## Call for Action: Shut Down Fraud

Back in October, *Consumer Watch* received a few letters from readers complaining about a couple of Southern California companies. Nothing odd about that—in its four years of existence, *Consumer Watch* has received hundreds of such letters. Associate Editor Roberta Furger usually resolves these grievances easily, because they often stem from simple lapses or misunderstandings.

But as this month's *Consumer Watch* Special Report reveals, this time Furger was onto something completely different. Letters began to pour in about four companies that advertised low-cost hardware but didn't deliver: One Stop Micro, Minuteman Computers, American Computer Technology, and Computer Spectrum—all located in the South Bay area of Los Angeles. Furger saw a clear pattern: "The company would blame the carrier for losing the shipment," she says, "and after supposedly tracing it, claim that it was damaged or missing and that the company was now out of stock."

The volume of mail, along with her inability to get satisfaction for any customer, convinced Furger these weren't merely struggling enterprises trying to keep up with orders. Tens of thousands of dollars were being lost by *PC World* readers alone. Phone calls to the companies yielded abrupt, evasive responses—or disconnected lines. Background checks turned up cooperative links between businesses that should have been competing.

The links and the amount of money involved indicated a major scam. News Editor Mike Hogan, a *PC World* veteran with 15 years of newspaper reporting experience, joined Furger for what would become a full-time, three-month investigation. Furger and Hogan alerted the California attorney general, the Los Angeles city attorney, the U.S. postal inspector, the Secret Service, and appropriate local police departments.

Unbelievably, all but the local police seemed uninformed and uninterested. Meanwhile, Furger and Hogan discovered that one phony company had bilked a single bank of \$100,000 in chargebacks, and other operations were surfacing all the time.

With nothing to stop unsuspecting readers from suffering more losses, *PC World* hired the private investigations firm of Palladino & Sutherland and a handwriting analyst, who helped confirm the reporters' worst suspicions. At least eight companies were involved, run by a group of men who used each other as credit references, shut down businesses and reopened them under different names, and regularly used aliases—all in a successful bid to duck creditors and confuse the authorities. Experts estimate that total losses could run into the millions.

The biggest surprise for Furger and Hogan was how easy it all seemed for the perpetrators—with no inventory, no legiti-

mate references, advertisements they didn't pay for, and lowrent storefronts that stayed locked during normal working hours. With businesslike phone manners for would-be customers, they conned experienced and first-time buyers alike. To help you avoid a similar fate, our Special Report explains the basic steps you can take to check out businesses before you buy, along with the safest way to pay.

Furger knows of only a handful of customers who received a refund from the companies investigated. One of them was so fed up with delays and excuses that he got friends to call One Stop Micro three times a day and say, "You took our friend's money, and we're not going to stop bothering you until you pay him back." Furger and Hogan displayed the same kind of

determination during their exhaustive investigation. As Hogan says, "These guys hurt our readers. That's why *PC World* got involved."

By going public with the results of our investigation, *PC World* aims to prevent further direct-sale scams. Copies of this month's Special Report have been sent to the law enforcement agencies that could have joined forces to shut down these operations months ago. A handful of unscrupulous men have defrauded the public and cast doubt upon legitimate direct-sale companies. We hope that reputable vendors and our readers will join us in a call for action by local, state, and federal law enforcement.







However, while your article claims that almost all modems are compatible, other articles I've read state that only modems of the same brand can communicate at 9600 baud. It would be wonderful if all V.32 and V.42bis modems could talk to each other at the same high level of performance. Is this really the case, or am I misinterpreting your article?

Don Esry Delray Beach, Florida Our exploratory tests for the buyers' guide showed that compatibility is very good between vendors. A few products had minor difficulties in connecting, but we were able to troubleshoot all of these. Once the modems were connected, throughput was identical with all combinations. However, there are hundreds of V.32 modems out there. Without further testing, we can't say for sure that they'll all work with one another. Usually, if two modems with the same protocols connect at all, they deliver at top speed. —Ed.

#### Whither First Publisher?

I was disappointed that you did not include *PFS:First Publisher* in your product comparison in "No-Sweat Desktop Publishing" (January 1992). I currently use *First Publisher* and am wondering whether to change desktop publishing programs or wait and see if Software Publishing ports it to *Windows*. Even though *First Publisher* has not been upgraded in two or more years, it would have been helpful if you had included it in your evaluation.

The prices you're citing are quite out of date, but your point is worth noting. As you correctly point out, speed is rel-

ative—as are all our descriptions of speed in the text of our reviews. So is price. Prices can drop or rise swiftly, which often results in street prices being quite different by the time one of our roundup reviews hits the street. It's possible that by the date you got that \$2399 quote for the 486/25, the price of our Best Buy 386 might have been even

lower, as it certainly is today. Furthermore, you have to be careful about choosing a system based on price alone—or even price and speed. Some vendors offer tempting bargain prices by skimping on quality control, tech support, and service. Price and performance are only two factors we weigh when we select a Best Buy. —Ed.

## Welcome to Work, Dear, Supper's On

Home Computing Isn't About Leisure; It's About Survival



We never promised you a rose garden or, for that matter, time in your rose garden. That wasn't part of the deal. So when IBM advertises its PS/1 home computer as "the first computer to understand you don't just have a job. You have a life," well, it ain't so, Joe.

True, computers make you more productive. True, they unchain you from the office. But home

productivity doesn't translate into more time with kith and kin, reports Tom Miller, vice president of Link Resources Home/Office Research. It just gives you the opportunity to do more and better work.

The first woodchuck at the office who used a computer to chuck more wood was a hero. Day two dawned to find him with more wood in his in-box. Likewise, the work you take home *will* 

expand to fill your discretionary time faster than your stuff expands to fill your closet. Don't believe me? Ask your significant other.

And there's no hiding from it anymore. A computer is one of those tools you need to keep a job these days, notes Miller, and global competition means constantly honing your computing edge by, say, learning new software, such as *Windows*, at home.

That's why you need a full-on, work-kicking, 486-based PC for yourself. Forget about so-called home computers whose expandability and/or power have been reined in to fit some manufacturer's errant vision of the lesser demands of home computing. The dollars you save on a 386SX today will be spent upgrading it to run the big, fat software that vendors have planned for tomorrow. One example: IBM wants you to run its 25MB-gobbling OS/2 on your home PS/1. Now there's a marriage made in hell.

The good news is, life's even tougher for

PC makers than for you. No room here to recount how many name-brands' prices have been slashed 30 to 50 percent lately.

Check out Dell's System 486P/20 at CompUSA. It has a 20-MHz 486SX that runs twice as fast as a 20-MHz 386, the minimum 4MB memory and 100MB disk needed to run *Windows* decently, and a *Windows*-enhancing 1024 by 768 color monitor for less than \$2600. Circuit City's \$2500 AST Advantage has more of just about everything, including a 25-MHz 486DX CPU. You can pay just \$2000 at Costco for a similarly configured Packard Bell Pack-Mate 486SX, while CompUSA's 486SX-based Compudyne is only a few dollars more. These are solid brands with a year of free on-site support.


The beefiest PS/1 I can find is a two-slotted, RAM-limited, 16-MHz 386SX at Circuit City for \$2199. IBM's name is a worm wiggled in front of clueless novices looking for a safe buy. Lucky ones end up biting on a cheaper 386SX clone. But experienced users zip past both machines, say salespeople, to get the real deal: a do-everything, expand-anywhere, lowball 486.

Go for it. If you're like most home workers, says Miller, you take your work home because you both enjoy it and take pride in making it the best you can.

#### WHAT TO WATCH

The only reason not to buy a 486 today is that it'll be cheaper tomorrow .... New prices on Compags bring them within a few hundred dollars of Dell. But by summer, a new line of modular Compags could meet or beat Dell prices .... Dell hopes to fire back with technology. It's racing to be the first PC maker out this summer with a 66-MHz version of Intel's clock-doubling DX2 486, one that will include Dell's special bus to accelerate graphics .... The world's most popular spreadsheet, 1-2-3, goes home in the next couple of weeks. Lotus has a specially tailored home version that mass merchandisers will sell for around \$100 . . . . What Windows app doesn't have its own tool bar these days? But version 2.0 of hDC's Powerlauncher, due in April, is one for all. It lets you simultaneously launch groups of apps and their files and hop between them . . . . Intel is planning new versions of its SatisFaxtion fax-modems with killer prices and 14.4-kbps speeds.



#### Cyrix Plans User-Upgradable 486s

With This 486SX Equivalent, You'll Be Able to Upgrade Your 386SX

Cyrix reportedly plans an announcement in late April of an equivalent to the 486SX processor that will plug into 386SX sockets. Following its successful foray into the math coprocessor market, where it helped break Intel's monopoly and

drive prices down, Dallasbased Cyrix has long been rumored to be preparing CPU entries and was reportedly conducting discussions with PC manufacturers at COM-DEX Spring.

According to sources close to the company, the new CPU—code-named M16—will be an Intel 486SX equivalent in 20-MHz and 25-MHz clock speeds. It will be followed later this year by the M32, a 486DX

equivalent including RISC processing capability.

Neither chip family will have an onboard math coprocessor. Instead, Cyrix will encourage PC makers and users to install its 32-bit 87DLC and 16-bit 87SLC math coprocessors for the M32 and M16 families, respectively.

The M16 has a 16-bit pinout so it can be plugged into 386SX sockets to upgrade. Cyrix is targeting the huge installed base of 386SX systems with the M16's plug-and-play compatibility. In addition, the chip reportedly offers 486 performance and is compatible with the 486 instruction set.

The M16 will be user installable, but the coprocessor must be surface mounted and installation will require dealer assistance. Both of the chips are small, low-power (3-volt) parts—appropriate for notebooks as well as desktops. Sources say that together they require less motherboard real estate than even an Intel 486DX.

The new CPUs reportedly will be priced at 386 rather than 486 levels. Cyrix would not comment on release dates, but the company is already sampling parts and is expected to ship in volume to PC makers in April. It was unclear when supplies of user-upgradable CPUs will appear.

#### Microsoft Sends Lotus a Letter Bomb

Windows version of Microsoft Mail 3.0 this summer, Microsoft takes the first step in its campaign to unseat Lotus as ruler of the E-mail market and gain a fundamental advantage in groupware.

Mail 3.0 is the first fully rewritten version of Consumer Software's Network Courier, which Microsoft purchased last year. It features a faster interface that takes better advantage of the Windows environment and offers several improvements over Lotus's cc:Mail for Windows. For instance, Mail 3.0 gives users a

split-screen view of files and folders and provides drag-and-drop filing of messages to folders, the out-box, or a wastebasket. *Mail 3.0* is OLE-capable so text, graphics, sound, and animation can be inserted anywhere in a message; double-clicking on an embedded file icon launches the application that created the file.

Much like Beyond's *BeyondMail*, *Mail 3.0* provides an easy way to filter incoming messages by sender name, subject, and keywords from the text. Like messages are automatically assembled under finder icons at the bottom of

the application window for quick review. However, *Mail* 3.0 cannot automatically sort mail into folders and doesn't yet include agents to launch other applications upon receipt of triggering messages.

Microsoft Mail 3.0 will include a driver so that it can be used as a front end to cc:Mail for Windows.

Lotus is already preparing a response. Look for enhanced versions of its *cc:Mail* for DOS in May, with a *Windows* revision later this year.

Mail 3.0 is Microsoft's first product to include MAPI, a Windows-centric application programming interface.

# Microsoft Catches the Fox

IVI icrosoft's purchase of tiny Fox Software, maker of the highly acclaimed FoxPro dBASE-compatible data base program, should improve the product's marketing and development pace, users and analysts say.

The Fox purchase also fills a hole in Microsoft's product lineup and gives Microsoft the ammunition to battle Borland International, maker of *Paradox*, in the data base market. Last year Borland purchased *dBASE* creator Ashton-Tate, and it now controls more than 70 percent of the data base market, according to industry analysts.

Microsoft plans to incorporate Fox's performance-boosting Rushmore technology into future versions of *SQL Server* and into *Cirrus*, the code name for Microsoft's upcoming *Windows* data base program. The initial release of *Cirrus*, however, is not expected to include Rushmore.

The deal calls for Fox Software president David Fulton to take charge of Microsoft's new data base division. A team of *FoxPro* developers will take up residence in Microsoft's Redmond, Washington, headquarters to work on future data base products.

Data base consultant Pat Adams of Brooklyn sees the Microsoft-Fox merger as a "win win" situation for users and developers. Fox's weakness was marketing, Adams says, but with Microsoft's resources, FoxPro will get much greater exposure, and its development team will produce updates much faster, she predicts. —Jeff Bertolucci

#### **All You Want From Windows and More**

The much-heralded OS/2 provides the promised "seamless" support for Windows applications (i.e., you can launch multiple Windows programs from Presentation Manager's Workplace Shell, and they'll run within PM windows). The ability to run multiple DOS and Windows applications unmodified plus improved network support and compatibility with a wide range of non-IBM hardware combine to support IBM's promotion of the new OS/2 as "a better Windows than Windows," users say.


OS/2 version 2.0 was scheduled to be available for large customers to download directly from IBM at the end of March, and the package was expected to work its way through the retail pipeline during the first few weeks of April. The new release allows full Object Linking and Embedding (OLE) links only between *Windows* applications. However, Lucy Baney,

IBM's Personal Systems director for programming systems market development, says that Dynamic Data Exchange (DDE) between DOS, Windows, and OS/2 applications is fully supported in OS/2 version 2.0.

The new icondriven Workplace Shell boasts dragand-drop capabilities and is LAN aware, simplifying network access, she says. Once an OS/2 2.0 workstation is configured by an administrator on a LAN

server, NetWare, or SNA network, the user can access network and host resources simply by selecting an icon on the desktop, Baney explains.

"They have really come a

# IBM Opens Direct Line to Users

A iming to turn direct vendor support into a competitive advantage while laying the foundation for a push into low-margin channels like superstores and direct mail, IBM has opened a nationwide toll-free customer hot line. Big Blue expects a million calls a year on the line, 800/772-2227, which is open from 9 to 5, Monday through Friday.

IBM customers seeking technical help traditionally are told to call their dealers, and "sometimes it's very difficult to get access to IBM," notes Larry Deaton, director of Personal Systems services and customer support. The new HelpCenter, located in Atlanta, aims to solve that problem. When you dial in with a question about a PS/2 you're thinking of buying, or when you hit a technical snag after the sale, "the IBMer who answers your call owns your problem until it's solved," Deaton says.

Winnie Briney, vice president for marketing support at IBM's National Distribution division, says the HelpCenter will refer sales leads to dealers and supplement rather than replace dealer support. But "we are looking seriously at alternative channels... to have a safety net for support," she acknowledges. "The day may come when we sell direct through an 800 number. We intend to sell where the customer wants to buy."


Analysts said the move makes sense as IBM seeks to reverse its slide in market share. But International Data Corporation's Bruce Stephen cautions that while IBM and other vendors aim to turn support into a competitive weapon, customers won't pay much extra for the added comfort level. —Eric Bender

#### Multimedia 1-2-3: Just-in-Time Learning

L otus Development is rolling out an ambitious plan to transform its applications into full-fledged multimedia programs, beginning with its flagship 1-2-3.

1-2-3 for Windows With



1-2-3 for Windows goes multimedia and shortens the learning curve for users.

Multimedia SmartHelp, due later this year on CD, provides a 40-minute guided tour of the application and includes dozens of "show me" help movies that explain concepts, such as what a solver is, and proce-

dures, such as how to create a graph. To run a movie, users simply access help. Watching a procedural movie, you can toggle back and forth, pausing the demonstration to return to your document and complete an action and then jumping back to

the movie to see how to accomplish the next step. All documentation is also on the disk, which will be sold for the same price as 1-2-3 for Windows but will require a CD ROM drive.

This type of just-in-time learning is planned for all Lotus products, says Steve Barlow, multimedia product manager at Lotus.

The use of multimedia in training "is fundamental and will touch all users," he says.

Lotus plans to add sound and animation features to *cc:Mail* and *Freelance*. The company also is creating a version of *CD/Networker* that will enable multiple users to access 1-2-3 for Windows With Multimedia SmartHelp.



### At Last, a Real Notebook From IBM

It's no speed demon, but it's well built and aggressively priced.



IBM's 6.2-pound PS note lists for less than \$2500, but it has a base battery life of under 2 hours.

I fit were spring 1991, IBM's new PS note (officially the PS/2 Model N51 SX) would be one of the hottest machines on the market. Not only would it be an innovative combination of refinements to portable computing, but its rock-bottom pricing would be turning the PC industry upside down.

It's a year later, however, and IBM's first true notebook PC doesn't push the excitement meter much past the halfway mark. True, IBM has finally gotten a portable PC right with its 6.2-pound PS note—including a price around \$2500 (less than \$2000 on the street). But it's hard to get excited about a 16-MHz 386SX

notebook with a 40MB hard disk when the 20-MHz SX is already a notebook standard and the first 25-MHz SL machines are in users' hands.

Nonetheless, IBM has succeeded admirably in eliminating the primary flaws that marred its bulky and overpriced PS/2 Model L40 SX. At 8.3 by 11.7 by 2.1 inches, the all-black PS note isn't the trimmest notebook around, but it fits comfortably into a full-size briefcase.

The battery is where IBM's technology both shines and disappoints. While the nickel-cadmium cell promises less than 2 hours of power, the machine comes with two batteries that are interchangeable on the fly. IBM also offers

optional nickel metal-hydride batteries that last about 15 percent longer. One of the few innovations in the PS note is its hefty 3.3-pound optional external battery pack, which provides up to 6 additional hours of operation—enough for the longest coast-to-coast flights.

Its 9½-inch sidelit LCD screen is significantly brighter and sharper than the Model L40's. The VGA screen streaks when displaying dark shades of gray as background colors, but running *Windows* with lighter screen colors markedly reduces the effect.

As with past IBM portables, the keyboard is among the PS note's best features. The 84key keyboard maintains IBM's solid, full-travel feel and standard 19mm spacing between keys. It includes the inverted-T cursor-key layout and dedicated <Page Up>, <Delete>, <Insert>, <Page Down>, <Home>, and <End> keys. A numeric keypad, lacking in the L40, is embedded in the QWERTY keyboard.

In light of its dubious ancestry—the IBM Portable PC, the PC Convertible, and the L40 SX—the N51 SX is a competitive product. If only it had shown up last year.

## QuickBooks Opens the Ledger

Intuit's QuickBooks takes small businesses into account.

ike a lot of small-business owners, I'd sooner scrub office floors than attempt to use my current accounting program. It's a tedious and often confusing chore. Quick-Books, Intuit's new accounting package, doesn't make it fun, but it does offer an easy and painless way to keep your books in order.

With its Quicken interface, QuickBooks will seem like an old, trusted friend to smallbusiness owners who've relied on Intuit's best-selling personal finance package to manage their books. But unlike Quicken, QuickBooks is designed for small businesses, which Intuit defines as firms with fewer than 20 employees.

Although QuickBooks is a full-fledged, double-entry accounting package, it insulates

users from most standard accounting terminology. It's also remarkably easy to use, boasting plenty of pop-up lists and keyboard shortcuts. QuickBooks offers extensive hand-holding, including context-sensitive help, a wellorganized manual, and Quick-Trainer, a comprehensive online tutorial that pops up how-to information whenever the keyboard sits idle for too long. You can adjust Quick-Trainer's response time or disable it altogether. The program can maintain accounts for 1000 customers and 1000 vendors.

One of the most cumbersome and daunting accounting tasks is setting up the books. QuickBooks simplifies this chore by offering preset income and expense accounts for 20 types of businesses. And in a move guaranteed to please many small-business owners

edge—QuickBooks does away with arcane account numbers, relying instead on simple account names.

#### Money In, Money Out

QuickBooks keeps track of every nickel with easy-to-follow entry screens that can create invoices and record payments and deposits. You can choose from three predesigned invoices for service, professional, and product-oriented businesses. While these can be customized to fit your individual business needs, you have to go back to the main menu to make such alterations.

The accounts payable section looks like a checkbook register and is just as easy to fill out. Type in the first few letters of a payee's name: If the information's already in your data base, the program fills in



the rest. Otherwise, a payee list appears on screen, which you can amend or use to find the correct account. These lookup tables are available within each module and include lists for customers, vendors, employees, payment terms and methods, and shipping methods.

QuickBooks features standard reports: profit and loss, balance sheet, cash flow, and others. But what sets the report function apart from other accounting programs' is its broad customizing features and the capability to create reports from scratch with only a minimum of effort.

This is a great program if you're more interested in running your small business than becoming an accountant. ⊜

## CompuAdd Turns Up the Heat

Two new 486 desktops with a 12.5-MHz graphics slot and card speed up publishing and CAD apps and give Windows extra pep.



Promising faster graphics at competitive prices, CompuAdd Computer's new upgradable 4865X 420s (shown above) and 486DX 433 feature a special 12.5-MHz ISA bus slot for the company's Hi-Rez VGA video controller.

R aster graphics and lower prices typically mix like oil and water. But don't tell that to CompuAdd Corporation. The Austin, Texas, direct marketer has launched two low-priced 486 desktops that feature a high-speed expansion slot and graphics card to boost the performance of graphics programs.

The 20-MHz 420s is CompuAdd's first 486SX desktop.

The 33-MHz 486DX 433 is the ISA version of the company's 433E EISA PC. Both systems have what CompuAdd engineers call a "hot slot"—a dedicated graphics expansion slot on the ISA bus designed to work with CompuAdd's Hi-Rez VGA video controller card.

Together, the hot slot and the Hi-Rez controller can boost the performance of graphics-intensive applications such as desktop publishing and computer-aided design by about 30 percent, says CompuAdd. Used with CompuAdd's proprietary Hi-Rez card, the hot slot runs at 12.5 MHz instead of the standard 8 MHz of the AT (ISA) bus. You'll see some performance gains running Windows with this graphics combo, but not nearly what you'll get from accelerator chips specifically designed to enhance the performance of Windows.

Both the 420s and the 433 have a secondary 64K RAM cache (expandable to 256K) to boost performance. Both come with a Weitek 4167 math coprocessor socket. To push performance even further, the systems also have an Over-Drive socket, which accepts the Intel

487SX (unnecessary in the 433) or one of Intel's new speed doubler OverDrive 486 chips. The systems will automatically recognize the new CPU—no jumper, BIOS, or software changes are necessary.

Standard features on the 420s and 433 include 4MB RAM, expandable to 64MB, an IDE floppy/hard drive interface, two serial ports, and one parallel port. CompuAdd pre-

loads both MS-DOS 5.0 and Windows 3.0 and provides free, on-site service for one year and unlimited toll-free technical support for the life of the product. A wide variety of options including tape backup units, CD ROM drives, modems, and RAM upgrades are available.

Priced at \$2195, the 420s includes a 40MB hard drive, 5%- and 3%-inch floppy drives, and a high-resolution (1024 by 768) VGA monitor. The same configuration with a monochrome monitor costs \$1895.

The 433, available with a desktop or tower chassis, is priced at \$2795. It includes the same features as the 420s except for its larger 80MB hard drive. With a monochrome monitor the 433 costs \$2495.

If these systems are more machine than you need, CompuAdd's existing lineup is priced competitively. For example, CompuAdd's 333 desktop model costs \$2195 and features a 33-MHz 386 CPU, 4MB of RAM, a 120MB hard drive, and a high-resolution VGA monitor. Not the cheapest 386 on the block, certainly, but one backed by CompuAdd's respected service and support.

#### **An Uncommon Scanner for the Common Scan**

I f you're intrigued by desktop scanners but wary of their cost and complexity, Hewlett-Packard would like a personal word with you. HP's new personal scanner, the ScanJet IIP, makes it easy to add sharp images to your presentations or pull hard copy text onto your hard disk. And at \$1295 list—under \$1000 on the street—it's at the bargain end of the price range for fullpage scanners.

But the real story is the IIP's simplicity. The 300-dpi unit automatically detects what kind of image you're scanning-black-and-white line art or a gray-scale photoand adjusts resolution, brightness, and contrast settings to achieve the highest quality scan. You can also adjust settings manually, cranking resolution up to 1200 dpi for sharper line art, and capture up to 256 shades of gray per image. You can calibrate scan settings to match your output device, or use one of the custom configurations that ship with the unit. And if you get bogged down, you can always call on the scanner's on-line help.

The best news is yet to come. Because the IIP works with the new Twain imaging standard, you'll be able to scan images directly into your document when using any Twainsupported Windows application. Just choose the scan option from the application's file menu, accept the default scan settings, and the image appears at the cursor. (At press time only ZSoft's lowend image editor, *PhotoFinish*, supported Twain; other major Windows vendors are expected to ship Twain products before year-end.)

But image scanning is only half the story. If you want to convert scanned text pages into editable files, you'll need

optical character recognition (OCR) software. The ScanJet IIP ships with a trial version of Caere's *OmniPage Direct*, good for scanning 25 pages. *OmniPage* lets you scan text directly into any *Windows* word processor, page-layout program, or spreadsheet. The program recognizes virtually any font from 6 to 72 points and can retain text character-

istics such as serifs, underlining, and boldface. A pop-up window lets you preview the page as you scan, and the software automatically adjusts settings to compensate for lower quality originals.

Buy the \$300 package—discounted from \$595—and you'll get a code word that turns the trial version into the real thing. But remember: you'll need a

386 or better with at least 4MB of RAM and Windows.

The IIP replaces the HP ScanJet Plus line and comes with *PhotoFinish*. The 12-by-16-inch unit handles originals up to 8.5 by 11 inches; a 20-sheet automatic document feeder costs \$395. As usual, HP backs its workmanship with a one-year warranty.

Standard features of the Pylon line include 1MB of RAM (expandable to 32MB on the motherboard and 64MB total using an add-in board); a math coprocessor socket; and switches for power, keylock, and reset on the front of the machine for easy access. For an extra performance boost, some models have a 64K or 256K RAM cache, which costs a little more. For example, a bare-bones 386SX/25 with no cache costs \$685 but runs \$745 with a 64K RAM cache, says Silicon Valley Computer.

The latest member of the Klonimus family, and its most powerful machine to date, is the Klonimus 486/50, a workhorse available as either a desktop or tower unit and built around Intel's speedy 50-MHz 486 chip.

Standard features include a minimum of 2MB RAM (expandable to 64MB), a socket for a Weitek 4167 math coprocessor, a 64K RAM secondary cache (expandable to 256K), eight 16-bit ISA I/O slots, and one parallel, one game, and two serial ports.

These systems are competitively priced. For example, the 486/50 PC with 4MB of RAM, a 120MB hard drive, two floppies, a super-VGA monitor, DOS 5.0, and *Windows 3.0* costs \$3554—a good price for a fully configured 50-MHz 486.

The other desktop models include a 486/33, a 386/33, a 386/25, a 386/20SX, and a 286/

16. Each model is available in a variety of configurations.

The Klonimus Lite notebook line holds up to two battery packs, which together provide up to 6 hours of operation, according to QSI. You can use the extra battery bay for an Ethernet LAN pack (\$300) or modem pack (\$200).

The 386SX notebook configured with 2MB of RAM and a 20MB hard drive costs \$2200. A similarly configured 286 notebook costs \$1700.

One thing buyers disliked was a desk-hogging design. So the AP-3250 has a tiny 148-square-inch footprint. If that's still too big, you can stand the printer on its side, cutting the footprint in half. If even that's too big for you, Epson says its designers are working on a caddie that will hang the printer off the side of your desk.

Users also said they don't like complicated front control panels, so Epson has stripped the AP-3250's down to a couple of LEDs and two buttons. Configuring the printer is easy: the machine prints a series of questions with yes/no answers and you answer by pressing the appropriate control button. Thanks to thick foam padding and an enclosed printhead, the AP-3250 is also quiet: its noise level has been reduced to 50db, nearly as quiet as a laser.

The AP-3250 comes with Epson's ESC/P2 control language, which gives you two scalable typefaces; you also get five bit-mapped resident fonts. The printer produces graphics at up to 360-dpi resolution and prints at a respectable 200 cps in draft mode.





These extensive collections of Windows shareware programs ensure that you have the right application at the right time—all the time.



Need the right Windows application at the right time? WinLib Library lets you browse through a wealth of shareware listings.

Would you like access to as many *Windows* programs as you could possibly use? Would you enjoy tinkering around with new software more if you didn't have to buy each program first?

Believe it or not, all this and more could be yours (and you don't need a job at *PC World* to get it). For less than \$200, you can buy an amazingly complete collection of *Windows* shareware that will keep you happily playing for days—and productive for a lot longer.

Two such collections are currently on the market. One of them. Windows Shareware Gold, is a joint venture by Nuclear Computing and the Digital Publishing Company. Windows Shareware Gold is a \$179 CD ROM containing 366 programs, 100 bit-mapped images, 120 PostScript fonts, and over 3000 icons. Your other option is the WinLib Library collection from EMS Professional Shareware Libraries. It comes on 120 360K floppies, or 30 1.44MB floppies, for \$149 (a CD ROM version, priced differently, may be available by the time you read this).

If you don't want the whole megillah, EMS sells smaller collections for \$59.50 apiece. These consist of *Windows* applications, utilities, fonts, Visual Basic tools, and fun stuff (icons, games, and wallpaper) from the *WinLib Library* collection.

An important caveat: You're not actually buying the soft-

ware, merely paying for the service of having it collected and sent to you in an easy-to-manage format. If you like a program from the collection and decide to use it regularly, you're expected to register it with the original developer—and pay a registration fee.

If you tend to think of shareware as a good place to catch a virus—have no fear. All the programs included in *Win-Lib Library* and *Windows Shareware Gold* are scanned for viruses when the packages are assembled.

It seems strange to spend \$100 to \$200 for software you haven't even bought, but when you compare the cost of one of these collections to what you'd pay in CompuServe on-line charges for the same programs, it quickly becomes apparent that these are good deals. Besides, it's nice to have the program you need at hand when you realize you need it.



The JetType IIP comes with the same TrueType fonts that are built into *Windows 3.1*, except you get Garamond instead of Courier, a scalable proprietary script face called Swing Bold, and special bitmapped fonts for printing spreadsheets. The advantage here is speed: Because the fonts are created inside the

cartridge, you don't have to wait for *Windows* to rasterize and download them before you can get back to work.

JetType IIP comes with drivers for *WordPerfect 5.0* and *5.1*.

To punch up your Post-Script performance, the \$999 PacificPage II/XL bundles the Series II cartridge with a RISC-based accelerator card containing 4MB of printer RAM. Owners of older Pacific-Page cartridges can obtain the II/XL package for \$499; upgrades to the cartridge alone cost \$99.

#### **FontMaster**

Finally, for users who like to roll their own, Kelly Computing offers a blank programmable cartridge for the Series II and beyond. The FontMaster Cartridge lets you download bit-mapped or scalable fonts, printer macros, scanned images, and electronic forms to the cartridge for faster printing.

The cartridge comes with disks containing 108 bitmapped fonts in sizes from 6 to 24 points, as well as drivers for Windows, Word, WordPerfect, and Ventura Publisher. But customizability doesn't come cheap. The 1MB car-

tridge, which can hold about 100 of Kelly's bit-mapped fonts, retails for \$445; a 2MB version costs \$599.

Mouse navigation is only one highlight of this \$99 bargain. A highly customizable program with a respectable set of features, MicroCourier rivals Crosstalk for Windows in its sizable roster of terminal emulations (from DEC to IBM 3101), and it includes all the standard error-checking protocols, even ZMODEM. The program supports DDE and offers a script language with over 300 commands, variables, and functions-the same language as can be found in Microcom's high-end Relay Gold for Windows.

MicroCourier puts the mouse to work for you with a "hotspot" feature—click your mouse on any letter or word on an on-line menu, and Micro-Courier makes it a hot command button. You can also program hotspots so that MicroCourier will transmit a designated string of characters whenever you click on a particular word while on line. The hotspots aren't foolproof—they work only if you're using TTY emulation, and only if on-line menu choices are set off with a space on either side.

MicroCourier gives you a mini, movable on-screen keyboard that pops up upon connection. You can point and click

on its characters, although most users will find the physical keyboard faster. And while on line, you can run a session in a resizable window.

MicroCourier is highly cus-

Some curious omissions and restrictions mar *MicroCourier* as a multipurpose communicator. It won't answer calls

from computers that aren't running *MicroCourier* or *Relay*. The scrollback buffer, the on-line editor, and the logon learn feature are activated only when the program is running TTY or ANSI emulation.

Despite its rough edges, *MicroCourier* definitely merits a look if you're seeking a *Windows* bargain—especially if you're tired of giving up your mouse when you go on line.

#### Supra-Fast Is a Compact Fax and Data Modem

The trend toward integrat-I ing a fax and data modem in a single unit is well advanced, but only recently have vou been able to find the fastest modem and the fastest fax technology in one package. Now, fantastically fast faxmodems are on the way, thanks to new fax standards and lowcost integrated chip sets. One of the first such products out of the gate, Supra's Supra-FaxModem V.32bis, delivers this one-two punch for only \$399.95.

The SupraFaxModem's fax engine will connect with faxes that support the new V.17, 14,400-baud standard, but it will slow down to communicate with any 9600- and 4800-baud Group III-compatible fax board and machine. The fax is also Class 1 and 2 compatible,

so you can use a variety of software packages to control it. For \$40 more you can buy the package with either the DOS-based *Mirror* and *FaxTalk Plus* software, or the *Windows*-based *WinFax*.

The modem's V.32bis data pump also transmits at 14,400-baud, yet it can talk to 9600-baud V.32 modems as well as slower Hayes-compatible modems. The data modem's industry-standard V.42bis data compression gives you effective throughput that's much higher than rated. As a bonus, the modem includes MNP 10, designed for especially dirty phone lines and cellular links.

The compact 15-ounce unit measures only 1 by 4.5 by 6.5 inches, and it includes a helpful status display that shows up to 25 messages.

Supra Corporation plans to ship extra-cost, user-installable firmware upgrades for voice mail and caller identification by midyear. Supra also sells a V.32 version for \$299.95 that is limited to 9600-baud for both fax and data.

### How Easy Will Windows 3.1 Be?

Experts Predict User Love/Hate Relationships Will Continue



"When Windows 3.0 came out, Microsoft was ill-prepared to support it," says WUGNET's Joel Diamond. "With 3.1, users will get crunched again."

Lalways bliss. Maybe you had no problem installing and using the environment, but most people do. You've almost certainly experienced crashes, unfathomable Unrecoverable Application Errors, and the incompatibilities that send people fleeing back to the DOS prompt.

Like many users, Rita Belserene, a teacher and author in Albany, California, says that *Windows* is easy to use—until it stops working. "Then you get into stuff so arcane it makes basic DOS commands look easy," she remarks.

Don't pin the blame entirely on Microsoft. While pushing DOS's obsolete memory model to the limit and running applications that break all the rules, *Windows* must also work with every semicompatible BIOS, video adapter, and storage

device out there. To its credit, Microsoft has fixed all the major problems reported by *Windows 3.0* users, who deluged Microsoft with up to 2400 calls a day.

But why does Windows still run out of memory while running only one program? When the minimal documentation doesn't help with problems like this, the only recourse has been Microsoft's Windows Resource Kit, which is aimed more at corporate gurus than novices.

Even when *Windows* works straight out of the box, a tune-up can spell trouble. Without a solid understanding of memory usage, disk caching, and the murky workings of INI and PIF files, it's easy to render *Windows* brain damaged. Once you start modifying the base configuration, "you're in danger," cautions developer Morrie Wilson of Seattle's

Wilson WindowWare. "You've either got to trust *Windows* completely, or understand it completely so that you can outguess it."

Users typically find solutions through trial and error or from third parties like the Windows User Group Network (WUGNET) in Media, Pennsylvania, which provides on-line help and a bimonthly technical journal for \$95 a year. "When Windows 3.0 came out, Microsoft was ill-prepared to support it," WUGNET technical director Joel Diamond

says grimly. "With 3.1, users will get crunched again."

### I Love You, I Hate You

Despite its foibles, many people adore *Windows*, with its snazzy interface, multitasking, and portfolio of powerhouse applications. *Windows 3.1*'s greater stability, bundled fonts, tighter application links, and improved speed should boost its acceptance.

Windows product manager Jonathan Roberts emphasizes that fit-and-finish improvements in Windows 3.1 also simplify installation and modification. For instance, improvements to the file properties dialog box and control panel mean that many users won't have to edit INI files by hand.

Often the memory problems that haunt *Windows* can be traced to *Windows 3.0*'s 64K resource limit, which restricts the number of windows and

icons in use. Happily, 3.1 doubles the resource area.

On the flip side, Windows 3.1 is less tolerant of applications that contain minor coding errors. "Users will discover that 3.1 is not as compatible as Microsoft claims," says Diamond. "It will require significant upgrades of third-party applications—utilities as well as core applications."

Roberts responds that Microsoft has worked closely with developers to ensure that most applications will run fine. Nevertheless, he adds, compatibility is not job one: "Our primary focus is making PCs easy to use."


### The Buck Stops Here for Lasers

Printers Will Pump Up Features But Hold Steady on Pricing

Terms hungry for good deals on printers enjoyed a feast in 1991, as vendors dished up a bounty of low-cost personal lasers. PostScript machines, the caviar of page printers, hit the streets at

offering scalable typefaces and knockoffs of HP's Resolution Enhancement technology that provides sharper text, as well as some models featuring 600-dpi engines.

"The standard is moving up

Hamburger Helper prices. And for the first time since the LaserJet debuted, Hewlett-Packard found its piece of the desktop laser pie significantly diminished—from 60 to 46 percent, according to InfoCorp in Santa Clara, California.

Will the prices continue to plunge? Is HP faltering? Don't bet your lunch money on either.

With dealer margins already sliced to the bone, most observers expect list prices for lasers to hold steady at the current floor of around \$1000—about \$650 on the street. "I wouldn't expect to see much action in pricing until some other breakthrough in technology comes," says Bill Sopp, marketing director for Okidata's nonimpact products in Mount Laurel, New Jersey.

What you will get is more printer for your money, as vendors start to beef up fonts, performance, and resolution. Expect a spate of PCL 5 clones to 600 dpi," says Rudy Batties, senior product marketing manager for Adobe Systems in Mountain View, California. However, don't expect to dump your 300-dpi machines anytime soon. A 600-dpi page quadruples the amount of data snaking its way through the parallel port, Batties notes. That means greater potential for bottlenecks, especially with shared printers. Vendors will need to respond with faster I/O, more standard memory, and heavy-duty integration of RISC processors with custom silicon.

### **Shooting From the HP**

Last year's introduction of the \$1595 LaserJet IIIP boosted HP's sales at the 4-ppm level. The debut of the IIISi, a rugged 17-ppm network printer, had a similar effect at the high end. But the 8-ppm market that was once HP's mainstay has dropped.

"Two years ago if you gave corporate users the choice between buying one 20-ppm printer for their network or three 8-pagers, they'd have chosen the latter," says Batties. "Today they'd go for the big printer. Why? The IIISi."

The \$5500 IIISi was the first HP laser to offer an integrated PostScript option and fast RISC processor as well as high-speed network interface cards. "You'll see more [Post-Script] integration in our lower-end products," says Steve Simpson, general manager of HP's Boise, Idaho, printer division. "You'll also see us upgrading our processors—possibly RISC, certainly higher performance—and it's safe to assume we'll continue to enhance PCL." HP will also introduce fast networking cards for its 8-ppm line, positioning the midrange printers as a solution for smaller work groups.

### **PostScript Gains Share**

Not long ago you could buy three LaserJets for the cost of one Apple LaserWriter IINTX, the PostScript flagship. Now NEC, TI, and Okidata are selling Adobe Post-Script models at street prices only a few hundred dollars higher than the PCL 5-based IIIP's, with a substantial edge in fonts and graphics power. Small wonder PostScript quietly climbed from 14 to 18 percent of the total laser market last year, according to BIS Strategic Decisions in Norwell, Massachusetts.

"What's really driving this move is the graphical interface," says Okidata's Sopp. "For WYSIWYG documents and scalable fonts, PostScript is the optimal solution."

But Adobe's page descrip-


tion language isn't likely to supplant PCL soon. "People buy a PostScript printer because they want a PostScript printer;" says Mick O'Rourke, marketing vice president at Pacific Data Products in San Diego. "People buy a PCL printer because it says HP on it. It's not a language-tolanguage battle at all."

Are low-cost PostScript printers taking a bite out of HP's lunch? "The font cartridge vendors are suffering," says Sopp, "but that's driven more by capabilities within Windows." Pacific Data's O'Rourke agrees that Windows 3.1's scalable TrueType fonts will affect sales of cartridge-based fonts, such as the PacificPage PostScript cartridge. "But one of the effects is that it gets people more excited about scalable type, and then they'll want Post-Script. Getting those other 22 TrueType fonts will cost you, and you still have to deal with issues of speed, convenience, and networking."

### **486 PCs Enter the Mainstream**

Price Premium Over 386 Machines Has Dwindled Dramatically


Last December Charles Shepard, micro systems manager for Mirage Resorts in Las Vegas, was planning to buy nine PCs. He had recently spent almost \$5000 for a 486-based system and expected to save money by ordering 20-MHz 386SXs from Dell Computer. But "all of a sudden the price started dropping on the 486s, and I realized it didn't make sense to buy 386s," remembers Shepard.

A year ago a 486-based PC was considered an expensive high-performance platform that only a true power user could justify. But now "it's a very small jump from the 386 to the 486," notes Phil Deering, senior product manager for Northgate Computer Systems in Eden Prairie, Minnesota. For example, the Northgate 33-MHz 486 ZXP with a 100MB hard drive and super-VGA monitor cost only \$2699 at press time. Archrival Dell of Austin, Texas, has slashed the price on its similar 486P to \$2898. AST Research, Compaq, Everex, IBM, NEC, and others are following suit.

### **Processor Prices Plummet**

Vendors attribute the lower prices partly to improved manufacturing efficiencies, product line changes, and the rise of alternate distribution channels such as mail order and superstores. But the biggest factor, they say, is declining microprocessor costs.

Pressured by compatible 386 chips from Advanced Micro Devices and other rivals, "Intel feels it's got to lower its prices for 486 products," explains Casey Dworkin, general manager of Personal Technology Research in Waltham, Massachusetts. The plan is to move customers to the higher

platform before competitors can follow. So a 33-MHz 486 CPU, priced over \$800 a year ago, was selling for \$417 this winter. At the low end, Intel is fitting its 16-MHz 486SX chip with a cheap plastic package and planning to sell it for as little as \$100 by year-end.

### **Users Climb on Board**

The combination of falling system prices and an onslaught of resource-hungry graphical applications is driving corporate America toward the 486. "My network loves them," notes Mirage's Shepard. "With the 486s I'm a hero because the users become so much more efficient."

Paul Bromwell agrees. As director of information systems with Frost and Jacobson, a law firm in Cincinnati, Bromwell was set on buying 30 386DXs a few months ago. Then price tags on 486SXs slid under \$2500. "Our feeling was, hey, it's \$200 cheaper than the 386DXs, it runs Windows better, and it's got an upgrade path," says Bromwell.

### **Truly Upwardly Mobile**

Buying into 486 technology may also offer better protection from obsolescence. Most computer manufacturers are offering chip-upgradable systems that allow users who buy an entry-level 486SX to move up to a full-powered 486 without having to replace their entire system. While upgradable PCs have been around for years without users taking much notice, this new scheme promises to change all that because upgrades should be simple, cheap, and effective. "Part of the reason we went with the 486SX was because all we have to do is swap in the 486 chip to upgrade," says Bromwell.

And the upgrade promise doesn't stop there—Intel's new OverDrive chips will run internally at twice the original clock speed in suitably designed systems.


"A lot of people have been burned in the past by buying 286 and 386SX machines," says Dan Shepard, marketing director at AST Research in Irvine, California. "They're looking further into the future today because they want a system that will last two or three years. The 33-MHz 486 has a long way to go before it becomes obsolete."

No longer able to differentiate on price, computer makers keep struggling to gain an edge in innovation. For example, AST integrates super-VGA capability onto the motherboard, Dell exploits flash memory to let you upgrade system BIOS via floppy disk, and Northgate promotes a socket that simplifies chip upgrades. And they're all racing to boost performance with "local bus video" designs, which place the graphics controller on the same high-speed bus as the motherboard.

Dell Computer slashed prices in a big way again in February, and its System 333P is the desktop Bargain of the Month¹ while the System NX20 carries off portable Bargain of the Month honors. Starting with this issue, InfoCorp's Storeboard Channel Tracking Service adds computer store sales to traditional dealer sales—which accounts for the sudden appearance of the CompuAdd 316s in fourth place on the best-seller list. IBM's 3-year-old PS/2 Model 55 SX, which is being replaced by various SX models introduced in the past year, will soon retire as champion. Throughout the industry, the steady barrage of price cuts continues. With prices tumbling on high-end CPUs, PCs based on those processors offer greatly improved price/performance. Northgate's Elegance line neatly demonstrates this—a 33-MHz 486 PC costs only 21 percent more than a 33-MHz 386 system.

### **CPUs Don't Dominate System Costs**



you can spiff up your output with a collection of PostScript fonts or a huge clip-art library that would otherwisefill a briefcase with floppies. And if you're ready to enter the exciting world of multimedia, CD ROM is a must.

This review covers 14 of the hottest new CD ROM drives on the market. We chose either the fastest drive or the multimedia model from each vendor; street prices ranged from around \$400 to \$1000. If your CD ROM needs are confined to simple text applications, you can find slower drives that can do the job for around \$300. The drives we reviewed were external models, which are a bit easier to install, but most vendors will sell you an internal drive for about \$100 less that takes up no more room than a 5%-inch floppy drive.

### The Multimedia Connection

While text-only business applications still make up the bulk of CD ROMs, multimedia reference, education, and entertainment disks are already arriving in force, providing high-quality graphics, sound, and animation.

Add one of these CD ROM drives and a soundboard to your home system, and you can enjoy encyclopedias, educational titles, dictionaries, atlases, and games that leave the likes of *Flight* 

Simulator in the dust. A CD ROM

tions are your thing,

drive will soon be an indispensable accessory for your office PC. Early users of *Multimedia Microsoft Works* CD ROM agree that multimedia tutorials are far more compelling than step-by-step exercises. As the use of onscreen presentations escalates, vanguard presenters are using animation and PC-generated sound to get their points across. Sound and animation clip libraries on CD can help make such productions much easier (see "Multimedia Presents" in this issue).

At log-on, a CD ROM drive looks and feels like a hard disk—with two key differences. You can't write data to a CD ROM, and compared to the faster fixed hard disk, the CD ROM player seems to be stuck in neutral. The typical 300ms to 500ms average access times of most CD ROM players pale in comparison to the 16ms you'll get with a fast hard drive.

Still, just about any CD ROM player will perform adequately for accessing text-only data bases. However, when you start flirting with multimedia—digital audio, high resolution graphics, and motion video—access speed and data throughput become critical. Slower CD ROM drives stumble over animation or video clips and leave you with a jerky or stop-action presentation.

All the CD ROM players here claim sequential data transfer rates of 150 kilobits per second (kbps) or better, which fits the Multimedia PC Marketing Council (MPC) guidelines for multimedia CD ROM drives. To see if our players can handle real multimedia applications, we ran them through a variety of tough application-based performance and raw throughput tests (see "Buying Smart" and the Test Report). Even though our raw throughput tests are more demanding than those used by vendors in rating their drives, most of our drives stood up well to multimedia, playing motion video clips smoothly. The NEC Intersect CDR-73M actually exceeded 150 kbps on PC World's tough data throughput tests.

Three drives earned Best Buys:

NEC's CDR-73M and Toshiba's TXM-3301E are the top multipurpose drives, with a winning combination of hot performance, thoughtful design, fair pricing, and solid support; Sony's Best Buy CDU-7205 Laser Library adds a terrific CD ROM bundle for home use. Two other players merit special mention: CD Technology's Porta-Drive T3301 is ideal for notebook users, and the Corel Blockbuster CD ROM Bundle is the desktop publisher's choice. Whether you need to search volumes of demographic data to save your business, zip out a stunning presentation to save your career, or spin through a multimedia encyclopedia to save your kid's education, one of these drives should do the job.

### \* \* 1/2 CD Technology Porta-Drive T3301

**PROS:** Very fast, small size, automatic lens cleaning, sealed mechanism **CONS:** No power-on indicator

If your business card reads "have notebook, will travel," you'll love CD Technology's \$599 Porta-Drive. It's a fast, fly-anywhere portable that requires little room for landing. The Toshiba-manufactured drive boasts a 325ms average access time and handled our tests with ease, coming in first on the MPC demo—a selected multimedia sequence combining music, narration, graphics, text, and user input. We ran tests with CD Technology's standard Trantor T128 SCSI host

adapter, but for an extra \$20, the new T339 parallel-to-SCSI adapter option (unavailable at test time but now shipping) will let you move the drive from notebook to PC without a standard internal adapter. If you're deskbound, CD Technology has an internal model that can save you more than \$100.

Documentation, setup, and installation are all straightforward. The drive features an external dust seal and an automatic lens cleaner to protect you on the road. If you need to travel with huge chunks of data—or you're lucky enough to have a custom CD ROM presentation—the CD Technology Porta-Drive is the best portable player you can buy.



### **Corel Draw Blockbuster CD ROM Bundle**

**PROS:** Very fast; deep competitive discount; bundled Corel Draw, clip art, fonts **CONS:** Expensive for general-purpose users

Team up a fast Toshiba 3301 CD ROM drive with Corel's SCSI interface, and toss in *Corel Draw 2.01*. Add a collection of 10,000 clip-art images, 1000 *Corel Draw* images, 52 new fonts, and stir. The Corel Draw Blockbuster CD ROM Bundle is hot and ready to serve. The Toshiba-built drive is a tremendous performer: A virtual twin to the Toshiba TXM-3301E, it passed every multimedia and throughput test with flying col-

ors. And you'll find every design detail done to perfection.

You'll have to pony up a steep \$1052 (\$100 less for the internal), but over \$1000 worth of free software makes this a great deal for graphic artists. If you're a registered user of *Micrografx Designer, Arts & Letters, Aldus Freehand* (PC), *Adobe Illustrator* (PC), *Harvard Draw*, or *Gem Artline*, you can buy the bundle for \$695 and nail down a *real* bargain. The average business user might not need all these drawing tools, but if presentations or desktop publishing are part of your business, this package has your name on it.

### **Buying Smart: CD ROM With an Eye Toward the Future**

You buy a CD ROM drive to get easy, affordable access to information—whether in text form or as multimedia sound and video. CD ROM data files are laid down sequentially and never rewritten, so sustained transfer rates are generally more important than average access time, especially when you're dealing with sound and graphics. Quick average access is most meaningful when you're seeking scattered information from text data bases, multimedia dictionaries, and so on. We found drives with the fastest transfer rates had the quickest random seeks.



### PERFORMANCE

We found most manufacturers' speed ratings to

be a fair indicator of a drive's speed. Our Test Report shows each drive's average data throughput, ability to perform random seeks, and multimedia capabilities running *PC World*'s application suite. You may be able to tell the difference between a fast and a slow drive when retrieving CD ROM text, but you'll really see the difference in multimedia. A sluggish drive is most irksome when you're trying to run motion video—you'll see either bursts of motion interrupted by pauses, or a series of stop-action images.

Most of our drives handled every multimedia application we threw at them. Our overall speed champ, the Best Buy NEC CDR-73M, actually exceeded 150 kilobits per second in our varied data throughput tests.



### DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

If your system has an

open, externally accessible storage bay, consider an internal drive, which costs about \$100 less. We chose to review

externals because you can easily move them between PCs and you don't have to give up a bay. Although all external drives are portable, some, such as the CD Technology Porta-Drive T3301 and the Liberty 115CD-P, are lighter and smaller and offer special parallel-to-SCSI interface options that let you plug them into a printer port.

All CD ROM players need an interface, whether a card that plugs into an empty slot or an external adapter that plugs into a parallel port. All vendors offer either SCSI (small computer systems interface) or similar proprietary adapters with high throughput capabilities. The two portables offer an external parallel-to-SCSI adapter—unavailable in time for formal tests. Preliminary tests, however, indicate that its throughput will compare well with an internal card. We priced all our drives with their fastest interfaces. But when you query vendors, make sure the adapter is included and ask if higherperformance options are available. Also note that with one exception (the Pinnacle Micro External PCD-102), you can daisy-chain multiple drives.

Unless you work in a dust-free environment, look for a drive with dust protection: a door that seals the motors and optical elements against contaminants, a mechanism that cleans the lens automatically, or both.

All units tested will play audio CDs—most have the necessary software—and all include a headphone jack and volume control so you can listen to audio direct from the drives. If you want to amplify output, look for RCA phono jacks for easy connection to an amplifier or soundboard.

You'll also see a variation in stated capacity, ranging from 540MB to 680MB, but none of the drives in our

roundup had any problem reading Microsoft Bookshelf for Windows, a CD ROM that contains close to 650MB of data. The Best Buy Toshiba drive tied with the Corel, Hitachi, and Panasonic players for top overall design.



### PRICE

There are some terrific bargains here. For every

player (except those that sell direct), we call at least three dealers in eight major U.S. cities for street price quotes. We then average the results for each system. We price all players with interface cards, cabling, and the software necessary to install and run them. The Pinnacle Micro External PCD-102 was the low-price leader.



### COMPATIBILITY

We tested compatibility with Microsoft's *Multi-*

media Extensions for Windows, which adds support for CD ROM, sound cards, and motion video to Windows 3.0. We also tested with the ISO 9660 format and the older High Sierra. All drives scored four stars.



### SERVICE AND SUPPORT

All the vendors offer at

least a 12-month parts and labor warranty, but NEC and Todd give you an exceptional two years. Most players breezed through installation, the most common time to encounter problems. If you need help, each company offers a central support number, and nine vendors offer toll-free support. We evaluated support by calling each company three times and judging accuracy and responsiveness, giving extra credit for long hours, fax lines, and BBS's. Texel scored highest on service and support.



### Hitachi/Multimedia Systems CDR-1750S

**PROS:** Top motion video performance, sealed, dust-free chassis, automatic lens cleaning **CONS:** Fairly expensive, slow support response

If you plan to run your CD ROM in hostile, dusty environments, check out the durable Hitachi CDR-1750S. Its dust protection scheme is among the best, with a a double-door external defense combined with automatic lens cleaning. The CDR-1750S is also a 3%-star performer, racking up respectable multimedia scores—including a first place on the motion video sequence—and running fluid motion video.

The superbly designed box has one annoying if relatively minor flaw: The eject button is directly below the power switch, making it too easy to accidentally power down. In addition, Hitachi's technical service was just so-so; the answers we received were accurate and complete, but the technicians were slow getting back to us. Finally, its \$760 street price is not likely to attract buyers on a tight budget. Considering its fine motion video performance and protective design features, however, the Hitachi is a very good buy, especially if you need a sturdy drive that can stand up to heavy service.



### **Liberty Systems Liberty 115CD-P**

PROS: Portable, plugs into parallel port
CONS: Expensive, no hardware documentation
The Liberty 115CD-P, like the CD

Porta-Drive T3301, is light, small, and designed with the road in mind; Liberty even gives you a built-in SCSI-to-parallel interface. Unfortunately, the vendor was in transition at test time and was unable to supply the new Trantor T339 adapter that boosts throughput and corrects compatibility problems found with the earlier model T338. We tested the 115CD-P configured as an external, bypassing the internal interface and

using a standard host adapter installed in our test PC. The speedy drive scored well in all categories, missing first place on the text retrieval test by an eyelash.

Installation was easy, and Liberty throws in a test program to verify that everything is running up to snuff. Oddly, Liberty includes documentation for the SCSI interface but no manual for the drive. And you'll have to watch out for road grime, as there's no dust protection. The drive, with its distinctive black case, is a pricey \$999, so it's not a great choice for the desktop. But the internal interface makes it into a nice travel mate.



### **NEC Intersect CDR-73M**

PROS: Fastest drive tested, automatic lens cleaning, two-year warranty
CONS: No external dust seal

Are you looking for a CD ROM drive that can handle any job you throw at it and leaves the path wide open to multimedia? The Best Buy NEC Intersect CDR-73M is our hands-down performance champ. In fact, this is the only drive reviewed that exceeded a 150-kbps average data transfer rate in our tests, resulting in butter-smooth motion video. Moreover, the unit's first-place showing on the random display test reveals

that the CDR-73M, with its scorching 280ms average access time, will give you top-speed text searches.

Setup and installation are no sweat, and other perks include a TSR for playing audio CDs, and automatic lens cleaning. The \$577 street price is tempting; an internal version could save another \$75 or so. We'd like an emergency eject button and a sealed caddy door for better dust protection. But if you want the fastest CD ROM drive you can get—bar none—with a generous warranty and a low price, the CDR-73M is your Best Buy.

### **Optimize Your CD ROM Setup**

Here are a few speedup tips.

- If your application doesn't install its access software on a hard disk by default, do it manually. This will save time at start-up and while running if the program must read overlays as you work.
- Increase the RAM allocated to cache reads. The amount is specified in the MSCDEX.EXE line, probably in your AUTOEXEC.BAT file. Look for the /M

switch and increase the number. If there's no /M switch, you've allocated MSCDEX's default 10 buffers. Each buffer uses 2K of memory; with DOS 5.0, you may be able to move buffers into high memory.

- Use a good disk caching program and allocate as much RAM as you can spare to the cache. Remember that the cache comes out of system RAM, although it will take advantage of extended or expanded memory.
- When you purchase your drive, buy the interface option with the fastest possible throughput.

We test each CD ROM drive with its interface and software device drivers configured occording to the manufocturer's recommended settings. CD Technology and Liberty were unable to supply a porollel-to-SCSI interface far their portable drives, so we tested them with a Trontor T-128 installed in our test PC. Our test system consists af o 50-MHz 486-bosed PC equipped with 8MB RAM, 256K external cache memory, and o 239MB hord disk. The test videa subsystem includes a 1024 by 768 VGA cord with 1MB of videa RAM and a multifrequency super-VGA color monitor. The test audio subsystem consists of a Saund Bloster audia card. Heodphones and/or speakers (as equipped) are used to gouge overall sound quality.

### Average data thraughput

We transfer a 1164K test file using data block sizes of 8K, 16K, 32K, and 64K. We measure the speed of transfer for differing block sizes and calculate the overage throughput.

### Text retrieval

We record the elapsed retrieval time far o 2.5MB text file.

### Randam display

We compile a library of 36 black-and-white imoges, with the images scottered in different locations on the CD ROM. Each image is retrieved ond displayed in sequence ond the elopsed time measured.

**Super-VGA display**We view three super-VGA images. We record the

elapsed time to retrieve and display each image, ond calculate the overage.

### Mation video sequence

We access an animoted sequence and recard the time af completian.

### **MPC** demonstration

We initiote a multimedia sequence that incorporotes music, narrotian, grophics, text, and user input from the keybaard. We record the elopsed time to complete the sequence.



### Panasonic LK-MC501S

PROS: Fast, power-save mode

CONS: Moderately expensive, technical

support unresponsive

Are you the type who switches off the light every time you leave a room? If so, the Panasonic LK-MC501S's unique power-saving mode will have special appeal. If the drive sits idle for 5 minutes, it powers down—so you save on electricity and motor wear. When needed, the drive snaps right back on. The LK-MC501S teams up with the Future Domain adapter to produce excellent overall performance, despite a laid-back 500ms average access rating and a poor showing on the ran-

dom display test. The drive handled multimedia easily—trailing the leader by just 3 seconds on the MPC demo and smoothly playing the motion video sequence.

In addition, you get automatic lens cleaning and trouble-free setup. We do have minor complaints about the 18-inch connecting cable, which was a little short, and the \$722 street price, which was a little steep. And we worry that novice users may be put out by long waits for callbacks from Panasonic's none-too-helpful support technicians. Still, the Panasonic's fine design and excellent motion video performance make it a very good value for multimedia users.



### Pinnacle Micro External PCD-102

**PROS:** Best price in roundup, doesn't require disk caddy, good documentation **CONS:** Slow, can't daisy-chain units

Bargain hunters: At \$406, the Pinnacle Micro PCD-102 is the least expensive drive here. And the Pinnacle's fast, easy popout design requires no disk caddy—just like your audio CD player. Installation and setup are easy, and home users will appreciate the free *World Atlas* CD ROM from Software Toolworks. Pinnacle also sells a portable model with a parallel-to-SCSI interface for the same price, or an internal for \$100 less.

Pinnacle's Micro External PCD-102 managed a smooth motion video sequence, but the drive's times were too slow to keep up with the action. The unit's average access rating is a sluggish 600ms, and the Pinnacle came in next to last in overall performance. Unlike the other units we tested, the Pinnacle doesn't allow you to daisy-chain multiple drives, so you're out of luck if you want truly massive storage using a single interface. If you're on a tight budget, the Pinnacle may be worth a look. But remember that only \$100 more will buy you the much faster Procom MCD-ROM650.

### Pioneer DRM-600A

**PROS:** Changer automatically loads up to six CD ROMs; programs up to six audio CDs **CONS:** Expensive, slowest in roundup

Make way for the undisputed storage champ of our roundup, the Pioneer DRM-600A. The bulky Pioneer unit connects you to over 3GB of data, and you don't have to lift a finger—it works just like an audio CD changer and holds up to six CD ROMs. You can assign a drive letter to each disk or configure all six disks as a single device.

Bigger doesn't necessarily mean faster: The Pioneer was slowest in the roundup, straggling in last on the super-VGA

display and MPC demo. Sorry, multimedia fans. Unless you want moving pictures that resemble an early Charlie Chaplin flick, stick to text and still images with this Pioneer. The \$1045 price is steep even considering the DRM-600A's mammoth storage. At press time Pioneer announced the fall release of a hot multimedia CD ROM changer drive. For an extra \$200, the drive will feature sub-300ms average access times, enhanced throughput, and a whopping 128K built-in buffer. In the meantime, if you need access to a multidisk text data base, this juke-box may be playing your song. Most users, however, will be better off looking elsewhere or waiting for the new drive.



### **PLI CD ROM Drive 10305**

**PROS:** Fast, automatic lens cleaning **CONS:** No power-on indicator, unnecessarily technical documentation

PLI's entry in our multimedia sweepstakes—the \$648 CD ROM 10305—is the effective union of a Sony-manufactured drive and a PLI QuickSCSI adapter card. While the drive's 380ms average access rating doesn't take it to the top of the heap, it still managed a four-star speed rating and a first-place finish on the text retrieval test. The PLI also took all our multimedia tests in stride and played the video clips well.

Although there's outer sealing on this unit, PLI also provides automatic lens cleaning. You can daisy-chain as many as seven drives if you need big-time storage. And Peripheral Land throws in a sample CD ROM of *Nautilus*, a *Windows* multimedia magazine on CD ROM.

The PLI's drawbacks include confusing, overly technical manuals, no power-on indicator, and a cable too short to allow placement of the drive on top of a tower system. Despite these minor flaws, the PLI is a very good choice, especially if rapid text access is a must.

### **Procom MCD ROM650**

**PROS:** Fast, great price, automatic lens cleaning **CONS:** No installation program or RCA jacks

Want a speedy drive for a temptingly low

street price? The \$492 Procom MCD ROM650 has you covered. Its overall performance was excellent, and it tied the Best Buy NEC for second on the MPC demo. Multimedia mavens will be happy with the drive's smooth rendition of motion video.

Procom gives plenty of dust protection with a pulldown door and automatic lens cleaning. Technical support was responsive and accurate, and novices will almost surely need it: There's no installation program, so you have to copy files and revise AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS manually. Further, this model has no RCA jacks for audio output, so you'll have to connect to a soundboard via the headphone jack. Procom's even cheaper PXCD-650S drive, which is configured for multimedia, has the jacks, but its speed rating doesn't match the MCD ROM650's. Finally, Procom ships the only full-length interface card in the roundup—it requires a completely unobstructed slot. If you can live with these rough edges, the Procom will give you the best price-performance ratio of the pack.



### Sony Laser Library CD ROM System CDU7205

**PROS:** Fast, very good price, easy installation, includes headphones and six CD ROMs

**CONS:** Spotty technical support

The Sony Laser Library CDU7205 is aimed at home users, and it's bound to be a family pleaser with its free *Compton's Family Encyclopedia*, Software Toolworks' *World Atlas*, National Geographic's *Mammals, Microsoft Bookshelf, Languages of the World*, and *Mixed-Up Mother Goose*. PROS: Excellent price, fast

CONS: No audio jacks, no power indicator

Texel cut its CD ROM teeth on rugged

drives used in industrial applications, but the company's sleek, budget-priced DM-5021 CD ROM drive seems to be more of a racehorse than a workhorse. Aimed at the multimedia market, the DM-5021 pairs its 340ms-rated drive with an efficient Trantor T128 SCSI host adapter and comes up with a solid four-star performer. Adding to the Texel's assets, service and support tested very well, and the DM-5021 drive's \$459 street price was the second lowest in the roundup.

Although performance and price are top-notch, design amenities are fairly spare. The Texel DM-5021 lacked some extras like emergency eject and automatic lens cleaning, and the absence of RCA output jacks means you have to use the headphone jack to feed audio signals to a soundboard or amplifier. Texel manufactures several other models, including internals and portable models with parallel-to-SCSI interfaces. Unfortunately, the confusing, poorly translated manuals cover all of the available models in one breath. For many users, however, the DM-5021's speed, price, and support will more than make up for the lack of polish.



CONS: Out-of-date CD ROM demo







ith today's business software you can create charts and graphs as colorful as any Disney cartoon. But when it's time to print those graphics, chances are you resort to plain old black and white. Worse, your information is probably being muddled in the process. The bars in your bar charts are rendered in only slightly different shades of gray, you can't tell one dotted line from another in line graphs, and cross-hatching patterns make your pie charts look like plaid nightmares.

It doesn't have to be this way. With one of today's increasingly capable and affordable color printers, you can make those charts and graphs easier to understand by printing them in full, clear color.

Plus, if you put a black-and-white copy of

how color printing can give your work an edge over the monochrome competition.

What kind of color printer is right for you? For most business buyers, the answer is a color liquid ink jet. With list prices between \$895 and \$2995, these machines are affordably suited to a variety of everyday business applications.

Liquid ink jets work by spraying droplets of black, cyan, magenta, and yellow ink onto the page. They're best at producing solid blocks of uncomplicated primary and secondary colors—just the ticket for straightforward business graphics. So while the output from liquid ink jets won't win any art contests, it's perfectly serviceable for the transparencies, flip charts, and handouts you use in pre-

> sentations and for adding color charts and other graphics to in-house reports.





Because they can't compete with black-and-white lasers in output quality or speed, you'll never use color ink jets as everyday printers. (The ink jet printers we tested averaged around 2 pages per minute [ppm] on pure text, while lasers start at around 4 ppm.) If you're doing finely detailed design work or

printing materials for an important outof-house audience, you'll probably want the higher quality output of a *thermal transfer* or *solid ink jet* printer. Thermal transfer and solid ink jet printers are typically faster as well. Unfortunately, these machines cost about four times more than liquid ink jets (see the sidebar "The Next Step Up: Thermal Transfer and Solid Ink Jet Printers").

### **True Colors**

For this review, we looked at six leading color ink jets on the market today, testing their standard, off-the-shelf configurations. We ran them through a series of

### **Buying Smart: Color Your World**

Color printers may seem exotic, but basic printer buying issues still apply. The most important consideration is output quality, and your eyes are the best judge of that. Additionally, you'll want to answer a few fundamental questions: Will the printer work with your software? Is its front panel designed for business users or astronauts? Can it handle a variety of paper sizes and fonts? And does the vendor offer enough customer service and support to get you back to work quickly when things go awry?



### **OUTPUT QUALITY**

Liquid ink jets won't match laser printers in

text output quality or thermal transfer printers in color graphics. We noticed surprising variations in quality from printer to printer (see the sidebar "The Proof's in the Printing") and even when printing from different applications on the same printer. But if you shop carefully, you can find perfectly acceptable output. When examining print samples, look for deep, even ink coverage in areas of solid color. Watch for banding (visible strips of ink left by each pass of the printhead) and poor color registration. Compare each printer's handling of fine lines-are they smudged or reasonably sharp?—and check the legibility of text, particularly when it's printed on a colored background.

When judging output quality, we

gave some weight to resolution, which can help create fine lines, crisp, smooth text, and dense, well-mixed colors. However, high resolution is no guarantee of great output. HP's DeskJet 500C and Mannesmann Tally's MT92 C, for example, both boast 300-dot-per-inch resolution, but while the 500C excels at output quality, the MT92 C had problems with smudged letters.



### **PERFORMANCE**

Liquid ink jets are not fast. These printers man-

age between 1 and 3 pages per minute (ppm) on our text tests, compared with the 4-ppm rated speeds of low-end black-and-white lasers. They slowed considerably on graphics. While you can expect 1-to-3-ppm graphics output from non-PostScript lasers, you'll be lucky to break 0.5 ppm on an ink jet; HP's DeskJet 500C took over 12 minutes to print a *Corel Draw* page.

When judging overall speed, we emphasized tasks for which these printers are best suited—printing charts and graphs from spreadsheets and presentation graphics software. As the *Quattro Pro* and *Harvard Graphics* tests indicate, the HP PaintJet scored well on these tasks. If you insist on using these machines for more detailed graphics, note that the PaintJet and the Sharp JX-735 both did well printing

from Corel Draw. For printing text in color, you can't beat the DeskJet 500C.



### PRICE

For street prices, we asked dealers around

the country for their prices on standard, off-the-shelf configurations, then averaged those quotes. Prices ranged from \$666 for the Kodak Diconix Color 4 to \$2857 for the Mannesmann Tally MT92 C.

Initial purchase price isn't the whole story. You'll pay 10 cents or so for each sheet of coated stock (unless you're using the Kodak) and \$1-plus for each sheet of special transparency film. Colored inks average around 10 cents a page, depending on how much of the page you're covering: Colored line graphs on white backgrounds require less ink than bar charts on colored backgrounds.



### COMPATIBILITY

Software support was a surprisingly common

problem with these printers: Three of the six were unable to run at least one of our speed tests. All these printers come with a *Windows* driver, but their support for DOS programs is spotty. Check your user manuals and printer spec sheets to see which printers work with your applications.

If your DOS application doesn't have a driver for a given printer, you

tests using *Corel Draw*, *Harvard Graphics*, *Quattro Pro*, and *WordPerfect* and rated the results for print quality and output speed. We averaged street prices from around the country for each machine and tested each vendor's customer service skills. Finally, we took a hard look at software compatibility,

which was often surprisingly poor, as well as design and construction, font and color options, and paper handling skills.

In the end, Hewlett-Packard's venerable PaintJet XL emerged as our Best Buy. This burly workhorse produced high-quality output at top speeds with little fuss, making it a great choice for

work groups that prepare a lot of presentations. Kodak's Diconix Color 4 was a close runner-up and, with its incredibly low price and intelligent, compact design, would be good for desktop printing. Though the Color 4 lacks the Paint-Jet's connectivity skills, it has the advantage of being the only printer here that

may still be able to print if your printer has a PaintJet emulation. Printers with DeskJet, Epson, and Proprinter emulations can handle most text work, while an HP-GL plotter emulation will help if you're doing CAD work.



### SERVICE AND SUPPORT

As with any printer pur-

chase, look for at least a one-year warranty, toll-free tech support, access to tech support by fax or modem, enough daily support hours to fit your schedule, and, ideally, on-site service. To rate service and support, we called each vendor three times to ask typical customer questions. We graded on speed of response and accuracy of answers and factored in the vendors' service policies. Support proved uniformly good, but both Sharp and Tektronix received demerits for their skimpy 90-day warranties.



### DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

Good design and con-

struction means convenience: snap-in ink cartridges, low-ink indicators, and front-panel controls. Good design also means a buffer big enough to handle the work load—the bigger the buffer, the faster you and your co-workers can get back to work. Plan on at least 32K for simple, single-user work, 100K if

you use downloaded fonts, and as much as you can get if you're sharing the printer with your work group. If you're sharing the printer, good design also means having enough of the right kind of ports and a high enough rated duty cycle to give you some idea of whether or not it will stand up to heavy use.

Both the HP PaintJet XL and the Kodak Diconix Color 4 earned high marks for their design.



### **FONTS AND COLORS**

None of these ink jets can compete with a LaserJet

for font options. While the typical laser comes with at least 14 typefaces, most of these printers offer 1 or 2; the HP DeskJet 500C is the lone exception, giving you 3 bit-mapped fonts and, with its *Windows* driver, an additional 4 scalable typefaces. If you need fancier type, look for a printer that can handle downloaded fonts or font cartridges, but remember that downloading fonts to a small print buffer can slow performance.

When it comes to graphics printing, one of the nicest options an ink jet can give you is a special transparency or high-density mode. In this mode, the printer makes extra passes over each page, producing colors saturated enough for overhead projection. And while all these printers come with four inks—cyan, magenta, yellow, and black—the HP DeskJet 500C and the

Mannesmann Tally MT92 C have only two ink cartridges, one for the three colors and a second for black. Four cartridges are better than two because with four, you can replace a single color without replacing others.



### PAPER HANDLING

Paper handling is the Achilles' heel of liquid ink

jets. For printing on paper, all the printers reviewed but the Kodak require special coated stock. Plain paper absorbs water-based ink like a sponge, resulting in bleeding and washed-out colors. Coated stock eliminates this problem, allowing sharper and more exact ink coverage. For printing transparencies, all the printers require specially treated film that can hold the liquid inks.

Because you'll use a color printer less than you would a regular black-and-white printer, paper capacity is less of a consideration. If you're sharing the printer with your work group, capacity for 100 sheets of paper should suffice to keep you from running to the supply cabinet too often. Adjustable paper trays, which can handle a variety of stock sizes, are handy, as is the ability to use continuous form paper, which is good enough for draft work and cheaper than cut sheets.

prints acceptably on plain paper—the others require expensive coated stock for best results.

A color printer can't guarantee sales or change minds, but it can make your work clearer and more memorable. With prices falling and software support expanding, the day may come when you won't be able to compete without one.

### Hewlett-Packard DeskJet 500C

**PROS:** Great output quality, low price, high resolution, scalable fonts in Windows


CONS: Slow graphics printing, no true blacks

Despite its low \$767 street price, the DeskJet 500C doesn't skimp on output quality. The 500C produces sharp 300-dpi graphics and surprisingly bright, well-mixed colors, making it a good choice for everything from spreadsheet charts to basic illustrations. Text quality is very good, plus you have plenty of font options: The 500C takes font cartridges, and with the *Windows* driver, you get four scalable fonts, something none of the other printers here offers.

The 500C's output does have one major flaw: Because the black ink cartridge can't be used with the color ink cartridge, the 500C is the only printer here that can't produce "true" blacks when printing in color. It's also slow. While it hit a first-place 2.5 ppm printing text, it was dead last on two out of three graphics tests. Still, if you want a cheap, versatile personal color printer but need sharp output, the 500C is a good value.



If you don't mind waiting, the DeskJet 500C delivers top-of-the-line output for a rock-bottom price.



Our Best Buy, the HP PaintJet XL, delivers bright, saturated color quickly.

### **Hewlett-Packard PaintJet XL**

**PROS:** High-quality output, top-of-the-line print speeds, excellent connectivity **CONS:** Low resolution, big footprint, no low-ink indicator



The PaintJet's been around awhile, but it's still the leader of the ink jet pack. It delivers brilliant, fully saturated output that's just a bit less precise than the DeskJet's, but its blacks and colors are true, deep, and even. The PaintJet

is also fast, averaging nearly 2 minutes per page on our *Corel Draw*, *Harvard Graphics*, and *Quattro Pro* speed tests. Designed for shared use, the PaintJet offers two ports standard and a third optional, a sturdy 12,000-sheet duty cycle, and room for up to 200 sheets of paper. Another work-group plus is compatibility with a wide range of software.

Granted, the XL's 513-square-inch footprint puts it in the behemoth class, and it lacks a low-ink indicator. These quibbles aside, with its combination of speed, output quality, and connectivity, the PaintJet XL is your Best Buy for bringing the power of color printing to your work group.

### **Kodak Diconix Color 4**

**PROS:** Lowest price in roundup, excellent design, high-quality plain-paper printing **CONS:** Slow, not good for shared use

As well as having the lowest price of any printer here, the Diconix Color 4 sports the best design, with a sleek profile, a small footprint, and a cut-sheet feeder hidden away in the back. But the Color 4's best feature is its oil-based inks. Unlike the other printers reviewed here, whose water-based inks require special coated stock, the Color 4 can print on plain bond. Though colors are less brilliant, plain paper costs about 8 cents less per sheet than coated stock.

With its single interface port and small, unadjustable paper tray, the Color 4 is strictly for personal use. It lacks the DeskJet 500C's emulations and font options, and it's on the slow side (the *Quattro Pro* test took over 11 minutes). Despite these shortcomings, the Diconix Color 4 is still the right color printer for the budget conscious—an inexpensive but fully capable machine that will save you money on long-term paper costs.

### Mannesmann Tally MT92 C

PROS: High resolution, very good font and color options, solid customer support

CONS: Expensive, slow, requires RAM and paper tray upgrades

The Mannesmann Tally MT92 C could be a great little work-group printer. It has two ports standard and room for up to 256K of RAM and 200 sheets of paper. Its 300-dpi resolution is top of the line, although output quality is only fair. We found Mannesmann Tally's customer service to be fast, friendly, and accurate.

However, to exploit the MT92 C's potential, you have to upgrade both memory and paper capacity substantially—standard RAM is only 10K, and there's no standard sheet feeder of any size. The MT92 C is also slow and incompatible with common software. (At press time, new drivers were due during the second quarter of 1992.) Also, maybe because of its recent introduction, the printer's average street price is just 5 percent off the high list price. Still, if the street price starts to drop, and you don't mind upgrading, the MT92 C could be an option for your work group.



If the cost were a little lower, the MT92 C could be a great network color printer.







### Sharp JX-735

PROS: Fast, 128K standard RAM

CONS: Spotty software support, few font options, no ink cartridges

The Sharp JX-735 is built along the same broad-shouldered lines as the Hewlett-Packard PaintJet XL. Like the PaintJet, the JX-735 can crank out color copy quickly—it averaged a second-fastest 2 minutes, 50 seconds per page on the *Corel Draw* and *Quattro Pro* tests.

Both the PaintJet and the JX-735 have relatively low 180-dpi resolution. But the Sharp's output is only fair compared with the PaintJet's, as it suffers from inaccurate color registration, banding, and poor color mixing. Moreover, the Sharp's software support is limited, it lacks most common printer emulations, and it has meager font options. Unlike most of the other printers reviewed, the JX-735 does not use ink cartridges, relying instead on liquid vials that, in the unit we received, had spilled during shipping. If all you want is speed, the JX-735 is worth a closer look, but its lack of software, printer, and font support limits its appeal.



The JX-735 is big and fast, but it has little support for software or fonts.

### The Proof's in the Printing

Hewlett-Packard's DeskJet 500C and PaintJet XL both produced top-of-the-line output with bright, accurate colors and sharp lines. The Mannesmann Tally MT92 C, on the other hand, had some problems with smudging, and the Sharp JX-735 had trouble with banding and awkward dithering patterns.

### **Tektronix ColorQuick**

PROS: Lots of memory, flexible paper handling

CONS: Fairly high price, poor software support, liquid ink vials

Like the Sharp JX-735, the Tektronix ColorQuick is a big printer with an emphasis on work-group use. Its 256K of memory is the best in the roundup, it can handle almost any kind of paper, and its sheet feeder holds 100 sheets. Performance is a mixed bag—slow with *Corel Draw*, the ColorQuick came in second fastest on our *Harvard Graphics* test.



The ColorQuick could be good for shared use—if you don't mind quirky software support.

### The Next Step Up: Thermal Transfer and Solid Ink Jet Printers

Liquid ink jets can't handle every color printing job. If you're doing outside presentations, or if you want to print color proofs, you're going to need the kind of output quality thermal transfer and solid ink jet printers offer. Both types of printers use solid, wax-based media: Because the inks don't bleed into the paper fibers, lines print sharp and colors stay bright. Plenty of these machines are available, many of them PostScript compatible and a few listing for under \$5000. Here are some leading models.

### Methodology

While the latest top-quality color LCD transportables are anything but cheap, if your business depends on your ability to deliver compelling presentations on the road, these hot new PCs might just pay for themselves. And even if you don't need one today, they open a window onto a near future in which a color portable with a stunning display—and low emissions—could be your desktop

system of choice.

The most spectacular new color LCDs use active-matrix technology. Bright, saturated, and flicker free, the best active-matrix displays are in some ways superior to CRT monitors. They have a true flat screen without the distortion inherent in most CRT displays. They also do away with flicker and minimize electromagnetic emissions.

With hardware just starting to roll off vendors' assembly lines, we were able to get a hands-on look at eight of the first color

portables—two battery-powered active-matrix notebooks, four active-matrix AC transportables, and two battery-driven passive-matrix notebooks. Passive-matrix displays are dimmer and slower, making them poor choices for presentations. Still, if a lightweight computer is your traveling companion, you've probably longed for a color display—and passive-matrix technology is





the most cost-effective way to get color on the road.

All of these machines' screens offer 640 by 480 resolution—the same sharpness provided by a standard VGA monitor. And all but one can drive the screen and an external monitor or projector simultaneously-making it easy for you to control the progress of a demo or a training session. The processors inside these portables range from a relatively slow 25-MHz 386SL to a high-velocity 33-MHz 486DX. If you're an architect who needs to run an on-site color animation or CAD application to show your customer what her new house will look like, you'll certainly want a faster (and more expensive) system. However, a 386SL is still perfectly adequate for slide-show presentation packages like *Harvard Graphics*. To help you comparison shop, we priced all eight units in a standard configuration with 4MB of RAM, an 80MB to 120MB hard drive, an internal modem, and DOS 5.0.

### AST Premium Exec 386SX/25C Color

Scheduled to ship by the time you read this, AST's \$4544 Premium Exec 386SX/25C Color was the least expensive

color portable we could find at press time. Compared with an 18-pound transportable, this 7.3-pound notebook is a pleasure to carry. Informal battery tests indicate that even under constant use, the Premium Exec lets you work for almost 2 hours before you need an AC plug. And the 8MB RAM capacity is more than adequate for most applications.

The Premium Exec's prototype 8.5-inch screen, made by Sanyo, is the best-looking passive-matrix display we've seen. Although you can make the pointer disappear by whipping it from one side of the screen to the other—a common problem with passive-matrix LCDswith most mouse moves, it remains in clear sight. Nonetheless, like all passive systems, the AST requires precise brightness and contrast adjustments for a good-looking image; fortunately, the slide controls are easy to use.

AST would like to sell this machine to traveling salespeople for knockout presentations, but while its display is impressive for a passive unit, low contrast and a narrow viewing angle make it a compromise choice for this market. The Premium Exec seems best suited to personal use by an individual—where it's a huge

improvement over a monochrome notebook.

### Compaq Portable 486c

Looking for the best portable color display you can buy? You've just found it. Compaq's 17.6-pound Portable 486c lists for \$11,697—one of the most expensive machines here. But this 33-MHz 486DX lunch box comes with the brightest, fastest, and prettiest display: a 10.4-inch Sharp screen with exceptionally bright "hot cathode" backlighting.

The 486c offers near-desktop capability. Should you want to network the unit, for instance, or connect it to a scanner, you can take advantage of two full-length 32-bit EISA slots that can accept either AT-style boards or highthroughput EISA peripherals. And the 486c comes with your choice of a 120MB or 210MB hard drive, plenty of elbowroom even if you have huge graphics files. Fast-RAM capacity is similarly uncompromised: You can load up to 32MB. In addition, the detachable 101-key keyboard is desktop quality: It boasts both excellent touch and an impeccable layout.

The 486c makes it easy to combine sound and image to produce dramatic presenta-

tions. There's a stereo input jack conveniently located near the expansion slots, where a sound board might go, a monaural audio amplifier with front-panel speaker and volume control, and a SCSI interface for plug-and-play connection to a CD ROM drive.

Thanks to its excellent expansion potential, the Compaq Portable 486c is the best portable we've seen for mobile multimedia presentations. Its high-powered processor and matchless screen also make it the portable to beat for CAD and other graphics-intensive applications. If you're willing to pay the money and carry the weight, you can't do any better.

### **Dell System 325NC**

Does a color screen at people's prices sound good? Meet the \$4897 325NC. Aside from its multihued display, this featherweight notebook is a virtual clone of Dell's familiar System 320N, which won a Best Buy in our November 1991 roundup of 386SX notebooks. This 7.1pound unit uses a 25-MHz 386SL processor and can handle a generous 12MB of RAM. Informal battery tests show it running just a bit short of 3 hours with most power-saving features disabled—impressive for a color system.

Dell wants the 325NC to be considered a color alternative monochrome-notebook users—which makes perfect sense. However, Dell says it's also aiming this machine at the field presentations, medical imaging, and financial modeling markets—and that makes less sense. Like the AST, the 325NC we looked at was a prerelease model, so we're reluctant to draw conclusions. Nonetheless, the 325NC lacks the ability for simultaneous external display, and its Sharp screen seemed dimmer and had lower contrast than those of the other units. The pointer has a tendency to disappear when you move the mouse, but a bundled copy of Microsoft's Mouse software 8.1, which provides an oversize flashing cursor, minimizes the problem.

The 325NC has great portability, the right battery life, and a cool price. But since it's not really suitable for presentations, you have to ask yourself if a passive-matrix color screen is worth about \$1000 more than the 320N just to keep your eyes happy.

### **NEC ProSpeed 486SX/C**

If you're willing to trade speed, expansion capacity, and a desktop-grade keyboard for a better price than Compaq's,

An active-matrix screen plus battery operation make NEC's UltraLite SL/25C a real temptation—especially at \$6633.

NEC's 17.5-pound clamshell transportable is worth a close look. For starters, it costs almost \$2100 less than the Compaq Portable 486c—around \$9600 in our standard configuration. It handles up to 20MB of fast RAM, and its proprietary screen is fast, bright, and contrasty.

The NEC's 20-MHz 486SX processor makes it less appropriate than the Compaq Portable 486c for CAD, animation, and other processing-intensive applications. In addition, when compared with the Compaq, the ProSpeed falls short of portable-desktop status. Its keyboard lacks dedicated cursor and page control keys, and there's one EISA slot instead of two.

In most ways, the design is excellent: The wide adjustment range of the swing-top display makes it easy to find a good viewing angle. The ProSpeed's dazzling display makes it a fine engine for presentations, and no one can argue with the big price break, but the Compaq Portable 486c offers greater computing power and better expansion capacity.

### **NEC UltraLite SL/25C**

It's hard to believe you can get a 9-inch color screen this good in a 7½-pound notebook. In fact, though the NEC Ultra-Lite SL/25C's screen is similar to that of the ProSpeed 486SX/C transportable, it's slightly crisper. Combine this edge with a remarkably low price—\$6633 as opposed to the ProSpeed's \$9624—and the UltraLite emerges as a better buy for anyone except those who need a free slot and loads of hard disk space.

The UltraLite SL/25C offers no internal storage options other than the 80MB drive that comes with the unit (though NEC, like every other notebook vendor, plans to offer a 120MB model later this year). The machine can hold a reasonable 10MB of RAM.

We were unable to test this preproduction unit, but NEC claims that a typical UltraLite session will run 2½ to 3 hours. That may not seem like a lot, but for an active-matrix color notebook it's headline news. Moreover, like all SL systems, the UltraLite can suspend Windows applications safely; just hit the standby button, and your work space will stay the way it is, ready to power up again hours later. A keyboard toggle lets you switch between external, internal, and simultaneous displays.

With its light weight, stunning display, and relatively low

### **Desktop Color for Tomorrow**

E ven a quick look will convince you that an active-matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) screen displays a much finer image than a passive-matrix LCD—making it your best choice for resplendent on-site demos and presentations. In fact, in some ways an active display presents a better image than the familiar CRT monitor on your desktop. Passive boasts lower power consumption and a more reasonable price. While both technologies are improving, many experts feel that passive is a transitional technology and that active will eventually replace most CRTs.

### **How It Works**

A color LCD uses backlighting as the source of the images it produces. Tiny red, green, and blue rectangular filters are arrayed on the inside surface of the screen, one three-color triplet for each pixel. The liquid crystal, which is sandwiched between the backlight and the colored filters, can vary the amount of light that shines through each colored subpixel, producing thousands of colors per triplet/pixel.

All LCD displays sandwich the liquid crystal between two sheets of glass. In a passive display, one sheet has horizontal bands of electrodes, the other, vertical. Subpixels are created wherever horizontal and vertical bands cross. A controller sends precisely timed pulses of power through the electrodes, governing how much light the liquid crystal admits through each colored filter. In an active display, a thin film of transistor-capacitor pairs is deposited onto one of the glass surfaces. Each transistor-capacitor pair controls one subpixel.

### **Brightness and Contrast**

In a passive display, cross talk, or interference of the signals in adjacent electrode bands, lowers image quality. Active displays don't suffer from cross talk. Each transistor can exercise unperturbed control over the state of its subpixel—turning it full on or full off and keeping it that way indefinitely. This means high contrast—as high as 100 to 1. That's as good as you get from a CRT.

### Pixel On/Off Speed

Thanks to those hard-working transistors, active-matrix screens can flip their subpixels on and off almost as fast as a CRT. Passive-matrix screens take three times as long to opaque or clear a subpixel, because they use lower voltages to minimize cross talk. The slowdown is noticeable during text scrolling and during rapid animation, where successive frames may be superimposed, causing blurred images.

### **Flicker**


In a CRT screen, electron guns zap the phosphors 60 or more times a second to keep them glowing. When the refresh rate is slower than the decay time of the phosphor, the screen flick-



ers, causing eye fatigue. Since color LCD screens are continuously backlit, they produce steady, flicker-free images.

### Resolution

A CRT can display multiple resolutions; an LCD can't. Currently, color LCDs top out at 640 by 480. CRT monitors can go higher—commonly 1024 by 768, but as high as 4096 by 4096 for very high resolution CAD and desktop publishing displays.





### **Emissions**

While CRTs are known for their electromagnetic emissions—along with dust-collecting electrostatic charge—as yet there's no hard medical evidence of any health hazard. Nonetheless, if scientists discover that this "safe" radiation isn't so safe after all, it won't be the first time. So if you're worried about electromagnetic dangers, you'll be glad to hear that LCDs have virtually no emissions or static.

### **Viewing Angle**

While both active and passive LCD screens limit you to about 40 degrees of vertical viewing range, they differ on horizontal viewing angle. You have to be looking almost dead center on a passive-matrix screen to see its images clearly. The active-matrix screen is more forgiving, with a horizontal viewing angle of around 90 degrees. Still, even that is a far cry from the 135 degrees most CRT screens offer:





price, the UltraLite SL/25C could be the machine that brings color notebook computing into the mainstream. At the very least, this system should prove irresistible to many mobile presenters.

### Toshiba T4400SXC

Toshiba's T4400SXC packs the processing punch of a transportable into an elegant, active-matrix color notebook. At \$8478, this 25-MHz 486SX unit costs \$1845 more than the NEC UltraLite SL/25C, but for that price you get roughly twice the CPU power—all in a neat 7%-pound package.

At 8½ inches, the T4400-SXC's display is one of the smallest of the bunch. However, the display quality stands with the best, offering color as good as that of its heavier sibling. The company has found a way to increase the efficiency of the screen, so you see the same amount of luminescence using less backlight—and therefore, less power. Combine this enhancement with a big 2.4-pound nickel-cadmium battery, and the company claims you'll get 3 full hours of battery-driven operation.

As is usually the case with Toshiba laptops, there's remarkably little compromise in the design of the T4400SXC's 82-key keyboard. The keys are full-size and fully spaced, with cursor keys arrayed in an inverted T, and dedicated <Page Up>, <Page Down>, <Home>, and <End> keys lining the right side. This arrangement may add an extra half-inch of width, but at 8.3 inches by 11.7 inches, the T4400SXC still occupies only about half of a normal-size briefcase.

Designed to be a true Windows portable, the T4400SXC comes with 4MB of RAM expandable to as much as 20MB. The new 120MB 2½-inch Conner drive gives you plenty of room for Windows apps or even a PowerPoint slide show.

In many ways, this high-quality color notebook surpasses Toshiba's transportable. If you can afford the very best in personal productivity and you don't need the expansion capacity of a big AC box, you've found the machine that's right for you.

### Toshiba T6400DXC/T6400SXC

We looked at a preproduction model of Toshiba's T6400 clamshell color transportable. It's comparatively light (12.9 pounds), boasts a roomy 20MB fast-RAM capacity, and

will be available in a high-performance, 33-MHz 486DX version for \$9948 (with a 200MB drive) and a 25-MHz 486SX version for only \$8648 (with a 120MB drive).

While the prototype 10.4-inch screen we looked at was

quite nice, when you place it next to the Compaq and the NEC, its contrast seems somewhat lower.

sion bus connector, Toshiba doesn't currently offer an expansion unit (unlike Compaq and NEC).

Still, were it not for the lower contrast of the display we examined, we wouldn't hesitate to recommend the SX version of the T6400 as the lightest active-matrix transportable here. As it is, we have to reserve judgment and recommend that you check out a production unit—which should be shipping by the time you read this. With color CRT technology improving daily and vendors upgrading their units almost as often, there's no sub-





IKE IT OR NOT, graphical user interfaces (GUIs) are here to stay. Windows, OS/2, and a growing number of GUI DOS packages, such as Quattro Pro, change not only the way you work but also the tools you work with. Yesterday's extras—mice, trackballs, and enhanced keyboards—are today's essentials.

Freedom of choice is alive and well when it comes to deciding how your hands will enter data and execute commands. This buyers' guide shows you what's available and gives you pointers on how to choose devices that will be kind to your wrists. But remember, the best judge is your own hands.

#### **Keyboards**

There are two kinds of keyboards: those that click when you type and those that don't. For the snappiest sound and feel, select a mechanical keyboard. With this kind, the key you press feels like it's springloaded and makes a definite clicking noise.

If noise and snap aren't for you, check out the quieter and less costly membrane keyboard. It looks the same as the mechanical type but lacks their spring and click and seems mushy to some users.

Keyboard layout determines how much time your fingers spend jumping about. The standard 101-key keyboard

has 12 function keys along the top of the board, a numeric/cursor keypad, and an extra keypad devoted to cursor movement. The old AT-style 84-key keyboard has 10 function keys on the left and a numeric/cursor keypad.

Some programs, such as *WordPerfect*, assign a number

of tasks to the function keys. If these tasks involve using function keys in combination with the <Ctrl>, <Alt>, and <Shift> keys, you may want a keyboard with function keys grouped along the left side for easy one-hand operation. quire hands to hop up and down. Some keyboard manufacturers offer both schemes on one board. Also look for an L-shaped <Enter> key, which is easier to reach than a smaller, rectangular one.

The latest option is to replace the dedicated cursor keypad with a trackball. You can get one built into the board à la Datadesk's Switchboard or add a clip-on trackball to the keyboard's side. Clip-ons were designed for laptop users but work equally well with desktop keyboards (for more information, see "Traveling Companions," February 1992). Both built-ins and clip-ons eliminate the jumping back and forth that freestanding trackballs and mice involve.

Keyboards from manufacturers such as IOcomm and Datadesk are making even



more radical changes. IO-comm's Wave (\$100) has an undulating shape that follows the curve of your hands; the bottom portion of the board extends outward for extra wrist support. Datadesk's pricey Switchboard (\$239) has a modular design that lets you move function, cursor control, and numeric keys to wherever they feel most comfortable.

#### Mice

With mice, finding the right size and shape is crucial to comfort. When you lay your hand across a mouse, you want your hand—from wrist to fingertips—to lie as flat as possible and still be supported. Expect a twinge of rebellion if your palm and wrist angle down to the desk because of insufficient support, or if your fingers must stretch to reach the buttons (see "Stress by Design").

Once you've got your hand on it, the mouse's job is to track and report movement to the driver—the software that links the mouse and applications. Movement is registered through one of three types of mechanisms: mechanical, optical, and optomechanical.

Mechanical mice have a rolling ball that tracks the movement of the mouse. Optical mice use light-beam pulses reflected off a mirrored pad to measure movement. They provide more precise screen movements than mechanical mice but are useless without the special pad.

Optomechanical mice use both technologies. The ball tracks movement like a mechanical mouse and also moves a perforated disk to create light pulses, which are transmitted as movement. Optomechanical mice are nearly as precise as optical mice, and they don't require a pad.

The amount of movement a mouse registers—its resolution—is measured in dots per inch (dpi). The higher the dpi, the farther the cursor travels for every movement of the mouse. Resolutions are listed here by the base dpi of the mouse hardware. Mouse software drivers use a complicated series of calculations to lower

and raise dpi levels, but they sometimes sacrifice smoothness to increase dpi. The higher the base dpi, the more likely the mouse is to support smooth cursor movement at higher dpi levels.

As with any add-in device, check hardware and software compatibility before you buy. The mice listed here come in serial, bus, and PS/2 versions. Unless your system has a PS/2 mouse connector, a serial mouse that plugs into one of your PC's serial ports is the easiest way to go. If the serial ports are already in use with printers, digitizers, or scanners, you'll need to buy the bus version, which includes a mouse interface board. Contrary to popular belief, there's no performance difference between the versions.

Since the Microsoft Mouse is the big cheese of input devices, all the mice here are Microsoft compatible. However, some maverick users prefer a three-button mouse to the twobutton Microsoft standard. This decision is strictly a matter of taste—and whether the utilities that come with your mouse enable you to use that third button in some useful way. For example, a zoom function programmed into the third button could make picture editing much easier.

Any peripheral added to your system will also add a tangle of cords. If you want to avoid the mess, you have two choices: infrared-remote or radio-wave mice. With infrared remotes, nothing should obstruct the line of vision between the eye of the remote and the computer—block the light beam, and your device becomes useless. Radio-wave mice don't have this problem. They work by assigning one of four to eight "stations" to your mouse, which works fine if no other mice are in the immediate area using the same frequency. If they are, then each

#### **Stress by Design**

We all know of someone who's experienced discomfort or injury from long hours at the keyboard. What's surprising is that physicians are also reporting an alarming increase in injuries attributable to mice and trackballs.

Sharri Baker, former graphics production supervisor at Farallon Computing in Emeryville, California, came face-to-face with this reality in late 1990 on a job that involved "heavy mouse work." Baker spent up to 7 hours a day performing hand-intensive mouse functions such as designing shapes, highlighting text, and cutting and pasting.

Within two months, Baker was diagnosed with overuse syndrome involving inflammation of the tendons of the hands and put on medical disability leave. Now, Baker can work on a computer for 30 minutes, twice a day.

How do you lessen your chance of developing a cumulative trauma injury when our work environments and the devices we use seem to be a breeding ground for them? First, rest your hands often. Take short but frequent



breaks. Vary your tasks; put the stress on a variety of muscles rather than using the same muscles in exactly the same way throughout the day. Last, remember to do frequent hand exercises and stretches.

Most important, get an input device that doesn't bite the hand that uses it. One of the most likely dangers is the one-size-fits-all philosophy. Product adjustability can also offset repetitive stresses to muscle groups. Look for keyboards with adjustable heights, mice that come in a variety of sizes, and trackballs with easy-to-reach buttons and a low-lying ball that lets your hand lie flat.

#### Trackballs

Flip a mouse on its back, and what do you get? A trackball (oversimplified, but you get the idea). Trackballs don't require the room that mice use roaming around your desk, and they offer all the same functions.

All the trackballs here have at least 150-dpi resolution and are Microsoft compatible. The balls themselves range from pearl-size to roughly the size of a tangerine. In general, the larger the trackball, the better the response to movement, al-

though Appoint's Thumbelina trackball has found its way onto the desk of keyboard aficionados and portables users with limited space.

One potentially annoying trackball problem involves click-and-drag. To highlight text with a mouse, you move the cursor to the starting point, hold down the appropriate mouse button, and move the cursor to the end of the line. With a trackball, this operation can require two hands—one to hold the button, one to rotate the trackball.

Some trackball companies solve this problem with a drag

lock feature. Click the drag lock button, and the trackball acts as if the pointer button is held down. The challenge is remembering whether drag lock is enabled; some trackballs have an LED indicator to show when this feature is in use.

# SCAM

HEN LINDA BRECHBILL WAS IN THE market for a couple of laser printers, she did what she always did: She thumbed through advertisements in computer magazines to find the best deal. Brechbill, the controller for Brechbill & Helman, a construction company in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, thought she'd hit on a winner when she saw a two-page ad for American Computer Technology (ACT), a Garden Grove, California, mail-order firm specializing in name-brand peripherals. Bad choice.


"They offered me a discount if we paid up front," recalls Brechbill. Although her usual policy is to order products COD, the chance to save \$300 was too good to pass up. She wrote ACT a check for \$4288.69 and sent it by overnight mail.

ACT cashed her company's check the next day but never

shipped her products. When two weeks went by with no sign of the printers, Brechbill began calling ACT every day, finally threatening legal action. An infuriating two months after she placed the order, the lines were disconnected.

"I don't think they ever intended to send me anything," says Brechbill, who is far from the only one taken in by ACT's frequent ads and low prices. More than 30 other consumers reported paying ACT for products they never received, and another 50 have reported similar treatment from other California firms with links to ACT and each other: One Stop Micro (OSM) of Van Nuys, Minuteman Computers of Costa Mesa, and Computer Spectrum of Wilmington.

To date, reports from *PC World* readers indicate losses of \$97,000. Our reader-service bureau forwarded 9049 inquiries to the four suspect companies in response to their ads in *PC World*. A source in the computer direct-sales

industry says 2.5 percent of reader-service leads usually result in sales averaging \$2000 each. By this reckoning, *PC World* readers may have ordered as much as \$450,000 worth of goods from these companies. Since the firms regularly ran ads in major computer publications over the past year, the total number of victims is unknown, and actual losses may be much greater.

Moreover, evidence indicates that these companies are only the latest in a series of retail/mail-order firms that have sprung up in the greater Los Angeles area and have links to one another and distinctly similar methods of operation.

"Just one of these locations could take in \$150,000 a month," estimates a Los Angeles retailer, "and if it's a rip-off, that's pure profit." The potential loss for those who have done

business with these companies runs well into millions of dollars.

Those funds have gone to pay for the fast cars and fast times of eight or more Los Angeles—area men. The primary intent of these individuals seems to have been to scam the consumers, banks, and publishers with whom they were doing business, says an East Coast credit and collections officer who has been investigating them for several years.

"I've been in this business since 1970, and this is probably the worst I've seen," he says. "There is no doubt in my mind that these folks were out to defraud right from the get-go."

These companies have been able to fool customers and creditors by using a variety of schemes ranging from questionable business practices to outright fraud. They obtained credit from banks, product suppliers, and the media by using each other as credit references and, in some cases, by using

phony personal identification, including aliases and multiple

Social Security and driver's license numbers.

The Southern California group began with Los Angeles native Tony Ortiz Arce (a.k.a. Anthony Palomino), according to sources who asked to remain anonymous. Following high school, Arce worked for several local computer retailers.

In 1988 Arce went to work at Los Angeles Computer of Torrance. On October 28, 1988, Arce refiled the company's Fictitious Business Name Statement (a legal document stating the name under which an individual or company is doing business) as Los Angeles Component Corporation and listed himself as a co-owner. He refiled the business as Los Angeles Components & Computers on January 10, 1989. Then on May 19, 1989, he filed two new Fictitious Business Name Statements—one for Los Angeles Computer Corporation and one for L.A.C.C. Arce used the different company names to throw off creditors, sources say, confounding them by returning with a different name after his credit had been cut off.

In late 1989 Arce's business closed down under assault by creditors. But a method of operation had been established—one he carried to fledgling retail/mail-order firms run by new people he had recruited.

One of the first, sources say, was Gregory G. Snyder, who opened Modern Business Systems of Manhattan Beach, California, on August 28, 1989. In early 1990, sources say, Arce, who was then going by the name Anthony Palomino, brought Robert Michael Hoover into the business. Hoover soon graduated to running Integrated Systems (sometimes called ISC Power Systems) of Hermosa Beach, which opened in April 1990. *PC World* has discovered 43 people who together lost more than \$27,000 to ISC.

In an interview with *PC World*, Hoover stated that he "made some bad business decisions" while running ISC and filed for bankruptcy last year. "I haven't been in the computer industry since my company [ISC] collapsed," he added. After being asked about his June 1991 Fictitious Business Name Statement filing for Micro Surge, however, Hoover said that he had "been doing some consulting work under Micro Surge" but had stopped doing business under that name.

Hoover said he wasn't involved with any other firms.

#### THE PLOT THICKENS

y the beginning of 1991, both Modern Business Systems and ISC had faded, but they were replaced by other computer operations, the most recent of which were ACT, OSM, Computer Spectrum, and Minuteman Computers. They all appeared on the scene in the summer of 1991 and began advertising in national and regional computer publications. Offering competitive—but not outrageous—prices on name-brand merchandise, the full-page advertisements promised extended warranties and expert technical support.

Although ostensibly owned and operated by separate individuals, these companies and their predecessors have many links. At various times, their owners lived together, worked together, socialized, and/or attended school together. And according to an expert handwriting analyst, the same two

people filled out portions of 12 of the 19 Fictitious Business Name Statements filed by these individuals.

"Both writers have such highly individual handwriting characteristics that there is no doubt in my mind that these two persons filled out many of the forms," says Patricia Fisher, president of Fisher Associates Questioned Document Examiners in Oakland, California.

Documents sharing the same handwriting were filed


#### TEN TIPS FOR BUYING DIRECT

- 1. BUY FROM COMPANIES WITH A PROVEN TRACK RECORD. Whenever possible, go with companies from whom friends and associates have purchased goods.
- 2. INVESTIGATE UNFAMILIAR COMPANIES. Call the local Better Business Bureau and the regional U.S. postal inspector's office to determine whether a company has a history of complaints.
- 3. EVALUATE PRODUCTS AT YOUR LOCAL COMPUTER STORE before you place an order.
- 4. INVESTIGATE SERVICE OPTIONS AND RETURN POLICIES. Look for a 30-day money-back guarantee and after-sale support.
- 5. BE WARY OF INCREDIBLE DEALS. If prices seem too good to be true, they generally are.

- **6. KEEP DETAILED RECORDS.** Note whom you spoke with (first and last name), as well as promises made about price and delivery.
- **7. CONFIRM PHONE ORDERS** with a letter or a fax to your salesperson.
- **8. DON'T SEND CHECKS.** Credit card and COD purchases offer protection against nondelivery of goods.
- 9. DON'T ASSUME THE VALIDITY OF ADVERTISEMENTS.

Even the most reputable of magazines, newspapers, and other periodicals do not routinely verify the claims made in advertisements.

10. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS AND EXERCISE THEM. If a company fails to ship your order on time, you can cancel the order and obtain a full refund.



#### WHO TO CONTACT IF YOU'VE BEEN HAD ...

You're not without resources if you're unfortunate enough to have a problem with a mail-order company. A variety of private and government organizations are set up to assist consumers in resolving complaints.

That's the good news.

The bad news is, none of these groups can guarantee resolution of your problem, especially if a vendor never intended to send a product. And one call or letter won't necessarily prompt anyone to act. Unless you're aggressive, your complaint could end up at the bottom of a hefty pile.

With the exception of the Federal Trade Commission and local police departments, all of the following groups will contact a vendor on your behalf in an attempt to resolve problems. Some will also investigate companies suspected of illegal activities. If you're not sure who to contact, write to everyone. And always send a copy to the company causing problems. The threat of outside involvement may be enough to spur action.

Letters should include a complete description of the transaction, as well as any supporting material, such as invoices, credit card statements, or canceled checks. The more information you provide, the better your chances of resolving the matter quickly.

Williams, owner of Williams Electronics and Consulting, which processed credit card vouchers for many of the orders that customers placed with ACT.

Once in business, these individuals vouched for each other with creditors, referred customers to one another, used the same addresses, and, in one case, had a third party process their credit card vouchers.

They typically begin by setting up shop in a low-rent store-front—or sometimes just using a mail drop—and applying for credit with banks and vendors as a retail operation. They section off part of the "store" as a showroom, which contains a few empty boxes marked "personal computer—fragile," a few well-placed add-in boards, and some other components. But the real business takes place in the back room over telephones and fax machines.

Armed with a retail facade and credit references from other outlets run by their cronies, the firms are able to obtain privileges with credit-voucher-processing banks. Each then advertises in multiple computer publications, paying a small amount of money up front or writing checks that bounce.

#### WHO GOT BURNED?

W

e interviewed numerous companies that did business with these firms—credit card banks, magazines, and product suppliers and none have received even a fraction of what is owed them. "They only find out after the fact that the check isn't any good,"

says one credit investigator.

One large distributor, which was hit at least 11 times by members of this group, has lost more than \$45,000 worth of merchandise that was shipped in return for checks that bounced. The distributor has turned to collection agencies and, in some cases, filed lawsuits, but it felt that no single loss was large enough to warrant police attention. "It's not surprising that this could happen in Los Angeles," says an executive with the company, "because authorities are so understaffed and there is so much [fraud] going on. If it was a small town in Kansas, it would get a lot more attention."

Besides the businesses that fell victim to these companies, dozens of unsuspecting consumers were also taken in.

... which has other priorities: Bush and Clinton.

When *PC World* realized the extent of consumer losses at the hands of these companies, we contacted several of the law enforcement agencies that have jurisdiction. While every agency welcomed our assistance, few aggressively pursued the issue, claiming conflicting priorities.

The Secret Service, with jurisdiction over crimes involving banks and credit cards, has only three fraud agents in Southern California. Their attention is split between fighting crime and protecting presidential candidates.

The California attorney general's office says it will rely on other agencies to pursue this investigation.

The U.S. postal inspector's office cites limited resources to investigate the numerous cases brought to its attention.

The Los Angeles city attorney's office cites lack of resources, saying it files only cases referred by other law enforcement agencies.

Local law enforcement reaction was mixed. Some police officials launched an investigation; others referred us to state and federal authorities. However, local law enforcement agencies are hampered because these companies did business primarily with out-of-state consumers. The cost of flying these people in to serve as witnesses at a trial is prohibitive.

Those who called the companies report that the sales staff were professional, courteous, and helpful. They also gave the impression that they were large, organized operations with separate sales, customer service, and shipping departments.

"At first they seemed to have a large staff," recalls Brechbill, "but towards the end I got the impression it was just two guys sitting behind desks answering phones." When *PC World* visited these operations, this proved to be the case.

"There was no tip-off when I ordered the product," adds Potomac, Maryland, attorney and CPA Jonathan Robbins, another ACT victim. He began to worry, though, when he received his credit card statement and found that he'd been overcharged—and by a company with which he had never done business, Global Electronics of Culver City, California.

All the ACT customers *PC World* contacted who paid by credit card had their cards debited by companies they didn't know: Global Electronics and Williams Electronics of Garden Grove. According to county and bank records, Williams Electronics is an independent firm operated by Arthur Dean Williams; but the address listed on the company's Fictitious

Business Name Statement shows Williams Electronics operating from the same building as ACT.

Debiting credit cards of customers who are not your own—or "laundering" as the banks refer to it—is not illegal, but it is a violation of credit card regulations. And "it's a very handy vehicle for fraud," says Joel Brewer, an attorney with the Federal Trade Commission's law enforcement division.

#### STALL TACTICS

ot long after ACT's phone lines were disconnected, several customers received a letter with a Global Electronics logo, stating that Global had been in the process of buying ACT when the firm began experiencing financial difficulties. The letter then advised ACT customers to seek relief from their credit card companies.

"The letter to the customer is a standard scam for any type of merchant situation where merchants are sending [credit card] drafts," says the head of investigations for a processing bank that revoked Global's credit-clearing priv-

ileges last December for excessive chargebacks. "In order to forestall the customer, they send out a letter saying that the name change is just a technicality."

When contacted, Global owner Paul Rossi denied sending the letter, stating instead that it was sent by ACT owner Michael Thomas Lytle. Rossi said he gave ACT "a big advance" in exchange for part of the business, and that Lytle was supposed to have notified customers that orders would be processed by Global. Rossi claimed to have been victimized by ACT and would not commit to reimbursing ACT customers whose credit cards he debited. "I'm not immediately going to refund [the money]," said Rossi. "I want to resolve things correctly and I am following my attorney's advice."

Global is also listed as a credit reference by Computer Spectrum, which, like ACT, took orders without delivering products. Although he acknowledged "a few business deals" with Computer Spectrum owner Mulvihill, Rossi could not explain why he would be listed as a credit reference. He also said he had no financial interest in the company.

The letter to ACT customers was only one tactic used to string people along. Staff at all the companies were quite adept at putting off customers, creditors, and even the authorities with stories of shipments being damaged, lost, and misdirected. After weeks of giving excuses, the companies often took the phones off the hook for hours at a time to thwart inquiries. When customers did get through, they were sworn at, told their orders were canceled, and hung up on. Ultimately, all the lines were disconnected. By the time consumers understood they had been defrauded and found the

right investigative agency, the offending business had closed and its principals disappeared.

Attempts to contact other principals were unsuccessful.

ome customers who paid by check found themselves

out thousands of dollars with no hope of ever recouping their losses.

John LaMunyon, pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Ephrata, Washington, was one of those victims. He sent a check for \$1038.52 to ACT for a printer and was assured "they'd do their darnedest to fill the order quickly." But in a pattern that was to be repeated many times over, he received many promises but no printer. "They have our money and our machine," he says.

Customers who paid by credit card were more fortunate, usually receiving a full refund from their issuing bank, which charged the amount back to the individual merchant's bank. Those banks take the loss. With complaints and chargebacks pouring in, and unable to recover hundreds of thousands of dollars paid to the suspect companies, the banks canceled the companies' credit-clearing privileges and put their names on a list of "terminated merchants." Undaunted, the companies obtained similar privileges from other credit-clearing banks, and the process began again.

All the firms had their credit-clearing privileges revoked by one or more issuing banks—all for excessive chargebacks.

Many of the issuing banks are compiling information and forwarding it to federal and local law enforcement agencies,

#### FRAUD: THE EXCEPTION, NOT THE RULE

News of fraud involving computer mail-order firms comes at a time when the direct-sales marketplace as a whole is experiencing phenomenal growth, with an increasing number of consumers turning to this channel for both competitive prices and quality service.

"I have had far more successes than discontentments," says Donald Smith, a long-time buyer of PC products through the mail. "I bought a pretty foxy computer by mail and was delighted with the vendor, the follow-up, and the machine," he adds. "It got here within a day of when it was promised. You couldn't ask for anything else."

According to San Jose market researcher Dataquest, experiences such as this have fueled the growth of the direct-response channel. Sales in that arena jumped

from \$2.5 billion in 1990 to \$3.2 billion in 1991.

But even industry leaders like Dell Computer Corporation and Zeos International can be negatively affected when other mail-order companies fail to come through.

"I don't see it as a benefit to us when other companies don't deliver," says Michael Dell, founder and CEO of Dell. "Any participant in the channel can have a negative influence on the overall market," he adds.

Clearly, though, cases of outright fraud are rare.

"Most of the time when you get questionable practices, the company's just not thinking [about what it's doing]," says Richard Barton, senior vice president of government affairs for the Direct Marketing Association (DMA), a trade group based in New York that sponsors a Mailas are many of the victimized consumers. But no one is likely to get satisfaction anytime soon, since this case does not seem to be a priority for most law enforcement officials.

When contacted in early March, the L.A. city attorney's office and the California attorney general's office could report no progress in the case. The U.S. postal inspector's office indicated that it had an open case but refused to discuss the matter further. Likewise, while the Secret Service

acknowledged that an investigation is under way, it indicated that it has limited investigatory resources to apply to the case because of its obligation to protect presidential candidates.

The Garden Grove Police Department is investigating ACT and "possibly some affiliated companies" for fraud, according to Investigator Rick Harrison.

The efforts of local police departments are hampered, however, by the fact that the companies are set up in different cities and no single police force

has the resources to fully investigate and prosecute these types of crimes. The companies are also careful to do business almost exclusively with out-of-state customers, thereby hindering investigations.

For example, Hermosa Beach Police Department detective

Lance Jaakola was unable to bring a case against ISC Power Systems last year because most of its victims were out of state. "The DA can't afford to bring people in to testify. These cases are better handled by larger agencies," he notes, adding that he turned all his files over to the postal inspector.

As Los Angeles Component Corp., Modern Business Systems, and ISC Power Systems have done, Minuteman Computers, Computer Spectrum, OSM, and ACT have closed. Many of their principals, however, run other California companies, some of which may still be operating. Using the name Palomino, Arce started Video-Tronics in Signal Hill; Mulvihill started Beach Computers of Hermosa Beach, Advanced Business Systems of West Hollywood, and Empire Group of Torrance; Williams opened Memory Connection of Hollywood; Steven Hunt, owner of One Stop Micro, started Dynamic Micro of Gardena; Minuteman owner John Tremblay opened Alternative LAN Systems of Hermosa Beach; and Hoover opened Micro Surge of Torrance.

"These guys have hooked into something they do well," says the East Coast credit investigator. "They found out how to beat the system—at least for a while."

In Dell's view, customers should feel very comfortable with the established players in the channel. "But," he adds, "when you look at potential savings by turning to a no-name, the risk outweighs the benefit."

But not everyone is willing to stop buying from startups. "I realize I expose myself to problems by going with smaller companies," concedes Smith, who refuses to stick with well-established firms. "But I've been inconvenienced far more by bigger companies than start-ups."

Given the potential for turnover and the difficulties involved when buying from a company you can't see, consumers should understand and exercise their rights, says Chester Dalzell, DMA's director of public relations.

Under the federal Mail-Order Merchandise Rule, if a company does not state a delivery date for goods, products ordered must be shipped within 30 days. If a company cannot meet the stated ship date, it must notify the consumer and offer a full refund, including all shipping and handling charges.

Because many mail-order purchases are paid for by credit card, consumers should also be aware of their rights under the Fair Credit Billing Act. Among other provisions, the law allows credit card shoppers to dispute charges for goods that are not delivered or do not meet the seller's claims. In cases of bankruptcy or fraud, this right may be a consumer's only protection.



Hang on tight! Tandy and Compaq boost computing to new heights with a revolutionary breed of low-cost, high-performance Intel 486DX2 systems.

nce you had to pay twice as much for twice the power, but no longer. Systems built around Intel's new supercharged 486DX2 chips aren't cheap, but in MIPS per dollar, they're the best deals yet in high-performance computing.

What's the trick? A common sense enhancement that took plenty of engineering pluck. Plug a 486DX2 into a 25-MHz system, and *internally* the chip will run at 50 MHz. Generally, that's all a system vendor needs to do (besides changing the BIOS) to turbocharge the processing performance of an existing 25-MHz 486DX system. No major redesign, no big price premium.

Tandy and Compaq offer two of the first systems built around the 50-MHz 486DX2. To find out exactly how much performance enhancement you

can expect, we tested the Tandy 4850 EP and the Compaq Deskpro 50M using our standard suite of business application benchmarks. These tests, which include considerable disk activity, show a speed increase of 20 to 70 percent over 25-MHz 486DX systems, depending on the application.

Machines like this can force a company to reevaluate pricing of its entire product line. The Tandy 4850 EP's price is nothing short of remarkable: With 4MB of RAM and a 120MB hard disk, it costs a mere \$2699. At \$4999, Compaq's Deskpro 50M Model 120 costs considerably more, but it comes with 8MB of RAM, a high-throughput EISA bus, and Compaq's new QVision 1024/E Controller for accelerated high-resolution graphics; and it boasts much faster performance.

#### Chips Are Jumping, and Performance Is High

The 50-MHz 486DX2 is one of several innovative CPUs that signal a new era of system choices, not to mention a steep plunge in the cost of computing power. In the second half of this year, you'll see speed-doubling systems outfitted with a 66-MHz version of Intel's 486DX2.

Moreover, the doubling technology in the DX2 is already available as an upgrade to 486SX systems. Remember those glossy Intel advertisements with the neon vacancy sign pointing at an empty 486SX "upgrade" socket? Well, that vacancy can now be filled with OverDrive chips that double the internal processing speed of 16-, 20-, and 25-MHz 486SX systems.

Like their 486DX predecessors, both the OverDrive and the DX2 have an on-chip math coprocessor and an 8K memory cache. In fact, the two new speed-doubling chips differ in only a couple ways. The first is a matter of a single pin: While the OverDrive is designed to plug into the 486SX upgrade socket (also known as the 487SX math coprocessor socket), the DX2 fits into a standard 486DX CPU socket. The other difference is, the OverDrive is the only end-user, speed-doubling upgrade supported by Intel. You can swap a DX2 chip into an existing DX system, but that's between you and the system vendor, which may prefer instead to sell you a whole new DX2 system.

If you go to the nearest PC retailer, buy a 25-MHz Over-Drive chip and plug it into your 486SX system's upgrade socket, your 25-MHz 486SX will act just like a 50-MHz 486DX2. Voilà, your reward for buying a 486SX. (Those who've already filled that socket with a 487SX math coprocessor can always use that chip as a fishing lure.) Of course, many 486SX vendors

have skipped the upgrade socket entirely: Instead, you pop out the 486SX, move a jumper, and plug in the OverDrive.

Systems containing either the 50-MHz DX2 chip or the 25-MHz OverDrive processor can't match the speed of a true 50-MHz 486DX machine. The reason? In a true 50-MHz system, both the chip and the memory bus run at a full 50 MHz. In a 50-MHz speed-doubling system, the memory bus

runs at 25 MHz; only data and instructions in the on-chip 8K cache are processed at full CPU speed.

Still, when the 66-MHz DX2 units ship, they should blow past 50-MHz 486DX systems and become the fastest PCs alive. Then again, who knows? There's little doubt that Intel's flurry of chip introductions has been spurred on by competition from Advanced Micro Devices, which will probably have its own souped-up 486 work-alikes by then.

#### **Tandy Shifts Into High Gear**

Tandy's 4850 EP reflects what most system vendors will do with the 486DX2—take an existing 486SX or DX and do little more than add the DX2. The obvious benefit here is cost. A 50-MHz 486DX2 goes for only \$133 more than a 25-MHz 486DX, and the BIOS change is a trivial expense.



Nonetheless, the inexpensive 4850 EP is no slouch. It beats Tandy's only 25-MHz system, the 4825 SX, by about 30 percent in the *Windows* test, and it hovers around 20 percent faster in the more disk-intensive data base and word processing tests. And because the 486DX2 has the onchip coprocessor, the 4850 EP ripped through the *1-2-3* benchmark in less than one-third the time of the 4825 SX. Not a bad increase in performance, considering you pay only \$700 more.

The 4850 EP buffers the 486DX2 with a 64K external cache and in-

cludes an IDE cache controller with a 15ms hard drive to speed performance further. The compact 15-by-15-inch chassis also encloses three drive bays, three 8/16-bit ISA slots, a VGA controller with 512K of RAM (upgradable to 1MB), and sockets for up to 32MB in SIMMs. In addition, the unit comes with DOS 5.0, Windows 3.0, and Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 already installed. As usual, the company supports the machine through Radio Shack retail outlets.

#### **Compag Pushes the Envelope**

Compaq's Deskpro 50M is more than a plug-and-play upgrade from its 25-MHz M series model, and it has the benchmark scores to prove it. In contrast with the Tandy's 30 percent *Windows* speedup, the Deskpro delivers 40 percent; the data base and word processing scores show a 27 percent increase against the Tandy's 20 percent; and in the 1-2-3 test, the Deskpro 50M offers nearly fourfold improvement over the Deskpro 486s/25M.

Predictably, comparison with Compaq's Deskpro 486/33 yields far less dramatic results. Combine the five tests using *PC World*'s typical system benchmark weightings, and the difference works out to approximately 19 percent overall—not far off the 16 percent higher list price.

Compaq is positioning the 50M as "the ultimate graphics PC," mainly due to the company's new QVision 1024/E Controller (which comes standard) and a stellar pair of competitively priced 15- and 17-inch Zenith-manufactured displays.

The QVision Controller boasts a Compaq-designed accelerator chip that offers the same performance as those from ATI, Texas Instruments, and others—which accounts for the system's fast *Windows* times. But it's the new Compaq QVision monitors that really shine. Both use Flat Tension Mask technology for a perfectly flat screen, increased brightness, and enhanced color accuracy. At \$899 for the 15-inch and \$1299 for the 17-inch, these monitors actually sell for significantly less than NEC's outrageously popular 4FG and 5FG, which don't offer truly flat screens.



Compaq's Deskpro 50M: The hottest DX2 yet?

The Deskpro *M* stands for *modular*. The processor board and a separate memory board that holds up to 64MB reside in CPU-speed slots, while an I/O board with all the usual ports slips into an interface beneath the power supply. The QVision Controller uses an EISA slot, but until you find an application that would tax an ISA bus, you're unlikely to see improvement due solely to the broader EISA bandwidth. All told, the system has four free EISA slots and room for four storage devices.

The 50M's DX2 processor board has been wholly redesigned. With largememory multitasking and multiuser

environments in mind, Compaq has added a fast 256K secondary memory cache. This cache, along with some hot new Compaq ASICs, probably explains the system's processing performance edge. In addition, Compaq's system outperforms Tandy's in the  $dBASE\ IV$  test, even though the 50M's 120MB IDE drive has a slightly slower access time than the 4850 EP's.

Although only Tandy and Compaq could meet our testing deadline for this issue, at press time over 40 companies had either announced DX2 systems or the intention to build them. And why not? Given the economies of scale, you have to wonder how long "undoubled" CPUs will last.

#### Plugging Into the Future

In upcoming issues, we'll cover the gamut of DX2 systems, along with 486SX PCs souped up with OverDrive upgrades—which, unless fine-tuned for the DX2, are basically the same systems anyway, because DX2 and OverDrive chips have identical innards. If this sounds a little confusing, hang on to your hat; it's only going to get worse.

Intel believes that the OverDrive upgrade concept will wrap around all its future products. The company avers that as early as this year, DX2 systems themselves may ship with an empty upgrade socket for an even more powerful processor. Or perhaps *the same* processor: If you have an operating system that can handle multiprocessing, there's no reason to put the original CPU to sleep as in the 486SX.



# WINDOWS DELIVERS

The latest version of Windows has the little stuff you wanted. But when all is said and done, it's the big stuff free fonts, multimediasupport, and tighter application links that'll stick to your ribs.

fter the biggest prerelease testing program in history, countless development hours, and endless hype, Windows 3.1 is among us. Can anything live up to that sort of buildup? Obviously not, though 3.1 certainly looks like a strong upgrade. For one thing, it offers increased stability: When an application hangs, you can restart just that program without having to bring down the whole system. And then there

are all the niceties: easier installation, slicker icons, an augmented File Manager, and improved drag-and-drop.

That's all well and good. But after all the advance press, we want more; we want breakthroughs, not incremental improvements. Surprise! Windows 3.1 delivers the goods three ways. With TrueType fonts, support for Object Linking and Embedding (OLE), and built-in multimedia extensions, Microsoft opens new worlds for many PC users. To evaluate these three hot additions, we went to the experts. DTP mayen Bob Weibel gives his impres-

maven Bob Weibel gives his impressions of TrueType; Contributing Editor George Campbell, of Word Processing Clinic

fame, conducts a walking tour of OLE; and Contributing Editor Scott Spanbauer, who also wrote our "Buyers' Guide: Multimedia Systems," evaluates the new multimedia extensions. And because we believe that even Microsoft can learn a lesson or two when it comes to building an interface, we asked Associate Editor Lincoln Spector, an avowed utilities junkie, to examine *Norton Desktop for Windows 2.0*.

#### TRUETYPE ENTERS THE FONT FRAY

he best thing about TrueType? It's built into Windows 3.1. That means you don't have to pay extra for decent scalable type on your screen or printer.

But why the fuss over new fonts? Windows always came with fonts, right? Yes, but they were nonscalable, bit-mapped fonts—fixed patterns of dots that define each printed character at a particular resolution. If you wanted type in a size not specifically installed, Windows would use the closest size available or stretch the bit-mapped font on screen by enlarging the individual dots that make up the type. The result was hideously jagged on-screen type. To make matters worse, the printer needed a matching font as well. Smart users who wanted a better solution turned to

vendors such as Adobe,

whose Type 1 fonts are *scalable*, mean-

ing they're not fixed at any particular size or resolution. For these fonts, character outlines are described by mathematical formulas, and the software in your computer or printer automatically converts the outlines into the pattern of dots (the bit map) required to display or print the characters at the necessary resolution. This process is known as font rendering, and it's what a program such as *Adobe Type Manager (ATM)* uses to create type in virtually any size.

But now *Windows* has its own outline fonts—14 of 'em—as well as its own font-rendering software, which will pump out scalable TrueType fonts on virtually any printer. That same capability from *ATM* will run you \$99.

TrueType fonts will be scarcer than Type 1 faces, though everyone was surprised when Microsoft announced it was entering the fonts business and would be selling 44 TrueType fonts for \$99.95—an impressive price. Other font vendors are being more cautious before committing major resources to repackaging the bulk of their font libraries in TrueType format. Bitstream, in fact, is taking the nothing-to-lose approach with its Type Essentials \$99 font collections. Each font will come in four flavors: TrueType, Type 1, Speedo (Bitstream's own), and an earlier format, Fontware—all in the same package.

Judging from the TrueType Times and Helvetica look-alike fonts included with *Windows 3.1* (along with Courier New and a symbol and dingbat font), I believe that a carefully made TrueType font *can* look a bit better on screen than an *ATM* font. But for the vast majority of users, there will be no discernible difference. And from my own tests, I honestly can't prove that TrueType under *Windows* is faster or even as fast as *ATM*.

Given that both look just fine on screen, the main difference is that *Windows*' TrueType is a medium-resolution (300-dpi to 600-dpi printer) solution. High-resolution (600 dpi to 3000 dpi) imagesetter service bureaus are Adobe PostScript territory, and desktop publishers, weaned on Adobe's PostScript

and Type 1 fonts, are likely to stick with what works.

For that matter, Microsoft's imperial might alone can't buy the technical and artistic expertise possessed by the folks at Adobe, who find themselves being pushed to new levels of excellence. This translates into fierce competition. In the long run, though, *Windows'* popularity will be a real oxygen rush for type vendors—even Adobe—as more people than ever will give scalable fonts a try. And ultimately that means better, more affordable type for everyone.

#### **OLE: REASONS FOR CHEERING**

o matter how you use your PC, there will come a time when you need to move text, graphics, or other information from one program to another.

In Windows versions 1.x and 2.x, the only tool available to do this was the Clipboard. I could copy data from one application and paste it into another—sometimes. Occasionally data from one program was incompatible with the other. Worse, there was no way to establish a live link between applications—updates meant starting from scratch. Then along came Windows 3.0. Its Dynamic Data Exchange (DDE) tools let me create one- or two-way data links between programs. If I made a change,

say, in an *Excel* worksheet, I could update a link to that worksheet in a *Word for Windows* document, or vice versa, with a single command. Still, these links were difficult to create and easily broken, often requiring a complex macro, and I couldn't easily send my file to another user who didn't have both programs.

But now, Windows 3.1 offers Object Linking and Embedding (OLE). As you'll see below, OLE lets me create one-way links to other programs' data in a single step. These embedded links update themselves automatically, and if I double-click on a linked object, the application that created the data opens. When I'm done, I just exit the second program to return to my document. Best of all, I can give my file to another worker with all the linked data embedded in the file.

Not all programs offer OLE tools, just *Word for Windows 2.0*, *Ami Pro 2.0*, *Excel 3.0*, and a few others. But that situation is about to change: Nearly every software publisher will be offering OLE in upcoming upgrades.

Want to give it a try? Let's say you want to create an OLE link in Word for Windows 2.0 to a portion of an Excel 3.0 worksheet. Fire up Excel, highlight part of a worksheet to bring into Win-Word, then select Edit • Copy. Switch to Word for Windows, position your cursor, then choose Edit • Paste Special. In

the dialog box, double-click the *Excel Object* option, and the data pops into your document, complete with all the *Excel* formatting.

That's just the start. Click once on the data and you'll find handles for sizing the linked worksheet; font sizes change automatically. You can also attach a *Win-Word* frame to the

object, then move it anywhere in your document. Double-click on the linked data, and *Excel* starts up with your data loaded. To return to the document, use *Excel*'s *File* • *Update* command.

To create a new *Excel* worksheet while in *Word for Windows*, select *Insert • Object • Excel Worksheet; Excel* starts, showing a blank worksheet.

On a slightly smaller scale, Word for Windows and Excel ship with OLE miniapplications that work as utilities. Within WinWord, select Insert • Object • MS WordArt. Create customized text—upside down, on a curve, in a variety of fonts and styles, and so on—and it will appear in the WinWord document. Again, you can resize or move the new object, and a double-click restarts WordArt for editing.


Because all OLE applications work in the same way, OLE-savvy programs can interact seamlessly: For example, if you have both *Word for Windows* and *Ami Pro*, each can use the other's OLE miniapplications. As the list of OLE-capable programs grows, every application you use will gain some of the features of the others, so the definition of an "application" begins to blur. In the future, when you have a job to do, you'll be able to concentrate on the task, not on what tools you'll need.

I orget File Manager—the first thing Windows 3.1 upgraders will do after installation is pull down menus, rummage through dialog boxes, and click on unfamiliar icons in search of that unknown quantity, multimedia. Windows 3.1's Multimedia Extensions—a collection of dynamic link libraries (DLLs), drivers, and utilities formerly sold separately—put digital stereo sound, animation, and CD ROM storage at your disposal. But while Windows 3.1 is ready for the zowie new world of multimedia computing, chances are you aren't.

Multimedia promises, and costs, a

#### New Norton Desktop: No Longer a Drag to Drop

o matter how good things get, I'm always left wanting more. Take Norton Desktop for Windows 2.0, which should be out by the time you read this. It's so much better than the Windows 3.1 File and Program Managers, so much more robust than Norton Desktop 1.0, so much more powerful than the vast majority of available Windows shells, that I should be jumping with joy that such a program exists at all. Part of me is jumping, but another part keeps thinking about what Norton Desktop still can't do.

In case you don't know, Norton Desktop is a potpourri of useful Windows utilities tied together with a shell that replaces Windows' File and Program Managers. In case you have heard, this version loads much faster; you won't have to wait around with your arms folded for the new desktop to appear.

The original Norton Desktop brought limited drag-and-drop capabilities to Windows file management. For instance, you could print a file by dragging it to the Printer icon. Now that Windows 3.1 lets you print this way, Symantec has gone one step better: With 2.0, you can drop a file on any program icon. If you drop a file named LETTER.FRD on the WordPerfect icon, both the program and the file will load—even if WordPerfect doesn't recognize the FRD extension as one of its own.

That's impressive and handy.
But it leaves me wondering why I
still can't copy or move a directory,
with all its files and subdirectories,

by dragging it from one place on the tree to another.

Speaking of directory branches, you can now collapse them within the tree, hiding directories beneath another directory, for easier tree navigation. But if you want to get to a directory by simply typing its name, you'd better be sure it's not hidden.

File viewers let you examine data without loading every appropriate application first, and *Norton Desktop for Windows 2.0* lets you view files in more than 45 formats, 30 of which weren't previously supported, including *Paradox*, 1-2-3 release 3, *Word for Windows 2.0*, and *Corel Draw*. Still, all you can do is *view* the data; you can't copy it to the Clipboard.

If you're using a QIC-40 or QIC-80 tape drive, you'll be able to put the new backup program (essentially a Windows version of Norton Backup 2.0) to work. If you're still backing up to floppies, however, you'll find it as flawed as previous versions. The program still can't store multiple incremental backups on the same disk: If you create or change 55K worth of files one day, you must devote an entire 1.2MB or 1.44MB disk to that data's safety. If you create or change only 23K the next day, you'll need another fresh disk.

On the other hand, the bundled version of *Norton Anti-Virus 2.0* worked just fine—although I didn't

go out of my way to thoroughly test it. Like Norton's separately sold *Anti-Virus*, it should keep your system uninfected without getting in your way. The bundled version improves on its commercial cousin by adding drag-and-drop: To scan a drive, drop the drive icon on the Virus icon, and the scanning begins.

Norton Desktop has some other nice additions. If you found 1.0's Batch Builder intimidating, you can now record a Batch (essentially a macro) without knowing the language. Version 2.0 also lets you use TrueType to change the display font in directory and file lists. And the bundled text editor—with its multiple file windows—runs circles around Notepad.

There's still a lot missing from Norton Desktop for Windows 2.0, but it has so much to offer that only a curmudgeon like me would complain about it.

But adding a CD ROM drive (handy, if not essential, for multimedia) and a soundboard to your existing system will cost at least \$1000.

And you'll also need multimediaaware applications. Mainstream business applications will someday live and breathe multimedia—just as color gradually infiltrated television in the sixties. But for now, the only spreadsheets, data bases, and E-mail programs capable of using sound or animation are those that implement Object Linking and Embedding (OLE), such as Excel and Word for Windows. Such programs allow you to copy sounds and animation from the programs that created them, then paste them into any document within an application that incorporates OLE—only a fraction of 3.1's multimedia potential.

The heart of Windows 3.1's multimedia consciousness is the Media Control Interface (MCI), a DLL that grants the Windows environment access to hardware such as CD ROM drives and sound boards. MCI doesn't care what the device is as long as its manufacturer provides a driver program that knows how to communicate properly with MCI. Although the selection of Windows-compatible multimedia hardware is still relatively small, MCI's deviceindependent design clears the way for manufacturers to create new gadgets for Windows users—things like videodisk players and full-motion video capture boards. The only requirement is that each device come with a driver, an area where Microsoft is offering developers significant help.

As upgraded third-party applications become aware of MCI, they too will be able to directly access your PC's multimedia hardware, and you'll have the pleasure of adding voice annotations to otherwise mute documents. Investing in multimedia for the few applications currently available is an expensive game, however, with few benefits to most businesses. But Microsoft is betting that applications that exploit multimedia the way PageMaker exploits a laser printer will show up soon. Until then, most Windows 3.1 users will be like kids glued to the toy store window, wondering, When can I play? ●







# WINDOWS DATA QUERY SHOOTOUT

hat do you do when you need information that's buried in your company's data base, and none of the canned reports or queries give you exactly what you need? You could turn to the office computer jockey, but if he's not off honeymooning in far-off Outer Fluoristan, he's too backed up with his own work to help you. It would be nice to have an easy-to-use program that lets you query the data without his help, but does such a program exist? And is the *Windows* environment, with its standardized, graphic interface, the place where you're most likely to find it?

To answer these questions, *PC World* put together a team to evaluate how easy it is to query data through five different types of *Windows* programs. While data base consultant and *PC World* regular Alan Schwartz watched and occasionally helped, Naomi Wise, a writer with a dozen years of management experience, queried data for "The Sherpa Image," a catalog/retail emporium selling upscale goodies at Himalayan prices to customers scaling the financial heights. Naomi, who uses *Windows* regularly but didn't know what a relational data base was before we started, took on the role of a Sherpa Image regional manager with an urgent need for information. Our rules were strict: We'd give up on a query before we'd resort to programming. Changing from managers to schoolteachers, we'd grade each program on every query, from A if we sailed through with ease to F if we gave up.

Our goal was to answer a number of burning questions. Does Windows really make this innately nonvisual job easier? Could somebody familiar with Windows but not with the programs get useful information from a standing start? Scanning only those parts of the documentation that pertained to extracting data from two or three files, could Naomi obtain answers at all, and in a reasonable amount of time? Could she transfer the results to a spreadsheet? And finally, could Naomi actually destroy data if she slammed her coffee cup on the mouse pad, hit the wrong key, or clicked on a forbidden icon?

Since your office data base probably wasn't created with any of these programs, ours couldn't be, either. Alan stored the bulk

of the data on a file server in the DBF file format used by dBASE, FoxPro, Clipper, and quite likely your company's data base. To make things more exciting, customer information was also stored on a separate, OS/2-based computer running Microsoft SQL Server.

## The Answers to Our Queries

We discovered immediately that knowing *Windows* is of minimal value when you're trying to master data base terminology. What's more, carryover between data base programs was

minimal; each had its own unique vocabulary and metaphors. With one exception (*PageAhead*), our "easy" first query took an hour or more as Naomi struggled with the program.

We also discovered that the more a program depended on metaphors that make it appear "friendly," the harder it was to learn. Forest & Trees presents a handsome screen with arboreal icons (leaves, trees, and so on) stemming from the title, but the woods proved an easy place to get lost. Superbase, drawing its screen iconography from that most intimidating of common household objects, the VCR, was no easier than a VCR to master. Personal Access displayed mixed metaphors,

bedecking the screen with "office" iconography (desks, files, cards, and so forth), a hammer, and yet another VCR panel, resulting in near-total confusion. The two ornament-free programs, Q+E and PageAhead, proved the most approachable and the least likely to lure a new user into disaster.

On the other hand, *Superbase* and *Forest & Trees* were better able to handle complex queries. *Superbase*'s one-window approach to query definition let us keep all our parameters in view, while the other programs made us hop back and forth, trying to remember which entries we'd placed in which window. *Forest & Trees*' versatility made it—quite simply—the only program to successfully complete the summary-oriented fourth query.

On the bright side, we found that destroying data isn't really a serious problem. Three of these programs can read but

not edit dBASE files, making it impossible to alter, erase, mutilate, or spindle data. The exceptions, Superbase and Q+E, wouldn't let us switch from query to edit mode without fair warning. However, crippling  $Personal\ Access$  itself was no problem: Our neophyte user's rabid mouse-work accidentally damaged a user-configurable part of the program, and the only recourse was reinstallation.

So what did we find? Most of these programs will need an upgrade or two before they're as easy as they should be. Nevertheless, you might get results without too much trouble. Or you may end up with your fist through the monitor.

# **Meet the Players**

We examined five *Windows* programs in five disparate software categories, ranging from a full-fledged data manager to a desktop publishing utility. Only these programs' querying abilities were tested.

#### Forest & Trees

Sometimes called an executive information system, Forest & Trees can peer into multiple files of varying types to gather just the pieces you need, allowing you to build and present a coherent collection of tables, charts, and graphs.

### **PageAhead**

Essentially a desktop publishing utility, *PageAhead*'s main job is to grab data out of your data base and turn it over to *PageMaker*. Version 1.1, which also supports *WordPerfect*, *WordPerfect for Windows*, *Microsoft Word for Windows*, and *Ami Pro*, shipped too late for our tests.

#### **Personal Access**

Personal Access is a point-and-click construction set for building applications without programming. It's based on Plus, a HyperCard-like environment (sold separately and bundled with Personal Access).

## Q+E

If you use Excel 3.0, you already own a copy of this simple data-handling tool. Because it's something you're likely to own already, we looked at the version that comes with Excel, rather than the separately sold Q+E.

## Superbase 4

A fully programmable relational data base, *Superbase* 4 contains a robust BASIC-like language to construct complex, customized data base applications, as well as all the tools a nonprogrammer would need.



# **MATCHMAKING BETWEEN TWO FILES**



he Sherpa Image's president is setting up a "fast track" training program and has asked manager Naomi for a list of hotshot sales reps under age 30 who earn \$50,000 or more a year. Since job categories aren't listed in the Employee data file, and names, ages, and pay don't appear in the SalesRep file, Naomi has to induce the computer to choose the right people from the Employee file, then compare them (by Social Security number) against the Sales Reps to exclude any nonsales hotshots.

In this first query, Naomi spent most of her time just learning to use the programs. She was initially impressed with *Forest & Trees*' sylvan

screen and eye-pleasing documentation, but the books were short on plain, direct instructions, and many important tools proved well hidden. For instance, when she tried to bring the two files together, Naomi was told that there was 'no such table.' She would have been permanently stumped had Alan not disclosed an obscure technique—one too arcane for any user to guess intuitively—that he'd unearthed earlier in the deepest thickets of the documentation. Usability Grade: C

PageAhead proved much easier. With just a hint from Alan about the nature of its traditional query-by-example layout method, Naomi plunged in, despite some perplexity over the need to create a "startup file" before calling up the query tables. The coolly elegant, metaphor-free screen graphically revealed how to extrapolate data and combine files, and the documentation was written in intelligible language. Usability Grade: A

Naomi initially thought that *Personal Access*'s documentation looked clear and logical, but it didn't provide much in the way of step-by-step procedures—perhaps because the lengthy, complex ritual simply beggared description. The busy array of icons wasn't much help, and after three hours she was ready to use the Hammer icon on the monitor.




In one desperate attempt at productivity, Naomi corrupted the program, leaving *Personal Access* as frazzled as its user. Alan had to reinstall the program—and complete the que-


ry. He didn't find it easy. Us-ability Grade: D

Naomi lost some time trying to understand Q+E's somewhat jargon-ridden—but ultimately fathomable—documentation. As "What gobbledygook!" gave way to "Oh, uhhuh, yeah," she found that the straightforward on-screen display made it easy to specify which fields and values she wanted the program to look at. Usability Grade: B

Superbase was less lucid. While actual programming wasn't required, Naomi had to define the query in a series of statements using the program's own vocabulary and syntax. The dialog boxes for creating these statements sported buttons for inserting common words and characters, but no prompts to tell her how to use those words, or warnings when she used them wrong. When she didn't think to click the And button, the program gave no indication of error but went ahead and produced an answer—a stupid, useless answer-and Alan had to give her the error message verbally. The documentation, written in High-Technolese. wasn't much help. Usability Grade: C-



# **SORTING FROM DIFFERENT SOURCES**



ustomer service is The Sherpa Image's executive mantra. When one of the company's couriers, Pony Express, goes on strike, Naomi must give Customer Service an alphabetically ordered list of afflicted customers. Naturally, the information is split between the Customer file (with most of the data) and the Orders file (which has shipping information). What's more, the most up-to-date version of the Customer data is in a separate Microsoft SQL Server table rather than a dBASE file. (There's a Customer dBASE file that can be used if necessary, but it's a bit out-of-date.)

Naomi's first task in Forest & Trees was to query the

dBASE Orders file. She stumbled over a log right away: The program couldn't quite believe that "PONY EXPRESS" was a valid text string. After a few curses, we discovered that 'PONY EXPRESS'—with single quotes—was valid, and we had the results of a one-file query in one window. Naomi encountered no such trouble with the SQL data, or combining and alphabetizing the results. Usability Grade: C+

At press time, *PageAhead* didn't support *SQL Server* (it may by the time you read this), so Naomi had to make do with the less-timely *dBASE* Customer file. Getting the basic list took mere seconds, but then came the mystery of alphabetizing the names. The

secret (found in another chapter of the documentation) not only told Naomi how to sort the list easily, it let her arrange columns to her heart's content. Usability Grade: B-


Since Naomi had given up on *Personal Access* in Query 1, Alan took the lead here. The first thing he discovered was that in order to link a *dBASE* file with *SQL Server* data, he had to import a humongous chunk of data from the server, a slow process that negated one of the theoretical advantages of SQL—keeping traffic on the network to a minimum. Once he had the data he wanted, alphabetizing the list was a bit awkward; since he hadn't




known about setting the order midway through the query, he had to create an index in a separate, bundled program. Usability Grade: D

Q+E had the same SQLServer problems as Personal Access, but once we had the data, sorting it was a single intuitive step. Another point in Q+E's favor: It was the only program of the five with a readily evident way to control a query's case sensitivity, letting Naomi choose whether a request for PONY EXPRESS would find only PONY EX-PRESS or also find pony express, Pony Express, and even PoNy eXpReSs. If any of the other programs had this option, they didn't help us find it. Usability Grade: B+

Still feeling ill at ease with Superbase's eccentric vocabulary, Naomi pushed on. Once again, we couldn't get some of the SQL Server data without waiting for all of it. And when Naomi tried to alphabetize the list, a deceptively titled "Order" command stymied her briefly. This time, Naomi remembered the And button, but when she followed Windows protocol and doubleclicked it she got an AND AND in the query, evoking the inscrutable warning 'Statement Has An Unrelated Item' and requiring her to exit and start the whole query all over again. Usability Grade: C




When a rookie mistake (no quotes around PONY EXP) causes Forest & Trees to object, real help wasn't forthcoming.

# **ALL THIS AND CALCULATION, TOO**



he Sherpa Image's rising reputation has produced a mountain of new orders, and inventory's getting low. The vice president of Profit and Loss tells Naomi to find out what it would cost to bring all items in the inventory up to their optimum, or par-stock, level. She wants the results listed alphabetically by vendor name (with phone numbers) and exported to an Excel spreadsheet so that she and the company's cleverest accountant can play with the figures. The Parts file includes everything except the vendors' names and phone numbers, which Naomi will

have to get from the Vendor file. She'll also have to calculate, for each product, the difference between the par-stock level and the parts on hand, and multiply that result by the net price.

Forest & Trees easily handled the query and the calculation—defining a calculated column was simply a matter of typing its name and formula into the blanks provided. But since Forest & Trees doesn't export to Excel directly, the only way that Naomi could get the data into the spreadsheet was through the Windows Clipboard. This proved to be a major hassle, since Excel re-

quired Naomi to estimate and mark out the space that she thought the incoming data would require, and made a mess if she guessed wrong. Usability Grade: B

In *PageAhead*, creating a list of all parts under parstock, ordered by vendor names, was quick and easy. It's beautiful, we said, but can it multiply? A Calculation Window provided the costs of bringing each part up to parstock. But once again, the only way into *Excel* was via the Clipboard. Usability Grade: B


Still feeling uneasy with *Personal Access*, Alan hit the books. Although the program created a report matching



parts with vendors, there was no way to include a calculated field in the query display without actually programming it and since The Sherpa Image's programmer was currently rappelling down Fluoristan Crest, this pass stopped us dead. Usability Grade: F

Setting up a calculated field in Q+E wasn't as intuitive as Forest & Trees, PageAhead, and Superbase made it—Naomi even had to resort to reading the documentation. Surprisingly, for a program bundled with Excel, Q+E had no better way of getting data into the spreadsheet than the other programs did. Usability Grade: C+

With the calculation complicating things, Superbase's method of putting all of a query's parameters in a single window proved both helpful and dangerous. Some of the statements soon outgrew their windows, so it's no surprise that both Naomi and Alan forgot to specify the link between the two files. The result? We sat and waited as Superbase created hundreds of thousands of useless records (alas, this VCR doesn't have an eject button). When Naomi redid the query, she joyfully discovered that Superbase could save data directly as an Excel file, sparing her from playing "guess the boundary." Usability Grade: B



# THE ATTACK OF THE KILLER SUBTOTALS



hat expert accountant played too long with the Query 3 results, and now The Sherpa Image is in crisis. Products haven't been restocked, and that means large back orders and angry customers. Naomi must instantly create a "must have" parts-order list, arranged by vendor name, showing how many of each part is needed to fulfill orders and how much the company will have to pay for them. The Parts and the Vendor files can be related pretty easily, but the only way to find the number of backordered units for each item is

to total *all* matching records in the PartsOrd file, then use that total as a calculated field in what's essentially a report on the Parts file. In other words, there can be only one line for Home Liposuction Kits in the final result, but that line must summarize information on all back-ordered Home Liposuction Kits.

Forest & Trees emerged as the only program capable of calculating the answer without unreasonable labor, and it did the job only when we broke the query into its component pieces. After a few false starts, Alan (Naomi gave up

early on this one) queried the PartsOrd file for a sum of the quantity ordered of each part number. When the program managed this handily, the rest was easy: He had it compare the sum quantity ordered with the parts on hand (from the Parts file), which gave us a rundown of what parts were back ordered and the totals The Sherpa Image would have to shell out to buy them. Finally, we brought in the Vendor file to attach names and phone numbers to the Vendor Numbers and then to sort alphabetically by vendor name. This difficult but highly realistic query was finally answered. Usability Grade: B


Alas, both PageAhead and




Q+E, the two programs we took a shine to early on, proved incapable of putting a sum from multiple items from one

file in a calculated field of another. To get an answer, we would have had to send the uncalculated data to a spreadsheet and start fiddling with the numbers from there, or haul out our pocket calculators and finish the query, laboriously and manually, on scratch paper. Personal Access had already been eliminated at Query 3 by its need for programming before it would calculate. Usability Grade: F for all three.


We found it possible to do the query without programming in Superbase—but the amount of work involved was enormous. We ran into a brick wall trying to do the subtotals in the query module—it was beyond that tool's capabilities. Searching the documentation, we found that the Superbase report writer could do the subtotals we needed. Unfortunately, the report writer was so different from the query tool that it required a whole new, and equally difficult, learning curve. Our conclusion: You can do this query in Superbase without programming, but you wouldn't want to-especially when the customers are getting restless. Usability Grade: D @



Forest & Trees was the only program that completed this query in a reasonable way—sort of reasonable.



# MULTIMEDIA IS A RAPIDLY VANISHING TECHNOLOGY.

Not that it's unimportant or a fad that will fade away. On the contrary, multimedia technology will eventually become pervasive—a standard part of all PC hardware and software and the next logical step in the way people interact with computers.

Support for sound and video will one day be built into most off-the-shelf hardware and considered essential for all business and consumer products. If you need proof of this, ask Microsoft or IBM, which thought enough of the technology to include support for multimedia in *Windows 3.1* and OS/2 2.0.

Early adopters of multimedia technology see the biggest benefits in two key areas: training and presentations. Why? Multimedia offers economical alternatives to conventional methods, and sound and video are remarkably effective tools, offering easy user interaction and, quite simply, fun. "There is a thin line between edu-

cation and entertainment; multimedia helps cross that line," says Nick Arnett, president of Multimedia Computing Corporation in Santa Clara, California.

Just as desktop publishing fueled the sale of Macs, training and presentation applications are likely to drive the purchase of multimedia systems for business. To help you with that buying decision, we've assembled a buyers' guide of 18 MPC systems, all of which guarantee compatibility with the latest *Windows* multimedia software.

#### OH, PIONEERS!

As our feature on multimedia training reveals, creating multimedia applications is still a specialized occupation, requiring an expert in multimedia programming. Then there is the artistic side of multimedia: Assembling a presentation or training program requires certain visual, musical, or production skills that the average person simply doesn't have.

Eventually, many off-the-shelf presentation packages will come with powerful, intuitive multimedia capabilities. Similarly, the addition of CD ROM-based sound and video tutorials to garden-variety business applications will bring multi-

media training to the masses and ensure that system manufacturers build cost-effective hardware into their PCs.

In the meantime, companies that want their multimedia now still have options. Products like Microsoft's *Multimedia Works* offer a glimpse of the software training of the future. And as you'll discover in our buyers' guide to multimedia presentation software, a wide array of products is already available, ranging from easy-to-use *Curtain Call* to more sophisticated animation packages such as Autodesk's *Animator*.

Early adopters of multimedia technology will encounter their share of problems. But as the companies highlighted in the articles that follow have discovered, these pioneering efforts can be handsomely rewarded with both cost savings and increased effectiveness—a winning combination in any business.

economical, and even fun.

"With traditional computer-based training, you usually fall asleep. With multimedia courseware, between the music, the graphics, the color on the screen, the motion, and the interaction—this is exciting," says Joe Galvan, information center manager for El Dorado County, California.

El Dorado decided to invest in two multimedia workstations to teach the county's 1600 employees WordPerfect, 1-2-3, Windows, and other popular applications. County officials were sold on slick, laser disk—based tutorials purchased from Comsell of Atlanta. With these one-on-one courses, users toggle between a software application and an on-screen instructor who makes sure users understand the material before moving on to the next subject.

Using the multimedia workstations, county employees learn applications at their convenience and at their own speed, eliminating two of the biggest draw-

backs of traditional classroom programs: scheduling conflicts and different skill levels among students.

"It's training in somebody's office at their convenience rather than ours. And you can train people in a mode that can allow them to make mistakes without feeling foolish," says Galvan.

As technology develops and hardware costs drop, multimedia training can be a powerful, economical alternative to stand-up lectures, how-to videos, and computer-based training (tape- or diskbased tutorials, known in some circles as CBT, or "computer-based tedium").

Some multimedia courseware is available on laser disk. Other training is produced on CD ROM. The newest courseware is built into applications, as Microsoft has done with *Multimedia Works*, and uses sound, animation, and

video to go beyond traditional online help.

Laser disks offer the best quality right now—but at the highest entry-level price. Tutorials such as those marketed by Comsell list for about \$2000 per program, not including the application software. And the workstations to run them cost roughly \$7000 apiece, which includes a 386 computer with VGA graphics, specialized audio and video boards, a laser disk player, and an optional touch screen monitor.

But evidence suggests the investment is worthwhile. A 1990 U.S. Department of Defense study concluded that interactive videodisk instruction (IVI) takes about a third less time, costs about a third less, and is more effective than conventional methods.

Indeed, people who learned WordPerfect and 1-2-3 through IVI scored almost a grade higher in their training courses than students who received conventional

instruction, according to a study by Sorel Reisman, professor of management information at California State University at Fullerton. And the students loved IVI, giving it a 3.42 rating on a scale of 1 to 4.

Early supporters cite specific cost benefits of multimedia training. Sending employees to off-site training courses can cost an organization between \$150 and \$300 per day, not including per diems and travel expenses. And hiring a consultant to train staff in-house can add up to thousands of dollars each month.

In 1990 and 1991, for instance, El Dorado contracted with a consulting firm to run two in-house classes a week with eight students in each. That cost the county about \$7800 a month, but it still didn't keep up with demand. Galvan estimates that with daily use, the multimedia workstations will pay for themselves in less than a month. "And once you've recovered your costs, there's very little overhead, if any," he adds.

#### **UP-FRONT COSTS**

It's a tough sell, though, for companies that already have their own training facilities and instructors. "Investing in this new technology gives them an upfront cost they wouldn't have if they continued along the same way," says Bob Munsky, associate director of New York Telephone's Computer Technology Learning Center in Manhattan.

New York Telephone began experimenting with multimedia in September 1990. The company needed to train roughly 600 mainframe users throughout the state and bought 8 workstations to accomplish that goal. The results were impressive enough to convince the company to order 32 more workstations for other end-user locations and another 10 for its central training facility.

"We're eliminating the traditional bottleneck of [needing] eight available students and one knowledgeable instructor to give a class on a specific day," says John Connelly, a staff director of the company's Computer Technology Learning Center. The new system is "like a merry-goround," he says. "Choose the course you want and, as long as there's a seat [at a multimedia workstation], you've got it."

Convenience isn't the only selling point, says Connelly. In a study comparing

can work wonders in other training situations as well. With the help of multimedia authoring tools, a growing number of companies are creating their own applications to make on-the-job training more effective and consistent throughout their organizations.

Two years ago National Linen, a \$500 million linen rental company based in Atlanta, distributed 15,000 pages of regulations, procedures, and hazardous-materials notifications in loose-leaf binders to its 101 plants throughout North America. Today employees sit at multimedia workstations, click on the information they need, hear the lesson in another language if necessary, and watch a video on how to perform specific jobs, such as handling toxic wastes.

Created in *Guide*, an authoring system from Owl International, the National Linen program has made the mountain of information—much of which the company is legally required to disseminate but which was nevertheless ignored by most employees—accessible and manageable. In fact, according to National Linen, the efficiencies that resulted from organizing the material onto laser disks and computers has saved the company millions.


National Linen is just one of hundreds of companies creating customized multimedia training applications with authoring software—programs that allow subject experts, video producers, graphic artists, and other nonprogrammers to build their own training applications. *Multimedia Toolbook, Authorware, IconAuthor, Quest,* and *Guide* are just a few of the authoring programs currently available, ranging in price from \$495 to \$8000.

Multimedia development time doesn't come cheap, however. It cost National Linen roughly \$150,000 and took nearly one year to design its application using *Guide*. Add to that the cost of the high-end hardware to run the programs—\$7000 IBM PS/2 Model 70 workstations with VGA, video boards, and laser disk players—and you've got a pretty hefty investment.

Not that every application has to be so expensive or intricate. In a matter of weeks, Duke University used Aimtech's *IconAuthor* to create a multimedia training application to teach medical students about acid-base disorders. According to Duke's Anthony Benson, one of the developers, animations were used to simulate the dynamic flow of ions in different kidneys. "You're putting across a concept that would take a page of description," he says.

Custom multimedia applications can be particularly powerful because of their ability to draw the viewer into the subject being covered. Union Pacific Railroad, for instance, used Allen Communication's Quest to create an interactive training program for conductors that evolved into a kind of multimedia documentary about the company. A touch screen brings interviews from employees in diverse jobs alive on video, emphasizing the importance of teamwork throughout the organization.

The new application turned the railroad around, helping to bolster company morale and boost package delivery rates from 48 percent to more than 80 percent. "With Quest we were able to simulate our system and simulate a day's work," says Union Pacific's Rich Elder, a conductor in the service reliability training design and development department in St. Louis.

Since the program was instituted in September 1990, roughly 3000 of the railroad's 6700 conductors have completed the course on 300 workstations. And because of the success of the training program for foremen and conductors, Union Pacific is designing and developing programs for other segments of the railroad, including field operations, customer service, engineering, marketing and sales, and dispatch.

"The training's consistent, it demands full interaction, and you're guaranteed a mastery level on completion," says Elder.



three instructor-led classes in PC literacy with three multimedia courses, New York Telephone found that more information was delivered in 7 hours of multimedia course work than in a 7-hour instructor-led class.

According to Munsky, a former lecturer, most employees are happy to let multimedia computers do the training. Unlike classes, in which fast learners become bored and slow ones fall behind, multimedia is entirely self-paced. And because the program is interactive, employees aren't as likely to daydream or be otherwise distracted. Ironically, one of the biggest complaints from telephone company users: "They don't like wearing headsets," says Munsky.

#### TRAINING AT THE DESKTOP

None of this is to say laser-based training tools are the be-all and end-all. For one thing, multimedia courseware seems best suited to novice users. For another, employees still have to leave their desks and PCs to go to a specialized workstation for their lessons.

Many managers say the ideal training tool would be one that runs on standard equipment that employees could use right at their desk, when they need it, and that comes to them through a network or less expensive media like CD ROM.

Multimedia CD ROMs for training are on the market, but they can't yet


video. Recently, for instance, the Defense Logistics Agency Systems Automation Center in Columbus, Ohio, tried Windows 3.0 Skill Builder, a CD ROM from National Education Training Group in Naperville, Illinois.

But the center's John Cosenza, a computer systems analyst in instruction, wasn't impressed: "It's not there yet. It's limited motion, not like someone coming on and speaking to you, like with IVI."

Still, experts cite CD ROM when describing the future. Leading the way, they say, is Microsoft's Multimedia Works 2.0, a CD ROM Windows version of the integrated, DOS-based package which has multimedia training built right in. Its 50 minutes of animation and audio instruction considerably expand the notion of on-line help.

"It makes a lot of sense for Works, because Works is targeted at very unsophisticated computer users," says Nick Arnett, president of Multimedia Computing Corporation. "It's more difficult to create an on-line help system for very sophisticated users. At times they want a sophisticated explanation, but at other times they want an instant answer."

If multimedia expands at predicted match laser disks' television-quality \_ rates, Microsoft surely will be followed



Multimedia Works 2.0 from Microsoft runs 50 minutes of instruction covering all aspects of program operation.




Multimedia Works 2.0 features built-in multimedia training designed to get the novice up and running.

into the CD ROM market by other software companies developing "enhanced" versions of their popular titles. Lotus Development, for example, is planning a multimedia CD ROM version of 1-2-3. According to Rob Lippencott, director of development for the Lotus multimedia product group, the multimedia version of 1-2-3 will show users how to use aspects of the program when a they need them. If you want to create a graph, for example, you'll be able to see an animated demonstration of how to do it.

"It's the most effective way to teach people something," says Lippencott. "You call for help, and instead of just getting a help file, you also get little programs, little movies, little animated help sequences in midtask. That's why we call it 'just-intime learning.' The idea is, you're never more ready, more motivated to learn something specific, a little chunklet of information, than when you need to."



# Multimedia Presents

You thought multimedia presenta-

tions were only for programming wizards with high-end hardware?

We've got good news for you.

Remember the last business presentation you gave—a few bullet charts, an imported spreadsheet or two, maybe some clip art thrown in for good measure? Nothing special, right? Now imagine that same presentation, except this time, it's alive with animation, sound, and graphics. And there's another difference: Your colleagues are perched on the edge of their seats.

That's multimedia presentation, and until recently it was pretty much out of reach unless you were a sophisticated programmer with sophisticated hardware. But the latest software is easier to use and can run on even a slightly souped-up PC. Essentially, you'll be able to get by with a 20-MHz 386SX with 4MB of RAM, VGA, and a sound card. Windows with

Multimedia Extensions, CD ROM, and CD audio are optional but handy. Given these modest hardware requirements, it's no surprise that business

users looking to break from the pack have begun eyeing these packages.

Presenters who go this route, though, can expect to spend some time learning new techniques and metaphors. To further complicate the matter, going multimedia presents a host of compatibility problems: Audio and animation files come in a variety of formats, and CD ROM players and soundboards require drivers that may not work with every application. Fortunately, a number of presentation graphics packages covering a range of capabilities, from enhanced slide shows to video production—are easing the transition to multimedia. Windows Multimedia Extensions is a big help here, since it takes care of the messy stuff for you, specifically providing drivers that any Windows product can use. And the news gets better

with Windows 3.1, which has Multime-

dia Extensions built in. Even the non-Windows products featured here should be accessible to knowledgeable PC users since they look and feel much like standard business graphics packages. They're geared toward building presentations, not for generating full-fledged applications such as those that run in public electronic kiosks, training shows, and the like. Most important, all these packages allow the user to enhance presentations with sound and special effects—without spending weeks learning how.

At the basic end, Asymetrix's Multimedia Make Your Point lets you link sound files to specific bullet items and screens in your presentation. Provided you have a sound card and Microsoft's Multimedia Extensions, this under-\$100 Windows product can produce quick, relatively sophisticated presentations

Madison Ave.'s specialty is capturing screens created in other applications. Eclipse Technolo-

gies' program supplies the means to link ' those screens to special effects and digitized voice files with the use of a compatible sound card.

Curtain Call, a Windows product from Brown-Wagh, takes a similar approach but uses a script to link these different elements, which it calls events. Scripts are represented graphically, providing visual clues to the design process.

David Warner, director of Air Traffic Control Development at Wesson International in Austin, Texas, is using Curtain Call to produce a demo of his company's air-traffic-control simulator systems.

Wesson's simulators mimic—right down to pilot response—the world of an airport control tower. Warner captures simulator screens, then adds voice and music to create a multimedia slide show that gives an overview of the simulation system, complete with pilot voices and animated radar screens.

Compared with the cost of a video presentation, which Warner estimates at \$10,000 to \$15,000, the time and money invested in Curtain Call is well worthwhile. "What I'll have is a 20-minute computer-based animation," he says. And unlike videotape, a disk-based demo is easily modified without huge expense.

From HSC Software, QuickShow, installable as either a Windows or a DOS application, includes sophisticated imageediting tools that let you import images from numerous graphic formats. Using the program's slide-show format, you define transition effects, timing, and delays and link visual displays—both slides and animations—to musical scores and sound effects. QuickShow's biggest drawback: It requires a high-color video card (32,768 colors).

#### **ANIMATION TAKES** CENTER STAGE

The real strength of Brown-Wagh Publishing's PC Animate Plus is animation, though it allows incorporation of sound files as well. With conventional PC painting and drawing tools, users can create convincing 2-D animations. The application imports GIF, TIFF, and PCX files; converts and plays Autodesk Animator files (the de facto animation standard for the low end); and creates special effects like wipes, fades, and dissolves.

hen you make a standard business presentation, no one expects you to draw your own pictures. That's why there's clip art. The same goes for multimedia presentations, except along with those static graphics, you need music and animated sequences, and these files come in many flavors. Among sound files, for example, Windows Multimedia Extensions uses the WAV format, while the Sound Blaster Pro card and others soundboards are partial to VOC files. Then there's CD Audio, the same format your home CD player uses, and the old standby MIDI. Animation is only slightly less confusing, with two main formats: MMM, from MacroMind, and FLI, created by Autodesk. When you're looking to add audio or animation to a presentation, make sure all your hardware and software support the same formats.

Gold Disk's Windows product Animation Works Interactive integrates multimedia and animation for stunning visual effects. Roger Newhall, project manager for sales force automation at Sanofi Winthrop Pharmaceutical in New York, has been using Animation Works Interactive since August 1991. After he delivered a presentation to company executives last October, co-workers confided to him how embarrassed they were by their black-and-white laser-printed overheads. Newhall's presentation incorporated animation, interactivity, and music special effects a generation or more beyond overheads.

Darrell Boyle, director of marketing for the Graphics Business Unit of Microsoft in Menlo Park, California, takes a different tack. Although a multimedia proponent, Boyle remains skeptical about the latest crop of presentation products. "Any product that requires a businessperson to be a movie director isn't going to be successful," he says.

Others echo that view. "We don't see it being a huge market for a while," says Betsy Fortin, group marketing manager for the Graphics Product Group at Lotus Development in Cambridge, Massachusetts. "Users aren't banging down our doors for this kind of thing."

User resistance may stem from timidity about learning new metaphors and new means of communicating ideas.

It may also be a reflection of many companies' unwillingness to spend money upgrading existing resources.

#### MULTIMEDIA GOES MAINSTREAM


Even with those obstacles, mainstream business graphics companies can't delay forever. Fortin admits that Lotus's Freelance Graphics for Windows will grow into

a multimedia-capable product. When it does, Lotus will join companies like Software Publishing, which makes limited multimedia capabilities available in *Harvard Graphics for Windows*.

Also joining the multimedia parade is Mathematica. Already praised for its graphics editing software, the company has released *Tempra Show* for entry-level users. *Tempra Show* can combine text, graphics, and audio in one presentation. The package sells separately and comes bundled with image-editing programs.

Known for its high-end animation software, Autodesk is bundling Animator, Animation Player for Windows, and Animator Clips as Autodesk Multimedia Explorer. Even users who are uncomfortable creating animation can use Animation Player, the one Windows offering of the three, to modify existing animation files for presentation purposes.

At the high end of the multimedia presentation scale, MacroMind/Paracomp, which cut its teeth on Macintosh

multimedia, turned to *Windows* in December 1991 with *Action*. Experienced presentation creators can link animation, special effects, sound, and voiceovers along a time line and play them on a PC or print them to videotape. Despite these sophisticated capabilities, *Action* is still basically a point-and-click affair.

In the embryonic world of multimedia presentations, none of the new generation of products is about to worry the traditional business graphics companies... yet. But each of these packages, in its own way, is ready for business. And as a group, they'll keep getting better—easier to learn, easier to use, and boasting more features. When that happens, the future will be theirs. If you don't have the patience to wait, check them out today.



# BUYERS' GUIDE: Multimedia Systems

Looking for great entertainment?

are you serious about multimedia

training? The first group of multi-

media PCs offers a configuration

to meet every need.

Like the first color televisions, the first multimedia PCs offer all the thrills and frustrations that mark the beginning of a new era. Just as those who bought the first color sets found that most TV shows were still black and white, users who buy multimedia systems today will find relatively few applications that exploit the sound and video capabilities of their new hardware.

Nonetheless, many of the first multimedia applications are compelling, from splashy CD-based games to animated business presentations. Experience enough of these apps, and you'll begin to believe the hype that eventually all software will have multimedia k most much more.

capability, from ' spreadsheets with voice annotation to CD-based tutorials that look like lavish video productions.

For those who want to get in on the ground floor of this new technology, our guide presents all the machines we could find at press time that comply with the Multimedia PC (MPC) standard, a spec announced over a year ago by Microsoft and a large contingent of PC vendors. The MPC stamp ensures that these machines are compatible with Windows Multimedia Extensions—software that enables any Windows multimedia application to talk to the soundboard and CD ROM drive. The spec also defines a minimum hardware configuration: 16-MHz 386SX CPU, VGA graphics, 30MB hard disk, 8-bit soundboard, and CD ROM drive with a 150-kilobit-per-second transfer rate. In reality, all the MPC systems

here offer more-

Yet even the fastest systems here groan under the load of the most demanding applications: those that include motion video. And the quality of that video is relatively primitive—generally half the resolution of broadcast television with a mere 256 colors instead of millions. Today, you need such expensive extras as PC-compatible VCRs or laser disk players to provide video of broadcast quality.

Such limitations reveal the downside of buying a multimedia PC right away. Tomorrow's multimedia PCs will have advanced data compression for high-quality video, not to mention the advantages of faster CPUs and cheaper, bigger mass storage. If you buy an MPC today, you should first have a realistic idea of the multimedia tasks you want to perform,

so you can match those goals with the variety of systems available.

### MULTIMEDIA? WHICH MULTIMEDIA?

The first question is: Are you going to consume multimedia or produce it? Your answer will help frame guidelines for selecting the right system.

If you just want to run CD ROM titles, you can get away with one of the less-expensive 386SX or 386DX systems listed here (for a sampling of educational, entertainment and reference titles, see "Buyers' Guide: CD ROM Software," November 1991). The performance won't astonish you, mostly because the CD ROM drive-much slower than a hard disk-will be doing most of the work. A 486 system will be faster, of course, but much of the CPU advantage will be wasted as it spends time waiting for the drive to find data.

If you plan to use authoring software to knit text, animation, sound, and video into branching, training applications, you'll probably use your CD ROM only for libraries of clip art, sound effects, and animation clips. To create training apps, you'll need an enormous hard disk, and a 486 CPU certainly won't go to waste. With heavy-duty authoring software like Authorware Professional and Macro-Mind for Windows, the more horsepower you can afford, the better.

While training applications are typically large and complex, multimedia presentations generally include less information—but you still need muscular hardware to create them. Depending on the amount of sound and animation you want, a presentation put together with such Windows applications as Action or Curtain Call could easily run 40MB or larger. Again, you need a large hard disk, and if you can afford it, a 486 CPU.

The ideal MPC machines for running multimedia business presentations are portables, of course. All the portable systems in this guide have monochrome LCD screens, but they also have VGA interfaces, so you can plug in a color VGA monitor when you're ready to present. Alternatively, you might want to check out one of the new systems in the buyers' guide to color portables in this issue. They

### hortly after the **Multimedia PC** Marketing Council rolled out its multimedia PC standard

last fall, IBM countered with its own—Ultimedia, an OS/2-based multimedia specification. Ultimedia is strong on hardware, calling for more advanced audio, CD ROM, and full-motion video components than MPC.

Ultimedia specifies high-fidelity, 16-bit audio versus MPC's 8-bit standard. It also introduces CD ROM XA, an extension to the standard CD ROM format that makes it easier for developers to synchronize image and sound. Best of all, Ultimedia offers motion video using a technology developed with Intel and based on that company's Digital Video Interactive (DVI) compression technology. Interestingly, a touch screen is also part of the spec, suggesting that IBM believes information kiosks—whether inside a company or in a retail showroom—will be a prime application for multimedia.

Currently, IBM offers the only Ultimedia system, the PS/2 Model M57 SLC, and there's been little OS/2 multimedia software development so far-probably because the multimedia version of OS/2, version 2.0, will have just begun to ship when you read this. The only Ultimediaspecific apps announced at press time (an educational CD disk about Columbus, and an authoring program called the Audio Visual Connection) come from IBM. Fortunately, the M57 SLC is also compatible with the MPC specification, and at this writing ships with DOS, Windows 3.0, and Multimedia Extensions. Compatibility with future Windows versions,

however, is not assured.

### A STEP TOWARD BETTER VIDEO

Motion video is where Ultimedia's advantage over MPC becomes clear. IBM has announced two new video-related boards: the Video Capture Adapter/A, a \$2250 board for capturing "still" images from cameras, VCRs, and laser disks; and the \$2885 IBM/Intel ActionMedia II (with capture option) that digitally records, compresses, and plays back motion video using DVI.

Using the DVI com-

CHALLENGE TO MPC pression scheme, the ActionMedia II can produce moving images that look reasonably like television, provided you limit the size of the video window to about a quarter of the screen area. Full-screen, the images are too coarse to

be considered presentable. This is still far better than the uncompressed video offered by current MPC systems.

ULTIMEDIA: IBM's

Video captured with the ActionMedia II can be edited and included in multimedia applications—as soon as developers write software to support the board. So far, the only way to use the ActionMedia II is to write your own program using an optional \$500 developer's tool kit, which is not a realistic alternative for most companies. IBM has announced its intention to write OS/2 and Windows drivers for the board, so that all applications that run in those environments can use it.

#### A LONE STANDARD?

From its DVI option to its 1024-by-768 XGA graphics accelerator, the Ultimedia M57 SLC is clearly better suited to multimedia than most MPCs. However, the M57 SLC is designed to be an OS/2 machine, and the chance of OS/2 multimedia applications becoming as plentiful as those written for Windows seems unlikely at this point. If you're serious about this system, either you have unshakable faith in OS/2 2.0's capability to run Windows multimedia software, or you're a multimedia professional willing to

> spend development time to avail yourself of superior hardware.

Unfortunately, you can't count on the M57 SLC's ability to run Windows itself. As this was written, IBM confirmed that its soundboard driver -a key element of every Ultimedia system—is not compatible with Windows 3.1, and that the company doesn' intend to write one. In fact, an IBM representative told us that people who need to use Windows 3.1 with the IBM soundboard could just write the driver themselves.

f you're ready to embrace multimedia but not about to buy a new system, a number of companies offer component kits that can make your system multimedia ready with a

minimum of trouble. The multimedia upgrade kits listed in the upgrade table all provide the three basic components that distinguish an MPC: a digital audio board with stereo input and output; a CD ROM drive with controller; and Microsoft's Windows Multimedia Extensions, which enables Windows multimedia software to communicate with the new peripherals.

If you already own one or more of these items, you can pick up the others separately through your favorite mail-order emporium or, in the case of *Extensions*, at any IBM dealer. But before you try to save even more money by shopping component by component, consider this: MPC kits also bundle in extras like speakers, microphones, boards that let you connect with a VCR, and best of all, multimedia software.

Those interested in creating multimedia presentations, for example, will be happy to find that NEC bundles Asymetrix's Multimedia Toolbook, and CompuAdd includes MacroMind's Action. Creative Labs offers the excellent general reference CD ROM title Microsoft Bookshelf, and Media Vision gives you Compton's Multimedia Encyclopedia, the home

education title. And if sequencer software is part of the package, as it is with Samsung's MediaWizard, you can turn your MPC into a true MIDI sound synthesizer.

Software differences aside, selecting the right kit is mostly a matter of checking a few key specs. For example, soundboards that sample using 16 bits at 44.1 kHz will sound better than 8-bit boards that sample at 22 kHz, but they cost more and create larger sound files.

Most soundboards also include a SCSI interface for the bundled CD ROM drive. This can save you a slot and some money if you plan to connect a scanner or other SCSI device to your system later on. Kits from CompuAdd, Samsung, and Tandy come with a proprietary CD ROM interface, while Turtle Beach includes a separate SCSI adapter. In addition, don't forget to check the average access time of the CD ROM drive itself. Though CD ROM disks, unlike hard disks, have contiguous rather than fragmented files, CD ROM drives still have to seek those files, and drives with slow access times will take nearly a full second to get there.



may not come with soundboards or CD ROM drives (you might not need the latter anyway), but several have standard expansion slots, and the color screens on some rival the CRT.

#### THE ESSENTIAL PERIPHERALS

The MPCs in this article are basically offthe-shelf PCs stuffed with multimedia peripherals. So the question arises: Why not buy a hot 486 clone, a Sound Blaster board, and a CD ROM drive and do it yourself? In fact, if you're not put off by the idea of resolving potential hardware incompatibilities and messing with Windows drivers, choosing one of the seven upgrade kits listed here—which include soundboard, CD ROM, bundled software and multimedia Windows—may be a more economical alternative.

Whether you buy an MPC or assemble one, the same basic buying criteria apply. Consider the following guidelines:

The Basic System Even if you only plan to run CD ROM titles, buying anything less than a 20-MHz 386SX makes little sense. Moreover, many users are gravitating to 33-MHz 486 systems just to speed up ordinary Windows applications; with processing-intensive authoring and presentation applications, would you want to make do with less? If you don't need a top-of-line system now but expect your needs to change, a system with an upgradable CPU can give you added flexibility.

You'll need at least 4MB of RAM for a usable Windows configuration, 8MB to multitask several large applications and keep things running at a decent clip. Make sure your system can expand to at least 16MB to accommodate forthcoming memory-hungry applications.

The MPC minimum of 30MB of hard disk space is unrealistic. For any Windows systems, at least 100MB is more like it. If you plan to author training or presentation apps, even a 330MB hard disk—the largest offered by any system in this guide—may be too small. Make sure your controller allows you to add a second drive later on. Also, look for a few free slots for scanner interfaces, videocapture options, and the like.

Audio Boards The MPC standard calls for 8-bit digital stereo sound. All the systems in the guide have an expansion board that converts analog input—from microphones, audio amplifiers, and so on-into digital information that can be stored on disk. The soundboard also turns the stored data into analog output for speakers, VCRs, and the like.

Most soundboards, such as Creative Labs' popular Sound Blaster Pro, offer 8bit sound and a 22-kHz stereo sampling rate (that is, 22,000 data points per each second of analog input). This can't quite match the sound quality you'll get with a good CD-equipped home stereo, which offers 16-bit sound sampled at 44.1 kHz. Remember, though, that these specs apply only to sound that the board converts from analog input, such as the human

voice; if you played a 16-bit, 44.1-kHz CD in the CD ROM drive, Sound Blaster Pro would reproduce it with its original clarity. Turtle Beach's MultiSound board can convert analog signals to 16-bit, 44.1-kHz digital sound, but be advised that these files will take up four times as much space as those created by a board that has the lower-quality spec.

CD ROM Drives All MPC CD ROM drives in the table below have a 150-kilobit-per-second transfer rate—they can all shovel a maximum of 150 kbps from the disk across the bus to the CPU. However, their access times (the average time it takes for them to seek and find a sector) vary from 280 to 850 milliseconds, roughly 10 to 30 times slower than the average hard disk. Access time is less crucial for CD ROM drives (where file reads are always sequential) than for ordinary hard disks (where files are often fragmented). Yet a drive with a fast seek time will perform better when reading a CD ROM containing many small files, such as a dictionary or encyclopedia application.

Video Hardware Every system here comes with a VGA capable of producing 640 by 480 VGA graphics in 16 colors. If you want to bump the colors up to 256 at this resolution or increase the resolution itself up to 800 by 600 or 1024 by 768, most of these VGAs offer the requisite super-VGA capability, and installing the super-VGA Windows driver for the resolution you want is easy. Most of the systems offer a choice of monitors, so make sure the monitor you choose can run at the resolution you desire. Likewise, finding a monitor and system that can do 1024 by 768 without interlacing—a cost-saving scanning technique that causes annoying screen flicker—is best.

In multimedia, the term *video* also means motion video. If you want to incorporate broadcast-quality video into training or presentations, you'll need a special board that plugs into your PC and hooks to a VCR or laser disk player. Some boards also "grab" individual video frames for you to import into a multimedia presentation, or let you create quality

animation by exporting frames to tape one by one.

#### **WELCOME TO TOMORROWLAND**

Just like the first desktop publishers' braving uncharted territories of font technology and page design, buying multimedia now will make you part whiz kid, part guinea pig. Waiting a year or two for more applications—and more powerful, less expensive systems on which to run them—probably makes sense for most businesses.

But multimedia education and entertainment packages are taking off, and if you can afford it, what's the harm in paying \$800 to \$1500 more for multimedia capability if it offers great potential for home education and beats the heck out of Nintendo? (After all, it's an IBM-compatible PC; you can still use it for working at home.) Moreover, those businesses that can justify the cost of developing in-house multimedia applications will be rewarded with valuable know-how.

As large companies begin to phase in multimedia for training and presentations, any in-house expertise that's already accumulated will provide an edge over the competition. And in the nineties, every minute counts.  $\triangleq$

### THE HELP SCREEN

### Leave It On or Turn It Off?

My department runs ten 386s on a Novell network. One recent Friday night, I was the last person to leave the office. It seemed to be a waste of energy to leave the workstations on, because they are not used on weekends, so I turned them off. (I left the server on, of course.) The following Monday, I was greeted by a terse note saying that the machines were to be left on at all times and that I should not tamper with things that I "obviously know nothing about." The note went on to say that leaving the computers on helps to "charge the batteries" and that most of the damage inflicted upon computer systems happens when turning them on and off.

I am by no means a PC expert, but this struck me as a bit farfetched. What batteries need charging? Is it true that turning computers off on the weekend can damage their processors?

Ah, the eternal question—not a month goes by that we don't get letters asking whether to leave PCs on all the time or turn them off at night. In our quest for a conclusive answer, we've called engineers from a cross section of the computer industry, people who design and support systems, monitors, chips, boards, and drives.

Few were willing to venture an unequivocal recommendation, and the advice we did get was split right down the middle. One expert tells us, "Leave it on, and your system will probably last longer"; another says, "Shutting it off prob-

ably slows wear." Others advise: "The power surge from turning it on might hurt the system." "The power surge from the night crew's cleaning equipment's more of a threat." Turn it off and on and you'll "...wear out your drive's bearings," "...wear out your chips," "...break the power supply switch sooner." And so on.

If there were a definitive argument one way or the other, we're convinced we would have uncovered it by now. We suspect the only real danger in turning a system off comes from wide variation in temperature. If your system's in a room where the temperature drops below 55 degrees at night, it's probably a good idea to leave it on—but only if it's plugged into a good surge protector, and only if you scrupulously park the drive's heads when you go home (see "Should I Park My Hard Drive?" in this column). Otherwise, there's no reason to waste the electricity. The systems should last at least ten years in any case and will be obsolete long before any part wears out.

The batteries in question maintain the system's start-up information and keep the CMOS clock-calendar chip ticking when the system's turned off. Many newer systems do recharge their batteries when powered up, but using such a system for a couple of hours every six to nine months should give the batteries all the charging they need.

### Which Is Best: IDE, ESDI, or SCSI?

I am confused as to the advantages and disadvantages of various types of hard drives. We're about to set up a large dBASE IV application on our Lantastic server, which is a 33-

MHz 386. Which kind of drive would be best: IDE, SCSI, or ESDI? Would the same kind also be the best choice for our workstation hard drives?

A We've had a lot of letters lately asking about the advantages of the various drive interfaces. The situation has changed a lot over the past couple of years, so here's our report on the current state of the art.

First, you can cross ESDI off your list. ESDI drives are more expensive and slower than IDE or SCSI alternatives, and most manufacturers are phasing them out. If you already own one, you can consider a caching controller if you want to boost the drive's speed.

The biggest, fastest hard drives around these days use SCSI. That makes them your first choice for a high-powered LAN server. However, among manufacturers of the 200MB-and-under drives typically installed in workstations, those we spoke with rate their latest IDE drives as fast as their SCSI counterparts. Moreover, while both interfaces' maximum throughput exceeds that of the ISA bus, newer mother-boards sidestep that limitation by using a special high-speed bus to an on-board IDE connector.

A big advantage to using SCSI in a server is that you can daisy-chain six or seven drives off a single adapter for easy expansion as your storage requirements grow. Depending on the brand, you can install up to four adapters in a single system, for a maximum of 28 drives. You can also hook other devices to a SCSI

adapter, such as tape, WORM, and optical drives. In contrast, you can't use more than one IDE connector in a system, and it can handle only two hard drives.

Neither SCSI nor IDE allows you to mix and match adapters and drives freely. Due to varying interpretations of the SCSI and SCSI-2 specifications, you still can't always attach drives made by different manufacturers to the same controller. That means either restricting your choice of drives or installing additional adapters. While IDE adapters are interchangeable, IDE drives sometimes conflict with one another, which may limit your choice of a second drive to those from the same manufacturer.

Depending on your configuration, IDE can be significantly less expensive than SCSI. If your motherboard doesn't have built-in IDE, you can pick up a combination floppy-IDE adapter for under \$50; SCSI equivalents cost about four times as much. While SCSI hard drives

generally cost little more than their IDE equivalents, SCSI tape drives are about twice as expensive as the ones that hook to your floppy controller. (They're also a lot faster, so they may merit the extra expense.)

The bottom line is that SCSI is usually the best choice when you're setting up a network server or building a high-powered graphics or CAD workstation. For the average user's workstation, IDE is currently a better deal.


Note that in order to get top performance from your LAN server, it's not enough just to have a fast hard drive. You also need to have plenty of RAM for caching. Start off with a minimum of 8MB of RAM in the server, and watch the cache statistics to see whether you'd benefit from adding more or installing a caching controller. To attain top network data base performance, consider switching from *Lantastic* to NetWare—it has consistently proved to be the fastest LAN OS in *PC World* tests.

### Delete \*.BAK From Every Directory

My word processor creates backup files that have the extension BAK. Is there a way that I can delete these files from all of my data directories with a single command?

You can do so easily using the DOS A Shell or Windows' File Manager utility. Both work exactly the same way. To avoid having to confirm deletion of each file, select Options • Confirmation, uncheck the 'Confirm on Delete' box, and select OK. Then select File • Search, type \*.BAK, check the 'Search entire disk' box (if it isn't already checked), and select OK to display a list of all files on your current drive with the BAK extension. Select File • Select All, press < Delete >, and your disk will be wiped clean of BAK files. To restore the usual warning dialog box for confirmation of deletes, select



Options • Confirmation again and check the 'Confirm on Delete' box.

### Cool Down an Overheating System

In my never-ending quest for top AutoCAD performance, I've installed a lot of boards in my desktop 486 system. Currently, I've got a RAM expansion board, a video coprocessor, a caching ESDI controller, an ethernet adapter, and a scanner interface. I also have a fax-modem, which is sitting on the shelf at present. When I installed the fax-modem, my video board acted up, and my computer tech eventually traced the problem to overheating. The only solution he offered was to upgrade to a tower system for better ventilation. Are there other alternatives?

A full-size tower case is a good choice for someone who needs to install that many boards. A tower has

more air space inside, and the top of the case, which is the hottest part of the interior, is about a foot from the closest expansion board. It shouldn't be necessary for you to buy a whole new system—if your motherboard is a standard size, a good computer shop should be able to transplant it and your drives into a tower case.

Before you go to all that trouble and expense, however, we suggest you try installing a FanCard. This gadget is an expansion board that holds two thin fans. Plug it into a slot next to your video board, and the direct play of air over the hot chips should cool things down to an acceptable temperature.

(I've noticed that my friend's drive now makes a whirring noise it didn't make before.)

A It's extremely unlikely that your friend's head-parking utility could damage his hard drive. It could happen only if the system's CMOS setup memory contained a wrong drive type that caused the drive head to land on the formatted area of the disk, or if he used a very old or badly written park utility that was incompatible with his drive.

When you leave your computer turned on and you suspect someone—like the cleaning crew in an office building—might bump into the CPU, it's smart to park the heads. The easiest way to do this is to modify your AUTO-EXEC.BAT to load a memory-resident utility that parks the heads automatically after several minutes of inactivity.

If you own *Mace* or *PC Tools*, use their utilities; otherwise, you can download a freeware utility like PARKTIME.COM or TIMEPARK.COM from your favorite on-line service or BBS.

If you turn your system off, you don't necessarily need to park your drive first to protect it from bumps in the night. Most hard drives manufactured in the

last few years (including all IDE drives) park themselves automatically when they lose power.

As for the whirring in your friend's system, that may be the hard drive's bearings showing their age. Or it may be just the bearings in the fan. All hard drives eventually give up the ghost, so back up regularly.

### Pushing the Folder Limit With cc:Mail

It's smart to use folders to store cc:Mail messages in manageable, organized groups. You can easily make custom folders on the fly after you read a message. 



### SPREADSHEETS (A..Z)

BY RICHARD SCOVILLE

Practical tips for building better worksheets

More people store data base information in spreadsheets than in data base programs, so data base statistical functions are indispensable for many spreadsheet users. In this month's column, I'll take a look at these chronically underutilized but supremely useful spreadsheet devices. I'll explain how they work and show you how to use them in typical reports. Along the way, we'll take a peek at some nifty tricks for efficiently placing formulas in tables.




FIGURE 1: Data functions can pull useful summary information (F14..120) out of a range of data (A1..D8).

Suppose you use 1-2-3 or Quattro Pro to maintain a personnel data base like the one shown in range A1..D8 of FIGURE 1. You need to report the data in several different formats: Along with an alphabetical list of all employees, you need to show the total salary, maximum salary, and number of employees in each department. You could group the employees by department, and use @SUM(), @COUNT(), and @MAX() functions to total each department. But then you'd have to rearrange the data in order to print the alphabetical list. The solution? Data base statistical functions. of course.

Data base statistical functions such as @DSUM(), @DCOUNT, @DAVG, @DMIN, and @DMAX work much like their regular counterparts—@SUM, @COUNT, and so on—except they're more selective: They calculate the values only from a selected column of a data base, from the records selected by a criteria range. For example, if your employee data base contains columns for department and salary, like the one shown in the figure, you can create a criteria range to select the employees from the MIS department, then use an

@DSUM() function to compute the total of their salaries.

The typical data base report shown in cells F14..I20 of **FIGURE I** consists of a set of data base statistical functions for each department. Each department requires its own criteria range (they're in the range A11..D12).

### **Building the Model**

You can build this month's model in 1-2-32.2 or later, or in Quattro Pro. Begin with a blank worksheet. With the /Worksheet • Global • Column • Width command, set the global column width to 8. You'll want a numeric format in which large numbers are easy to read—in other words, commas are in and anything right of the decimal point is out. Select /Worksheet • Global • Format, choose the comma, type 0, and press

<Enter>. With the cell pointer in column
A, use /Worksheet • Column • Set-Width
to change its width to 13.

Now it's time to enter the labels and values. Start with the data in the range A1..D8—the alphabetized information you'll be reporting on. Each department will require its own criteria range; enter them, as shown, in cells A10..D12. Each of these ranges should be named. Use the table at F1..H6 as a guide for how to name each range. For example, to assign the name CU\_DB to the range A1..D9, select /Range • Name • Create, enter CU DB, highlight the range A1..D9, and press < Enter>. You don't need to actually enter anything in cells F1..H6. Finally, to make your results readable, enter the labels in G14..I15 and F15..F20. Now you're ready for the data base functions, which you'll put in G16..I19.

### Spreadsheet Toolbox

EASY FORMULA EDITING

If you work with complex formulas in 1-2-32.x, you've probably found yourself muttering unkind words about 1-2-3's formula editor. It's a bit like trying to build a house with a pair of tweezers.

Let me introduce you to the Formula Editor add-in from Funk Software. Press a key and you get the current formula in a full-screen display, with any syntax errors flagged in a contrasting color. Special keystrokes let you swap between range name and cell address displays; select @functions, range names, and operators from superbly organized pop-up menus; specify absolute cell addresses; and jump

back to the spreadsheet to point to a cell or range, or define a new range name from any point in the formula.

And that's just for starters.

Formula Editor can help you understand complex formulas by automatically highlighting expressions within parentheses and calculating the numeric values of each component expression of your formula.

It's a workhorse. If you live with 1-2-3, you can't live without this utility.

the H and I @DSUM() functions into @DCOUNT() and @DMAX() functions, go to H16 and select /Range • Search. Specify H16..H19 as the range to search and SUM as the string to search for, then select Formulas • Replace and enter COUNT as the replacement string. Select All and the proper count values will appear in the range. Use this process in column I to convert SUM to MAX.

There you have it; your data base summary information is in place. You'll probably also want grand totals in the salary and staff columns, and you can do these with conventional spreadsheet functions: just enter the formula @SUM(G16..G19) in G20, and copy it into H20 for the total of all salaries and employees companywide.

Spreadsheets aren't the best tools for handling lots of data. If you have large quantities of complex information to manage, you should consider a full-fledged data management program, such as *Paradox*. But if you already own—and know—a spreadsheet program, you'll find it convenient for less-demanding data management tasks.

### **Functioning With Data**

n cell G16, you need the salary totals for the Marketing department. To obtain this number, enter the formula @DSUM(\$CU DB,2,\$CU CR MKT). The first parameter, \$CU DB, is the data base range that @DSUM() will search. The second parameter, 2, tells @DSUM() to total the values in column 2, which is actually the third column of the data base—SALARY because @DSUM() counts the first column as 0. The last parameter, \$CU\_CR\_MKT, is the search criteria range; since the CU\_CR\_MKT range—A11..A12—contains the word Mkt under the word DEPT, @DSUM() will ignore any lines in the data range that don't have the word Mkt in their DEPT column.

Use /*Copy* to copy the formula into the range G17..G19. Next, edit the formulas to make each refer to the proper

criteria range: Put the cell pointer on G17, press <F2>, position the cursor anywhere within the term '\$A\$11.. \$A\$12', and press <F4> to convert the range address to the range name CU\_CR\_MKT. Use <Delete> to delete MKT, type MIS in its place, insert a dollar sign in front of the 'CU\_' and press

<Enter>. The formula should
read @DSUM(\$CU\_DB,2,

### **Excel Shortcut**

FAST KEYBOARD SHORTCUTS

by Ralph Soucie

E \*\*xcel\* uses the mouse so well it's easy to overlook the program's <Ctrl>-key shortcuts.

Nothing is faster than entering a formula or formatting a cell in a single keystroke—as long as you know the keystroke.

To enter the current date in the active cell, press < Ctrl>-;. For the current time, use < Ctrl>-:. To

copy the formula on the cell above the pointer and leave the cursor on the formula bar for you to edit the formula, use < Ctrl>-'.

You can even format with shortcuts. The following table lists *Excel's* formatting key combinations and what they do to selected cells, rows, and columns.

As you've already discovered, you can round values by using /Range • Format and choosing a format such as Fixed, or by using the @ROUND() function. But to simply drop all decimal places past the second, try this: In a blank worksheet, enter the value .33333 in cell A1. In A2, enter @INT(A1\*100)/100. Multiplying .333333 by 100 yields 33.3333. The @INT() function gives you the integer value of a number, that is, 33. Then dividing by 100 gives .33.

I occasionally need to enter numbers with leading zeros in Excel. In my search for a solution, I learned to format the cells using Format • Number and the 000# format, which works fine. But along the way, I discovered something strange about Excel. If you need leading zeros only in an occasional cell value, you can avoid the formatting step by entering a formula like = "00"&70 to display '0070.' You can see more examples in FIGURE 2. umn A reveal the contents of the cells in column B. But here's the strange part: If you add a series of these formulas using SUM(), as in B5, you end up with zero. But if you use a formula like the one in B6, you get the correct result. Is this a bug in Excel?

> SHANE DEVENSHIRE WALNUT CREEK, CALIFORNIA

It's not a bug. You're using a carefully designed property of Excel, "data type coercion," on a job for which it was never intended. When you enter a formula such as ="00"&70, you've given Excel an ambiguous mission: You've asked it to concatenate a text string (00) and a number (70). Excel responds by converting the number to a string, and

the result is a string value. Your formulas then try to interpret those string formulas as numbers: The one in B6 gives the correct answer because the plus operators force *Excel* to interpret the cell contents as numeric values. But SUM() always ignores strings occurring in its arguments, hence the zero result.

Data type coercion, when used properly, actually makes Excel much easier to use. For instance, in 1-2-3, you can't enter an address such as 500 Elm St. without typing a label prefix first because it begins with a numeral. But in Excel, as long as you haven't turned on the Alternate Navigation Keys option, you can type the address directly, and the program will see it as a label.

### WORD PROCESSING CLINIC

Tips for getting the most out of your word processor

When I change the top margin of the second page of a WordPerfect 5.1 document, it sometimes changes back to the margin size of the first page; I know I haven't changed the margin settings. Is there any way that I can stop this from happening?

A You've discovered a problem in the way WordPerfect handles its page margin formatting codes. When you change margins on a second page, Word-Perfect inserts a code in your document before the text on that page. However, if you add or delete any text on a previous page, the margin code moves when WordPerfect repaginates. Since page margin codes must occur before any text on a given page, you lose your margin changes. You can see this happen if the Reveal Codes window (<Alt>-<F3>) is visible.

What's the cure? Wait until you've made all your text changes to format your document, or insert a new margin code for the second and succeeding pages. Just remember to move the cursor to the first character on that page before inserting the code.

When I'm using WordPerfect 5.1's Equation Editor with my Toshiba 24-pin printer, my output shows an equal sign looking almost like a minus sign. The two lines are spaced too closely together. WordPerfect tech support has been unable to figure out what's wrong. Do you have any ideas?

AUGUST NECHI STONE MOUNTAIN, GEORGIA A This problem occurs with many printers, but it's fairly easy to solve. WordPerfect normally prints equations using graphics. Your printer is having difficulty coping with the small spacing needed between the lines of the equal sign. What's the solution? You need a larger font size. To change an existing equation's font size, press <Alt>-<F9>EE, type the number for your equation box, press <Enter>, type E, then press <Shift>-<F3>.

Now press <Page Up> to increase the font size for the equation, or press <Page Down> to decrease it. When you're finished, press <F7> until you return to your document, then print a sample. Repeat the process until you're satisfied with the results.

I just bought a copy of Word for Windows 2.0 and I'm having trouble getting PageMaker to import its files. The import worked fine with an earlier version of WinWord. Is this an incompatibility problem, or is there something I'm doing wrong?

A No, you're not doing anything wrong. When new versions of programs emerge, their file formats often change. It often takes a while for other program vendors to develop import filters that can handle the changes. Until that time, here's a work-around: After you create a document in *Word for Windows 2.0*, select *Save As*, then click on

the arrow for the 'Save File as Type:' list box and select the Word for Windows 1 (\*.doc) entry. Enter a file name in the file name box, and then click OK to save your document as a Word for Windows 1.x file. PageMaker will be able to handle this format just fine.

I use WordStar 6.0 to create twocolumn documents. I'd like to create a header for each page that contains left-aligned text above each column, plus a page number aligned at the right margin. All this information needs to be on one line. I'm having difficulty finding a way to do this in WordStar. Can you offer any suggestions?

Aligning text within headers can be tough. While I can't give you exactly what you want, I can come close. The key to the solution is *WordStar*'s tab feature. WordStar 6.0 will let you

align text within headers, although it's not obvious. Assuming that you're using the default page parameters for Word-Star 6.0, follow these steps at the very top of your document or at the top of the first page where you want the header.

- 1. To turn off bottom-of-the-page page numbering, type .op and press <Enter>.
- 2. To set tabs for the header, type .tb 3.4", press <Space>, type 6.4", then press <Enter>.
- 3. To create the header, type .h1, press <Space>, type the header text for the first column, press < Tab>, type the header text for the second column, press <Tab>, type #, then press <Enter>.
- 4. Now press < Ctrl>-OU and, in the dialog box, enter 2 to specify the number of columns that you want.


You may find that WordStar's default margin settings are too small to print your headers, especially if you have a two-line header. You can increase these settings in the Margins & Tabs section of the Onscreen Format menu, but first move the cursor above any of the commands for your header.

While you can create these dot commands from WordStar's drop-down menus, it's easier here just to type them in. One caution: If you go back and change the tab measurements in the first line, delete and reinsert the tabs in the header text, or your changes won't take effect.







### Tips and techniques for managing your data

I wish I could find some way to automatically purge my dBASE IV mailing list of customers who haven't ordered within the past year. Can you recommend an easy solution?

> BILL PIKE MADISON, TENNESSEE

A Create a new query for your data file. At the Query Design screen, type MARK in the box directly under the data base's file name, then select Condition • Add Condition Box (if you're warned about changing the query type, select Proceed). Assuming that the Last\_Order field holds the date of each customer's last order, type DATE() • Lost\_Order > 365 in the condition box.

Now you can mark the old records for deletion all at once by selecting *Update • Perform the Update* and confirming the change. Finally, to purge the marked records, press <**F2**> to move to the Browse screen, and select *Organize • Erase Marked Records • Yes*.

I find navigating through a large Paradox data table to be a major hassle. Is there a quick way to get to the field or record I'm looking for?

> Andrea Hartsock Little Rock, Arkansas

A To get where you want to go fast, use Paradox's Zoom command. While viewing a table, press <\formalfont{F10}> and choose  $Image \cdot Zoom$ . You'll get options for moving to a specific field, record (by record number), or value—where Paradox will search a column for the string of numbers or characters you're seeking. This is an exact, case-sensitive

search; *Paradox* will take you to only those entries on the data table that match your criteria perfectly.

By the way, there's a Zoom Value shortcut that doesn't require menus. Place the cursor in the column you want to search, press < Ctrl>-Z, fill in a search value, and press < Enter>.

I'm working with a marketing survey data base that includes an age field. Is there a way to print a report using dBASE IV that divides the data by age group?

Assuming that your file is indexed on the age field, one relatively uncomplicated approach uses multiple IIF() functions to group interviewee data according to age.

At the Report Design screen, place all the fields you want to print where you want them in the Detail Band, position the cursor in the Report Intro Band (the second band from the top), and select Bands • Add a group band • Expression value. Assuming that the age data resides in a field named Age, type in something like the following expression: IIF(Age <= 18, "Under 19", IIF(Age <= 26, "19-26", IIF(Age <= 42, "27-42", IIF(Age <= 62, "43-62", "Over 62")))). Group 1 Intro and Summary Bands will appear.

That will take care of grouping your interviewees by age. To get a count for each group, go to the new Group 1 Summary Band, press <**F5**>, and select *Count* from the Summary column. Give



In the dBASE IV report writer, a Count field in a Summary Band will tell you how many records are in each subgroup.

### Reader Tip

**COUNTING FRIDAYS OR OTHER DAYS IN dBASE IV** 

Want to know how many Fridays or Tuesdays will occur in a given month or quarter? Here's how to get that information automatically in dBASE IV.

Set up a data file with two date fields, Beg\_Date and End\_Date, and a one-digit numeric field, Weekday; then create a query for this file. At the Query Design screen, select *Fields • Create calculated field*, type end\_date - beg\_date + 1, press < Down >, and type NUM\_DAYS. Repeat this process twice, the first time typing weekday-DOW(beg\_date) + IIF(weekday < DOW(beg\_date),7,0) on the top line

and XTRA\_DAYS below it, and the second time entering

INT(num\_days/7) + IIF(xtra\_days <

MOD(num\_days,7),1,0) and HOW\_MANY.

Transfer this last field to the

View by highlighting it and pressing <F5>; when you're asked to fill in a name, type How\_many.

When you run the query, enter the appropriate dates and day-of-the-week number (Sunday is day 1) in the fields provided. **dBASE** will display the number of times your day of the week occurs within your time frame.



From now on, when you print your new report you'll get a list of interviewee data, separated by age group, with a total at the bottom of each group. Just make sure your Age index is active before you print the report.





### PUBLISHING & PRESENTATIONS

BY RICHARD JANTZ

Expert advice for creating high-impact documents and presentations

Tables in business documents can cause big problems. It can be a nightmare to squeeze all the information into the allotted space and then align it in orderly rows and columns. It can be even more difficult to make a table attractive and easy to read. But a few enhancements can often turn a lackluster or complex table into one that's graphically appealing and easier for readers to understand.

For this month's make-over, we selected a full-page table from a two-color quarterly report produced by the Center for Real Estate and Urban Economics, a Berkeley, California, research group. The original design isn't bad, but the lack of contrast in the table makes it daunting to read. It's difficult to distinguish the first column's main categories, and even harder to tell which columns are related. And while a few blue lines do enliven the black-and-white sheet a bit, they don't help organize the tabular information as well as they could.

To make the table easier to read, we changed the typefaces and type sizes, added more rules, and used a third color as a background in various areas. We also reorganized the column headings to make them uniform and added *straddle rules*—rules that extend over more than one column—to indicate lower-level heads and link related columns.

By changing the Helvetica typeface to Helvetica Condensed, we were able to use larger type in the same amount of space. To make the main categories in the first column stand out, we set them in boldface and added horizontal rules to separate them from other rows.

A third color (a light blue tint) sepa-

rates sections in the table, making it easier to read across the columns. To add the third color, we simply used a tint of the original blue color—in this case, a 10 percent screen tint of 100 percent blue. This kind of spot color doesn't cost very much, and it's an excellent way to add extra color to a document while getting additional mileage out of the same-color ink.

To enliven your next table, try adding contrasting typefaces and graphic enhancements such as rules and color tints. When used properly, these tools can turn an ordinary report into an effective eye-catcher.

- In the original document, the centered title is too inconspicuous. To set off the title, we placed it on a single line and enlarged it from 12-point Helvetica Bold to 18-point Helvetica Condensed Black Bold.
- We replaced the standard Helvetlca typeface with space-saving Helvetlca Condensed so that all the first-column categories are easler to read and fit on one line.
- Contrasting typefaces and Indents make it easier to distinguish different levels of information. Here, we used 10-point Helvetica Condensed Black Bold for the first category level, 10-point Helvetica Condensed Bold for the second, and 10-point Helvetica Condensed for the third level. We also indented the second level and further indented the third level.
- We placed related columns under common heads and added straddle rules to bracket each set and separate lower-level heads. We also reduced the space between related columns under common heads to unify each set and make them stand out.
- We changed the footnote from 8½-point Helvetica to 9-point Helvetica Condensed, used italic instead of the unwarranted boldface (for "Source:"), and eliminated the superfluous line spacing.
- We used spot color to organize and enliven the tabular material. Light blue serves as a background for defining various sections of the table, and 100 percent blue is used for the ½-point rules that surround each light blue area. We used a 10 percent screen that to produce the light blue spot color.





### **COMMUNICATIONS Q&A**

On-line resources for business and professional users

Is there a national directory I can use to look up the E-mail addresses of people on other on-line services?

A lif you're looking for addresses for users on every on-line service, you're out of luck. But you can locate addresses of MCI Mail users, Internet users, denizens of various public and private UNIX networks, and users of many other computer systems here and in Europe through the Knowbot Information Service. The downside: Knowbot won't tell you who's on Prodigy, GEnie, or even CompuServe.

You access Knowbot through Internet. Most business users will reach Internet, in turn, through CompuServe or MCI Mail. You send Knowbot a message with the name of the person you're looking for and, if you wish, his or her country and network. Knowbot analyzes the message, then sends out "knowledge robots," intelligent search programs that march onto hundreds of computer systems and networks seeking the name you specify.

Knowbot is the product of the Corporation for National Research Initiatives in Reston, Virginia, a nonprofit organization that develops artificial intelligence—like ways to plumb data bases. The service is still being perfected, but it's quite usable, and access is free.

To conduct a search with Knowbot, you need to know its Internet mailbox address: netaddress@nri.reston.va.us (case is important). On CompuServe, at the To: prompt, enter INTERNET: followed by the mailbox address (don't put a space after

the colon). On MCI Mail, address the message to NRI Directory Services, then when prompted for an E-mail system, type Internet. Enter the mailbox address at the next prompt. Since Knowbot will examine just the body of the message, enter only the name of the person you're seeking. Place it flush left on the first line. If you have more information about the person, add that data on succeeding lines. For instance, if you know there's a Pete Jones who lives in France, works for INRIA, and has an MCI Mail address, enter:

Pete Jones service mcimail country FR org INRIA

Again, case is important: Names of services are lowercase, and countries are signified by their two-letter ISO networking country code. Knowbot will respond with a list of E-mail addresses, the names of addressees, and their organizations. For a help file of Knowbot commands, send a message with a question mark on the first line.

Is there a way I can get my communications software to check the amount of free disk space before I download a monster file? I hate to spend half an hour downloading only to have disk space run out and have nothing to show for my efforts.

A Some of the early file transfer protocols like XMODEM are not sophisticated enough to check file size at the start of a download and verify that

there's enough room on the disk. Instead of XMODEM, try the more up-to-date ZMODEM, which comes with all the major communications programs. ZMODEM will cancel a file transfer at the start if it finds that there's not enough disk space.

Can I get rid of Procomm Plus's annoying splash screen—you know, the one that requires you to press a key to continue with the program?



A Sure. Load *Procomm* by entering peplus /f. (Put the command in a batch file to make it even easier.) The /f is the command line option to load *Procomm* with a script file and is normally followed by the name of the script. If you load it without a script name, however, *Procomm* will flash the introductory screen and jump right to the terminal screen. You may get an error message with old versions of *Procomm*; ignore it.

### WINDOWS WORKSHOP

Practical answers to your questions about Windows

### WordPerfect for DOS Under Windows

Perfect 5.1 to give it up just because it's not a Windows application. However, the PIF automatically generated by Windows during installation proved unsatisfactory. There wasn't enough memory to handle data base merges and sorts, and I was getting 'Unrecoverable Application Error' (UAE) messages. Can you help?

VINCENT P. AITRO OAKLAND, CALIFORNIA

A The PIF settings Windows gave you are probably as good as you're going to get. Two likelier sources of your problem are insufficient disk space and lack of conventional memory. WordPerfect needs a lot of extra disk space to run sorts. In general, your free disk space should be 2½ times as large as the file you're sorting. If you don't have this much room, you'll get out-of-memory messages. Check to see if there are any programs that you can delete or modules within those programs—templates you don't use, tutorials you no longer need—that you can uninstall.

It's also possible (though less likely) that you're running out of conventional memory—the first 640K of RAM. When you start a DOS application in 386-enhanced mode, Windows gives it the same amount of conventional memory as was available before starting Windows. Consequently, if you have 480K free before you start Windows, each DOS application will get only 480K under Windows, minus a bit used by Windows itself. You can tell how much conventional memory WordPerfect will have

under Windows by typing CHKDSK at the DOS prompt. The last line that appears will list the amount of bytes free. (Warning: Don't use CHKDSK/F while Windows is running—you might lose data.)

To get the extra RAM you need, you may have to reduce the number of mem-

ory-resident utilities and any extraneous device drivers you load upon startup. To do this, first save a copy of your AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files in case something goes wrong. Then open CONFIG.SYS in a text editor, and type REM (for remark) in front of

### **Windows Toolbox**



Many users find Windows a great multitasking shell but find File Manager and Program Manager a waste of time. If you're always running back to the DOS prompt for everyday chores, check out WinCLI, a Windows-based command line that lets you launch both DOS and Windows applications and access many familiar DOS commands. Unlike a windowed DOS prompt, which can take up to 640K, WinCLI requires only about 40K. A paltry \$35 U.S. (\$45 Canadian) gets you the shareware version. For an additional \$80, you can get WinCLI Pro, with command-line editing, command-line history, aliases (like DOS 5.0's DOSKEY macros), a scroll-back buffer, selectable fonts, adjustable colors, and a number of utilities. each line that begins with 'DEVICE'. Don't use this disabling trick with the HIMEM.SYS line, however; Windows needs that to run in enhanced mode. Save the file, and use the same technique to disable memory-resident programs launched by your AUTOEXEC.BAT.

Now reboot your computer, start *Windows*, and try running *WordPerfect* 

again. If it performs properly, you can restore memory-resident utilities or drivers one at a time, testing *WordPerfect* after enabling each utility to make sure that you have enough memory. If this solution deprives you of a needed utility, your best bet is to upgrade to MS-DOS 5.0 or some other memory management software that lets you load

memory-resident programs into upper memory blocks. In DOS 5.0, you can use the MEM command to learn how much memory is available.

### Free Memory

I run Windows on my 25-MHz 386 computer with 4MB of RAM. When I open the help menu in Program Manager and select the About Program Manager option, I read 'Free Memory 14064K'. This would mean I have 14MB of free memory, which cannot be. What's happening here?

A Windows' 386-enhanced mode can use hard disk space as if it were extra RAM—a scheme known as virtual memory. The amount of memory you see reported is the total free RAM, plus the Windows swap file (permanent or temporary) that the program will use when you run out of the genuine article. To find out just how much RAM alone Windows can access, start Windows in standard mode (enter WIN/S at the DOS prompt). Then select Help • About Program Manager as you did before.

### Edit, Don't Launch, Batch Files

I normally run my batch files in Windows by launching the PIF I've assigned to each. I tried associating my BAT files with Notepad in File Manager so that I could open and edit them by double-clicking on their file names. But File Manager will have none of it. Whenever I double-click on a BAT file, it executes the file. Is there some way to get around this?

A Sure. Just use Notepad to edit your WIN.INI file. (As a precaution, make a backup copy of WIN.INI.) In the first section of WIN.INI, labeled [windows], locate the line 'Programs=com exe bat pif'. Delete 'bat' from the list.

Since WIN.INI is already open, you can add the file association right now.

Add a line like this, changing the path as necessary, to the [Extensions] section: BAT=C:\WINDOWS\NOTEPAD.EXE ^ .BAT. Save WIN.INI and restart Windows. (Note: In Windows 3.1, you must make this association in File Manager. Select a BAT file name, and choose Associate from the File menu. Select text file from the list, and click OK.) The next time you double-click a BAT file in File Manager, it will open the file in Notepad rather than execute it. Of course, now you won't be able to run a batch file by doubleclicking on it in File Manager. But that's probably a good thing, because it's smarter to run batch files by setting each one up with its own PIF and then double-clicking on the PIF's name.

### Speeding Up Start-Up

Windows to load on my computer.
What's the problem? Can it be fixed?

KEVIN MAXWELL NEW YORK, NEW YORK A Windows' start-up speed is affected by a number of variables. Probably the most important is your hard disk transfer time. Changing that requires a hardware upgrade.

But software also can influence the time it takes to climb into Windows. For example, if you're not already using disk caching software, try using the Smart-Drive disk cache that comes with Windows. The program installs SmartDrive when you load Windows, but things can go wrong in installation, or you might have disabled SmartDrive. See your Windows manual for instructions on reinstallation.

Second, reduce the number of applications you launch at start-up by removing unneeded ones from WIN.INI's load= and run= lines. If you have *Windows 3.1*, remove some less important icons from Program Manager's Startup group.

Finally, you can save about a second by making *Windows* bypass its start-

up screen. One way to do this is to start Windows by typing WIN: (note the space) at the DOS prompt. If you also want to save a bit of disk space in the process, try this: At the DOS prompt, type COPY \WINDOWS\SYSTEM\WIN.CNF \WINDOWS\WIN.COM. Then start Windows as usual. You won't have to repeat this command again unless you use the Windows Setup program to change screen drivers—doing so restores the start-up screen.

One bogus speed-start tip making the rounds says that you can accelerate *Windows'* start-up time by removing comment lines (those beginning with a semicolon) and extra carriage returns from WIN.INI and SYSTEM.INI. Although it's true that *Windows* must read these files before starting, such microsurgery has no noticeable effect.





### Two Ways to Save Trees With cc:Mail

If you need to print cc: Mail messages, you can consolidate them and save some paper; you'll eliminate the multiple cover sheets and end sheets. Instead of pressing P to print, press W, and enter a file name, such as MAIL. Each message that you W(rite) will be appended to an ASCII mail file. You can print MAIL with your word processor or from the DOS prompt (with the command COPY MAIL PRN) at day's end. Then delete the MAIL file so you won't be reprinting today's messages tomorrow.



### Helpful hints from members of the nation's user groups

### Use Quick Batch Backups for Special Files

Here's a quick way to back up the project you've been working on and still get out of the office and make your train home. First, create a start-up BAK.BAT file:

@ECHO OFF

CLS

**CALL A: BAK.BAT** 

Save it along with the rest of your batch files in a directory specified in the PATH command of your AUTO-EXEC.BAT file. Next, make an individual BAK.BAT file for each essential project and store it on its own clearly labeled floppy disk. Here's an example that protects all the daily modifications you make in your May 1-2-3 financial worksheet:


ECHO Backing up 1-2-3
ECHO Financial Spreadsheets
REN A:\MAY92.WK1 MAY92.OLD
COPY C:\DATA\MAY\MAY92.WK1 A: /V
ECHO -- Backup completed
PAUSE

With the appropriate floppy in drive A:, enter BAK at the DOS prompt. The BAK.BAT on your hard disk calls the custom BAK.BAT on your floppy disk. This batch file gives your prior MAY92.WK1 backup the extension OLD in order to keep it from being overwritten. It then copies your freshly modified MAY92.WK1 file to the floppy (the /V activates VERIFY for the copy as an extra measure of protection) and pauses so you can check for errors. Use this solution, and you'll speedily back up a 240K worksheet, and be on your way.

### Managing and Consolidating ASCII Files

As Cary Jensen and Loy Anderson pointed out in "COPY Gets ASCII Files Together" (January 1992), copying multiple ASCII files such as E-mail notes into a single file reduces clutter and increases available disk space. If you also plan file names, you can use wild-card characters to make that job easier.



Suppose you name all your May purchasing memos MAYDDXYZ, where MAY is the month, DD the day, and XYZ the recipient's initials. You can then easily combine, say, all of RWF's May invoices into one file with COPY MAY??RWF MAYRWF. Use DEL MAY??RWF to delete all the files you archived in one pass.

### **Proper Paradox Execution**

If you use *Paradox*'s PAL language, you should familiarize yourself with the Execute command, which runs text statements as other PAL commands. The script below shows how Execute can ease the job of creating simple menus.

table.a = "customer"
Showmenu

"View" : "Look at " + table.a,
"CoEdit" : "Change " + table.a,
"Empty" : "Empty " + table.a,
"Delete" : "Erase " + table.a
to choice.a

If choice.a <> "Esc" then

Execute choice.a + " table.a"


Note this script contains no massive If . . . End If or Switch . . . End Switch commands—it doesn't need them. When you run it and select a command from the menu, the script combines the command you chose with the table name ("customer" in this example) in an Execute statement. If you select *View*, the Execute command receives the statement "View customer," and runs that as a separate command. Of course, this technique only works when all menu choices are valid PAL commands.

That's only a portion of what you can do with Execute. It's worth your time to experiment with this useful command.



### **Hot-Rodding DOS Under Windows**

Luser: I have a couple major Windows applications and a slew of DOS programs. Early on, I found I got very slow performance when I ran DOS applications under Windows. If you have the same problem, here's my solution:

Using SYSEDIT.EXE or any other ASCII text editor, open your SYSTEM.INI file, go to the [386Enh] section, and add a line with the command PerVMFILES=20. The '20' reflects the largest number of files that any DOS apps can use at a time; you may wish to use a larger or smaller value.

Save your file, leave your editor, and exit and reenter *Windows*. Then watch your DOS apps take off!

Editor's note: The PerVMFILES setting reserves "private" file handles for each DOS window, giving your DOS programs faster access to files. You'll loose a few bytes of system resources, but that shouldn't cause much of a problem. Note, however, that you'll see a speedup only in programs that keep many files open at once, such as relational data managers.

Make sure of two things if you use this tip. First, make sure the value you specify is smaller than the number given in your CONFIG.SYS file's FILES = command. FILES sets the total number of files that may be open at once in the entire system (including all DOS windows), so be generous! I recommend that FILES be set to at least 60 if you're running several filehungry applications at once; 30 is a practical minimum for Windows. Second, make sure the PerVMFILES command is below the [386Enh] heading and above any other heading (in SYSTEM.INI, a heading is a line that's enclosed in square brackets).

SYSEDIT.EXE is a very useful multiwindow-configuration editor that comes with every copy of Windows but doesn't install automatically as an icon. It opens the four files you need to configure your system—AUTOEX-EC.BAT, CONFIG.SYS, SYSTEM.INI and WIN.INI—in four tiled windows on your screen. To use it, select File • Run from inside the Program Manager, and enter SYSEDIT.EXE as the program name. If you find yourself using SYSEDIT a lot, you may want to  $turn\ it\ into\ a\ Program\ Manager\ icon.$ In order to do this, select the group window you want SYSEDIT in, then select File • New • Program Item. In the resulting dialog box, type System Editor as your description and SYSEDIT as your command line. When you press < Enter>, the SYSEDIT icon will appear in your program group.

### **Peek at Your Printer Ports**

Here's a utility I developed to allow a quick peek at the LPT port parameters. It analyzes each LPT port (1 through 3) that has an existing base I/O address in the BIOS data area. Just run the program, and it will give you the status of the Printer Busy, Acknowledge, Paper Out, Selected, and Error signals for all your printers.

JERRY KEENAN FREMONT, CALIFORNIA Editor's note: This program can be very useful if you suspect that one of your printer ports is malfunctioning or incorrectly configured. It's also handy for checking whether a network print spooler is malfunctioning, since most network printing software reports an 'out of paper' or 'busy' condition if it is unable to contact the print server.

To create LPTSTAT.COM, copy the DEBUG script in LISTING 1 to a text file called LPTSTAT.SCR. (There are no uppercase letter O's in the listing, so anything that looks like one is actually a zero.) Once you've copied and checked the listing, type the command DEBUG < LPTSTAT.SCR at the DOS prompt. The file name LPTSTAT.COM will appear in the current directory; move the file to a directory listed in your AUTOEX-EC.BAT's PATH statement.

### An Excellent ECHO

any users have noted that DOS's ECHO utility doesn't allow you to echo certain characters, such as the redirection symbols > and <, without enclosing them in double quotes [see PC] World, October 1991]. I have written a simple utility, which I call ECHO!, that takes a string enclosed between any two identical delimiter characters and echoes it without the delimiters. The command ECHO! "Press <F10>", for instance, echoes the string between the double quotes-without echoing the quotes. Note that there must be exactly one space between the ECHO! command and the first quotation mark.

LISTING 1: This script creates LPTSTAT.COM, a utility that tells you how many printer ports your system has, what they're up to, and whether they're functioning properly.

Editor's note: To create ECHO!-COM, copy the DEBUG script in LISTING 2 to a text file called ECHO!.SCR. (Note that there are no uppercase letter O's in the listing, so anything that looks like one is actually a zero.) Once you've copied the listing, type the command DEBUG < ECHO!.SCR at the DOS prompt. The file ECHO!.COM will appear in the current directory; move it to one listed in the PATH statement of your AUTOEXEC.BAT.

Unlike the DOS ECHO command, ECHO! doesn't append a carriage return, a linefeed, or a Control Z character at the end of its output. This makes it extremely useful in situations where these characters aren't wanted for instance, if you want to create a file to which you can append text without starting a new line.

### Printing Backward Better

January Star-Dot-Star included a WordPerfect macro for printing a document from last page to first—a handy capability if your printer stacks pages facing up. But even when I corrected the macro's errors (a correction appeared in the March issue), it still wouldn't work on one of my documents.

I discovered the problem with the very first document I tested the macro on—it had a table of contents. After

each page, *WordPerfect* would stop and ask if I wanted to print before regenerating the table of contents. Once I discovered this, I rewrote the macro to work whether or not a table of contents was present [see FIGURE 1].


Editor's note: In a string of errors worthy of a thirties screwball comedy, the March "correction" contained an error of its own. The >l~ at the end of the third line should have been >1~.

But as Mr. Campbell points out, even in its corrected form the original macro doesn't work when there's a table of contents in the document. It was necessary to make the macro press Y as it requests a printout of each page. This revised macro shows how you can query WordPerfect's internal flags to determine whether or not a response is needed.

As with the original, this version of REVPRINT uses macro specific commands, so you can't create it by simply recording keystrokes; you must use the macro editor. To get to this editor, press <Home>, then <Ctrl>-<F10>. At the 'Define macro' prompt, type REVPRINT and press <Enter>; at the 'Description' prompt, type Prints backward and press <Enter> again. You're now ready to create the macro.

The first command, {DISPLAY OFF}, is already there. Get past it by pressing < Right> and < Enter>. To place editing and cursor navigation commands like {Home}, {Down}, and {Page Up} into the macro, press < Ctrl>-V followed by the appropriate command key. To enter the commands that appear in all caps, such as {WHILE}, {STATE}, and {SYSTEM}, press <Ctrl>-<Page Up>, select the command on the resulting pop-up list, and press <Enter>. Insert {Print} by pressing <Shift>-<F7>. Type the remainder of the text as it appears. When the macro is finished, press <F7> to exit the macro editor.

### A Good First Impression of Windows

Windows 3.0 lets you customize many things, such as window size, location, colors, wallpaper, and icons. However, there's no obvious way to modify the start-up screen—unless you know how.

First, a bit of background: Windows' start-up image is not a separate file; it's an integral part of the WIN.COM program that loads the environment. When you first install Windows 3.0, the SETUP program builds WIN.COM by concatenating three other files. The first, WIN.CNF, loads the Windows software. The second, xxxLOGO.LGO (where xxx stands for a graphics adapter—VGALOGO.LGO, for instance), contains the program that displays the logo. Finally, there's the start-up image itself, the file you're going to replace.

This third file, a graphic image, has the extension RLE, for run length encoded. This extension signifies a compressed graphics file format that *Windows*' Paintbrush doesn't support. Fortunately, a number of other programs do support it, including utilities that can translate Paintbrush BMP and other common formats into RLE files; at least two of them, *PaintShop* and *WinGif*, are available as shareware.

As you create a masterpiece for your start-up screen, keep two restrictions in mind. First, *Windows* can handle only 4-bit (16-color) start-up images—that driver for your 256-color super-VGA board doesn't kick in until the start-up screen is gone. Second, your RLE file can't be larger than 59K; any-

thing bigger, when you add it to WIN.CNF and the RLE file, will give you a COM file that's larger than 64K, and DOS won't be able to load it. This second restriction will be a problem only if you want a highly detailed start-up image.

To create your custom start-up screen, use the


following procedure:

- 1. Find WIN.CNF and your LGO file, which may not be on your hard disk. If you can't find them in your WIN directory, you'll have to expand them (they ship in compressed form) from the distribution disks. The expansion utility, EXPAND.EXE, is also on the distribution floppies. Its syntax is simple: EXPAND source destination, as in EXPAND A:WIN.CNF.
- 2. Find a graphics image you want to use, or create one in Paintbrush or another program, making sure the image size matches your screen resolution. If you use Paintbrush, select *Options Image Attributes* to set the proper image size in pixels (640 by 400 for EGA, 640 by 480 for VGA).
- 3. Convert the image from its source format (BMP, PCX, TIF, or whatever) to RLE, using any utility that can handle this translation.
- 4. Create your new COM file with the following DOS-line command, where xxx is the first three letters of your LGO file's name, such as EGA, VGA: COPY WIN.CNF/b+xxxLOGO.LGO/b+YOURL-OGO.RLE/b NEWWIN.COM/b. The /b switch tells DOS to treat these as binary files and to ignore any end-of-file markers it finds. After you've loaded Windows with NEWWIN a few times and feel comfortable with it, you might want to change its name to WIN.COM.

# THE HOME OFFICE

BY STEVE BASS

The practical guide to home/office computing

Here's a quiz: What program always ships on time, sends free upgrades to your home, and is a breeze to install? The Whale Virus.

If you're careful, the chance of your computer being infected is less than that of winning the Lotto. But I *wasn't*—and when the Whale took hold, my system became sluggish and programs mysteriously hung up.

To make sure I don't get hit again, I now take some simple steps to protect my home system. First, I consider any new software to be an intruder—guilty until proven innocent.

Many in my user group consider themselves immune because they avoid what they mistakenly consider to be virus hangouts: BBS's. That's a fallacy. A virus is more likely to infect your home PC via a floppy; I traced mine to a disk I used on a friend's computer.

And if you assume your office computer is exempt because it's watched over by your MIS director, think again. Repair technicians can inadvertently carry infected disks, or a disgruntled employee can intentionally sabotage a network. Don't be surprised if you bring home a virus along with the bacon.

Viruses can also lurk in commercial software; occurrences are rare but

increasing. Novell had to issue software to clean the Stoned 3 virus from its network support floppies.

So step one is that *everything* gets scanned as soon as it hits my hard disk. I use Central Point's *Anti-Virus* to scan the files and immunize them. If the inoc-



ulated file is attacked, you're warned and can opt for automatic cleansing. Pretty amazing.

Once your system is clean, do a backup. Having backup files can turn a potential disaster into a mere nuisance.

Second, I consider every anomaly in my computer a possible virus attack. Some viruses are easily found because they broadcast themselves with hightech graffiti: "Your computer is stoned." It's harder to detect those like the

Whale that mimic typical computer problems, like software conflicts, bugs, or power spikes.

Because I download lots of new software, I've installed a RAM-resident watchdog as an extra level of protection. Most antivirus programs include a TSR in order to monitor known and unknown viruses while preventing attacks on disk boot sectors and partition tables. CP's *VWatch*, for example, can be tucked into high memory using a memory manager for a meager 1K.

Because I spend so much time on BBS's, and they typically archive their files with *PKZip*, I have to decompress them before my virus program can scan. To speed the process, I created GET-EM.BAT (LISTING 1), a handy batch file that automatically unzips and scans EXE, COM, SYS, and OVL files. I used VWatch's command-line feature; you can substitute your antivirus program command on the fifth line of the listing. It then deletes all unzipped copies. I also blow away the infected ZIPped files and notify the SYSOP. Later I can unzip the archived versions at my leisure, knowing they're clean.

If you're hit and not protected, don't panic. Turn off your computer and get an uninfected, *copy-protected* system disk and reboot. Run an antivirus program from the A: drive, making sure to copy-protect its disk too.

Now if a virus knocks at your floppy door, your system will be prepared: scanned, immunized, and inoculated.
