all this, Cheifet believes that the Mac's high price subjects it to competition from lower-priced computers like the Amiga, which has a Maclike interface and software like WordPerfect, or the Atari. which promises a \$595 CD ROM drive. "However, if the Mac becomes more price competitive," he adds, "I think it could really take over."

# Intelligence for the Rest of Us



You can think for yourself, but can your Mac? Apple and Texas In-

struments (TI), now an Apple Value-Added Reseller, say aveespecially when you have a TI Micro Explorer coprocessor board inside a Mac II.

TI's Micro Explorer makes the Mac the first personal computer ever to include a LISP microprocessor. The LISP chip was developed by TI specifically to run artificial intelligence (AI) programs. It sits on a Mac II NuBus board, along with up to 12 megabytes of memory.

However, hardware alone does not turn the Mac II into an Al workstation. TI also provides the software tools you need to develop AI applications: TI's Common LISP compiler, debugger, and editor; the Flavors object-oriented programming system; and user interface tools.

Another important feature of the Mac II-TI setup is that both Al and traditional Mac environments can run concurrentlyapplications running in either can cooperate or exchange data. For instance, an expert system might receive data from a program that controls a robotic assembly line; based on that information, the expert system could help the control program decide whether a part meets quality standards or must be rejected.

In addition, TI's Micro Explorer greatly lowers the price of developing LISP-based applications. Other LISP workstations range in price from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Prices for the Micro Explorer, which includes a Mac II, start at \$14,995 and extend to \$26,795, depending on the amount of memory, size of the hard disk, and type of monitor. Upgrade kits for current Mac II owners are also available.

## Art through a Modem



Finding just the right picture to dress up a page can be a frustrat-

ing experience for the desktop publisher. For instance, diskbased collections of clip art for the Macintosh often lack the kind of PostScript-based art that reproduces well on highquality imaging devices like LaserWriter printers or Linotronic typesetters.

Metro ImageBase promises to change this situation with its first Macintosh product, Metro ImageBase, a multivolume, disk-based library of artwork and other graphic elements designed specifically for desktop publishing.

Metro ImageBase is a division of Metro Creative Graphics, which has been supplying over 90 percent of the newspapers in North America with clip art since 1910. 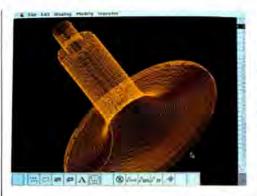
Computers have replaced the punched tape once used in manufacturing environments to control specially designed machine tools. Now, userfriendly Macs are beginning to replace those early, more difficult-to-use computers.

A Macintosh running manufacturing software from Gibbs and Associates can tell a two-foot-high milling machine, mounted on your desk, exactly how to manufacture a complicated part. Using industry-standard numerical control language, a Mac can even run very large milling machines and lathes that shape complex, expensive parts.

Using Gibbs's ncCAD program, users can design threedimensional parts or import designs from other CAD software. Helping in the concep-

## Desktop Video Takes Off



With the Mac II's gray-scale and color screens, creating and

editing videos on your Mac is a much closer possibility than ever before. Nine companies have announced products with video input/output capabilities. These range from the \$5995 Truevision NuVista, a programmable 24-bit color card with electronic editing, to the Koala MacVision, a \$399 system for capturing video images on the Macintosh. This first wave of new products will strengthen the Mac-to-TV connection.

Pixelogic and Comtrex both offer products that can import and export video images on a Mac Plus or SE. Comtrex also sells an inexpensive videoediting console; Data Translation manufactures a card for the Mac II that imports and exports gray-scale images.

Computer Friends continues to be the only company shipping a Mac II color board with video capabilities. The board, TV Producer, is currently limited to exporting the Mac video signal for mixing or recording with external video. Computer Friends hopes to add freeze-frame, which can capture snapshots of external video signals for storing and editing.

MegaGraphics announced a color card that will have video input and output options and gray-scale freeze-frame capability. RasterOps expects to have two 24-bit color boards and an 8-bit color board available before July; the 8-bit board will import and export color video images.



Mass Micro has announced a new Mac II color board that will include color import/ export abilities as a standard feature. It will also display 1600-by-1200-pixel-resolution monochrome images on a compatible monitor.

# CD ROM Goes HyperCard



Just how do you find your way through a CD ROM that holds a

whopping 550 megabytes of information? Many CD ROM developers are answering this question with one word: HyperCard.

HyperCard is being used as a search-and-retrieval engine and a user interface. The engine locates specific information on a CD ROM disk; the user interface acts as the go-between for the user and the engine.

Apple gave out a CD ROM sampler disk of five HyperCard works-in-progress. The Whole Earth Catalog CD ROM stack includes the entire text of The Essential Whole Earth Catalog, about 25 percent of the original graphics, and over two hours of music and sound. Another multimedia CD ROM stack is The Americana Series from Grolier Electronic Publishing. It uses animated maps, historical documents, illustrations, and folk songs to teach United States history from 1800 to 1850.

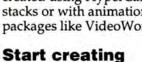

# The Inside Story

At UCLA's Department of Radiological Sciences, X rays are being displayed on a Macintosh II instead of a standard viewbox. Dr. Osman Ratib chose the Mac because of radiologists' widespread acceptance of the Plus and SE for routine tasks like word processing and presentation graphics. And the Mac II is ideal for X-ray display, because it handles gray-scale images.

Ratib's challenge will be to integrate the Mac II smoothly into UCLA's existing electronicimaging network, which runs on a VAX mainframe and uses optical disks to store the huge amounts of data that radiologists accumulate daily. So far, diagnostic images ranging from chest X rays to ultrasounds

have been successfully transferred from the VAX to the Mac using standard telecommunications software.

Next, pictures will be sent over high-speed Ethernet lines, and easy-to-use software will be developed for retrieving images on the Macintosh. Also in the works are programs that will enable physicians to bring out image details that wouldn't be obvious to the naked eve. using color, animation, and sta-

cess a lot easier, Emerald City Software has created LaserTalk, a new PostScript development environment.

LaserTalk's list of amenities starts with a full-screen, multiwindow text editor that automates some PostScript-code formatting chores, such as surrounding program lines with braces and indenting lines properly.

Yet another LaserTalk convenience is a dictionary browser.

The LaserWriter's dictionaries contain the printer's collections of important subroutine-like PostScript procedures. With the browser, you can view the dictionary code, edit it to suit your own needs, and download the customized dictionaries back into the printer. Finally, Laser-Talk provides a preview window that displays the contents of the LaserWriter buffer on screen, so that you can view a page and make changes before printing it in hard copy. 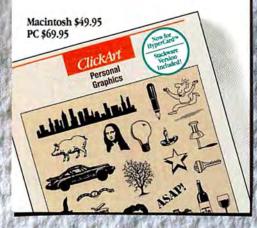

## The 68030s Are Here

Faster performance and more power are coming to the Mac II, thanks to accelerator boards

sporting Motorola's newest CPU: the 68030. Known as the Oh Thirty, it can transform the

Mac II into a speedy workstation for engineers, architects, and designers seeking more productivity from their complex programs and databases.

Although Dove Systems, MacPeak, and TSI announced 68030 boards last January, shipping dates, prices, and product specifications are still not available. However, Computer Systems Associates (CSA) and Mac-Products USA have been shipping prototypes to testers.

MacProducts plans a series of upgradable boards beginning with a Mac II model followed by one for the SE. This firm's first 20-MHz 68030 accelerator should cost \$3995 and should be available by August. It's expected to improve most nondisk operations by at least five times and numeric operations by four to five times when used with the optional 68882 math coprocessor. A 30-MHz version may be available by the end of the year and should cost about \$4995.

CSA's board also uses a 16-MHz 68030, but its price is expected to be \$995 when purchasers trade in their 68020 chip. However, with a real-time software debugger and software enhancements to take advantage of the Oh Thirty's superior performance, this board is more for developers than for end users.

Potential purchasers will also want to consider a whole new

series of boards that use 68000 and 68020 microprocessors running at clock speeds of 25 MHz-three times their current heartbeats. These accelerators are expected to be available by the August Macworld Expo and may prove more software-compatible than the 68030 boards.

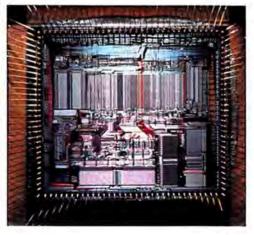

from Apple, 3Com, or Kinetics; and for Sun's Network File System, which allows shared access to files over a network. Third-party products, like AST's Intelligent Communications Processor board and SuperMac's A/UX AppleTalk product—in conjunction with UNIX implementations of the AppleTalk protocols from companies like TOPS, Kinetics, and Mt. Xinu—will allow A/UX users to link to AppleTalk-based networks.

Apple will offer several purchase options. For a limited time, it will offer an upgrade bundle for existing Mac II owners-including A/UX on an internal or external Apple Hard Disk 80SC, 4 megabytes of RAM, and the Motorola Paged Memory Management Unit (PMMU) chip—(\$5459 with an external drive). Apple will also offer entry-level as well as complete A/UX systems with both color and monochrome displays. Prices range from \$8597 for the system with a 12-inch monochrome display to \$10,795 for the complete system, which includes 4MB of RAM and a 13inch color monitor. In comparison, Sun's 3/60 gray-scale workstation and Apollo's Domain 3000 with a color monitor both sell for about \$15,000.-David Ushijima

# Apple's Utopia?



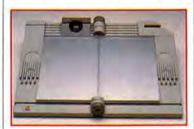
Your future Macintosh may be viewed in a recent 15-minute video-

tape from Apple that shows a university professor opening a computer that resembles a thick file folder. In the computer's upper left-hand corner is an animated assistant who talks and listens, searches for information, and even says "Have a nice day" as you leave the room.



An Apple videotape reveals one concept for the future of personal computing: Knowledge Navigator. Could the computer be a Mac X?

Apple calls this advanced concept the Knowledge Navigator, referring to the way tomorrow's computer might steer through massive informational databases to find exactly what you want. Additional features include video telephone, seamless use of different data.formats, flat-screen color display, and an artificial-intelligence—based command system that

means the computer does what you want even if your directions are unclear.

Actually, almost all the concepts dramatized in Apple's video were demonstrated eight years ago in the Media Lab at MIT, according to Apple Fellow Alan Kay. He believes that not only should future computers employ a natural human interface, but they also ought to go

far beyond the current fad for extending previously developed technologies like printing, photography, telephony, sound recording, and television. Computers should be based on new ways of analyzing our complex world, and especially on methods that overcome our observational blind spots. For instance, people living in a valley with a growing air-pollution problem may never notice that nearby mountains have slowly disappeared. But get those same people up in an airplane, and what's happening to the valley becomes starkly apparent, according to Kay.

In summary, Kay suggests we invent new ways of looking at our world and then develop appropriate new hardware and software.

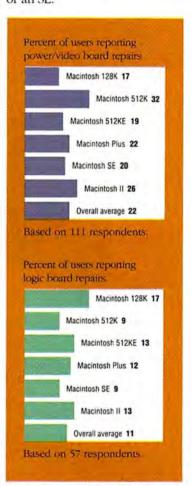
## Macworld News: Readers' Views



This month's reader survey focuses on the reliability of two com-

ponents built into every Macintosh. We asked 1000 randomly selected *Macworld* subscribers about power/video and logic board (sometimes called system board) problems, because of continuing burn-out reports.

Returns from 504 respondents show that 277 (55 percent) required some kind of servicing. Of these, 111 needed repairs to the power/video board and 57 to the logic board. As the charts below show, the Mac 512K and Mac II needed the most power/video board repairs, while the Mac 128K needed the most logic board servicing. In looking at board repairs, keep in mind that the machine's age must be taken into account—that is, a Mac 128K has had more time to need repairs than has a Mac II or an SE.



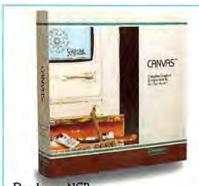

# Five Mid-Range Hard Disks

Between the personal disk and the gigabyte file server, mid-range disks offer speed and expanded capacity at an affordable price

wenty megabytes just doesn't go as far as it once did. With applications growing in size, graphics documents taking up 2MB and more, and users sharing network storage, the demand for midrange hard disks is growing steadily.

This review looks at five external hard disks with capacities in the 140- to 150MB range: the CMS SD140k, the Jasmine Direct Drive 160, the NuData Data Cell, the Rodime 140 Plus, and the SuperMac DataFrame XP 150. All can be used with any Macintosh that has a SCSI port: the Mac Plus, SE, or II, or even a modified 512K. However, these hard disks are high-performance machines that do their best with the faster SCSI port on the Mac SE or the even faster SCSI port on the Mac II.

#### Performance Indicators

Price and performance are the most important items on a hard disk buyer's checklist. Prices are easy to compare, but hard disk performance is difficult to measure in a meaningful way. Manufacturers like to cite average access time, which is how many milliseconds, on average, a hard disk drive takes to locate the spot at which to read or write, once the computer has requested data. But access time is only one aspect of performance.

The five drives I tested, like most drives in their class, can sustain data transfer rates at or above the capacity of the SCSI port on any Macintosh. The Mac II

SCSI port transfers data at up to 1250K per second, the Mac SE at 656K per second, and the Mac Plus at 312K per second.

Hard disk manufacturers have come up with several schemes to compensate for the mismatch between a disk drive's data transfer rate and the slower Mac SE or Plus SCSI ports. NuData and Rodime follow Apple's lead and arrange the blocks of data, called sectors, at different intervals on the disk surface, according to the Macintosh model to which the hard disk is connected. The interval pattern is called the *interleave ratio*. The standard interleave ratio is 3 to 1 for a Mac Plus, 2 to 1 for a Mac SE, and 1 to 1 for a Mac II. (For a diagram illustrating the concept of the interleave ratio, see "The Disk Shopper's Guide to Storage," *Macworld*, December 1987.)

If the disk's interleave ratio does not match the computer's, performance suffers. When you move a Rodime or NuData hard disk to a different model Macintosh, you must reformat the disk to change the interleave ratio. Reformatting erases all data stored on the disk.

The CMS, Jasmine, and SuperMac hard disks use special software that permits a 1 to 1 interleave ratio with any Macintosh. This less conservative approach, which does not strictly follow Apple gospel, should result in better performance on a Mac SE or Mac Plus.

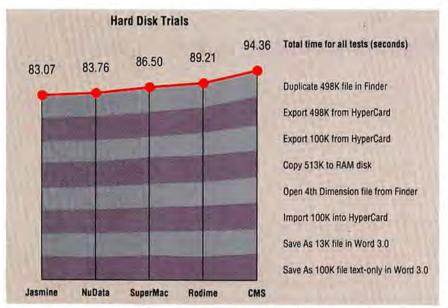
All these performance indicators measure a hard disk's theoretical performance. In practice, a number of other factors tend to even out hard disk performance on similarly configured Macs. When opening and saving documents, for example, most applications

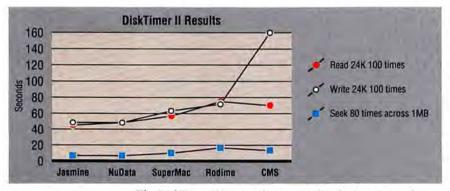
spend more time massaging information inside the Mac than they do transferring it to or from the disk. Similarly, opening and quitting applications involves spending significant time on nondisk tasks. Performance varies among hard disks, but less than you might expect.

#### **Performance Tests**

I tested hard disk performance in three ways. First, I used each one for two weeks in my everyday work with a 4MB Mac SE. Second, I timed eight tasks typical in everyday use. And third, I ran the DiskTimer II tests.



All five hard disks run at about the same speed for most everyday tasks. However, the Jasmine, NuData, and SuperMac drives are at least 35 percent faster when writing unprocessed information. Normalized times give the tests equal importance on the chart; the numbers at the top plot how long (in seconds) each disk took to complete all the tests.



The DiskTimer II test results suggest that the Jasmine and NuData hard disks are faster than the others, but in actual use there is little perceptible speed difference among the five products.

In everyday work, I noticed no particular difference between the performances of the five hard disks. I had about 70MB of identical files on each disk, and I had the Control Panel RAM cache off at all times.

The timed tests included saving a 13K formatted document in Microsoft Word 3.02, using the Save As command; saving a 100K text-only document in Microsoft Word 3.02, using the Save As command; importing 100K of text into HyperCard; opening the 4th Dimension Personnel example database from the Finder; copying a 513K System file to a RAM disk; exporting 498K of text from HyperCard; exporting 100K of text from HyperCard; and duplicating a 498K file with the Finder. Before testing a hard disk, I reformatted it and copied a uniform 15MB set of files to it, always copying in the same sequence. MultiFinder was off, the Control Panel's RAM cache was off, and AppleTalk was on.

All five performed similarly when opening and saving test documents and when opening test applications. Some of the drives copied a file in the Finder and exported text from HyperCard faster than others. Both those tasks involve writing to disk with little data manipulation, a relatively uncommon Macintosh activity.

The "Hard Disk Trials" chart shows the test results, normalized by dividing each disk's test time by the average time for the test. The normalized results de-emphasize the variation in times among tests and emphasize the variation in test times among drives. To provide a sense of scale, the chart also shows the total time each disk took to perform all eight tests.

The DiskTimer II tests measure theoretical performance (for my findings, see "DiskTimer II Results"). The value of these tests is hotly disputed. Charles McConathy of CMS says that using them to examine disk performance is like "looking at an elephant with a magnifying glass." But the DiskTimer II numbers are widely published for many hard disks, and they do show some correlation with everyday-use tests.

#### Reliability

Reliability is probably the most difficult disk attribute to evaluate. How do you measure the unpredictable and irregular? Manufacturers extrapolate the mean time between component failures (MTBF) from stress tests. The MTBF measures an average lifetime of probable reliability, but not guaranteed reliability.

During their lifetime most hard disks develop flaws on the disk surface and mark those flawed areas as unusable. The Jasmine, NuData, and SuperMac hard disks remap new defects automatically. The CMS disk includes a utility you can use to substitute a spare, unflawed area of the disk for a defective area without erasing the disk. With the Rodime hard disk, you must back up what files you can, reformat the disk to block out the defects, and then restore the files from the backup.

To reduce the chance of a head crash during operation, the drive mechanisms in all the units I tested have some shock mounting to absorb minor bumps

and vibrations. To further reduce the chance of a head crash, the five disks all have thin-film disk surfaces. The thin film is less likely to develop defects than the conventional media used in most 20MB hard disks.

#### Help When You Need It

Technical support begins with a manual and ends with a phone call to the manufacturer. The quality of the manuals varied widely, from SuperMac's and Jasmine's thorough, well-written, two-manual sets to Rodime's turgid sheaf of photocopied pages. All five manufacturers have a technical support department that customers can call during business hours. Only NuData has an 800 number (for callers outside California).

To test the quality of tech support, I telephoned anonymously and asked two hypothetical questions. First, I said I had been using my hard disk with a Mac SE and was now going to use it with a Mac II. Should I change the interleave ratio, and if so, how? Second, I described the symptoms of a congested Desktop file (slow file copying in the Finder) and asked for help. I'll discuss the merit of the responses later.

#### Beneath the Surface

In a sense, this is a review not of five hard disks but of two. The CMS and Rodime units both use the same drive assembly, which is manufactured by Rodime. The Jasmine, NuData, and SuperMac disks all use a drive manufactured by Control Data Corporation. Both types of drive assemblies have embedded SCSI controller electronics for improved reliability and

performance. The CDC drive mechanism is faster, physically larger, noisier, and has a higher capacity and a longer life than the Rodime one.

A cooling fan also contributes to the noise level in all of the drives. Overall, the CMS machine was the quietest, and the SuperMac was the loudest. However, noise levels can vary from unit to unit. Furthermore, even a quiet hard disk can become noisy with a year or two of use.

Connecting multiple SCSI devices involves the black art of termination. In theory, the first and last SCSI devices connected to a Mac must have terminators. When more than two devices are connected to the Mac, the ones in the middle must not have terminators. Of the five hard disks I tested, only the NuData Data Cell 150 is unterminated. If it's the first or last SCSI device connected to your Mac, you must purchase an external terminator.

The other drives have internal termination, which is great if the disk is one of only two SCSI devices connected to your Mac. But removing internal termination so you can connect the disk between two other SCSI devices ranges from easy to very difficult. On a Jasmine Direct Drive 160, you simply unplug a connector located behind an access panel on the bottom of the cabinet. On a Rodime 140 Plus, you have to take off the cabinet cover and pry out three small electronic parts. Removing termination from the CMS SD140k would be more difficult, but CMS recommends experimenting with cable length instead of removing termination.

The termination on the SuperMac DataFrame 150 is buried inside the drive assembly where the average user won't want to try to remove it.

#### Software

Aside from cabinet style and price, it's software that differentiates hard drives of the same class. Not surprisingly, the less expensive drives offer less elaborate software. All manufacturers include the basics: a backup application, a utility to format the disk and install driver software, and a disk test utility. However, the backup application shipped with the CMS and Jasmine drives, HD Backup version 1.0, was virtually useless for drives of this capacity because it can only back up to floppies. Fortunately CMS and Jasmine price their drives lower than equivalent competitors, and you can pick and choose from software others sell separately.

#### CMS SD140k

"No frills" best describes the CMS SD140k. This basic hard disk was the quietest of the bunch and worked well except for a few minor annoyances. The manual is presentable, fairly complete, and readable. However, I could not set the SCSI priority correctly by referring to the documented switch settings in the appendix, so I had to resort to trial and error. And the manual does not explain what all the files included on the disk are for. A ReadMe document on disk tries to explain them, but it's inaccurate and confusing.

A call to CMS technical support cleared my confusion and solved a problem. I couldn't use the SDI40k to start up the Mac SE, and its icon wouldn't appear automatically on the Desktop file when I started up from another disk. Tech support told me to put a mysterious file named InitPramFix v.2 in the System Folder of the start-up disk. This file was shipped on the SDI40k but was not in its System Folder. To compound the confusion, the ReadMe document said the file was only for Mac II use. Following tech support's advice, I was able to solve my start-up problems.

CMS tech support was less helpful with one of my hypothetical questions. I was told that to fix the congested Desktop file problem, I would have to wait until Apple released a Desktop Manager application, which I could then use instead of the Finder. While the Apple-Share file server software includes a Desktop Manager, Apple had not announced plans to incorporate that structure into the Mac's Finder. The person I spoke with did not know about rebuilding the Desktop file. Reaching CMS technical support took some effort. The manual encourages contacting your dealer and doesn't include any phone numbers for CMS.

The CMS utility software has a couple of special features. It allows you to reassign flawed areas of the disk to unused areas. Also, it gives you a choice of disk icons.

#### Jasmine Direct Drive 160

With me, Jasmine lived through every manufacturer's nightmare. My Direct Drive 160 failed shortly after it arrived, probably from transit damage. Jasmine quickly replaced it with a review unit that inadvertently hadn't been upgraded with the production ROMs. The third drive arrived promptly and worked without a hitch. Like all Jasmine drives, the Direct Drive 160 has an air filter and surge protection. It also comes with almost 10MB of public domain software and shareware. In addition, you get MacTree, an interesting utility that constructs a map of the folder hierarchy on the disk (see *Reviews*, *Macworld*, June 1988).

The two manuals are well written and complete, although they tend to define and describe more than to provide methods and solutions. For example, one



#### Cost per Megabyte

The bars compare prices per megabyte, using list prices and formatted capacities. The CMS drive was clearly the cheapest. While bundled software will affect price per megabyte slightly, not all the software that comes with a drive is essential.

manual defines interleaving, but does not say what ratio the drive uses, nor whether the drive should be reformatted for a Mac SE or II.

The manual does explain how to cure a congested Desktop file, thereby answering my second hypothetical tech support question.

The Jasmine technical support phone number is published in the manual. The person I spoke with was courteous and reasonably responsive when I was having trouble using the Direct Drive 160 as the start-up

device. Tech support concerning any Mac-related issue is available to all Jasmine customers by phone.

#### NuData Data Cell 150

The Data Cell 150 costs more than three of the other hard disks do, but you get more for the extra outlay. The disk comes with lots of useful software, including a disk optimizer and one of the most versatile backup applications available. An interesting feature of the utility application is partitioning. It lets you divide the disk into any number of volumes (the Mac treats each volume as a separate "disk").

The NuData manual describes how to set up and install the disk drive and how to use the software. It does not, however, offer as much advice on using a hard disk effectively or on troubleshooting as do some of the other manuals.

NuData's technical support is easy to reach, and it's free if you live outside California. The person I spoke with was patient and helpful, even though I was asking questions that the manual answers.

#### Rodime 140 Plus

The 140 Plus worked flawlessly from the moment I installed it. Rodime has been making hard disk mechanisms for years, including the ones Apple uses in its Hard Disk 20SC. Last year, Rodime began packaging its own hard disks for retail sale.

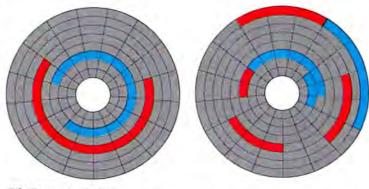
Rodime's support of the 140 Plus doesn't measure up to the quality of the product, however. The manual is ponderous, uses jargon excessively, and is incomplete. For example, it doesn't mention the interleave

#### Problems in Common

The five hard disks I tested exhibited a common performance problem, one all hard disks share to a greater or lesser degree. After you use a disk for a while, the Finder starts slowing down. The slowdown shows most when you copy a file to the hard disk. It can take two minutes to copy a 5K file, with most of that time spent updating the invisible Desktop file. The approved solution is to rebuild the Desktop file by pressing Option-# while starting up the Mac. Unfortunately, rebuilding the Desktop file loses all Get Info comments except for applications that have standard comments in their creator resources. The NuData and Data Cell 150 come with a utility that clears a congested Desktop file without losing the Get Info comments. To really solve this problem, Apple needs to improve the Finder's handling of the Desktop file.

Eventually, all hard disks also suffer from file fragmentation. A fragmented file isn't located in one continuous piece of disk real estate, but is scattered in little pieces across the disk. Fragmentation slows disk performance, and it gets worse with normal use. To consolidate fragmented files, you can back

up all files, reformat the disk, and restore the files from the backup. Utility software can also fix fragmentation, but you must still back up files first in case something goes wrong during the consolidation process. NuData includes a defragmentation utility with the Data Cell 150.

ratio or the fact that you must reformat the 140 Plus if you move it from one Macintosh model to another. It does not say whether Rodime provides technical support, and it doesn't list a phone number for Rodime. Tech support does exist, and they had answers for my two hypothetical questions (though the answer to one question was not very helpful).

#### SuperMac DataFrame XP 150

The SuperMac DataFrame XP 150 was a troublefree performer that came with lots of top-quality software. It includes an easy-to-use backup application, two superior print spoolers, and a data-encryption utility. You do pay more for the DataFrame package than for most of the others I reviewed, and it was the noisiest drive I tested. It easily drowned out a loud Mac SE.

SuperMac supports its products well. Its twomanual set is thorough and very readable. However, the manuals don't discuss interleave ratio. Technical support knows about the interleave ratio, and about rebuilding the Desktop file to make it more efficient. But I was told—incorrectly—that Finder 6.0 doesn't destroy Get Info comments when you rebuild the Desktop file. Tech support was easy to get; the phone number appears several places in the manual.

#### Which to Buy

Choosing one of the five hard disks is difficult. All are fine performers—you really can't go wrong buying any of them. The CMS disk is cheapest and quietest. The Rodime disk is almost as quiet, is smaller and more attractive, but seems overpriced compared to its competition. SuperMac, NuData, and Jasmine seem to offer the best support, and all three disks hold 11MB more and are somewhat faster than CMS's and Rodime's, but they're also bigger and noisier. If I were buying a hard drive for the Mac Plus or SE, I would buy the CMS SD140k because of its low price. If I were buying a drive for the Mac II, I would pick the Jasmine Direct Drive 160, because it offers speedy performance at a low price. You should base your decision on the attributes that are most important to you.

# Music Processing: The Next Generation

aul Sadowski, proprietor of Music Publishing Services in New York, is one of this country's finest music engravers. His firm has undertaken major compositions by some of America's foremost composers, including Leonard Bernstein, John Cage, and Gil Evans, and works routinely with such respected publishers as Boosey & Hawkes and C. F. Peters. Sadowski's own engraving has been exhibited at the Philadelphia Museum of Art and the Museum of

Print, and Professional Composer found a niche among hobbyists and even many professional composers who were open-minded enough to put up with the sometimes monthly onslaught of bug-fixing updates issued by the developers of these ground-breaking programs. The serious publishing and engraving industry never perceived these early attempts as anything more than toys. Even devoted and highly qualified users were rewarded with nothing more than frustration when they attempted to apply the programs to music of even moderate complexity. Output tended to violate far too many time-honored rules of music notation.

When Adobe Systems released its now famous Sonata font of PostScript music symbols, the music community held its breath in anticipation as literally every one of the aforementioned first-generation products rushed to include PostScript compatibility. Sadly, adding access to a PostScript font within an existing software package didn't raise a program's capabilities to professional level any more than adding PostScript fonts to MacDraw's QuickDraw graphics brought that program into competition with Adobe Illustrator.

Second-generation music processors, on the other hand, took full PostScript compatibility to be a prerequisite. For some, this implied new PostScript music fonts in addition to Adobe's Sonata font. Second-generation developers learned from the mistakes of the first-generation packages, consulting professional publishers, engravers, and copyists and making every effort to fulfill their needs. Nearly all program aspects have been redesigned, from input methods, editing, and formatting to output, both MIDI and PostScript.

As of this writing, six or seven programs in various stages of development qualify as second-generation music processing software. Most of them fulfill 99 percent of the requirements for notating music based on nineteeth-century Western tonality, and all produce high-quality printed output. Only HB Music Engraver from HB Imaging has been officially released. Coda's Finale and Graphic Notes' Music Publisher are in the final days of beta testing. High Score from Southworth Music, a product from Passport Designs (codenamed MasterScore), and Advanced Music Notation Systems' Nightingale are deep in the testing stage but should be available by the time you read this or shortly thereafter. Shaherazam, the company that brought you Music-Type, has a package in the pre-beta-test stage that was unavailable for evaluation.

ExampleKrafter from MusicKrafters is another product with a new focus, that of creating musical examples consisting of a single staff or a connected group of staves for scholarly publications. This package is available now, and while it is capable of producing elegant PostScript output of complex music, its limitation to single musical systems dictates its exclusion from the current discussion.

Although these new programs have the advanced features required by publishers, engravers, and conservatory-trained professionals, most of them can be effectively used by people who merely play by ear.

Using new pitch-tracking devices, all you need to do is sing or play your kazoo into a microphone (of course, it simplifies matters if you can bang out a melody on a MIDI keyboard).

#### **Faster Input**

With the new programs' emphasis on the professional market, considerations of input efficiency are paramount. After all, time is money. Serious contenders in this race support both mouse input (clicking notes onto the screen, often with MIDI audio feedback) and MIDI step-time input (entering a note's rhythmic value with the mouse or Macintosh keyboard and simultaneously entering its pitch with an attached MIDI keyboard). Radical new approaches to both these methods, as well as wholly new alternatives, are being explored.

The guest for input speed led the creators of Music Publisher to develop a supplementary input device, the Presto Keyboard, which attaches to the Apple Desktop Bus. This keyboard, pictured in Figure 1, is dedicated to the specification of musical pitch. That approach has already proven itself on hundreds of thousands of pages published by Columbia Pictures Music using a proprietary system. I found it to be even more effective in Music Publisher's new and improved redesign. My one complaint is that the Presto Keyboard functions only in treble and bass clefs.

To enter music in the (admittedly less used) alto or tenor clefs, one must in effect pretend that these are treble clefs and enter music accordingly. This presents great confusion to anyone fluent in reading alto and tenor clefs. Graphic Notes is considering adding an option to remedy this failing. But even without this improvement, the Presto Keyboard may very well be the fastest method now available for inputting music into a computer.

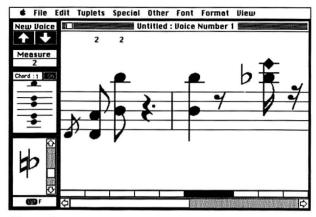


Figure 2 HB Music Engraver uses 17-by-20-pixel noteheads for input, on the theory that this large format speeds mouse input. The trade-off is that you can see no more than five or six notes at any time in the editing mode.

HB Imaging has made a unique attempt at improving input of music with the mouse. The HB solution—the use of real big notes (see Figure 2)—seems much less likely to meet with acceptance, however. Some people may agree with HB's philosophy that if the notes are displayed large enough, speedier entry will be possible because the mouse clicks need be merely in the general vicinity of a specific staff line. But imagine being forced to type text in a 144-point font, being able to see only about five or six characters on screen at a time, and then having to switch to a Show Page mode every time you wanted to read a sentence or even a word longer than two syllables. Add having to switch to another mode to add punctuation, and to yet another mode to capitalize the first word of each paragraph, and you've got a scenario for a writer's nightmare.

This view-one-staff-at-a-time input method is about the closest thing I've seen on a Macintosh to the ancient single-command-line interface that even the IBM world would like to forget. HB Engraver also carries Music Publisher's clef deception beyond the limits of acceptability: when entering music from a MIDI keyboard that is intended for the bass clef, we are requested to pretend that the bass clef is a treble clef.

Finale improves on previous real-time MIDI keyboard entry methods. Up to now, before MIDI data could be converted to notation, it had to be tediously quantized (a sort of rounding-off of the rhythm) to a user-specified note value; this required playing in time to a metronomic click produced by the Macintosh. Finale's developers have devised a system that uses socalled *companding* and pattern-matching techniques to deduce the correct notation of music played on a MIDI keyboard without a Mac-generated reference click. Two methods are available: you can tap on a pedal to specify the beat, or you can simply play freely and later specify beat or measure boundaries by tapping during playback (Finale even correctly determines changing meter signatures).

In the first case, it is actually possible to watch music appear correctly notated on the screen during a performance. In the latter case, music appears in pianoroll notation prior to transcription. Freed from the robotic tyranny of the metronome, the performer may play with feeling, speeding up and slowing down as musical expression demands.

Other features of this input method include accurate tracking of rhythmically independent parts on single staves, determination of triplets and other tuplets (a problem first-generation sequencers have still not solved), and a *floating*, or active, keyboard split-point between the right and left hands (when you request this option, Finale asks you to play the widest intervals you can, and records your finger span). If you're a professional musician you'd better sit down when you watch all this in action—it's like traveling into the next century. (Throughout this article you'll notice my discussions tend to emphasize Finale. The reason for this is simple: with more features by far and usually the most advanced implementations of features, Finale represents most clearly the state of the art in music processing.)

When notation programs for the Macintosh first started to appear, most packages took a modular approach to MIDI input; they employed one program (known as a sequencer) for capturing MIDI data and another for converting the data to notation and for editing. This approach was dictated mostly by the memory limitations of Macs previous to the Mac Plus. Only two of the new products retain this separationof-powers philosophy: Southworth's High Score is designed to work in conjunction with the company's

#### **High Score**

Pros: Aimed at general musicians, composers, and arrangers. Optimized to work with Southworth Music Systems' popular sequence programs MIDIPaint and OneStep. Commendable PostScript implementation.

Ease of use a primary design concept. Shares files when running under MultiFinder with Southworth Sequencers.

Inexpensive (\$200).

Cons: Conversion of MIDI data to High Score is a one-way process. No direct MIDI input or output capabilities. First release handles a maximum of 16 stayes.

#### **Passport Designs**

Pros: Excellent choice for general musicians or copyists. Practical for composers and arrangers. Optimized to work with MasterTracks Pro Sequencer. Interface and features are illustrative of what Professional Composer might have been if Mark of the Unicorn had listened to its users. Will include some filmscoring features: hit lists or tempo maps, can slave to MIDI Time Code. Will include some features aimed at composers. Easy to use. Midrange price.

Cons: No direct real-time MIDI In except through MasterTracks Pro. Limited range of note values: whole note to a 64th note. Questionable implementation of ability to bind lyric syllables to notes.

#### Music Publisher 1.0

Pros: Excellent for general musician and copyist. Missing some features for composers and arrangers but will fulfill most tra-

ditional music publishing requirements. Presto Keyboard provides for extremely fast input. Includes tools for drawing on score, library of tablature, spelling checker for musical terms, and see-through, stick-on key labels for reference. Prints music in columns. WYSIWYG. Closely adheres to Macintosh interface. Easy to learn. Midrange price (\$595) includes Presto Keyboard. (Also comes in a professional multiuser version, \$895.)

Cons: No MIDI In or MIDI
Out as of this writing but developer is rushing to include MIDI
implementation. Learning the
Presto Keyboard is relatively
easy, but getting up to full
speed on the alternate Macintosh keycaps may take extra
time. Current version allows
only singly dotted notes.

#### Nightingale .70

Pros: Aimed at composers, engravers, publishers, orchestra-

tors, arrangers, and general musicians. Many state-of-the-art features already implemented and more on the agenda. Will include many additional features for composers. Easy to learn. Follows Macintosh interface but adds many innovative power-user features. Supports selection of discontiguous regions. Permits fine-tuning of any symbol's graphic or MIDI parameters. Midrange price.

Cons: Extremely comprehensive and ambitious development spec indicates we may have to wait some time for product release.

MIDIPaint and OneStep MIDI sequencers, and MasterScore is optimized for Passport's MasterTracks line of sequencers.

#### Text in the Musical Context

All second-generation notation packages have improved text-handling capabilities. The packages all differentiate between lyrics and block, or annotative, text. In the case of block text, the new programs offer great freedom of textual placement and a variety of individual character attributes. In Finale, annotative text is even MIDI-executable. For example, when the word accelerando appears in the score, it can actually signal the MIDI output to speed up by a user-defined amount; the word tremolo can cause either the restriking of subsequent pitches in a string part or an actual alternation between pitches in another instrument.

In addition to the ability to bind lyric syllables to specific notes so that they travel together when the music is reformatted (initiated by Mark of the Unicorn in Professional Composer), the second-generation programs permit the merging of standard text files with music. In most cases this includes the automatic centering of hyphens between the syllables of broken words. Finale even provides a relatively full-featured text editor that, besides permitting the creation of large bodies of lyric text, enables you to edit lyrics by making changes to text in a separate window.

#### Conventional Notation

One major complaint that composers, engravers, and publishers made about first-generation notation packages was that they lacked many of the fundamental elements of conventional music notation. The newer programs have added such basic necessities as variable numbers of staff lines (percussionists sometimes use one- to four-line staves), complex meter signatures (also fractional meter signatures, in Finale), key signature cancellation (also custom, nonlinear, and microtonal key signatures, in Finale), bracketed and cautionary accidentals with "smart" insertion options, and slurs that do not collide with other symbols (see Figure 3).

Perhaps the most widely voiced user request was for diagonal beaming. Developers have responded to this demand with a vengeance, and now all kinds of beams are available—including cross-staff beaming, center beaming (beams that include some stems up and some stems down), automatic beaming, beaming to a beaming table, double beaming (different beam groups connected to a single note or group of notes), and extended beaming over rests (see Figure 4).

#### New Editing and Viewing Features

WYSIWYG (what you see is what you get) is definitely the order of the day with the new notation packages; most support editing and viewing of music in both continuous-scroll and page-by-page format. The programs enable you to place any symbol of any size anywhere, interactively. Taking the lead from current page-layout packages, nearly all second-generation music programs allow you to edit in various resolutions (zoomed-in or zoomed-out views).

The scope of standard edit regions has been extended in some of the better second-generation packages to include *discontiguous selection*. Examples include the ability to select only the blue notes or only the offbeats; you could then copy these into another part at another transposition.

In terms of editing features, Finale has pioneered such new options as Copy and Replace, Copy and Merge, Delete after Replace, Delete after Merge, and Mirror (or *Hocket*). Mirroring is a very powerful type of copying in which the copied material remains linked to the original. These linked copies may appear any number of times, at any number of transpositions, anywhere in the score. When you edit or change the original in any way, all its linked copies automatically

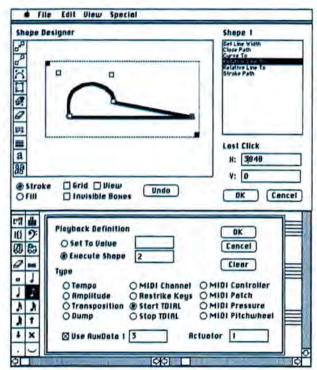
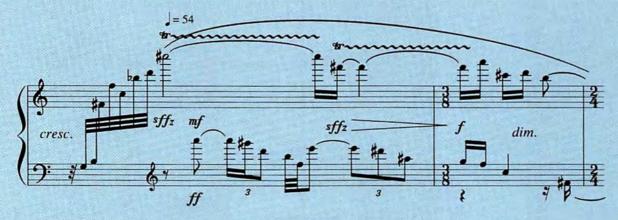

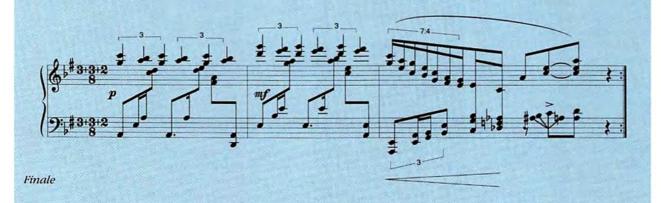
Finale includes a built-in PostScript editor that enables you to extend the symbol library by designing your own markings. Such user-created objects may be designated as executable shapes and associated with any MIDI data. These symbols can trigger any effect handled by MIDI, or they can signal a user-defined MIDI variation. This provides the means to work with the large body of twentieth-century music that departs from conventional notational symbols.

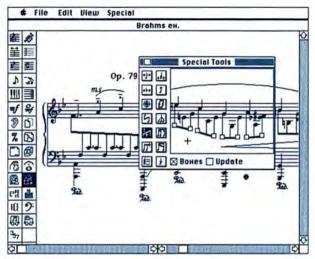

#### Note the Difference

While printed output (from a 1270-dpi Linotronic) of these second-generation packages appears to be identical at first glance to untrained eyes, there are significant differences. Finale's developers, for example, bave realized that traditional music notation, the result of more than 600 years of musical

evolution, is the ultimate representation of MIDI data rather than the alphanumeric event lists or bar graphs common in other programs. Each of the notes in this specimen retains all its associated performance data, from expressive changes in volume to subtle timing nuances.

undergo a corresponding transformation (similar to Lotus Jazz "hot views"). This is an extremely powerful tool for arrangers and orchestrators.

#### Formatting and User Configuration

Whether publishers, engravers, copyists, or composers, most people involved in music preparation eventually develop a unique style for their notation. In the case of professional publishers this may be a recognizable look, nurtured over a century, that is so consistent that serious musicians can identify the publisher merely by looking at a single page of a score. To retain such subtleties in computer-produced notation requires vast formatting capabilities, and this is an area where the first-generation products failed miserably. For example, you could not even specify that different pages of a score have different formats.

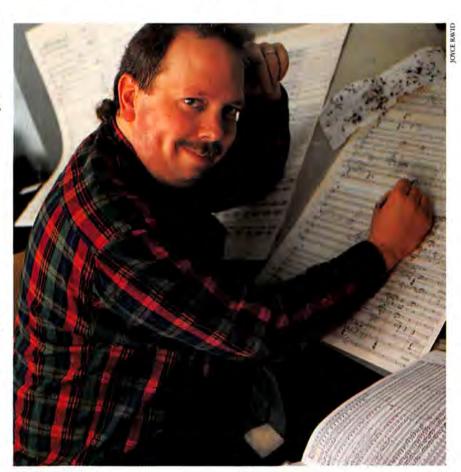
Second-generation products all provide full control over page formatting, a wide variety of staff sizes, extensive control of system and measure balancing, and control over justification both vertically and horizontally. The interface to many of these page-formatting features has been borrowed from page-layout programs. A uniquely musical aspect to this type of formatting is the suppression of staves that have no notes in them—automatic in HB Engraver.

Providing the means to tweak a program's default values while still observing the rules of conventional music notation is no easy task. HB Music Engraver plans to write a configuration utility in the future that will allow users to cultivate their own looks, but Finale

already permits this type of program customization. The user may define default values (and variables) for practically everything from beam angle and width to custom beat positioning (professional engraving does not preserve one-to-one relationships between rhythmic values and note spacing). Perhaps the closest analogy to this in the world of typesetting is custom kerning tables.

#### Output

We finally arrive at the output stage of our musical masterpiece. All the new products can print on any PostScript printer on any size page, and they all have the ability to extract parts. Where first-generation bitmapped programs often permitted the saving of documents in MacPaint format, the second generation recognizes output to encapsulated PostScript file



#### A Changing Art

Engraver Paul Sadowski works with both publishers and composers. "Publishers will continue to deal with us as we adopt computers, and more composers will be coming to us with disks. The future of music notation lies in this technology."

In general, the features listed here are those that most clearly differentiate second-generation products. As you can see, Finale sets the standard to which the other programs aspire. The popular first-generation product Professional Composer is included for comparison purposes. MasterScore, HighScore, and Nightingale were not complete enough when this article was written to chance listing their features.

(EPS), pure PostScript file, Illustrator, and PICT formats. Finale outputs a special "transportable file" format that permits document sharing between versions of Finale running on the Macintosh and IBM (and other computers, as Coda's ENIGMA kernel gets more widely ported. ENIGMA stands for Environment for Notation Utilizing Intuitive Graphic Music Algorithms).

The more ambitious second-generation packages output to the increasingly popular standard-MIDI file format; the most daring use MIDI output to control synthesizers for audio proofing. In all except Finale (and to a certain extent Nightingale), MIDI output is limited to the standard 16 MIDI channels and only a single velocity (volume) assignment per staff or part. Finale supports up to 64 output channels (the current Macintosh standard is two sets of 16 MIDI channels, one out the printer port and one out the modem port, for a total of 32). Furthermore, because all Finale symbols and expressive markings are MIDI-executable and any real-time expressive performance data captured on input is retained, Finale's performance output equals that of most sequencers controlling MIDI sound-generating devices. Finale even permits sending out dynamics via separate channels for the control of MIDI effects devices. Now that's a thorough MIDI implementation.

#### Where Do We Go from Here?

There's quite a hubbub of activity and speculation in the music processing industry. The developers of HB Engraver and Finale are talking about licensing their code and resources to other programmers to facilitate adding notation output from every imaginable type of music application. Publishers are talking of keeping their catalogs on WORM (write-once, read-

many) drives, of telecommunications-oriented distribution centers, of publication on demand as opposed to stocking multiple copies in warehouses, of a renaissance of new critical editions, and of being able to bring forth music that hitherto would never have seen the light of day. As turnkey desktop music publishing workstations begin to appear, everyone—especially the composers—is wondering what the publishers will do with all the money they'll save on engraving.

Returning to the word-processing analogy, try to imagine the impact of software that wouldn't require you to learn to read or write. You could dictate to a word processor and it would type up your words; it wouldn't beep at your mispronunciations, but would "know" what you meant and enter the correct spelling; it would understand all the rules of capitalization, punctuation, and grammar and apply them on the fly. It would seem like magic. And that is another analogy that comes to mind when I look at the new generation of music processing software. So you can see why everyone is becoming a bit excited.

## Forms of Intelligence

into any office building and look around. Even if there's a personal computer on every desk, all networked to the latest laser printer, you'll almost always spot one or two of those word processors of yesteryear-typewriters-positioned within easy reach. Why has the typewriter retained its niche in the office environment? One reason is the need to fill out business forms.

Invoices, purchase orders, inventory control slips, return receipts, applications—for better or worse, forms are here to stay. But typewriters may not be. New forms processing programs coming to market enable you to display and fill out forms on screen. Unlike forms designed with page-layout or graphics programs, the interactive forms produced by these new programs take advantage of the computer's processing power to help you fill out forms easily and accurately. You can use forms processing software to create and print new forms, or to fill out existing paper forms.

In the right situation, interactive forms offer many advantages. Employees can fill out purchase orders, for example, directly on the computer, moving from field to field with the touch of a key. Error checking reduces typos, and automatic calculations eliminate the chance of mathematical errors. Once the form is completed, the data in it can be sent to a database without retyping.

The trick, as always, is making sure you do have the right situation for this type of software and that you

get the right package for your situation.

Forms processing for the Macintosh isn't exactly new. MegaForm from Megahaus has been around since the days of the 128K Mac. More recent and interesting entries in the forms processing market include Fast Forms from Shana Enterprises and Spectrum Digital's TrueForm (actually two programs, TrueForm Set-Up and TrueForm Fill-Out). Two prerelease programs I looked at were Claris's SmartForm system (SmartForm Designer and SmartForm Manager) and FormSystem from SoftView.

Besides the dedicated forms processing programs, many databases for the Mac offer the graphics and calculation features needed for forms processing. Some databases, such as FileMaker Plus from Nashoba by Jim Morton

and RecordHolderPlus from Software Discoveries, are so forms oriented they might be considered forms processing programs. Most of the high-end, relational databases, such as Reflex Plus, 4th Dimension, Double Helix, and dBase Mac, have strong forms processing capabilities. While it's beyond the scope of this article to review every database that works with forms, I did look at the forms capabilities of two such databases. Filemaker Plus is a simple, nonrelational database that represents the low end of performance. 4th Dimension is a powerful, complex program with a lot of features that give you control over the appearance of screens.

#### Software Strategies

Forms software comes in two varieties: forms design programs and forms processing programs. Forms design programs are used to create the screen versions of forms. These programs usually offer a selection of drawing tools, as well as tools for creating different types of fields. SmartForm Designer, TrueForm Set-Up, and Fast Forms are all forms design programs.

You use forms processing programs to enter information on screen into the forms you've created with forms design programs. Processing programs do not allow you to alter a form's appearance or change field properties. SmartForm Manager, TrueForm Fill-Out, and the Fast Forms desk accessory are processing programs. MegaForm integrates design and processing features. FormSystem is available in two versions, a Full-Editing version that has all the features of design and processing, and a Use-Only version.

#### **Automatic Calculation**

The ability to automatically manipulate data you've entered on a form is the feature that defines an interactive forms program. If your software lacks this ability, you may as well use a typewriter. Examples of automatic calculations can be seen in a standard in-

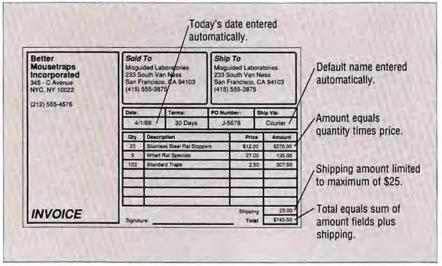

voice where the forms software fills in the amount column automatically by multiplying the quantity column by the price column (see "Parts of a Form"). Other types of automatic calculations include date-stamping, where the date is entered automatically, time-stamping, and automatic page numbering.

All the programs listed offer automatic calculations. The main differences between them are the range of calculations available and the amount of work required to make the form do your bidding. The programs with the least calculation power are Fast Forms and MegaForm, which offer only addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. In Fast Forms, you must type each field name in the calculation box (most oth-

er programs let you select fields using the mouse). If a field is the sum of 20 other fields, you must type in the name of each field, like so: "Field 1 + Field 2 + Field 3 + Field 4...." If you misspell one field name, the program returns an error message.

FileMaker Plus offers a good selection of mathematical functions, including compound interest payments, statistical functions, and sum values within a field. The program also includes the standard comparative operations (greater than, less than, equal to, not equal to) and three logical operations (AND, OR, and NOT). FileMaker Plus's calculation features are the easiest to use of the programs tested. All calculations can be selected with the mouse (see "Adding It Up").

4th Dimension defines automatic calculations as *procedures*, actual programming commands within the database that let you manipulate the information in each field. Possible operations extend well beyond the usual mathematical calculations. The program offers greater power over the information in a form than any of the other programs tested, but not without a price. Getting calculations to work right may take considerable practice.

TrueForm Set-Up's calculation features are easy to use and comprehensive. You enter fields to be calculated by selecting the formula button and clicking on the fields to be computed. You then type in the kind of operation you want to perform (+, \*, /). Operations such as compound interest rates, annuity rates, sum values, and string functions are invoked via one-word commands.

All the programs feature date-stamping. True-Form and 4th Dimension also offer time-stamping. All except Fast Forms can automatically number your forms; however, this feature seemed to work erratically with TrueForm Fill-Out.

#### **Error Checking**

Error checking restricts the kind of information you can enter into a field. A typical example is a retail invoice where no item is priced over \$30. If you acci-

dentally enter \$40, the program alerts you to the mistake and lets you enter the correct figure.

All the programs offer some error checking. Date fields, for instance, are checked automatically to prevent invalid entries. In Fast Forms, you can limit numbers to a certain range using the Range-Check option in the field dialog box. MegaForm lets you construct tables of values for checking errors in specific fields. When you enter a number, MegaForms checks the table. If the number you entered isn't there, an error message appears. The other programs listed use the mathematical operations greater than and less than to check entry values.

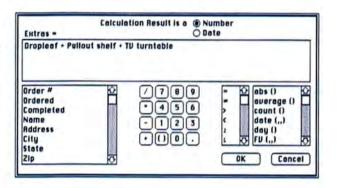
#### **Invisible Forms**

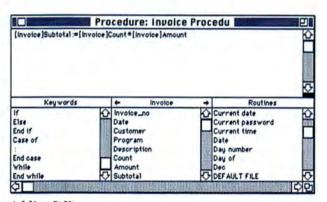
Anyone who wants to use a computer to fill out preprinted forms requires an invisible forms feature. With invisible forms, the lines, boxes, and wording of a form appear on the screen, but the program prints only the data you enter. Most of the programs I looked at let you work with invisible forms, but only TrueForm is intended specifically for use with existing forms.

TrueForm Set-Up includes software that drives several popular scanners, including those from New Image Technology, Laser Connection, Abaton, and Microtek. Spectrum Digital Systems also sells its own scanner for \$1295. Scanned forms appear on the screen as templates. You then create fields in appropriate places on the form. TrueForm Set-Up lets you adjust the image—moving it in 1-point increments—to compensate for variations in scanner or printer alignment.

#### **Anchored Fields**

Anchored fields are connected by an invisible link to corresponding text. If the text moves, the field goes with it, and vice versa. If the order of a numbered field series changes—if field number five, for instance, moves to second place—the program renumbers the other fields to reflect the change. Anchored fields are most useful to professional designers, who often re-

arrange a form several times before achieving a final design. So far only SmartForm Designer and Soft-View's FormSystem offer anchored field capabilities.

A step beyond anchored fields is *graphics intel-ligence*, a term coined by Susan Morgan, president of SoftView. Graphics intelligence takes the anchored-fields concept to its logical conclusion: all lines, boxes, fields, and text blocks are anchored to each other. If the designer makes a global change in the size of the text font, the program automatically adjusts the spacing of the fields to conform to the new size (see "Art with Brains").

#### **Drawing Tools**

Drawing tools are necessary for designing forms or producing electronic versions of printed forms. A forms design palette should include a line tool, a text tool, and a box tool. Round-cornered rectangles, circles, hairlines, and reverse type are other useful features.

The Tool Palette in FileMaker Plus is a strippeddown version of MacDraw. It offers the basics but little else. The program's inability to scroll automatically when you draw a line past the screen's edge, and the fact that you cannot draw in the reduced view make the program awkward to use for forms design.

In spite of its low price, Fast Forms offers one of the best selections of drawing tools. The inclusion of a

#### Art with Brains

SoftView FormSystem's graphics intelligence lets you make radical changes in the appearance of a form without completely redesigning it. The examples above show the same form with two minor changes. hairline is useful for forms printed on a laser printer. The program also lets you select pen and fill shades in 1 percent increments, in case you're outputting to a phototypesetter.

SmartForm Designer is an attempt to break into the professional forms design market, with design capabilities that compare favorably to \$250,000 dedicated workstations such as the Harris DigiForm and Purup systems. In addition to intelligent graphics features, the program offers adjustable line weights, round cornering, reverse type, and the ability to automatically create *comb* fields, where each letter or number appears in a separate box (see "Smart Tools").

Because it is intended primarily for use with existing forms, TrueForm Set-Up has no graphics capabilities. You can assign functions to fields and choose the fonts and styles that appear in those fields, but you cannot make changes to the layout.

#### Search and Sort

Once you've filled out a form, what do you do with it? Most forms processing programs store completed forms of a given type together in one file. You may want to go through the filled-out forms from time to time, searching for a specific form or piece of information. Or you may have an invoice file you want to sort by invoice number, or to arrange alphabetically by customer. You would think that the ability to search through a file for specific entries or to sort files according to numeric or alphabetical information would be de rigueur for forms processing programs. Yet this is where many such programs come up short.

Neither TrueForm nor Fast Forms lets you search or sort completed forms. With TrueForm Fill-Out you can at least store completed forms in "stacks" (which have nothing to do with HyperCard stacks), but there is no way to manipulate forms once they have been filled out. Fast Forms does not save completed forms at all. Any information entered on a form is lost when the form is closed, unless it is exported to a text file.

In this respect the database programs FileMaker Plus and 4th Dimension are superior to most of the other programs. Both databases let you search through fields and sort them, alphabetically or numerically, with ease. There is no need to export information to a database—you're already there. The only nondatabase program that also offers these features is SmartForm Manager.

#### Importing and Exporting

Because most businesses use a combination of software, it's desirable to have a forms program that imports and exports data to and from other programs. For example, you might want to store the information from completed purchase orders in a spreadsheet or database program. Or you might want to fill out a monthly statement using information already in a database.

Fast Forms and TrueForm include no features for importing data. Fast Forms lets you save data as a text file, with the fields separated by commas, tabs, or returns. TrueForm Fill-Out also saves data as a text document, but fields are delineated only by carriage returns. Since different database and spreadsheet programs respond differently to things like commas and tabs, a choice can be very useful.

FormSystem is intended for use with a database and can import and export information in a wide variety of database formats, including dBase, DB2, and SYLK.

MegaForm is specifically intended to be used with Megahaus's database program, which opens and reads MegaForm files directly. MegaForm does not support other formats and has no export or import options.

#### The Bottom Line

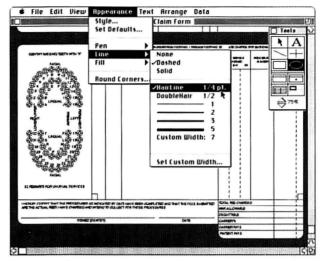
Forms have always been data-management tools: we use them to make it more convenient to store or read certain types of information. Logically then, filling out forms is part of the larger process of handling data. To take full advantage of the computer, the perfect forms program would enable you to define convenient or familiar input screens, to save and sort data, to make calculations with it automatically, and to output stored information in any format you could devise. So far only the databases offer that power.

Fast Forms is the most reasonably priced forms processing program available. The Fast Forms desk accessory, included with the program, lets you open, fill out, and print a form while running another program. However, its import/export limitations and its inability to save completed documents keep Fast Forms from being more than a novel way to fill out forms. As a graphics program it is quite good.

The TrueForm package is a good choice for working with existing forms but, like Fast Forms', True-Form's data-handling abilities need strengthening. Because TrueForm Fill-Out saves all completed forms in a single file, the absence of search and sort features becomes a problem once you've got more than a dozen or so forms. One of TrueForm Set-Up's nice features is the user-definable help menu. This feature lets you assign information to accompany each field on a form. When a user activates a field with TrueForm Fill-Out, the information appears automatically. This is especially useful if someone other than the designer is completing the form or when hard-to-remember codes are used. SmartForm Designer and FormSystem also feature user-definable help menus.

FileMaker Plus is a good choice for the small-business owner who needs an easy-to-learn database. It is too limited, however, for use in larger companies. Although FileMaker Plus has most of the drawing tools you're liable to need when creating a form, its inability to work in reduced or enlarged views and the absence of automatic scrolling are annoying omissions in the design department.

Unfortunately, Claris's SmartForm Designer, SmartForm Manager, and SoftView's FormSystem had not been released at press time. How well the final ver-

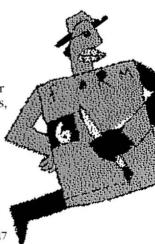

sions of these programs actually perform remains to be seen. Judging from product demonstrations, demos, and beta versions, they promise to be powerful contenders in the forms processing market. The inclusion of search and sort features in SmartForm Manager is a point in its favor.

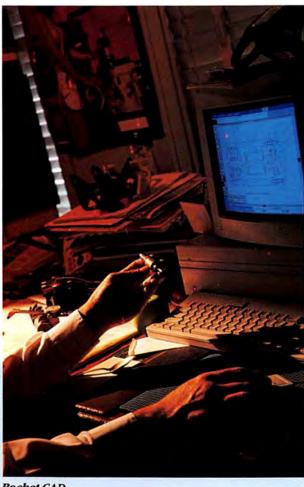
We are still at least one generation of software away from the ideal forms processing system, one that incorporates the main features of a spreadsheet and database in an easy-to-use package. Of the products I looked at, only 4th Dimension has the features necessary to set up a complete bookkeeping, inventory, and forms processing database. It's a good choice for larger companies and for consultants who want to set up turnkey databases for their clients. But be warned: Macintosh owners who think writing HyperCard stacks is too much like programming will find 4th Dimension unbearable. Also worth investigating are the other high-end, relational databases mentioned earlier. They offer most of the features of 4th Dimension in formats that are slightly easier to digest.

Leaving aside my vision of the ideal forms program for the moment, it's a fact that some people simply need to fill out a large number of forms. For anyone who fits in this category—particularly people who are required to work with preprinted forms—all the forms programs tested are a big improvement over a typewriter. Surveying the expanding field of Mac drafting software

roving itself as a computer-aided-design machine has been an uphill battle for the Macintosh. Despite a growing user base among design professionals (see "CAD Sales"), the Mac has largely been ignored by the computer-aided design (CAD) mainstream. Technical and professional journals, for example, have tended simply to leave the Mac out of their considerations. The Mac has been conspicuously absent from trade shows for the architectural and engineering communities. And in the not too distant past, people who wanted to set up a Mac CAD system had to shift for themselves, since almost no CAD resellers had Macs on their showroom floors.

It took the Macintosh II to convince the CAD establishment that Apple has what it takes. Evidence that the CAD world is finally coming around can be seen in the increased presence of major plotter vendors such as Hewlett-Packard, CalComp, and Houston Instrument in the Mac marketplace. The change is also visible in

the increasing number of sessions now devoted to the Mac at gatherings like the A/E/C (architectural/engineering/construction) expo-and in the crowds that Apple's booth draws at such events. But one of the more dramatic indications that the Mac is now perceived as a contender in the CAD field is the proliferation of Mac drafting software.

Recently vendors have unveiled five completely new 2-D drafting packages: LSI Pentagon CAD from Lionshead Software, PowerDraw from the Computer Shoppe, PEGASYS from IGC Technology, Snap from Data Basics, and VersaCAD/Macintosh Edition from VersaCAD Corporation. This article looks at these new CAD offerings and places them in proper relation to the three Mac standbys responsible for the bulk of the CAD units sold in the past four years: MacDraft from Innovative Data Designs (IDD), MGMStation from Micro CAD/CAM, and Diehl Graphsoft's MiniCad. As you'll notice from a glance at "CAD Compared," the

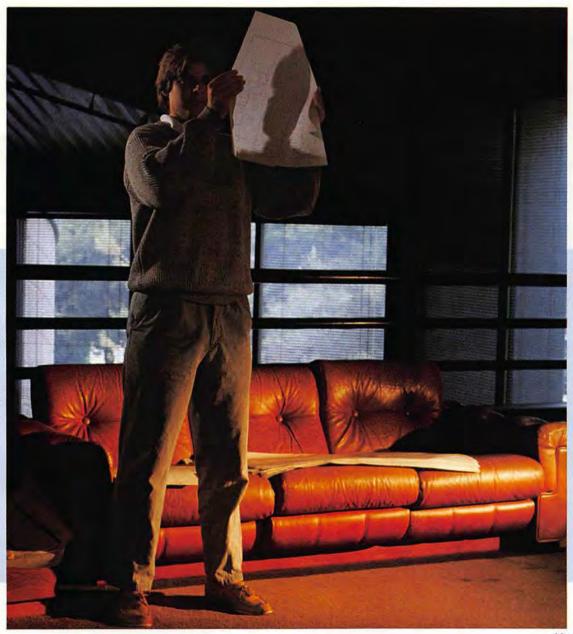
field is varied. Prices, for example, range from \$99 to \$1995.

Three other drafting programs aren't covered here—IDD's Dreams, Generic CAD, and Bridgeport Design's EZ-Draft. The first two weren't available when this article was prepared, though they may be by now, and EZ-Draft's marketing future was uncertain, pending negotiations between the developers and vendors.

#### LSI Pentagon CAD 1.1

This \$99 entry-level product is presently the lowest-priced CAD software for the Macintosh. Power users will find that Pentagon CAD lacks many of the features they look for, such as dimensioning. Its pluses include an easy-to-learn interface and minimal hardware requirements. It runs on a 512K Mac with a single 400K drive.

Although it's not a CAD powerhouse, this program shines in a few applications. Civil engineers will



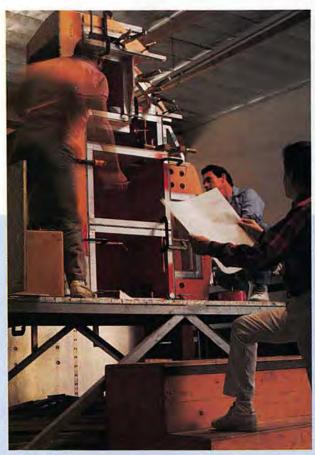

find its mapping layout features and links to Cogo (coordinate geometry) useful. Also a surprise for a package at this price: a facility for importing AutoCAD DXF files and a built-in pen-plotting utility. The DXF capability permits the importation of United States government map data, which is now available in DXF format.

In its present form, I found Pentagon CAD slow and lacking too many features to be very useful for most mechanical and architectural drafters. The developers, however, promise additions aimed at architectural users.

#### MacDraft 1.2b

MacDraft is a basic 2-D drafting package that offers an object-oriented database and a set of basic drawing tools that can be learned in a short time. Perhaps this simplicity is what has helped IDD to sell nearly 16 times as many copies of its product as any other Macintosh CAD vendor. Complaints of bugs have clouded MacDraft's record, but IDD claims to have addressed these difficulties, and I personally encountered no problems with this version.

CAD Sales

Macintosh CAD sales have been growing rapidly. The figures represent almost a fourfold increase in the last two years.

MacDraft lacks the horsepower required for production drafting, but I've seen some beautiful architectural drawings made with it. The program's ability to take advantage of the Macintosh's rich font, fill, and texturing facilities enables MacDraft to produce results that would be difficult to duplicate on some of the more extensive CAD products.

MacDraft calculates areas but has no dimensioning or pen-plotting support. It has the ability to cut and paste between applications—something Mac users take for granted but some CAD companies don't—and it exports PICT files.

Later this year, MacDraft will be supplemented by IDD's next-generation program, Dreams. Although it will be more expensive (\$600 and up), Dreams will retain MacDraft's simplicity. It will offer extensive new capabilities, many including symbol libraries and plotter support, as optional modules.

#### MiniCad 4.0

MiniCad is unique among the software in this article as the only product that is also a 3-D package. This feature and others, such as double-line drawing, have made the program popular in the A/E/C arena.

Although quite fast, MiniCad lacks the floatingpoint precision and geometric-construction aids, such as tangents or bezier or spline curve facilities, that are often required for serious mechanical drafting. The program has no links to the NC CAM world either. (I should point out that these limitations haven't kept a large number of drafters from applying MiniCad in mechanical applications.)

MiniCad has many on-screen similarities to Mac-Draw and MacDraft, making it familiar and easy to learn. Like MacDraft it is object-oriented, so it can use the Macintosh fonts and fills. But it is significantly faster than MacDraft and provides many more drawing aids. It also has dimensioning, multiple layers, and a database that stores attributes for producing listings such as bills of materials. On a Mac II it supports color.

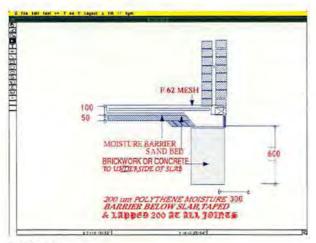
MiniCad provides one of the most comprehensive import/export facilities of any Macintosh CAD software. The program can import and export files in PICT format, it supports the Clipboard, and a \$495 optional combined IGES/DXF module is available. A recently added option (\$300) now provides pen-plotter support.

MiniCad combines the simplicity of a MacDrawlike interface with a broader array of features than the lower-priced packages, LSI Pentagon and MacDraft. On the negative side, by the time you add the plotting and file-translation options, MiniCad becomes a \$1300 package. It is also copy protected, asking for a master disk once every 20 launches.

#### PowerDraw 1.0

Because of PowerDraw's low profile, you might easily overlook this package, but it's jammed full of features—including some that don't become apparent until you spend time with the program. And considering its modest price, PowerDraw offers reasonably high performance. In every timing test I tried, it performed faster than about half of the seven other packages I tested.

This object-oriented program's user interface will be immediately familiar to Mac users for fonts, fills, and other MacDraw-like functions. However, Power-Draw also offers 120 layers, extensive geometry construction facilities, full dimensioning, text rotation,

chamfering, fillet, extend, Mac II color support, and other advanced facilities.

PowerDraw's extensive features will satisfy most CAD mechanical and architectural power users. But its hybrid database—part floating-point, part integer—may not offer the accuracy desired by some mechanical parts designers.

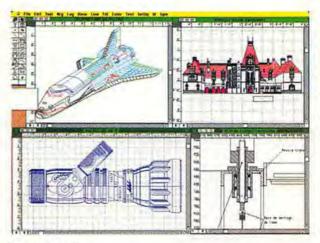
The program has Excel-compatible time-accounting facilities for tracking time spent on a job. Its basic price includes a full range of output facilities. The only option that costs extra is a DXF import/export facility that the developer is planning; it should sell for less than \$200.

PowerDraw combines ease of use with better than adequate performance and broad capability. It won't win every CAD timing race and currently has trouble dealing with some desk accessories on a Mac II. But on a Mac Plus or an SE, your savings in purchase costs and learning time can easily make up for any shortcomings. (One of these is copy protection.)

#### PEGASYS I 3.02

Years of A/E/C drafting service bureau experience show up clearly in facilities PEGASYS's designers built into this package. For example, to speed navigation within a large drawing, PEGASYS enables you to View and Locate with a single keystroke (no need for %-key combinations).

On an SE, no product I tested zooms faster than PEGASYS, even though it is not very fast in loading or saving drawings. On a Mac II, PEGASYS's zooming comes within a hair of rivaling the fastest software I tested. The program includes many features designed

#### **Zooming In on Performance**

It's natural for engineers to want to quantify things like software performance by timing them. One measure of a CAD package's "performance" is the speed of its zoom function, since zooming brings into play the software's ability to manipulate its own database and work with the Mac's graphics facilities.

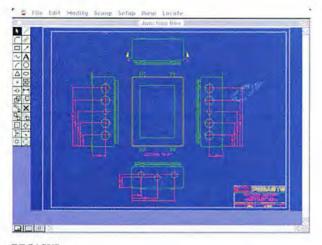
The charts show how long it took for each CAD program to zoom in on an image until only ½00 of it was showing, and then to zoom back out. Zoom-out takes longer than zoom-in because the program must redraw more.

I performed this test on identical files prepared by each of the eight CAD vendors. To eliminate as many variables as possible, I loaded the software and sample files on a freshly formatted external hard drive (no fragmentation) and physically moved the disk from the SE to the II. The test files contained 500 lines, 400 arcs, and 500 text characters each. The variation in storage requirements for the "identical" files reveals major differences in the CAD programs' database structures and their degree of precision (see "CAD Compared").

What's the bottom line? Pentagon CAD is the slowest, but for \$99 you can't expect a screamer. MGMStation is the fastest on the Mac II but much slower on the SE. PowerDraw did a little better on the Mac II than it did on the SE. Snap lived up to its name on both machines. PEGASYS fared better on the SE than it did on the Mac II, as did MiniCad and MacDraft.

No, VersaCAD's times weren't the fastest, but for good reason. VersaCAD uses full floating-point numbers for greater precision, and it does more with its database than the other programs do. This is an excellent example of an aspect of performance that is hard to quantify, and of why timing tests don't prove everything.





#### PEGASYS

to help drafters cope with endless modifications to existing drawings. A global change/replace function for symbols is one example. PEGASYS also offers one of the most extensive plotter facilities I've seen thus far.

PEGASYS's roots lie in a program that runs on Apollo and other workstations under UNIX. The Macintosh version retains much of the original's functionality, yet the Mac interface makes it easy to learn. If you're looking for even more capability, you'll have to wait for PEGASYS Expert, which IGC Technology claims will offer additional speed, 3-D, a macro language, and a bill-of-materials generator; this version, scheduled for release later in the year, will cost about \$1295. A third version, PEGASYS II, will utilize the Mac II's color capabilities and its 68020/68881 facilities.

#### Snap 2.01

The first thing that hit me about Snap is that its user interface has no icons; you access every function via pull-down menus. I found this somewhat odd, but Intergraph users say they feel right at home with Snap. Perhaps that's due to the way Data Basics has positioned the program as an architectural Intergraph adjunct, complete with an optional (\$195) translator for importing/exporting Intergraph IGDS format files.

A well-documented, full-featured drafting package, Snap has many positive qualities. Speed, for one—it is very fast on the Mac II, and it's among the fastest programs I tested on the SE.

Snap's drawing features won't disappoint demanding users. Its assortment of primitives is very broad, and its Fence and Group facilities make global changes fast and easy. For greater precision, you can key in data instead of using the mouse. If you use a stroke font (a single-line font that a pen plotter can draw quickly) you can even rotate text to any angle.

And, like PowerDraw, Snap tracks time data for accounting.

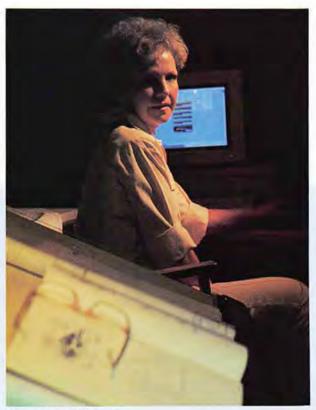
Snap exports drawings in PICT, PostScript, or Intergraph IGDS formats. Its features seem somewhat more suited to architectural than to mechanical users. For example, it doesn't appear to have any direct ties to NC CAM capabilities.

In spite of its speed and broad array of features, I didn't feel completely comfortable working with Snap's icon-free interface. Perhaps that's because I'm a terrible typist and Snap is quite keyboard oriented.

#### **MGMStation CAD 2.5**

In earlier versions, MGMStation's (MGMS) user interface differed from what many call the Mac standard. Bowing to user criticism, Micro CAD/CAM has recently revised the program considerably, and the latest version should easily satisfy even the most demanding of Mac purists.

MGMS offers over 200 different functions. A companion program, MGMStation CAM (for an additional \$5700 to \$6200), provides output to a wide variety of numerical control machine tools.

#### **Data Stuctures**

The way programs store information in their databases is one of the most significant differences among CAD products, and one of the hardest to get a handle on. People commonly reduce the data structure question to a simple choice: If you need precision, floating point is the way to go. If precision doesn't matter, opt for the speed of an integer database. As I discovered in talking with CAD vendors, the matter is not really that clear cut.

PEGASYS and PowerDraw, for example, store some types of data in integer format and other types in floating point. And one software designer's definition of floating point doesn't necessarily provide the same precision as another's. When I asked the CAD software designers to describe their databases and the level of precision they provide, they all gave me long, often cryptic descriptions of why their own approach was best.

PEGASYS's designers chose to save drawing list data to speed the building of screen images. The designers of VersaCAD, MGMStation, MiniCad, and PEGASYS included attribute data that might be useful for such diverse applications

as generating bills of material or driving numerical control machinery.

Another factor determined by data structure is a program's ability to work with other software. In the words of Versa-CAD's Scott Harlin, "No CAD system ought to be an island unto itself. It needs to interface easily with other applications, other CAD systems, and CAM facilities." One of MS-DOS VersaCAD's strengths has been the large number of third-party add-on applications available for it; the company has wisely provided hooks for similar products in the Mac database.

MGMS includes a wide variety of geometric construction tools that greatly simplify the layout of complex drawings. However, it does not have layering capability, nor is it equipped with double lines. These shortcomings make the program less suitable for the architectural community, although a third-party vendor currently offers both architectural and electronic symbol libraries for it.

MGMStation CAD fully supports Cut and Paste via the Clipboard, as well as import and export of PICT files. It also supports color on the Macintosh II. An optional (\$500) IGES translator provides import/export of files in that widely used format.

Operation is extremely fast on the Mac II, but slower than expected on the SE. MGMS stored a test file in less space, and loaded it in less time, than any other product I tested.

MGMStation CAD's roots go back to the days of the Lisa and the Mac XL, but it has been significantly expanded and refined since then. Early complaints

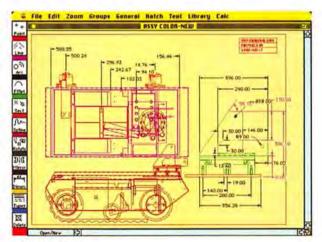

about its interface and bugs have ceased. Support has greatly improved, and I applaud Micro CAD/CAM for removing copy protection in the latest version.

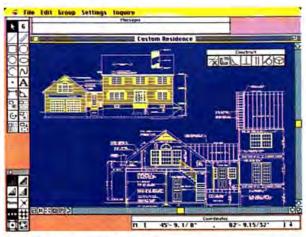
#### VersaCAD/Macintosh Edition 1.0

When you go to a large supplier for tech support, you usually meet with indifference or apathy; what you don't usually meet is a person who can answer your

question. Not so with VersaCAD; this CAD giant has more support staff at the end of its phone lines than most other Macintosh CAD developers have employees. VersaCAD is the only Macintosh CAD supplier that currently offers both a toll-free support number and formal training courses. At \$1995, VersaCAD is the highest-priced CAD system I reviewed, but this price includes plotter support as well as IGES and DXF translators. Other Mac CAD vendors charge as much as \$800 to add these same facilities.

VersaCAD has over 300 features and more than 30 graphics primitives. It is at home in both mechanical and architectural applications. NC CAM hooks are in place. The program calculates length, radius, perimeter, area, moment of inertia, and center of gravity. It supports 256 colors on the Mac II, and full text editing of Macintosh or stroke fonts. Its plotter preview facility actually shows exactly what you'll get before you waste time, paper, and ink.

Unique features include an automatic file-recovery facility and full use of the Mac II's multiple screen capability, which allows you to move tools and indicators anywhere you desire, even to another monitor. Moreover, the database in VersaCAD stores more information than those in the other programs do. While this appears to slow the system down a bit, the potential benefits far outweigh the slight reduction in performance.

If you've gotten the impression that I like this product, you're right. It isn't the fastest one I tested, but when I added up all the pluses—including its features, database, links with products on other platforms, plot-

ter and translator facilities, total adherence to the Macintosh interface, and the extensive support you get—I liked what I found (for a more detailed description of VersaCAD, see *Reviews* in this issue).

#### On from Here

Choosing a CAD system is no simple task, nor is it getting easier with the arrival of more choices for the Mac. The issues involved are complex, abundant, and different for each user and application. It's just not possible to point to one CAD product and label it the best. So how do you make an intelligent decision?

First, try to define your needs clearly. For example, do you need a CAD system that can produce mechanical drawings only, or must it also provide numerical control machining information? What size range will items in your drawings encompass? Must you, for example, accurately show the details of a single rivet on a wide-body jet as well as the entire jet itself? This will give you an idea of the degree of precision you need and what database requirements you have.

Next, examine the way you interface with others. Will you have to import files? What about exporting? In what format? What kind of output do you need? Will your output requirements be satisfied with plotted lines and text or will you also need Macintosh-quality fonts and fill patterns?

Finally, don't forget to ask yourself how much time you'll be able to invest in learning new CAD software—and find out which vendors offer formal training. Experts agree that training time represents the largest single cost associated with purchasing a CAD system. Failure to take this into account can lead to frustration, underuse of the system, and unnecessary downtime.

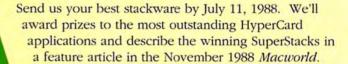
"CAD Compared" shows the estimates the CAD vendors and I came up with of the time it will take an average user to become proficient with each program. I should emphasize that proficiency in this case is only an early way-station on the road to real mastery. How long it takes you to become an expert operator depends on several factors: how much you apply yourself, what kind of training you expose yourself to, past experience, and so forth.

Use the comparison table as a starting point to get answers to your basic questions. Contact CAD vendors whose products appear to be tailored toward your needs and ask questions about the suitability of their packages for your applications. Ask for the name of a knowledgeable dealer in your area who can show you the program. Also ask for the names of users doing jobs similar to your own. The more and the better questions you ask up front, the fewer surprises you'll have later.

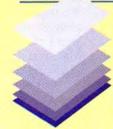

## Publishing with Word

Why lay out hundreds for layout software?

ometimes the right publishing program for the job isn't a publishing program at all. Using Microsoft Word for page makeup might sound like a strange idea at first, but integrating writing and layout into one task can bring many advantages—not the least of which is the advantage of paying for only one program.

Word includes the features necessary to duplicate the basic requirements of a publishing package: you can import, place, and size graphics; manage various column formats; and control character spacing and leading. Other standard publishing features in Word's repertoire include the creation of rules and boxes and automatic calculation of page gutters.

But what makes using Word for publishing more than just a workaround are its automated features—the things you would normally lose when exporting text to a layout program. Word's automatic footnoting and index generation, and its ability to link text blocks so they automatically stay together and remain aligned during editing, can save you considerable time and effort. Moreover, these are features that Macintosh layout programs currently lack.

By far the most powerful of Word's automatic functions, and the key to making the program work as a publishing tool, is the style sheet. Style sheets enable you to apply virtually any aspect of formatting—font, line and character spacing, tabs, margins, and so on—with just a few keystrokes. They also give you the power to revise documents effortlessly. At any time you can recast every instance of any element in a document simply by changing the style that controls that element.

Word can't compete with page-layout programs when it comes to producing graphically oriented publications with complicated layouts. But for longer documents such as books, scientific journals, or manuals with a consistent format and few graphics, the benefits

of using one program instead of two, and of retaining access to Word's powerful automatic features, can be compelling.

#### Styles

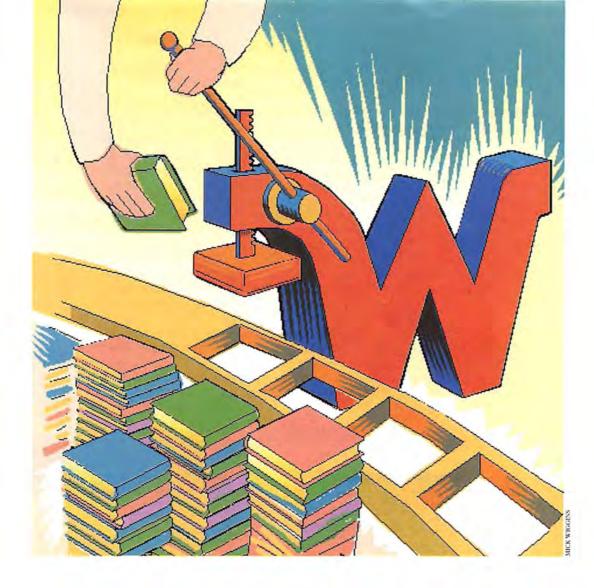
Word gives you so many options for formatting text that creating all the parts of a long document manually could take you forever. Fortunately, you only have to define a given element once. You can save any combination of formatting options as a *style*; thereafter you can transform text into the desired element simply by selecting it as an option from the Style menu.

Figure 1 shows a page that was composed using Word and printed on a LaserWriter. The styles are written in a kind of programming language, but don't worry; you don't have to learn to program. Word records the formatting instructions for a style as you select options from menus (see Figure 2).

Although you can add styles to a paragraph or group of paragraphs at any time, it's best to assign styles to text as you write—or at least whenever you come to a convenient stopping point in your writing. Even if you don't know the exact formatting of your publication, assign provisional styles to each part of the document as it is typed. For example, assign the body of text the style Normal, main headings the style level 1, subheadings the style level 2, and so on. Then when you do decide on a format, you can implement it easily and consistently throughout your publication.

Get in the habit of always using styles for formatting. Any manual formatting you do to a paragraph will interfere with formatting done by assigning a style. If

you make a heading bold as you're writing, for example, and later try to assign that heading a style that's bold, the two bold commands cancel each other out and the result is normal text.

Using styles consistently and from the beginning enables you to experiment with a variety of formats with little effort. For example, if you want the body of your text to be single-spaced with a double space between paragraphs, use the Before and After spacing features to establish interparagraph separation. Then if you decide to alter the spacing between paragraphs, you can change the style instead of having to go through the document removing or inserting blank lines. You can also use styles to keep the spacing between sections of text consistent (see Figure 3).

One caution: Be careful when opening style sheets. When you open a new style sheet, any styles in the current style sheet with the same names as styles in the new sheet will be replaced. No warning box appears when this happens, and it is very easy to lose your formatting information. Until this "feature" changes, it's a good idea to keep backups of all your style sheets (for more information on using Word's

style sheets, see "Mac Word Processing Tools" in *Macworld*, October 1987.)

Aldus has announced that PageMaker 3.0 will support Word style sheets. This means that even if you use PageMaker 3.0 to lay out your document, you might very well want to use many of the techniques described in this article. Doing so will give you the best of both worlds: Word's batch features with PageMaker's flexibility.

#### File Handling

It usually makes sense to split long documents into a series of shorter files. Microsoft recommends a limit of 250 pages per file. A more practical limit might be 40 to 100 pages, since longer files tend to cause problems—when cutting and pasting, for example—and generally slow down program operation.

Word's ability to copy style sheets from one file to another enables you to easily maintain identical formatting across all the chapters of a book, for example, even if different people are preparing different chapters. Unfortunately, you can't change the formatting of all chapters simply by changing one master style sheet; to make changes you must recopy the updated style sheet from file to file.

Word enables you to link the files that make up a publication. You can print linked files together automatically and generate collective indexes and tables of contents. When generating tables of contents or indexes, Word compiles entries from the current document and then moves to the next document listed in the Page Setup dialog box. To generate a correct table of contents or index, you must start the function from the first file in the series. Information for footnote numbers, page numbers, and line numbers doesn't carry over between linked files. You'd think it would, but it doesn't. The starting points for each of those elements must be entered in the Page Setup dialog box for each file in a document.

#### Layout

As Figure 1 demonstrates, Word enables you to lay out text in multiple columns and to mix column formats on a page (here the headlines are a single, centered column, while text is in double-column format).

Another Word layout format is the side-by-side paragraph, which was used in Figure 1 to create the drop caps.

To set up a page format, you simply specify the number of columns you want and the amount of space you want between columns in the Section dialog box. Word determines the width of the columns based on the margins you have specified in the Page Setup dialog box. Columns must always be evenly spaced; you can't have a 2-inch column next to a 3-inch column.

You can, however, put a row of 2-inch columns below a row of 3-inch columns. To change to a different column format, you must indicate that you're beginning a new Section by typing **%**-Enter. You may specify that a new Section begin on any new page, on a new even page, or on a new odd page. Figure 1 contains four Sections—two for the major headings and two for the text under the headings.

Word's extremely useful side-by-side paragraph option is another feature you won't find in the current generation of page-layout programs. You can use side-by-side paragraphs to put tips or subheads in the margins next to your main text, to put a caption next to a

graphic, to begin a paragraph with a run-in heading, and for a variety of other purposes. Once two elements are formatted as side-by-side paragraphs, they float together in your layout regardless of editing changes. Each paragraph may have a different width (specified using the left and right margins on the ruler), but you should make sure the paragraph margins do not overlap.

Side-by-side paragraphs are particularly useful in creating tables of information, because you can ensure that elements—even ones of different lengths—will align themselves into rows. A table like the one in Figure 4, for example, looks simple enough to construct. But when you just use carriage returns for vertical spacing, every time you add or delete a word the whole thing goes out of whack. With side-by-side paragraphs, the spacing automatically adjusts when you edit.

The disadvantage of side-by-side paragraphs is that they don't appear side-by-side on screen unless you use the Page Preview function. If you have an extended keyboard, a shortcut that takes you from Page Preview to the normal screen is to press the numeral 5 on the numeric keypad.

Another of Word's features that can be very effective with tabular material is the ability to manipulate columns of data. Word lets you select any rectangular portion of text (hold down the Option key while you perform the normal select function) and Cut, Paste, and Copy as you need. If you choose Sort while a column of text is selected, for example, Word will sort the selected entries alphabetically or numerically and then reorder the entire table to correspond to the new order.

#### Line and Character Spacing

It is important, from both an aesthetic and a practical standpoint, for desktop publishers to be able to adjust line and character spacing. Some people find the ability to *kern* (adjust the spacing of) letter pairs a must for setting headlines, cover type, and other critical text elements. Closing line-spacing by a point or decreasing character-spacing by a small fraction of a point can sometimes give you just the room you need to make a section of text fit on a page.

Word's kerning features aren't as sophisticated as those of page-layout programs, which have tables that specify optimum kerning for individual letter pairs. You can select a block of text and specify the amount of compression or expansion, but to really get a proper kerned effect you must work with letter pairs individually.

If Word's standard LaserWriter output doesn't meet your character-spacing standards, check the Fractional Widths option in the Print dialog box. With this box checked, Word prints using a more sophisticated character-spacing algorithm. The trade-off is that the printed results don't match the screen and the program slows perceptibly.

If you use subscripts and superscripts in your publication, be sure to enter the line-spacing in the Paragraph dialog box as a negative number. Otherwise

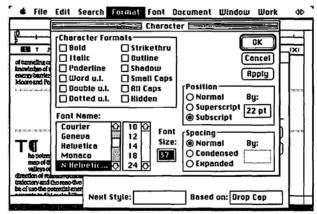

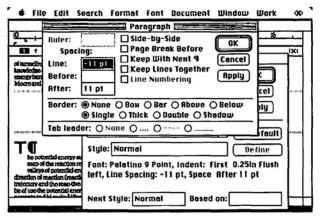

Word automatically increases the spacing between lines that contain subscripts or superscripts, resulting in a page that looks uneven.

#### **Graphics**

Obviously, Word is a text-oriented program; if graphics are a main focus of your publishing efforts, you're reading the wrong article. Word documents can, however, include three types of graphics: Word's own line graphics (borders), graphics imported via the Clipboard, and graphic effects created with direct Post-Script programming.

The table in Figure 4 shows typical uses of Word's line graphics. These line graphics are associated with "paragraphs" (in the Microsoft sense of the word, which means anything that precedes a return) and are

selected from the Paragraph menu. You can format a paragraph to have lines above, below, or beside it, or to have a box around it. The lines can be double-weight or thin, and can have drop shadows. You can specify vertical lines within a paragraph by setting a vertical line tab. One advantage of Word's line graphics is that when a paragraph changes length or moves to another position in the document, the line graphics adjust or move with it.

More elaborate graphics, like the graph in Figure 1, must be imported via the Clipboard. Imported graphics are enclosed in a graphics frame created with the Insert Graphics command from the Edit menu. Unfortunately, Word cannot import graphics directly from files created by graphics applications.

Since Word thinks of a graphics frame the same way it does a text character, you can apply many of the functions available under the Paragraph and Character menus to graphics. This means you can use graphics as side-by-side paragraphs and position graphics with the ruler commands—tabs, margins, indents. You can apply a style to the graphic paragraph so that you can handle all graphics in a standard fashion if you choose. The graphics frame can appear in the character formats—Outline, Shadow, Underline, and so on (the graphics frame prints only if it is Outline or Shadow). You can center a graphic with a centered tab stop.

You can resize a graphic by holding down the Shift key and dragging one of the handles that appear when you select the graphic. Dragging the corner handle resizes a graphic proportionally. Word displays the percentage of reduction or enlargement in the lower left-hand corner of the screen. With the horizontal or vertical handle you can selectively adjust the hori-

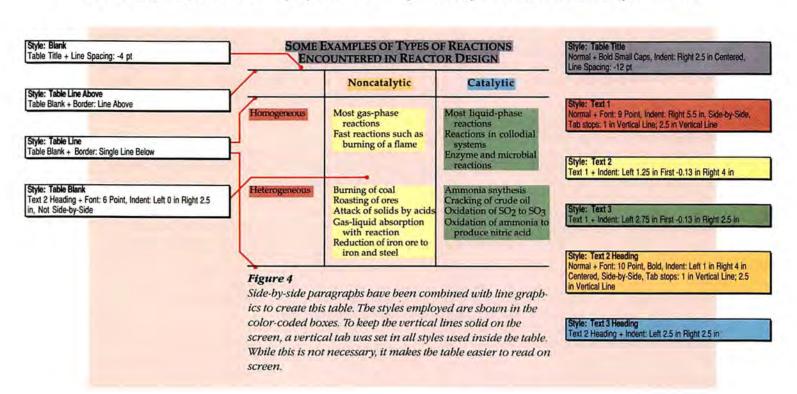
zontal or vertical aspect of a graphic. If you don't hold down the Shift key, the size of the graphic won't change, just the portion of the graphic displayed (starting from the upper-left corner).

One of the differences between using page-layout programs or Word for publishing is that in Word, images cannot be anchored to specific positions. If you edit text above a graphic, the graphic flows with the surrounding text. If you don't specify otherwise, Word could even end up splitting an image across two pages.

When you have graphics in a document, the best procedure is to put them in the final draft after most of the editing is finished. Always format the graphics to stay together on the same page. When you edit the document, start at the beginning and work forward. Repaginate every time you encounter a graphic to make certain that it is in a satisfactory position.

With imported graphics, make certain to allow for increased printing times on the LaserWriter. If you have large or complicated graphics, you may consider using just the graphic frames to preserve space and pasting the graphics into the final version by hand.

Many people don't realize it, but Word actually comes with a PostScript glossary with some routines in it. The most useful of these will print page numbers sideways, screen a column of text, and draw lines between columns. In addition, any text formatted as the style "PostScript" passes directly to the LaserWriter as a series of PostScript commands. The screen around the highlighted quote in Figure 1 was created with the PostScript commands that are printed to the left of the quote. These commands interact with the LaserWriter and Word to automatically screen any paragraph that's preceded by this series of commands (you can't view

#### Math Typesetting

For technical publishers, another advantage of Word for layout is its sophisticated math typesetting. You can use a Word equation in a desktop publishing program, but you must paste equations in as graphics, which precludes later editing. The equation shown on the left was created using the commands displayed on the right.

the result until the page is printed). The easiest way to use this routine is to copy it to the Clipboard and then paste it to the Glossary. When you want to apply it to text, type **%**-Backspace (**%**-Delete on the extended keyboard) and then enter whatever name you give the PostScript routine in the lower-left portion of the screen.

Warning: PostScript programming can alter your LaserWriter settings, with very unpredictable results. We've tested the routine for screened boxes and can assure you that it's safe. Don't, however, try any improvising unless you know what you're doing.

#### **Automatic Writing**

Automatic functions like table-of-contents generation, paragraph numbering, and footnoting offer the Word publisher relief from some of the grunt-work of preparing documents for publication. They also give you the freedom to edit up until the last minute. Normally even a minimal amount of editing on your main document, for example, could throw all the page numbers in a table of contents off. With an automatic table of contents, however, it's a simple matter to update the references.

To create a table of contents that lists the page numbers of major and minor headings, organized with subordinate sections grouped under major section titles, assign the headings the default "level" styles. The headings styled as level 1 become major entries in the table of contents. Headings given the style level 2 will be the next level, and so on. The table-of-contents generator can be programmed to pick up only a certain range of levels (for example, level 2 through level 4) or all levels.

If you want the table of contents to contain information other than headings, you must give that information specially formatted coding in your document. You can't mix the "style" method with the "formatted entry" method to build a single table of contents. You can, however, generate a table of contents using levels

and then create a separate table, say of illustrations, from codes, by running the Table of Contents command a second time.

The index generator operates similarly to the table-of-contents generator. However, you can't use styles to generate the index automatically. You must enter special codes next to every item that goes in the index. Since the codes must include formatting, they can't be inserted using search and replace. This limitation makes the index feature much less useful than it could have been, since you can't use the power of the computer to automatically find and list every instance of an entry. Still, finding and marking entries is no more difficult than manually finding and noting down page numbers; and once you've done the initial marking, the feature works like a charm.

All of the formatting features of Word plus page numbering, time stamping, and date stamping are available in the headers and footers. Each section of a document can have a different header and footer for the body and first page. You can also have Word automatically number and position footnotes in your publication.

#### Words to the Wise

The combination of Word's style sheets, automatic list-generation, good range of features for formatting text, and graphics capability makes it a natural alternative to page-layout software for publishing longer, text-intensive documents.

Word, however, is far from perfect. Many of its quirks have already been mentioned: the program has a long way to go to achieve the WYSIWYG ideal. Microsoft needs to improve the linkage between multiple file documents; you shouldn't have to enter starting page, line, and footnote numbers. It is also inconvenient to have so many style sheets. If a style sheet could be saved independently and then linked to many documents, styles would be even more convenient to use.

If you don't already own Word and this article has got you interested in the advantages of integrating writing and layout, you might do well to look into one of the new generation of writing tools becoming available. The long-awaited FullWrite, in particular, seems to have an elegant Mac interface and many tools aimed at the publishing market. WordPerfect is another word processor with powerful publishing features.

If you are among the masses who already own Word, however, give its layout abilities a try. It has its faults, but if you take the time to learn its functions, it may be the only publishing program you'll ever need.

At press time we learned that Microsoft is planning to release Word 4.0 sometime this summer. This upgrade, which at this writing has a projected price of \$50 to registered owners, will include many features that should make Word an even more attractive tool for publishers.—Ed.

### Reviews

#### A Big Hand for FreeHand

#### Aldus FreeHand 1.0

PostScript graphics program. Pros: Versatile set of drawing tools; sophisticated text functions.

Cons: Switching between multiple drawing tools can be cumbersome; one kerning option won't work on old keyboards. Company: Aldus. List price: \$495. Requires: IMB; two 800K drives or hard disk; PostScript-compatible printer recommended.

A handful of old timers have seen transportation evolve—in the course of their lifetime—from the horse and buggy to a manned moon shot. Compress the scale and add a dash of hyperbole, and you can analogize that many Mac users have seen comparable progress in graphics programs in the brief course of the Mac's existence, from MacPaint to Aldus FreeHand.

Like Adobe Illustrator, FreeHand uses PostScript to produce crisp, precise illustrations made up of bezier curves. But Free-Hand takes up where Illustrator leaves off, adding features such as layers, object alignment, gradient fills, precision kerning, and text bound to a path, to name a few. (Note that I'm referring to the original Illustrator here; Adobe's forthcoming Illustrator 88 may well give FreeHand a run for its money.)

You can create a drawing from scratch in FreeHand, or trace a template à la Illustrator. A bitmapped or PICT drawing pasted from the Clipboard or Scrapbook appears in gray, ready to be traced. FreeHand also imports drawings saved in encapsulated PostScript (EPS) format, allowing you to reposition, resize, rotate, or skew them. (I was unable to open an EPS document created with Cricket Draw 1.0, but was informed that later versions of Cricket Draw

correct the problem.) In addition, Free-Hand opens Illustrator files and converts them to FreeHand format, enabling you to edit Illustrator drawings.

#### The Tools

One of FreeHand's most important innovations is its namesake, the freehand drawing tool, which makes the program immediately accessible to beginning users. The freehand tool is similar to MacPaint's pencil: you simply hold down the mouse button and draw a free-form line or enclosed area. Unlike with MacPaint, however, when you release the mouse button FreeHand converts the line into a path made up of PostScript components—line segments, curves, and their endpoints. You can drag the points to reshape the path, and add or subtract points if necessary. While I initially found manipulating Illustrator's curves akin to drawing with a handful of rubber bands, thanks to the freehand tool I was able to start drawing right away in FreeHand.

For more precise manipulation of lines and shapes, FreeHand offers four additional drawing tools. The curve tool draws a series of symmetrical, rounded curves, while the combination tool draws asymmetrical curves as well as straight lines (the curve tool might be used to draw an arch, for example, while the combination tool would be more appropriate for an irregular shape such as a map or a puzzle piece). The corner tool connects a series of

straight lines or curves with "hinges"; use this tool to draw a zigzag line or a polygon. Finally, the connector tool allows you to join straight and curved segments smoothly. You can use the tools in any combination while drawing a shape; simply click on the tool you need or press a key to change tools. Unfortunately, FreeHand's variety of tools may be a hindrance rather than a plus for many users; switching between four tools to draw different types of curves can be confusing while learning the program, and it is not a natural way to draw—an artist doesn't have to change pens to add a sharp corner to a curved line.

Once you've drawn a shape, you can edit it by dragging one or more points or, alternatively, you can adjust curves by dragging a point's handles. (Illustrator users may be disappointed by the inability to click on a path between two points and drag only that section of a curve.) Points can be added or deleted anywhere on a path. In addition, you can change a point from one type to another—corner, connector, or curve—to alter the shape of a path radically.

#### **Editing and Positioning Elements**

Editing is not confined to an object's shape, of course. You can adjust the line width from 0 to 288 points; create a custom dashed line; rotate, scale, skew, or mirror an object; and fill areas with solid colors or gradient fills. FreeHand offers a style-sheet approach to colors, fills, and line styles: attributes you define and name subsequently appear in menus. Unlike Illustrator, Free-Hand lets you draw in both keyline mode (outlines) and preview mode (shading displayed); practically speaking, however, complex illustrations redraw much too slowly to make working in preview mode acceptable.



To help you position objects accurately, FreeHand provides rulers (in points, picas, inches, "decimal inches," or millimeters), an invisible grid, and an align elements command. An information bar displays distances and angles of rotation as you work. Although FreeHand's invisible grid is helpful for aligning elements, I'd like to see the option of displaying the grid (you can draw the gridlines in gray, but doing so takes time and effort). Likewise, horizontal and vertical lines extending from the rulers (like Cricket Draw's guides) would be helpful. While I'm being picky, I'd also like to see a Nudge command like SuperPaint's, which moves an object in 1-pixel increments for precision placement.

To further help you position drawing elements, FreeHand has adopted the concept of layers from its CAD cousins. The

program lets you place parts of an illustration in any of 200 layers, grouping or locking elements as necessary, making the task of constructing and editing a complex drawing more manageable.

#### **Text Options**

FreeHand offers more sophisticated text capabilities than its two closest relatives, Illustrator and Cricket Draw, combining some of the best features of each. FreeHand lets you mix fonts, sizes, and styles in a block of text; adjust leading; apply the transformation tools (rotate, skew, and so on) to text; and bind a line of text to a shape or path. In addition, FreeHand offers precise kerning, allowing you to add or

subtract space between adjoining letters in increments of 0.1 or 0.01 ems. (I ran across a slight problem when kerning text; the keystroke combo for kerning by 0.1 em includes an arrow key, which unfortunately doesn't exist on my old-fashioned Mac keyboard—I could still use the 0.01-em option, at least.) You can also adjust space between words or between all the letters in a line of text. You can even create condensed or extended text by dragging a block of text vertically or horizontally, or simulate styles such as bold and italic with the Heavy and Oblique style options. The style options are somewhat limited, however; unlike Illustrator, FreeHand doesn't allow you to change a letter's outline width or fill it with a pattern.

#### Printing

If you're fortunate enough to own a Mac II with a color monitor, FreeHand takes advantage of color. With an appropriate driver, FreeHand documents print on color output devices such as thermal printers; I saw an impressive sample printed on the 300-dots-per-inch Tektronix 4693D color thermal printer. For professional printing jobs, however, you're likely to print at a higher resolution. FreeHand provides options for producing color separations for a commercial printer, including registration marks and screen angles for process colors. (I didn't send my output to a printing service, so I can't vouch for the program's color-separation capabilities.)

You can also apply special effects such as posterization or *screen functions* to black-and-white output, adding a professional touch. FreeHand's screen functions let you simulate halftone screens by printing specified patterns of lines or dots. You can alter factors such as line angle and number of lines per inch to create impressive effects.

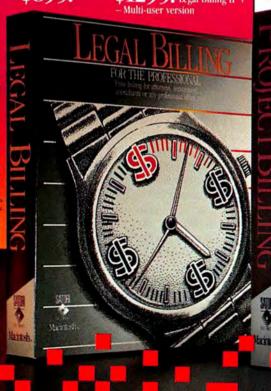

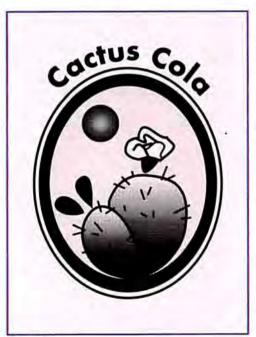
# The Bottom Bezier Curve

I was impressed not only by the number of features FreeHand offers, but also by how easy it was to learn the program's basic operations. FreeHand has a manual, an animated tutorial disk, a written/on-disk tutorial, and an advanced user's guide to accommodate different learning styles. And the freehand tool makes it relatively easy for beginners to produce drawings before tackling the trickier tools. Beginners will also be pleased to know that FreeHand offers eight levels of Undo: you can undo your last eight drawing or editing actions.

As I was learning the program my only major problem, besides figuring out when to switch between drawing tools, was a tendency to accidentally double-click objects as I tried to move them, bringing up a dialog box. When I ran into an occasional snag, I found Aldus's technical support staff very helpful, even though I had to suffer through three recorded messages, one human operator, and interminable Muzak before my call went through. But that's about the only suffering I encountered with FreeHand; in all it's an excellent implementation of PostScript graphics.

## Simul 1.0

Simulation program for mathematically describable processes. Pros: Versatile, powerful, fast; enables you to simulate the action of CAD drawings; flexible in defining groupings from simpler drawing elements; can run simulations based on arbitrary rules; imports/exports ASCII tables; relatively easy to use. Cons: Too expensive for casual use; idiosyncratic documentation; not copyable. Company: Abvent. List price: Version 1.3 \$1195. Requires: 1MB.



Although Simul allows you to animate CAD drawings, the program goes far beyond this function—it

can simulate any simple or complex physical process (turbulence is a good example) that can be described with a set of equations. Since Simul is the only program of its kind for the Mac, it's fortunate that Abvent has developed a fast, assembler-based program that takes care of almost any reasonable simulation wish-list. It's hard to imagine a science or engineering lab that wouldn't want Simul.

This practical viewpoint, however, should not be allowed to obscure the program's entertainment value. For serious technical software, it is amazingly fun to use. You can even import MacPaint pictures and introduce animation—just think of the possibilities.

# **Elementary Considerations**

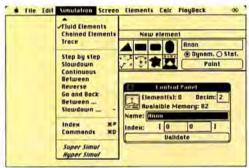
A simulation in Simul amounts to moving elements around on the screen according to formulas that define their equations of motion, in time steps. You set the number of time steps for a simulation through a parameter called an index. When starting a new simulation, you see the New Element and Control Panel dialog boxes (see "Taking Control"). To simulate a ball bouncing across the screen, for example, you first set the index number in the Control Panel. Then you use the New Element dialog box to define the size and shape of the ball, position and velocity at the start of the simulation, force of gravity, and ball elasticity. Simul gives you the choice of defining

some elements (such as gravitational force) directly, or implicitly in formulas.

While in many cases elements will be simple numerical variables, Simul provides 14 types of elements: 8 are geometric types (points, lines, polygons, and so forth), the rest are text and icons. In the simple bouncing ball simulation, "ball" is the sole geometric element, velocity and position are dynamic variable elements, and gravity is a static variable element. Imported pictures and 3 types of grouped elements are key element types, since they let the program readily simulate motion using drawings already produced in a CAD program. In most machine simulations, grouped elements predominate-flexibility in defining groupings from simpler drawing elements is a Simul strong point.

# Forming a Formula

The Formula choice under Simul's Elements menu is where you define action. Using the index number (#) as the time variable, you write an equation of motion

for the center of the ball in terms of time, height, and horizontal coordinate. At this point, you're basically translating expressions from first-year physics into Simul notation using the calculator-like Formula dialog box.

For physical simulation you would typically use equations based on the laws of physics. But Simul also allows you to run simulations according to any rules you can

devise. For simulations of machinery (one impressive Simul example shows a detailed cross-section of a diesel engine in motion) you are free to define practice simulations that simply move parts of a drawing, whether Newton's laws are obeyed or not. "Think Apple" shows a whimsical application of a hypothetical machine following arbitrary formulas of motion. In the bouncing ball example you could even define unrealistically squishy "dead" balls or zingy super-elastic balls, as well as complex bouncing paths.

The Simulation menu, which contains the stop and go signals for motion, also allows you to set a display style. Simulations can show motion as simple animation, as a continuous superposition of frames on the screen, in reverse, or as stop action, stepping through one index at a time. Simul uses a table to keep track of coordinates for all elements in each indexed frame so that you can inspect simulation details. The program will also set up a simulation from imported tables. Since tables can be exchanged in ASCII format, the results of simulations can be exported to Excel or used as raw data in other computer programs.

Exporting is accomplished using an option called Externe, one of many gallicisms remaining in this product originally developed by a French engineering group. The icon for Region in the Elements menu is a tiny map of France, and memory usage is consistently specified in kilo-octets. These charming touches compensate for several minor annoyances (page numbers in the index of the manual are often incorrect, and explanations are classically brief).

# Apple Machine Simul\*\*

# Think Apple

This Simul contraption takes apples from a shelf and deposits them in the subject's head, perhaps simulating aspects of Gassée's theory of the "third apple" that will change the world. Parts of the machine were defined separately and then grouped, giving the effect of the whole contraption being "driven" by the wheel at left.

# Options

Simulations with many moving elements can take great amounts of computation, and Simul has some tricks for providing adequate speed. The first of these appears in the Playback menu, which offers the option of collecting a sequence of simulation screens in memory and playing them back at intervals chosen to match the screen redraw rate. The second and third options, called Super Simul and Hyper Simul, speed up presentation by shutting down various program interrupts (Hyper even deactivates the mouse and keyboard). Since Simul runs quickly on both the Plus and the SE, its speed on the Mac II should be more than adequate.

# The Right Tool

Simul can handle simulations not just of physical situations, but also of systems with any type of variable—economic, chemical, electronic, or anything else that can be described mathematically. Its straightforward interface and its speed make it a pleasure to use. If Abvent can find a way to release a cheaper educational version, this program could become a standard tool for analyzing a wide range of problems.—Charles Seiter

Data compressor for Excel spreadsbeets. Pros: Saves room on disk, provides audit trail and password protection. Cons: Increases saving and retrieval time; some features not as convenient as they could be. Company: Symantec Corporation. List price: \$79.95. Requires: 512K; Excel 1.00 to 1.04.



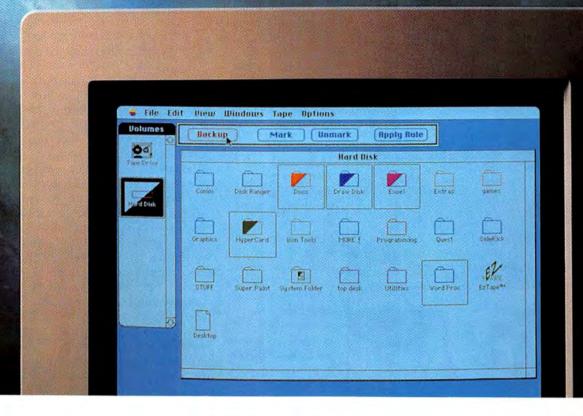
When I first started using MacSqz (pronounced *MacSqueeze*), I decided that it was one of those captally good things, like Velero

quintessentially good things, like Velcro and screw-top soda bottles. After all, one reason business people purchase large hard disks is to accommodate giant spreadsheets. Unfortunately, after using MacSqz I decided it's more like preservatives and superhighways, things that seem good when we need them, but which have downsides.

MacSqz is a desk accessory that allows you to reduce the disk space required for any Excel worksheet or macro by about 60 to 90 percent. But what you save in disk space, you pay for in time. The program uses algorithms to compress the information in the document as it is being saved and then uses other algorithms to restore the information when the file is opened. I tested the program on a 465K document, which was squeezed down to 165.5K. Saving with MacSqz took 4 minutes 31 seconds as compared to 2 minutes 52 seconds without MacSqz, and retrieval took 4 minutes even compared with 1 minute 33 seconds.

The amount of compression you achieve depends partly on how you set the MacSqz controls (see "Compression Options"). A control dialog box offers three ways to save formula values (see "Space-Saving Controls"). The most prodigal way is to save both the formulas and the values calculated by the formulas. The most thrifty way is to save only the formulas; but then if you need Excel to recalculate the spreadsheet when it is opened, retrieval time is extended. A middle road is to save approximate values, which provide 6 digits of accuracy (Excel provides 15 digits). Most users will be able to work, for a while at least, with 6 digits of accuracy. And you can always have Excel recalculate to full precision during your coffee break. To increase compression have MacSqz remove all

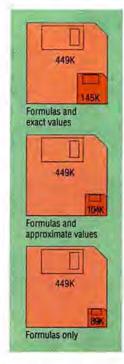

# Compression Options

MacSqz saves formula values in three waysthe values and the formulas, approximate values with six digits of accuracy, or formulas only. Our test used a 449K spreadsheet containing 50 percent values and 50 percent formulas. About 95 percent of the formula cells contained values with more than six digits. The more a file is compressed, bowever, the longer it takes MacSaz to retrieve the information.



blank cells (Excel saves blank cells). However, any formatting information contained in the blank cells will be lost.

# What Microsoft Left Out

MacSqz offers important functions that Microsoft should have included in Excel. The first is file-level password protection. Excel allows you to lock cells within a worksheet so that unauthorized users cannot change data; they can, however, still view it. The MacSqz protection system prevents unauthorized file opening and viewing as well.

MacSqz also maintains an audit trail, which lists the date and time whenever you save a document. You can set the number of entries in the audit trail from 0 to 99, and each entry can have a 50-character annotation. Although the annotation feature is very useful, it has a couple of rubs. First, you are allowed only one annotation per worksheet per session. So if you need to annotate each change, you must quit and restart Excel in order to enter each additional annotation.

Second, since you access the audit trail through a separate program called MacSqz Tools, you must first quit Excel. You cannot read the audit trail of a password-protected document even if you know the password. So you have to open the document in Excel using the password, resave the document without protection, quit Excel, start MacSqz Tools, access the audit trail, restart

Excel, reopen the file, and finally resave the document with protection. Since opening and saving files takes longer with Mac-Sqz, you can easily spend 15 minutes accessing the audit trail for a protected document.

The MacSqz manual is excellent. It includes a tutorial that allows you to master the program in about half an hour. Each section in the manual explains all possible ramifications of each option. The manual is also well indexed and fully explains MacSqz's extensive error-message system.

There are, however, a few minor telltale signs of a product that was rushed to market. The Read Me document on the disk contains two pages of changes to the manual. Also the document for using the utility that allows you to convert batches of Excel files to MacSqz and vice versa is incorrect. The manual tells you to open the Batch Squeezing or the Batch Unsqueezing file and then select, respectively, Excel to MacSqz or MacSqz to Excel. But the copy I received did not have the files. I first had to select Other translations, and then install Excel to MacSqz or MacSqz to Excel.

(If you use the Apple File Exchange and have a 51/4-inch floppy drive, then Mac-Sqz automatically converts Lotus 1-2-3 files to Excel.)



## Space-Saving Controls

Select the MacSqz DA when the Excel document to squeeze is active. Until you alter the dialog box controls, MacSqz compresses the document whenever you save it. The control box also lets you choose a method of compression, assign password protection, and determine whether or not the document will be annotated.

But those are small problems in a generally well-planned, well-produced product. So if your bookkeeper has been screaming for a high-capacity storage medium, you might be able to substitute MacSqz, along with a small raise, and still save yourself a few bucks. —Lawrence Stevens

When Monogram acquired the rights to Maccountant, Digital Etc.'s accounting package for small-to medium-size businesses, it thoroughly revamped the program and reintroduced it as Business Sense. Maccountant was a popular package, and Business Sense should do equally well.

A double-entry accounting package, Business Sense integrates Accounts Receivable, General Ledger, Accounts Payable, and Payroll modules into a single, interactive whole. The main window has 14 icons that you click on to access the various sections of the program. You can keep your books open throughout the year or close them periodically.

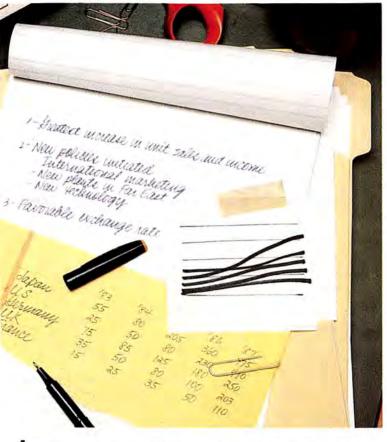
Whenever you close a window, the program posts entries and updates all related modules. In order to ensure system integrity, entries cannot be erased once they are posted. You can, however, use the Fix/Adjust window to change entries and still maintain an audit trail. Data entry and report generation are well automated through a series of scrollable windows—rarely will you need to type any information into the program more than once.

The Recurring Entries windows are great time-savers too, allowing you to automate recurring entry work. For instance, if you regularly post the sales figures for three regional stores, you need only go through the steps once, saving the work on a separate worksheet as a recurring entry. From then on, simply choose this worksheet from a menu, change the variable data, and let Business Sense do the posting.

One of the features sure to make Business Sense popular is the Payroll module.

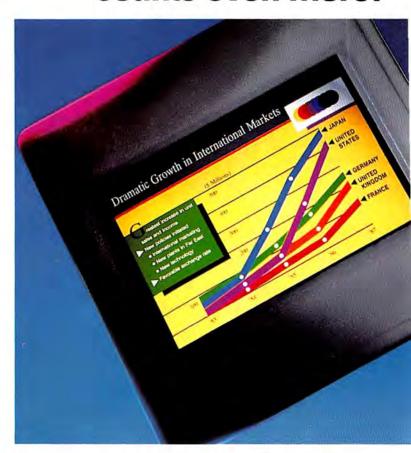

## One More Time

BusinessSense's Recurring Entries feature gives a great boost to the program's speed and accuracy. Create your own template for any recurring group of transactions. Clicking on your custom index adds the transactions to the appropriate journal. Variable amounts can be adjusted and portions omitted.

You can access three windows—personal information, wages, and withholding—through the list of employees. Up to ten wage scales can be defined, as well as tips, fringe benefits, and commissions. Withholding amounts may be determined for federal, state, FICA, and local taxes, and up to ten other categories. Each category can be defined by percentages or by tax tables to be filled in by the user. You can print checks, W-2s, and 941 forms.

# **Bohemian Accounting**

Those who are comfortable with the stuffy and conventional Dollars and Sense program may be uncomfortable at first with how unconventional and even quirky Business Sense is. It takes great liberties with the Mac interface. For instance, the only way to open a new set of books is to drag the folder marked Company Data from the master program disk to your data disk or hard disk. A bookkeeper who wants books for more than one company on the hard disk must drag a new Company Data file from the master disk and rename it for each company. Each file must then be hidden in another folder. The file you wish to open and work with must be alone on the desktop (placing it in a folder with the Business Sense application will not work). To switch books you must return to the desktop and exchange Company Data folders. Backups to other disks can be done only by dragging Company Data folders onto the disk icons.

The program supports 52 types of reports, which are constantly updated "behind the scenes" as you enter new data. You can view reports with tabular or graphic data, and with or without budget

information included. Since the reports are otherwise not very customizable, it's fortunate that most report data can be exported as standard ASCII text. Then the determined user can move the data to a spreadsheet for further analysis or graphing. You can print mailing labels from all lists.

Although Business Sense allows you to print information onto checks and several other preprinted forms, you cannot change Business Sense's alignment of the information. You can, however, ask your forms supplier to adapt those forms so they match Business Sense's default spacing. Pin-feed forms, such as invoices, billing statements, and W-2s, must be printed on a dot matrix printer. Checks and reports can be printed on a laser printer.

# Requirements and Support

Business Sense will run on a 512K Mac with two 800K drives, but I suspect that the majority of users will have at least a Mac Plus with a hard disk. In that configuration, you shouldn't run into file size limitations. The program can handle multiple companies, each with up to 2000 accounts, customers, vendors, and employees; up to 99 profit centers or departments; and it can print checks up to one trillion dollars.

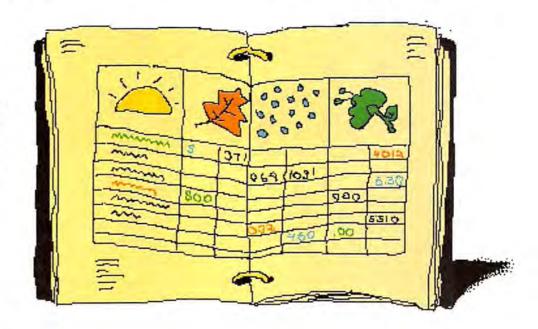
The large, well-thought-out manual is full of proven advice. One has the feeling that a bookkeeper, not a programmer, wrote it. For instance, the manual makes some suggestions about how and why to close your books monthly, and it does not hesitate to recommend using a pencil and paper when necessary.

Yet the manual's index is curiously weak—lacking, for example, entries for Double Entry or Data Import. In fact, the manual does not directly mention that you can import existing Dollars and Sense files to begin a new set of books for Business Sense, though the utilities to do this are provided. (If you phone tech support, however, they will walk you through it.) Also, the program's on-screen help is incomplete and too brief. But since it is modifiable, you can create your own training guide.

Monogram offers free telephone support and also sponsors a CompuServe forum (Go Monogram) where you can usually get answers to your questions within 24 hours. If you buy the premium support service for \$150 per year, however, Monogram promises to answer phoned-in questions within a couple of hours, and you'll receive upgrades at no additional charge.

Before investing in Business Sense, be sure to include in your decision-making process the people who do the day-to-day data entry and review the reports, as well as your accountant. Ask if you can rent the program for a couple of weeks, or at least find a friendly retailer who will allow you to use the program undisturbed for a few hours. Better yet, make sure you can bring it back during the first month for a full credit toward other software if it doesn't prove satisfactory. But I recommend Business Sense as a good entry-level accounting program, and my guess is that few will bring it back. — Scott Beamer

# **Bombs Away**

## 1stAid Kit HFS 2.2

Troubleshooting manual and utility for recovering damaged files and disks. Pros: Excellent reference manual with emphasis on prevention; software solves many common disk and file problems; good security measures. Cons: Tutorials contrived; recovery tools limited; pricey. Company: IstAid Software. List price: \$99.95 plus \$5 shipping and handling. Requires: 512KE.

It's a rare Macintosh user who has never watched a system bomb, had a disk rejected, or opened a familiar file to find it full of holes. Even more rare is the individual who understands why such mishaps occur and what to do about them. With 1stAid Kit HFS, even nonhackers can troubleshoot and repair files and disks. This manual/disk combo offers an easily understood summary of prevention and diagnostic techniques, along with a handy toolkit for restoring disk and file information.

# The Heart of the Kit

The heart of 1stAid Kit HFS is the extensive text. Besides detailing how computers store data on disks and how the Mac accesses it, the manual catalogs a full spectrum of error messages and offers comprehensive routines for diagnosing problems and recovering damaged data. Error being an unavoidable human trait, the manual stresses prevention—it constantly reminds us to lock, label, and Save As; to catalog, archive, and back up. Heeding the tips and caveats will forestall some disasters, but when acts of God and of fools happen, then the software comes into play.

# The Working Part

The kit's software, IstAid HFS, has a verification routine that yields information on specific sectors, pinpointing which are bad and recommending recovery routines. If altering the name or resetting Creator or Type codes or the Attribute Bits of a file will solve the problem, then IstAid HFS can probably help you.

If you've trashed a document that you would like to recover, however, the chances of retrieving it are slim. IstAid HFS creates "fake" files, made up of *possibly* related sectors. Extracting text from these and piecing the fragments together can be tedious. Also, the process does not work

well with files that depend on internal information to locate other data in the files, such as spreadsheets, object-oriented data, and page-layout documents.

Things like subjecting disks to magnetic fields or dousing them with coffee can make your disks develop *flipped bits*. Whole files can become unreadable because one bit has changed its orientation. Although the bit's resident sector can never be recovered, 1stAid HFS can zero out the sector and restore the file, albeit minus bad sectors.

# The Best and the Worst

1stAid HFS offers various types of security features, and these are its best qualities. Disks must be locked before diagnosis, and repairs that affect data are made on copies that 1stAid HFS creates. The program creates a disk catalog and archives volume information (particularly important when restoring hard disks). You can erase all traces of sensitive files that have been deleted, thereby ensuring that the files cannot be reconstructed. And a desk accessory/F-key option allows you to save the contents of the RAM cache to disk. (In the name of expediency, some applications don't write all the data in the RAM cache to disk every time you save.)





# Mending a Broken Disk

IstAid displays all files and folders on the selected disk. You can automatically catalog the disk; view, extract, and print text; fix the Creator and Type codes and Attribute Bits; copy files to other disks; and delete files, even if they are locked or protected.

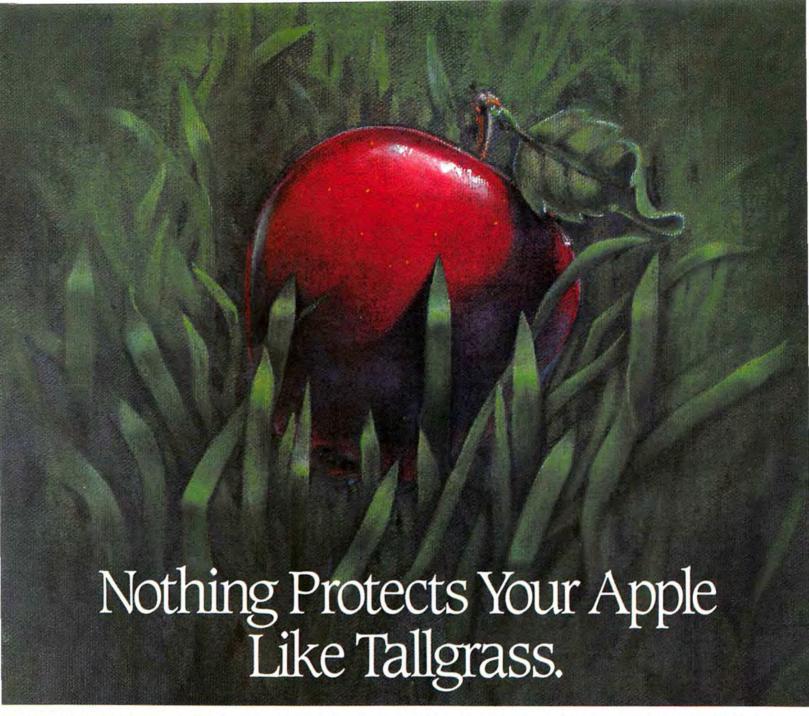
The program takes care of an earlier version's problems with hard disks of more than 40 megabytes and with printing reports on laser printers. It also restores files that have resource forks in one step, complete with their names and icons. The software adds recommendations and sequences of repairs to the Diagnostic Report, and allows for creation of folders and the duplication and erasure of disks from within recovery procedures.

Some users may find 1stAid Kit HFS too text intensive. Also, because recovering files that have been trashed is not 1stAid HFS's forte, some users may choose MacTools' Copy II Mac for its CPS Savedelete INIT. And, although Fedit Plus's routines may be somewhat sophisticated for some users, that utility can be used to check and change data bit by bit.

# Becoming a Disk Detective

If you're willing to commit the first few background chapters of 1stAid Kit HFS's manual to your bio-ROM, you'll find yourself becoming a much smoother operator. And, should things go awry, the troubleshooting and recovery procedure chapters will turn even beginners into successful detectives. Should using the software tools be necessary, 1stAid HFS can solve many common disk and file problems without danger of further damaging the data. All things considered, this HFS version of 1stAid Kit, particularly the manual, is an excellent resource.—Suzanne Stefanac

Designing and developing a solid, coherent interface is not the primary strength of many programmers. Prototyper, a user interface design and prototyping tool, enables a software designer to quickly lay out a collection of menus, windows, and buttons, all of which can be tied together to create a semifunctioning mock-up of a program's display. Going a step further, Prototyper also generates source code that can be easily integrated into the program, thereby saving the programmer a considerable amount of coding time.



# Main Window

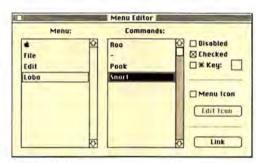
Prototyper's screen bas very little clutter. The titles in the main window represent the windows and dialog boxes being prepared for this prototype. The icon at the top calls up the Menu Editor and the window selection palette.

Creating a Display

When using Prototyper to create a mock-up of a program, you might begin by selecting a window from a palette. Prototyper offers a description of each window type to help you make a selection. The window then appears as a blank slate, with an-

other palette containing various items such as buttons, picture areas, and text fields that you can place in the window. Within five minutes, you can lay out two or three complete windows.

You can also assign a variety of characteristics to the menu commands and the

With the Menu Editor you create and edit the menu bar and its pull-down menus. The highlighted menu selection can be linked to another window, which will open when it is selected.

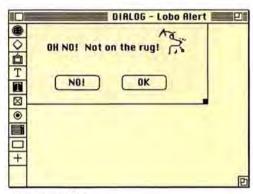
window's controls. For example, you can group radio buttons together or set the step size of a scroll bar (the increment it moves the window). Unfortunately, Prototyper does not let you assign any functions to controls other than opening or closing windows. This shouldn't be a problem, however, since most of the functions that you would assign to a menu selection or button depend on the program you are designing, and therefore, must be coded manually.

Prototyper also lacks a few features that many designers may clamor for. For example, you can't create more than one menu bar, and you can't enable or disable menu selections dynamically. In a resizable window, the scroll bars won't shrink or grow with the window. The program also does not handle hierarchical or pop-up menus. These limitations by no means make the program unusable—you merely add such features when programming.

Prototyper's real value is in its ability to generate source code for four popular Pascal compilers: MPW, Lightspeed, Turbo, and TML. The program will also create a source file for RMaker, as well as a compiled resource file that you can use in your program. The time saved in coding is worth the cost of the program. (Unfortunately, though, Prototyper does not currently generate any C code.)

Jump On In

Even though Prototyper practically begs you to jump in and start playing, you'll probably still learn something by reading the manual. Liberally illustrated and remarkably comprehensive, the 148-page manual includes a short tutorial, a discussion of the technical details of Pascal source code, and a set of instructions for compiling a prototype application. For those with limited knowledge of the Macintosh toolbox, a good, hands-on introduction is provided.



# Window Editor

The Window Editor enables you to design elements such as dialog boxes. The text, icon, and buttons are called zones, and can be dragged around the window. The outline of the dialog box being created appears within the editing window. The palette to the left shows all the zones and items that can be used in the window being created.

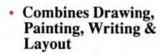
Prototyper is a very well designed program for software developers and designers who need to create a user interface for their applications. Prototyper's ability to let you create objects and drag them around the screen, much like in a drawing program, greatly facilitates the design process, and the program's ability to generate Pascal code reduces the effort required in a tedious but necessary area of the program. These immediate benefits far outweigh the wish list of features not yet provided.

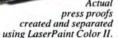

The LaserWriter IISC, Apple's entry into the "personal" laser printer market, uses the same

Canon SX print engine as its PostScript siblings, the LaserWriter IINT and NTX. That means better print quality than original LaserWriters and easier manual-feed operation. However, in its approach to describing the appearance of a page, the IISC more closely resembles Apple's dot matrix ImageWriters. Indeed, the best way to understand the IISC is to think of it as an ImageWriter that prints 300 dots per inch (dpi).

Like an ImageWriter, the IISC uses the fonts in the Mac's System file; Post-Script printers and General Computer's Personal LaserPrinter (PLP) use font outlines, which are scaled to the specified size when printed and can be stretched or condensed for special effects. The IISC, however, prints high-quality text by reducing larger sizes. For example, to print high-quality 12-point Times, the driver looks in the System file for 48-point Times, then reduces it by a factor of four. (Apple calls these large sizes 4X fonts.) The Image-Writer driver works similarly, except it uses a font only twice the required size.

And like an ImageWriter, the guiding force behind the IISC is QuickDraw. The PLP also uses QuickDraw, but quite differently from the IISC (see *Reviews, Macworld*, March 1988). Because it lacks a Post-Script interpreter and the support circuitry one requires, the IISC is Apple's least expensive laser printer—though it's still \$800 more than the PLP. But the IISC's limitations also make it the least capable Macoriented laser printer you can buy.

Simple Setup

Life with a IISC begins as you heft the 44-pound printer from its box and install the disposable drum-and-toner cartridge. Then you connect the printer to the Mac's SCSI port. (Like the PLP, the IISC is off limits to 512K or 512KE Macs.) The IISC is preset to use SCSI address 4, but a convenient switch lets you change that.

Next you spend a few minutes setting up the IISC's driver software and installing the fonts. The IISC doesn't require a hard disk-equipped Mac, but using it with a floppy-only system requires some creative disk organization. The complete sets of Helvetica, Times, Courier, and Symbol consume over 1.4 megabytes of disk space, making it impossible to have all the fonts on tap at once. Floppy-disk users should probably set up several system disks containing the combinations of fonts and sizes they use for various tasks.

If you use MultiFinder, you can specify that printing occur in the background—a time-saving option the PLP lacks. You can also adjust print options such as paper size and orientation, and you can adjust the size of bitmapped graphics. For instance, you can reduce a page by 4 percent to avoid the

distortion that can occur when 72-dpi bitmaps are prepared for printing on a 300dpi printer.

Compatibility and Quality

The LaserWriter IISC performs reliably with most Mac applications, although I did encounter a few problems. Incompatibilities ranged from system crashes (Micro-Phone) to extraneous characters (Page-Maker) to out-of-memory errors when I tried to print (dBase Mac). MockWrite, CE Software's desk accessory text editor, also choked, spewing text onto the screen instead of sending it to the printer. When you print from PostScript-oriented applications such as Adobe Illustrator and Cricket Draw. the results vary. Illustrator drawings print at 72 dpi. With Cricket Draw images, the portions of a drawing that don't require PostScript code—such as rectangles, lines, circles, or text-print at 300 dpi. Elements that require PostScript code-such as fountains, drop shadows, or text bound to a curved path—either print at 72 dpi or not at all. Although the IISC coexists well with Mac software, you should verify that

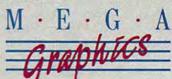

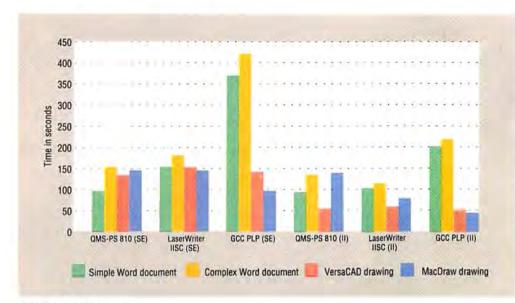

# Printer Performance

On the SE, the HSC prints text-oriented documents faster than the PLP; the chasm narrows with a Mac II. The PLP proved faster when printing complex graphics, however. (Text results from the 8-pages-perminute QMS-PS 810 PostScript printer are shown for comparison.) The simple Word document contained 12-point Courier and no graphics. The complex one contained bitmapped images and several type sizes. The VersaCAD drawing was 71K and the MacDraw document contained 960 objects. Tests were run on a 1MB SE and a 5MB Mac II with MultiFinder and background printing disabled.

any incompatibilities have been fixed before buying.

What won't change is the IISC's limited typographic capabilities. The IISC can print text in only the sizes installed in the System file, and it can print high-quality text in only those sizes for which 4X fonts exist. (At this writing, the selection of 4X fonts is limited to the four that come with the printer; Bitstream has announced plans to release others.) When you print text for which no 4X font exists, the Mac uses the actual size, which results in jagged-edged text. The Text Smoothing option improves the appearance somewhat, but the result still lacks the quality of PostScript or PLP text.

Moreover, the fonts that come with the IISC aren't of the same high quality as Adobe's PostScript fonts or Bitstream's PLP fonts. For example, the Times font doesn't include a true italic. Instead, the Mac simply slants, or *obliques*, the roman to simulate italic—just as it does when displaying italic text on screen. This pseudoitalic text occasionally touches adjacent nonitalic text. Until high-quality fonts become available, the IISC is a poor choice for desktop publishing applications.

# Should You or Shouldn't You?

Should the shopper on a budget buy a PLP or a LaserWriter IISC? It depends. For Mac Plus or SE users, the PLP can be as slow as a dead snail when printing documents with many fonts and styles. The IISC is satisfyingly swift (see "Printer Performance"). The PLP taxes the limits of a 1MB Mac, forcing you to endure a two-step printing routine to print complex documents. The IISC-temporary compatibility problems aside—never gets in your way. The PLP requires a hard disk. The IISC doesn't, but the PLP costs so much less that you could buy one with the money you save. Both the IISC and the PLP can be upgraded to PostScript printers, but the PLP upgrade costs less.

If you print typographically simple documents—manuscripts, letters, or legal briefs—the IISC is worth considering, provided you don't mind its higher cost and its phoney Times italic. But if typographic aesthetics are important to you, buy the PLP. You may wait longer and work harder for some documents, but you'll enjoy nearly the same typographic versatility as users of PostScript printers. That's a claim IISC users will never be able to make.—Jim Heid

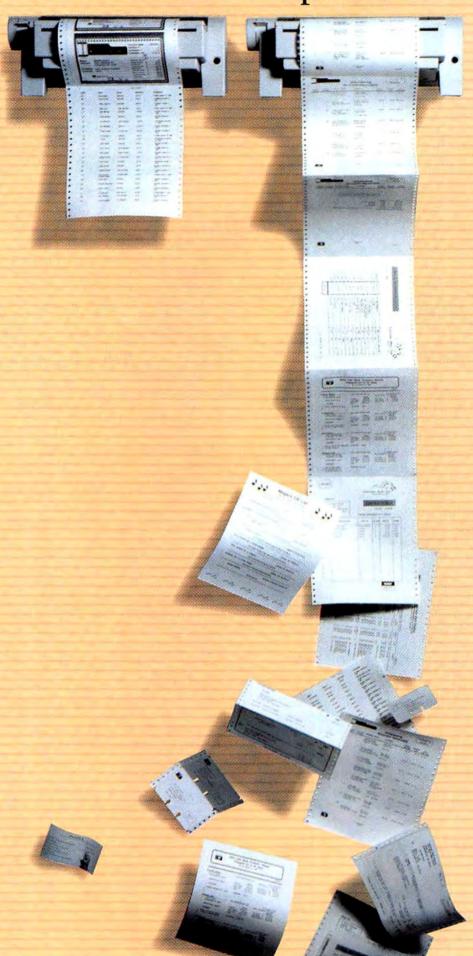

## The Castle Within

One of the most appealing aspects of Dark Castle is the rich world through which you make your way. Beyond Dark Castle has an even more imaginative setting and begins to actually blur the distinction between arcade games and graphics adventure games. In pursuit of the magic orbs, you cover a varied new landscape as you scale walls, traverse swamp and forest, and unravel labyrinths. In addition, Beyond Dark Castle has a scrolling feature that makes several scenes seem to extend into a world of their own. As you traverse some scenes, the picture on the screen scrolls with you.

The enemies and challenges you face are more varied as well. Beyond familiar foes, such as plague-ridden rats and bats, and robot crossbowmen, new hazards scour the rooms, including giant mosquitoes, pulsating laser beams, and venomous snakes. You need new skills to blast through walls with bombs and fuel helicopter packs with gasoline. Improving on the original, Beyond Dark Castle lets you save games in progress and restore them

later. The game adds an interesting twist to this normally mundane operation: you can make Prince Duncan save up to five games within the storyline by manipulating switches in the Computer Room (provided you survive long enough to reach it).

# The Will and the Skill

Like its predecessor, Beyond Dark
Castle is challenging and takes time to master, but it's well worth the effort. Even with
three skill levels—beginner, intermediate,
and advanced—the game requires patience. Some of the required leaps, for example, take a fair amount of practice. And
Dark Castle players will be happy to discover that in Beyond Dark Castle a secret
animation rewards you for finally vanquishing the Black Knight at the advanced
skill level.

Silicon Beach Software is known for providing high-quality sounds, graphics, and animation. In this game the company has outdone itself. This is the best computer game I've ever played. It's too bad that Silicon Beach Software has no plans to produce any more games (see *Verbatim*, *Macworld*, February 1988). The last time I remember feeling like this was right after I had finished the last book in my favorite fantasy trilogy.—*Ralph Ames*

# Making Points, Scientifically

Scientific and technical users of the Mac have often been stymied by the lack of good graphing tools. Programs like Excel and Cricket Graph either do not handle a sufficient number of points or do not include advanced math functions for complex analysis. And although programs such as Eureka, MathView Professional, and MacMathPac handle complex functions, they do not address scientific data plotting. Now, thanks to a pair of Yale physicists, a program called Passage brings technical, graphical analysis to the Macintosh.

# **Beyond Simple Plots**

Although Passage plots only points or lines, its added support of interpolation, function calculation, calculus, and transformations makes the program unique. For example, you can use either cubic splines or rational polynomials to interpolate or extrapolate data, and you can do smoothing by simple multipoint averaging or Fourier transform filtering. Standard selections also include differentiation, integration, and least-squares fitting to either ordinary polynomials or Legendre polynomials.

Passage's function parser lets you create up to six individual equations at one

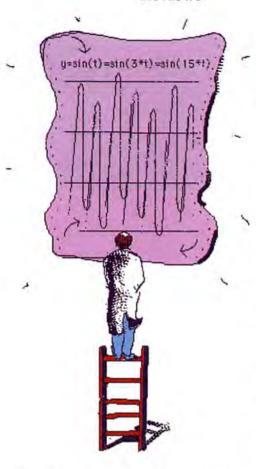

time; these equations can be stored as a separate file for use with other data. Both Bessel and the typical trigonometric functions are available. Because Passage uses a parametric approach, both *x* variable and *y* variable can be expressed as equations of any available function. For example, it's a simple matter to create a plot of points representing a spiral.

Passage also includes the discrete Fourier transform, which can be used to perform time-series analyses or frequency analyses. As is the case with most implementations of the discrete Fourier transform, Passage restricts you to data sets that are equal in length to a power of two. If your data does not meet that requirement, you can always use the built-in function parser or the interpolation/extrapolation option to come up with the right number of points.

While Passage is restricted to merely points and lines, even its plotting capabilities include features that I've long waited for. A maximum of eight separate plot windows can be open at one time, showing different plots of the same data set, for example. Another useful feature allows you to zoom in to any portion of a plot as often as you wish for near-infinite magnification (see "Cycling Along"). Passage also pro-

vides two other features that make analysis of plotted data easier: cross hairs for calculating the value of any point within the graph, and a unique point-identification tool that relates any plotted point back to the original data file.

If you want to use the Mac's features to analyze data generated on a mainframe, Passage includes a very handy data-conversion utility for dealing with text files, such as those downloaded from a mainframe. The utility enables you to preview the contents of any line of the file in order to determine which columns contain the data you need. You can tell Passage to skip any number of lines at the beginning of the file; then you can select certain columns to become a Passage data file.

Final output can be controlled to a finer degree than with other programs. In addition to selecting fonts for axis labels and comments, you can design your own dashed and dotted lines and store them as a plot preferences file. For printing, you can place up to eight graphs on a single page. Passage provides individual rescaling for each graph and includes user-definable rulers and guides on a reduced view of the output page for placing the graphs. For technical publications that prefer to have all graphs near each other with the axis labels on the outer edge, you can place your axis labels on any edge of each graph.

# **Learning New Tricks**

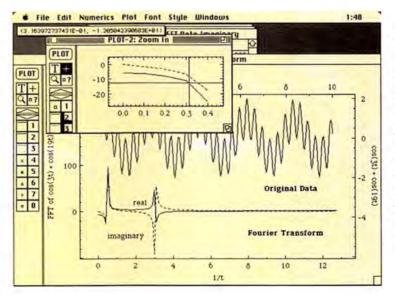
Some of Passage's features take a little getting used to. For example, say you create a list of up to 16 files and then select the

Open button. If you mistakenly select the wrong data file, you cannot remove only that selection from the Open dialog box; you must start over from the beginning. Also, when you resize a plot window or change parts of the plot, you must use the Plot button or its keyboard equivalent (%-P) to see the new plot. In contrast, Excel and Cricket Graph replot graphs after every change, so complicated graphs take longer to lay out in those programs than in Passage.

Although Passage includes Font and Style menus for selecting typefaces, selecting fonts for plot preferences and text labels is awkward. Passage uses a button with the font's name to show the current selection; clicking the button cycles you through the available choices. Selecting a new font is tedious at best; the use of a pop-up menu would make this feature easier to use. Passage also includes user-definable macros for saving axis limits and font sizes and styles, among other things, for use with other graphs.

Aside from the unusual way you select fonts in the plot preference and text dialog boxes, Passage makes good use of the Mac interface to extend graphing to more technical analysis. It plots twice as fast as Cricket Graph and includes excellent control over printing, especially if you want to put more than one graph on a page. The inclusion of advanced mathematical functions also makes Passage a front-runner for technical graphing.—Dave Kosiur

Crystal Paint, by Great Wave Software, has just one purpose: to create pretty, symmetrical designs with a screen pen. As you draw lines and curves freehand, Crystal Paint reproduces every stroke in one or more locations at regularly spaced intervals elsewhere on the screen. Within moments, a few quick turns of the mouse will bring forth intricate patterns—instant florets, webs, mandalas, and kaleidoscopic designs (see "Crystal Patterns").

the Crystal menu reproduce drawings in a crystal-like infinite series, with the actual number of copies you see depending on a separate spacing setting. The program offers three pen widths, and the pens toggle between black and white (for erasures, or for drawing on a dark background).

Besides drawing lines from scratch, you can also paste graphics copied from Crystal Paint or another program into your design from the Clipboard. What's unique about Crystal Paint is that the program pastes in multiple copies of an image, according to the pattern you've selected. You should exercise restraint in such pasting, however, since multiples of a large or complex image tend to overlap and lose definition.

Crystal Paint stores each pen stroke, from the time you click the mouse until the time you let up again, as a separate item called a *trail*, and you can backtrack to delete any individual trail in a pattern. A set of redraw commands will reconstruct the image for you trail by trail, just once, or over and over again (you can even set the program to draw designs on its own, without any further input).

While the program does have other potential uses—such as exporting patterns to MacPaint for further editing—it is es-

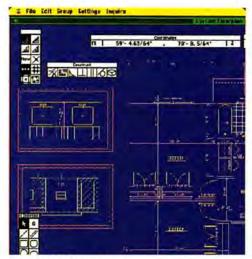

# VersaCAD Floorplan

VersaCAD follows the Macintosh user interface guidelines and makes full use of the Mac II's color and multiple-screen capabilities. You can move the tool palettes and display windows wherever you want, even to another screen. Background and drawing colors are selected from 256 hues.

Taking It from the Top

In moving its product from MS-DOS to the Mac, VersaCAD took great pains to adhere fully to the Mac interface. You start a drawing with a blank screen (the base window), selecting icons from the Tool Palette for the various primitives, including lines, multilines (2 to 256 at a time), circles, arcs, ellipses, bezier curves/splines, polygons (of *n* sides), points, rectangles, symbols, and text. The palette also contains tools for dimensioning, moving, copying, mirroring, scaling, rotating, and exploding.

The Construct Palette provides tools for extending, trimming, and breaking objects and for creating fillets, perpendiculars, parallels, tangents, and isometric views. The Constraint Palette gives you tools for locking the construction to a choice of limits (such as horizontal/vertical) and for controlling the six snap choices (grid snap, intersection snap, increment snap, object snap, equation snap, and no-snap). The Symbol Palette displays libraries of symbols that you have created in a numbered array; pictorial representations or names would be a more efficient system for displaying these symbols, however. A smaller palette fixed to the lowerleft corner of the window provides a number of zoom and repaint facilities.

The movable Coordinate window shows you the present cursor position (in chosen units), and the movable Message window guides you through the steps involved in creating shapes, such as arcs or circles. You can selectively hide all palettes and display indicators, or move them anywhere you want—even to another monitor.

To assure design precision, you can specify locations, lengths, and the like by inputting numbers directly from the keyboard. You can also store drawings in a full 64-bit Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) floating-point database. Although VersaCAD displays only 2-D drawings, it allows you to store associated 3-D data in the database, which other products can access. In addition, all versions of VersaCAD use the same database format, so with the proper connections, you can access data on other machines (for instance, PC VersaCAD or a PC VersaCAD add-on product can access data stored in a VersaCAD/Macintosh database). The database stores location, rotation, length, starting point, ending point, level (layer), color, density, width, style, and Z-Top & Z-Bottom (3-D data). This is more data than other systems store, so some operations take a bit longer to complete.

# Some Nice Extras

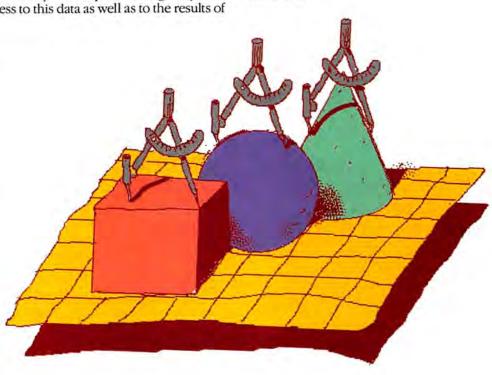
VersaCAD/Macintosh Edition maintains data on how much time you've spent on a drawing so you can track projects accurately. The Inquire menu gives you access to this data as well as to the results of

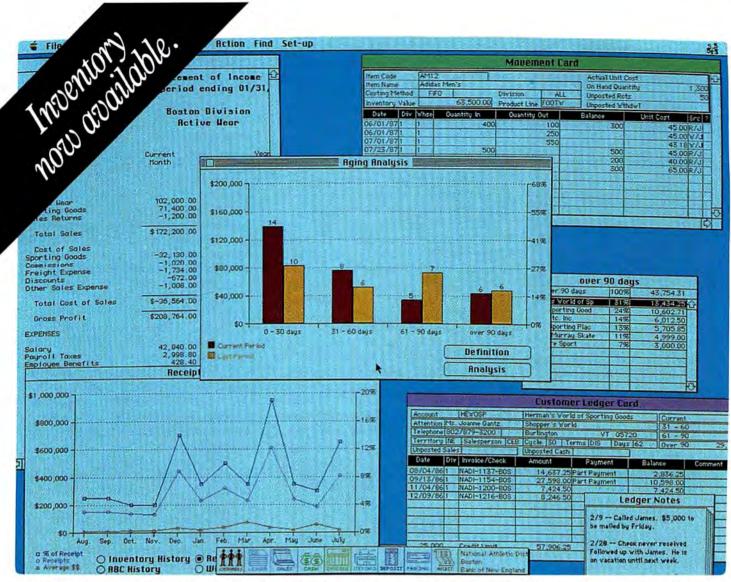
requested calculations—including area, perimeter, length, radius, moment of inertia, and center of gravity.

In addition to supporting the standard LaserWriter and ImageWriter capabilities, VersaCAD provides numerous other output choices. For example, one option turns the LaserWriter into a 300 dots-per-inch plotter. For pen plotting on large-format paper, VersaCAD supports an array of plotters, including CalComp's 1023 and Houston Instruments' DMP-61. Many smaller plotters, such as Hewlett-Packard's HP 7550 and the Rolands, are also supported, as is the JDL 850 EWS dot matrix printer/plotter.

Unlike most Mac CAD products, which cost extra for even basic import/ export facilities, VersaCAD comes complete with DXF (AutoCAD) and Initial Graphics Exchange Standard (IGES) translators. The VersaCAD system also has a facility for importing and exporting files to VersaCAD's MS-DOS and UNIX (Apollo, Sun, and HP 9000) software. In addition, the company can supply direct translators to/from Intergraph, Cadam, and Computervision at extra cost.

The manual is excellent—nicely organized, well written, and conveniently tabbed. VersaCAD comes with a Hyper-Card Help stack that explains all user controls and features. Also, the company offers two-day training classes, on several subjects, at its headquarters in southern Cali-

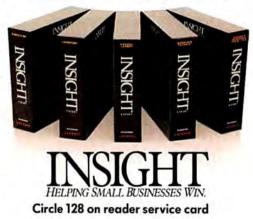

fornia. A toll-free number is provided for technical support. So far, I've received quick and accurate answers to my questions, without ever facing a busy signal.

There is a little bad news, however. VersaCAD costs more than its competitors. Its screen images are not quite as crisp as those on some competing systems—arcs and circles, for example, seem more jagged. And if you're a stopwatch freak, you'll be annoyed to find that VersaCAD takes a little longer to load, save, zoom, and repaint. But when you consider that Versa-CAD hides a sophisticated database beneath your CRT, you'll agree that a slight slowdown is a small penalty to pay for the versatility this program provides.

Cons: Documentation is skimpy; requires INIT files in System Folder to mount expansion disk. Company: Mass Micro Systems. List price: Mass 50e (50MB master) \$1049, P2E 50 (50MB expansion) \$749.

There was a time when a Macintosh user with a hard disk, any hard disk, was truly privileged. A 20-megabyte hard disk that was even close to being full represented outright conspicuous consumption. Enter SCSI ports and easy-to-connect hard disks, 256-color im-

ages, digitized sounds, scanned halftones, HyperCard stacks, hundreds of fonts and desk accessories, huge System files, and the next thing you know even 80MB disks start to feel a little cramped. Fortunately manufacturers have kept pace by releasing everlarger hard disks.

For this review I evaluated three 100MB external SCSI drives, all of which came with the cables necessary for hooking up to any Macintosh equipped with a SCSI port. In each case the SCSI address could be changed by switches on the rear panel without disassembling the drive. All three drives were ready to run and included utility software on floppy disk for formatting and testing.

To check performance, I ran some tests using a Plus equipped with 4MB. First I ran DiskTimer II, a program that measures the performance of disks by doing a series of 24K reads and writes, and measures average access time as well (the time it takes for the disk heads to move from one area of the disk to another). To get a better idea of real-world performance, I timed how long it took to copy a folder containing 11MB (in 900 files) to each disk using the Finder. I initialized the disks before each test to reduce the effects of fragmentation. Finally, I timed how long it took to launch HyperCard from the Finder, using the disk I was testing as the start-up disk (see "Performance Tests"). Keep in mind that, due to improvements in the SCSI port, all of these disks will perform significantly better when connected to a Mac II or an SE.

# The Overall Picture

Priam's MacDisk EM100 is designed to sit next to the Mac. At almost 14 inches

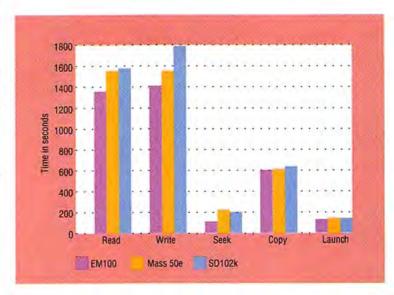


Priam's MacDisk EM100, CMS's SD102k, and Mass Micro's 50e with P2E 50 internal expansion.

deep, it was difficult to find a place for it on my crowded desk, though it would be at home next to a Mac II on a larger desk.

The EM100 was ready to run as soon as I took it out of the box, but its performance was disappointing; it took three to four times longer than the other disks to complete my basic tests. I suspected that the poor performance was due to an incorrect interleave factor, so I consulted the manual. (The manual is excellent—slick and filled with clear illustrations and concise instructions on disk installation and usage.) It insisted that the interleave factor the disk was shipped with (1 to 1) was optimum for all Macintosh systems. Priam's technical support concurred. Nonetheless, reformatting the disk with an interleave factor of 3 to 1 brought the performance favorably in line with the other disks (I've shown only the improved times in "Performance Tests"). Priam subsequently admitted that using an interleave factor of 1 to 1 is only appropriate for the SE and II.

All three drives offer close to 100MB of disk space, although the Mass Micro drive uses two 50MB volumes. The Priam drive is fairly large; both the CMS and Mass Micro drives fit under a classic Mac.

The CMS SD102k installed and ran without a problem. It is a bit more difficult to set the SCSI address on the SD102k; you have to consult the manual to determine the settings of eight little switches in the back. Fortunately the manual is clear and informative, though not as glossy and well organized as the Priam manual, and the CMS representative I talked with was helpful and well informed. The SD102k has an internal buffer that eliminates the need to worry about interleave factors. It fits under a classic Macintosh and is significantly quieter than the EM100.

The Mass Micro disk system uses a different configuration than the other two drives. The unit I tested was a 50MB Mass 50e with a 50-megabyte P2E 50 add-in disk. Each disk shows up as a separate 50MB volume on the Macintosh desktop, though together they use only one of the seven available SCSI addresses. The split-drive approach prevents you from ever having a single file larger than 50MB, but it also allows you to back up quickly by copying from one hard disk to the other. The whole package fits comfortably under the Macintosh, with the top of the case angled back slightly to tilt the Mac screen. It is noisier than the CMS drive, but quieter than the Priam. The Mass 50e also has two surgeprotected AC power outlets on the back panel.

The first unit I received from Mass Micro was defective, but its customer service department quickly sent a replacement unit. The disk ships with about 12MB of shareware and public domain software. In addition, Mass Micro plans to supply a new utility package that includes disk-partitioning software and an improved backup program. The manual supplied with the drive is adequate, but it is largely devoted to describing Mass Micro's partitioning software. It has no index and lacks information on how to get the Macintosh to recognize the expansion drive without using the System

Folder supplied by Mass Micro. This information might be vital to someone who has a highly customized system or who is installing the Mass 50e as a second hard disk.

In many respects the three hard disks are quite similar. The differences in performance are not significant, their capacities are virtually identical, and customer support from all three manufacturers is good. I preferred the CMS drive because of its straightforward, well-documented installation and its excellent price/performance ratio, though the unique dual-drive configuration of the Mass Micro unit might be appealing to anyone whose primary concern is fast backup.—Ron Risley

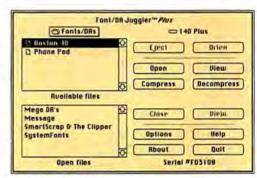

Font/DA Juggler Plus has enough features to satisfy the most hardened DA and font addict. For start-

ers, the program breaks Apple's Font/DA Mover limit of 15 desk accessories, enabling you to install up to 600 DAs. You can also have an unlimited number of font sets, each containing up to 256 fonts, saving you the time and effort required to load them into your System file.

Installing Font/DA Juggler Plus is easy; just copy the program into your System Folder and reboot. The program installs upon start-up, and appears at the top of the Apple menu. Submenus give you access to Font/DA Juggler Plus's desk accessory or to one of four lists of installed system re-

sources: DAs, fonts, F-keys, or sounds. These submenus allow you immediate access, via the Apple menu, to resources not installed in the System Folder (see "The Flexible Core").

Font/DA Juggler Plus's DA is the program's control center. With it you can open and close sets of system resources, view the contents of a resource file, and set Hot Keys to open the DA or resource lists from the keyboard. The DA even compresses (and later decompresses) font files to save disk space—I compressed a 443K font file to 265K.

# **Breaking the Barriers**

Using Font/DA Juggler Plus is a treat. Just seeing the list of desk accessories scroll...and scroll ...and scroll is a thrill. At one time I had 98 DAs installed; I went just as wild with fonts, installing 41. I've since cut down on my DA diet, limiting myself to 26 desk accessories I can't live without.

It takes Font/DA Juggler Plus a little too long to scroll to the end of a list of 100 DAs, however. To avoid scrolling, you can type

the first letter or two of the desired DA to highlight its name in the list. Pressing Return opens that DA. You access F-keys and system sounds similarly.

You can designate any digitized sound as the alert the Mac emits when you make a mistake. On my system the voice of HAL, the computer from 2001, says, "I'm sorry, Dave, I'm afraid I can't do that." The Sound List allows any Macintosh to play Macintosh II sounds. The Font List also deserves special mention because it shows you the names of the fonts in their associated type-face (see "Fonts with Flourish").

# Wait, There's More

The Font/DA Juggler Plus package comes with several other useful utilities. The Mac keeps track of font families by their ID numbers; if two or more installed fonts have the same number, you can have problems accessing those fonts. Usually, you can only display one of them, regardless of which one you choose from the Font menu. Font Resolver automatically renumbers font families in one or more font suitcase files, eliminating potential numbering conflicts.

Font/DA Utility renames or renumbers fonts or DAs. Fkey/Sound Mover installs and removes F-keys and sounds and lets you rename and renumber them without having to resort to a utility like ResEdit. The Font/DA Utility also has a great F-key that displays installed fonts in any standard style, such as bold or italic, and in any size from 9 to 24 points. The same F-key also lets you see which fonts are QuickDraw and which ones are PostScript, and allows you to print a sample of any font.

As a competitor to Software Supply's Suitcase, the program that pioneered the use of virtually unlimited fonts and DAs, Font/DA Juggler Plus holds its own. Font/DA Juggler Plus automatically loads resource files from anywhere on a hard disk; Suitcase requires those files to be in a named folder within the System Folder. Suitcase handles only 10 F-keys; Font/DA Juggler Plus can load more than 32,000. Font/DA Juggler Plus's ability to use sound files is another advantage and, unlike Suitcase, it shows you a list of installed fonts.

Included on the disk are public domain fonts, DAs, F-keys, and sounds. The manual is well written but lacks information on the different types of sound resources currently available, and it doesn't specify which of those sound resource types the program actually uses. Taking into account the program and its associated utilities, Font/DA Juggler Plus clearly offers many more features than the current version of Suitcase (1.2.1). Although Suitcase includes a nifty screen saver, Pyro, in its \$59.95 price, I find Font/DA Juggler Plus to be a better value.—Tom Negrino

# SunShine Graphics Library

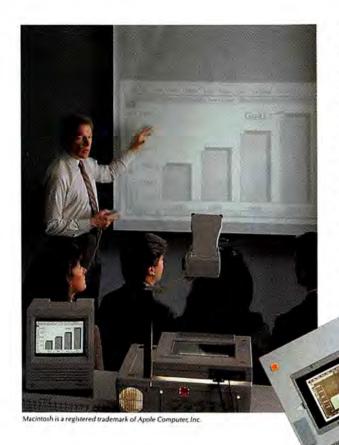
Macintosh clip art ranges from the utilitarian to the sublime. Styles and subjects exist to suit almost every taste. A pragmatic desktop publisher might opt for a disk of dingbats—pointing hands, arrows, stars, and so on—while another Mac owner may prefer more fanciful images. If you're a connoisseur of digital artwork, you should definitely take a look at the SunShine Graphics Library.

This eclectic collection, which had reached 47 disks at last count, for the most part offers digitized renditions of antique prints and illustrations: floral patterns from tapestries, anatomical illustrations, real and fanciful animals, American Indians, the Civil War, knights in armor, Oriental paper cutouts, and creatures of the sea. Each 400K disk contains around a dozen graphics. Several of the disks feature decorative borders in styles ranging from Art Nouveau to Renaissance and Baroque woodcuts to geometric designs.

The collection also includes two disks of border fonts. Like regular fonts, these graphic elements are installed in a program's Font menu. When you select a border font and press the appropriate key, a graphic appears in lieu of a letter; repeating the keystroke produces a border made up of interlocking graphic elements. A keyboard map is included to show which patterns correspond to which keys.

But Is It Really Clip Art?

The SunShine Graphics Library differs from most canned graphics collections, such as T/Maker's ClickArt series or Dynamic Graphics' DeskTop Art series. In-

stead of offering sets of small, individual graphics to be used as decorative elements, space fillers, and the like, most of SunShine's graphics are large—many nearly fill an 8 ½-by-11-inch page. This format limits their utility as decorative items, but many of the illustrations can be used at their full size for report covers, title pages, signs and posters, announcements, menus, and so on ("Clip Art Nouveau" shows a decorative border turned into an invitation). You can also employ a full-page

graphic as a background for text, printing the artwork in a light color on the Image-Writer II or applying a gray "screen" over the drawing with SuperPaint's Paint On Black feature, for example.

The graphics don't have to be used at full size, of course. In some cases you can extract part of a drawing and use it as a decorative element. And most of the Sun-Shine graphics, although intricate, look crisp and clear when reduced to 50 or even 25 percent and printed on the LaserWriter.

(For best results, scale drawings with an object-oriented application such as Mac-Draw or SuperPaint's draw layer.)

# A Smattering of Subjects

One of the SunShine Graphics Library's strong points is its wide range of subject matter, although several categories—Mayan Ruins, and A Treasury of Small Mammals, for example—will probably appeal to only a few Mac users. You should find something of interest in at least one of the 47 disks, whether your taste runs toward Aubrey Beardsley's erotica or Gustave Doré's Old Testament engravings. Overall, the quality of the images is excellent, with few digitizer-induced glitches.

A catalog of images would be a welcome addition to the extensive SunShine Graphics Library. The collection does expedite viewing with a utility called Throw-Paint, however. ThrowPaint opens a fullscreen view of a drawing and provides a tool that lets you scroll around the image. The utility also displays information such as the drawing's location, date modified, and the amount of disk space it occupies.

I found browsing the entire SunShine Graphics Library a delightful experience—like having a miniature art museum on my Mac. If you're interested in art of the nineteenth century and earlier, I recommend exploring this collection. New disks are added periodically, so contact SunShine if you're interested in a particular subject or theme.—Erfert Fenton

The choices for turning a Mac II into a terminal linked to an IBM mainframe are slowly, but surely, increasing. Novell, with its PCOX/Coax-M board and PCOX/Multi-M software package, is one new player in the field. However, this product is not likely to be a strong contender against DCA's MacIrma II board, Avatar's MacMainFrame box, or Tri-Data's Netway 1000A box, until Novell makes some improvements in the software.

The PCOX package provides the basic features you would expect from a terminal emulator board and software, such as emulation of IBM's 3278 and 3279 terminals, as well as file transfer between the Mac and an IBM mainframe. The PCOX/Multi-M software also supports multiple sessions, enabling you to transfer a file and maintain an interactive session with a mainframe at the same time. However, the implementation of some features doesn't meet the standards Mac users have come to expect.

# PC Program in Mac Clothing?

The first hints that PCOX/Multi-M is not typical Mac software appear in the manuals and the accompanying disks. Although the manuals contain references to the Mac II, they do not offer any screen dumps to illustrate points raised in the text and continually refer to the PC in place of the Mac.

The PCOX/Multi-M software consists of two applications, Customizer and PCOX/3270. Although you'll probably only

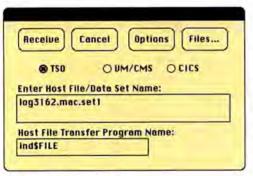

need to configure the PCOX/3270 emulation program once, you must use a separate program, Customizer, to do so. Considering the few options available for customization, such as number of sessions (you can have up to five) and default name for the session, Novell should have incorporated configuration options into the terminal emulator program itself. The PCOX disks also contain an inordinately large number of files to copy to the Mac, and each file bears the extension .EXE (an obvious holdover from MS-DOS days).

Once you start working with the emulation software, you'll find that its performance is lacking as well. The screen refresh for every new screen display is annoving; a distracting white band sweeps down the screen, twice in succession. The program could use a better font for displaying color characters on the white background, or allow users to select a black background (as on real IBM 3278 terminals). In addition, cursor movement is slow, in comparison to that of an IBM 3278/9 terminal, but that seems to be typical for microcomputer-based emulators. When you're working with multiple sessions on multiple hosts, a menu selection or #-J allows you to switch between sessions; in typical Mac fashion, just clicking on a different window changes sessions, but this isn't mentioned in the manuals.

## Moving Data

PCOX/Multi-M includes support for file transfers between the Mac II and an

IBM mainframe using IBM's generic filetransfer utility, IND\$FILE. However, the implementation is, once again, awkward. In order to initiate a file transfer, you must first switch from the current session window to the main PCOX/3270 window (which acts as a shell for the program) and then enter the command for the file transfer. You have the choice of simply typing a command like

SEND Filename D PCDOS:TESTFILE.TEXT CRLF ASCII or working your way through three nested dialog boxes to transfer a file from the Mac II to the mainframe (MacIrma, on the other hand, does it all with one dialog box with a better layout). Receiving a file is simple because you only have to deal with one dialog box. Novell's manuals discuss the text-style command (referring to MS-DOS directories) but say nothing about using the menu and dialog boxes. Novell didn't even bother to include a help file on the disks explaining these features.

When you're working in a mainframe environment that requires simple text commands, you find yourself repeating certain commands frequently. Many terminal emulators allow you to copy these commands at any occurrence and then paste them as new commands. Well, PCOX/3270 doesn't you can copy text from a screen, but you cannot paste anything back into PCOX/ 3270. Thus you can only copy data from the mainframe session into a text file (using a text editor desk accessory or a standard editor with MultiFinder); you cannot copy commands for use later in the session.

# Lots of Room for Improvement

Novell could improve this product tremendously by providing a smoother screen refresh, redesigning the dialog boxes for file transfers (working your way through a series of nested dialog boxes is counterproductive), and including either a different font for character displays or offering a black-background option. I particularly like the clean look and straightforward functionality of MacIrma's file-transfer dialog. The one advantage that PCOX/ Multi-M software offers is the ability to handle multiple mainframe sessions; however, Tri-Data's Netway 1000A with MacWindows 3270 software can handle up to four sessions on four Macs, for about the same as it would cost to equip four Macs with the PCOX/3270 package, and it supports cutand-paste between sessions for easy data and command transfers.

In bringing PC software over to the Mac. Novell has failed to support the Macintosh interface properly. Foisting barely

rewritten PC manuals onto the user does not make operation of the package any easier and will offend most Mac users. When rewriting a manual for a different computer, companies should at least include screen dumps from that particular program and list the features offered for that computer-Novell doesn't .- Dave Kosiur

Desktop Help is billed as a desktop documentation system for commercial developers, corporate users, and individuals. In actuality, this desk accessory package combines a specialized word processor for developers (Help Editor) with an information retrieval utility for users (Help). Desktop Help lets you concentrate more on what you say and how you organize it, rather than worry about the mechanics of presentation—that is, the coding of the help system, its integration with your application, and the creation of the necessary resources (such as dialog boxes, buttons, and scroll bars).

Although Desktop Help is a useful tool for all three targeted audiences, it is best suited for application developers and corporate MIS managers. For developers, it provides a quick solution to the problem of creating consistent, useful online documentation. The corporate manager can use Desktop Help to create online references for standard templates and applications. For the individual user, however, the program is not useful enough to justify its high cost.

Any developer who has implemented a help system can tell you that it is timeconsuming and costly. Do you settle for simple, text-only help (the standard method that most developers have fallen back on)? Or do you take advantage of the Macintosh interface, mixing font styles and

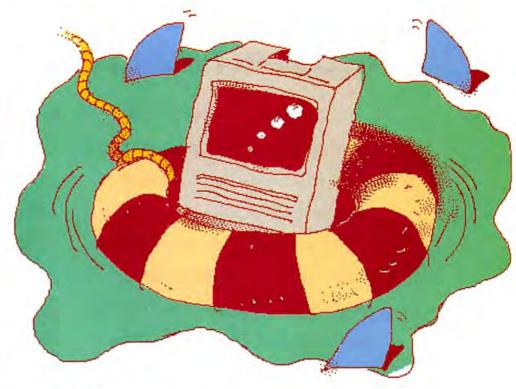
supporting graphics? Further, should you integrate context-sensitive help into your application? Desktop Help supports all these capabilities, as well as cross-referenc-

ing and indexing.

Creating a help file for an application is quite simple. Launch the application and select Help Editor from the Apple menu. You can either edit an existing help file or create a new one: font choices are available through a pop-up menu. At this point, selecting any menu item from your application either brings up associated documentation or a blank window in which you enter your help message. Additionally, you can create new topics. With the aid of Desktop Help, I was able to create a help system for my program in just a couple of hours by extracting text from the user manual, which I had on disk.

Desktop Help can be learned fairly quickly just by looking at the sample files. This is fortunate, because the manual is poorly written, is full of promotional hype, and has numerous spelling, punctuation, and grammatical errors. The lack of solid reference material was particularly noticeable in the area of context-sensitive help. one of the program's strongest features. Fortunately, the authors included the source code (in Aztec C) for their sample program. Although the sample demonstrates context-sensitive help quite adequately, it would be nice if it also included comments about what changes need to be made when the program is used with other C-compilers, such as LightSpeed or MPW, and if a second example that used Pascal were included.

Calling context-sensitive help from languages that do not conveniently support parameter blocks can be difficult, since



that method is also used to communicate with a DA. Modifying my application to support context-sensitive help took only an hour, but it would have taken longer if I had not already created the help file. Thus, I was able to just add a few lines of code calling the Help DA when appropriate with parameters that had already been established. The secret to using context-sensitive help with Desktop Help is to create the help file, figure out which topics should be context-sensitive, and then add the hooks to the program.

The program displays some particularly annoying limitations when running under MultiFinder. To invoke it, you must

either hold down the Option key while selecting Desktop Help or install it directly in the application. If you want to use the context-sensitive features, Desktop Help must be installed directly in the application. If you have numerous applications, this uses up a lot of disk space. In addition, there are known problems with application-installed DAs under MultiFinder. Further, if you invoke Help with the Option key down, you are presented with the SFGetFile (open a file) dialog, rather than the applicationspecific help file.

Some consideration also should have been given to document-specific help-a benefit for database and spreadsheet users. You can produce this type of help by creating a separate topic for each document and having the subtopics describe the document's use. A more elegant solution, however, would be preferable.

Desktop Help is a fine value for the application developer or data processing manager, but a bit pricey for an individual. Unfortunately, its MultiFinder incompatibilities prevent me from giving it an enthusiastic recommendation.—Dennis Coben

### **Quick Tips**

### Answers to your questions

Before you replace the Eveready 523 4.5-volt battery in your Mac Plus, 512K, or 128K, carefully check the new battery's polarity markings. Kenneth L. C. Stamm of New York noticed that Eveready interchanged the black and silver ends when the company switched to a new logo. Don't trust the battery coloring—go by the + and — markings.

### Generic Icons by Phone

MultiFinder users who transfer disk files using certain communications applications may find themselves stuck with inaccessible, generic (blank) icons if they put those files in a folder they've opened from the desktop (see "Traveling Incognito"). *Macworld* contributing editor Rob Hahn found out why from Mike O'Connor, author of CompuServe Navigator, an application that gives CompuServe a Mac-like interface.



### Traveling Incognito

If you're using MultiFinder and find that the file you downloaded from a communications program sports a generic icon, you'll see this perplexing message when you try to open it. To make the file recognizable, you must download it again to a folder that is closed on the desktop.

Lon Poole answers readers' questions and offers advice in his monthly Macworld column. A collection of tips can be found in his book Mac Insights (Microsoft Press, 1987).

It seems that before the communications application receives the first block of a file, it creates that file as a generic text file. While the program waits for the first block to arrive, MultiFinder has time to switch momentarily to the Finder. Operating in the background, the Finder notices the new generic text file and installs it (with a generic icon) in the open folder. MultiFinder then switches back to the communications application to receive the first block of the incoming file. With a Mac-Binary file transfer, that first block identifies the real type and creator attributes of the file, which specify its correct icon. The application changes the file attributes, but it's too late—the Finder doesn't notice the change.

Both Navigator 2.0 and SmartCom 3.0B create an incoming file only after the first block arrives and the correct file type and creator are known. Then they create the file and assign its attributes. By the time the Finder sees the new file for the first time, the correct icon is safely installed.

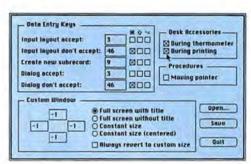
### 4D Runs in Background

You can use Apple's ResEdit and Acius's 4D Customizer to set up 4th Dimension as a background application (see "4D Background Setup").

First make a copy of 4th Dimension, and then open ResEdit (available from most user groups). Make sure the disk with the 4D copy is inserted. In the window bearing that disk's name, find and open 4th Dimension. From the 4D resource window that appears, find and open the SIZE resource type. From the window listing individual SIZE resources by ID number, open the one whose ID is 0. Click the 1 button next to the fourth option: Can background (ResEdit versions prior to 1.1B3 label the fourth option Undef bit). Then close all windows, save changes, and quit ResEdit.

Next open 4D Customizer and use it to open your modified copy of 4th Dimension. In the large dialog box that appears,





### 4D Background Setup

ResEdit (along with 4D Customizer) lets you modify 4th Dimension to perform background tasks while you use another application or run desk accessories.

select the two options During Thermometer and During Printing. Click the Save button and then the Quit button. This makes desk accessories available at any time from 4th Dimension.

The modified copy of 4th Dimension can search, sort, or run a procedure in the background while you use another application. When you open 4th Dimension, its window initially appears behind the windows of the application you were using.

### How To/Quick Tips

Extra System Folders
Each of my application disks contains a System Folder. Do I need to copy it to my hard disk?

Never have more than one System Folder on a hard disk. If you do, your Mac may become confused, refuse to start up from the hard disk, restart unexpectedly, or worse. When copying an application, don't drag the application's floppy disk icon to the hard disk icon. Instead, open the floppy disk icon and choose Select All from the Finder's Edit menu to select everything on the disk. Press the Shift key and click the System Folder icon, if it's present, to deselect it. Then drag the group of selected icons to the hard disk icon. If you think you might have extra System Folders buried on your hard disk, use Apple's Find File desk accessory to locate them, and then drag them to the Trash.

Incidentally, the Mac treats any folder containing the Finder and the System file as a System Folder, regardless of its actual name. Conversely, a folder named System Folder that doesn't contain both the Finder and the System is not a real System Folder.

HyperMutant
I encountered a HyperCard problem that perplexed me for months. The
pointer and tools in the tool window were
mutant letters and numbers taken from the
Luxembourg or Shadow Box fonts. When I
removed those fonts from my System file,
the tools and the pointer went back

to normal.

HyperCard gets its pointer, tool, brush, and polygon shapes from a private font named 12 that is part of HyperCard itself. This font may conflict with a font in the System file. To eliminate the conflict, use Font/DA Mover to copy your font to HyperCard. (To open HyperCard in Font/DA Mover, press the Option key while clicking one of Font/DA Mover's Open buttons and then proceed normally.) After copying your font to HyperCard, remove it from the System file. Then copy it back from HyperCard to the System file. Finally, remove it from HyperCard.

No, you're not playing a shell game, you're using Font/DA Mover to give your font a unique font number. The Mac looks for a font by number, first in the System file, second in the application, and third in the current document (if any). It uses the first font it finds with the requested font number.

Font/DA Mover prevents conflicts between font numbers in the System file or in a single application. If necessary, it renumbers a font when you copy it into a file. However, Font/DA Mover can't prevent conflicts between fonts in two different files. If a System file font and an application font share the same number, the System file font wins out.

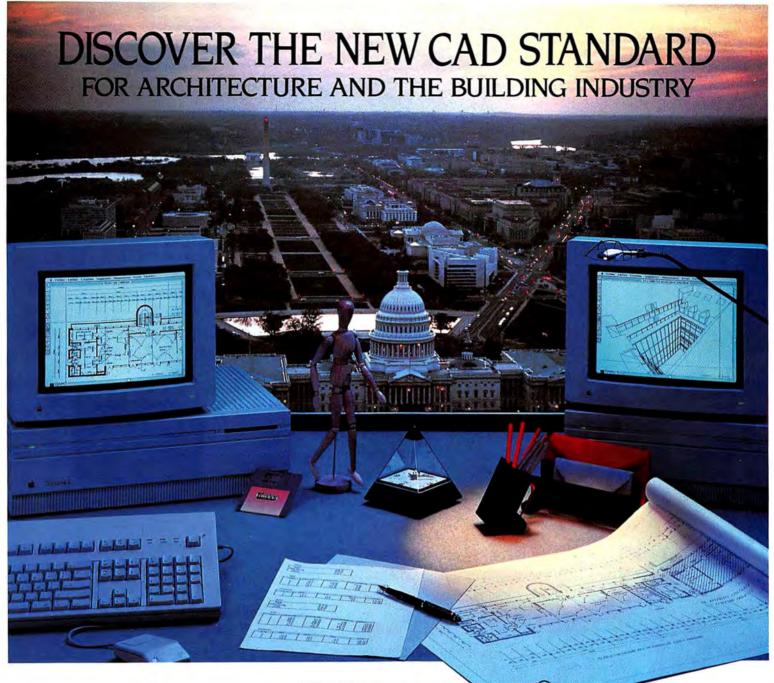
Special Application Needed
Our university's development office requires software that can find donors

Database publishers keep track of vertical applications created with their products, which have been custom-designed for specialized purposes. They also list developers who customize applications on request.

I occasionally use Excel's Set Print
Area command to print a portion of a large
worksheet. However, when I want to print
the whole document, I need a better way
of canceling the print area limitation than
selecting the whole worksheet and choosing Set Print Area again.

### Clear Print Area

Use Excel's Define Name command to clear a defined print area.

To clear the print area, choose Define Name from Excel's Formula menu, select Print Area in the scrollable list of names, and click the Delete button (see "Clear Print Area"). Be careful, though, because you can't undo name deletion.

Freeze Titles in Excel?
I'd like to upgrade from Multiplan to Excel. But a Multiplan feature called Freeze Titles is crucial to me, since I like to see row and column headings while I work on other sections of a spreadsheet. Does Excel provide an equivalent feature?

To get stationary titles in Excel, you have to use the split windows feature. Multiplan also has split windows, although they don't scroll smoothly as Excel's do. You won't need both split windows and Freeze Titles, because Excel lets you open any number of independent windows for each worksheet.

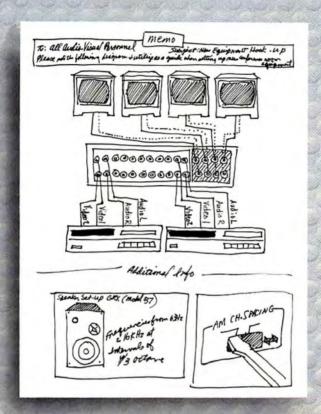

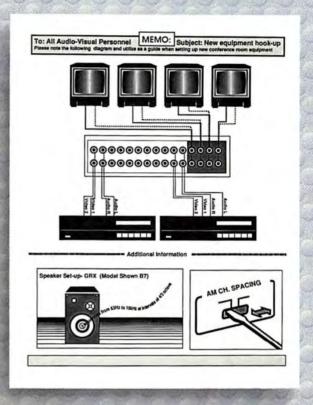

from Altsys Corporation, 214/424-4888). But you don't have to modify fonts to get the results you want. Linguists' Software (206/775-1130) has two products that include the character sets of 79 languages, plus the macron and other symbols needed to transliterate most of the languages of the world. MacPhonetics (\$79.95) has two bitmapped fonts (for ImageWriter printing), one like Geneva and the other like Times. LaserTransliterator (\$99.95) has those fonts plus PostScript fonts for the LaserWriter. Linguists' Software also has non-roman fonts such as Hebrew, Greek, and Cyrillic, as well as software that transliterates English to Hebrew, Georgian, and Armenian.

Hex on the ImageWriter
Occasionally when I try to print a
document after turning on the computer,
my ImageWriter spits out hex codes instead. I must turn off the printer, turn it
back on, and then reprint. What's causing
the problem, and how can I solve it?

Neil Ticktin Encino, California You must have inadvertently hit the Select button while switching on the printer—easy to do on an ImageWriter II. It's designed to print hexadecimal codes in that mode.

### Icon Move Back

Tip: Many times I start to move an icon in the Finder but change my mind. If I put the icon down and then move it back, I have to use the Clean Up command to realign the icon. I found that setting the icon directly on the title bar returns the icon to its original spot in the window.

Remember, if you press **%** while dragging an icon, the Finder aligns it to the same imaginary grid the Clean Up command does.

### LaserWriter Blacks

Tip: You can easily darken grayish blacks from LaserWriters and LaserWriter Pluses, Large black graphics, large black lettering, even smaller lettering can have sharp edges, high contrast, and black blacks. Buy a can of Blair spray clear (order number 201, matte finish) at an art supply store. Spray it on your LaserWriter output. (WARNING: Be sure you use it in a well-ventilated place. Also, don't touch your paper until it's completely dry, or your "ink" will smear.) This will improve print quality 100 percent. Blair spray will also help prevent the toner from chipping off the paper, and saturating the paper with the spray will create a water-resistant page.

You get better results from a LaserWriter or LaserWriter Plus if you print on heavier paper, such as Xerox 4024 (28-pound). Also, copying LaserWriter output with a good photocopier improves contrast. □

# Getting Started with Spreadsheets

From rows and columns to macros and links, an introduction to "what if?" analysis

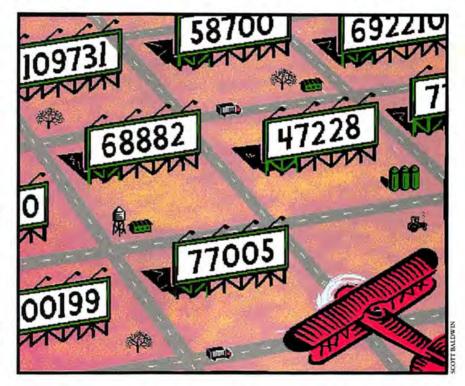

The spreadsheet has been around in one form or another for centuries. For years it remained essentially the same: a large ledger with pages divided into rows and columns for convenient organization of text and numbers. Then about ten years ago, a Harvard MBA candidate named Dan Bricklin got the idea that a computer program could mimic a ledger and calculate numbers. Although his finance professor dismissed the idea as having no commercial value, the undaunted Bricklin teamed up with programmer Bob Frankston to create a wildly successful program called VisiCalc. The skeptical professor joined the ranks of history's great antivisionaries.

Since then, the electronic spreadsheet program has become as much a mainstay of business as the expense account. And deservedly so. A spreadsheet lets you record numbers more neatly and efficiently than a ledger does, and it lets you calculate and analyze them. You can plug in new values and watch the spreadsheet recalculate accordingly. You can ask "what if?" questions: What if interest rates rose to 15 percent? What if we got a 20-year mortgage instead of a 30-year?

A spreadsheet lets you explore different approaches to a problem—without the risk. And because life is full of problems

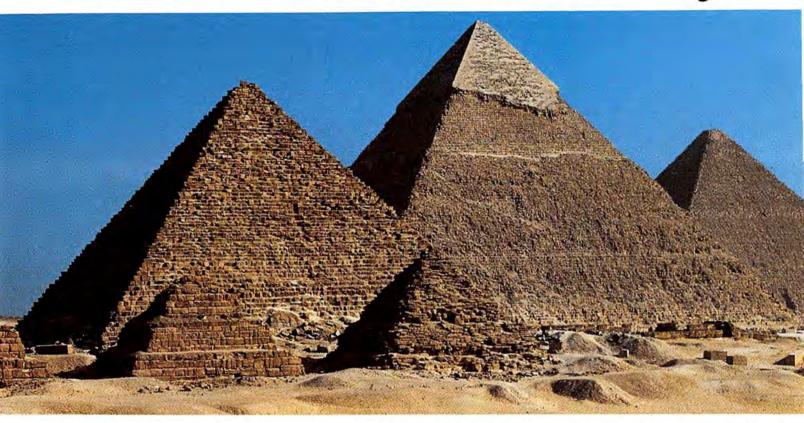


and risks, spreadsheets have 1001 uses. You can use them to create business plans and profit-and-loss statements, to forecast sales figures and track stock market data, and to print loan-amortization tables—in short, any endeavor that involves playing with numbers. And their orderly approach to storing information makes them ideal for other tasks, from managing address files to creating columnar tables (see "A Spreadsheet's Other Lives").

**Everything in Its Cell** 

The secret to a spreadsheet's organizational virtues is its gridlike approach to storing information. A blank spreadsheet is divided into horizontal and vertical lines that create a grid of boxes called *cells* (see "Spreadsheet Basics"). The horizontal lines form *rows*, and the vertical lines form *columns*. Rows are labeled by number, columns by letter, to give every cell its own

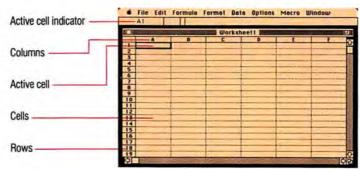


address: A1 is the cell in the upper-left corner of the spreadsheet. B4 is the cell in the second column, four rows down. (Some spreadsheets number both rows and columns: A1 becomes R1C1, and B4 is R4C2.)

Each cell can hold a number, some text, or a formula. A simple spreadsheet contains text labels that describe the numbers in adjacent cells and a formula-a combination of cell addresses and math

symbols that tell the program what to do with those numbers (see "Weekly Pay").

But the real power of a spreadsheet surfaces when you create formulas that manipulate the results of other formulas. In "Monthly and Yearly Pay," I've tied two new formulas to the result of "Weekly Pay." This causes any changes in the Hours Worked or Hourly Wage cells to show up in the Weekly Pay, Monthly Pay, and Yearly Pay cells. To

### A Spreadsheet's Other Lives

Spreadsheets' abilities to neatly pigeonhole text and numbers make them good database managers. When using a spreadsheet for data management, label columns with your field names (such as Name, Address, Phone) and build down from there, making each row a record. There's no need to fuss with field definitions and maximum character lengths: every cell will accept any combination of text or numbers, and most spreadsheets can hold 255 characters per cell. And you can use the spreadsheet's library of functions and math features to analyze data and

additional commands for managing data. Excel lets you sort and search through your data. Microsoft Works and Modern Jazz provide data-entry forms

that show one record at a time. (Excel 2.0, Wingz, and Full Impact will also have datamanagement features.) But remember, spreadsheets can't offer the sophisticated formlayout features or the extensive entry-checking features of true databases. Finally, spreadsheets' col-

create reports. Many spreadsheets provide umnar bent make them wonderful "table processors." (Indeed, most of the large product-features tables you see in Macworld articles began life as spreadsheets.) You can add new columns or rows with a mouse click and resize columns in a flash-instead of struggling with rulers and tab settings. If you need fancy formatting, move the completed table into a word processor by copying its cells to the Clipboard or by saving it as a text-only file.

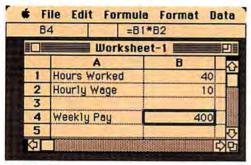

#### Monthly and Yearly Pay

Building on the formula in "Weekly Pay," the Monthly Pay formula multiplies weekly pay by 4, while the Yearly Pay formula multiplies monthly pay by 12. As you enter different wage and hour values, the spreadsheet instantly recalculates the weekly, monthly, and yearly pay.

answer the question, "What if I earned \$15 an hour instead of \$10?" simply type 15 in cell B2 and press Return.

That brings us to spreadsheet navigating. In all Mac spreadsheet programs, you select a cell by pointing to it with the mouse and then clicking, or by using your keyboard's direction keys to move the cell pointer, a dark rectangle that encloses the current cell. Once you've homed in on a cell, simply begin typing. The characters you type appear within the cell and also within the formula bar, a text-entry box just below the spreadsheet's menu bar. You can edit text in the formula bar just as you would in other Mac applications. Pressing Return stores the text in the cell.

How does the spreadsheet know whether you've typed a label, a numeric value, or a formula? Most programs follow this approach: if you type only numbers. the entry is treated as a value. If it contains any letters or spaces, it's treated as a label. If the first character is an equal sign (=). it's considered a formula.

#### **Manipulate Data with Functions**

Spreadsheet programs also contain a number of preprogrammed formulas called functions, which provide advanced math skills. You needn't remember any complex math symbols to use a function; simply type its name (or choose it from a dialog box), and enclose the required values, called arguments, within parentheses. The function performs its preprogrammed calculation on the arguments and returns a result.

One statistical function that all spreadsheets provide is SUM, which adds its arguments. In a spreadsheet function, a colon (:) between two cell addresses indicates a range of cells, while a comma between them denotes individual cells. For example, the formula = SUM(B1:B3) adds the contents of cells B1 through B3 (the short form of =B1+B2+B3), while the formula = SUM(B1,B5,B7) adds the contents of cells B1, B5, and B7.

Other statistical functions include AVERAGE, which calculates the average value of given arguments; and MAX and MIN, which return the largest and smallest values, respectively, within the list of arguments. Spreadsheets also provide mathematical functions such as ABS, which returns the absolute value of an argument: and ROUND, which rounds it off to a specified number of digits. Then there are trigonometric functions like COS, which gives the cosine: and TAN, which calculates the tangent. Text functions search and manipulate text. Financial functions calculate present and future values, rates of return, and more. Date functions return the current date and time. A spreadsheet's seemingly endless library of functions is its ultimate weapon for manipulating text and numbers.

Functions become even more powerful when you nest them within other functions so that one function uses the value returned by another function as an argument. For example, the Excel formula = MID(A1,1,SEARCH(",", A1,1)-1) uses two text functions, MID and SEARCH, to extract the last name from a cell (A1) contain-

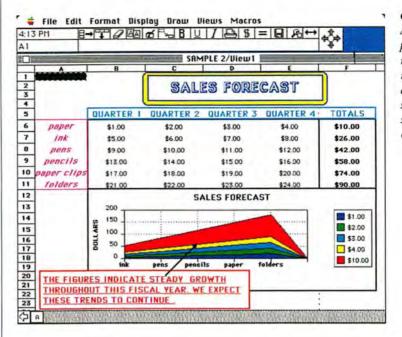

ing names in "last name, first name" format. Excel first executes the SEARCH function to locate the comma. SEARCH reports its findings to MID, which takes over to extract all the characters up to the comma.

#### Then Spruce It Up with Formats

Spreadsheets calculate numbers with a high degree of precision, using droves of decimal places (14, in Excel's case) to represent fractional values as accurately as possible. But that kind of precision is overkill for some data. A dollars-and-cents value doesn't look like one when 14 digits follow the decimal point.

Cell *formats* enable you to specify how you want numbers and text to be displayed. You can have dollars-and-cents figures appear with a dollar sign and only two digits after the decimal point. You can have percent signs appear after values that represent a percentage of other values. For date values, you can specify display formats such as 8/17/88 or 17-Aug-88. Appropriate display formats can make spreadsheet values more meaningful.

Mac spreadsheets provide other formatting options as well, including the ability to format cells in different fonts and styles. Excel 2.0 (set to ship late this year). Ashton-Tate's Full Impact (due this summer), and Informix's Wingz (due in the second quarter) will all support color graphs and cells (see "Colorful Impact"). So when you're in the red, your spreadsheet figures can be, too. Excel, Full Impact, Wingz, and Access Technology's Trapeze also let you create boxes and lines to highlight key figures or underscore totals.

#### Making Things Manageable

A single spreadsheet document provides many thousands of blank cells, ready for facts and formulas. But you'll probably run out of memory long before filling all of them. And if you don't, you'll run out of patience as you struggle to scroll from one area of the spreadsheet to another. One solution to both problems is a program that enables you to link separate documents, causing changes made in one to appear in the other. Linking separate spreadsheets lets you work around memory limitations and simplifies creating and using a complex spreadsheet application.

While the specific steps vary between products, you usually link spreadsheets by creating a formula in one spreadsheet that refers to one or more cells in the second spreadsheet. For example, assume you're working with two spreadsheets, named Income and Expenses, and you want to link them so that the contents of the Income spreadsheet's Net Income cell are copied into the Net Income cell of the Expenses worksheet. To do so in Excel, you'd create a formula in the Net Income cell of the Expenses worksheet reading = Income!\$E2.

The formula tells Excel, "This cell contains whatever is in cell E2 of the spreadsheet named Income."

Another way to tame a spreadsheet is through *macros*, special series of formulas that carry out actions at your command. A macro facility is an electronic autopilot that you can program to perform repetitive tasks—anything from choosing commands to entering formulas to performing complex calculations. You'll find macro features in Excel, Lotus's Modern Jazz, Full Impact, and Wingz.

If you create complex formulas containing flocks of functions and parentheses, look for a program that lets you "attach" notes to cells. Cell notes, electronic versions of Post-it notes, are an effective way to describe how large formulas work or how the spreadsheet is structured—details that are easy to forget and difficult to decipher. Full Impact and Wingz will let you attach about a page of text to each cell. If your program lacks this feature, try Deneba Software's Comment, a desk accessory that lets you attach notes to documents created by virtually any application.

#### Swiss Army Knife or Power Tool?

Besides number-analyzing prowess, most Mac spreadsheet programs also have built-in graphing features that transform numbers into spiffy bar, line, or pie charts. Wingz and Trapeze even let you mix spreadsheets and graphs on the same page (see "Tables and Charts"). Charts and spreadsheets team up well for analyzing numbers and spotting trends; a rising or falling line tells a more compelling story than a nondescript table of numbers.

Since charts and tables often end up in reports, some spreadsheet programs include built-in word processors so you can consolidate your efforts. Lotus's Modern Jazz and Microsoft Works take a Swissarmy-knife approach by consolidating spreadsheet, word processing, graphing, database management, and telecommunications features in one program. Orange Micro's Ragtime wraps its spreadsheet within a desktop publishing framework, well suited for creating financial reports.

Integrated programs are convenient, but remember that the Mac's Clipboard and Scrapbook let you create your own integrated workplace by cutting and pasting information between programs. And with MultiFinder, you can do so without quitting

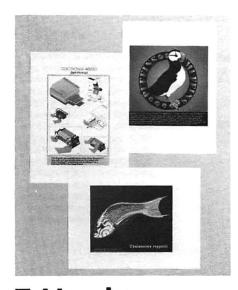

#### How To/Getting Started

#### Spreadsheet Design Basics

Creating an effective, easily understood spreadsheet requires an organized approach and plenty of advance planning. According to John M. Nevison's excellent The Elements of Spreadsheet Style (1987, Brady: \$12.95), a spreadsheet "should be straightforward to build. easy to read, receptive to change, and, above all, free of error." Here are a few of Nevison's 22 spreadsheet rules:

Make a formal introduction. Explain the spreadsheet's purpose and design, as well as how to use it: describe cells holding key information, and provide a "table of contents" listing key data sections.

. Label every assumption. So that your readers can better understand your spreadsheet's structure, state—up front-all its assumptions (say, a 5 percent annual growth rate with a 7 percent annual depreciation rate).

Explain tricky formulas. If your spreadsheet offers cellnotation features, use them, Later, when you have to modify your formulas, you'll be glad you did.

Use cell naming. If your spreadsheet program lets you, assign names to a cell or range of cells to explain key formulas. The formula = HoursWorked \*HourlyWage says a great deal more than = B7\*B6.

Graph to illuminate. Be sure that graphs summarize their data well. Proofread them for style and content. And put each graph's conclusion in its title. For example, the title "Sales Up 20 Percent This Year" says more than "Year-to-Date Sales Results."

great deal of time asking "what if?" you'll be better served by a powerhouse spreadsheet like Excel, Full Impact, or Wingz, using the Clipboard and MultiFinder to exchange and combine data within other applications as needed.

As you shop for heavy-duty spreadsheets, look for these two techie-sounding features: sparse matrix memory management and minimal recalculation. Sparse matrix memory management is an efficient method of spreadsheet storage that doesn't waste memory on empty cells, and thus lets you squeeze more into the machine's memory. Programs that use minimal recalculation recalculate spreadsheets by keeping track of which cells depend on the contents of other cells. Thus, they recalculate only those cells that are dependent on the cells you've changed, which takes far less time than checking and recalculating every cell in the spreadsheet.

#### The Power of Numbers

Don't forget the importance of good spreadsheet design. Creating a spreadsheet that's easy to understand and maintain requires forethought and an understanding of the problem you're analyzing. You'll find some tips for creating effective spreadsheets in "Spreadsheet Design

Finally, don't underestimate the potential for spreadsheet abuse. Anyone can doctor a spreadsheet to give the desired results by simply beginning with preselected figures, and then designing a spreadsheet to produce them. Don't take numbers at face value. Question the spreadsheet's underlying assumptions: did its creator assume that profits will increase 20 percent each year, that interest rates will fall, that no competition exists, that costs will remain the same?

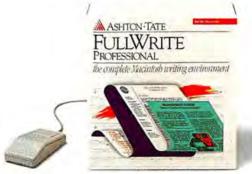

### When you absolutely, positively have to work on an MS-DOS document

#### by Danny Goodman

Nothing brings home the incompatibility between the Macintosh and MS-DOS worlds as much as the first terrifying moment when you discover that a client whose documents you must share belongs to the IBM camp. If the two of you have to exchange word processing, spreadsheet, or database files—and you've never done anything like this before—the prospect can be intimidating. Even the thought of picking up a delicate 5¼-inch floppy disk may send a shiver up your spine.

I run into this problem quite often, as do many fellow Macintosh owners who must coexist in a double-standard computer world. For example, recently I had to start with a Wordstar draft of a software manual, edit it on the Macintosh, and produce it in a form suitable for PostScript printing. In another case, the audio tapes of an interview I did for a New York magazine were transcribed directly into a Mac word processor. Then, after my edit, the magazine wanted the final draft on an IBM PC disk, because that's the only system they have, and that's how they send material to their typesetter. Conversions such as these can be done.

#### **Basic Concerns**

Bridging the chasm between the Macintosh and MS-DOS worlds is a two-part job: first, you must make the MS-DOS disk file into a Macintosh disk file, or vice versa; and second, you must convert the PC file contents to a format your Mac software can load, or vice versa. The first problem involves hardware; the second, software.

The preferred hardware and software solutions, it turns out, depend on how often you find yourself converting from one

format to the other. If the frequency or volume of conversion justifies it, any number of prepackaged solutions stand ready to help you out. But the first time the need to convert occurs, you may hesitate to make a financial commitment to the sleek packages, preferring a less expensive way to do infrequent, low-volume transfers. Either way, you can show an MS-DOS client that your Mac is a real computer.

#### **Everyday Conversions**

Among the prepackaged hardware solutions, by far the simplest is to slip an IBM PC disk into a disk drive connected to the Macintosh. This is getting easier and easier to do. Apple, for instance, offers an external 5½-inch disk drive—the Apple PC Drive—for the Mac SE and Mac II. You need to add a disk drive controller board, however—which takes care of your SE expansion slot, in case you had other ideas for it. The Apple PC Drive also works with AST Research's Mac86 (for the SE) and Mac286 (for the Mac II) coprocessor boards, but either would be overkill for merely reading and writing PC disks.

Dayna Communications produces a more flexible peripheral, the DaynaFile. This external disk-drive system connects to the SCSI port on the Mac Plus and later models. The base DavnaFile reads both 51/4-inch disk formats (360K as well as 1.2MB high-density AT-compatible disks). You can add a second drive to the unit, including one that reads the newer 720K MS-DOS format for 31/2-inch disks—the same disks we use on the Mac, but formatted very differently. This format is used by MS-DOS laptop computers and IBM PS/2 series machines. (For more on DaynaFile, see "Foreign Interpreters for Hire," Macworld, February 1988.)

For routinely passing data between a PC and a Macintosh in the same office. nothing beats connection via a network like TOPS (see "Insights on TOPS," Macworld, March 1988). Linked together through AppleTalk and TOPS networking software, either machine can access the other's files, just as if all the disk drives were connected to each machine. In the Macintosh environment, you see MS-DOS files as icons on the desktop. You drag a copy of the file to your hard disk for editing.

If there's a PC near your Mac, you can link the two machines without a network by cabling between their serial ports. Finding the right cable on the open market is a nightmare (especially with the newer, 8-pin mini connectors found on models since the Mac Plus). Fortunately, the correct cable comes with the MacLink Plus conversion software from DataViz. With the cable comes all the communications software you need for both the PC and the Mac.

The final way to get an MS-DOS file to your Mac is by using a modem. If you and your client are modem-equipped, you can send files to each other over the telephone. (For more on modems, see "Well-Connected," Macworld, March 1988). Depending on distance, file size, and deadlines, a modem transfer may be more efficient than shuttling disks back and forth. Each machine needs its own communications software. Red Ryder and MicroPhone are very popular among the Macintosh modem crowd, as is Smartcom among owners of Haves-compatible modems. PC communicators rely predominantly on Smartcom, Crosstalk, PC-Talk, and QModem. Use the communications software's Xmodem filetransfer protocol. This method detects errors in transmission due to noisy phone

lines; the program automatically resends any 128K blocks that contain errors on the receiving end.

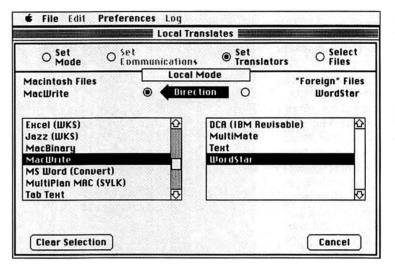
Of course, not every Mac office has a modem or a PC equipped for file transfers. It wouldn't hurt, therefore, to plan ahead for the inevitable by locating computer users nearby who have the setup you need. Macintosh owners seem especially willing to help fellow travelers with technical hurdles like this. Perhaps a Mac colleague with a modem could receive the file for you and then hand over the Mac floppy disk with the file on it.

#### File Incompatibilities

It's one thing to get an MS-DOS file onto your Macintosh disk. It's quite another for your Mac applications to open and edit those files, especially in the word processing world. The difficulty lies in the way

ware that converts files from their native formats to those of the most popular applications for the other machine, like converting a Wordstar file to a MacWrite file.

MacLink Plus, TOPS, and DaynaFile include file translators (all designed by DataViz) that handle common file conversions. Using dialog boxes reminiscent of Font/DA Mover, the translators let you convert one file style to another, and then back again. Therefore, you can convert a PC's MultiMate word processing file to the Mac version of Microsoft Word, edit it on your Mac, and then convert it to Wordstar for transmission to another PC (see "Linking Two Worlds"). Other translators facilitate conversion of spreadsheets (for instance, between Symphony and Excel) and databases (for example, between dBase III files and tab-delimited files for Macintosh databases).

programs store their documents on disk. With few exceptions, PC programs plant their document data on disk in a way that only compatible programs can understand. We encounter the same kind of thing in the Macintosh arena, although many software developers acknowledge certain standards for eventual file sharing-MacWrite and MacPaint formats come to mind.

The point is that very few Macintosh applications can work with documents generated by PC applications (although the situation is improving). That's why many hardware products designed for Mac-to-PC file transfers come with translation soft-

As part of the System 5.0 release, Apple now includes a utility program called the Apple File Exchange. By itself, this program performs some rudimentary conversions. With the addition of specialized translator files, File Exchange performs more thorough conversions to maintain document formatting during the translation. Apple furnishes just one of these more specific modules, a two-way conversion between MacWrite and the DCA (Document Content Architecture) format that a number of PC word processing programs now support in some fashion. Apple is leaving further modules up to outside software developers.

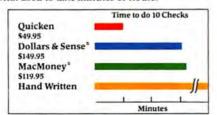

#### **Business Clinic**

#### Preparing the MS-DOS File

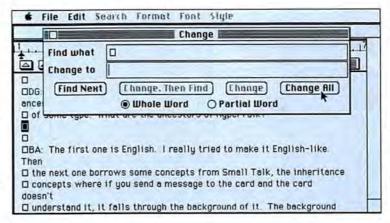
If you aren't using a conversion utility to turn an MS-DOS file into a file your Mac software readily loads, then it is crucial that you instruct your client how to prepare the file before sending it to you. For word processing documents, most PC word processors provide a facility for writing the file to disk as a straight ASCII file (also called a DOS file)—the same as a Macintosh textonly file. That means that the file contains only the text characters. Special formatting, such as boldfacing or underlining, is lost when you make this kind of file.

In most MS-DOS programs, the terminology for saving a file as an ASCII file differs from the Mac vocabulary. You're probably familiar with a Text-Only choice in Save As dialog boxes, but MS-DOS programs generally make you "print the file to disk." In other words, the procedure is listed amid the printing commands rather than in the file commands (WordPerfect, however, classifies this as a file-related activity). Even an experienced PC user working with a familiar program may not know how to save a file in ASCII form.

#### Do-It-Yourself Translation

Once a file is in ASCII, the problems really begin. Generally when a PC word processor prints to a text file, the text includes carriage returns at the end of each line and sometimes extra spaces for left margins. These leftovers spell disaster for your Macintosh word processor. Carriage returns mess up whatever formatting you intend for the document. Moreover, ASCII files saved by programs such as WordPerfect and IBM's DisplayWrite 3 place a curious control character at the beginning of each line (see "Controlling Characters"). It looks like a square, but it is actually the line-feed character, ASCII value 10.

MacWrite can help you eliminate linefeed characters with its Search and Change functions. Since you can't type the character from the keyboard, select a square from your document and copy it. Then choose Change from the Search menu and paste the square into the Find box. Leave the Change To field empty, since you want to eliminate the squares entirely.



#### Controlling Characters

A converted word processing document may bave carriage returns at the end of each line and line-feed characters (the squares) at the beginning of each line. While a couple of utility programs strip line-feed characters, MacWrite lets you remove them yourself.

If you use Microsoft Word, you won't be able to search for and replace these characters because you can't copy and paste strange characters into the Find field. There is a public domain utility called UnWS (for Un-Wordstar) that removes these characters from the entire ASCII file in a few seconds. You might want to pick up this program from a bulletin board or a user group and keep it handy.

The Apple File Exchange utility has a provision for eliminating line-feed characters, but the procedure is anything but obvious. Once the file is on a Mac disk, and you establish that the target disk is also a Mac disk, the Mac-to-Mac menu appears. If the Text Translation menu item is checked, click on the item to uncheck it. Then hold down the Option key and choose the Text Translation item again. The resulting dialog box offers several translation possibilities (see "Removing Line Feeds"). Choose MS-DOS to Macintosh to see additional choices at the left of the dialog box. These

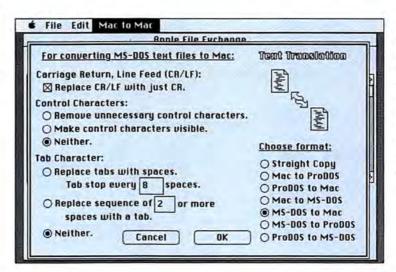
choices give you some control over the way the file is converted. Check the box that replaces CR/LF with just CR. This means carriage return/line feed combinations (which result in the square characters on the screen) are replaced with single carriage returns.

#### Removing Carriage Returns

Taking care of the carriage returns at the end of each line entails some more searching and replacing. Your goal is to remove the carriage returns at the end of each line inside a paragraph, but to leave the carriage returns at the ends of paragraphs.

Since searching and replacing individual carriage return characters throughout a document affects both end-of-line and end-of-paragraph carriage returns, you need to make three search-and-replace passes (assuming two carriage returns at

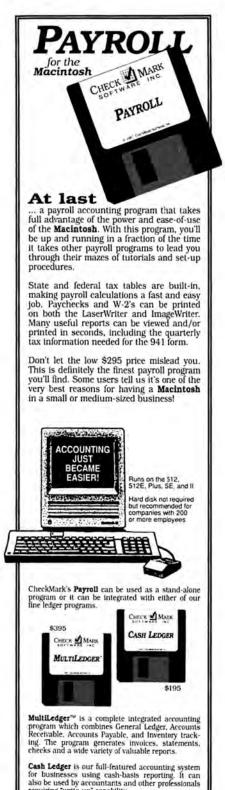

In the second pass, I replace every two-bullet cluster with two end-of-paragraph markers (^p^p in Word), as shown in "Goodbye Carriage Returns." That leaves single bullets at the end of each line within paragraphs. In the third pass, replace single bullets with nothing.

If your document file has spaces making up a left margin, you may use the search-and-replace feature to eliminate them. Let's say the document has five spaces to the left of each line of text. Type five spaces into the Find What box and nothing into the Change To box.

#### Preparing a Document for Export

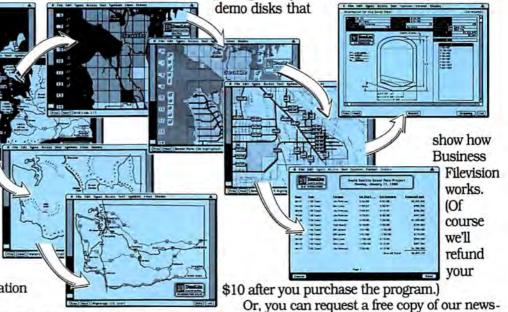

serious number crunching is done in Excel, which can read Lotus files directly. All you have to do is get the Lotus file onto a Macintosh disk, as discussed above. In the other direction, you can choose to save an Excel spreadsheet in the Lotus WKS file format. Translation utilities aren't necessary in either direction.

Not everyone uses 1-2-3, of course. For those who don't, however, the spreadsheets can usually be saved in the SYLK format, an alternate lingua franca among spreadsheet programs like Multiplan and SuperCalc. Virtually every Macintosh spreadsheet program, including Microsoft Works' spreadsheet module, reads and writes SYLK files without difficulty.

Excel converts Lotus functions, but macros just won't compute. Each spreadsheet brand uses very different macro methods. As a 1-2-3 file loads into Excel, you will be alerted as to which parts of the worksheet Excel cannot understand. If the spreadsheet requires the macro to work its

magic, then someone must rewrite the macro in Excel—often no trivial task.

#### **Databases**

Transferring large banks of data from PC to Mac is also relatively simple, thanks to a common method of saving database records in ASCII form with tab characters between fields and a carriage return between records. Most Macintosh databases, including high-end relational databases, can import such data, as well as data fields separated by commas.

Transferring more complex parts of the database, such as report formats, is usually not possible. You're better off redefining reports within the Macintosh world anyway, because you can make them more graphically interesting with judicious typeface selection. Still, if you can save vourself the task of retyping hundreds or thousands of database records, then the transfer is definitely worth the trouble. There are commercial services that translate databases and other files. CompuData of Los Angeles, for example, translates data between mainframes and personal computers as well as between personal computers.

#### **Common Programs**

The key to the end of PC/Mac incompatibilities, I believe, lies in the current trend toward software developers' providing Macintosh and MS-DOS versions of the same programs. Aldus, Ashton-Tate, Microsoft, and WordPerfect have not only opened up programs to both camps, but also simplified exchange of data from one operating system to the other. Often there are minor incompatibilities—and graphics translations range from difficult to impossible—but gradually those barriers will disappear. In fact, Apple is exploring the possibility of letting a Macintosh floppy disk drive read a 31/2-inch MS-DOS disk-the standard format of the IBM PS/2 line.

Such a capability will simplify matters in the future, but for now, at least your lone Macintosh can competently hold its own anywhere along a document's path from PC Mac and back again.

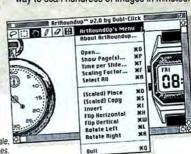

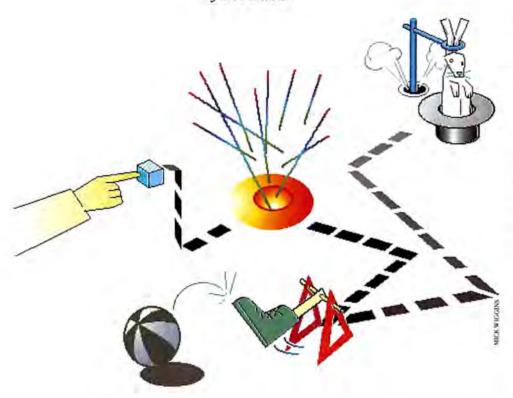

### Insights on QuicKeys

Speed all your Mac tasks with custom keyboard shortcuts

Are you tired of running your mouse through the same old maze to perform repetitive actions on your Mac? Ever wish you could change the **%**-key shortcuts for certain menu items? Or maybe you'd like to add a **%**-key equivalent to a menu item that lacks one. QuicKeys, a keyboard enhancer from CE Software, lets you do all that and more.

It's not quite a macro program, like Affinity Microsystems' Tempo, which has a true programming language that allows

(Apple's expected System Tools 6.0 will include MacroMaker, which we haven't been able to test in final form.) Still, QuicKeys can provide keyboard shortcuts for tedious tasks on the desktop or within programs that would normally require lots of mousing around. By grouping sequences of QuicKeys, you can approach Tempo's macro capabilities without sacrificing power for ease of use. For example, you could select printing preferences and initiate printing, all by hitting just one key, bypassing the need to navigate through a bunch of dialog boxes.

Once you get used to having Quic-Keys shortcuts, you'll be unable to imagine life without them—they're that helpful. Though they work well with extended keyboards, you don't need any special hardware; QuicKeys works with all Mac models that have the 128K ROM, from the 512KE on through the Mac II. QuicKeys requires System version 4.1 or later.

**Key Mapping Orientation** 

QuicKeys is a Control Panel device (CDEV), just like the General, Keyboard, and Mouse CDEVs that come with System software. You place QuicKeys in the System Folder to add it to the scrollable list of icons at the left side of the Control Panel. Selecting the QuicKeys icon brings up a window that lists the assigned QuicKeys. It's also where you define keystroke commands or change them.

To design a QuicKey, you select the type of function from the Define menu, follow the prompts that appear, and then assign a key combination you'll use from the keyboard. The QuicKeys manual thoroughly covers the details of the process, but a summary of the Define menu options gives an idea of the scope of the program (see "Short-Order Menu").

- Text assigns a single key to automatically type a series of characters.
- File launches applications and documents from the keyboard.
- Menu/DA calls up any menu item or desk accessory with a keystroke. No more need to mess with ResEdit to assign %-key equivalents to menu items that lack them.
- Alias assigns multiple keystrokes (like \(\mathbb{H}\)-up arrow) to a single key.
- Clicks substitutes keystrokes for a mouse click, double-click, or series of clicks, anywhere on the screen. This is how you instruct QuicKeys to drag windows around. Unfortunately, QuicKeys doesn't play back mouse actions in real time as

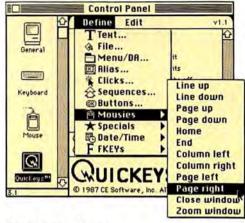

#### Short-Order Menu

QuicKeys' Define menu lists all the functions you need to create keyboard shortcuts. Select Page Right, assign it a key, and you can scroll to the right without putting hand to mouse.

Tempo II does, but like Tempo, it can click on the exact spot you designate in a window, even if that window later moves.

Sequences groups a series of QuicKeys shortcuts together into a single keystroke. You create single QuicKeys to perform simple tasks and then string them together, inserting pauses when necessary, to perform complex jobs.

For instance, you might have Quic-Keys open MacWrite, pause for 5 seconds while MacWrite launches, "press" **%**-O to reach the Open dialog box, pause 1 second, press the key D to select a folder named Documents, press Return to open the folder, scroll down to the end of the list, double-click on the last file, pause 2 seconds, shift-drag to select the whole document, select Copy from the Edit menu, pause 2 seconds, select Quit from the File menu, pause 5 seconds, open Page-Maker with a QuicKey, pause 15 seconds, then *finally* paste the file into a new document. All that by pressing a single key.

- Buttons selects or deselects any button you designate in a dialog box or window.
- Mousies offers preprogrammed substitutes for common mouse moves: scroll up and down a document, zoom a window, close a window, drag the scroll box to the end of a document, and so on.
- Specials holds a grab bag of miscellaneous actions: transfer to another application, shut down or restart the Mac, activate the rear window, toggle between two specified windows among all the open

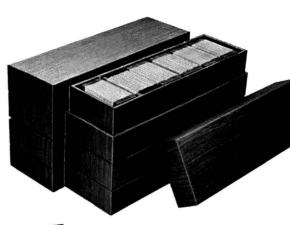

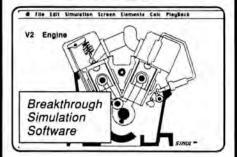

#### **QuicKeys Sampler**

No doubt you have pet peeves that block the way to efficiency as you work on the Mac. Enthusiastic QuicKeys partisans have found many good solutions. Here are a few suggestions to get you thinking of your own step-savers.

Design a QuicKeys shortcut that ejects a floppy disk by dragging its icon to the Trash a big favorite with people who own big screen displays.

 Define a Shut Down key that avoids the Finder when you stop work; a real time-saver if you have lots of documents and folders open on the desktop.

Take a cue from James Gealy, Jr., of San Luis Obispo, California. He set up a QuicKey that switches from one Omnis 3 data file to another—he can then press two keys instead of clicking through a series of dialog boxes.  Speed formatting in Excel worksheets by creating Quic-Keys that make selected cells bold or italic.

 Use the Alias function to remap a keyboard from QWERTY to Dvorak.

Customize an application for completely idiot-proof operation. Tom Piper of Jefferson City, Missouri, established a QuicKey that launches Hyper-Card and opens the Laura's Letters stack for two-year-old Jason. The same key, marked with a colored dot, lets Jason close HyperCard—harmlessly bypassing the tempting Folderinto-the-Trash-Can game.

Define a Quickey that brings up the Chooser or the Control Panel. Great for the networked office with two laser printers, or for people who frequently change monitor settings.—Nancy E. Dunn

windows, enter typographical ("smart") quotes without a convoluted combination of keys, and more. This is where you go to put QuicKeys in Watch Me mode, to record a series of mouse clicks—or to see a description of each QuicKey, in case you need reminding. Use this menu to toggle QuicKeys on or off—for instance, if you've assigned QuicKeys to the numeric keypad, but now you want to use the keypad for entering numbers.

Date/Time automatically types the date or time.

 Fkeys invokes any F-key installed in the System file (or in Software Supply's Suitcase).

The Edit menu lets you remove a QuicKey, undefine an already defined QuicKey, sort keys, or save a whole set of keys to disk so you can open them later. You begin editing by double-clicking the name of the key in the list in the QuicKeys window.

Setting an Example

The best way to understand QuicKeys is to try it out. Here are step-by-step instructions for setting up a few sample shortcuts. Do the first example—even if you don't need automatic text entry. Then try a sequence. Going through the motions will give you a feel for how to create your own QuicKeys routines. "QuicKeys Sampler" suggests some do-it-vourself designs.

A tip to remember: consistency is the watchword when it comes to choosing names for your QuicKeys. Use the same

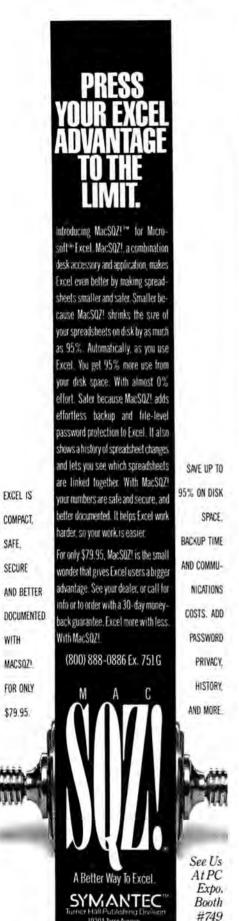

modifier key to perform similar operations. For example, when launching applications and documents from the keyboard don't use the # key sometimes and the Control key other times. I always use the Option key for launching-Option-F for Font/DA Mover, Option-W to launch Word, and the like. Similarly, it's most useful to have common keystrokes for the same action. Don't use #-P for printing in one application, and for Page Setup in another,

 Automatic Typing Anyone who processes words has a few phrases that must be typed over and over again. Some word processors, such as Microsoft Word, let you establish a glossary of oft-typed phrases so you can enter them automatically with a keyboard shortcut. With QuicKeys you can establish a collection of shortcuts that are available in all your applications. Mark Roebuck at the Missouri Department of Health, understandably fed up with repeatedly typing Missouri Department of Health State Health Planning and Development Agency, defined a OuicKey to enter it automatically in correspondence, on charts, and in database reports. Follow these steps to do the same.

 Open QuicKeys from the Control Panel. Select Text from the Define menu. Click on the Text button in the window that opens. In the entry box, type the text you want for quick entry, putting any Returns and tabs in place just as you would in a word processor.

Proofread the text and then click OK. The Quickeys window returns, with your newly created item highlighted on the list, prefaced with the word Undefined because you haven't assigned a key to it yet. The text appears in quotes, and there's a big T to show what type of QuicKey it is.

While the new item is highlighted, assign keys to the text shortcut by pressing the keys you prefer, for example Enter-A.

4. Close the Control Panel and then

try out your text Quickey.

MultiFinder Switching You've got 8 megabytes of RAM on your Mac II and you love using MultiFinder, but you'd really like an easier way to switch between your favorite opened applications. Sure you can click on the windows or select the program names from the bottom of the Apple menu, but you'd much rather use the keyboard.

On start-up, I automatically launch PowerStation (a superb alternative Finder

from Fifth Generation Systems), mv Hyper-Card address and phone number stack, and the Finder. Since these applications appear on the Apple menu, it's a simple matter to assign keys to select them. Here's how.

1. After starting up under MultiFinder, open Quickeys from the Control Panel. Select Menu/DA from the Define menu.

When prompted, pull down the Apple menu, scroll to the bottom, and select Finder. The selected menu item appears in quotes in the main QuicKeys window.

3. Assign a shortcut while your newly created item is highlighted by pressing the key combination you want.

4. Repeat steps one through three for other applications you want available.

Close the Control Panel. Now every time you want to switch programs, just press the keys you assigned.

 Building Sequences By grouping QuicKeys together you can build a powerful shortcut to perform a series of actions -initiated by a simple keystroke combination. Here's a sequence I find handy to open the Control Panel, turn off the RAM cache, and close the Control Panel.

1. Open QuicKeys from the Control Panel.

2. Select Buttons from the Define menu. When asked what button to look for, type Off, Click OK and enter #Option-Shift-O. (I chose an awkward key combination that I'd never want to use for something else, since this QuicKey works only as part of a sequence, not by itself.)

3. Select Menu/DA from the Define menu. Select the Control Panel from the Apple menu. Assign keys to this action.

4. Select Close Window from the Mousies hierarchical menu under the Define menu; assign a key combination. Now you're ready to create the sequence.

5. Select Sequence from the Define menu. The right side of the Sequence editor shows all the installed shortcuts (see "A Sequence for Printing"). On the left is an empty area that will hold the sequence. Find the Quickey you created to open the Control Panel. Double-click it to make it the first action to be executed when you run the sequence. A copy of the QuicKey you double-clicked on appears in the left window.

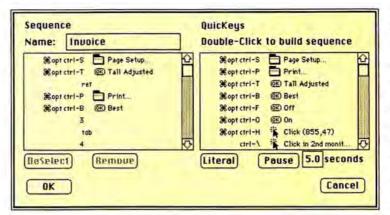

### A Sequence for Printing

A Quickey that prints two invoices. Pressing the assigned key performs this sequence: it opens up the Page Setup dialog, selects Tall Adjusted, opens the Print dialog, clicks Best, specifies to print pages 3 and 4, then clicks OK to start printing.

- 6. Delay the sequence while the Control Panel opens: type 2.0 seconds in the box and click the Pause button.
- Double-click the QuicKey that selects the Off button to add it to the sequence.
- 8. Double-click on the Close Window OuicKey and then click OK.
- 9. Now, back in the main QuicKeys menu, assign a keystroke to the sequence.
- 10. Close the Control Panel. When you press the sequence key, QuicKeys opens the Control Panel, waits 2 seconds, looks for the Off radio button, clicks it, turning off the RAM cache, and then closes the Control Panel.
- Printing Sequence Printing a document on the Mac often means opening up several dialog boxes to make a myriad of choices. QuicKeys can alleviate all the mouse traveling and narrow down your actions to one key sequence.

Let's say every Thursday you print the same two invoices for two different companies. The invoices occur on pages 3 and 4 of a larger document containing more invoices for other jobs. Setup always includes opening Page Setup and selecting Tall Adjusted. Then you choose Print, type in the page range (from: 3, to: 4), type in the number of copies (2), select the quality you want (Best), and finally hit the OK button. Here's how to simplify the process with Quickeys.

 While in MacWrite, open OuicKeys and select Menu/DA from the Define menu. Go up to the File menu and pick Page Setup. Return to the File menu and pick Print. Assign keys to both menu items in the main QuicKeys window. (Any obscure

combination will do, as these keys will only be part of a sequence.)

- 2. Select Buttons from the Define menu in the main QuicKeys window. Type Tall Adjusted in the box and then assign a key to this shortcut. Select Buttons again and type Best; assign a key.
- 3. To build the sequence, select Sequences from the Define menu (see "A Sequence for Printing"). Find the Page Setup QuicKey you defined and double-click it to start building the sequence. Then doubleclick on the Tall Adjusted QuicKey. Click on the Literal button and press Return to indicate a click on the OK button in the Page Setup dialog. Double-click on the Print Quickey and then on the one for Best. Click Literal and type 3. Click Literal again and press the Tab key. Click Literal and type 4. Click Literal and press the Tab key again. Click Literal and type 2 (for two copies). Finally, click Literal and press Return.
- Close the Sequence window by clicking OK. While the sequence is highlighted in the main QuicKeys window, assign it a key combination.
- 5. Test the QuicKey by pressing the key combination you specified.
