Hot Deals and Thin Margins

ore than ever, it's a buyer's market. A quick example: At this writing you can purchase Microsoft Office for Windows, which includes Excel, Word for Windows, PowerPoint, and Mail, for less than \$500 on the street. That's four applications for the suggested retail price of one.

So what's the catch? As Associate Editor Roberta Furger reports in "Is Your New Software Secondhand?" truly great deals like Microsoft's—along with industrywide competitive upgrades, money-back guarantees, and the like—are slicing retailers' margins. As a result, some are cutting corners by reselling returned software, with consequences ranging from annoving to disastrous.

Furger learned of this practice two years ago from one of her most reliable sources—a letter to *Consumer Watch*. A reader complained that his supposedly new copy of Quarterdeck's *QEMM* was registered to someone else. Since then, Furger has received an increasing number of letters describing shrink-wrapped software with torn disk envelopes, missing or mangled documentation, and even the occasional virus.

The complaints led Furger to wonder how widespread the phenomenon was. All but one chain of software retailers we talked to had an official policy of returning opened software to the manufacturer. But with an estimated return rate of 15 percent, the administrative overhead was apparently too big for some stores to bear. Many were simply firing up the shrink-wrap machine and putting the rewrapped packages back on the shelf.

Furger called on *PC World* contributors around the country to investigate major chains by buying, marking, returning, and tracking software. The results of this study, beginning on page 134, may surprise you. This special report also provides some simple tips to help you avoid getting stuck with secondhand goods.

In the wake of this PC World investigation. one chain has instituted a policy of scanning all returned software for viruses. The risk of virus infection aside, Furger believes that there is a basic consumer issue at stake. "It's like buying food or medicine," says Furger. "When you buy something that you think is new, it ought to be new, whether or not it's got anything wrong with it."


Hardware Fire Sale

If software retailers

think that they have it rough, they should get a taste of the margins that hardware vendors endure. As this month's cover story ("DX2-66s: Fastest PCs in the Universe") reveals, you can buy a system with the speediest Intel CPU for a mere \$2041, complete with 202MB hard disk, super-VGA monitor, and 8MB of RAM. You'd be hardpressed to assemble a cheaper 66-MHz DX2 system from parts.

The PC World Test Center subjected 24 DX2-66 scorchers to exhaustive application-based benchmarks (the industry-standard BAPCo test, plus our own Windows 3.1 suite) for 12 hours of runtime testing on each system. When the smoke cleared, six machines were the swiftest PCs of any kind we've tested.

Think for a minute. When was the last time you could buy a member of the fastest class of PCs, fully configured, for \$2000? Not in the 8088, 286, or 386 eras. Even more remarkable, the quality and quantity of service and support continue to climb; a year's free on-site service is the rule, with four of the systems offering two-year warranties and two of them providing three-year warranties. It



leaves us wondering just how low hardware prices can go and how much value vendors can add before they start squeez-

ing each other out of existence.

In fact, we had to pull one system from the review because the company went out of business. Before we went to press, another manufacturer expired, and two others (one of them Everex, a major player that had been responsible for much groundbreaking technology) filed for Chapter 11.

As consumers, we want it all—our money back if we don't like a program, incredibly fast and cheap PCs with lifetime warranties, and low prices. As Furger's special report and this month's system review demonstrate, the vendors are stretching themselves to the limit to meet these demands. That may mean tough sledding for them, but for you it means the best value that the industry has ever delivered.

Hard Disk Warranties: More-or Less-Than Meets the Eye

hen you buy a new hard drive that comes with a five-year warranty, you probably expect to be covered if the drive fails after four years. Surprise! When it comes to hard drives, warranty coverage may not be all that it seems.

Just ask Dr. Geoff Smith, president of Wesco Technologies of San Clemente, California. Smith had maxed out all 220MB of his office computer's hard disk with program and data files. Rather than spending several thousand dollars on a new computer, he decided to buy a second drive.

Warranty Woes

Recognizing the importance of having a reliable drive backed by a strong manufacturer's warranty, Smith began shopping to see which company offered the best warranty. After reading through ads and product literature, Smith settled on Fujitsu, which offers a five-year warranty on all its drives, and began calling around for the best price. He found a good one—offered by Hard Drives International—but when it came time to place his order, Smith discovered that his new drive came with a one-year warranty from HDI rather than a full five-year warranty from Fujitsu.

Smith's experience is not uncommon in the hard drive market and is certainly not limited to drives made by Fujitsu or sold by Hard Drives International. A survey of mail-order advertisements for hard drives from a variety of leading companies indicates that price isn't the only thing that varies from one reseller to the next. Depending on the reseller, the same drive could be advertised with a one-year or five-year warranty—or with no discussion of the warranty. Similarly, some resellers said they handled warranty claims, while others said those were the manufacturer's responsibility.

"There has been some confusion in the way warranties have been offered," Matt Keowen, director of marketing services at Fujitsu. Warranties on Fujitsu drives, like those on drives from several manufacturers, including Seagate, Conner, and Maxtor, are typically handled by resellers, who determine the length of the warranty and handle its administration.

According to Keowen, the focus on resellers rather than on end users is a carryover from a

time when drives were sold almost exclusively to PC manufacturers-not end users-for inclusion in desktop computers. "The purchase price was determined by all the things the PC manufacturers wanted us to provide, including the length of warranty coverage," says Keowen. PC manufacturers keen on getting the lowest possible price could opt for a shorter warranty. The market for hard drives is now considerably broader (they're now sold to end users as well as to value-added resellers, distributors, retail chains, and PC makers), but the old reseller-oriented policies still apply.

Return to Reseller

That means you may not get the full manufacturer's warranty when you buy a new drive—it's up to the reseller from whom you buy it. It also means that when the drive fails, you don't go back to the manufacturer (except in rare circumstances). You go to the reseller, which ships the drive back to the manufacturer, which ships a replacement to the reseller, which sends it to you.

To be sure, virtually every manu-



facturer vows to stand behind its drive should the reseller be unwilling or unable to help. But with a few exceptions, they're not set up to deal

with end-user inquiries. The bottom line: Drives have not been sold with the end user in mind. They often come without detailed installation instructions, unless the reseller includes them as a value-added service. (Hard Drives International, for example, provides very detailed installation instructions that its own staff has prepared.) Similarly, you won't always find a manufacturer's warranty card in the box—which makes it difficult to know what the terms and conditions are.

This is changing, however, and manufacturers are beginning to offer innovative warranties and services that reflect the growing end-user interest in their products. Fujitsu, for example, expects to start providing five-year end-user warranties on all its hard drives early this year. No matter where you buy the drive, the warranty (detailed on a card included with every unit) should be

BUG WATCH

FreezeFrame 1.0

This graphics conversion and file capture program may freeze up when users try to convert a graphics file type that the program does not support, such as a Macintosh GIF file. Users report that after FreezeFrame's conversion module issues an error message, the program occasionally locks up, requiring users to complete a full rebooting of the system. DeltaPoint officials said they are aware of the bug and plan to fix it in the next version of FreezeFrame.

Quicken Version 2.0 for Windows

Some users of this personal finance software are finding their checking accounts out of balance due to an error in *Quicken for Windows*' year-end file copying feature. The problem has appeared most commonly following an upgrade to this latest release. (The bug was fixed in 2.0 release 5 of the software, so copies of *Quicken for Windows* purchased after November 13, 1992, should not be affected.) Users can get a free copy of the fix on disk by calling Intuit's tech support line.

Norton AntiVirus 2.1

Symantec has reported that some copies of its virus protection software can transmit false indications of system infection after users copy an updated virus definitions file from the Norton BBS or from Norton's CompuServe forum onto their systems. At that point, Norton AntiVirus begins incorrectly alerting users that their system is infected with MtE, the so-called Dark Avenger Mutating Engine.

Version 2.1.3 of NAV is free of this confusing bug. If you own an affected copy of Norton Antivirus, a free patch (PTCH-1A.ZIP) is available for download from Symantec's BBS and the Norton forum on CompuServe (GO NORTON), or by calling Norton's technical support. Symantec recommends reinstalling Norton AntiVirus in an empty directory, installing the patch file, then reinstalling the updated virus definitions file.

available to all registered owners. Although users will still have the option of going through their reseller, they will also have the chance to deal directly with Fujitsu.

Other hard drive manufacturers are also focusing on the end user. Seagate's hard drive warranties are still geared toward system manufacturers and resellers, but the company has established an Orphan Program for users who can't get assistance from their reseller. These individuals can contact Seagate's customer service department on a toll-free line. Repairs are free if the unit is still under warranty. Quantum, for its part, now offers a renewable warranty on most of its drives that's available to all Quantum drive owners, independent of the reseller. If your drive fails while still under warranty, you get a replacement drive, and the war-

ranty clock is reset to zero. So if your drive fails 22 months into a two-year warranty, you get a full two-year extension on the replacement unit. Neat, huh?

A word of caution, though: While many drive manufacturers are taking steps in the right direction, not all are adopting end-user policies. Therefore, before buying a drive, ask the reseller a few questions—and then get your answers in writing:

- What's the length of the warranty?
- Who services the warranty—the reseller or the manufacturer? (Ideally, you'd get the option of going to either place.)
- Are failed drives replaced with new drives or reconditioned ones? (Often you'll get a refurbished drive should yours fail while under warranty.)
 - What's the average replacement time?

Perils of International Purchasing

Two years ago I purchased Microsoft Works in Spanish at a local store. Then I received MS-DOS 5.0 as a gift from an American friend. I also bought Windows 3.1 at a store in Los Angeles shortly after it was released. I have mailed all the registration cards and still retain all the original disks, manuals, registration card tear-offs, invoices, and so on to prove ownership. However, in each case I have been ignored by Microsoft: no promised newsletter, no update information, not even a simple acknowledgment. And though I consider myself a loyal customer, I am not eager to pay full price for revisions of these products.



Editor's note: According to Microsoft, international customers are supposed to receive support (from update information and discounts to phone support) locally. According to Renee Greenup, Microsoft international public relations coordinator, this policy applies whether customers are using an English version of a product or a foreign-language version and regardless of where it was purchased.

Unfortunately, though, many international distributors and resellers don't offer customer service and support. Out of frustration, users contact Microsoft, which in turn refers them to someone local. If you're an international user who is feeling abandoned, try contact your nearest Microsoft Product Service and Support Subsidiary. Each of these offices, Greenup says, is fully equipped to handle any questions users may have.

Central American and Caribbean users should contact the Microsoft subsidiary in Venezuela via fax at 58-2-923-835; European users can reach the Microsoft office in France via fax at 33-146-351-030; and Asian customers should contact the Japan office via fax at 81-3-54-84-0757. International customers might also consider using the Microsoft forum on CompuServe, which is available 24 hours a day (call 800/841-8199 for more information). A Spanish-language

As part of my research, I contacted both my local value-added reseller and the Twinhead corporate offices in New Jersey. Twinhead staff told me that though this unit did not have an external battery charger, third-party vendors offered a compatible charger. I accepted this information and bought the Slimnote. After receiving the unit, I began my search for the external charger-with no success. When I tried contacting Twinhead again, they told me they knew of no such third-party vendors.

Editor's note: Doug Moglin, marketing manager at Twinhead, confirmed that there is currently no external adapter available from either Twinhead or a third-party manufacturer. Although he could not explain why Meskell was given incorrect information, Moglin told *Consumer Watch* that he has notified all sales personnel of the options available either from Twinhead or a third party to eliminate any similar confusion. Further, "in compensation for his difficulties," Twinhead also supplied Meskell with an AC/DC adapter for a car.

E-Mail and Faxes Are Great, But . . .

use electronic mail and fax to negotiate for and buy supplies. Are these messages as legally binding as signed paper letters?

Editor's note: According to Jeffrey Kingston, a computer law attorney and partner in the San Francisco firm of Brobeck, Phleger, and Harrison, in most cases faxes and E-mail messages are acceptable means of handling business transactions. "But there are also risks associated with conducting business using these types of media," he notes, particularly if disagreements arise over the terms of a deal. Traditional written

contracts, says Kingston, include all the history of an agreement, together with verification that the person entering into the deal is in fact authorized to do so. The minute you start shedding elements of formality, says Kingston, such as the signed and notarized contract, upholding an agreement in a dispute becomes increasingly difficult. Agreements negotiated via E-mail and fax can raise questions about who actually sent the correspondence and whether they were authorized to do so. While these issues shouldn't keep you from conducting business with E-mail and faxes, you should take care to follow up and get a signed paper copy for your records.



A Business Plan for the Nineties

ou've just emerged from your twelfth business meeting of the day. A pile of faxes has taken over your chair, your voice mailbox is full, and the report you sweated bullets over has landed back on your desk for major revisions. Suddenly the idea of branching out on your own has new appeal. But how do you manage to go into business without going into hock? This month Judy Merrill, a partner in the San Francisco Bay Area public-relations firm Shepherd Merrill Communications Group, gives her blueprint for creating the "virtual company"-mixing the best of the corporate and entrepreneurial worlds with the help of personal computers. —Ed.

Creating the Virtual Office

Ever since I started working for a big company, I've dreamt of being my own boss. My problem was figuring out how to maintain access to first-class resources and highly skilled professionals without having to rent office space, buy a ton of furniture and equipment, and become somebody else's boss.

Last year, with the help of Robin Shepherd, Gail De Lano, and Vicki Wagner, I finally did it. Inspired by William Davidow and Michael Malone's *The Virtual Corporation* (Harper Business, New York, 1992), we formed the Shepherd Merrill Communications Group (SMCG), a public-relations firm representing high-tech companies. SMCG helps these firms position and launch new products, write business plans and annual reports, schedule meetings with the media, and so on.

But SMCG is a company without walls. There's no executive suite, no lushly carpeted meeting rooms, no receptionist or assistants. Each partner works independently from her own office. And thanks to personal computers and fax machines, we can provide the same services as a bigger operation at a fraction of the cost.

Setting Up Shop

How did we do it? First we established some basic operating procedures. We set up a consistent rate structure for each partner and decided that each of us would be responsible for drumming up new business and keeping our own books. To create a consistent look for everything that goes out to our clients, we designed a stylebook with templates for fax cover sheets, press releases, reports, memos, and invoices. We agreed to meet at least once a month to brainstorm and discuss the status of each project. Being equal partners, we each chose our own comput-

ers, peripherals, telephones, and other office equipment. Two of us picked PCs, the other two chose Macintoshes.

It didn't take us long to realize that the key to making this kind of company work was setting up effective communications. Suddenly we were dealing with four partners, ten clients, and hundreds of professional contacts—many in different time zones, on different schedules, and with different sets of priorities.

While the telephone is our lifeline, we also rely on fax-modems and fax machines to stay in touch with the outside world. We use Phoenix Technologies' PhoenixFax for Windows and send-only fax boards to transmit computer-created documents, and stand-alone fax machines to send and receive hard copy. (They're also handy for making quick one-page photocopies.) On-line services such as MCI Mail and CompuServe are essential for transferring files and sending important E-mail to our customers

and each other. For clients who aren't connected to these systems, we transfer files directly between computers using communications software such as Hilgraeve's HyperAccess for Windows and Software Venture Group's MicroPhone II. And instead of hiring a recep-

tionist, we use answering machines and commercial voice-mail services such as Pacific Bell's Message Center.

But even the best communications setup isn't worth very much if you're not able to share files. Because we frequently collaborate on press releases, slide presentations, and other documents, we needed programs that would let us send files from Windows PCs to Mac and back, but with the formatting intact. That's why we standardized on software that offers cross-platform com-

patibility, such as Microsoft Word. We also use the Macintosh and Windows versions of Timeslips for tracking our billable hours and Intuit's Quicken for accounting. For tracking media contacts, generating reports, and building targeted mailing lists, we employ three different databases—Borland's Paradox, Claris's FileMaker for the Macintosh, and Portfolio Software's Dynodex; we use comma-delimited ASCII format to trade files back and forth.

Lean and Mean

Coming together as a team has several obvious benefits. We're able to share our expertise and pool our resources. For example, we split the cost of hiring a graphic designer to create our logo, and get a better deal at the print shop and office supply stores by ordering in bulk.

But the real beauty of this arrangement is that we can be as big or as small as we want, depending on the client's needs. Each partner has a database with the names of hundreds of freelance writers, photographers, designers, couriers, and industry contacts. When I have a big project, I get on the phone and assemble my team. When the project's done, the team disbands. We don't have to worry about training employees or paying staff salaries when business is slow—a savings we can pass along to our clients.

It's true, sometimes I miss the personal interaction you get every day in the corporate world. But the support and expertise I get from my colleagues, as well as the ability to make my own rules about when and how hard I work, far outweigh this disadvantage. Best of all, I'm able to focus all my efforts toward helping clients, without spending valuable time on meetings and other less productive corporate activities.

PC Support Gets Simple: Whatever You Want



The first thing you notice about the service and support plans of major PC makers is how heavily the ifs, ands, and buts weigh in. IBM

gives you three years of on-site service—even boasting a 4-hour turnaround—but only on some PS/2s, not ValuePoints, PS/1s, or notebooks. And if your Model 95 was purchased before a certain date, it carries only a year of onsite. Compaq advertises a three-year warranty on everything... but printers. Dell has one program for its high-end PCs, another for Dimensions, another for PCs bought through discount stores.

Have It Your Way

Confusing? Yes, but a big improvement over the tell-it-to-your-dealer policies of days past. And things get a lot better from here on. PC warranties have begun to metamorphose into a simple statement of support wherever and whenever you need it.

The transformation won't happen tomorrow. But at least the largest vendors now clearly agree with Dell that service is a terrific way to stand out in a same-same pricing environment-especially if you build 'em right in the first place. And service matters to users: Note the spike in PS/2 sales after IBM's new warranty. Reason enough for Compaq to up its warranty to three years and phone support to seven days a week, 24 hours a day. AST, Dell, and other firsttier competitors have unannounced plans to follow IBM and Compaq to the 7/24 plan and improve on-site policies as well. Everyone is drafting three-year, on-site contingency plans.

The majors figure new technology will let them deliver higher levels of service while actually lowering some costs and avoiding others. The cost they most want to avoid is the \$100 to \$200 dropped for the average on-site service

request. The precise figure has less to do with the repair itself than the number of trips a repair technician makes.

To minimize road trips, large vendors are building expert systems to help technicians resolve most problems over the phone. Smart phone systems are routing calls faster, saving staff and phone charges. Databases detailing precise configuration and repair histories of PCs are becoming de rigueur.

These measures wouldn't do much for your car or VCR. But your PC has on-board intelligence and almost no moving parts. The most complex repair is a component swap. On those occasions when a swap is necessary (about 1 percent of the time), vendors want a technician to walk in with a precise diagnosis and a "hero kit" of the right replacement parts.

Compaq's RemotePAQ software lets support personnel audit a modemequipped PC and diagnose its problems anywhere a phone will reach, any time that's convenient for you.

If your WIN.INI just needs to be reconfigured or your BIOS is out of date, a technician can download a fix over the phone. When digital signal processors become commonplace, it will be feasible to download even large bundles of software or technical manuals such as the CD ROM-based *Quick-Find* reference library from Compaq.

Do It Yourself

Who'd want a technical manual? Vendors hope you will—or, at least, highly graphical repair charts. The fastest and cheapest way to service your PG is to do it yourself (DIY). It's no big deal once you know the problem. The occasional part failure could be diagnosed by phone and replaced by you from a drop-shipped hero kit. To that end, Dell has combined its new snap-together L chassis with a phone line and cash incentives for DIYers.

Vendors will match service offerings to the needs and budgets of different customer groups. Joe Bob's PC-O-Rama may not offer much, but name brands can afford a wide selection. You already get a "lifetime" of telephone support from Dell, and why not? Most PC problems occur in the first 90 days, after which PCs are more likely to be replaced than break.

The warranty scenario may be confusing today, but tomorrow it will be simple: a "lifetime" of PC security.



DOS 6: MORE UTILITY,

C users are a finicky lot. For years software vendors tried to tempt them with utility products designed to compensate for DOS's shortcomings. Some vendors tried the smorgasbord approach, offering packages with everything from disk optimizers to communications programs. Others tried the steak tartare approach, creating products that featured intimidating bit-level disk editors and bare-bones interfaces requiring arcane command switches. Some even tried

the red herring approach, slipping the utilities into DOS and Windows shell products. Though all of the products were well received by reviewers, few users bought them. Rod Turner, executive vice president for Symantec's Peter Norton Group, estimates that fewer than 5 percent of all PC users own utilities products.

Now it looks as if Microsoft has a recipe that may satisfy all but the most demanding users: DOS 6.0, slated for release in April, incorporates numerous improvements over

> its predecessor in the form of basic utilities previously available at extra cost from thirdparty vendors. The DOS 6.0 offerings include on-the-fly data compression, virus protection, backup, and basic networking.



extra cost" may be the key ingredient here. The utility products included in the beta version we tried were solid and easy to use. Several of the programs were scaled-down versions licensed from Central Point Software and Symantec. Though Microsoft readily admits that full-fledged products from third-party vendors can do some jobs more thoroughly, the more complete products don't include the operating system, which users must buy anyway.

MORE POWER

Like DOS 5.0, this version will be available as an upgrade. John Dunkle, president of WorkGroup Technologies, expects it to sell at approximately \$60 on the street, about \$10 more than DOS 5.0. He estimates that buying utilities similar to those offered in DOS 6.0 from third-party vendors would cost about \$800. As a result, the product could outsell DOS 5.0, Microsoft's most successful DOS version to date, by 15 percent, Dunkle said.

How DOS 6.0 will affect third-party utility vendors is unclear. Once users sample a scaled-down version of, say, the backup program, they want a more robust thirdparty package, said Richard Freedman, MS-DOS product manager at Microsoft. Both Symantee and Central Point Software agree with Freedman and anticipate that brisk sales of DOS 6.0 will lead to increased sales of their utilities. For more sophisticated users this might be the case. But DOS 6.0 is intended for the average home or business user and could satisfy most of their needs. "If [the operating system] includes all these features, there's no reason to buy them from somebody else," Dunkle said.


Data Compression

DOS 6.0 includes DoubleSpace, a data compression program that may be one of the better ones around. Like the front runners, Stac Electronics' Stacker and AddStor's SuperStor Pro, DoubleSpace is fast, virtually transparent to the user, and claims to double hard disk capacity. The product compresses data automatically as it is stored and decompresses it when it is retrieved.

But Microsoft says the similarities end there. Stacker and SuperStor work outside the operating system; therefore, DOS loads them from commands installed in your CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT files. If those files are accidentally erased or modified, the system may need to be reconfigured and rebooted.

Microsoft says DoubleSpace is a little more bombproof. Because it is a part of the operating system, changes to configuration files shouldn't affect compression. Moreover, DBLSPACE.BIN and its two associated files are hidden system files-accidental deletions become virtually impossible.

DoubleSpace offers some other nice features too. The program lets you increase or

RING THE BELL: Aiming to attract firsttime PC purchasers and upgrade-conscious veterans alike, Packard Bell's new line of 486s features flexibility and ease of use. The product line comes in 68 varieties; processors range from a 25-MHz 486SX to a 66-MHz 486DX2, hard disks start at 107MB, and case options include a four-slot, four-bay desktop, a three/ three small profile, and a five/five minitower. However, the linchpin of the systems' performance and flexibility is Power Pack, which includes a proprietary local bus video graphics accelerator, a ZIF socket for simple installation of OverDrive processor upgrades. and the ability to add as much as 512K of cache memory, to double video memory to 1MB, and to bring system RAM up to 32MB. With bundled software, the systems cost between \$1099 and \$3999 and include one-year limited warranties and on-site service.

SOFTWARE PRICE WAR: Borland officials say they are not reacting to the phenomenal sales of Microsoft's Windows database, Access, but until April 30 you can buy Borland's just-released Paradox for Windows database for \$139.95-regular list is \$795. The company is also reintroducing its Quattro Pro for Windows spreadsheet for \$99.95 through the end of April. List is \$495, with a money-back guarantee.

The price deals follow layoffs and restructuring at Borland aimed at building market share in the wake of the success of Access, which despite bugs is expected to sell 750,000

decrease the amount of compressed space on your disk, and Microsoft claims that DoubleSpace can convert files compressed with Stacker to its own format.

Disk Maintenance and Data Protection

DOS 6.0 offers a defragmenting utility, which is a subset of Norton Utilities' Speed Disk licensed from Symantee. The DOS 6.0 product rearranges the free space on the uncompressed portion of your hard disk to improve disk performance. (A defragging utility developed by Microsoft performs similar functions on compressed disk sectors.) Power users seeking maximum performance will still want a full-blown defragger like Speed Disk, which rearranges splintered files as well as free space.

The backup utility, also licensed from Symantee, is a scaled-down version of Norton Backup. The product offers basic functions, such as error correction and file comparison, and lets you choose full or partial backups. Corporations or advanced users may opt for a full-blown backup product: The DOS version doesn't support scheduled backups or tape drives.

An antivirus utility, licensed from Central

Point Software, also offers basic features. The product seans both memory and disks for known viruses, checks for unknown viruses, and offers access to antivirus updates from Central Point. Again, corporate users may want a full-blown product designed for network use.

Although DOS 5.0 offered improved memory management features, optimizing memory was still tricky. The MemMaker program in 6.0 automates memory optimization. When you invoke the program, it examines your system, makes an educated guess at where to move device drivers and memory resident programs in upper memory, modifies setup files accordingly, and reboots. If the system hangs, the program takes over and offers several options to reconfigure it. Microsoft claims the product can free up as much as 100K more RAM than the memory manager in DOS 5.0.

DOS 6.0 also has some new communications features. Built-in network-client software lets a DOS 6.0 PC access files and peripherals from PCs running Windows for Workgroups, Windows NT, LAN Manager, or a compatible network. An E-mail feature lets you communicate with PCs configured as MS Mail or Windows for Workgroups post offices. DOS 6.0's file sharing utility lets you transfer data via parallel or serial ports between two computers. Other smaller improvements abound, including new DOS commands, better on-line help, and easier installation. Bon appetit.

SL Transformed: You'll probably see small-footprint, power-efficient desktops from a wider variety of vendors sooner rather than later, as a result of Intel's decision to bring all appropriate features of its 486SL into future versions of the 486SX, 486DX, and 486DX2 processors. But Intel denies industry reports that the move means the elimination of its mobile processor family.

"The 486SL has not been canceled, nixed, waxed, or iced," claims 486SL product marketing manager Dave Ryan. He insists that despite reports to the contrary, Intel will introduce 25 flavors of mobile processors in 1993, including a 33-MHz 486SL by the end of March.

But by 1994, new versions of so-called desktop families will gain the power-saving features of the SL line-3.3-volt rather than 5-volt operation and both static mode and system management mode (SMM), so that inactive components, subsystems, or the entire machine can be powered down to 0 MHz.

That leaves some people, like Texas Instruments marketing communications manager Jerry Rycaj, asking why a special SL line existed in the first place. "We never bought the SL story," he says, "because we couldn't prove that we could do better going the SL route than with SX and DX chips using our own power management."

The name of the processor inside their systems makes little difference to users anyway, notes Marcy Puhnaty, AST's portable prod-

> uct manager. But SL features do. The migration of those features to desktops will advance the introduction of so-called green PCs, which use considerably less power and generate less heat. These systems will have smaller, more integrated motherboards driven by power plants that could be two-thirds smaller than today's, creating smaller desktops that are cheaper to buy and run.

Intel's off-the-shelf solution can eliminate much, but not all, design duplication among vendors, adds the executive of another large portable systems maker. So green PCs may arrive sooner at more price points and from more vendors-even small suppliers without their own custom power management.



PC Tools Comes to Windows



PC TOOLS FOR WINDOWS' File Manager lets you drag a file to the Anti-Virus window for a quick virus scan.

Long a popular DOS package for protecting and recovering data, monitoring and optimizing system performance, launching programs, and automating tasks, Central Point Software's PC Tools is making an impressive Windows debut with the usual slew of utilities, plus a nifty Windows shell that replaces the much-maligned Program Manager.

Like Symantec's Norton Desktop for Windows, Hewlett-Packard's NewWave, and a growing list of other third-party Windows shells, PC Tools' Desktop replaces the rigid program groups of Windows' Program Manager and adds a few Mac-like touches. You can arrange programs and files in related groups called folders and put folders inside folders. For example, your projects folder might contain a presentations folder, within which might be yet another folder containing an Ami Pro document, an Excel spreadsheet, and a CorelDraw chart—all pertaining to a single business presentation.

PC Tools for Windows has its own File Manager, which offers a few bells and whistles you won't find in the standard Windows issue. A key addition is the product's easy-to-use compression feature. To compress a file, you just drag it from its current directory to the compressed file directory in the File Manager tree. You can view the contents of a compressed file without expanding it first. Sophisticated drag-and-drop

capabilities let you drag drives, directories, and files out of *PC Tools*' File Manager to other applications, and vice versa.

As you'd expect, PC Tools for Windows offers all the helpful utilities of its DOS counterpart, including an integrated copy of Central Point Backup that lets you back up an entire disk, specific directories and files, or only the files that have changed since your last backup. You can create a DOS Emergency floppy disk to boot your PC in case you have hard drive problems,

and PC Tools' DiskFix utility can analyze and repair the hard drive—protecting you against damaged file allocation tables and directory structures that can cause data loss.

The program includes *Central Point Anti-Virus*, claimed to protect your system against more than 1500 viruses (quarterly updates are available). You can schedule unattended virus scans and drag and drop files from File Manager to the *Anti-Virus* window for a quick scan. A scheduler, data encryption, and a file finding utility are just a few of the other tools. Pricing was not set at press time but was expected to be similar to that of *PC Tools 8.0* for DOS, which lists for \$179, \$69.95 for upgrades.

copies during its 90-day promotional drive (slated to end January 31), compared with last year's total PC database sales of just 1.25 million.

After announcing the layoffs, Borland's Philippe Kahn predicted 1993 would be a year of price wars: "The price of software on Windows and DOS is going down. We didn't start that."

BACKATCHA MICROSOFT: Recovering from Microsoft's Windows for Workgroups incursion, peer-to-peer networking leaders Artisoft and Novell began their counterattack this month. Artisoft is parrying Microsoft's Work-Groups thrust with channel programs and discounts that aid its 15,000 active LANtastic resellers. Meanwhile, Novell is trying to leverage its more robust net management facilities—both with special emphasis on corporate users.

Already compatible with Windows applications, NetWare Lite 1.1 has just gained a new Windows interface that provides access to the NOS's considerable network management facilities for directory services and multilevel security. Similarly, Artisoft has a new ethernet adapter card, the NodeRunner, bearing a chip of its own design that simplifies net configuration and enhances performance. Both products support more platforms than Windows for Workgroups.

NOVELL'S ANSWER TO NT: Trying to gain the upper hand against Microsoft in the looming battle of the network operating systems, Novell intends to (continued on page 55)

A Trio of ASTs Pushes the Limits

kay, you've been reading about faster PCs since Blue got Big, but AST's new Premmia trio is proof that speed thrills. The line offers a selection of today's fastest processors, local bus graphics, the fastest I/O available, plenty of disk capacity and memory, and prices below what you pay for the Power Premium line it replaces. And Premmia is a Pentium placeholder—any of the three systems is ready for a quick upgrade to Intel's newest engine.

In days gone by, you could argue that only users with the most expansive applications and budgets needed cutting-edge power. Then came that great equalizer *Windows* to put a strain on everyone's computing. There's no longer any real reason to

forgo PC power when

you can get

the 486SX-33-based Premmia 4/33s with 8MB of RAM expandable to 128MB, a 170MB IDE hard drive, factory-installed DOS 5.0 and *Windows 3.1*, and a PS/2-compatible mouse for a list price of about \$2000. Add the standard 14-inch color super-VGA monitor, and that probably ends up being your street price. Similarly configured Premmia 4/33 and 4/66d models—driven by Intel's 486DX-33 and 486DX2-66 processors, respectively—will be available for about \$2500 to \$4000.

Local Bus Graphics

All Premmias are designed to be state-ofthe-art graphics performers and feature the AST LocalLink graphics subsystem with

local bus video via ATI's
68000 chip. Transfers between the graphics
subsystem, memory, and CPU
take place

640 by 480; 65,536 colors at 800 by 600; and 256 colors at 1024 by 768, all noninterlaced. Add another megabyte, and you gain speed via 64-bit bit video I/O and a 256-color 1280-by-1024 (interlaced) video mode.

Speaking of upgradability, a unique connector on the Premmia motherboard accepts various AST "personality" modules—ethernet, business audio, token ring, or SCSI—without wasting one of five EISA expansion slots. The ethernet module is available now, with the others a month or two down the road.

With three external and two internal drive bays, you can add two floppy devices and a tape drive and still boost any of the Premmias to more than 1GB of IDE storage without adding an adapter. Achieve 2GB of internal storage by adding AST's FastSCSI adapter to one of its five EISA slots or via the soon-to-be-released SCSI personality module.

Pentium Ready

All three systems have a motherboard connector that's ready for one of four daughtercards, each of which ensures zerowait-state reads and writes and boosts system performance even further. Three of the cards provide 128K, 256K, or 512K of

cache RAM, while the fourth will hold a true 66-MHz Pentium CPU with a 64-bit path to that card's 256K of even faster cache memory.

high-speed synchronous


The Pentium CPU will perform twice as fast as Intel's 486DX2-66 and can use today's software without recompiling. However, recompiled software will be able to take full advantage of the Pentium's dual cache/dual integer processing scheme and run faster still.

All of the Premmias sport a 238-pin ZIF (zero-insertion force) socket to accommo-

at processor speed along a 32-bit bus. The chip also provides fast bit-block transfers for snappy screen updates, a hardware cursor for smoother zooming and panning, and hardware line draw for enhanced CAD and other draw functions.

The systems come with 1MB of video DRAM supporting 16.8 million colors at



OverDrive processors, including the Pentium-based OverDrive for DX2, which probably won't appear until year-end.

All this is packed into the same diminutive 15.5 by 16.5 by 6.25-inch case that AST introduced with the Power Premiums. But the Premmias are equipped with the prime heat-mitigating features needed for future Pentium upgrades—a 200-watt power supply to drive the 3 million—transistor chip and room for a second fan. Another innovation is baffled-board holders that let heat blow out the back of the system.

BIOS Plus

BIOS (basic input/output system) is one of those under-the-hood features due to play a greater role in automatic peripheral configuration and other PC control functions in years ahead. With AST's FlashBIOS, which can be updated in minutes with the latest BIOS downloaded from AST's bulletin board, you'll be ready for whatever comes.

FlashBIOS also is equipped with interesting asset-control and security features. The machine's serial number is stored in the system before shipment, and another user-definable field of

25 characters lets you add configuration and asset control codes of your own so that, say, an information manager could inventory AST system configurations—even remotely over a network.

There is, of course, a boot-up password, the floppy drives and parallel port can be made read-only, and after a user-determined period of inactivity, FlashBIOS's Walk-n-Lock feature will require a password to return the system to operation. A network administrator password configuration "lock" and a front-mounted chassis lock provide additional security.

AST offers a one-year on-site/three-year depot service warranty and 24-hour phone support seven days a week. With the Premmia, you have proof that getting out on the edge of technology can be a no-pain, plenty-of-gain proposition.

improve integration of NetWare and UNIX in 1993. (In January Novell announced plans to purchase UNIX Systems Labs [USL] from AT&T for \$350 million.) According to Novell and USL officials, work is under way to develop a common application programming interface—allowing developers to write programs to both NetWare and UNIX—and shared systems administration and data security features.

HOME OFFICE DEDUCTION: A recent Supreme Court ruling will make it

tougher for some people to deduct home office expenses, including PCs, from their taxes. The ruling affects those who do some work at home but spend the bulk of their work time at other locations. Examples include selfemployed individuals, such as physicians and consultants, who use an office for administrative work, such as billing and correspondence, but spend most of their time seeing clients away from home. In the Supreme Court case, a self-employed Virginia physician used a spare bedroom in his home for administrative tasks. The court ruled that because he spent most of his time seeing patients at area hospitals, not working at home, he couldn't claim the bedroom as a home office. The upshot: the IRS will now look more closely at the amount of time spent and the relative importance of activities performed in a home office, said Lawrence W. Goldstein, a senior tax manager at the accounting firm Ernst

From Russia With Love?

The Cold War is no more—or is it? International security experts will assemble from March 10 through 12 in Manhattan to discuss a new silent threat from the Eastern bloc: computer viruses.

garia ideal virus cultures. Although Russian students learn programming, no market for their skills exists because of what Gryaznov calls the "Russian computer antiethic"—software piracy is not only legal but encouraged. Viruses offer Russian youths a creative challenge.

A Complete Windows Communicator

What does Hilgraeve's

HyperAccess for Windows 1.0 offer that can't be found in Procomm for Windows, Crosstalk for Windows, MicroCourier, and all the other Windows communications programs? Try pop-up, context-sensitive mini-menus, a smart scrollback buffer, built-in virus protection, and the ability to create individual icons and documents for each on-line system you call.

Open the program, and you'll spot icons of chicks hatching, bottles of soda fizzing, and file folders winging through the air. Already you know that on-line sessions are not going to be dull. Delve deeper, and you'll find some nifty innovations too, like the Keys & Buttons dialog box, which lets you create keys or icons for passwords, on-line functions, or external programs.

Scrollback Buffer

A scrollback buffer with longterm memory stores the dialog of any on-line session. When you dial a service, *HyperAccess* loads the dialog of your previous session. If you've ever spent 20 minutes typing an E-mail message, then lost the on-line connection and spent the next half hour trying to retrieve the message from the scrollback buffer and get it back on line (usually you can't), you know how priceless this feature is.

You can use the mouse to pop up context-sensitive menus for any operation. Or you can customize your mouse-clicks to send selected words or letters from your screen to the host useful for automating commands. A Launchpad editor lets you cut and paste text between

incoming and outgoing E-mail messages. The program's virus filter scans for more than 300 known viruses in downloads, even files compressed with *PKZIP*. Should it encounter a virus, a pop-up message gives warning and lets you abort the transfer if you wish.

But genius never comes without quirks, and HyperAccess for Windows 1.0 is a case in point. The icon bar is austere as far as Windows communications programs go. It includes icons for adding a phone book entry (the chick), opening an entry (the soda bottle), dialing a number, recording a script, and other basics. Absent are clipboard or printer icons. Once you get on line, you won't find any of the special on-screen buttons or function keys that other Windows communications programs feature. And although you can drag and drop files from the File Manager to upload them, you need to write a C program to do this.

HyperAccess is a highly customizable program, with a million levers. Almost everything can be turned on or off, but finding the right setting can be hard if you're used to other communications programs, and some icons require more than a second's thought to identify.

HyperAccess for Windows is hardly intuitive, so it takes some getting used to. But it is worth the trouble.





PC Prices Are Great, but Choices Dwindle

ould-be PC buyers may find fewer vendors to choose from this year as the market roils in the wake of last year's vicious PC price wars. Lower profit margins and component shortages have already crippled or sunk three vendors. Buyers, sidelined by shipment delays of the most popular PC models, should find relief this spring, while price cuts will likely continue, though not at last year's rabid pace.

The lack of 486DX2 systems is the most significant current shortage. Spurred by low prices, many buyers rushed to get the systems in 1992 but encountered backlogs at a number of vendors, including IBM, Dell Computer, and Gateway 2000. Surprised by high demand, these companies were still trying to catch up in January; until they can get more of Intel's precious 486DX2 processors, however, shortages will continue.

PC vendors order compo-

nents 8 to 20 weeks before they build machines, and many of them underestimated demand. Compaq, for instance, forecast that worldwide PC demand from July through September 1992 would be three to four times that of the year before. It turned out to be six times as much, said Gian Carlo Bisone, Compaq's vice president of North American marketing. The result: Consumers wait.

The delay leaves some customers stewing. Mitch Siegel, a purchasing agent at Teradyne in Boston, decided to buy 486DX2s at the end of 1992. "I called Gateway right before Christmas looking for DX2-50s, and they told me it would be four to six weeks' turn time due to component shortages," Siegel says. "I called Dell, and they said four to six weeks. The shortages aren't a joke."

How long will demand exceed supply? Gateway is having problems getting chips and SIMM memory for 486DX2s but expects to clear its backlog of orders by March, says marketing manager Mike Schmith. At IBM, 486DX2 shortages will clear up by the end of first quarter, according to spokesperson Mike Reiter. As of mid-January, orders were taking four to six weeks to fulfill. Compaq expects its shortages to end by March.

Better Deals to Come

Because demand is steady, don't expect prices for 486DX2 or other systems to drop

soon, says JoeAnn Stahel, a senior market analyst at Info-Corp. "Rather than more price cuts, you'll see features added," she says.

But the price war may continue into 1993, says Bisone. The situation "is still fairly turbulent. The forecast shakeout will occur, but those companies won't just disappear, they'll go down swinging."

Meanwhile, spot component shortages are expected to continue into late spring and summer, says Dean McCarron, vice president of technology at InStat. "Right now, one of the main issues is that almost all the suppliers' inventories are depleted," he says.


Trouble Ahead for Small Vendors

What's good for PC buyers may not be so good for smaller PC vendors, McCarron says. The price wars leave them little room for more price cuts.

"The component shortages really affect smaller companies who buy parts from distributors," McCarron says. "They end up low on the supply ladder, so they have a hard time obtaining high-demand parts. This could force some of the little guys out."

In the first week of January, Gecco Computers of Tempe, Arizona, went out of business and Fremont, California-based Everex filed for bankruptey. In late December 1992, Cumulus of Cleveland also went under.








High-End Accounting Apps Ease Into Windows

t's been a long time coming, but high-end PC accounting companies are beginning to warm up to Windows. After years of adopting a wait-and-see approach to the widely popular graphical interface, virtually every major player in the highend PC accounting market has announced plans to develop for the platform.

Although Windows accounting was embraced by entrylevel developers, there's been a notable lack of activity at the higher end-makers of those products geared to meet the needs of companies with annual sales between \$1 million and \$100 million. That will change this year.

To date, only a couple of high-end companies are shipping Windows products. Platinum Software, which launched the general ledger module of SeQueL to Platinum in September, offers a client-server product that's based on the Microsoft/Sybase SOL Server at the back end and either Windows or

OS/2 on the workstation.

Great Plains Software also announced Great Plains Dynamics for Windows, a highly customizable accounting program for Windows, last September. Select modules were available to resellers at the end of 1992, and Great Plains plans to sell them to the public in the first quarter of 1993.

Although most other players in the high-end market have announced products, few plan to ship them before the second half of the year. That opens possibilities for new players, says Corley Phillips, president and CEO of Manzanita Software Systems, the developer of BusinessWorks, a midrange package in the DOS market and winner of a 1990 PC World Best Buy. With the release of BusinessWorks Accounting Systems for Windows, Manzanita hopes to garner a greater share of the midrange marketcompanies with sales in the \$500,000 to \$5 million range.

The system manager, general ledger, and accounts payable modules were released in December, to be followed by payroll, job cost, order entry, and inventory modules over the the first three quarters of 1993. BusinessWorks for Windows is compatible with the DOS version and supports all the features in the DOS package. Although BusinessWorks for Windows uses standard Windows help, certain higher-level Windows features such as support for DDE won't appear until later releases.

Among traditional high-end heavy hitters, Solomon Software, State of the Art, Computer Associates International, and Macola have all announced plans to enter the Windows accounting market. Most do not expect to begin shipping products until the second half of this vear, however.

If you're already on a network, take note: Windows for Workgroups is compatible with Novell NetWare and Microsoft LAN Manager. This means managers in large offices can create a small network with anyone using Windows for Workgroups and still be connected to the main NetWare network. Windows for Workgroups simply treats the Net-Ware server as another drive on the system.

The Decision PCs integrate ethernet networking electronics into the system, so you don't have to install add-in cards. Wyse also includes an ethernet cable, which is available in different lengths and types: thin or thick coaxial, or twisted pair.

These systems include all the amenities and come in three variations. The Decision 486si models boast 486 processors ranging from a 33-MHz 486DX up to a 66-MHz 486DX2. Each comes with 256K cache, a 200MB hard drive, 4MB of RAM, and Wyse's Hyper16 Video, a proprietary local bus.

How to Get HP IIs and IIIs to Print Like 4s

Hewlett-Packard's new 600-dpi LaserJet 4 promises to make higher-resolution output and superfast printing de rigueur. But this doesn't mean that you have to throw out your veteran 300-dpi HP Series II or Series III laser printer. The Laser Printer Accessories printer enhancement board can extend the useful life of those older printers. It is also PostScript compatible, although you won't find much of a performance improvement when you're printing PostScript documents.

The \$599 doubleRES IV gooses the printing mechanisms inside HP Series II and III printers with a patented process that allows them to generate 600-by-600-dpi output. This

higher resolution means betterlooking text and graphics.

The doubleRES IV also accelerates Windows printing by compressing files before they reach the printer. These smaller documents reach the printer sooner than larger, uncompressed versions. At the printer, the doubleRES IV board decompresses the files. In informal tests, an HP LaserJet II with the board installed printed complex word processing and graphics documents up to three times faster than the same printer without the board.

Installation is relatively painless. You plug the board into the HP's I/O slot located next to the other ports on the back of the printer. Then set the I/O port

VideoSpigot: Low-End Leader in Desktop Video-Capture Boards



VIDEO FOR THE REST OF US: The SuperMac Technology \$499 VideoSpigot is a PC add-in card that captures video.

Desktop video promises to do for video production what desktop publishing did for publishing—put a technology once hoarded by a few into the hands of many. The first enabling products are here and relatively easy to use. The prime example is Microsoft's Video for Windows, a program that lets you store, play back, edit, and incorporate full-motion digital video into other applications.

But software can't do it alone, and that's where SuperMac Technology's \$499 VideoSpigot comes in. This add-in board captures video from common sources such as VCRs, video cameras, and television so you can store the data on a hard drive or on removable media. Using Video for Windows, you can display the results on any graphics accelerator-equipped 386DX-25, whether or not it has the VideoSpigot. SuperMac plans to bundle Video for Windows and an assortment of presentation and multimedia products from Asymetrix, including Multimedia Make Your Point.

To run the VideoSpigot, you will want a 486 with from 8MB to 16MB of RAM, a high-performance video card with at least 256color capability, and 60MB to 100MB of free space on a fast hard disk. If you want synchronized audio, you'll need a compatible soundboard such as Creative Labs' Sound Blaster. For input, the VideoSpigot includes an RCA jack

for video signals produced by most consumer VCR and video products, as well as an S-VHS jack for higher-end video devices. The board is compatible with PAL, SECAM, and NTSC video formats.

When choosing a desktop video board, you need to consider the size of the images you want to capture and display, the rate at which you will capture them, and the amount of disk space the captured video will require. Larger images are easier to see but need more PC horsepower-the system must transfer and store all that data (1 minute of 320-by-240-pixel images in 256 colors can take 17MB of space). The capture rate, measured in frames per second, determines whether your work plays back in smooth real-time video motion or spastic, jerky motion. As a rule, 30 frames per second is considered real-time, 24 frames per second (the speed of motion pictures) is adequate, and 15 frames per

second is slow but tolerable.

On a 486-33, the VideoSpigot can capture 30 frames per second in a 160-by-120-pixel, 2-inch window, or half that many in a 320-by-240-pixel window. On a 386DX-33, we captured 15 frames per second in the smaller window.

SuperMac includes compression/decompression software that can compress audio and video to ½5 their original size (that would let you pack a 2-hour video with sound onto a CD ROM). As CD ROM mastering devices become afford-

able, PC users will be able to shoot, edit, and distribute videos that can play on a properly equipped computer. Hollywood had better watch out.

level configuration a tad underpowered for Windows. You can step up to a 120MB hard drive, 4MB of RAM, a VGA monitor, and preinstalled DOS and Windows for \$1449.

Measuring 4 by 15 by 15.6 inches, the system is more compact than previous Dells and leaves you more room on your desk. However, the smaller size limits expandability. You'll find only three expansion slots, and the power supply is just 100 watts. Moreover, this machine has no processor upgrade path, although it does have a socket for a 387SX math coprocessor.

The Dell is priced similarly to IBM's entry-level PS/Value-Point, but it's less expandable and has a smaller hard drive: IBM's \$899 25-MHz 386SLC PS/ValuePoint 325 T without a monitor has five slots, an 80MB hard drive, and a 145-watt power supply. Memory is expandable to 16MB and hard drive options go up to 500MB.

A PostScript Printer for the Common Folk

PostScript printers are quickly going the way of the PC—wait a week, get a lower price.

This time, however, the label may come as a surprise to you: Digital Equipment Corporation, noted for well-engineered, high-priced hardware, is heading down the low-price road. At the special introductory offer of \$999, the DECLaser 1152 desktop laser printer costs about half as much as the company's previous laser, and for now at least, it holds the high honor of being the lowest-priced Post-Script printer in town.

Built around a Canon engine, the 4-page-per-minute 1152 is a true personal laser. It supplies serial, parallel, and Apple Talk ports and, true to Digital's longstanding networking tradition, allows users to hook up to any two at once. With the printer's automatic port-switching, you can run it off both a PC and a Macintosh without getting up from your chair.

The 1152 supports PostScript Level 2 and Hewlett-Packard's PCL4. The 17 resident Post-Script fonts are fewer than most PostScript printers include, but creative types can access 43 additional fonts via an optional \$299 cartridge.

The printer's 6000-page-permonth duty cycle is likely to stand up to a heavy workload longer than you do. Like most lasers, it prints on letter-, legal-, and A4-size paper and on envelopes and transparencies. If you want to spruce up your presentation, Digital Equipment's optional image-enhancement firmware, *DECImage*, makes the 1152's normal 300-by-300dpi printing look like 1000-by-1000-dpi output.

The unit's controller, built around a run-of-the-mill 16-MHz Motorola 68000 processor, was designed with Adobe's help. A standard 2MB of RAM handles most files, but if you plan to do a lot of imaging, you can boost memory to 4MB for another \$150.

The printer's most complicated aspect may be its pricing schedule. You can get a single 1152 for \$999, but only if you use a rebate coupon (available through ads and direct mail) and buy by March 31. Or you can buy the printer direct from DEC for \$1169 and get a year's

free on-site service if you also buy a Digital PC through the firm's mail-order channel, PC-By-DEC. After March the price rises to \$1299 in single quantities. In volume orders of five to ten units, you'll pay \$1260 each.

Those prices still looks good to us at press time. But by March, who knows?

AudioMan's software driver taps into Windows 3.1's Media Control Interface so you can create, copy, and paste sound files from within OLE-compliant Windows software, including programs such as Word for Windows 2.0, Ami Pro 2.0, Lotus-Write, Quattro Pro

for Windows, 1-2-3 for Windows, and Excel 4.0.

Using the \$179 AudioMan is simple. To attach a voice message to a document, bring your cursor to where you want the sound, then pull down the Edit menu and choose Insert Object. The Windows 3.1 sound recorder box appears on screen. Click on the Record button and speak into the AudioMan. Just click to stop, then click on Update to attach the message, which appears as a microphone icon. You can adjust playback volume via software or do it manually using the hardware.

Recipients just click on the icon to hear the audio file. They don't need an AudioMan—the file will play back on their PC speaker. Sound quality is about half what you'd expect to hear from an audio CD player. You can adjust quality during recording to save file space.

AudioMan can also record from CD players—you can connect a CD player or an external microphone directly through a built-in jack. An output jack lets you attach headphones or external speakers too.

Logitech officials claim that AudioMan will run for about 50 hours on two AA batteries. Battery-monitoring software comes with the product, and an AC adapter is optional.



You shouldn't have to load an application and load a file into the application just to look at that file. Or print it. Or copy a piece of it to the Clipboard. With Systems Compatibility's file viewing utility Outside In for Windows 2.0, you don't have to.



For the longest time, data compression programs were a lot like gut feelings: Either you trusted them or you didn't. 

EMS, the vendor claims, lets you reduce conventional memory use to as little as 10K.

Farallon Brings Peer-to-Peer Networking to Windows PCs, Macs

The walls separating PCs and Macs continue to crumble. Two new networking packages, Farallon Computing's *Timbuktu for Windows 1.0* and *Timbuktu for Macintosh 5.0*, let *Windows* and Mac users exchange files, share printers, and remotely control other PCs and Macs on the net. Even more impressive, you do not need a LAN administrator to install *Timbuktu*, and it does not require a file server.

Macintosh users are familiar with *Timbuktu*, Farallon's remote control software praised for ease of use and installation. The new *Windows* and Mac versions retain that simplicity while adding powerful screen sharing and remote access features you won't find elsewhere.

Supports NetWare, Ethernet

Timbuktu for Windows 1.0 and Timbuktu for Macintosh 5.0 run under NetWare and work with over 25 ethernet, token ring, and Apple LocalTalk LAN adapters, ensuring compatibility with the most common networking software and hardware. (However, before you install Timbuktu, check to see whether the program supports your company's LAN boards.) In addition, Timbuktu works with Microsoft's Windows for Workgroups peer-to-peer operating system, although some features are incompatible with WFW, according to Farallon.

The minimum configuration for *Timbuktu for Windows* is what you'd expect for any *Windows* package: a 386SX PC with 4MB of RAM, *Windows 3.1*, DOS 5.0, a VGA display or better, and a memory manager such as *EMM386*, 386Max, or *QEMM* to load the program into high memory. Each worksta-

tion needs its own copy of Timbuktu, which lists for \$199.

PC-to-Mac Connection

You install Timbuktu for Windows as you would any other Windows program—there's no need for approval from the LAN administrator. You also

have to install Farallon's *PhoneNet PC* software, which is included with *Tim-buktu*. You can configure *Timbuktu* to load automatically when you start *Win-dows*, or you can run it by doubleclicking the *Tim-buktu* icon in Program Manager.

The main screen lists other *Timbuktu* users whose computers you can access. One handy touch: The program displays different icons for Macs and PCs—convenient

for Windows users who are looking to run a Macintosh application remotely. Click on one of four connection buttons to control another *Timbuktu*-equipped PC, view a screen remotely, or send and exchange files.

Snoop-Proof

But what if you don't want everyone snooping around your hard drive? Fear not, *Timbuktu* lets you assign each user passwords for specific tasks or deny access altogether.


When another user is accessing your PC remotely, *Timbuktu* displays a flashing icon in the lower right corner of your screen. An "observer" icon (a face) means that a user is view-

ing your screen remotely, while a mail-slot icon tells you a user is sending you an electronic file.

When you use *Timbuktu* to access another PC, the program displays the host's screen on your monitor in a resizable window. When you're controlling a PC remotely, you can operate

Windows doesn't support remote communications, although Farallon says it plans to add that capability to future versions of the product.

While the new Windows and Macintosh versions of Timbuktu aren't cheap, at \$199 per workstation, both are available in 10-

the host's computer with your mouse and keyboard—a powerful feature for running Mac applications under *Windows*, and vice versa.

If you are merely observing a remote PC rather than controlling it, you can watch while the host does the work. Mac users can display color screens and presentations on Windows PCs without first converting image files-always a tedious process. And Windows users can review high-quality graphics with Mac users in real time across the LAN. Plus Macintosh users with high-speed modems can dial in and control either Macs or Windows PCs on the LAN. Unfortunately, Timbuktu for pack, 30-pack, and 100-pack units, with volume pricing as low as \$55 per copy, according to Farallon. *PhoneNet Talk* users can upgrade to *Timbuktu* for a list price of \$59.



Photonics Brings a Light Touch to Wireless LANs

Wireless networks continue to improve in performance and drop in price. They can be lifesavers when wiring proves too expensive or difficult, or in conventional offices where a mobile, notebook-toting work force makes a wired LAN impractical.

Among the new breed of wireless LAN products is Photonics' Collaborative series of transceivers, which use diffuse infrared technology to transmit data in a 30-by-30-foot area. Unlike conventional infrared transceivers that require an unobstructed path to transmit or receive data, the Collaborative bounces its signal off walls, ceilings, and floors, which means that you don't have to aim the device. The signal cannot penetrate objects, however.

The Collaborative's 1-mega-

The Collaborative's 1-megabit-per-second transfer rate is faster than that of the similarly priced Proxim RangeLAN, a 242-kilobit-per-second wireless LAN that uses spread-spectrum radio technology. (The Range-LAN, however, has a far greater range, with a broadcast radius of 800 feet.) The Collaborative also includes drivers for two major network operating environments, Novell NetWare and Microsoft LAN Manager.

Each Collaborative adapter consists of two components—a 2-by-2-inch external transceiver, and an internal or external connector for the PC.

Initially, two versions of the



product will ship: The Collaborative PC comes with a PC addin card that connects via cable to the transceiver; the Collaborative Port includes an external adapter that connects between the parallel port and the transceiver. If you use *Qmodem-Pro* under *Windows*, you can do it all in the background.





Digital Devices Outrace High-Speed Modems

Digital telephone phone lines, including ISDN and switched digital, offer faster throughput and are less susceptible to noise than conventional analog lines. With their capability to transmit uncompressed data faster than 56 kilobits per second (kbps), digital phone lines represent the future. And while the BRI LAN Adapter offers higher data rates than conventional modems, it lacks a compression scheme to boost throughput—a feature that the manufacturer says it's working on.



Digital modems are targeted at telecommuters and branch offices—actually any remote user who needs a high-speed network link. A word of caution, however: Older PCs, particularly 286s and earlier, may have serial ports limited to speeds that are under 20 kbps. Check to make sure your system can handle a high-speed link. Or consider buying a serial upgrade card for about \$200.





Desktop PC purchases by processor (in thousands)




Currently the price difference between a 386 and a 486SX desktop can be as little as \$100. 486DX2-66s

FASTEST PCS IN THE UNIVERSE

t's amazing what \$3000 will buy these days. That's the average price of the 24 fully configured systems in this roundup, all of which boast the fastest 486 processor available-Intel's DX2-66. According to our tests, DX2-66 systems average 10 percent faster performance than DX-50s, 15 percent faster than DX2-50s, and 40 percent faster than DX-33s. Yet the average cost increase of DX2-66 PCs is less than

the performance gain. For the first time in PC history, the fastest systems available are also the best values.

Of course, choosing your PC's processor is only half the battle. In this review, we'll let you know which of 24

COVER STORY 486DX2-66 SYSTEMS

DX2-66 speedsters offer the best combination of performance, price, service and support, expandability, and design and which are the individual standouts in these areas.

Breaking the Land Speed Record

Our first step was to see how fast these systems really were. We ran each through an exhaustive round of speed tests, using both the primarily DOS-based BAPCo test suite (an industry-standard application-based benchmark) and our own PC World Test Center Windows benchmark suite.

The six fastest DX2-66 systems here are the fastest machines of any kind we've ever tested. The speed advantage of the DX2-66 is particularly noticeable on the BAPCo suite; all but three of the systems in this review were faster there than the fastest DX2-50 we've ever tested.

Despite the blazing speed of all these systems, there are significant differences among them. The slowest machine overall was some 40 percent behind the fastest. Why the big disparity?

The first and most important factor was the presence or absence of a caching disk controller. The four fastest systems in the review used caching controllers. The advantage was particularly noticeable on the software development portion of the DOS-intensive BAPCo suite. This set of tests is extremely disk intensive—even more so than database applications—and systems with caching disk controllers took the top eight spots. Caching controllers had far less impact on our *Windows* tests—except in the *Paradox*-in-a-DOS-window section—partly because the *Windows* tests use much more of a system's resources at once.

You don't need a large disk cache, either. In the machines we looked at, 512K or 1MB improved DOS and *Windows* performance significantly; moving from 1MB to 4MB produced far less dramatic improvements. Finally, disk caching alone doesn't

guarantee top performance. The Quill system, with its 4MB caching controller, turned in comparatively poor results on many tests, although it did do somewhat better on several of the disk-based tests.

A Fast Ride on the Local Bus

The second big factor in system speed, particularly for *Windows* applications, is the graphics subsystem. All these machines use graphics accelerators—they're standard equipment on most PCs these days—but vendors implement them in various ways.

The fastest systems have accelerators on the *local bus*—a high-speed circuit that lets the graphics system operate at the PC's clock speed (in this case, 33 MHz). There are currently two kinds of local-bus designs available—proprietary and VESA standard. Neither is intrinsically faster, but the VESA bus is a standard. Many card vendors are making VESA-compatible expansion boards for graphics, IDE or SCSI controllers (as in the Gateway and Tri-Star systems here), and networking. In the PCs we looked at, local-bus


Best Buys



Not surprisingly, all our Best Buys are among the top speedsters in this review. All but the Gateway use caching disk controllers, and the Gateway uses a VESA local-bus controller that also speeds disk performance. The

Hertz and Tangent systems include a whopping 4MB of cache memory on their drive controllers. The Axik won top honors by ranking in the top six in price, performance, and service and support. The Gateway also was a good all-around performer, although the company's service-and-support policies have started to drop below the average.

graphics systems performed up to 20 percent faster on the *Windows* tests than their ISA counterparts did; with character-based DOS apps, the difference was hardly noticeable.

Strangely enough, the performance of the local-bus systems varied widely, even when they used identical accelerator boards in an identical fashion. The disparities reveal a subtle performance element—software drivers. Drivers are programs that enable a system to communicate with its peripherals. How well a peripheral actually performs depends very much on the quality of its drivers. Localbus technology is still new, and judging by the performance of the slower local-bus video systems in this review, many of the drivers for local-bus boards could be improved. Expect to see better performance from them soon.

Fast Caching for Memory

The third important factor in overall performance is the memory subsystem. All these systems were configured with 8MB of RAM and, since all of them use the 486DX2-66, they all have an 8K cache inside the CPU. But they vary widely in the amount of secondary, external cache that vendors have added.

In the past, we've found that an external RAM cache consistently improves performance, but in this roundup the improvement was much less consistent because video and hard drive differences were more noticeable. Four of the five fastest systems in the review come with a 256K RAM cache, and the fifth (and fastest machine overall) has a 128K cache; similar numbers hold true, however, for the five *slowest* systems. Only one system had no external cache, and it finished in the bottom third.

Getting More for Your Money

We expected top speed from this group—but the prices were a big surprise. One system, from CAF Technology, sold for an amazing \$2042 in our standard configuration—8MB of RAM, a 100MB or larger hard drive, two floppies, super-VGA graphics, a color monitor, serial and parallel ports, a keyboard and a mouse, DOS 5.0, and *Windows 3.1*.

Finding out the actual prices of fully configured systems was easy with direct-sale vendors—we simply called up and asked for quotes on our particular configuration. For systems sold through dealers, we estimated street prices based on vendor list prices minus the average street discount we've found for each vendor over the past six months. Prices when you read this are likely to be lower than those quoted. Check "Late List Prices" for the latest prices we could get before we went to press.

The biggest reason DX2-66 systems are so affordable is that vendors can just drop the chip onto existing 33-MHz 486 system boards; they may have to tweak the BIOS a bit and perhaps improve the case's ventilation, but that's about it.

Price variations among these systems tend to hinge on several key design and configuration factors. The EISA-based systems we looked at, for example, averaged about \$800 more than the ISA machines, and systems using SCSI instead of IDE hard drives averaged \$900 more. The inclusion of caching controllers helped raise the cost of a system by about \$300. Interestingly, machines using local-bus graphics cost just \$100 more than those with regular ISA video. The most expensive system in the review, the \$4297 Zenith Data Systems, includes an ethernet adapter and a SCSI controller on an EISA bus system.

Service and Support: A Brighter Picture

A fast, cheap system may not be a great value if it lacks good service and support—a major factor in our choice of overall Best Buys.

To rate vendors' customer service and support, we placed anonymous calls to their tech support lines and posed typical questions. We then graded the vendors on responsiveness, courtesy, accuracy, and thoroughness. We also considered the length of the warranty, the cost (if any) of on-site service, and the turnaround time for off-site repairs.

The quality of service and support continues to improve industrywide. On a scale from 0 to 100, almost all these vendors scored over 80. Most offer on-site service and fast turnaround on factory service, and most provide long hours (including weekends) of telephone tech support. Warranties are getting longer, too. A one-year warranty has been standard, but now two-year warranties are be-



coming more common, and a few vendors even offer three years.

Which Way Is Up?

You may think that DX2-66s don't have to be upgradable because they are already the fastest systems on the market. How-

ever, in the near future you should have a choice of a couple of upgrade paths for this CPU. The first will come in the form of a next-generation OverDrive chip for DX2s. This chip is based on Intel's newly announced Pentium technology and is scheduled to ship some time early next year. It will require a 238-pin upgrade socket. Although many systems will include this socket soon, the

Acer is the only one of the reviewed systems that has one.

Second, the systems that use a CPU daughterboard should be able to handle any chip advances (though the upgrade cost will be higher because you're replacing a board instead of just a chip). As new processors emerge, you can buy the appropriate CPU board upgrade from the system vendor and replace the original DX2-66

In its DX2-50 incarnation, this system was a Best Buy in our February cross-processor comparison. In that review, we admired its balance of performance, price, expandability, and design. Upgraded with the DX2-66 processor, however, it doesn't fare as well, though it's still a very nice system.

Expandability is one of the Acer's strengths. It has four free EISA slots, plus one proprietary 32-bit local-bus slot and two free 8/16-bit ISA slots. Acer's own ATI-based PowerVision video controller occupies the local-bus slot. Mass storage is handled by a 203MB Conner hard drive. You get one externally accessible 3½-inch drive bay (occupied by a floppy) and three externally accessible 5½-inch bays, two of which are free for a tape or CD ROM drive (which can be handled by the SCSI-2 adapter integrated on the motherboard). This system also earns points for upgradability, with a multipurpose CPU socket that accepts not only today's 486 CPUs but also Intel's next-generation, Pentium-based upgrade processor, which is expected to arrive early next year.

Beyond expandability, however, the Acer gets mixed reviews. Its \$2962 price is reasonable, right in the middle of the spread. The system performed respectably on our *Windows* suite, particularly on the *Freelance* and *Excel* tests. It was less successful on the BAPCo suite, where it placed next to last overall, about 56 percent slower than the system fastest on BAPCo.

Though Acer's service and support is more than adequate, the company lost points because it was slow to respond to our calls and then answered a relatively easy question inaccurately. It also

requires up to a week to turn around factory repairs. If you want to be ready for Intel's next-generation OverDrive technology, the Acer looks pretty good; otherwise you're advised to go with one of our Best Buys.

Amax Engineering 486DX2/66 MHz ISAmax System

It takes a lot to stand out in this exceptional field, and, despite some attractive features, the Amax ISAmax can't manage to rise above the crowd.

That's not to say the Amax doesn't have its good points. Its \$2746 price is extremely attractive for a system using such a hot processor, but its performance is only average among these systems. It did best on the DOS-intensive BAPCo suite, particularly on the graphics and software development sections. The system had less success on the *Windows* suite—it was 27 percent slower than the leader overall, despite an S3-based NDI Volante Warp10 graphics board.

Storage chores are handled by a 203MB Conner hard drive, which is run by a 512K caching controller. The system gives you eight 8/16-bit ISA slots, but two of them are occupied: one by the graphics controller, the other by the I/O board (which obstructs a third with slot-cover-mounted I/O ports). One bonus: The system comes with a nice 15-inch Mag multiscan monitor.


The case and documentation are strictly generic, and the motherboard could be laid out more neatly (SIMM sockets are buried under a tangle of disk cables). Beyond these small complaints, the biggest problem with this system is that it's unexceptional. In a field this competitive, that doesn't earn it more than a pat on the back. board. Of the reviewed machines, the Swan, Zenith Data Systems, and DEC use CPU daughterboards.

Naturally, there's more to the design of a system than its upgradability. We look at the number and types of free slots and bays and the availability of alternative interfaces like SCSI or ethernet to rate each system's capacity for expansion. We also scrutinize the quality of the keyboard and monitor and consider such important details as access to essential items on the motherboard. In addition, we consider the system's visual design.

The bottom line is that the value to the customer is getting better all the time. After we evaluated these systems, it became clear that they're among the most attractive machines on the market today, especially in price/performance terms. All but the most priceconscious buyers can afford one of the cheaper systems here, which will still blow away anything but the fastest 486DX-50s. If you want even more speed, look into adding a caching controller or putting more RAM on an existing controller. If you don't want to get left behind again, buy a system with a socket for a next-generation OverDrive or one that uses a CPU daughterboard; but for even the most challenging *Windows* applications, any DX2-66 will keep you cruising for a long time to come.

Like the Acer AcerPower, the AST Bravo won a Best Buy in our February systems review, but among its peers it doesn't earn any bragging rights. Nonetheless, the details that made the Bravo a Best Buy last month still earn it some big points.

At just \$2340, the AST Bravo is the third cheapest PC here. Yet it more than holds its own when it comes to performance. It came in just 14 percent slower than the fastest system by posting decent times on the *Windows* tests and by scoring well on every section of the BAPCo suite. The result is one of the best price/performance ratios in the review. The AST's speed is due in part to the integrated Cirrus Logic video accelerator chip and the 256K external cache.

All this performance is packed into an attractive compact case that, not surprisingly, sacrifices some expandability. You get only two externally accessible drive bays, both of them occupied by floppies; to add a tape backup or CD cheaper systems

by floppies; to add a tape backup or CD ROM drive, you'll have to find an external model. The only free drive bay is inside the case and could be used for a second hard

drive to bolster the relatively puny 116MB Quantum disk that comes standard. Thanks to the high degree of integration on the motherboard, all four ISA slots are free.

AST backs this system with a nice service-and-support package that includes a year of free on-site service and toll-free technical support (even on weekends).

We applaud the AST Bravo for its great price and performance. If you can live with limited expandability and want a cheap, fast system, the AST is well worth a closer look.

ATronics Int'l ATI-486/66

Like the AST Bravo, the ATronics nearly makes the top five for overall value, missing it by only a narrow margin. It does several things especially well.

First, it's fast. This system was just 15 percent slower than the overall speed champ from Tangent. It performed especially well on the *Windows* tests, in which it was just 5 percent behind the leader.

Second, this tower system stands out by giving you tons of room both now and in the future. It comes with a brawny 321MB Maxtor hard drive. The drive pulls out with the turn of a key; it's a snap for a network administrator to swap out defective drives or secure drives overnight in a safe place. You also get a whopping nine drive bays, seven 8/16-bit ISA slots, and one free 8-bit slot.

All but the most price-conscious buyers can afford to buy one of the cheaper systems here, which will still blow away anything but the fastest of the 486DX-50s.

Third, ATronics backs the system with good customer service. The tech support staff answered our questions perfectly and manages a fast three-day turnaround on factory repairs. The only flaw is a \$99 charge for a year of on-site service.

The ATronics's \$2995 price is right in the middle of the spread. For the money, you also get a nice 15-inch CTX monitor harnessed to a Diamond Stealth VRAM graphics controller. All in all, if you want a fast tower system with plenty of room to expand, the ATronics is, if not a Best Buy, well worth considering.

top by offering great price/performance and customer service.


The Axik turned in excellent benchmark scores. It was one of the few systems to do as well on the Windows tests as on the BAPCo suite. This hot performance can be attributed to several factors, including the Promise Technology caching controller (equipped with 1MB of cache) and the ATI Graphics Ultra video accelerator.

The system also offers plenty of room to grow. It gives you a total of eight drive bays, five of them externally accessible. You get eight 8/16-bit ISA slots, four of which are free because one's slot cover holds extra I/O ports. The system also has a proprietary 32-bit localbus slot, which according to Axik accepts only Axik's Ace Cache Point 32 video board. It's unoccupied and can double as a regular 8/16-bit ISA slot.

As for service, all calls to Axik's tech support were answered quickly, politely, and almost completely accurately. Tech support is also available through a fax-back program. Axik provides a year of free on-site service and two-day turnaround on factory repairs.

You'd expect to pay top dollar for such an accomplished system, but at \$2595 the Ace Cache is one of the least expensive systems in the review. You can't go wrong with high performance, good expandability, low price, and excellent customer service in one machine. That winning combination makes this machine the overall Best Buy.

The DX2-66 from Blackship just barely missed being included in our top five for overall value.


Like the other successes in this tough field, the Blackship does well by doing a little bit of everything.

The Blackship's most attractive feature is its extremely reasonable \$2345 price—the fourth lowest in the review. That money buys you, among other things, a 202MB Maxtor hard drive, which occupies one of four externally accessible drive bays. Two more bays hold floppies, leaving one available for a tape drive or other storage device. The system also comes with five 8/16-bit ISA slots, one of them occupied by an OEM video controller card using a Cirrus Logic chip set.

You also get good, though erratic, performance. The Blackship turned in wildly different times on separate sections of the Windows suite-it was the fastest system on the Freelance test but 80 percent slower than the fastest system on Word for Windows. Results were equally varied on the BAPCo suite, in which the Blackship did relatively well on the desktop publishing and spreadsheet tests and relatively poorly on the database, graphics, and software development sections.

Blackship's other great strength is service and support. When we called the tech support staff anonymously with our questions, they answered immediately and their responses were right on the money, and the system is backed by a year of free on-site service and a two-day turnaround policy on factory repairs. The result: Even in this fast company, the Blackship is well worth a test drive.

CAF Technology CAF Gold 6B2

In a contest of generally fast machines, price can be the great differentiator. That's what sets the CAF Gold 6B2 apart from every other system here: At just \$2042, it's the least expensive system by \$200.


A low price won't do you much good without at least competitive performance, which the CAF delivers: It's just 20 to 30 percent slower than the fastest system here. It turned in particularly good times on the Freelance test and consistently good times on all sections of the BAPCo suite, with the exception of the graphics test. This weakness may be due to the no-name graphics accelerator card.

The anonymous video card is one example of the CAF's main weakness, which is a generic, one-size-fits-all approach to design. The exterior styling is nice enough—a clean front panel with no unnecessary controls, a good keyboard, and an easy-off case. Inside, however, cables come off the combination I/O-controller board and obstruct two of the expansion slots. On the upside, the system comes with a decent 202MB Maxtor hard drive and a generous eight ISA slots.

The CAF also lost a few points on customer service; the company ranked second to last in a strong field. While CAF's tech support department answered our calls accurately and quickly, the company provides neither on-site service nor a toll-free tech support line. Company representatives say they encourage, but don't require, dealers to provide on-site service, so the quality of service depends on your local dealer.

At this price, many will put up with a few design flaws and will haggle over service with their dealer. This is a solid, reasonably speedy system at a rock-bottom price—a combination you may find irresistible.

Compaq Deskpro 4/66i Model 120/w

The Compaq Deskpro 4/66i is one of several systems in this review that pack a speedy DX2-66 processor into a compact, low-profile case. It's clearly not meant to be a network server. The case has room for just three drive bays, two of them externally accessible but already filled with the two floppies; the single internal drive bay is filled by a relatively small 116MB Quantum hard disk. You also get just three 8/16-bit ISA slots—though all of them are free—because Compaq has integrated its own QVision video accelerator, as well as the disk connector and I/O, on the motherboard. The motherboard also holds Compaq's Business Audio hardware, which along with the bundled microphone and set of headphones gives you Windows 3.1 sound capabilities good enough for voice annotations but not for music or other hi-fi applications.

Except for its limited expandability, this system is on a par with any other here. The \$2626 price puts it just \$180 away from the best five for price, and its performance is more than competitive, especially on Windows apps. Thanks in large part to QVision,

the Deskpro turned in particularly good scores on the Excel and Paradox tests. Performance on the BAPCo suite was less impressive.

Compaq revamped its service-and-support package as we went to press. It now features a three-year warranty, weekend support, a year of free on-site service, and toll-free technical support. The one weakness we detected in the customer support is the lack of a turn-around policy for off-site repairs. Company representatives say that there's no such policy because users return their units to dealers first; dealers send the unit back to Compaq only if they can't fix it themselves.

If it weren't for the limited expansion options and the subpar BAPCo numbers, the Deskpro would be one of the most attractive systems here. As it is, if you want a fast system for *Windows* that won't take up much desk space, this machine is a contender.

DEC DECpc 466d2 LP

There's just something appealing about putting a DX2-66 into a low-profile case—it makes you think of a sports car. The compact DECpc is one of the hottest-looking systems in this review, offering a sleek, uncluttered front panel. What's really remarkable is, at \$2284, the DECpc costs just \$242 more than the cheapest system in the roundup—a bit like getting Porsche styling and engineering at a Yugo price.

Like the other compact systems here, the DEC offers limited expandability, although the CPU can be upgraded because it sits on a daughterboard. It has just two internal bays, one of them free (a 234MB hard drive sits in the other), and two occupied externally accessible drive bays; if you wanted to add a tape drive, you'd be out of luck. The system has three 8/16-bit ISA slots, all of which are free, thanks to integration of the video and other peripheral controllers on the motherboard.

Performance is good, but not good enough in this crowd. The DEC produced just average numbers on both our *Windows* and BAPCo tests—despite the S3 video accelerator chip integrated onto a local-bus circuit on the motherboard.


Even worse, DEC came in last in our service-and-support evaluations (though it still got very respectable scores since industrywide, service and support is improving so fast). When we called tech sup-

port, they made us hold for long periods and answered two of our questions incorrectly. The reason: DEC's mail-order business has become such a success that the company has had a hard time keeping up with the volume of sales and the subsequent phone calls. DEC has scored well for service in previous reviews, so the service picture will likely improve in the near future. DEC offers the two-day turnaround policy on repairs, one year of free on-site service, and toll-free tech support line we praised last month.

Despite the hot design and low price, the DEC's poor expandability, average performance, and overburdened customer support make it a fair-to-middling value this time around. If you're looking for an inexpensive network node and care more about how a system looks than how many slots it has, this DEC is well worth considering. After all, nobody buys a Porsche for good gas mileage.

Dell Computer 486D/66

The good news is that the Dell 486D/66 is backed by some of the best customer service in this review—Dell missed inclusion in our service top five by just a fraction of a percentage point. The tech support people answered our sample questions perfectly, and the phone lines are open 18 hours a day.

The bad news is that the Dell's performance is average—it's still a screamer, but not fast enough to attract notice in this company. Perhaps it's the lack of an external RAM cache, but the 486D/66 turned in subpar times on virtually every test, with the exception of the graphics section of the BAPCo suite.

The Dell didn't do much better when it came to price. At \$3218, it's slightly expensive among these systems. For the money, you get a relatively small 116MB Quantum hard drive and a 3½/5½ combo floppy drive (which leaves you with two externally accessible drive bays free). Thanks to the integration of video, disk controller, and I/O functions on the motherboard, the midsize system also has six 8/16-bit slots free.

Nice design and excellent service aren't enough to overcome ordinary performance and a high price. If you want the security of knowing you're buying from one of the most reputable firms in the business, with some of the best customer support available, then this system is worth consideration. However, several faster and less expensive alternatives are available.

At press time Dell indicated it would replace this system with an improved DX2-66. It should be worth taking a look at.

The DFI 486-66 was just 8 percent shy of the top five for overall performance. It turned in a faster time on the *Word for Windows* test than any other machine. It also did quite well on the word

processing, spreadsheet, database, and desktop publishing sections of the BAPCo suite.

The fast *Windows* times may result in part from DFI's integration of the Tseng ET4000AX video controller onto the removable CPU card used in the system. Another benefit of this CPU-board design: You'll be able to upgrade when faster processors become available, without worrying about upgrading your BIOS or changing the system clock.

The compact case makes room for four free 8/16-bit and two free 8-bit expansion slots. You get just three externally accessible drive bays (only one of which is free); the single internal drive bay is occupied by a 202MB Western Digital hard drive. Strangely enough, the external RAM cache isn't integrated onto the CPU board, but onto the main board instead.

DFI offers an attractive service-and-support policy, marred only by the lack of a turnaround policy. Responses to our tech support questions were nearly perfect, and the company provides a year of free on-site service. Unfortunately, fast performance and good service can't justify this system's high price. At \$3767, it's one of the more expensive here, far above the \$3000 average. Despite the good speed, you can find better values elsewhere.

EPS Technologies 486-DX2 66

With a street price of just \$2645, this system is one of the cheapest in the review, quite a bit below the \$3000 average. You get some nice design and expansion features, including a 15-inch monitor and an Orchid Fahrenheit VA video board, the latter offering both accelerated graphics and basic sound capabilities, including I/O ports for microphones, headphones, and speakers. You also get six 8/16-bit ISA expansion slots, four of which are free after you account for the video and I/O boards, and two 8-bit slots. The desktop case has four externally accessible drive bays, two of which are free. A 202MB Maxtor hard drive occupies one of two internal full-size bays.

The low price includes decent customer service. EPS offers a three-year warranty, a year of free on-site service, two-day turnaround on factory repairs, and 12 hours of tech support per day. The only fault we found with tech support was a minor inaccuracy in their response to one of our questions; their answers were fine otherwise.

Sad to say, despite the Orchid accelerator and a 256K external cache, the EPS's performance didn't live up to its respectable specs. It produced consistently subpar times on both the *Windows* tests and the BAPCo suite. If you want the best combination of price and performance, several other systems will fit your needs better.

Like certain fast-food restaurants, First Computer Systems will build pretty much any kind of system to order. FCS built us a decent, if generic, 486DX2-66 machine.

The tower case is identical to that used by PowerBox. Inside, there's a 203MB Western Digital hard drive attached to an impressive 2MB Ultrastor 15c caching controller, which helped the system blaze through some disk-intensive tests, particularly the BAPCo software development benchmark. In other tests, however, the FCS was less impressive, achieving only midpack performance overall. The unremarkable speed may result in part from the system's Orchid Fahrenheit 1280 video accelerator. Once considered a fast board, this video veteran has been eclipsed by local-bus designs and second-generation Windows accelerators.

In fact, "middle of the pack" pretty much sums up the FCS, from speed to service and support. Expandability is the one bright spot, thanks to a total of eight drive bays, only three of which are used by the floppy and hard drives. There are also five free slots.

First Computer Systems' flexibility makes the company worth considering if you need a custom configuration. If you're looking for top speed or a bargain price, however, check out some of the better buys in this review.

Gateway 2000 4DX2-66V

The Gateway is not only a jack-of-all-trades, it's a master of them, too. Let's start with speed. It ran only 6 percent slower than the fastest system—almost indistinguishable from the fifth-place finisher—and earned the best overall Windows benchmark scores. Good integration, an ATI local-bus graphics accelerator, and a local-bus IDE hard drive controller all contribute to this bravura performance.

This speediest of *Windows* performers is also better than average in price, only about \$950 more than the cheapest system we tested. You also get one of several major apps for free. Gateway's service and support is quite good: free on-site service for a year and accurate answers to our test questions (although we had to wait a while to get them).

Integration is the key here. Since most system functions are either on the motherboard or controlled through the two VESA local-bus slots, the system has six 8/16-bit ISA slots free. It also comes with a high-quality Gateway CrystalScan 15-inch flat-screen monitor. The speedy local-bus hard drive is a 202MB unit, but Gateway offers a 340MB unit as standard for only \$120 more. Every detail of the design is carefully thought out. Tight integration around really fast components accounts for the superb performance at a reasonable price.

All-around excellence makes this Gateway the decathlete of DX2-66 computers. We recommend it wholeheartedly, particularly as a powerful *Windows* workstation.



the computer company (no relation) seems to have the same idea. Its 486/D66X2e system is one of the fastest machines in this review. It was close to the front of the pack on several segments of the Windows test suite, and it did even better on the BAPCo suite, with a first-place finish on the spreadsheet section and impressive numbers on everything else but the database tests.

The Hertz's performance scores are undoubtedly helped by the heavy-duty Ultrastor 15c IDE controller with 4MB of disk cache. While it isn't a local-bus solution, the ISA-based Diamond Speed-Star video accelerator board seems to have helped as well. The system's compact desktop case also holds a total of five drive bays, but two floppy drives and a single hard drive take up three of them. Service and support is ordinary. Although Hertz answered all our questions promptly and correctly, it charges for on-site service, and its support hours are shorter than most. It should be pointed out that the company has specialized in selling to large enterprises that have dedicated in-house support staffs.

Surprisingly, all this speed and expandability is available for an extremely reasonable \$2895—slightly less than the average for this review. Like the Gateway system, the Hertz is a great all-around system with a low cost, acceptable service and support, and good design. The result is a third-place spot on our Best Buy list.


Hyundai is making a big new push into the PC marketplace. This system is one of the company's first shots at the competition.

One of Hyundai's hottest selling points is its new centralized customer service, and it seems like a winner. The tech support people answered our questions promptly, politely, and almost perfectly. Service is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day, and includes a special help line for beginners. As a result, Hyundai waltzed away with our top honors for service and support. Another sign of Hyundai's aggressive strategy is the price of the 466D2—at \$2448, it's just \$400 more expensive than the cheapest system here.

Unfortunately, we weren't able to get a 486DX2 system from Hyundai configured exactly as we wanted it by press time. The system we looked at came with a 116MB Conner hard drive; shipping systems will include a 300MB hard drive that should be noticeably faster than the one we tested. With the current drive, the Hyundai fared poorly, finishing well below average on the Windows tests and even further back on the BAPCo suite. This seems odd since the Hyundai system uses a fast VESA local-bus video controller, the ATI Graphics Ultra Pro. We suspect that not all the bugs had been worked out of the video driver and that a simple driver and hard disk upgrade could improve this PC's performance dramatically.

If you're looking for a reliable PC with a good price and lots of hand-holding, then this Hyundai could be for you.


on the BAPCo test suite, where it got top scores in every category and was just 7 percent slower than the fastest system here. Although it did slightly less well on the Windows test suite, it still finished just 5 percent behind the leader.

What's the source of all this speed? A SuperIDE caching controller with 2MB of RAM and a proprietary local-bus card for fast video. The local-bus implementation in this system is rather odd and looks like two back-to-back ISA slots. The 486LB DX2/66 Winstation has two of these slots, one occupied by the video board and the other free. Unfortunately, since the slot is proprietary, you won't be able to stick in one of the many VESA drive controller or networking cards that are beginning to appear. Instead, you'll have to wait until Lodestar issues other proprietary cards.

In addition to its speed, there's a lot to like about the Lodestar. Its tower chassis has eight drive bays, three of which hold the two floppies and the 203MB Western Digital hard drive. Lodestar helps out your eyes by throwing in a flat-screen 15-inch monitor. And the support staff answered our questions perfectly.

At \$3329, the Lodestar isn't cheap, but you get a lot of machine for your money, along with solid service and support and a two-year warranty. If money isn't your primary concern, this machine could be what you're looking for.

NEC PowerMate Express 486DX2/66e

For a compact system, the NEC PowerMate Express 486DX2/66c is incredibly expandable. It includes a caching SCSI controller (with 512K of cache expandable to 16MB), which powers a mammoth 509MB Maxtor hard drive. It also has four free EISA slots. There are also four free drive bays, and the SCSI port will let you tack on additional peripherals like a tape backup or a CD ROM drive with ease. As usual with NEC systems, the monitor is one of NEC's own standard-setting MultiSyncs, in this case the 3FGx. Graphics are controlled by NEC's Image Video system, which consists of an NEC proprietary local-bus board based on a Tseng ET4000 chip. The system includes circuitry to detect the presence of high-frequency MultiSync monitors and automatically improves the refresh rate if the monitor can handle it. The result: the best picture the board and monitor can produce every time.

Performance, however, isn't spectacular. Some individual test scores were excellent, including those for databases (thanks to the caching SCSI controller), but overall performance was middling. Fortunately, since the processor is on a daughterboard, you'll be able to upgrade to any future CPU that NEC chooses to supply.

If you want one of the highest-quality monitors available, EISA, and plenty of room for the future, consider the NEC. Just remember that it isn't as good as our Best Buys for price/performance.

With a name like PowerBox, you'd expect a screamer of a system. This sleek tower certainly looks the part, with its classy matte-black finish, but it doesn't deliver consistently. The system, helped by its eaching disk controller, did very well on the BAPCo test suite, especially on the database tests. Unfortunately, it did quite poorly on the Windows tests. Perhaps its ISA-based video accelerator card can't compete with some of the faster video systems here. Overall performance placed it in the middle of the pack.

Service and support for the PowerBox was very good: We got accurate answers, short response time when we called the support line, and a two-year warranty. The tower chassis has a total of eight drive bays, five of which are free.

If you must have a PC that matches your black leather office furniture, then by all means go with the PowerBox. But less design- or database-conscious buyers should check out our Best Buys instead.



This attractive entry from Quill fairly bristles with features. Its tower chassis comes with a stunning eight 32-bit EISA slots, five of which are free. One holds a SCSI caching controller that's laden with 4MB of RAM and manages a giant 324MB hard drive. Another slot holds an STB WinD/X video accelerator card (which unfortunately has only a 16-bit ISA interface even though it sits in a 32bit slot). There are seven drive bays, five of which are free, thanks to a combo floppy drive.

Apart from a strong showing on disk-intensive tests, the Quill lagged in performance, finishing 30 percent slower than the fastest system.

If you're looking for a file server, the Quill's big expansion capacity is a plus, as is its high-performance SCSI controller. This system is relatively expensive, but you get a lot of extras for the money.



This Swan's nicest feature is, its wings won't get clipped as new processors appear and desktop PCs get faster and faster. The CPU, along with the proprietary integrated local-bus video, resides on a removable daughterboard. When Intel brings out its Pentium-based OverDrive chip, Swan should supply a board that can plug into your system.

Until that future arrives, however, the Swan 486DX-66DB is at best a plain cygnet, if not an ugly duckling. Performance was average both in the BAPCo suite and the Windows tests. From price to service and support, the Swan fell roughly in the middle of the reviewed systems. A slightly cramped case that has only four drive bays doesn't leave much room for the Swan to spread its wings, but a space-saving combo floppy drive helps a bit. If you want to make sure you can keep up with changing technology, consider the Swan, but only as one of several upgradable systems.

This hot-rod system produced some of the best performance figures in the review, thanks to great numbers on the BAPCo test suite. Most likely, the Tangent you purchase will perform even better than the one we tested: Tangent is installing EISA-based video controllers in future systems.

The machine's impressive performance on disk-intensive tests isn't surprising given the Adaptec caching SCSI controller with 4MB of RAM. This system includes three free drive bays, one open EISA slot, and four free ISA slots. A 15-inch flat-screen Taxan monitor completes the package. Service and support is ordinary, and tech support failed the toughest of our test questions. If you want speed, consider this Best Buy. Its numbers on our tests are too good to ignore.

The Tri-Star delivers stellar performance, finishing just a fraction of a percent behind the leader on the *Windows* suite and almost as strongly on the BAPCo tests. Although the 202MB hard drive is controlled by a standard IDE controller, Tri-Star includes a local-bus SCSI-2 adapter. The company also plans to migrate its motherboard designs to EISA bus designs soon.

A local-bus ATI card, similar to the one used in several of these PCs, provided graphics in our test system. Impressively, Tri-Star has chosen to match this video board with a superb Hitachi 17-inch flat-screen monitor that meets all the tough Swedish MPR-II radiation standards. A two-year warranty is part of a good service-and-support package.

This tower system also has five free drive bays out of eight and seven free ISA slots—room enough for plenty of growth. But this performance and technology come at a price—\$3695 to be exact. If you want speed, top-notch graphics, and SCSI capabilities in an expandable tower, take a look at the Tri-Star; if the price is beyond you, turn to one of our cheaper Best Buys.

This beautifully designed system is extremely modular. Intended as a network node workstation, it has only two free drive bays and four free EISA slots, but you can upgrade using a daughterboard.

Our unit came with an ethernet-compatible, Novell-certified LAN module and a SCSI-2 module in place. In addition, ZDS supplies Windows for Workgroups free, along with the client shells for Novell NetWare, Microsoft LAN Manager, and Banyan's VINES. The added value could be well over \$1000 to some purchasers of network workstations.

ATI graphics accelerator. Nevertheless, it did better than average on the *Paradox* and BAPCo database tests, helping it to a middle-of-the-pack finish overall, 20 percent slower than the fastest system.

Some of ZDS's dealers are authorized service centers and can give superb service. While the company's phone support hours are long, tech support gave us confusing answers when we called.

The ZDS costs too much for a Best Buy, but given its features, consider it if you need a high-performance network workstation.





Methodology

All tests were run using systems configured as standard. If we had to install Windows, we performed the default installation. We configured Windows with a Hewlett-Packard LaserJet III as the default printer, disabled Print Manager, and attached a null printer to LPT1. Using vendor-supplied video drivers when possible, we set the resolution to 800 by 600 pixels. On systems unable to support 16 colors at that resolution, we used 256.

Excel 4.0

We perform several data extracts; build and format a financial statement and print it; and open a mortgage

analysis, scroll, move blocks, change the interest rate, print preview the statement, and save it.

Word for Windows 2.0

We use the spelling checker and scroll through a 27page document; create, format, print, and save a singlepage business letter, and open a business proposal, add a paragraph, and preview and print the proposal.

Paradox 3.5 In DOS window

Running the program in a DOS window, we perform a variety of data entry, record searching, and updating tasks. Then we generate reports using a simple customer list.

Freelance for Windows 1.0

We load a single-page starter file containing a United States map with each state a separate object. Then we build a six-page presentation using charts and preview it five times with different effects. Finally, we save the presentation to disk.

BAPCo SYSmark92

We run a scripting program that loads common database, desktop publishing, presentation graphics, software development, spreadsheet, and word processing applications and executes a variety of typical tasks with each. The following software packages are used in this test: Aldus PageMaker 4.0, dBASE IV 1.1, Harvard Graphics 3.0, 1-2-3 3.1, Microsoft C 6.0, Microsoft Excel 3.0, Microsoft Word for Windows 2.0, Paradox 3.5, Quattro Pro 3.0, and WordPerfect 5.1.

Is Your NEW Software SECONDHAND?

When you buy shrink-wrapped software, you have a right to assume it's unused and virus-free. Our investigation reveals you may not be as safe as you think.

erry Mailey had installed new software countless times before. He slit open the shrink-wrap, fished the disk envelope from the box, and began to load his new copy of *QRAM*, Quarterdeck's 286 memory manager. But when he got to the registration screen, he saw someone else's name: The program was already registered to another user.

"Suddenly a message flashed on screen. *Norton AntiVirus* had picked up something. I turned the machine off in a panic," recalls Mailey, former contracts manager for JAYCOR, a government contracting firm in Vienna, Virginia.

Mailey was lucky. His virus detection software identified the Jerusalem II virus in the new software before it infected any files. But even if there hadn't been a virus lurking on those floppies, Mailey could have had a big problem on his hands: If the software was registered to someone else, he might have been unable to get technical support or the upgrade benefits afforded registered users.

"I thought shrink-wrap around software was like the safety seal around a bottle of medicine—that it meant the software was fresh from the factory," says Mailey.

It doesn't.

Judging from a *PC World* investigation into the software return and resale practices of major retailers, there's more than a slight chance that the software you're using has been used before. During the months of October and November 1992, a team of

posing as everyday consumers, bought and returned software packages at 20 stores throughout the United States. Of the 39 packages purchased, four showed evidence of having been previously used, and an additional seven wound up back on the shelves for resale after we returned them to the store. That's a whopping 25 percent rewrapping rate.

The rewrapping wasn't limited to any single store or chain of stores, although some were less inclined to rewrap than others. Nor was more expensive software reshelved more often than lower-cost products. Many of the more expensive packages we bought and returned never got restocked, while relatively low-priced software found its way back on the shelves.

The results of our shopping expedition aren't projectable to every store in every chain. But the percentage of packages that were rewrapped was high enough to indicate that it's a fairly common practice. Interviews with consumers, channel watchers, and store employees confirm our findings: If you buy enough software retail, you'll eventually wind up with a rewrapped package—that is, if you haven't already.

Most consumers never know their software has been road tested by someone else. Only when the new owner's system is infected by

a virus, when the registration screen identifies someone else as the owner, or when the package is incomplete, do most people realize they didn't get what they paid for.

Common Practice, But Not Common Knowledge

Virtually every major software retailer allows customers to take software home, try it out (generally for two to four weeks), and then return it if they wish. "As long as the package is complete and it's not damaged, many stores will rewrap it," reports Marcia Kaplan, director of research for Merrin Information Services, a Palo Alto, California-based research firm that tracks the retail channel.

The practice is seemingly commonplace, yet few consumers we spoke with—regardless of how many years they'd been using computers or how many packages they'd purchased—knew about it. "If they're going to recycle software they should let me know about it," says Mailey. "Then I could make the choice and decide if I want to take the risk [of buying used software]."

Customers are being naive, according to one former store manager of a major soft-ware retailer who asked that his name not be used. "Where do [they] think the soft-ware goes when they return it?" he asks, noting that one of the daily projects at his store was to rewrap all the open software. "There's no guarantee that anything on the shelves hasn't been opened."

It's a simple matter of economics, says channel watcher Kaplan. Fierce competi-

tion demands that stores offer some kind of money-back guarantee on software, but the lenient return policy means they are left with a lot of used, but not defective software on their hands. In fact, the store manager we spoke with estimated that he processed 10 to 15 returns daily, or roughly 15 percent of his sales volume.

It's too expensive and time-consuming for stores to repackage software and then return it to the software company or distributor, says Kaplan. And they can't afford to factor the cost of returns into their operating expenses. "It's getting tough out there," says Kaplan. "Competitive upgrades [handled by vendors], bundling agreements, and short product life cycles are all cutting into the margins of retailers."

Real Risk

Even customers who sympathize with retailers' economic predicament wonder what, if any, checks are in place to ensure that only pristine packages are rewrapped. And many would like to know why retailers don't notify customers of their rewrapping practices.

According to store personnel, returned software is supposed to be checked to make sure it's in "salable" condition before it's rewrapped. That means the warranty or registration card is still in

PC World Goes Shopping

We purchased software from BizMart; Comp-USA; Egghead; Electronics Boutique; Fry's Electronics; Office Depot; Software, Etc.; and Waldensoftware. Although software buyers report purchasing rewrapped software from many of these chains, we found rewrapped packages only at BizMart, CompUSA, and Software, Etc. Of these firms, only Software, Etc. acknowledged that it is store policy to rewrap returned software. All others indicated rewrapping was against company policy.

Here's what our shopping expedition uncovered: Fry's Electronics, a Northern California superstore chain, appeared to have one of the most conscientious resale policies.

Clerks placed returned software in one of several bins—one for unopened packages, one for packages in which the seal on the disk envelope had been broken, and a couple for defective or altered software, which gets returned to the manufacturer or distributor.

According to one salesperson, employees load opened software onto a computer to see if it's been registered or infected with a virus. If it passes inspection it gets put on the shelf with a sticker indicating that it was opened but examined and found to be okay.

According to a Fry's spokesperson, however, official policy is that all opened software gets sent back to the manufacturer. Only


> packages in which the disk envelope has not been opened get reshelved.

> The results of our CompUSA shopping sprees were mixed. Of the five packages we purchased, one was used, and a second got rewrapped after we returned it. According to Chief Operating Officer Keith Costein, opened software is supposed to be returned to the vendor for credit. "It's alarming that even a couple packages got rewrapped," he said.

We bought 14 packages at

the box, all the disks and packaging materials are intact, and the manual hasn't been written in, highlighted, or otherwise sullied. Software that writes the user's name or identification number to disk is never supposed to make it back on the shelf.

That's the theory. But strict quality assurance procedures are not always followed. Take the experience of Charles Jackson. The Mountain View, California, desktop publisher has bought two previously used software packages in the past year. The first, Word for Windows 2.0, was registered to an Edmund Wong of Hong Kong. He discovered this after checking the About file when he was not prompted for his name during the installation. Jackson says he should have known something was amiss when he saw that the plastic bag holding the disks had already been torn open.

Jackson's second encounter with used software came recently when he bought a copy of Gold Disk's *Professional Draw*, a drawing package that comes with dozens of fonts and a sizable clip art library. This time the disk container (a cardboard

box sealed by a small sticker with the standard copyright warning) appeared unopened, but the spine was broken on two of the manuals, as though someone had tried to photocopy them, and the font and clip art catalogs were missing. Jackson's solution: "I've started

seven Egghead stores, and not one of them made its way back on the shelf. We did buy one package, Aldus Photostyler, that was missing the advertised coupon for a free copy of Gallery Effects, but the disk envelope itself was unopened. Other than that one oversight, the store's record was unblemished.

When asked about the chain's return policy,

In four out of five cases, the software we bought at one store was back on the shelf in a matter of days with no sign that it had been returned and rewrapped.

Egghead spokesperson Megan McKenzie said all used software is sent back to the vendor. Our experience supported this statement. At nearly every store, sales personnel placed a sticker on returned Items identifying the software as "Unsalable/Defective." It would be difficult, if not impossible, to take the sticker off without damaging the packaging.

We bought and returned two packages each at Waldensoftware, Electronics Boutique, and the Office Depot. None of these products were reshelved.

The same cannot be said of the BizMart stores we visited. Many of the stores prominently displayed notices to customers indicating that opened software can be exchanged only for the same package (an effort, according to one store manager, to curtall software piracy). Signs to the contrary, we were able to obtain refunds in every case (although it took some effort at a few of the stores). And in four out of five cases, the software was back on the shelf in a matter of days—with no sign indi-

cating that it had been returned and rewrapped. In fact, a "new" copy of Peachtree Accounting for Windows was open when we

bought it and got rewrapped a second time, even though we told the sales clerk the package had obviously been used before. At another BizMart, one of our shoppers overheard a clerk saying, "It's okay to wrap it up and put it back" after inspecting a package returned by one of our shoppers.

Jim Berk, BizMart president and CEO, said store personnel were "absolutely wrong" to rewrap returned software. "If the seal is broken, the software is assumed to be used. We don't sell used products."

This policy has been reiterated to all store personnel, according to Berk.

Two of the six packages we returned at Soft-

ware, Etc. were rewrapped, while another two were used when we bought them. One copy of Peachtree Complete Accounting was missing the 3½-inch disks and the warranty card. A Word for Windows 2.0 upgrade package was used when we bought it. Disk envelopes were open, some manuals lacked their standard shrink-wrap, the WinWord 1.02, 2.0 Reseller License Agreement Card was bent, and the original shrink-wrap material was stuffed into the bottom of the box. In both cases, the store managers grudgingly accepted the software for return.

A spokesperson for Software, Etc. says the firm's policy is to check all returned software to make sure it's in "salable condition." If the software has been "Initialized" (marked with some form of user Identification), It goes back to the manufacturer. Complete and undamaged packages get rewrapped and put back on the shelf for resale. Returned packages are not identified as "used," however.

At press time, Stan Hirschman, Software, Etc. vice president of store operations, informed *PC World* of a change in company policy. Beginning January 1, all returned software was to be scanned for viruses before it was rewrapped and restocked. "We want to ensure the software's safe when we sell it to our customers," he noted.


Clearly, these packages weren't checked before they were rewrapped. And even if all the quality control measures are carefully followed, the standard checking procedure does not include a scan for viruses.

"This was not an obscure virus that infected my software," says former JAYCOR employee Mailey, referring to the Jerusalem II virus he found on his disk. "They didn't even take the first step and check the software."

"Sure we should scan for viruses," acknowledges the anonymous store manager. "But who should do it and what do we pay them?" During his four years at the software store, the number of authorized employee hours dropped

from 135 to 90 per week. "We didn't have the time or resources to scan every disk," he says, adding that the only computer in the store didn't have enough hard disk space to hold virus detection software.

Are customers expecting too much? That's the opinion of one store manager. "Customers need to get their priorities straight," he says. "They want us to know everything about software; they want to be able to look at the manual before they buy a package; and

they want to be able to return anything they don't like. But they also don't want it rewrapped. They can't have it both ways."

Some customers suggest that retailers identify returned software and let customers decide if they want to take the risk of buying a used package. However, this may not be the most attractive option. "If there was an originally wrapped package and a used one, I'd take the original, even if the rewrapped package was offered at a discount," says Don Bohr, a Westminster, California, PC user who

An Ounce of Prevention...

Some heads-up shopping and a thorough check of new software can go a long way toward identifying rewrapped packages.

Here's what you can do:

- Ask about a store's policy. While most retailers don't advertise that they rewrap returns, many salespeople will tell you if it's standard practice at their store.
- Examine packages carefully. If there's more than one copy of a product on the shelf, take a minute to compare boxes. First,

look for a different type of shrink-wrap material. For example, Central Point's shrink-wrap has small, 'k-inch holes, Peachtree's is embossed with small peaches, and Aldus adorns its packages with the company logo, generally on the bottom of the box. Some companies shrink-wrap only an inner box, which slides into an outer sleeve. Rewrapped items may get a different treatment. Also, take a look at the price tag; returned items may be marked differently.

Shopworn packages occasionally get rewrapped, so different packaging does not always indicate a used item. Nonetheless, play it safe: If there's more than one on the shelf, pick the one that looks factory-fresh.

• Examine the contents carefully. Ask the salesperson if you can open a package you intend to purchase. This extra step can save you a trip back to the store, but open only software you know you're going to buy. Otherwise, you're just compounding the rewrapping problem.

When inspecting the contents, check the following items: Are the disk envelopes sealed? Are the manuals clean? Is the warranty/registration card in the box? Next, look for the contents list—either on a separate slip or in the installation section of the manual, and make sure everything is still in the box (manuals, different media, etc.).

- Run your disks through a virus detection utility once you've brought them home.
 Some retailers rewrap the disks, making it all the more difficult to tell if the software you're getting has been returned. Look for an unbroken copyright seal on the outside of the disk envelope.
- Save your receipt. If the above steps fall and you wind up with a package that's already registered, you'll need a refund or another package.







unknowingly bought a rewrapped package. "I'd rather pay full price and get the original."

Clearly, says Kaplan, liberal return policies invite abuse—some customers figure they don't need to research purchases in advance, since they can always get their money back. Others simply use the guarantee to get free software, installing it on their systems and returning it to the store.

"I had one customer who returned something every other day all year long," recalls our anonymous store manager. "Either he was bored and it was cheaper than renting videos or he was copying software and using it illegally. It's hard to come up with a policy that will discourage abuse and still respect the rights of real customers."

While retailers struggle to find that balance, many stores continue to rewrap returned software. So, for the time being at least, be a heads-up shopper: Thoroughly check that everything's in the box and scan new software to make sure it's clean.

Many Happy Returns?

Software consumers are spoiled rotten.

That's what retail sales managers say, off the record. Sure, used software sometimes gets rewrapped and sold as new but what other industry lets you take home a \$500 item, use it for 30 days, and then return it for a full refund if you're not satisfied?

To find out how software sales and return policies compare to those in other industries, we called stores that sell other forms of intellectual property—music, movies, and

books—and investigated their return policies. We called a number of shops in the San Francisco Bay Area and asked how they

handle returns of used, but not defective, items. While the responses varied, it's clear from our informal survey that software buyers benefit from unparalleled freedom.

Movies

Although it's less likely that consumers will try to return videos and laser disks, opened products can often be returned for credit. Some managers are more inclined to provide an exchange than a refund if someone just doesn't like her or his purchase. "People usually buy videos of films they're already familiar with; it's less of an impulse buy than music," says Troy Nelson, manager of Tower Video in Berkeley, California.

While music stores can't prevent consumers from making copies of records, tapes, or CDs before they return the items, most video stores "copyguard" new videocassette releases. Try to duplicate the tape, and you'll get an unwatchable copy with fuzzy lines or poor sound. Laser disks, on the other hand, have no protection.

Books

Of all the shops contacted, only bookstores would admit to reselling returned items as new. But they won't accept returns on shopworn books.

"You can tell when a book has been read," says Paul Shanahan, manager of Stacey's Bookstore, a shop that caters to the San

Francisco business community. Among the telltale signs: A creased spine on a paperback, blemishes or writing on pages. "You can thumb through the book to make sure nothing's been torn out," he adds.

Most store managers say they will exchange a book that's in good condition, as long as you have a receipt and bring it back within a specified period of time; many even provide a cash refund.

But there are exceptions. Stacey's, for example, won't accept returns on study guides (such as *How to Take the SAT*) to discourage students from buying them to cram for a test and then returning them. Most stores won't take back computer books if any software included with the book has been opened, or books on tape if the shrinkwrap is broken.

Granted, spending \$10 to \$25 for a book, video, or CD is a lot less dicey than dropping a few hundred dollars on a piece of software.

The only risk is that you may not like your purchase, while if you buy the wrong business software you can set yourself back months in training and installation costs. That's why retail software return policies are so liberal: They help remove some of the risk.

Music

Among Bay Area record shops, The Wherehouse has one of the most easygoing policies, allowing you to return any opened item (record, tape, or CD) with a receipt within 10 days for either credit or exchange. "We believe this policy takes the risk out of trying new music," says Bruce Jesse, The Wherehouse's vice president of advertising and sales promotion.

Many stores allow you to exchange an opened item even if you simply don't like it. But some, such as Amoeba Music in Berkeley, charge a 25 percent restocking fee, then resell your returned product as a used item. While no store we surveyed refuses to accept returns of open items, some go to great lengths to keep customers from bringing back items in the first place—setting up listening posts so people can try before they buy, or displaying CD booklets so consumers can read about a CD's contents.

Records, tapes, and CDs, like software, are easy to copy. That's why most managers won't take back items if they suspect customers of copying items before returning them. "If we felt someone was abusing the policy we'd refuse to honor the returns, but it's not much of a problem," says John McCord, general manager of Down Home Music, a mail-order and retail store in El Cerrito, California.

names, backing up regularly, and generally thinking of my data as my data, not the property of whatever program I happened to create it in. This way I can easily find what I need, copy or archive everything connected with a single project, delete old files, and keep upto-date backups of my precious data.

There isn't one right way to organize a hard disk, of course. Everyone has different work habits and goals. Corporate managers, freelance lawyers, and small business owners all need to tailor their

disks differently, as do tailors (to say nothing of computer magazine editors). But there are a few simple rules that can make your life easier.

In the pages that follow, I'm going

to show you how to organize your hard disk for speed, safety, and convenience. I'll tell you how to outsmart installation programs that think they know what's best for you, use the infamous eight-and-three file name limit to your advantage, and improve performance by keeping your AUTOEXEC BAT's PATH statement short.

Everything in Its Place

Let's start with rule number one: Keep your data in one place, away from the programs you created it in. Save data files either in one directory branch (a directory and its subdirectories) or in a logical drive that you created when you partitioned your hard disk.

If you keep your data in the same directory as the program that created it, you're making life difficult for yourself—and asking for trouble. Think of how you would organize a filing cabinet: Would


you put the typed papers in the first drawer, forms filled out in pencil in the second, stuff written with a pen (separated by ink color, of course) in the third, and fifth-generation carbon copies that are impossible to read at the bottom?

Well, it's not a good way to organize your hard disk, either. A per-

To Partition or Not to Partition?

Should you partition your hard disk, causing DOS to see it as several smaller drives instead of one large one? When we asked this question on PC World Online, readers and editors on both sides of the issue responded passionately, unwilling even to consider the others' arguments. Here's a somewhat less zealous discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of partitioning your hard disk.

Partition Size Versus Cluster Size



LARGE DRIVES MEAN WASTE: The size of your logical hard drive determines the size of your clusters. Smaller cluster sizes are more efficient. If you partition your disk, you'll divide the space used by DOS into two parts: the primary DOS partition, which contains one logical (as opposed to physical) drive; and the extended DOS partition, which can contain several other logical drives. The primary partition drive gets the first available drive letter on your system, probably C:. You have 24 drive letters (C through Z) available for all the drives on your system, although you may need to reserve some of them for network drives.

Reclaiming Wasted Space

If you have a large hard disk, using more than one logical drive may be an excellent way to reduce the amount of "slack," or wasted, space. DOS reserves space for a file in units called clusters or allocation units. Every file takes up at least one cluster, and if a file is even 1 byte larger than the cluster size, it takes up two clusters, with most of the second cluster wasted. It's easy to see that smaller clusters mean less waste. For logical drives over 15MB, the larger the partition, the larger the cluster; in other words, partitioning your drive into smaller logical drives reduces slack. The figure at left shows a breakdown of these clusters.

To see how much space you're wasting, you can use the QBASIC program featured in "Reduce Your Waste" in January's Dialog Box. If you find you're wasting more than you are comfortable with (8MB to 10MB of wast-

ed space is about normal for a 200MB hard disk), repartitioning may be a good idea.

Utility Advantages

Under certain circumstances, breaking up your hard drive can make backups more convenient. If your tape drive holds significantly less than your hard drive, so that you can't do a full backup on one tape, partitioning the drive will make make running partial backups easier. And if you prefer image backups—which save a byte-for-byte image of a logical drive to tape and are faster than file backups—the only way to back up your data while skipping your programs is to keep them on separate logical drives.

Partitioning may also give you better control over some utilities. For instance, if you want to exclude certain data from the Smart-Drive disk cache, or turn off SmartDrive's write-back feature for a specific group of files, the only way to do it is to create a separate logical drive for each set of instructions.

Hitting the Too-Low Ceiling

So why doesn't everyone run out and partition his or her hard drive? Because dividing your disk divides your free space, and that limits your freedom. What happens if you need to install some monster application that requires great tracts of hard disk space? Or what if your collection of graphics files gets bigger? If you have 10MB free on sonnel review is, first and foremost, a personnel review; the fact that it also happens to be a *WordPerfect* document is a mere detail. If you store your data as important information rather than an adjunct to applications, you'll be able to get to it faster and combine it easily with other types of files, and you'll be more likely to keep it secure.

Aside from being convenient and intuitive, segregating your data from your programs helps keep it safe. No one wants to back up an entire hard disk regularly, and backing up your data is much more important than backing up your programs, which you can always reinstall from the original floppies. Well, it's a lot easier to back up your data when it's all in one place—a simple XCOPY C:\DATA*.* A: /S /M will do it. And if you're recovering from a virus attack, you may want to restore only the data, a much easier job if it's backed up separately.

So Where Do You Put Your Data?

Should you keep your data on a separate disk partition? There's a lot of controversy about that, and Brett Glass offers the arguments

for both sides in "To Partition or Not to Partition." For the purposes of this article, I'm going to assume that you won't, that you'll use a branch instead, and that the branch's parent directory will be called C:\DATA\ Your actual data files could be kept in directories called C:\DATA\ CLIENTS, C:\DATA\ SMITH, C:\DATA\ \JAN, or, if you like to type a lot of backslashes, C:\DATA\ CLIENTS\SMITH\ JAN.

You don't have to call your parent directory C:\DATA, of course. I call mine C:\ARTICLES, which reflects what I do for a living. *PC World* senior editor Steve Fox came up with a directory name that is absolutely brilliant (he's my boss): C:\1_DATA, thus ensuring that it's always at the top of his root directory listing.

So if it's a good idea to put your data in directories inside C:\
DATA, is it a better idea to put it in directories inside directories of C:\DATA? Or directories inside directories inside directories? Well, yes and no. A deep directory structure, with several layers of directories, lets you break things down for better organization. You can easily access all your data concerning clients, concerning a particular

C:, 6MB on D:, and 11MB on E:, you can't put 15MB in a single directory, even though you have 27MB free.

Some people use partitions to organize files—storing data on one drive and applications on another, in the manner recommended in Lincoln Spector's article. But this can be done easily with directories, so it's no reason to partition. Some people would argue that drive letters are simpler to type than directory paths, thereby making partitioning worthwhile. But if you want to type D: instead of CD \DATA, you can achieve your goal with DOS's SUBST command, which lets you assign a drive letter to a directory, without the disadvantages (or for that matter the other advantages) of partitioning.

So What's Faster?

Does partitioning your hard drive affect performance? Since everyone in our Online discussion claimed that his or her scheme was the fastest, we asked the PC World Test Center to settle the matter. They ran their usual system performance tests on the same machine with four partitioning configurations. As you can see in the Test Center Report, there were no significant differences either way. Partitioning may at one time have improved speed, but the common acceptance of SmartDrive (which was used in the tests) and other disk caches probably leveled the playing field.

A Major Hassle

All the arguments that I've given, both pro and con, are worth considering if you have a new computer or hard disk to set up. But should you change your current configuration, creating multiple drives out of a large one (or vice versa)? Think hard before you answer, because repartitioning a hard disk takes substantial time and effort. As DOS's confusing FDISK program warns you, changing the size of an existing partition destroys the data on it. You'll need to back up every-

thing on your old partition(s), run FDISK, format each of the logical drives that you've created, and restore your data, reorganizing it as you go along. This job is time-consuming, difficult, and for your data, downright dangerous.

When you're setting up a new system, however, the options are worth considering. Both choices have their advantages and disadvantages. It's difficult to go back, however, so make your decision carefully.

client, and concerning a particular client for a particular month. But typing C:\DATA\ CLIENTS\SMITH\JAN\BILLING-. DOC can be something of a drag, and selecting your way through multiple directories in a Windows dialog box isn't a whole lot of fun either.

The bottom line: Experiment. If you find that typing *.* gives you more files than you want to deal with, break your data directories down into more subdirectories. But if you're getting tired of typing backslashes, consolidate some of your directories and bring your data closer to the root.

A File by Any Other Name

Ask people what they don't like about DOS, and the eight-dot-three file name limit is bound to come up. Let's face it: It's not easy to put a concept like "My Letter to Joe About the Cost Overruns" into eight concise letters.

Nevertheless, by inventing some codes and sticking to them, you can make this ridiculous system work. If you have several files concerning cost overruns, you might start all of their names with CO, so you can easily grab all of them with CO*. *. To show that the file is a letter, you could follow that with LT. You might use the next two letters to identify who the file is for: JO. That leaves you two spaces for a date, or maybe something like V1 to show that this is the first version of your letter to Joe about the cost overruns. And you still have the extension to identify the program you created it in. The name COLTJOV1.DOC may not look communicative, but if you use your system regularly, you'll instantly know what the name means (and you'll amaze your friends with your ability to find your files).

If your application doesn't insist on using the extension for its own purposes (most word processors and many other programs don't), you have three more characters to play with. You could, for instance, use LET, REP, and BIL for letters, reports, and


bills. That makes it very easy to find all your bills with *.BIL.

The Path to a Short PATH

Okay, so you've got your nicely named files in a directory that's far away from your applications. How do you load that application if you're nowhere near it?

The traditional answer is to include the application directory in your AUTOEXEC.BAT file's PATH statement. That's because you can easily run any program whose directory is in your PATH, no matter what directory you're in. In fact, you probably already have

By putting your data in subdirectories of a single directory, you can protect it better and group it by project instead of program. all your programs' directories in your PATH; installation programs tend to put them there automatically.

But while this is convenient, it's also slow and wasteful. When you enter a command at the DOS prompt (we'll get to Windows in a moment). DOS first checks to see if it's an internal command (like DIR or CD). If it isn't, DOS looks for a COM, EXE, or BAT file in the current directory. If DOS can't find it there, it looks in the first directory in your PATH. If it's not there, DOS looks in the second, and so on. The longer the PATH, the longer you may wait. Also, the PATH statement resides in a very small piece of memory called the environment, and a large path will give you less room for the variables that DOS, batch files, and some applications like to store there.

There's another way to run an application from any directory: Use a simple batch file. For instance, here's how to load WordPerfect easily without putting C:\WP51 in your PATH. Instead, create a batch file called WP.BAT that contains the single line @C:\WP51\WP. The result is the same: Typing WP at the DOS prompt will launch the program without bouncing you out of your existing directory.

Of course, for this to work, WP.BAT must be in a directory on your PATH (you can't get away from it completely). So if you create one directory called C:\BAT and put batch files for all your applications in it, you can put that directory into your AUTOEX-EC.BAT's PATH statement and remove a lot of other directories.

What other directories belong in your PATH? The rule is simple: If a directory contains more executable files than you want to bother making batch files for, put it in your PATH. This includes C:\DOS, so you can run FORMAT, XCOPY, EDIT, and those other little programs that come with the operating system. If you collect little utilities, gather them up and put them in one directory—I call mine C:\UTIL—

and put that in the PATH as well. Utility collections such as *The Norton Utilities* and *PC Tools* belong in the PATH, because they contain multiple programs. And if you're on a network, chances are there'll be a network drive or two that must be included for reasons only Novell and your network administrator understand. So it's a rare computer indeed that needs a PATH statement longer than PATH C:\DOS; C:\BAT; C:\UTIL; C:\ PCTOOLS; Z:.

But what about your *Windows* directory? Doesn't that belong in your PATH? After all, there are a lot of little programs there.





Well, C:\WINDOWS (or wherever you keep Windows) is different because Windows is different. There's only one program in C:\WINDOWS that you're likely to run from the DOS prompt, and that's WIN.COM, the program that launches Windows. You can load that with a one-line batch file like the example just noted. You'll run the other C:\WINDOWS programs, such as Notepad and Paintbrush, only from inside Windows, and Windows always acts as if its own directory is the first one in the PATH, whether or not \WINDOWS is actually in your PATH.

Windows applications are another matter. You can't launch them from batch files, and they don't reside in the Windows directory. Does that mean you have to put them in the PATH? Not necessarily. Chances are the only ways you're going to launch a Windows application are from its icon in Program Manager or by double-clicking an associated data file in File Manager. In either case, information that tells Windows where to find the program is probably already where Windows needs it.

When you install an application, whether for DOS or Windows, it will want to change AUTOEXEC.BAT's PATH statement. Don't let it. It will warn, it will plead, it will threaten. Be firm. With the exception of Aldus programs such as PageMaker and IntelliDraw, which keep their common support files in an ALDUS directory that must be on the PATH, I know of no application that had any trouble traceable to its not being in the PATH statement. If your application is an exception, you can always add it to the PATH later.

Making Data Your Default

Most applications assume that you are going to keep your data in the program directory, but very few insist on this arrangement. If you are going to keep your data in C:\DATA subdirectories, you might want all your applications to come up in C:\DATA. With very little work, you can make this happen.

Of course, there are always a few rotten applications in the barrel. Some programs don't care what you put in the Program Item Properties box—they have their own ideas where data should go.

With most DOS applications, the directory you're in when you load the program is where it will look for data. To make C:\DATA your default, simply replace your one-line batch file with:


@C:

@CD\DATA

@PATH\PROGRAM

That is, if you have to. Several applications, including WordPerfect and 1-2-3, let you set a default data directory. In WordPerfect, press <shift><F1>LD, type C:\DATA or whatever your default data path is, and press <Enter> three times. In 1-2-3, select /Worksheet • Global • Default • Directory, enter C:\DATA or whatever, press <Enter>, and select Update • Quit.

And what about Windows programs? For once, Windows actually makes things easier. Windows 3.1 does at any rate, at least with programs that behave themselves. To make a Windows application open up in your C:\DATA directory, highlight its icon in Program Manager and press -<Enter">Alt>-<Enter>. This brings up the Program Item

Properties box, where one of the options is Working Directory. I think you can figure it out from there.

Of course, there are always a few rotten applications in the barrel. Some programs don't care what you put in the Program Item Properties box—they have their own ideas about where data should go. In most cases you can point them in the right direction with a WIN.INI command, but you'll probably have to call their technical support department to find out more about it. I had to do that with Micrografx's Windows Draw, which insisted on coming up in its own SAMPLE directory. The solution? Putting the command DRAWINGS= C:\ARTICLES in the [Windows Draw 3.0] section of my WIN.INI file.

If you launch a program by double-clicking a data file in File Manager, you don't have to care about the default working directo-

ry. But you may have to worry about file extensions, at least if you use extensions of your own devising. The solution lies in WIN.INI. For instance, if you create reports in *Excel*, and you mark them with an REP extension rather than the default XLS, load WIN.INI into Notepad (you can do this

from Program Manager or File Manager by selecting File•Run and typing WIN.INI), find the section labeled '[Extensions]', and add the line REP=C:\EXCEL\ EXCEL\EXC ^.REP.

Beyond Directories

The DOS directory system is a useful tool, letting you organize your programs and work in the logical manner of your choice. But what if you want to track files by clients and by quarters? You can't put DEC_SMITH.WK1 in both your C:\DATA\Q4 and your C:\DATA\SMITH directories. (You can put copies of a file in multiple directories, but that wastes disk space and causes revision problems.)

That's where virtual directories come in handy. A virtual directory (my term—you'll probably never see it outside this article) is a list of files, all matching a set of criteria, that you can treat like a directory. It's not an absolute necessity, but being able to pull up, launch from, or copy all your fourth quarter files—even if they're spread

across several directories—is a great convenience.

To create virtual directories, you need a DOS shell or file manager that can search for files across multiple directories, then display the files it finds in something that looks like a directory listing. You'll want the ability to browse that listing, select files, copy, move,

or delete files, and do just about anything the file manager will let you do with a regular directory listing. In our last buyers' guide to DOS Shells (September 1992), 17 out of 33 shells had this capability.

Of course, doing it and doing it well don't always go hand in hand. Both the DOS 5.0

DOSSHELL and the *Windows 3.1* File Manager can treat search results like a directory, but you're limited to searching by file name and directory tree. In other words, you can make a "directory" out of all the DEC*.* files in C:\DATA and its subdirectories, but if you want all the *recent* files, or those with a particular word in them, you'll have to spend some money.

No other program offers more or better choices than Lotus's Magellan, the most powerful file manager ever made. Its first-rate file-searching tool—it even does fuzzy searches—produces a list you can manipulate any way you want. You can save sets of search criteria by name, so that bringing up "Denise's Work in 1992" will always bring up, well, Denise's work from 1992. And when you copy files from a virtual directory, you even have the option to copy their directory structures with them, so that, for example, copies of the files that are actually in C:\DATA\CLIENTS end up in

A:\DATA\CLIENTS. Unfortunately, Magellan has a complex, nonstandard interface and hasn't been updated in nearly three years. Other file managers that come close to matching Magellan's power include File Director, IDIR+, XTree Gold, and both DOS and Windows versions of Norton Desktop and PC Tools. A discussion

of some of my favorite file organization utilities—not all of which offer virtual directories—appears at the end of this article.

So Why Wait?

Keeping an organized hard disk isn't difficult; it's really just a matter of being consistent and dividing up your work logically. True, it may take an hour or two to move the files and tell your applications about it, but you'll only have to do that once. Then you'll reap the benefits of quicker searches, easier navigation, and backups so simple you might even perform them daily.

Next, I'll show you how to keep an organized set of floppy disks. I've got one of those here somewhere . . . maybe it's under that pile.

Counterpoint: An Alternate Organization Strategy

While the organization strategy outlined in Lincoln Spector's article makes good sense for many users, others may find it less than perfect. If your data falls into many categories rather than just the few laid out in the main article, or if your projects often use multiple files created by several applica-

tions, you may find yourself bogged down by storing data files separately from the applications which created them.

Here's an example: Suppose that one of your regu-

lar projects is an internal sales report. The main report might be created in Word for Windows but will contain, say, a graphic logo file and a chart from Excel and use a dBASE data file to print mail-merged copies for distribution. Most of these files are not unique to the report itself but are reused in other documents.

If you store these accessory files separate from the programs that created them, you can easily lose track of their location or, worse yet, end up with multiple copies of the files wasting your precious hard disk space.

Most of us use just a few programs regularly and have no problem keeping track of where they're located. If you store data files in directories under their program's directo-

ry, you'll always know where files created by dBASE, Excel, or Word for Windows can be found.

As Lincoln pointed out, most programs install themselves with prebuilt data directories for their files. When you open a data file in those programs, the program automatically looks for its data files in the appropriate directory. Although you can change that default directory in most cases, why bother?

A little creative file naming, as described in the main article, makes finding your files a breeze. And if you tend to update files from one application more often than you do files from another one (for instance, I write and edit word processing files all the time and rarely change my bit maps), backing up only a single program's data files can be a big time-saver.

Even if you need multiple subdirectories for different kinds of documents, such as letters, reports, and memos, it's easier to create them under the main program directory. That way, you don't have to change defaults and write batch files to have your data directories just a few keystrokes or mouse clicks away when you open an application.

You won't need any fancy tricks, virtual directories, or shell programs to find files under this system, either. Since you're using the program's own default filing system, files will be just where both you and the program expect them to be.

LINCOLN'S FAVORITE FILE

ou can do plenty with the DOS prompt, DOSSHELL, and the Windows File Manager. But if you're willing to spend a few dollars, you can do even more. Here are a few of my favorite tools for finding the files I need, putting them in usable groups, looking at what's inside them, and shrinking them down into something that will take up less precious hard disk space.

A disclaimer: I have not used every utility program ever made, but I have looked at a great many of them. There are a lot of very good, even great, programs out there that can do many of the same things as the ones I've listed. So if *your* favorite program isn't included, it's not my fault!

For the DOS Prompt

Go

FINALE WARE Ever need to delete BAK files across your entire drive? Or find a text string somewhere in a directory branch? This public domain program by Garry J. Vass runs other programs or commands across multiple directories. For instance, if you enter the command GO DEL *.BAK, GO will run DEL *.BAK in the current directory and every directory below it. Mr. Vass has left us no address or phone number, but GO.ZIP is available on PC World Online and other online services. No registration fee.

cool collection of command-line and batch file utilities. Along with programs that help you move files, erase directories, and delete BAK files across a directory branch or disk, there's a program for changing file attributes that's considerably easier to use than DOS's ATTRIB. Best of all is a little program called D, which lets you define 100 quick access shortcuts; for instance, you can have the command 'D 12' bring your \DATA\ CLIENTS\JONES directory, while 'D 13' will go to \DATA\ PROJECTS, start WordPerfect, and load a commonly used file. SHAREWARE Few shareware programs become standards, but PKZIP has. Through one command at the DOS prompt, you can compress a file or many files, save the directory structure with the files, add files to an existing archive, and password protect the lot. You can then turn your compressed ZIP file into a self-extracting program. The ZIP 1x file format is a true standard; six other programs in these listings support it. As I write, version 2.0 with a new file format is expected; what it will do to the standard ZIP file remains to be seen. 

DEEP in the

Tax software can help the average taxpayer save a few bucks, but does it measure up to a tax accountant? A mixed bag of seven personal tax programs take on the IRS—and H&R Block.

etween the humble lifestyle of the 1040EZ and the dizzying complexity of self-employment Schedule C lie the moderate complications of the average tax return. If your tax situation is slightly knotty, but not quite gnarled, a personal tax package can help you save the cost of a human tax preparer—and may teach you some tantalizing tax tips.

A good personal tax package can deal competently with wages (or straightforward unearned income, such as unemployment compensation, pensions, and alimony) and with deductions for child care, charitable contributions, standard mileage, state and local income and property taxes, and home mortgage interest—even if they're all on one return. Should your situation include some of the gray areas of the tax laws (such as oil and gas investments or passive activities), you can still use a program to draft a return for your accountant to check. And if you've been tracking your finances with a

financial management program, software that imports data directly to your return may work wonders for you.

We looked at every program under \$100 we could find that's designed primarily to help individuals prepare their own tax returns. We hoped to learn which were most likely to save you money, and which, if any, might eatch you in a tax tornado. We asked an accountant from the firm of Peckler, Evans and Kolling to create a moderately complex test case for us based on the financial situation of a typical *PC World* reader's family (see "Our Tax Scenario"). Then our expert audited the returns generated by seven tax programs and by a local branch of H&R Block. The results of the audit and a look at how the programs compared to H&R Block are presented in "Tax Programs Versus H&R Block: The Self-Employment Difference."

With each program, we tested the "early bird" or "head start" edition—a version of the software issued in autumn for those who prefer tax returns to gift returns during the holiday season. (The final versions are sent free between January and March to registered "early bird" owners.) The preliminary packages can't generate legal returns, and their programming isn't always complete, either. And since we weren't testing the final versions, we can't draw absolute conclusions or choose a Best Buy. What we can and did find out, though, is how the programs run, how easy they are to use, and how they handle specific tax areas.

The Interactive Approach

The classic approach to preparing taxes on a computer emphasizes speed, not comfort: It goes straight to the tax forms, with text-based help reminiscent of a tax booklet. Classic programs are actually scaled-down scions of higher-priced, more comprehensive programs for tax professionals, and they may require knowledge of financial language, laws, and practices.

Interactive programs, on the other hand, gather information mainly through an on-screen interview and offer tax help (of widely varying degrees of usefulness) as you go. This technique is one of the reasons tax preparation software has become popular—such hand-holding is a sheer necessity for those of us who can't waltz across taxes without a partner to lead us.

The interview sessions are designed to usher even brain-deficient scarecrows and frightened financial lions gently down the yellow roads of taxes. (Weathered tax wizards can use them too, of course.) As you answer questions, the program determines which forms you need to complete, and may stick around to coach you. The user guides are unusually friendly, with clear and sometimes witty language and legible layouts.

All the interactive programs can import from 1-2-3, Dollars and Sense, Managing Your Money, and Quicken. (TaxCut can even import last year's return from rival TurboTax.) These packages also offer a "shoe box"—an alphabetical list of tax topics that finds homes for orphaned items. (Some users prefer to fling their raw fig-

Our Tax Scenario



In our scenario, prepared by the firm of Peckler, Evans and Kolling, Kevin Smith, an office manager, received \$57,000 in gross wages and had \$9546 withheld for federal tax and \$2160 for state tax. His wife, Kristal Jones, is an independent computer consultant who grossed \$16,400, and made three estimated payments of \$500 each for federal tax and \$75 each for state tax. Their four-year-old, Kyle, spends his days at a local child care center charging \$3200 per year.

The family received a taxable refund of \$100 from the state and bank account interest of \$640. They sold 100

shares of stock on September 9, 1991 for \$3000. They bought the stock on January 10, 1987 for \$1400.

Their mortgage interest was \$9600 and property taxes were \$1100. The deductible portions of their car registration fees were \$74 for Kevin's car and \$220 for Kristal's car. They contributed \$1100 cash to charities along with a noncash contribution of clothes, books, and toys purchased December 1, 1988 for \$1850; their estimated resale value is \$600.

Kevin's auto expenses, not reimbursed by his employer, included 2300 business miles (out of 27,000 total miles) in a car he purchased July 1, 1989. He paid \$85 in tolls and parking costs on business trips, spent \$200 to entertain clients, and laid out \$150 for unreimbursed travel costs.

Self-Employment Expenses

On February 1, 1991 Kristal bought a new IBM PC desktop system for work for \$3600, and has decided to depreciate it over five years. She bought software on the same date: One program cost \$339, and another \$150. She also spent \$150 for office supplies, \$70 for bank charges, \$200 for business insurance, \$500 for computer-related supplies, \$300 for repairs and maintenance, and \$500 in legal fees. She spent \$500 entertaining clients, \$600 for travel, and \$300 for advertising.

Kristal bought a new car on January 1, 1991 for \$15,000. She drove 12,000 business miles out of 20,000 total miles. Her gas, insurance, and repairs came to \$2000. She paid \$2400 in car-loan interest.

Kristal wants to contribute the maximum to her SEP-IRA. Kristal's office is at home. The home's total area is 1900 square feet, and Kristal's home office is 228 square feet. General repair and maintenance costs were \$700. Utilities for the entire home cost \$810 for the year (obviously nobody left lights burning) and homeowners' insurance was \$500. The home cost \$85,000, with the house valued at \$55,000 and the land at \$30,000.

ures into the shoe box even before they start the interview.)

Don't assume, however, that an interactive program will help you remember every single item. Many incidental deductions (such as union dues, investment fees, car registration fees) may only be mentioned in pop-up tax hints tied to the space where you can enter them. Just keep hitting the Help key if you want to get your money's worth.

What to Look for in a Tax Package

When you buy a personal tax program, you should get a lot more than just a tax deduction for its cost and the chance to use the Delete key instead of an eraser. The programs not only perform most calculations, but by linking related forms, they transfer calculated fields from supporting worksheets to schedules and from schedules to the 1040. (Calculations may be performed constantly as you enter new data or only upon command, or they may be generated by your spreadsheet program.) And once you've bought a tax package, you'll be able to purchase subsequent editions at a discount of about 50 percent. With that, you'll be able to import the previous year's data for savings in input time and improved tracking of those elusive carried-over deductions.

Tax Assistance

Want more for your money? You may get it. With most tax programs, you'll rarely have to crack the manual, since pulldown menus will guide you through the protocols. Among the most important options for the inexperienced tax preparer is an on-line audit function. This option alerts you to any glaring inconsistencies or omissions, and it may even compare your deductions to U.S. averages (because the IRS sure will).

Some other features that you'll want to be on the lookout for, but that are more commonly found only in the interactive programs, include an automatic final audit and a demonstration of how the program arrived at its calculations. Other typical features include summaries of tax law changes, tax tips based on your entries, hotkey access to DOS, electronic memo pads, scratch pads, and checklists that prompt you to enter stray financial scraps, and periodic reminders to save your file. You may also find a pop-up calculator and a pulldown scratch pad you can use to total groups of miscellaneous loose receipts.

Preparation and Filing

If the program makes calculations automatically, look for a calculation override option for fields where you know something that the program doesn't. A number of packages also offer what-if analyses to estimate what your taxes might be if you switched from a joint return to a pair of single ones, or even if you moved to Maui and bought a new Mustang to work as a rural mail carrier. (Such speculations appear on clearly labeled alternative forms, so you can't confuse them with real life.)

If you can buy an add-on module for your state taxes, you won't have to go through the tedium of entering all the same data twice.

If you're eligible for a refund, filing your return electronically through a transmitting service will get you a check in three weeks or less.

Although you can't substitute your printouts for the official state forms, the software companies sell plastic overlays to produce a legal photocopied state return. And if you've laboriously recorded your ongoing finances with a money management program, your drudgery will finally be rewarded when you use an import-capable program (Andrew Tobias' TaxCut, EasyTax, Personal Tax Edge, Tax Solver, and TurboTax) that zaps your figures right into your return.

If you're eligible for a refund, filing your return electronically through a transmitting service will get you a check in three weeks or less. The IRS prefers electronically filed returns because they reduce the time, cost, and error risk of manual data entry. Those companies offering electronic filing with their personal tax packages charge less than \$25 for the transmittal.

Tax Tech Support

No matter how chummy the software, the fun stops around the 15minute mark. In exchange for saving a tax preparer's fee, you'll expend hours or days of gruelling labor. Our test results brutally informed us that haste makes waste of deductions and hash of adjustments. Unless you're an expert, you should choose a program offering lavish tax help and peruse every hint you can get.

Should you need live program help at the height of the tax season, you're liable to spend additional time on hold listening to Vivaldi until the next available technician takes your call in the order in which it was received.

AM-Tax

AM-Tax is a classic program that runs rapidly along its narrow-gauge rail. Its screen format is austere and its on-line help offers only program instructions. Overall recalculation is performed on command, and you can switch between forms with a keystroke. A bottom line just above the menu shows how much you owe so far.

You start with the 1040. To verify which additional forms to use and how to complete them, you go to the forms appendix in AM-

Tax's 1040 manual (a user guide written in typical software-does prose).

The head-start version had a few apparent bugs. It inserted two irrelevant forms and wouldn't delete them. It also erased the


amount of federal tax withheld at every recalculation; we finally had to commingle the wife's estimated tax payments with her husband's withholding. (The IRS would return this return for correction.) No final audit option is included.

AM-Tax's personal-use program is available as Personal 1 with 37 IRS forms (\$40, or \$45 with early-bird module), and Personal 2 including 60 forms (\$65, or \$70 with early-bird). State modules are available for 22 states. Electronic filing is available only with the higher-priced Professional packages.

MINDOWS Created by the same company as Andrew Tobias' Managing Your Money, Andrew Tobias' TaxCut is nearly jovial enough to make this woeful work entertaining. Each chapter in its readable user guide opens with a bon mot. (To wit: "There is one difference between a tax collector and a taxidermist—a taxidermist leaves the hide.") The same attitude manifests itself on screen.

As you navigate through a full-length interview, *TaxCut* fills out your forms, displaying a wealth of helpful hints pertinent to each of the questions.

You always know where you are, and you can switch at will between the interview and the forms. Although there's a pop-up calculator, the program calculates virtually everything automatically, including the items you total on a scratch pad. Early starters can even flag estimated figures while waiting for that laggard W2.

When it comes to the self-employment forms, TaxCut admits on screen that it can't encompass every nuance. It did better than the rest, though, due to its lucid explanation of depreciation terms and its up-front confessions of its inadequacies.

The line-by-line audit is properly picky, and should you faintly recollect some audit-evading goof, you can reach it through Find Form By Tax Topic.

TaxCut supports a whopping 85 forms and schedules, with modules for 23 states. Data can be exchanged between the Macintosh edition and the DOS and Windows editions.

EasyTax


With EasyTax you get a colorful screen bedecked with menus above and below. Oddly, you need to hit the space bar for many entries, but on-screen protocol hints (e.g., "use space bar") tell you what to do.

A brief, brusque interview merely determines which forms you'll need to complete, then leaves you with miles and miles of taxes still ahead. The pertinent forms on the Forms List are marked with asterisks. Once you've opened a form, its name appears in boldface. It's easy to falsely assume later that this means you've completed it. In fact, you need to recheck all forms for completion.

You'll need the pop-up calculator often, because *EasyTax* won't perform several calculations that other programs handle automatically, such as percentage business use of certain assets.

Pop-up options include helpful hints (inadequate for a tax novice), some general tax tips tied to the forms rather than your entries, and hypertext help, offering mind-boggling IRS-authored instructions for selected spaces. The shoe box is shallow (lacking,

Tax Programs Versus H&R Block: The Self-Employment Difference



All our programs (and, of course, H&R Block) got the basics of the return right, adding up their numbers and applying the right percentages. They can all be trusted to handle straightforward wages, state and local income and property taxes, home mortgage interest, standard mileage, child care, and charitable contributions. But if you're self-employed,

you need all the extra help you can get your hands on.


The self-employed must complete at least two (possibly four) of the most fearsome IRS forms, and however scrupulous your entries, the eyes of tax folks are upon you. Unless you're self-employed as a CPA, you'll have to take your taxes to a live accountant. While H&R Block cheerfully and promptly gave us all the right answers, not one of the programs accurately handled all aspects of self-employment forms.

Landlords shouldn't fire their accountants, either. These programs don't handle property depreciation any better than they handle other varieties of depreciation.

Despite their promises of automatic recalculation, all programs demonstrated serious calculation failures in the self- employment forms. Two of them (TaxPerfect and Tax Solver) failed entirely to calculate self-employment tax (a dragon's tooth that spawns further errors). None of the programs calculated the maximum allowable SEP-IRA deduction (a percentage of income), so our test-case tax-payers would have buried \$1215 too much in an IRA, and then faced an additional tax bill and fine.

Perils of the Home Office

Dealing with the expenses involved in operating a home office also overtaxed all programs. As a result of a missing link (form 8829 to Schedule A), no program subtracted from the Schedule A home deductions the percentages we'd already deducted for the home office—a \$1000 double-dipping audit magnet. No program asked the right questions to reach a correct car expense calculation. Only two (AM-Tax and TaxCut,) could automatically calculate depreciation on the business part of the home. In fact, the usually competent TurboTax head start edition was so discombobulated, it kicked us

for instance, any version of "automobile"). A permissive on-line audit identifies potentially dangerous deductions but ignores missing or misformatted fields that the IRS will resent.

EasyTax offers 24 state tax modules and supports 66 forms. Should you fall asleep at the monitor, on April 15 a unique Tax Calendar/Alarm will tug your sleeve until you rise and file.

Personal Tax Edge


Edge is its user guide. Its index is rich, its instructions good-looking and clear. Not only is there a chart suggesting what evidence you'll need for certain entries, but a generous series of appendices in-

out of our house (form 8829) and bounced us to the cars-andcomputers worksheet (form 4562).

Depreciating business equipment was equally dire: The software won't make the hard choice when the IRS coos, "Our specials tonight are MACRS and ACRS, in half-year or mid-quarter portions." TaxCut's superb on-line translations of this terminology allowed us to depreciate a computer correctly (and even amortize the software) but stalled on the automobile. And while EasyTax and Personal Tax Edge offered extensive depreciation guidelines, their arcane IRS phrasing left us helpless.

In contrast, for just \$181, H&R Block managed the whole selfemployment morass smoothly and passed our auditor's inspection. Although slightly skimpy on documentation, the firm's final calculations were substantially correct and defensible. (H&R Block is a franchise operation, so we can't guarantee that the accountant you get will be equally good.)

We concluded that if you're self-employed and you've got any business equipment beyond a 10-cent ballpoint, you're better off paying a human tax expert to do your return.

cludes program information, lists of IRS publications (and how to get them), tax forms (and what they cover), and even a DOS guide.

Would that the program were equally supportive. While taxing your patience with the pokey pace of its calculations, its phlegmatic interview mingles the austere vocabulary of the tax forms with the redundancies of a myopic bureaucrat. (Instead of asking "Did you or your spouse receive interest?" it asks "Did you receive interest?" and then "Did your spouse...?" "Did you jointly...?") The interview often abandons you in midform, leaving you perplexed about whether to fill in all the blanks or hit the Resume Interview button. We found ourselves leaving some forms half-completed and even omitting important deduction worksheets. Tax help is ample but unhelpful, cut whole-cloth from the IRS's inimitable prose.

The program lacks the scope to catch subtle inconsistencies. When we accepted the program default of 0 for "dependents eligible for care," *PTE* just blanked subsequent child care entries rather than pointing out the four-year-old listed on the 1040. However, the line-by-line final audit is laudably nitpicky about formats, and the program offers the option of flagging estimated figures.

Tax Solver


WINDOWS For those whose finances are spreadsheet-based, *Tax Solver* offers help in the form of add-ins for *I-2-3* and *Excel*.

Start your return by choosing which forms you expect to need. Should you forget any, return to this forms menu to open them. You also have to keep them all open until the return is complete, or else transfer calculations manually from closed forms to any linked documents. Although the program officially requires only 40K more than the spreadsheet, our 4MB of RAM soon ran out. As a result, we had to close some forms, yielding dubious results.

Tax Solver presumes complete comfort in a spreadsheet environment. It's harder to learn than most programs (requiring some tricky, counterintuitive moves); you'll probably need frequent consultations with the clear, dry manual.

In two tries we experienced numerous calculation and transfer errors, possibly the result of broken forms linkages. For example,

the only Schedule C deductions that transferred from the supporting worksheets were those for mortgage interest and utilities. Failing to calculate self-employment tax was a potentially disastrous omission. A minimal audit picks out fields that differ from the national average, and what-if scenarios and calculation overrides can be evoked by changing cells on the spreadsheet.

Tax Solver's personal version supports 102 tax forms and has modules for three states.

TaxPerfect

TaxPerfect is another classic program, whizzing you through the 1040 while identifying entries that require completion of a supporting schedule or worksheet. Your bottom-line taxes appear under Current Values Display. Function keys can issue commands, switch forms, and recalculate the return. A stand-alone Depreciation Module may benefit users who know their ACRS from their MACRS.

The jargon-filled loose-leaf Operators Software Manual includes a forms appendix that tersely indicates what data goes on each form. TaxPerfect's return included several calculation or forms linkage

failures connected to self-employment, the worst being the omission of self-employment tax, which the on-line audit didn't detect.

The personal version of *TaxPerfect* supports 57 forms, but offers no state modules. Electronic filing is available only with the professional modules.



TurboTax

WINDOWS → *TurboTax* is the market leader of personal tax programs. The wit of its pop-up Tax Help comments, along with the full-length interview, make filling out the forms almost a pastime. For the tax tyro, though, it remains harder to handle than *TaxCut*.

The interview questions are generally clear (although some read like either/or when they're really yes/no). The tax help available is so comprehensive (except on the deadly topic of depreciation), it turns your *TurboTax* session into an enlightening tax law seminar.

On the downside, the program's prompts cover all but a narrow

slit in the screen, so you can't see most of the form, and you can't switch freely to the forms module for a better view (or reach the Calculation Override button). Hence, along with feeling disoriented, you risk flinging data into spaces that sound right, but aren't.

The Filebox Review (shoe box) lets you locate remembered errors by topic—but may tempt you into new goofs. A home gardener tempted by Seeds and Plants may be suddenly cultivating a phantom freesia farm—and the audit function won't care if this plunge into agribusiness contradicts earlier entries. Still, *TurboTax* was one of the most generally accurate programs in our tests.

TurboTax offers 44 state tax modules for DOS and 15 for Windows, and supports 90 forms, schedules, and worksheets. TurboTax, ChipSoft, Inc.; 619/453-8722



t's official. You're finally getting the new printer you've needed for years. No more fighting for access to the laser down the hall; from now on, your printer will be right there on your desk. So what'll it be? A laser? An ink jet? A dot matrix?

Dot matrix! Wouldn't putting a dot matrix printer on your desk be like parking a DeSoto in your driveway? Not necessarily. We took a fresh look at these machines and discovered that while all the better-hyped print-

ers were getting faster and cheaper and sharper, so were dot matrix printers, particularly 24-pin models. They're quicker than they used to be, whipping out lightning fast drafts. They're quieter, some as quiet as a laser. And they provide better

print quality than before—some even come with scalable fonts. Plus, they perform a few stunts the jet set can't, at prices it can't beat.

Consider a few numbers. First the low ones: We allowed ourselves a top price of \$750 and rounded up nearly three dozen candidates, with the Epson ActionPrinter 3250 lowballing the field at \$269 list. For those who like high numbers, how about 360-dot-per-inch (dpi) resolution, sharp enough for crisp fonts and line graphics?

In case you've forgotten, dot matrix printers can handle some jobs most lasers can't touch. They print multipart forms and accommodate an enormous variety of paper

sizes, from any kind of label to 11-by-17-inch sheets. Most dot matrixes also feature paper parking, which shunts continuous-feed paper aside while you run envelopes, letterhead, or single sheets through, saving time and paper. Swap in a module or special ribbon on some, and you can even print in color.

So why not really save and just buy a 9-pin? Some 9-pin printers perform many of the paper-handling tricks their big brothers do, but they can't give you high-quality output that comes oh-so-close to laser quality. Put to the TrueType test, the 24-pin clearly outshines the 9-pin (see output samples).

This buyers' guide covers 32 24-pin dot matrix printers, all of which list for under \$750, less than any laser. Since many people buy dot matrix printers for special purposes such as printing multipart forms or labels, we surveyed each printer's skills at a variety of paper-handling jobs. Clearly, today's dot matrix puts more options at your fingertips than linefeed and formfeed.

A printer's speed depends on two factors. The first is obvious: the number of characters per second (cps) it prints. The second is just as important: How soon after you start the print job will your PC deliver a document and be available for use? The first depends on how fast the printhead lays ink on the page; the second involves the printer buffer's size.

A Fast Crowd

Contrary to popular belief, dot matrix printers are not necessarily slow. In draft mode, many dash through plain text at better than 300 cps. Comparing cps ratings can help you determine which machine prints fastest, but it won't tell you how quickly a particular unit will crank out a document. Taking the dot matrix standard deductions into account (paper feed time, printhead movement time, and so forth), you can expect two to four pages per minute. The fastest

printers in our sample better that by 25 to 33 percent: The Star Micronics XB-2420 whips along at 375 eps, while the Epson LQ-870 churns out 413 eps and the Okidata Microline 590 a blazing 450 eps.

Letter quality printing generally takes three times as long as draft quality. With the fastest dot matrix printers, that's about 140 cps. NEC's Pinwriter P6200 produces 150 cps in "Quick Gothic letter quality," which is actually somewhere between draft and letter quality; the Epson LQ-870 nearly matches that in standard letter quality. Finally, graphics on your dot matrix take even longer than letter quality text.

Judge for yourself. To show what kind of quality you can expect from a 24-pin dot matrix printer, we ran some sample text through an HP LaserJet IIID laser printer, the new Epson FX-870 9-pin printer, and a Panasonic KX-P2124 24-pin printer.

Speed aside, if the buffer has only enough memory to hold a page or two, your PC will be useless during large print jobs as it waits to load pages into the printer. We found that virtually all 24-pin printers pack at least 8K of storage space. You need about 3K per page of text if you use a printer-resident font, more if you don't. At that rate, 8K gets gobbled up quickly. Many printers come with larger or expandable buffers. Both Brother printers, for instance, have 64K of buffer space (room for more than 20 pages) in their standard configurations. If that's not enough, two Citizen printers expand all the way to 136K, enough for 45 pages of text.

The output confirmed what we already suspected: Dot matrix printers can't duplicate laser output. However, as you can see, 24-pin printers smooth out most of the bumps and bulges that even advanced 9-pin models like the Epson generate.

Paper Handling

Think about how many types of paper you'll need to work with. At one time or another, everyone needs to print on odd-size paper or switch between letterhead and envelopes. Do you want to print multipart

forms? One printer we looked at can handle only a two-layer multipart, but others

pound out forms five deep. Such paper-handling wizardry is the reason people stand by their dot matrixes.

More important, the days of waste are

gone. With paper parking, you can print a letter or an envelope without having to discard several sheets of continuous-feed paper. The printer "parks" the continuous-feed paper behind the single sheet, allowing your envelope or letterhead to slide by. When that job is finished, you flip the continuous-feed paper back into position without a time-consuming reload.

Finally, consider the paper paths on these printers. If you can send paper past the printhead in two or three ways, you can preset each path for a different paper thickness and size. This simplifies the job of switching between envelopes or labels and standard single sheets. Several printers offer top loading only, while others load from the top, bottom, front, or rear. With the Epson ActionPrinter 3250, this flexibility allows you to turn the printer on its side for a smaller footprint.

Sharpness and Style

Even if these printers are faster than you thought, will their output leave you wondering if you should have bought a bargain laser? This question is tricky, and the answer depends on you and your work style.

Dot matrix printers with 360-dpi resolution actually deliver more dots per inch than most lasers. However, there's more to print quality than resolution. Since the dot matrix's dots are larger than a laser's and don't always line up evenly, you can't rely on

them for overheads or fancy graphics, especially those that require halftones. Very small pitches and complex fonts are also out of the dot matrix range. Where these printers are good, though, they're very good. Using basic block fonts like Helvetica in 10-or 12-pitch, they'll produce text so sharp you might even entrust your résumé to it.

Output quality is only part of the game. Look for a printer with a variety of resident typefaces. Panasonic's KX-P2124 and Star Micronics's XB-2420 Multi-Font both offer 12 resident fonts in fixed point sizes. Even better, Epson and Citizen offer printers with built-in fonts that are scalable from 8 to 32 points.

With the widespread availability of type management software, just about any printer can scale fonts. Panasonic, for instance, bundles Adobe Type Manager with its printers, providing Windows users with 13 Post-Script fonts in addition to the printer's resident typefaces. Moreover, Windows 3.1 users have access to True Type fonts, which any printer can use. Remember, however, that software-generated fonts can take as long to print as a graphics job. Resident fonts print much faster—so the more resident fonts your printer has, the faster you'll be able to print a variety of jobs.

Easier on the Ears

Noise was once the bane of anyone who worked near a dot matrix printer, but many of today's models have solved that problem. Most of the models listed here offer a quiet mode, which softens the noise level by several decibels. A 3db drop usually cuts the noise by half, but you'll also take a 50 percent drop in print speed. For both speed and quiet, Citizen, Epson, and Panasonic offer printers that run at 47db in standard mode—well below what most printers generate in quiet mode. Quiet mode cuts their noise to about 43db, barely above the 41db that laser printers produce.

Fingertip Controls

You don't have to print a single page to notice something new about these printers—just take a look at their control panels. As on your VCR, buttons and displays galore offer plenty of scope for you to express yourself. Gone are the days when your choices were limited simply to feeding

a form or a line. Indeed, many of these dot matrix machines are practically programmable. With the Citizen GSX-240, for instance, you can create printer macros right on the control panel that switch font and formatting information.

Scan the standard features on today's dot matrix printers, and you will find LCD screens that guide you through font changing, margin and form adjustments, microline feeding (up to ½ inch), and a number of other settings. Make sure that at least the essential functions are easy to adjust. Setting linefeed and formfeed and making font and pitch changes shouldn't take more than a touch or two of the controls.

Plug and Go

For most users of dot matrix printers, the best type of interface is a parallel port—it's faster than using the serial port. However, if you absolutely must use a serial port, there are plenty of printers that include both interfaces, and many others offer a serial port option.

At least one company, Epson, uses the serial interface as the home for its buffer upgrades, enabling you to squeeze the most out of available resources.

Less is more may sum up this generation of 24-pin dot matrix printers best. They offer style and flexibility and possess a bluecollar work ethic that you'll appreciate, at a price that will fit your budget. These old dogs of printing have learned a few new tricks and still do some of the old ones better than any other printer at any price.

aps lift you above normal perception and show you how to get from one place to another. Computers enable you to analyze and manipulate vast quantities of data. Put maps and computers together, and you have a supremely intuitive tool for visualizing information.

Descended from mainframe geographic information systems (GIS), today's mapping programs have shucked their command-driven heritage and five-digit price tags in favor of point-and-click operation and attractive pricing.

Software maps of regions, states, cities, and towns can bring all forms of location-dependent information to life, from the latest sales data to the address of the piano bar nearest your hotel. personnel, or even identify new markets.

Daratech, a Cambridge, Massachusetts, market research firm, projects that 1992 will show a 42 percent increase in the use of mapping software for analysis, and that sales of routing, trip planning, and presentation products will hit \$200 million—a "phenomenal" growth rate, according to Daratech. Perhaps because maps provide the world's most intuitive graphical interface, businesses seem to be warming to mapping software without the skepticism that usually greets a new application genre.


Navigating New Territory

Anyone who travels will find that a good navigation package can turn a laptop computer into a trusted tour guide. Navigation products can provide instant directions in an unfamiliar city, help plan long trips, recommend places to sleep and eat, or even help you plan a nearby jogging route.

The capabilities of navigation programs depend on the type and quantity of information they contain. Generally, there's a trade-off between breadth and depth. Products such as *PC Globe* cover the United States and a host of foreign countries but offer little local detail. True electronic travel guides, such as *Zagat-Axxis CityGuides*, provide a wealth of information on hotels, scenic attractions, and restaurants. Such

information-rich packages can eat up disk space in a hurry; Zagat-Axxis City-Guide: New York, for instance, gobbles up more than 7MB of space.

Some of the programs allow you to customize maps to include your own information on people and places, an especially practical feature for anyone who frequently visits out-of-town clients. Terry L. Brock, president of Achievement Systems in Norcross, Georgia, uses the \$169 Street Atlas USA when he visits small towns to deliver training seminars on office productivity. By typing in a phone number or ZIP code, he can zoom in on any area of the country. Running the \$495 Map-

New Yorker Challenges Laptop



Two years ago PC World lured me—an unrepentant New Yorker—to San Francisco, where I'm the acknowledged guru of all things Big Apple. Or was—until Zagat-Axxis City-Guide came along. It professes to know more about New York than I do—sacrilege! And even worse, you can take it with you on your labtop.

To me, this was a challenge: Who would you trust for advice on New York? A flesh-and-blood Manhattanite or some piece of software that probably couldn't tell a bagel from the Statue of Liberty? So I took up the challenge.

On my last trip home, I dragged along a Zagat-loaded laptop to see who was king of the New York hill.

Full Size and in Color

I felt confident. On the black-and-white screen of my laptop, the Zagat map details don't look great. The icons are tiny, and all the streets are the same color, so it's hard to tell the main thoroughfares from the minor roads (though the program does look great on a color desktop PC). When I show someone around town, I'm charming, witty, and I provide plenty of anecdotes. I'm always full-size and in color. So I declared myself the winner of Round One.

Round Two would test our navigation skills. Give Zagat an address, even a partial address, and it will immediately pan to the requested area and zoom in or out. Click on any landmark and Zagat will identify it for you. It even found obscure addresses in The Bronx and in Secaucus, New Jersey—even on Aske Street in Queens, where my friend Eliot grew up. Okay, Zagat won that round.

Round Three was mine. I asked Zagat to

locate 527 Sixth Avenue—a basic Manhattan address. It offered a choice of addresses in Staten Island or Brooklyn. Hah! That's because it calls Sixth Avenue by its official-but-never-used name—Avenue of the Americas. Ask a cab driver to take you to 527 Avenue of the Americas and you might as well have the word tourist emblazoned on your fore-head. It would be like trying to buy tickets to see the New York Metropolitans—any local would call them the Mets.

Cabbies Don't Care

I claimed Round Four as well. Using Zagat, you can mark a beginning and end point of a trip, and it will tell you the best way to drive there. You can set preferences (local roads only, major highways only, minimize route zigzag, and so on). And it does a fair job, even recognizing one-way streets and going through the park to avoid traffic lights. But it has a fatal flaw: In Manhattan, at least, people don't drive. They hop in a taxi. Just try telling a New York City cab driver the best route to the Garden—fahgeddaboutit. Now, if this were car-crazy L.A., Zagat would have


Expert on top of Street Atlas USA, he can customize the maps with the addresses of his clients and add descriptive text. "It makes business traveling enjoyable again," says Brock. Instead of lugging tour guides, address books, and maps of each area with him, he prints customized maps with his route highlighted.

Concert promoter Bob Braun uses a combination of travel products, including PC Globe, 'The Software Toolworks' World Atlas, and Automap for Windows: The Intelligent Road Atlas to plan the details of Julio Iglesias's live concert tours. With Automap, Braun even provides printed directions for the drivers of the tour's buses and trucks. Of course, not all the information he needs is available in the packaged database supplied with the programs. But thanks to Automap's built-in data management, Braun says, "I'm starting to build my own database by adding caterers, sound companies, and other information artists need on the road."

Zagat-Axxis CityGuides are perhaps the most impressive of the latest crop of travel

packages. Like several others, they offer routing: Select two points on the map, and a highlighted path to your destination appears; one-way streets are accounted for. Enter an address, and the program shows you the location at your choice of several levels of magnification. Best of all, each CityGuide includes the locations of hundreds of ho-

tels, restaurants, and attractions and enables you to search for them by proximity, price range, and a variety of additional criteria. At the moment, *Zagat-Axxis CityGuides* are available only for New York, Los Angeles, and Chicago, but the publisher has guides for other cities in the works.

Strategic Mapping's Local Expert, which should be out for the PC by the time you read this, is intended to compete with CityGuide by offering more detail, more cities, and monthly updates. The base product and travel information for one city, which uses less than 2MB of disk space,

me beat, but in New York what you really need are subway and bus routes—and you won't find them in Zagat.

I quickly conceded Round Five—locating hotels. I'm a native, so I don't know much about the city's hotels. Still, for fun I did a few tests. You can get lists of the top ten hotels, best values, best service, and so on. Or you

can pick an area, a desired feature (say, "Convenience to Convention Center" or "Power Scenes"), and a price range, and Zagat will spit out a list matching your criteria. Select a hotel from the list, press Map, and you'll switch to a map view, with the chosen hotel as a blinking icon. Double-click the icon, and a text box displays a review, com-

plete with a numerical rating of service, rooms, and dining as well as an overall rating.

At the start of the sixth and final round—restaurants—I held just a one-point lead. But I felt confident: I'd spent many years in New York eating out as often as my wallet would permit. Zagat handles restaurants essentially the same way

it does hotels. A dialog box lets you list criteria—price range, location, type of cuisine, special features ("delivers," "fireplace," "quiet conversation"), and so on. Reviews are available for every restaurant listed—all 1063 of them. I skimmed through about 25 write-ups for restaurants I knew and realized I was in trouble—the reviews were colorful, informative, and accurate in capturing each establishment's spirit. Plus, there were listings for hundreds of places I'd never been to and scores more I'd never even heard of.

I was despairing my title until I spotted Zagat's Achilles' heel. Sure, Zagat knew all the fashionable, pricey locales, but what about some of the more, well, bohemian spots? Where was Sweet Basil's (my favorite jazz hangout/bar), pizza standout V&T, the cheap and delicious Indian restaurants on East Sixth Street, or all those eccentric Village cafes?

In the end, Zagat-Axxis and I agreed to call it a tie. I must say I was impressed by the volume of Zagat's information. Maybe it's time for me to retire... and buy a color laptop.

costs \$99; information on additional cities costs about \$25 per city.

If you're worried about getting there on time, the \$299.95 Personal Travel Guide from Personal Travel Technologies lets you plan travel by bus, train, subway, streetcar, or foot. In the future, the product will even link with intelligent traffic monitoring systems to route you around traffic snarls. Customer contacts (imported as ASCII files) can be added for reference. So far, plug-in destination database modules at \$149.95 have been compiled for San Francisco, Chicago, Miami, Orlando, New Orleans, and Sacramento. They include electronic yellow pages for hotels, entertainment, and weather and information on where you'll find a fax machine or an ATM.

Quick access to this kind of information can be more than just convenient. Scott Ahlsmith, president of Trava, a travel agency in Glen Ellyn, Illinois, uses IntraCorp's Travel Partner to set his business apart from the 29,000 other U.S. travel agencies. He uses it as an "in-house concierge" to find restaurants, hotels, and other services for clients traveling to distant cities. By pointing and clicking to locations around the world, Ahlsmith views directories of local information—hotels, airlines, points of interest—complete with phone and fax numbers, costs, and amenities. He then prints the information and includes it with his client's airline ticket. "Any agent can give them a hotel or rental car. I'm offering a one-of-a-kind service," says Ahlsmith.

A Competitive Tool

Analytical mapping programs focus on navigating data rather than thoroughfares. Nearly all these programs can crunch huge databases of demographic information that is available from either the Census Bureau or third-party vendors. Combine that with data specific to your business, and you have a powerful tool for scouting new markets or

flagging problem areas.

Most of these packages offer database-like querying, delivering query results as map overlays. Say you're working with census information on family income to determine where to open a new upscale retail outlet. Typically, you'd select colors to represent ranges—say, green to show city blocks with families averaging incomes of over \$80,000, blue to show those with incomes between \$50,000 and \$80,000, and so on. You could then superimpose addresses of competitors' stores to determine the best potential locations for your new outlet.

Easy to See What's Happening Where

Ken Swisher, a manufacturer's representative for Spraying Systems, a spray nozzle manufacturer in Randolph, New Jersey, uses *MapLinx Pro for Windows* with his contact manager *ACT for Windows* to track his customers. If he's planning a sales call in Connecticut, for instance, he types the cus-

tomer's name into MapLinx. MapLinx searches in ACT for information on the customer and displays the location on the map. To make the best use of his time in the area, he draws a circle around the location to spot customers nearby. His customers are coded A, B, C, or D by their sales volumes. "If I see three 'A' customers in my circle, I'll try to see them all. If I don't see any, I may widen the circle a bit or look at the 'B' listings," explains Swisher.

Integrating data with maps is an efficient and convincing way to present information as well as analyze it. Wayne Young, a project director with the Marine Board of the National Research Council (NRC) in Washington, D.C., the executive arm of the National Academy of Sciences, uses Golden Software's MapViewer in order to quickly create detailed maps of marine accidents. He can assign different symbols to types of accidents so it's immediately obvious what kind of accidents are happening and where. He

uses these maps for in-house meetings and when he's making presentations at international conferences on marine safety. According to Young, the colorful maps make the key data "jump right off the page and beg for attention."

Mark Carpenter, a marketing analyst for Michigan Bulb, a mail-order company in Grand Rapids, has made geograph-

ic analysis an integral part of his job. "Even though we're a horticulture firm, we need to be a savvy marketing company," says Carpenter. "We need to know where to sell our



products and when to send out catalogs." He uses a \$995 package, MapInfo for Windows, to break the country into seasonal planting zones. As each zone approaches the right planting season, Michigan Bulb mails out the appropriate catalog. The maps take advantage of color and fill capabilities to help planners in Carpenter's department spot areas that are too cold, hot, or dry for their products. "I used to spend 80 to 100 hours defining mailing areas for catalogs. Using MapInfo for the first time, I planned a planting-zone mailing in 15 hours," Carpenter says. The same information used to be managed with a statistical and database program on a service bureau mainframe. He estimates that using MapInfo saves the company about \$100,000 annually.

Hal G. Reid, vice president of development research for Arby's, in Miami Beach, has a pair of urban geographers working with *Atlas GIS* to plan approximately 200 expansion sites per year for the 2600-store fast-food chain. "We used to make circles on road maps with crayons to show protected trade areas," says Reid. "You can imagine how we reacted anytime we had to make changes."

For companies willing to invest time and money, customizing the programs to suit their terminology and applications can help them gain an edge. Arby's has spent about \$50,000 customizing Atlas GIS for national market analysis studies. The company uses the system to overlay demographic data from National Decision Systems and other sources on top of competitors' locations to develop a full demographics profile of every

proposed franchise site. "The maps are like a backdrop—we can add the data we want to view and remove what we don't need," says Reid. Arby's believes the expense of developing and supporting the Atlas GIS-based mapping system is justified, even necessary, to keep up with McDonalds, which has spent millions developing its own mapping system.

CIGNA, an integrated financial services company, uses Atlas GIS to market health insurance to large corporations. It develops customized proposals that show where a customer's employees live in relation to CIGNA's network of providers—a big selling point.

These maps even break down providers by specialty to show where the OB/GYNs or pediatricians are located, says Jennifer Fisk, assistant director at CIGNA's Employee Benefits Division in Bloomfield, Connecticut. "The maps help sell our services. They are easy to understand, and they also convey lots of information," she says.

Mapping the Future

The three biggest developers of analytical mapping tools—Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI), Strategic Mapping, and MapInfo—are stepping up efforts to reach the general business user. ESRI is best known for its high-end tool *PC Arc-Info*. But new ESRI products like *ArcView*

II are easier to use, cheaper, and more flexible. Earlier versions of ArcView used only PC Arc-Info maps and data, but ArcView II will import 1-2-3, Excel, and dBASE data and make interactive changes easily.

MapInfo and Strategic Mapping are focusing on several low-end products such as Strategic's *Local Expert*. "We learned a lot from developing GIS products; now we're learning more about what business users need to do—find clients, plan trips, analyze sales territories," says David Radoff, director of product marketing and public relations with Strategic Mapping.

Daratech predicts mapping programs will find their way to more and more desktops because of falling hardware prices and the availability of ready-to-use data from commercial and government sources. If the trend continues, it won't be long before software-based maps become a common way of viewing business information. These packages already offer small businesses the same competitive advantage of, say, Arby's or McDonalds. Just define your needs and price range—chances are there's a vendor out there who's already thinking along the same lines.



Tip of the Month

WALLPAPER WITH A PURPOSE: Windows' wallpaper and screen-saver images can be fun; why not make them useful too? Instead of static 3-D chess pieces or a moving star field, display information you use every day—like the company phone directory.

To create a wallpaper phone list, just call up Paintbrush, select the text ('abc') tool, pick a spot on the canvas, type the list, and save it as a BMP file in the Windows directory. Then in Control Panel, double-click Desktop, locate the Wallpaper section, and select your BMP image in the File list box. Click OK and you're done.

If your current wallpaper image is standard VGA but you run Windows at a higher resolution, your image doesn't take up the whole screen—it's tiled on the screen several times, or it's centered and surrounded by lots of blank space. In either case, you can combine your wallpaper image with your phone list—the best of both worlds. Just open a new Paintbrush file and paste in your current wallpaper image using Edit • Paste From, then enter your phone list around or alongside the image.

To create a screen-saver image, you need a program like After Dark. With After Dark's Logo, Globe, and Slide modules, you can display the same BMP file in various ways; screen-saver fanatics can do even more by creating a graphics module.

Share Drives Between Two PCs

I own two 386s. To save money, I would like to buy an external tape backup drive and an external CD ROM drive and move them from one computer to the other. Is SCSI the best interface for this purpose?

Richard J. Farrell Agoura Hills, California

A You could install a SCSI adapter in each PC, and move a single tape drive from one to the other—but it wouldn't save you money. Internal tape drives are cheaper than externals, and those that hook to floppy controllers cost less than SCSI models. An external SCSI tape drive will likely cost significantly more than two QIC-80 standard, 250MB internal drives.

If the two computers are in different locations, moving an external CD ROM drive between them will be cheaper than buying a second drive. External CD ROM drives cost only 10 to 20 percent more than internals, and a second interface board will add another \$50 to \$150 to the price.

If the two computers are in the same location, the cheapest approach is to buy one internal tape drive and one internal CD ROM drive and link the PCs with a peer-to-peer network, like Artisoft's *Lantastie* or Microsoft's *Windows for Workgroups*. That will let you share not only the tape and CD ROM drives, but hard disks and printers as well.

Install Old Memory in New DX2?

I own a 25-MHz 386 with 16MB of RAM and am planning to upgrade to a 50-MHz 486DX2 soon. A salesperson told me that if I want to use my current SIMMs in a new system, I would have to buy a 33-MHz 486DX instead, since my 70ns SIMMs are too slow: He says 50-MHz 486DX2 systems require 60ns. Is that true?

Eddie A. Gregg, Temple Hills, Maryland

A The salesperson you spoke with apparently assumed that because the DX2s in that store required 60ns SIMMs, they all do. In reality, DX2 systems' memory-speed requirements vary from 60ns down to 80ns. Buy a system

that requires 70ns or slower and it will happily accept the RAM from your old system. A PC that demands 60ns memory may run a bit faster than one that uses 70ns chips, but system performance depends on the interaction of many different components (memory, cache, video, bus, disk), so there's no guarantee of that.

Copy, Move, and Delete by Date

Is there a DOS utility I can use to copy, move, and delete files modified before or after a particular date?

A You can use XCOPY to copy files based on when they were modified. For example, to copy files created on or after January 15, 1993, from the current directory to the directory C:\NEW, enter XCOPY *.* C:\NEW /D:01-15-93 at the DOS prompt.

For the other tasks you describe, use DOS 5.0's Shell (enter **DOSSHELL** at the DOS prompt): Select the directory containing the files you want to act on, then select *Options* • File Display Options •

Date•OK to sort the file display by date. Mark the beginning of the group of files you want to select by clicking on the first file with the mouse. Then scroll down to the last file you want to include, and <shift>click on it to select the whole group. (To use the keyboard instead of the mouse, select the first file, press <space>, scroll down to the last file, and press <shift>-<space>.) Then select File•Move, File•Copy, or File•Delete, as appropriate.

Extra-Safe Storage

Would storing my floppy disk backups in a bank safe-deposit box assure the preservation and integrity of the disk contents?

Robert B. Dawson, Greenfield, Indiana

A safe-deposit box is certainly one of the safest places you can store disks. It will protect the disks against most of the things that can damage them: heat, cold, dust, damp, and magnetic fields. The only things that could hurt them would be a disaster that destroyed the bank, or the unlikely event of someone storing a giant magnet in the next box. A good fire safe will afford the same level of protection.

However, it sounds like what you're really asking is, how can you make your backup data as safe as possible? There are a few more steps you should take to reach that goal. First, switch from floppy disks to tapes. Tapes are more rugged than disks. They're also faster to use and more convenient, so you'll be able to back up often with minimal interruption of your work. You can pick up a tape drive and a few tapes for as little as \$200. (Watch for a tape drive buyers' guide in an upcoming issue.)

If a fire or other disaster destroys your office building, your data will be lost unless you've stored copies of your backup tapes off site. (A lot of companies in California learned that lesson the hard way after the 1989 earthquake, when they couldn't get into their offices for days or weeks pending safety inspections, or at all after their offices

were condemned.) Your precautions can be as simple as having one person take a backup tape home (or to your safedeposit box) once a week. Rotate among at least three tapes, so you need never risk having all three backups in the same place.

Tapes last a couple of years given normal use, but they won't last forever—
and a worn-out tape can mean a partially or wholly unusable backup set. Mark the date of first use on the case with indelible ink, and replace old tapes regularly. New tapes are occasionally defective: If, when you format a tape, you find it has bad sectors, ask your dealer for a replacement. If that's a persistent problem, try another brand.

Switching Between Two Programs

What is the simplest DOS program we can use to switch between Quattro Pro and WordPerfect without having to exit each one every time? (We don't have Windows or OS/2 and don't want them.) Also, when I save Quattro Prographs in HP plotter format and import them into WordPerfect, they don't always print as well on our LaserJet II as they do directly from Quattro Pro. Is there some way to fix that?

A If you've got DOS 5.0, you already have a utility you can use to switch between *Quattro Pro* and *WordPerfect* without exiting: the MS-DOS Shell. Enter **DOSSHELL** at the DOS prompt to start the Shell.

First, look on the Options menu. Select Enable Task Swapper to turn the option on if there's no dot next to it. Then select View • Program List (or View • Program/File Lists).

Now create a Program List entry for WordPerfect: If Main is not the active window (if its title bar is not highlighted), Tab to it or click inside it. Select File • New • Program Item • OK. Type WordPerfect, press Tab, type the DOS command you use to start WordPerfect, press Tab, type the directory in which you store your WordPerfect files (or C:\ if

SAFER INSTALLATIONS: In the past, whenever I upgraded my software I'd install it into the directory where the old program resided. Then I received some bug-infested upgrades. Once I'd installed the new version over the old, retrieving the original turned into a nightmare. What's worse, some products translated the old version's data files into a new format, which meant there was no going back.

These days I'm more careful. I always install the new software into a new subdirectory and keep my old version intact. Once I'm sure the new one is stable, I delete the old directory. If I'm running short on disk space, I use PKZIP to compress the old program and a copy of the data files for easy retrieval.

there's no special directory), press <Tab>, press <Ctrl><Alt>-W, press <Tab>, and press <Space>. The result should look something like Figure 1. Now press <Tab> twice and <Enter> once to save the Program Item. Repeat the process to define a Program Item for Quattro Pro, making its shortcut key <Ctrl><Alt>-Q.

Now you'll have Program List entries for both programs. Highlight WordPerfect and press <Enter> to start it. Once the program has loaded, press <Ctrl><Esc> to return to the Shell. Highlight Quattro Pro and press <Enter>. Now you can switch quickly between the two programs by using the shortcut keys you defined (<Ctrl><Alt>-W and <Ctrl><Alt>-Q).

If you don't have DOS 5.0, any thirdparty task switcher will do the same thing. Following is a list of several of the most popular. In your case, I'd strongly recommend WordPerfect Office. Its shell utility makes copying data between programs particularly easy by hooking directly into WordPerfect's copy/paste buffer. (Note that Office's shell utility is also bundled with several of WordPerfect Corporation's non-word processing programs.)

As for your problems printing Quattro Pro graphs from WordPerfect, you may get better results if you save the graphs in PCX or PIC format instead of HP-GL. (The EPS format would be your best choice if you had a PostScript printer, but it won't work with your LaserJet.) You can also experiment with the Invert command (Graphics• Figure•Edit•Edit•Invert) in WordPerfect's graphics editing menu.

DOS Redirection Characters

To keep a record of when my office's shared computer is turned on, I added the commands DATE < CR.DAT >> BOOT.LOG and TIME < CR.DAT >> BOOT.LOG to AUTO-EXEC.BAT. The CR.DAT file contains only the single carriage return the DATE and TIME commands require. My problem is that other users keep deleting CR.DAT, after which these commands produce only a 'File not found' message and don't update the BOOT.LOG file. Can I send these commands a carriage return from within the batch file itself?

A Yes, but first let's give a little background to the uninitiated. The < and >> in the commands above are redirection characters. The command < filename construct tells DOS to feed the characters in the specified file to the command in the place of input that would normally come from the keyboard. The >> filename portion tells DOS to take the command's output that would normally go to the screen and append it to the specified file (the file is created if it doesn't already exist).

A third redirection symbol, >, not used by Mr. Wang's commands, tells DOS to replace, instead of add to, the specified file's contents. For example, DIR A: > C:\DIRFILE replaces the contents of C:\DIRFILE with output that DIR A: would normally display on screen. You can also use > to redirect a command's screen output to a printer, as in DIR A: > LPT1.

The fourth redirection character, the pipe (I), lets you use the output of one command as input for another. For example, TREE C:\ I MORE "pipes" the output of TREE C:\ (the directory tree structure of drive C:) to the MORE command, which displays a screenful of its input and waits for you to press a key before displaying the next screenful.

To solve your problem, use the command ECHO. (no space before the period) to generate the carriage return and I to pass the carriage return to the DATE and TIME commands. Modify the commands in AUTOEXEC.BAT to ECHO. DATE >> BOOT.LOG and ECHO. TIME >> BOOT.LOG.

This trick also works with many other commands. But if a command clears the keyboard buffer before executing, you need your old < CR.DAT trick instead. In such cases, you can ensure that CR.DAT exists by adding the command ECHO.> CR.DAT to your batch file before the first occurrence of < CR.DAT.

Drawing the Line in Excel

As a 1-2-3 user, I used right-aligned minus and equal signs to create total lines in financial reports. When I switched to Excel, I looked forward to eliminating the little spaces between the characters. But I can't get Excel to produce satisfactory lines: While the Format•Border command puts lines at the bottom of the cell, it always fills the width of the column. How can I get a solid double or single line that's slightly narrower than the cell?

A The quick-and-dirty solution is to format several right-aligned spaces as underlined and/or strikeover (use Format•Font). But the best approach I've found is to use Excel's drawing tools to place lines on the bottom edge of the cell. Start by revealing the draw toolbar. Select Options•Toolbars, select the Drawing toolbar, and click Show. Now, click the line tool, press and hold

the <alt> key, and drag along the bottom of the cell to draw a line.

For a double line, copy the first line: Press **<Ctrl>-C**, then press **<Ctrl>-V**. Place the mouse pointer on the line, and when it becomes an arrowhead, press the **<Shift>** key and drag the duplicate line down just a smidgen. Select both lines—press **<Ctrl>** and click on the other line—and join them into a single object by clicking the group button or selecting *Format* • *Group*.

Now, shorten the line slightly: Depress the **Shift>** key, and drag the selection mark on the left edge of the line slightly to the right. Make sure that the line is attached to its cell: Right-click on the line, and when a pop-up menu appears, select *Object Properties*; in the dialog box, ensure that *Move and Size* with Cells is selected. Now, when you change the width of the column, the line will adjust automatically.

That's a lot of work for just one line. But now that you have one, you can

> quickly copy it: Select it with the mouse, press <Ctrl>-C, press <Ctrl>-V, then press the <Alt> key and drag the copy to another cell.

Hidden Sums in 1-2-3

I need a formula that hides zeros for quarterly data until the quarter is complete. I'm comfortable with a formula like @IF(B1<1 #OR#B2<1# OR#B3<1, "", @SUM(B1..B3)). If any cells are empty, the formula displays nothing; when they're all full, it displays their sum. But I want the formula to work even if one of the values is supposed to be zero. How about using this formula: @IF(↑ @COUNT(B1..B3)=@ROWS(B1..B 3),@SUM(B1..B3),"")? @ROWS() yields the number of cells in the range, and @COUNT gives the number that have entries. If the numbers are the same, the formula displays the sum; otherwise it displays nothing. Of course, you could use a constant (in this case, 3) in place of the @ROWS() function, but the function allows the formula to adjust gracefully when you insert rows into the range. For a larger range, you could use something like @ROWS(B1..D4) * @COLS(B1..D4) to calculate the number of cells in the range.

Excel, Novell, Crosstabs, Kaboom!

We run Excel 4.0 on a Novell network, and until last week we thought everything was going smoothly. When one of our users tried to use the Crosstabs feature, she was greeted with an error message instead of a Crosstabs table. Crosstabs works fine on a standalone system, but we don't want to install Excel locally on all our users' machines if we can help it. Is there a fix? Will Herder, Rosemont, New Jersey

Microsoft issued a maintenance release of Excel, 4.0a, in late October to remedy several bugs, including this one. Call the company's technical support line to obtain a copy. The problem arises when Crosstabs tries to write a temporary file to the CROSSTAB directory, to which users are usually denied rights. For example, let's say you've installed Excel in the directory X:\APPS\EXCEL. Then the Crosstabs add-in will be in X:\APPS\EX-CEL\LIBRARY\CROSSTAB, Until 4.0a arrives, just assign all Excel users full rights to this directory, including Create, Erase, File Scan, Modify, Read, and Write.

In 1-2-3 release 3.x, the formula would look like @VLOOKUP(A1,<<C:\LOOKTABL,WK3>>A1.,D 10,1), assuming that the item you want to look up is in A1 and your lookup table is in the range A1..D10 in the file C:\LOOKTABL.WK3. Note that this trick will not work in 1-2-3 2.x, which can't use external cell references in functions or calculations. In Quattro Pro, the formula is @VLOOKUP(A1, [C:\LOOKTABL .WQ1]A1..D10,1); in Excel, =VLOOKUP(A1,C:\LOOK-TABL.XLS!A1..D10,1),

Printing Ranges Side by Side

Using 1-2-3 3.1, I need to print a 3-D range as a single table. When I designate A:B1..C:B5 as the print range, the values from each sheet appear below the values from the previous sheet. That is, I get A:B1..A:B5 first, then B:B1..B:B5 below it, and so on. Is there any way to print them side by side?



Speedy Calculations With Tables

I've developed a spreadsheet to handle a hockey pool in my office, but I want to find a faster way to do the calculations. I need to assign 10 points if a participant correctly predicts a team's score, 7 if he or she misses by 1, 5 if by 2, and so on. There are 24 teams, with 160 to 200 participants, and each cell contains a formula like @IF(B1=B3,10, @IF(B1=B3+1,7,@IF(B1=B3-1,7,@IF(B1=B3+2,5,@IF(B1=B3-2,5,@IF(B1= B3+3,3,@IF(B1=B3-3,3,@IF(B1=B3+ 4,1,@IF(B1=B3-4,1,0))))))), where the participant's guess is in B1 and the team score is in B3.

With over 5000 copies of this formula, the worksheet is huge and very slow. Isn't there a faster way to calculate? Eboli Febrin

You can definitely improve the formulas by using a lookup table and the @ABS function; you could also use a Data Table to avoid storing thousands of formulas. Figure 2 shows how it might work. Check out the formula in B5: @VLOOKUP(@ABS(B3-B1), B9..C14,1). B3-B1 calculates the difference between each participant's guess and the actual score; @ABS turns a negative difference into a positive number. The lookup table at B9..C14 converts the differences into points. When the




FIGURE 1: HERE'S A TRICK FOR PRINTING A 3-D RANGE as a single table with the columns arranged side by side.




FIGURE 2: INSTEAD OF DUPLICATING THE SAME @IF FORMULA, improve performance by using a lookup table.



difference is zero, the lookup function returns the 10 from the top row; when the difference is 5 or greater, it returns the zero from cell C14.

Now, with 5000 copies of this formula you will still have a sluggish worksheet, although these formulas will recalculate faster than your embedded @IF() formulas.

To further improve performance, you might want to set up each team as a one-way data table, like the one shown in E9..G19. For each participant, enter his or her guesses into F10..F19. In G9, enter the formula +B5. Select /Data • Table • 1, paint the range F9..G19, and press <Enter>. Then select B1 as the Input cell, and press <Enter> again. 1-2-3 builds the table of points shown in G10..G19 by putting each guess from column F into cell B1, recalculating G9, and entering the result into the corresponding row in column G.



Master Class: Graph Attack

This month, Master Class responds to a question from Merton Bolack of Washington, D.C., who wants to know how to display downloaded stock data in a high/low/close/open chart in 1-2-3 release 3.1.

Just to satisfy my own curiosity, I decided to check out Microsoft's stock price history. I went to the Issue/Symbol Lookup forum on CompuServe (GO SYMBOLS) and found that Microsoft's stock symbol is MSFT. Then, from the Pricing History forum

(GO PRICES), I downloaded Microsoft's weekly price data for the period from 11/16/90 to 11/16/92 into a text file I called MSFT.PRN.

Once you've downloaded the stock data, open a blank worksheet in 1-2-3 and Import the text file: With the cell pointer on A1, select /File • Import • Text, and choose MSFT.PRN. The data will appear in the spreadsheet as a series of long labels extending from A1 to A147. Each line con-

tains the date, volume, and weekly high, low, and closing prices, each separated from the next by a few spaces.

The text file includes title information at the top and a blank line between every five records. Using the command /Worksheet • Delete • Row, work your way down the sheet, deleting the superfluous rows. You'll end up with column headings in A1..A2 and data in A3..A106. To make the data more readable, I turn off the Wyslwyg interface with :Display • Mode • Text.

Next, you need to parse the single column of labels into separate columns of values and, for the prices, combine the integers and fractions into single values. Start with the cell pointer on the first data record (A3), and execute the command /Data * Parse * Format-Line * Create. The format line controls where 1-2-3 will split the labels. Then select Input-Column, highlight

A3..A107, and press <Enter>. Then choose Output-Range and select cell H4. Select Go, and 1-2-3 creates eight columns of values: date value, volume, high price integer, high price fraction, low price integer, low price fraction, closing price integer, and closing price fraction.

To combine the integer and fraction portions of the high, low, and closing prices, put the cell pointer in P4 and enter the formula +J4+K4; in Q4 enter +L4+M4; and in R4 enter +N4+04. Next, copy P4..R4 into P5..R107. Then select /Range • Value, paint P4..R107, and press <Enter> twice to convert the formulas into values. Finally, use /Worksheet • Delete • Column to delete the original data in columns I..0 (you won't need the volume data).

Use /Range • Format • Date • 4 and press <Enter> to format the date values in column H; then use /Range • Format • Fixed • 2 to format the numbers in column I, J, and K to show hundredths of a point. Finally, replace the original labels with the converted values by using /Move to move 14..K107 to A4. Then edit the column headings, delete the data parse format row, and use :Display • Mode • Graphics to turn Wysiwyg back on. The finished table of data is shown in Figure 3A.

Finally, you're ready to create the graph shown in Figure 3B. Select / Graph • Group, paint the range A1..D105, press < Enter>, and select Columnwise. Select Type • HLCO to get a high-low chart. Then, to display only every tenth label on the x-axis, select Options • Scale • Skip and enter 10. Use Titles to add appropriate titles, then Quit and View your creation.



Relocating Footnotes in WordPerfect

I need to move all the footnotes in an existing WordPerfect 5.1 document from the bottom of each page to the end of the entire document. This is very tedious to do by cutting and pasting. Isn't there an easier way?

There is a way to change footnotes to endnotes, but you won't find the answer in any WordPerfect manual. The key is to temporarily reformat your document using multiple columns. Since WordPerfect can't use footnotes in a multicolumn format, it automatically moves them to the end of the document. Here's how:

- 1. First, open the document containing the footnotes you want to change. Press <home>
Up> to move the cursor to the top of the file.
- To specify a two-column layout, press <alt>-<f7>CD<Enter>0.
- 3. Press <Home><Home><Down><Home><Cli>Clime><Up>. This ensures that the entire document reformats into two columns. The footnotes will move to the end of the document, with all other formatting and numbering intact.
- 4. Now you'll want to return the document to a single-column format. With

the cursor still at the top of the file, press <Backspace>Y twice to remove the 2-column layout codes.

Remember, if you add more footnotes later, you'll have to repeat this process to convert them into endnotes.

Converting to WordPerfect

I'm trying to edit a genealogy book written in *Professional Write*, but I use *WordPerfect 5.1* for DOS and don't have a copy of the other word processing program. Is there a secret formula for converting from one format to the other, or am I stranded?

A There's no secret, but you can't make the switch without some help. You need a file conversion utility. One of the best available is MasterSoft's Word for Word Professional 5.1. It can convert Professional Write files to Word-Perfect files, as well as translate to and from scores of other formats. For more information on this \$149 program, contact MasterSoft at 602/277-0900, 602/970-0706 (fax).

Mapping Windows Characters

I use Windows Write and have tried to paste special characters from Windows 3.1's Wingdings symbol font into

documents using the Windows Character Map application. But instead of the symbol I want, I just get a normal keyboard character. What's the story? Sally Masso El Paso, Texas

A When it comes to inserting special characters from the Character Map, some Windows word processors such as WordPerfect for Windows, Ami Professional 2.0, and Windows Write—are not very bright. The trouble is, these programs don't paste the font information along with the character. To work around this problem in Write, select Character Fonts and choose a font that matches the one you've chosen in the Character Map window. The next time you paste in a special character, it will appear correctly. Of course, you'll have to change back to your original Write font before you start typing again. Choosing matching fonts before pasting in special characters will solve the problem in other, similarly afflicted Windows word processors.

Dumping Fonts in WordPerfect for Windows

The Font button on the WordPerfect for Windows ruler displays a customized set of fonts for quick access. It's easy to add fonts to the list, but I haven't found a way to remove a font. Can this be done?


A Sure. Start by double-clicking the ruler's Font button to call up the Font dialog box. Select Assign to Ruler; then choose the font you want to remove in the Fonts on Ruler list. To remove each font from the list, select Clear. (However, you won't be able to remove Courier, which is the default font.) When you're finished removing fonts, select OK twice to return to the editing screen.

Form Fitting in WinWord

I'm having trouble with Word for Windows 2.0's table function. I've created a table that I use for filling out a preprinted form. When I type too much data into a particular cell, the row containing that cell increases in height, destroying the alignment when I print the table. How do I fix this?

A By default, Word for Windows automatically adjusts row heights in its tables to compensate for text you enter.

But that's easy enough to change.

First, load the document containing your table. Position the cursor in the first cell of a row that needs to have a fixed height, or select multiple rows that will have the same height, then select Table • Row Height. In the dialog box's Height of Row list, choose Exactly. Then, in the At: frame, type the exact height that row should have (you can enter dimensions in lines, inches, centimeters, or points). Select OK to complete the change. Repeat this process throughout the table to set up the precise measurements you need.

Cell height will now remain constant, regardless of how much text you enter. If you do type in more text than will fit, you'll have to crank down the font size to see it all.

Truer Type in Word 5.0

I use Microsoft Word 5.0 and an Epson LQ-2550 dot-matrix printer to keep a small scientific journal. Everything works fine, but the Greek delta character I need for printing equations isn't available, so I must draw it in by hand. Any suggestions?

Among the math characters missing from the extended ASCII character set, the delta is the one most often needed. Fortunately, there's a fairly cheap solution: MicroLogic Software's *TrueType for DOS*. The \$99.95 package

Creating a Printer File

Q I use Ami Pro 2.0 with Windows 3.1 and want to print my documents at another location on a friend's laser printer. Unfortunately, he doesn't have Ami Pro. Is there a way I can send him a file that enables him to print my documents exactly as I want them?

Alvin Woo, San Francisco

A You bet. Instead of sending the formatted document, you send a "print file," matched to your friend's laser printer. But first you'll need to do some setup work.

With the Windows Program Manager on screen, fire up Control Panel and double-click the Printers icon. In the dialog box, select Add, choose a printer from the list that matches your friend's printer, then select Install. (You may be prompted to insert the Windows installation disk containing the correct printer

driver.) Next, select Connect and choose FILE: in the Ports list. Select OK, Close, and exit Control Panel.

To make use of this new printer driver from within Ami Pro, load the document you want to send, select File• Printer Setup, choose the printer you just added, and click OK. Select File•Print•OK, then type in a drive, path, and file name when prompted. Ami Pro will print the docu-

Shrink Reveal Codes Window

After pressing <Alt>-<F3> to reveal WordPerfect's hidden-codes window, do you find the window takes up half your screen, leaving little room for editing? Fortunately, you can shrink the window using WordPerfect's Setup menu. Press <Shift>-<F1>DER, then specify the number of lines you want under Reveal Codes Window Size (specifying five lines, for example, will take up the bottom fourth of a normal VGA display). Press <F7> twice to record your new default and return to editing.


ment, including all fonts, graphics, and other elements formatted for your friend's printer, into the file you name. Once your friend has the resulting file, he or she can print it out at the DOS prompt by typing COPY /B d:/path/filename.ext PRN<Enter> (substituting the file's drive letter, directory, name, and extension for d, path, filename, and ext). The /B switch tells the COPY command you're copying a binary file and makes sure the entire file goes to the printer. This technique works not only with Ami Pro, but with any Windows application.

The Right Write

The default font for Windows Write is Arial 10. I'd like to use a larger size (like Arial 12), but I can't figure out how to change the default setting. Any suggestions?

Rob Weissman, Annandale, Virginia

There's no direct way to change Write's default formats (font, font size, margins, and so on), but the following work-around should do the trick quite nicely. First, start a new document in Write, type a single space, then select it. Go to the Character Fonts dialog box and change your font as desired (the sample box will show you a preview of your font choice) and click OK. While

you're at it, you can also use the Document menu to adjust the margins, headers, footers, and tab settings. When you've got things set up precisely the way you want them, save the file in your WINDOWS directory as DEFAULT-.WRI and exit Write.

Now go to File Manager to make your new file Read Only, Click once on the DEFAULTWRI file to select it, and press <Alt>-<Enter> or File • Properties. Turn on the Read Only attribute by either clicking the box next to it or by typing R, then click OK.

Next, select the Write icon in Program Manager and press <Alt>-<Enter> to open the 'Program Item Properties' dialog box. In the 'Command Line' text

Personalizing Printers

I currently use Windows 3.1 for desktop publishing and making signs. I have installed and configured three PostScript printers, two Hewlett-Packard printers, and three plotters. This makes for a lengthy and confusing printer list in the Printers section of Control Panel as well as in the Print Setup boxes of my various Windows applications. Is there any way to assign names to these devices (such as: "Printer on Bob's Desk," "Big Plotter," and so on)?

You can list most printers and plot-A ters by name by making a few changes in the WIN.INI file. First, make a backup of the WIN.INI files (found in the same directory as Windows). Then, open the file in Notepad by choosing File • Run in Program Manager and typing WIN.INI.

Find the [PrinterPorts] heading; underneath it you'll see a list of your printers. To customize a name, edit the entry (a printer name) to the left of the equal sign. For example, you might change the line 'HP LaserJet Series H=HPPCL,LPT1:,15,45' to read Mary's Old LaserJet=HPPCL,LPT1:,15,45. Next, search for the [devices] section and repeat these changes, making sure your new printer names match those you typed in the [PrinterPorts] section. Save the file, then exit, and restart Windows. The next time you access the Printers section of Control Panel (or any Print Setup dialog box in most Windows applications), you'll see your customized printer names. If you changed the name of your default printer, select the new printer name and click Set As Default Printer.

Here's another tip: Because Control Panel puts the printers in alphanumeric order, you can rearrange the order of the printers in the list by placing a number before each printer name as part of its custom designation (say, "1Big Plotter"). After you've restarted Windows, open the Printers section of Control Panel to sort the list.

Now the bad news: Although this technique works well with the Hewlett-Packard LaserJet family of printers, not all drivers are so trouble-free. Changing the names of PostScript printers can cause minor problems, for example, when you switch between portrait and landscape orientations. And you may find yourself unable to use the 'Generic/Text Only' printer driver at all. Experiment with your printers, and if you encounter difficulties, change the names of problem drivers back to the way you found them.



Sound Management

Using Windows 3.1's great sound capabilities, I have been accumulating a lot of WAV files. But the eight-character limit on DOS file names is making it hard to keep all the sounds straight. Doesn't Windows include some utility for managing these files? Sound Recorder is of no help.

Alan Reade, Seattle

A Windows does not include such a utility per se, but by manipulating the WIN.INI file, you can use Windows' Control Panel for this purpose.

Here's how. As always, make a backup copy of WIN.INI. In Program Manager or File Manager choose File Run, type WIN.INI, and click OK to open this file in Notepad. Within the [sounds] section, add a line for each sound file you'd like to identify: Type a short description, followed by an equal sign, and then the drive path and file name of your WAV file. For example, you could add a line that reads 'Anemic, tinkly chimes=C:\SOUND\CHIMES-WAV'. When you've added descriptions for as many WAV files as you want, save the file and restart Windows.

Now launch Control Panel and double-click the Sound icon. You'll see your new descriptions in the list on the left and their corresponding WAV files on the right. (It's helpful to limit your descriptions to 20 or 25 characters so they fit in the list box.)

You'll still have to use File Manager to add, delete, or rename these files and update corresponding changes in WIN.INI. For a more robust sound manager, see "Windows Toolbox" on the previous page.

A New Shell

I recently switched to Windows after working on a Macintosh. I miss the way the Finder lists files and programs. Is there any way to make Program Manager list its icons alphabetically? Lynn Scott, Salt Lake City, Utah

A What you want is File Manager rather than Program Manager. To make File Manager your shell—the default program that starts and closes with Windows—you need to edit SYS-TEM.INI, a file in the same directory as Windows. First, make a back-up copy of SYSTEM.INI. Then from Program Manager or File Manager, choose File•Run, type SYSTEM.INI, and click OK. When the file opens in Notepad, search for the line that reads 'shell=progman.exe' and edit it to read shell=winfile.exe. Save the file and restart Windows.

In File Manager, double-click the drive icon to open as many windows as you need. To create a group window like those in Program Manager, select a window and choose View • Directory Only. Then in another window choose View • By File Type and uncheck every option except Programs. To create a group that shows only documents, repeat these steps for yet another window, checking Documents instead of Programs (and checking Directories too, if you want to see folder icons to navigate to other directories).

For further customizing of other windows, choose View • Partial Details and check only the options that correspond to information you want to see. To see file names only, choose View • Name. If you get lost, you can use View • Tree Only to create a separate window that shows only a directory tree. To curb clutter, minimize the windows you don't currently need.

To save your customized windows, hold down **Shift>** as you choose File • Exit. To have File Manager always look the same as the last time you used it, choose Options and then choose Save Settings on Exit if it doesn't have a check mark in front of it.

Each window will retain the view characteristics you gave it, even if you switch to another directory by doubleclicking a folder icon or the '..' symbol or you create a new window by doubleclicking a drive icon.

This new shell may not be as pretty as Program Manager, but it will simplify things by combining program and file management.



Super Delete: Getting Rid of Linked Records in Paradox

I do much of my work in a form with two linked tables, LEADS and ACTIONS, with LEADS serving as the master table and both tables keyed on the LeadID field. *Paradox* won't delete a record in LEADS unless the linked records in ACTIONS are deleted first. Is there some way I can delete them all together?

A Yes, there is. You can write a script that deletes the proper records from both tables, then use the SETKEY command to play the script whenever you press <Delete>. First, enter the text shown in Listing 1 in an ASCII text file called DELTRAP.SC. You can do this from inside Paradox with the Scripts • Editor • New command (or Scripts • Editor • Write if you're using Paradox 3.5 or an earlier version) or with the text editor of your choice.

To make *Paradox* play this script whenever <Delete> is pressed, press <Alt>-<F10>, choose *MiniScript*, and enter SETKEY "Del" PLAY "DelTrap". To make this change permanent, add that line to your INIT.SC file.

Once you have done this, pressing <Delete> will cause *Paradox* to ask for confirmation and then to delete the master record and any related detail records that are in a linked embedded form. Note that the script will ignore records in unlinked embedded forms. If you subscribe to PC World Online, you will find DELTRAPSC in the Featured in March library.

Printing Conditional Values in Paradox 4.0

I've been using *Paradox* to print invoices for my wholesale business. While most of my customers are resellers who don't have to pay sales tax, a few of them do pay sales tax. To handle these exceptions, I've added a field for sales tax to my orders table and have been calculating the tax by hand.

I recently upgraded to *Paradox 4* and am wondering if there are any new features I can use to handle sales tax differently. What I would like is to have a field in my customer table indicate whether a customer is taxable, and then have *Paradox* automatically calculate taxes and include them in an invoice. *Don Korth, Everett, Washington*

A Paradox 4.0 has a new IIF() function with the syntax IIF(Condition, ValuelfTrue, ValuelfFalse) that you can use in a calculated field. Let's assume you have a field called Taxable in your CUSTOMER table that is left blank unless a customer pays sales tax, and that all the information for an invoice is stored in a single record of a table called ORDERS, which is linked to your CUSTOMER table via the Customer# field. To design the report, first use Field • Lookup • Link to link CUSTOMER to the report (if they are not linked already). Then choose Field • Place • Calculated, and use IIF(ISBLANK([Customer>Taxable]),0.00,[Total] • TaxRate), where TaxRate is your state's sales tax rate.

That formula won't work, of course, if your ORDERS table doesn't have a Total field. If your total is coming, via another calculated field, from a linked DETAIL table, you will want to alter the formula to read something like IIF(ISBLANK([Customer>Taxable]),0.00,Sum([Detail>Qty]*[Detail>Price],group)*TaxRate).

Simple Relations in dBASE

My community volunteer organization uses dBASE III+ to manage our member list. We use two data files, PEOPLE and SERVICES, the latter listing what type of work each member can provide. We handle everything via the Assist menu. When I update the records for an existing member, I usually find the main record in PEOPLE first, make my changes, and note the member number. Then I change the database in use to SERVICES and use Position Locate to find that member's SERVICES records. Is there an easier way to switch between the files? Fred Boyd, Los Angeles

What you've got is a fairly simple one-to-many relationship, something that the Assist menu doesn't support. If none of your members can volunteer skills as a *dBASE* programmer, you can handle the relationship through the dot prompt. At first this may seem more intimidating than using the menu system, but in the end it's easier.

Let's assume you have a field common to both PEOPLE and SERVICES



called MemberNo. From Assist, use *Organize • Index* to set up indexes for both PEO-PLE and SERVICES, using MemberNo as the index key expression. Call the indexes **PeopMem** and **ServMem**, respectively. Then, before you start editing, press **<Esc>** to go to the dot prompt and type:

SELECT 2

USE services

SET INDEX TO servmem

SELECT 1

USE people

SET INDEX TO peopmem

SET RELATION TO memberno INTO services

If these commands seem a bit much to enter every time you edit your data, you can copy them into an ASCII text file called EDITVOL.PRG. Then you'll be able to run the whole series with the single dot command DO EDITVOL. After you've run these commands—however you do it—every time you move to a different PEOPLE record, dBASE will find the first matching record in SERVICES.

Now you can start editing PEOPLE. To quickly find the member record you want

to edit, enter FIND memno, where memno is the person's membership number. Then press <F10> to display the current record for editing. To change that member's SER-VICES information, press <Ctrl>-<End> to return to the dot prompt, type SELECT 2 and press <Enter>, then press <F10> again. The record that appears will be the first for the last member you edited in PEOPLE (or the last record in SERVICES if there is no match). Remember to type SELECT 1 when you need to go back to PEOPLE.

Recovering Damaged Q&A Files

Strange files that have names like '0B2A0F20' appear inexplicably in Q&A 4.0. What's more, while we're accessing data, an orange window occasionally pops up stating that we must recover the database. Are these problems connected, and can you give us a solution?

George Murillo, Irvington, New Jersey

A It sounds like you have a damaged database file. When you work with a problem file, Q&A may be unable to delete temporary files it normally creates and erases while going about its business. There's no harm in deleting these files.

To address the source of the problem, you'll need to take Q&A's advice and repair the damaged database. First back up your data, then use File • Utilities • Recover database on the suspect file. If Q&A can't successfully recover your data, try exporting it to an ASCII file with File • Utilities • Export data and importing it back with File • Utilities • Import data. If that doesn't work, restore it from a backup.



PUBLISHING & PRESENTATIONS MAKEOVER

Bottom Line Considerations

This month we take our scalpels to *The Bottom Line*, a newsletter published by Integral Systems, a Walnut Creek, California, developer of mainframe software for human resource and financial departments. Published four times a year, *The Bottom Line* keeps more than 2000 Integral clients up-to-date on new products, services, and personnel.

Unlike most newsletters, which are text rich and graphics poor, *The Bottom Line* suffers from visual overload—photos, boxed items, and an oddly placed banner all compete for the reader's attention. Our mission: to reorganize the various graphical elements into an inviting, informative design.

Redesigning Top to Bottom

The first order of business was to get that banner back where it belongs—on top of the page. Typically the first thing that meets the readers' eye, a newsletter's banner is the key to establishing its identity. Ideally, a banner should use an attractive typeface and reinforce the publication's message. We replaced the original's hard-to-read type treatment with a *Corel Draw* graphic, creating a visual metaphor out of the title.

Since "Let's Talk" is the main story in the newsletter and has the most interesting graphic, we placed it next. We enlarged the photo to spread across three columns and cropped it, removing approximately 25 percent of the image to zoom in on more important details. We also rewrote the caption to fill out the space beneath the photo and give more information.

Moving the banner up meant relocating the article about the new CEO. But even though the story is now on the bottom of the page, its unique layout makes it more visually compelling than the original. By wrapping the text along the outline of the photograph and rewording the headline slightly, we created a friendlier, more personable introduction to Integral's new boss.

While we retained the newsletter's

four-column layout, we stripped out the distracting vertical rules, moved the columns slightly closer together, and expanded the right and left margins. We also got rid of the large initial capitals and the line spaces between paragraphs, using standard indents instead. The new page contains more text but seems less cluttered; it also provides more "thumb space" for people to hold the page while they read.

As for type, we replaced the original's mix of New Century Schoolbook (body text) and Helvetica (headlines) with a variety of Helvetica fonts—normal weight for body type, boldface for headlines, and italic for subheads and captions. Helvetica provides two big advantages: It's extremely versatile, so you can use one type family for all parts of your document, and it's available with virtually every page layout program, as well as any laser printer.

Finally, the original table of contents is far too large. Since Integral's business is software development, we used *Page-Maker*'s drawing tools to turn the TOC into a pulldown menu—further reinforcing the company's identity.

- We created the new banner using Corel Draw. First we drew two rectangles, adding different fills to create a drop-shadow and gray shading. The title is reversed type (60-point Helvetica Light Condensed), modified slightly to raise the centerlines of each character. We then drew a very thin rectangle and extended it from the baseline of the letter E—creating "the bottom line." Finally, we exported the graphic to PageMaker as an EPS file.
- Helvetica's clean sans serif look makes the dateline readable even in 6-point type and full capitals.
- We set the headline in 29-point Helvetica Bold and kerned it manually. The subhead is 11-point Helvetica Italic.
- We scanned a photograph and used PageMaker's cropping tools to reduce its top and right margins. We increased its size by about 40 percent, maintaining its height-to-width ratio. We then created a transparent box with 1-point lines, and laid it over the picture to provide a border.
- Using 9-point Helvetica type with 11-point line spacing fits more text on the page without crowding it.
- 6 We scanned this photo as a 256shade TIFF file, loaded it into a paint
 program, and painted the background
 white. After importing it into the page
 layout, we drew two rules (one on
 either side of the image) and flowed
 the text around the picture using
 PageMaker's text-wrap tools.
- 7 Two rectangles drawn in Page-Maker make the pulldown menu; the smaller black one contains reversed 12-point Helvetica Bold for the title. TOC entries are 8-point Helvetica.

Remote Windows Access

Of I'd like to remotely use a computer running Windows. Is there any software that will allow me to do this? Steven Seyster, Elmont, New York

Most remote communications packages claim to support remote Windows access, but all have limitations. Running a computer remotely is inherently slow (a 9600-bps modem is mandatory on both ends). Some packages won't run Windows in enhanced mode, many do not support a remote mouse, and their graphic requirements can be fussy. (You may get a blank screen dialing into a VGA PC with an EGA-equipped one, for instance.)

Faster Procomm Dialing

I'm always calling private BBS's to upload and download files and on-line services such as CompuServe to get E-mail. Because I charge many calls to my credit card, I have to punch in my long-distance access number, the number I want to call, and my credit card number—almost 40 digits.

To save time when dialing, I use a simple AT command to tell my modem to decrease the time it waits between sending each digit to the phone line. From Procomm 2.0's terminal mode, type AT S11=55 and press <Enter>. (Because some phone carriers won't accept that fast a setting, you'll need to experiment to find the one that works best. The default is typically S11=70.) Once you determine the speed your carrier will accept, add the S11 parameter to Procomm's initialization string. Type <alt>-S from Procomm's terminal mode, then MMA to get to the initialization string setup area. (If you're using Procomm 1.1, you'll need to type MGA.) Just place your new S11 parameter before the '^M' that ends the string, then press <Enter><Esc><Esc>Y to make the changes permanent.

Easy On-Line Session Tracking

Q I'm looking for a program, preferably shareware, to keep track of the amount of time I spend on line.

Most communications programs include a feature that keeps a record of your calls and the time you spend on line, although you usually have to do some hunting through the documentation to find it. In Procomm Plus, the session log is in a file called PCPLUS-.FON, which you can examine with the view command <Alt>-V. In Qmodem, session logging is activated with <alt>-0. If your communications program lacks this feature, download COMLOG-10.ZIP from the Featured in March section of PC World Online. This free TSR (terminate and stay resident) program will log your time when you load it with your communications software.

Sorting Shareware From Freeware

What is the difference between shareware, freeware, public domain software, and pirate software? Amol Parolekar, Troy, Michigan

A Shareware is software that has been uploaded to BBS's and on-line services with a price tag attached. You can use it, but you're morally obligated to pay the author a small fee. Look for shareware that is registered with the Association of Shareware Professionals. That means the author has agreed to support the product and not vanish into the bitstream with your money.

Freeware originally meant the same thing as shareware. The term was trademarked by one of shareware's pioneers, Andrew Fluegelman, and fell out of popularity. It has lately re-emerged to mean software that is free to use, though its author retains the copyright.

Public domain software is also free. The author may be lax about retaining its copyright or may even encourage others to rewrite (and distribute) it.

Pirate software is commercial stuff that has been uploaded illegally to BBS's and on-line services.

What Happened to Videotex?



STAR-DOT-STAR TIPS

Disconnecting Your Extension

Combining the technique illustrated in Mr. David Graczyk's "Fantastic FOR" [Star-Dot-Star; September 1992] with a looping batch file, I've created PARSE-.BAT [Listing 1], which separates a file name from its extension. I originally created this batch file so I could open AutoCAD files from Tandy's Deskmate desktop. Deskmate normally passes complete file names to applications, but AutoCAD refuses to open a drawing unless it is given a file name with no extension. I just type Parse filename.ext at the DOS prompt, and the batch file strips the extension from the file name so AutoCAD will load it. You can also use this utility to create backup copies of files for programs that don't create backups automatically.

Editor's note: Mr. Bartlett's batch file makes up for a serious omission in DOS's batch language: its inability to parse file names. But loading *Auto-CAD* files is just one of dozens of useful functions PARSE.BAT can take care of for you.

Following Bartlett's suggestion, I've written a small batch file called BAK-BAT (Listing 2) that uses PARSE.BAT to strip a file name from its extension, create a copy of the original file with a BAK extension, and then launch DOS's EDIT utility. I've also modified PARSE.BAT to clean up after itself by deleting all environment variables except FNAME and EXT, and to leave an exact copy of the extension in the EXT variable for later use. This lets you perform operations such as testing a file's extension to see if it matches a predetermined pattern.

This batch file is worth studying; it illustrates important batch programming techniques. The batch file sets

the variable BNAME equal to %0's value (the batch file's name), allowing the batch file to call itself reliably. (If a batch file doesn't use SHIFT, it can use %0 whenever it needs to refer to itself and needn't set a variable.) It also uses a variable (TARGET) to hold the name of another variable-a useful trick that allows it to perform an indirect assignment. Finally, it uses the FOR statement with the / character in two ways: In the first FOR, it removes the first character from an environment variable and leaves the rest; in the second, it uses the first character and discards the rest.

If you have trouble following the flow of execution within this batch file, bear in mind that invoking one batch file from another terminates the first batch file unless the CALL statement is used. Thus the second FOR statement executes only one time; when it invokes a

batch file without a CALL, the FOR loop is terminated.

An Audible Pause

I use DOS's PAUSE command to halt batch files temporarily after they display a screen of data. Since I'm usually busy while the batch files run, I'm not always looking at the screen when the program pauses. That's why I've altered COMMAND. COM to make the computer beep whenever it runs PAUSE.

Here's how to make the change to DOS 5.0. Copy COMMAND-.COM to a new file (call it NEWCMD-.COM); then use a hexadecimal editor such as *The Norton Utilities*' DISKEDIT' (DE) to edit the file. Search the

file for the *second* occurrence of 'to continue' (in *Norton*'s DISKEDIT, the command to search for a string the first time is **<Ctrl>\$**; to find the second occurrence, type **<Ctrl>\$**6). At the end of the message, which reads 'Press any key to continue...', there will be a hex 0D (a carriage return) and a hex 0A (a linefeed). Replace both with the character hex 07 (bell). Then exit the editor, telling it to write the changes to disk.

You should then have a new version of the command interpreter that beeps when it prompts you to press a key before continuing. (To make sure you did it right, try executing NEW-CMD.COM and typing PAUSE at the prompt. If it works, you'll hear two beeps.) You may then replace your original COMMAND.COM with the new one. This command also causes the DIR /P command to beep when it pauses between directory pages.

Editor's note: This trick ensures you'll know when your computer pauses for input. But since you might not always want it to be this noisy, make sure you save a copy of your original COMMAND.COM (perhaps in C:\DOS\OLDCMD.COM). That way, it will be

easy to revert to a silent prompt.

If you don't have a hex editor, use DOS's DEBUG utility to edit NEW-CMD.COM. At the DOS prompt, type DEBUG NEWCMD.COM and press <Enter>. Next type SO FFFF 20 2E 20 2E 20 2E and press <Enter> to search for the '...' string that ends the 'to continue' message. DEBUG will display two lines of hex addresses. Type E followed by the last four characters of the hex addresses and press <Enter> to edit the message. Press 7<Space>7<Enter> to change the first space-and-period pair to bell characters. Then press W<Enter> and Q<Enter> to save the changes and exit DEBUG.

Preventing Voyeurism Under Windows

If you use Windows 3.1 and share your computer with others—or suspect that somebody may be snooping around your hard disk when you're out of the office—there's an easy way to keep your personal files safe from prying eyes: Use extended-ASCII characters in your directory and file names. Most Windows 3.1 programs can't access directories or files whose names employ characters with codes above 127.

To try this, create a small text file: At the DOS prompt, type COPYCON F, hold down <Alt> and type 255 using the numeric keypad, then press <Enter>. DOS will return the prompt to the next line. Enter a line of text such as This file cannot be read in Windows. Press <Ctrl>Z and then <Enter> to save the file and return to the DOS prompt. When you call up a directory listing, the file will look as if its name is F—only you will know about the invisible character at the end.

You can access this file from most DOS applications, but when you try to open the file from Windows, you'll get a message saying that the document does not exist or the path is invalid. To lock out several sensitive files in one shot, store them in a directory using extended-ASCII code 255 in the directory name. Windows' File Manager will not let you enter the directory, though files inside it will show up when you use its File•Search command. Later, when you want to open the files inside Windows, you'll have to rename them using DOS's REN command.

Editor's note: While this trick will prevent people from peeking at your files via most Windows applications, there are still a few nonconformist programs (mostly obsolete) that don't use Windows' common dialog boxes and can therefore access the files. Also bear in mind that Windows does recognize a handful of extended-ASCII characters, such as character code 129, which produces a U with an umlaut. There are also a few DOS programs that won't read file names using character codes above 127-in particular, WordPerfect 5.1. In such cases you'll need to rename the files using normal ASCII characters.

Right Face

Power Tip No. 256 in *Star-Dot-Star*, August 1992, contains a *1-2-3* macro that right-aligns labels in a cell. That macro can cause problems if the label text doesn't fit inside the field. Listing 3 is a solution that works even if the column width is increased or decreased, as long as the column width is greater than or equal to the width of its contents. (If the contents won't fit in the column, the macro leaves the contents left-justi-

fied in the cell.) My version adds two lines, one to test for decreased column width and one that looks for columns that are too small (to prevent replacing the contents with ERR). To run the macro, put the cursor on the cell holding the label you want right-aligned and press <Alt>-A.



Editor's note: I improved upon this macro still more, adding a line at the beginning that causes the macro to quit with a beep if the cell does not contain a label. The second line of the macro loops until it has deleted all leading spaces, and the third exits if the contents are too wide for the column. As always, enter this macro in an outof-the-way place in your worksheet. Every label that begins with a slash (/ or \) must be preceded by an apostrophe; in other words, type in the first cell entry as '\A. Once you've entered the macro, use /Range•Name•Labels•Right to assign the names in the left-hand column to the cells to their right. After this is done, pressing <Alt>-A will run the macro. This macro will be available as FLUSHRT.WK1 in PC World Online's Featured in March folder.

Instant Accents

After reading Maria Zambrano's question regarding foreign characters in Windows [Windows Workshop, July 1992], I wanted to share a Microsoft Word for Windows macro I rely on to create accented characters. My

macro, which I call InsertAccent [Listing 4], allows you to enter foreign characters easily by typing the letter and pressing a second key that adds the appropriate diacritical mark. For example, to type the character è you'd type e and follow it with the key that invokes the macro. In my organization we create documents in both English and Spanish. While I use the macro mainly to create Spanish characters, you can easily customize the code to provide shortcuts for other foreign language symbols.

Editor's note: This macro has other great uses—it can convert an R into a registered trademark symbol and a plus sign (+) into a plus-or-minus sign (\pm). Since many foreign languages require grave accents (for example, \grave{a}) as well as acute accents (\acute{a}), I've added a list of the appropriate ASCII codes for characters using grave accents (Figure 1), so you can create a macro to insert those as well. (To figure out codes for other accents such as umlauts and circumflexes, fire up *Windows*' Character Map accessory and move the mouse over the grid until you find

the character you're looking for. The appropriate key code should appear in the lower right corner of the window.)

To create the macros, select Tools . Macro, type InsertAcute, and click Edit. Inside the macro editor, type the macro as shown in Listing 4, and check it carefully. Then highlight all the macro lines except for Sub MAIN and End Sub, press < Ctrl>-C to copy the macro lines to the Clipboard, and press <Ctrl>-<F4> to exit. Now select Tools • Macro again, type InsertGrave, and click Edit. Press <Ctrl>-V to paste in the first macro's lines, substitute the values shown in Figure 1 for those characters using grave accents, and press <Ctrl>-<F4>. Once you've created both macros, the next step is to assign the hot keys. Select Tools Options, and press K to get to the Keyboard Options dialog box. Highlight the macro on the Macros list, and use the Shortcut key box to assign it a key combo (I use <Ctrl>-<F11> for acute and <Ctrl>-<F12> for grave). Next time you need an acute a, just type a and press < Ctrl>-<F11>. Remember to save glossary changes when you exit WinWord.

Hot Products Challenge the Status Quo

ity the poor office manager who must decide among three preeminent Windows graphical word processors—Lotus's Ami Professional, Microsoft Word for Windows, and WordPerfect for Windows. The Lotus entry makes the decision particularly difficult: While it doesn't have the market share of the other two, it's a clear title contender and the package against which all word processors should be judged.

The latest Ami Pro is not the only fresh release that will force new decisions on Windows users. Two recent Macintosh emigrants—QuarkXpress 3.1 for Windows (desktop publishing) and MicroPhone Pro for Windows (telecommunications)—are also worthy challengers in their fields, while Metz Task Manager offers creative shortcuts for handling your Windows desktop.

The hardware community isn't making purchasing choices easy, either. This month I'm tempted by a *Windows*-ready notebook—Texas Instruments' TravelMate 4000 WinSX—and will sample some high-speed file transfers from a BBS with the tiny Practical Peripherals PM14400FX fax-modem.

QuarkXPress 3.1 for Windows

I kicked things off by trying to open a file created on the Macintosh version of XPress. Surprise! A dialog box immediately listed the necessary fonts my PC lacked. Other desktop publishing packages would have left me searching for the font mismatches or simply scratching my head, but here they were, listed by name and point size. I gave XPress the go-ahead to substitute installed fonts, and the document appeared on screen. Quark has achieved cross-platform file compatibility, at least in one direction. (Quark promises XPress 3.2 for the Mac, slated to ship later this year, will be able to read XPress for

Windows files. Current Windows and Mac versions are both \$895.)

Desktop publishing has become a skilled profession, and its software tools cannot be glibly described as easy to use. But I surely wish I'd had this power in the days I was a front-page editor for a daily newspaper. I'd have put the effort into learning *QuarkXPress* from bottom to top.


Time will tell whether QuarkXPress for Windows truly answers desktop publishers' need for cross-platform compatibility and whether it meets the toprated quality of the Mac version. I'll bet it does, and that makes it a Foulks' Favorite. I've already seen power in it that no other product has.

Ami Pro 3.0

In the box you'll find a \$9.95 coupon to order the *Macro Developer's Kit* by mail. Use it if you want to grasp the full scope of this new word processing powerhouse. Don't just take my word for it—read the GOODIES.SAM samples file that installs with *Ami Pro.* See how a macro looks up a geographic location by its area code, even displaying time zones. Or find and replace a given text string across a multiple document list—and then do an updated printout of the list while you're out to lunch, by using the Set Time button.

The MDK provides a thick macro language manual with examples of how all the functions and control statements operate, plus more sample macros including one that writes a story based on your characters and plot twists.

Even if you find macros foreign, Ami Pro 3.0 has other features to improve your workday. For example, whenever your mouse pointer is over an on-screen



button, you can pop up a small help line by clicking the right mouse button. If you don't want your screen cluttered with icons and buttons, the Clean Screen mode shows just the cursor, your text, and one small button to restore the stan-

dard screen. Like all new Lotus Windows products, Ami Pro has Smart-Icons—buttons that you can redesign and reconfigure as you see fit.

Yet, it is traumatic to switch word processors, no matter the amount (lots!) of context-sensitive help available. Users moving to Windows from DOS can fearlessly choose the latest Ami Proversion. Windows veterans will need to consider seriously whether Ami Pro's cosmetic advantages can significantly improve the printed output (and I am considering it). The suggested retail price is \$495, but look for street prices as low as \$95 for a competitive upgrade. (You can download a demo version from PC World Online's Test Drive folder.)

MicroPhone Pro for Windows

MicroPhone, in various versions, has a solid reputation among Macintosh users. In this \$195 initial version for Windows, Software Ventures Corpora-

tion has integrated WinFax Lite from Delrina Technologies to produce an all-in-one telecomm/fax package. That's an attractive approach, but unfortunately, the fax program is not particularly impressive. WinFax Lite installs itself on your printer list, and you can access it most directly by using an application's commands for changing the default printer instead of using Micro-Phone's separate Fax command menu.

For something truly significant, though,

look no further than MicroPhone Pro's tremendous scripting capabilities (more than 200 commands and functions). Scripts are a series of commands that automate the process of logging onto various telecomm services, whether CompuServe or a neighborhood BBS. "Even novices can script," brag the product's ads, and the Watch Me mode proves it. I developed a script to log on to my own BBS in just a few minutes.

A surprising inclusion is support for multi-

media, including playback of CD and MIDI files. You can even use scripts to control a multimedia presentation—novel, but again, of limited interest. Veteran telecommunicators will search in vain, however, for file transfer protocols other than XMO-DEM, YMODEM, and ZMODEM.

Practical Peripherals PM14400FX Modem

Hayes subsidiary Practical Peripherals calls this tiny 4.2-ounce fax-modem a pocket unit, though it won't do anything until you plug in the AC adapter or install a battery pack, both of which are also pocket size but not likely to share the same pocket. Facing reality, the firm ships all the modem's hardware items in a dainty 8-by-5-by-2-inch leather pouch.

Aside from truth-in-advertising questions, this is the real bargain product in this month's collection. It transmits at up to 57,600 bps for data and 14,400 bps for fax, is indeed portable, and lists for \$499. Its street price—around \$320—will likely threaten some of its larger competitors.

Its outstanding feature is the unique help facility in ROM. Keying AT\$H in command mode brings you six ROM-based help screens. They display modem parameters, options for every parameter, and a list of the various AT commands used with the modem. In essence, the screens are an online reference manual, always available—even in a hotel room. No need to carry the manual in your pocket... or the pouch.

Modem users trying to find the 14,400bps option on their modem parameters' setup screen will discover it's not included in the Smith-Micro Quick Link II software bundled with this unit. Not to worry-most telecommunications packages lack that parameter. You solve the menu omission by setting speed at a higher pace-say, 19.2 kbps-and allowing the modem to transparently negotiate its own speed, once on line. My first 14.4-kbps log-on was with Practical Peripherals' own BBS. I sampled the fax and data capabilities of the PM14400FX with QLII, MicroPhone Pro, WinFax Pro, and Procomm Plus and found no unpleasant surprises. It is fast-'nuff said!

Texas Instruments TravelMate 4000 WinSX

trackball in editing portions of this column, I gave up and decided to rearrange the default Windows desktop more to my liking. A half hour later, I gave up on that, too, and shut down the notebook to install a traditional mouse so I could untangle the disarray I'd made with the intractable trackball. [Trackball appreciation seems to be highly individual. The TravelPoint trackball is our editor-in-chief's favorite, -Ed.1

There is indeed 486SX-25 power here, in 5.5 pounds on an 8.5-by-11-inch footprint, but not without trade-offs. Hard-core touchtypists may not appreciate the small cursorcontrol and function keys. Users looking for a small desktop unit should note that the side-mounted ports produce a sprawl of spaghetti when mouse, external modem, printer, and external monitor are attached.

On the plus side, the \$2799 unit has some of the best power-saving options on the market. After charging the battery overnight, I spent more than 2 hours transferring some standard work files to it, then nearly another hour arranging screens and icons before the low-battery light began blinking.

Usage with less hard disk activity would easily have topped 4 hours.

With Windows 3.1 installed, the WinSX is a fine machine. But what's the point of Windows on a notebook computer without an adequate pointing device? Someone needs to find an answer to this question.

Metz Task Manager 2.0

There's not enough space here to describe fully the functionality this program-launching and file management utility adds to Windows. Even with Norton Desktop for Windows in use, I call upon the Metz Quick File Find and Quick Text Search components frequently. Task Manager itself is a mere <Ctrl>-<Esc> away, popping up a neatly framed box of icons to launch your customized tasks or switch to running ones.

With version 2.0, the \$49.95 Meta has become smarter, easier to install, and easier to uninstall (part of a growing trend, I hope). Although the program is now distributed through software discounters, uncrippled evaluation copies remain available from online services, including PC World Online (in

the Featured in March folder), as well as many BBS's. It is definitely worth your time for a free look at how to handle file-management and file-access chores without resorting to the DOS prompt.

Adventure on the High Seas and Beyond

f you can handle the concept of a three-masted schooner that travels between the stars and fights with catapults, you'll find much to like in SpellJammer: Pirates of Realmspace, an amusing hybrid of sailing and outer space adventure.

Your space-traveling sailing ship lets you navigate the eight planets of the Realmspace system (originally found in the popular Forgotten Realms series), trading, taking on occasional diplomatic missions, and politicking in port. On your way from planet to planet, you'll encounter space pirates, rival merchant ships, and even a few monsters. As a merchant-adventurer, your ability to manage your 12-person crew will advance your fortunes as much as your mercantile skills or fighting ability. Even in outer space it seems a good manager is hard to find.

A well-designed, mouse-based interface makes playing easy, and the graphics are quite good. Whether you're blasting a space pirate whose ship looks like a short-tempered wasp, duking it out hand-to-hand with marauders intent on scuttling your schooner, or buying a round of drinks in a bar, *SpellJammer*'s design helps preserve the illusion that you're really there. The sound effects of this charmingly schizoid game are firstrate, but you'd better know what interrupt and DMA channel your soundboard uses: If you guess wrong, *Spell-Jammer* may not load at all.

Wild Women of Wongo

From the artful start-up sequence, in which a scratchy film counts down 5...4...3, to the eagle-emblazoned Access logo that echoes the opening of Republic Pictures' classic adventure serials, there's little doubt what inspired Amazon. This light-hearted role-playing game is even divided into serial "chapters," complete with opening synopses

to bring you up to speed. The chapters make playing a snap, since even a part-time gamester should be able to get through one in an evening,

The premise is standard serial stuff: As a young scientist, you must make your way into the remote upper Amazon to save your naturalist brother from a horrible fate. To get there, you track down keys, books, safe com-

binations, recorded messages, and the usual assortment of treasure-hunt items, evading unwelcome attention from trigger-happy security guards and officious secretaries in the process.

If the plot and puzzle aspects of Amazon are a bit familiar, the images that propel the tale are anything but. The opening credit sequence looks like a wide-screen color movie panning across the jungle. And while most subsequent scenes play out via conventional computer animation, a number of characters are rendered with near-photographic clarity, and move with cinematic smoothness. They even have synchronized dialog. In fact, it wouldn't surprise me to discover that sequences for this game were filmed with live actors and then transferred to disk-at less than full-motion frame rate, of course, but still with stunning effect.

Unfortunately, the playing interface isn't quite as slick as the cinematic animation. You have to use both arrow keys and the mouse to walk, climb, talk, and manipulate objects, which can get tedious very quickly. For instance, even if you've already finished exploring a room, if you walk past it you automatically enter again. Moreover, many of the action controls seem sticky: Time and again the game required that I hit



keys repeatedly to go through a door I had just opened or to make my way around an object.

There's a built-in hint system that you can use if you like. Unfortunately, the hint system keeps count of how many times you use it. After a certain With SpellJammer, there's commerce between space wars. Even in outer space, money talks.

limit, all it offers are egregious insults about how stupid you are—less than charming.

Fortunately, there's enough charm in the rest of Amazon to make up for the ill-tempered hint system. To take just one example, there's an outrageously silly home movie called "Wild Women of Wongo" that made me roar with laughter for a full minute! I've yet to make it all the way to the Amazon, but I have a feeling the fun is just starting.

Not for Gun-Control Advocates

Firing up Wolfenstein 3D is a bit like turning into Steve McQueen and falling head-first into The Great Escape: You become B.J. Blazkowicz, a tough-asnails military espionage operative, trapped behind the Nazi lines in Castle Wolfenstein. And in the grand tradition, you need to shoot your way out.

The game is a World War II remake

of Dungeons and Dragons. You explore rooms, blast Nazis, search for secret passages, and collect weaponry and treasure on your way to the exit. What makes *Wolfenstein 3D* special is its incredibly responsive interface. You never see B.J.; you *are* B.J., and you view everything through his eyes. Perspective is perfect. As you maneuver

around a potted palm to get a better shot at an SS bad guy, the entire scene shifts and foreshortens instantaneously. Sound effects are great too.

The controls are so easy to use that once you get the hang of them, you'll feel like you're flying through the castle corridors. To pick up treasure or a machine gun, simply walk over it. It goes into your stash automatically. Installation is utterly painless, too. Unlike games that make you enter hardware interrupts and

DMA channels for your soundboard, this software simply checks out your system and installs itself correctly.

Wolfenstein 3D is easy to play but hard to win. There are six episodes, with ten floors each—and as you complete each floor you're rated against a par score and a clock. Also, there are some nasty Nazis waiting to

snuff you, and some of the secret rooms are almost impossible to find. But hey, if winning World War II single-handedly were easy, everyone would do it! Incidentally, if you like to try before you buy, you'll be pleased to know that Episode 1 is available as shareware on many BBS's; you'll have to pay for episodes two through six. Wolfenstein 3D is big fun—though probably not a great choice for gun-control advocates.

Pick a Boot, Any Boot

omething's always forcing me to mess around with my CON-FIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC-BAT files. Maybe I use Windows one day and plain old DOS the next, or I have to load a particularly monstrous DOS program that demands every speck of conventional memory. I hate fiddling with these system configuration files because I usually honk something up. And let's face it—neither REMing out lines nor rebooting from floppies is an elegant solution.

Fortunately, I've found a few neat tricks to load different AUTOEXECs and CONFIGs automatically and safely; they effectively give me an almost unlimited number of setting combinations. Now I can back up and defrag my hard disk in a squeaky clean environment without worrying that some disk cache is loaded and will scramble my FAT. (Who was it that said "The backup ain't over till the FAT table sings"?)

Do It Yourself

The cheapest solution (it's free) is a batch file trick I learned from fellow PC World Contributing Editor Michael Goodwin. You'll need a boot utility to reset your computer. Various boot utilities, most of them free, are available on BBSs; there's a free one on PC World Online—WARMBOOT.ZIP. Check out "Batching the Warm Boot," User Group Tips, (July 1992, page 259) to see how to make one yourself.

You use the program in a batch file I've cleverly named REBOOT.BAT. Create it using your favorite text editor.

@ECHO OFF

COPY C:\CONFIG.%1 C:\CONFIG.SYS
COPY C:\AUTOEXEC.%1 C:\AUTOEXEC.BAT
WARMROOT

(If your boot utility isn't called WARMBOOT, you'll want to change the last line accordingly.)

Once this file is saved in a direc-

tory in your AUTOEXEC.BAT's PATH, create a matched pair of AUTOEXECs and CONFIGS—with appropriate extensions—for every boot variation you want. For instance, AUTO-EXEC.STD and CONFIG.STD might load your everyday system full of TSRs, disk caches, and network drivers; while the WIN extension could load Windows, VAN might boot DOS with no TSRs at all.

Now, to load a plain vanilla system, you type REBOOT VAN (so that's where the extension came from) and press <Enter>. The REBOOT batch file then replaces AUTOEXEC.BAT and

replaces AUTOEXEC.BAT and CON-FIG.SYS with the VAN files and reboots the system. Just like magic.

When it's time to return to normal, just type REBOOT STD and you're back where you started. If you want to get fancy, you can create a set that has a command line to run your hard disk defragger, REName everything back to STD and WARMBOOT again.

There's a fringe benefit: With this system, you don't have to think twice about letting an Install program rewrite your precious CONFIG or AUTOEX-EC. If you don't like the new additions, just run REBOOT STD and you're back to square one. If you like the changes, copy AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS to the STD versions to make them permanent.

The Ready-Made Route

But there's more than one way to give DOS the boot. Instead of fiddling with batch files, you can buy a program that will automate the process for you. One of the best is CLEAR Software's Easy Boot. This \$49.95 utility lets you create up to 15 sets of AUTOEXEC and CONFIG combinations and choose any of them using a neat, graphical menu every time you reboot or start your com-



puter. If you use a disk caching program, *Easy Boot* has a feature that delays rebooting to give the cache time to write to disk. And you can use *Easy Boot* without ever having to touch the manual.

If you're interested in trying a multiple boot switching program before laying down any cash, download a copy of Auto916/623-4455 (BBS) Reader service no. 601 Easy Boot 1.0 \$49.95; Clear

Con, a nifty \$15 shareware program. AutoCon is a bit harder to use than Easy Boot, but it gives the more expensive program a run for its money with similar features and 50 boot configurations—more than I'll ever need.

Rumor has it DOS 6.0 will have a multiple boot feature built in—but hey, why wait? With just a couple minutes and a few bucks, you can boot up with your choice of environment right now.




