ince moving into our offices in November 1992, the PC World Test Center has made a science of testing products to extract information of maximum value to you, the PC World reader. Whether by surveying readers about their needs or recruiting PC World subscribers to carry out trials, the Test Center has focused on developing and running real-world tests based on off-theshelf business applications. After all, what good is a test that measures something you will never do?

In ten busy months, the Test Center has tested 226 PCs, 32 business applications, 20 laser printers, 18 monitors, 14 hard disks, and 18 disk caching products. In addition, the Test Center has evaluated the relative performance of 7 Intel and Intel-compatible CPUs to give you clear, relevant buying information; investigated the benefits of VESA local bus graphics; performed pioneering usability tests of notebook computers in an airplane simulator; laid bare the pros and cons of upgrading a system with motherboards or processors or replacing the old system with a new one; and attacked the problem of developing application-based testing for new processors like Pentium, the DEC Alpha, and the MIPS R4000 and R4400, running both Windows and Windows NT programs.

All told, the Test Center staff plays a leading role in *PC World*'s mission to provide the most reliable and well-rounded advice on system purchases available today. We'd like to round out your picture of this dedicated group:

Director Greg Smith joined us with an outstanding background in developing tests for *InfoWorld*'s test center, where he acquired a strong foundation in application-based testing and formulated new ways of maximizing staff productivity in a testing operation. He was instrumental in developing the BAPCo (Business Application Performance Corporation) benchmarks, which form part of PC World's system test suite. When Greg isn't marshalling the staff that evaluates scores of computer products every month, he follows local politics and continues his search for an excuse to travel to Paris.

Tom Grubb joined our hardy band after helping to launch ZD Labs. His substantial technical expertise and

years as manager of end-user computing for several large corporations help hone the Test Center's focus on the needs of our management readers. Since joining PC World, Tom has spearheaded test development for everything from hard disk caches to spreadsheets, including the usability tests of notebook PCs that appeared in our July special report on mobile computing. Tom unwinds by trying to defy the laws of physics on his mountain bike or pursuing his favorite hobby: brewing beer.

Like Greg Smith, Dean Andrews was a key player at *InfoWorld*'s test center. He has led the effort to develop meaningful benchmarks for systems running Windows NT—a difficult task, because NT is arriving a few months ahead of new versions of major business applications that exploit it. Testing NT systems is a particular challenge for a staff committed to basing benchmarks on real applications that our readers can buy and use. Dean enjoys screenwriting and exploring San Francisco.

Susan Silvius joined PC World as an associate technical editor in 1991 and acquired expertise in product testing at the InfoWorld test center. During 1991 and 1992, Susan developed such proficiency in testing and analyzing system performance, she seemed a test center all by herself. She continues to play a



leading role in testing PCs, contributing information vital to sound purchase decisions. When she's not putting systems through their paces, Susan leads tours of national parks, looks after her rabbit, and writes fiction.

Ulrike Diehlmann joins Susan as a pivotal member of our PC testing team. Ulrike has spent years supporting and de-

veloping database applications, including a nationwide credit card billing system for gas stations and cellular call tracking and billing. Ulrike's recreational pursuits include programming (!), skiing, and traveling.

Dawn Furseth is the Test Center's communications and tracking hub. We count on her to tell us when we'll have a quorum for each month's system review, to keep 100 or so machines in the testing pipeline at all times, and to route them to photo shoots and back to manufacturers. Dawn enjoys adding exotic marine life to her aquariums and improving her accomplished golf game.

Author's response: I have nothing but sympathy for those who upgraded to DOS 6.0 and experienced the severe problems described in these letters. Computers are supposed to make our work easier and more productive, not harder and fruitless. I'm thankful that I had no such problems. I started using prerelease versions of DOS 6.0 in November of 1992 and have had no problems since late January, several versions before release. I'm using an IBM PS/2 Model 80 (a 16-MHz 386) and two Gateway 2000 systems (a 386-33 and a 486-33); I installed LANtastic to network the two Gateway machines before the final version of DOS 6.0 was released, and DOS posed no problems.

When I review a product, I can write only of my own experiences. If you'll read the article closely (and realize that I didn't write the cover copy), you'll see that I don't quite fall over myself praising DOS 6.0, but in general I believe it's worth the money (especially at a \$40 street price).

For those who don't know how book

Sax's attitude is one of the reasons that the rapidly developing peer-to-peer technology will supplant client-servers as the network of choice.







#### **Shades of Green**

urn out the lights when you leave the room! That refrain rang through my childhood years, as my mother tried—often in vain—to get all of us kids to turn off appliances and lights when they weren't in use.

Judging from Environmental Protection Agency statistics, a lot of us still have a hard time finding the off switch. Between 30 and 40 percent of all PC equipment is left running 24 hours a day, seven days a week—consuming enough electricity to keep at least 12 power plants running year-round.

"It's not that one PC uses so much power, it's that there are so many of them," says Bristol Stickney, research associate with E source in Boulder, Colorado, a clearinghouse for information on electrical end-use efficiency.

According to the EPA, computer products now account for 5 percent of the nation's commercial energy consumption. If the current trend continues, that figure is expected to rise to 10 percent by the year 2000. The ever-increasing load is maxing out the power capacity of many office buildings, says Arthur Kressner of New York's Consolidated Edison utility, forcing many companies to investigate significant upgrade projects. "We're starting to reach the saturation point," he adds.

#### Go to Sleep

n the ideal world, people would just shut off their computers when they weren't using them. "But that's not ever likely to happen," says Brian Johnson, manager of the EPA's Energy Star Computers program. Started last year, Energy Star teams the EPA and hardware manufacturers in a cooperative venture to reduce energy consumption via more efficient computer equipment.

Nearly 60 PC, monitor, and printer manufacturers had joined Energy Star

as of press time, with a host of announcements expected over the summer. Product specifications and timetables for introductions vary (see Top of the News), but all products have a lowpower sleep mode that kicks in after a set period of inactivity-a prerequisite for carrying the EPA's Energy Star logo. EPA guidelines require PCs and monitors to run at 30 or fewer watts in sleep mode. Laser printers must power down to 30 to 45 watts, depending on their type.

By the year 2000, the EPA estimates, the Energy Star program and other efforts to increase energy efficiency will yield an annual savings of 26 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity, cutting carbon dioxide emissions by 20 million tons. That's equal to the amount produced by 5 million cars over a year.

#### How Low Can You Go?

ew companies will have problems achieving the EPA's initial standards, since they're primarily a matter of applying the power management facilities of notebooks to desktop designs. Most PC companies, in fact, will ship Energy Star products by the end of the third quarter. Some, such as Gateway 2000, plan power-down features for their entire product line; others will start by offering a separate line of "green" PCs.

"It's not a huge technological challenge," says the EPA's Johnson. "We wanted to define a target that was easy to reach for the first generation of Energy Star products."

According to Johnson, nearly every company he approached about the sleep mode concept had already consid-



ing hook," he says.

"Until the Energy Star program, there was no incentive for lower consumption," says E source's Stickney. "The industry didn't care, and the consumer didn't care."

"Customers have focused on price and performance, not energy efficiency," agrees Intel product manager Dave Dent. And although Dent expects tremendous interest in the new energysaving systems from Intel and others, "Customers aren't willing to pay one penny more" for the benefits, he says. Johnson and others disagree, noting that large firms in particular understand the tremendous savings these new systems afford and will be willing to pay extra for the long-term gains.

Besides the energy savings that sleep mode provides, many new systems will consume less power even when in use. For example, IBM's new Personal System 2/E (sans monitor) runs at 30 watts

at peak consumption (compared with roughly 70 watts for the average desktop computer). The breakthrough system has no fan, since none of the components require cooling.

Although the first systems are just rolling off the line, discussions have already started about the second phase. Opinion is split over whether the EPA should set an even higher standard once everyone has complied with the first level.

Stickney and others believe that now that the EPA has got the ball rolling, customer demand may drive the technology further. "The EPA won't have to do a next generation if energy ratings become a market comparison tool," says Stickney. "The industry always responds to customer demand."

Several factors are coming together to force the issue among even the most hesitant manufacturers. President Clinton has issued an executive order mandating that as of July 21, all federal agencies may purchase only computers and printers bearing the Energy Star logo. Many observers expect state and local governments to issue similar buying requirements. "Anyone wanting to do business with the government has to think seriously about offering an Energy Star system," says Intel's Dent.

Apart from the EPA activity, the National Energy Policy, enacted in 1992, calls for energy efficiency ratings (such as currently appear on refrigerators, for example) on office equipment by 1995. Although the mechanics of such labeling have not been finalized, the deadline is looming, and the ratings will only add to consumer—and vendor—awareness of the issue. "Clearly, we're at a unique point in history," says Dent.

"There's no downside to it," adds E source's Stickney. "And if we can cut consumption by 50 percent, we can shut down a few of those power plants."

#### Starting Here, Starting Now

You don't have to rush out and buy a new PC, monitor, or printer to conserve energy. Here are a few simple steps that will enable you to do your part now.

 Remove unused peripherals from your system to reduce the overall energy load.

- Use shared peripherals whenever possible. Choose one network printer for your work group, for example, rather than several personal printers.
- If you are buying a personal printer, consider an ink jet model, which typically consumes 10 watts while in operation, compared with the 300-watt appetite of a typical laser printer.
- If graphics and splashy colors aren't important in your work, consider a black-andwhite monitor, which consumes less energy than a color model.
- Install a fax board for computer-generated faxes rather than using a separate—and less efficient—fax machine.
- Think before you print—you'll save energy and paper.
- Turn equipment off when it's not in use. Shut down all computers, monitors, and printers at the end of the day, and consider turning your monitor off when you go to lunch or into a meeting. It takes only a few seconds to get the display back but can mean tremendous savings over a year.

Oh, and don't forget to turn out the lights.

Schmith, Gateway hired more than 400 people across all areas of the company in the winter months in an attempt to keep pace with projected sales. But with customers experiencing continued delays reaching technical support, at press time Gateway was hiring 15 new technicians per week. "We will continue at this pace until we get rid of the complaint that people can't get through," says Schmith, adding, "Our goal is to have everyone talking to a technician within 5 minutes of calling."

During late 1992 and early 1993, Consumer Watch saw a heavy increase in letters from Gateway customers, many complaining about their inability to get through to the company's technical support staff. In the past few weeks, the volume of letters has decreased but we continue to receive reports of slow service.

We'll continue to monitor Gateway's progress and report any new findings.

#### What to Do When Your Vendor Leaves You

did a great deal of research before buying a Lodestar computer. The company had a good record with the Better Business Bureau, had been in business for over six years, and had an outstanding warranty and service plan. PC World even awarded Lodestar a Best Buy in its March review "486-DX2-66s: Fastest PCs in the Universe."

But Lodestar went out of business before the ink on that Best Buy had dried. So much for the warranty, lifetime technical support, and on-site service. What do I do next? Should I simply lick my wounds and forget the whole thing?

Editor's note: We've been asked this question a lot lately, given the steady stream of business failures among PC manufacturers. To get some answers, we asked Marguerite Kirk, a bankruptev lawyer in Fort Worth, Texas, for advice about what consumers can do when their PC manufacturer goes under.


According to Kirk, if your vendor files Chapter 11 bankruptcy, there's a good chance it's hoping to continue in business. Together with creditors, it will formulate a reorganization plan and work with customers and suppliers to get back on its feet. During this time, says Kirk, it will often honor service and repair contracts, either directly or through a third-party provider.

Not every company reorganizes when it files Chapter 11, though. If the company simply wants to liquidate its assets and you haven't received goods you paid for, you'll find yourself standing in line with other creditors. The good news is that consumers move to the front of the unsecured-creditors' section of the line and will be among the first to be paid (if any funds are left after attorneys and the trustee have been paid). But don't expect to get your full investment back; you'll likely get only a portion of your initial outlay. (Of course, if you paid with a credit card, you probably don't have to worry about all this.)

If, on the other hand, your vendor files Chapter 7, your chances for receiving continued service-or any outstanding products-aren't very good. But Kirk suggests calling the attorney or trustee handling the case (the names are available from the federal bankruptey court for the region in which the company is located) to see if any-

one purchased the service contract.

Kirk also suggests calling the trustee if you sent your computer in for repair just before the company closed shop. According to Kirk, "If you can provide evidence that you own it-a serial number and invoiceyou stand a good chance of getting your computer back. Often the trustee has a roomful of goods and no idea who the rightful owners are."

Not every failed PC company files for

bankruptey, though. If your vendor crept off in the night-or just chose to deal with creditors outside the bankruptcy courtyou don't have a lot of options. If you purchased a number of computers, Kirk says, it may make economic sense to sue for damages according to the particular laws of your state. The hitch is that to collect, you have to be able to find the owners of the company, who may not want to be found.

Unfortunately for reader Muller, Lode-

star's owners haven't filed for bankruptcy, leaving its stranded customers with few options. Fortunately, Muller paid with a Visa gold card that has a separate warranty plan for its customers.

#### The Long, Long Wait

n early January, I ordered—and paid for an IBM PS/2 Model 9557 from my campus store. I was told the computer would be delivered in two to three weeks. I thought that was a long time but decided to wait. Three weeks passed, and I hadn't received the computer, so I called the store and was told the computer was back ordered and would be delayed another four to six weeks.

I have now waited two-and-a-half months for delivery of a PC that should have arrived in three weeks. IBM is making money with my money. I'm losing warranty time on an unused printer and wasting time driving to the school computer center to do my work. Julio J. Santos-Munne, Exanston, Illinois

Editor's note: The current PS/2 line has had ongoing supply problems since IBM introduced it last September, and there's no end in sight. According to JoeAnn Stahel, senior industry analyst at market research firm InfoCorp, the shortage has eased, but PS/2s-which carry the Big Blue name and competitive price tags-are extremely popular, and IBM may never catch up.

IBM spokesperson Michael Reiter says that the company has ramped up production, but that continued high demand and backlogged components have aggravated the situation.

Santos-Munne finally received his computer in early May-four months after he paid for it. According to IBM, the price of the Model 9557 has dropped 10 to 18 percent since Santos-Munne paid for his system. But, says Reiter, "it's up to the dealer to make amends."

#### Who Needs a Network, Anyway?

sing a network to share files, print, and swap ideas is a lot easier than walking down the hall 45 times a day. But with an average price of \$20,000 for a full-blown, NetWare-style 15-PC network, plus a salary for a network administrator, LANs don't come cheap. This month Bob Larkin, communications and operations manager for J.A. Jones Construction Company of Charlotte, North Carolina, explains how he developed his criteria for judging when a LAN, peer-to-peer network, or peripheral-sharing device makes sense. —Ed.

#### Rather Switch Than Fight

Most people who read the ads in computer magazines think that to be more productive, they need the newest, most expensive technologies. But I have to spend the company's money carefully. So before submitting purchase orders, I've found that it pays to know how equipment will be used.

My disillusionment with LANs began in 1986, after employees persuaded management that the only way for them to share printers and computer files was by purchasing the hottest new technology on the market: a LAN. We spent \$30,000 on a 10-node Nestar LAN for our headquarters in Charlotte. Unfortunately, the network administrator who understood the technical underpinnings of this monster left the company shortly afterward. We were left with a complicated piece of technology no one knew how to operate.

Shortly afterward, my company was constructing a 60-story office building in Chicago. There were ten IBM PCs at the site; the engineers who used them ran a proprietary scheduling software package, as well as MultiMate, 1-2-3, and other programs. With just one printer available, the engineers had to stand in line with a floppy if they wanted to print a file, and they could share files only by passing disks around. We

couldn't afford to install individual printers, and installing a LAN at this temporary site was out of the question.

I wondered if there was a way for the engineers to share printers and swap files. I read some articles on printer sharing devices and thought such a solution might work for us.

We bought a switching device from Rose Electronics of Houston, Texas, and used it at the site. Installing the box was easy: I plugged an RS232 cable into the serial port of each PC,

connected the cables to the switch, and attached the switch to the printer.

The device also came with TSR software that let users exchange files. We were able to develop a rudimentary file sharing system, in which users could send a file to someone else's mailbox.

We appointed one of the more PC-literate engineers as the point person and taught him how to set up mailboxes and manage the quasi-network. The total bill for installing all the cabling, software, hardware, and connections came to about \$1000, and it took only a week to get everything running.

#### Sighting LAN

By 1991, the number of employees in our tax department had grown from 6 to 14, and every one of them needed to keep on top of rapidly changing tax laws as well as manage the state and federal returns for more than 400 companies. Although a Rose switch had worked successfully in the department for several years, the tax information, which was critical to our business operations, needed to be stored in a central database that could be backed up daily.

And because the number of users had more than

And because the number of users had more than doubled, it made economic sense for them to run a multiuser LAN version of their corporate tax package, Fast-Tax, rather than try the single-user

Fortunately, the network market had matured. Networking products were more stable and PC prices dropped, as did the cost of installing a network. So we made the LAN leap, paying around \$25,000 to install a 14-node NetWare network—with special 10 Base-T twisted-pair cabling, a CD ROM stacker unit, a 486-25 server, and backup hardware and software—in the tax division.

versions we had originally purchased.

That LAN worked well, so in 1992 we decided to install two other networks. At one site, the users need to share project management and accounting information and back up this centralized data every day. Another LAN runs in our "heavy" division, where 26 engineers use PGs to develop projects such as bridges, dams, tunnels, and highways. In this division, centralizing



estimate and proposal data for government clients justified the investment.

#### To LAN or Not to LAN?

These experiences helped me establish criteria for deciding when to set up a switch, a LAN, or a peer-to-peer network.

A device like a Rose switch makes sense when a group's chief need is to share a peripheral, and the group is small—say, fewer than 12. The users don't have a frequent need to share files, and the information they're working with is not "corporate" data that affects the company's bottom line.

On the other hand, a LAN is justified if there is an overriding need to centralize and protect corporate information and when more than 12 must share information and software, such as a database, scheduling, or E-mail system. In this case, the cost of a LAN is small compared with the value of the information stored on its server.

Some people in my firm are interested in peer-to-peer networks, such as Windows for Workgroups. After all, they are inexpensive, let users share resources, and are fun. But to me, these networks make sense only for small groups of computer experts who can take advantage of several Windows programs. And they're dangerous places to hold corporate information because they have limited security, there's no centralized backup, and there's no control over the data.

My conclusion? For many situations, a print sharing device is still a practical buy. However, there are times when going with a LAN makes sense. But when I install a LAN, I take a hard look at the reasons users want it, whether I can support it, and whether my company can really afford it.



#### Trying to Keep the Customer Satisfied

f there's anything I've learned after years of being my own boss, it's that you can never be too prepared. When I give seminars on PC productivity, I always prepare more material than I need. To avoid even the slightest possibility of losing my data, I back up my files like clockwork. And if my clients gripe—heaven forbid—I make sure to keep track of their complaints.

This month, I've turned my attention to three new products that help with these tasks. Compel from Asymetrix is a new multimedia-based presentation package that adds sound and video capabilities to text and graphics so you can put on a real show. To keep my hard work protected, I tried Colorado Backup for Windows, a tape-backup system that is considerably easier to use than most DOS-based backup products, from Colorado Memory Systems Inc. (CMS). And Complaints Desk, a new package from Spectrum Computer Technologies, promises to help keep your customers satisfied.

#### Compel 1.0

Having spent the last year putting on seminars for small firms, I've become friendly with Microsoft's PowerPoint, which I use to create overheads. Although PowerPoint lets me create a series of slides with occasional limited animation, it doesn't allow me to do anything fancy, like show a moving graphic while playing a sound, or incorporate video segments.

Five minutes into my first look at Compel, I knew that I was ready for the big time. This Foulks Favorite comes with more than 100MB of media clips; using my CD ROM drive, I incorporated sound from the Compel samples into my slide presentation. The result was like seeing a Panavision presentation with Dolby stereo after years

of watching old-fashioned silent movies.


As I created each slide in Compel, I'd select the appropriate WAV or MIDI audio files from a drop-down menu, integrate them with graphics and video segments, and tell the program to play them all at the same time. (Compel even lets you cull from Kodak Photo CD images, if your drive is Kodak-CD certified.) Now

I'm using Compel to rebuild and enhance my stock seminar materials. (Alas, Compel won't let me convert my present PowerPoint files.)

Special effects add more than fun to your presentation. Sound, music, and moving images can be an extremely effective way to make a point that will linger in the minds of your audience. And if you can't give your presentation in person, Compel also includes a runtime module called Compel Show that you can include with your presentation files, so clients can run the presentation without you.

Of course, this software is not for the hardware lightweight. Asymetrix recommends a minimum 20-MHz 386 with 2MB of RAM along with VGA or super-VGA video. However, you'll probably need more firepower and a speedy hard disk: Audio and video data need to be gulped down rapidly, or the playback will be jerky. I ran the program quite comfortably from the Mitsumi CD ROM drive of a 25-MHz. Cheetah Gold 486 with 8MB of RAM and a fast hard disk.

One of Compel's best features is its relatively low price: At \$295 suggested retail (and a street price likely to be half that), the product is \$200 less than its nearest rivals. If your job



involves any form of presentation, treat yourself to a look at Compel.

#### Colorado Backup for Windows

Doing tape backups using DOS-based backup programs can be a hassle, especially if you want to back up just a few files. But with Colorado Backup for Windows, specially designed for use with Colorado Memory Systems tape backup units, backing up is almost a pleasure. Instead of wad-

ing through picky menus or entering arcane command line parameters, just select the files and drag them to the tape icon. Then name the backup volume, and you're done.

Restoring from tape is equally slick just drag an icon representing a tape volume, and drop it on the proper drive icon. (Yes, it works even on my LANtastic network.) Once you've started a backup, you can move on to other Windows applications while the operation continues in the background. You can also schedule unattended backups, Backup really doesn't get much simpler.

Best of all, owners of CMS's TC-15 data compression cards (with the chip set from Stac Electronics) finally have a full-featured, Windows-based backup product that lets them do a transparent, real-time data compression. I can back up a 510MB hard disk by linking tapes, and I can store as much as 320MB of data on a single DC-2120 cassette.

Colorado Backup for Windows is compatible with QIC-40 and QIC-80 but is currently intended only for users of CMS tape backup systems. It supports the company's full series of Jumbo tape drive interfaces (including the external unit I use). According to the company, versions for its Trakker and PowerTape drives will be available later this year. The package is distributed through major software houses and lists for \$59.

#### Complaints Desk 1.1

The \$129 Complaints Desk is one of those "Why didn't I think of that?" products, and one that just about any business that deals with the public could use.

You can use this straightforward database, which is founded on Paradox, for tracking customer complaints, comments, suggestions, and requests. Thanks to its Paradox 3.5 underpinnings, Complaints Desk can generate enough reports, graphs, and charts to keep any quality assurance manager busy. Use the preprogrammed reports or graphs to chart complaints, tracking their sources and frequency so you know where to go to correct the problem. Once the data is entered, you can export it to other data file formats, or create an ASCII list of names and addresses for use in mailing lists.

To set up the program, first determine categories of complaints or comments you expect to receive, and establish a list of departments to whom various complaints should be referred. Happily, the setup is not etched in stone; you can revise it later as needs or conditions change. You also can assign each incoming complaint to various status codes so it can be tracked through departments and actions until the problem is resolved. Complaints Desk even

lets you develop scripts, so that an employee receiving a particular complaint can have a ready reply for it. ("Yes, Mrs. Wheeler, we know the sprinkler is leaking. A technician will be there Tuesday.")

Complaints Desk is surprisingly well documented (if you overlook some spelling errors) and easy to set up. The program requires minimal hardware: A mere 640K RAM, 2.5MB of hard disk space, and a printer, and you can run it on just about any LAN. Look for Complaints Desk in catalogs, or order it directly from Spectrum.

#### **Quick Fixtures**

Online Reference's QFind is a superfast file finder that's capable of finding a single file on an 80MB hard disk in less than a second. QFind found all of the 71 INSTALL.\* files on the six hard disks and CD ROM of my LANtastic network in just under 2 minutes and searched 264 ZIP files along the way. It also proved its compatibility with two MS DOS 6 DoubleSpace drives and one Stacker drive. You can toggle OFind's ZIP search feature on and off and tell it to limit its search to specific drives. You also can tell QFind to jump to the first file located in a given search. A stripped-down version of QFind is available for downloading from PC World Online, with registration of the full version set at \$20.

SWFTE Int'I's Typecase III must be a contender for the "most unusual fonts" award. The program gives you more than 100 fonts you've been searching for in addition to off-thewall fonts you'll probably never need, such as the curling Happy Days font from the long-popular TV show's logo. You'll find a Punch Label font, which resembles the letters that label makers punch onto plastic tape, and a Neon font with rounded corners that looks like the glass tubing of neon signs. Typecase III also includes more than 200 holiday symbols and icons, ranging from Santa images to Halloween pumpkins. All are usable with any Windows 3.1-compatible printer, and scalable from 1 to 999 points.

I recently used Automap for Windows

to find my way across 1300 miles and four states. Automap's itinerary of highways and projected mileage totals were completely accurate; it scheduled my projected arrival at a California destination within 20 minutes of the actual arrival time. What's more, Automap selected a route I would not have spotted simply by flipping the pages of a road atlas, saving me 4 hours over a more conspicuous but less direct route.

Reduce, reuse, recycle. Those three words will reshape the desktop as PCs go "green." The first step is here: energy-efficient PCs.

The next generation of energy-efficient desktop computers is here and promises to save you money by cutting your utility bills without sacrificing performance. These machines, which in sleeplike mode use an eighth the power of traditional desktops, also herald an age of environment-friendly computers that are recyclable and produced with fewer pollutants.

Our evaluation of three of the first energy-efficient PCs to reach the market—AST Research's Bravo LP 486/66dx, Austin Computer Systems' Green PC 486/66, and IBM's PS/2 E—uncovered a wide range of power conservation features and other innovations. All three power down after a period of inactivity to a notebooklike sleep mode from which they can be awakened with the

touch of a key or a mouse movement.

Of the models we tested,

the models we tested, Austin's Green

PC 486/66 was the clear winner. It offers a sleep mode that draws just 28 watts (system with monitor) and traditional PC pricing—the DX2-66 version starts at \$2299. IBM's PS/2 E

won high marks for technical innovation and draws just 29 watts in sleep mode, but its high price and limited expandability place the unit in a league of its own. For moderate energy savings and a low estimated street price of under \$2700, AST's Bravo LP 486/66dx is a solid choice. It provides a sleep mode of 55 watts.


To have their products included in this test drive, vendors submitted computers

they said qualified for the Environmental Protection Agency's Energy Star Computers program, which requires computers, monitors, and printers to consume a maximum of 30 watts of electricity in an idle state (45 watts for printers faster than 15 pages per minute and all color printers). But there is no monitoring program in place to

ensure EPA compliance, and our findings indicate that energy consumption and your savings—will vary greatly from vendor to vendor.

Our advice: Look further than the Energy Star logo to find the most efficient product. Ask vendors for information on how they achieve energy reductions, such as whether they use software modes, low-voltage components, and energy-efficient monitors.

And be aware: Each add-in card you install, every peripheral you connect, every bay you fill—even upgrading to a larger hard drive or adding cache memory—will cause your system to use more power. How



The IBM PS/2 E has the most innovative

design of any desktop we've seen in a while. For power management, the PS/2 E employs a number of mobile computing technologies—and likewise suffers from some of the common inconveniences of notebooks, such as limited expandability and a high price. In our tests, a PS/2 E system configured with a maximum 16MB of RAM (8MB is standard) and an LCD mon-

itor drew about 46 watts at

the DOS prompt and 47 watts while running Excel. In sleep mode, the combo drew 29 watts.

The power savings start with the CPU, a clock doubler IBM 486SLC2 with a 3.3-volt design that uses about half the power of tradition-

al 5-volt CPUs and runs at 50 MHz in a 25-MHz system.

IBM claims the system performs about as fast as a 33-MHz 486. The company shaved off another couple of watts by using a 2½-inch 120MB hard drive, a notebook-size device that draws about 2 watts—half the draw of a comparable 3½-inch drive.

IBM opted against standard expansion slots in favor of four PCMCIA slots. You can hot swap PCMCIA cards simply by slipping them into the slot as you would a floppy, which makes them a lot easier to install than typical AT add-in cards. Unfortunately, PCMCIA cards cost a lot more than AT cards, and you won't find as many options—yet. The four PCMCIA expansion slots draw a maximum of 2 watts per device, or about 25 percent of the power used by

**NEW AMD 486S; PENTIUM SHORTAGE CONTINUES: Advanced Micro Devices** is shipping a new line of Intel 486-SX-compatible microprocessors while fighting a rearguard action in the courts over its right to make versions of Intel's 386 CPU and 287 math coprocessor and to ship its own Am486-DX line of processors. Unlike its other Intel-compatible CPUs, AMD's new designs don't rely on any Intel micro code. AMD's new line includes the Am486SX-33, Am486SX-40, Am486-SX2-50 and Am486SXLV-33. Like Intel's 486SX chips, they do not have a built-in math coprocessor.

Meanwhile, Intel stands by estimates that it will ship hundreds of thousands of Pentium chips during 1993, or at least 200,000. According to company spokesperson Nancy Pressel, many manufacturers aren't receiving Pentiums because early shipments are going to customers with "world-class engineering talent...who need these large volumes in order to create and expand the market." tor, and a floppy drive costs \$6780.

#### **AST's Basic Philosophy**

While IBM flexed its technical muscle, AST drew on its notebook technology to transform its entry-level Bravo line with a redesigned keyboard controller and a new BIOS. The resulting Bravo LP line consists of three processors—486SX-25, 486DX-33, and 486DX2-66—in two basic configurations: 170MB with 4MB of RAM, and 340MB with 8MB of RAM. All of them are expandable to 64MB of RAM and offer local bus video, and you can upgrade to OverDrive for DX2.

drive; 2, 24-watt power supply;

3 and 4, PCMCIA slots.

The keyboard controller, similar to those used in AST's notebooks for power management, lets the Bravo LPs communicate with a new family of low-emission monitors via a vacant pin in the video connector. After a user-defined period of keyboard inactivity, the controller signals the monitor to go to sleep. The monitors will also be sold separately. While the Bravo LP systems are able to use any monitor, the sleep signal works only with monitors equipped to re-

ceive it. AST also reached into its bag of mobile computing tricks to implement a hard drive power-down state that's user definable in setup.

A relatively austere prototype configuration—the Bravo LP 486/66dx with a single floppy drive, 8MB of RAM, a 170MB hard disk, and an energy-efficient 15-inch monitor—pulled 55 watts in sleep mode. With Windows idle, the unit—including monitor—pulled 100 watts. This 486DX2-66 unit will have a street price under \$2700.

The 486SX-25 Bravo LP 425s with a 170MB hard drive, 4MB of RAM, 1MB of video DRAM, and the 15-inch, flat-screen, low-emission monitor sells for about \$1600 (\$1200 without the monitor). That's \$100 to \$200 more than similar Bravo PCs, but, company officials note, the system includes local bus graphics, a larger hard drive, and a larger monitor.

#### Austin's Optimum Innovation

For price and performance, the unit we preferred was Austin's thoughtfully designed Green PG 486/66. Even with a 14-inch monitor, 16MB of RAM, a 340MB hard drive, a tape drive, and two floppy drives, it had a sleep mode of just 28 watts in our tests—less than half the EPA ceiling. The prototype we tested drew 79 watts at the DOS prompt and 31 watts with the monitor off and the hard drive spinning. The tested configuration sells for \$3199.

In addition to turning off the monitor, Austin's Green PCs can shut down the hard drive after a user-configurable period of time, putting the unit in its 28-watt sleep mode. Or the system can leave the monitor

off while performing some activity, such as backup, at night after you've gone home. Power management is activated after a user-configurable period of time or via a button on the front of the PC. To reduce noise pollution and energy use, the fan varies its speed according to the operating temperature. The company plans to offer a low-radiation monitor.

The Green PC 486/66 is the high end of Austin's new Green PC line of 15 systems; the low end is a 486SX-25 model with 4MB of RAM expandable to 32MB and a 170MB hard drive for \$1499. The basic Austin Green PC 486/66 with 4MB of RAM, a 340MB hard drive, and a 14-inch monitor is

\$2299. All the systems offer several configurable power management options and solid Energy Star benchmarks, and they include a low-emission, 14-inch super-VGA monitor, local bus graphics, and an IDE hard drive adapter.

How does the power consumption of these PCs compare with that of traditional computers and business equipment? A Texas Instruments DX2-50 notebook, finetuned for power management, hovered around 21 watts for every task except an animated sequence in Microsoft Golf that pulled 27 watts. A 66-MHz 486DX2 from CompuAdd's new high-performance Centura line with a 500MB hard drive and Diamond's Viper local bus video card drew 95.6 watts at the DOS prompt. A Hewlett-Packard DeskJet 550C drew 7 watts while idle and around 11 watts while printing. The new Energy Star LaserJet 4L draws 180 watts while printing and powers down to 10 watts when idle, according to HP.

#### There's More to Being Green

Cutting energy use is all well and good, but it's only a start in creating truly "green" computers. Recyclability is also important, and some vendors are already addressing the issue. Many of the parts in the IBM PS/2 E are easily recycled, and 25 percent of the plastic used in the unit is recycled plastic. Apple and TI were the first companies to accept laptop batteries for disposal. You can get advice on where to drop off your computer's packaging for recycling by calling 800/944-8448.

Industry watchers predict that within a year, energy-saving features will be built into nearly every computer, monitor, and printer sold. Once all computer equipment is energy efficient, computer power use should drop by as much as 75 percent. Computers currently account for about 5 percent of total U.S. power use, according to EPA estimates. What does that mean in dollars and cents? According to the EPA, if energy-saving computers and monitors are left on 24 hours a day, you could save as much as \$120 a year per system, or \$600,000 for a corporation with 5000 PCs.

# IBM DOS One-Ups DOS 6

DOS just gets better TEST DRIVE and better. First Microsoft adds data compression, antivirus, memory management, defragmentation, and backup capabilities in its latest DOS offering, 6.0. Now it's IBM's turn, and Big Blue doesn't disappoint: IBM DOS 6.1 offers the same features-sans data compressionand adds tape backup, support for PCM-CIA devices and pen-input systems, an enhanced text editor, a system diagnostics utility, and several other cool tools. (So you don't recall an IBM DOS 6.0? No wonderthere wasn't one. IBM is attempting to distinguish its DOS 6 from Microsoft's and will likely market DOS 6.1 as an upgrade to MS-DOS 6.0.)

#### **Tape Backup and More**


IBM's DOS 6.1 is in many ways better than Microsoft's DOS 6.0, although not by a wide margin. Both let you run most of their utilities from the DOS command line, the DOS Shell, or Windows. In a comparison of utilities, IBM DOS's greatest advantage lies in its backup software: Licensed from

Central Point Software, Central Point Backup supports backup to tape drives. MS-DOS's scaled-down version of Symantec's Norton Backup supports only floppy drive backups. Why is tape support so important? Try backing up a 200MB hard drive with a mile-high stack of floppies, and you'll find out soon enough.

Also included in IBM DOS is the Central Point Scheduler utility, which allows you to

schedule unattended backups and the automatic launching of other programs. For example, you could use Scheduler to run your data compression program after work hours. Microsoft DOS 6.0 doesn't provide a scheduler utility.

However, not every utility in IBM DOS 6.1 is superior to its Microsoft counterpart—

some are equal. For instance, both products include a defragmenter licensed from Symantee; the utilities appear to be identical, right down to their point-and-click interface. The antivirus utilities sport different interfaces but offer similar capabilities, and both scanned effectively in

informal PC World trials.

#### The Intelligent Office at Work: Imagine having the

same control over your office equipment and the documents that pass through it as you do over your desktop system. By this time next year, your PC could command a new generation of copiers, fax machines, printers, and even phones that run a Windows-compatible operating system. Called Microsoft At Work Architecture, this multitasking OS will let PCs and properly equipped office devices communicate so documents can be routed, combined, duplicated, and shared easily. It also promises to simplify complex office equipment functions—the graphical At Work interface will also run on 320-by-240-pixel touch screens on the machines themselves, replacing today's cryptic buttons and LCD panel commands.

Microsoft At Work includes communications and printing software. The communications features will let networked PCs treat At Work-based office equipment like any other peripheral. For instance, a fax machine receiving a document could route that file over the network to the recipient's E-mail box. Two fax machines supporting At Work could send and receive files in the files' native format, so you could fax a spreadsheet and the recipient would receive a live document in its original file format, not as a scanned, uneditable image.

These communications features could also let a PC manipulate voice mail from a phone supporting At Work: Messages could be forwarded to the same PC mailbox that stores your E-mail and faxes. From a PC, you could listen to, forward, sort, and store those voice messages. For example, instead of forwarding an irate cus-

tomer's voice message using your phone, you could insert the message into a document, add the customer's billing file and recent correspondence, and send the whole package over the network to the customer service department.

Sixty office equipment manufacturers, including NEC, Ricoh, and Xerox, have pledged to develop At Work products.



IBM DOS 6.1 includes Central Point RAMBoost, a memory manager that helps optimize system memory by moving device drivers and terminate-and-stay-resident programs (TSRs) to upper memory, freeing more conventional RAM (the PC's first 640K) for DOS programs, Like MemMaker in Microsoft DOS 6.0, RAMBoost operates automatically. Type RAMSETUP at the DOS prompt, and RAMBoost reconfigures and reboots your PC to get the best fit

for your TSRs and drivers in upper RAM. I found this utility as easy to use as MemMaker and got similar results-it freed about 620K of conventional RAM, Both RAM-Boost and MemMaker work with 386-class or better processors.


Also new in IBM DOS 6.1 is a diagnostic utility that quickly displays your system's hardware configuration. Need that information handy when you call tech support? Simply type QCONFIG at the

DOS prompt; you'll get a list of important details about your system, including PC identification number, BIOS revision and type, processor type, and information on the keyboard, mouse, serial and parallel ports, hard and floppy disks, and memory usage. You can redirect this information to a file as well as print it. IBM DOS 6.1 also includes Microsoft DOS's MSD configuration utility. While QCONFIG merely scrolls your system information across the screen, MSD comes with an easy-to-use mousedriven interface.

Utilities aside, IBM DOS 6.1 includes all the operating system enhancements you'll find in MS-DOS 6.0, including the Smart-Drive disk cache, a new MOVE command that moves files to a different directory or disk, and a multiple configuration facility

that lets you choose a system configuration at start-up-useful if you've got a motley collection of TSRs or device drivers to load.

Nobody wants to load a full-featured and slow-loading word processor to dash off a memo or edit a simple text file. IBM DOS 6.1 has a new text editor that makes it easier than past IBM versions did to write quick notes and edit system files such as CON-FIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT. Like Microsoft's DOS, it lets you create multiple

configurations. Simply type an E at the DOS prompt (or double-click the IBM DOS E Editor listing if you're using the DOS Shell), and up pops a no-frills word processor. You can use key combinations and function keys to move, copy, or delete text as well as perform other basic editing tasks. While the IBM DOS editor is ideal if you enjoy memorizing keyboard commands, I found the menu-driven text editor in MS-DOS 6.0 easier to learn.

#### PenDOS and PCMCIA Support

IBM had a future generation of hand-held, pen-based PCs in mind when it added Pen-DOS to DOS 6.1. This pop-up utility is a scaled-down version of CIC's Handwriter Recognition System. If you have a pen tablet computer or a conventional PC with

an external digitizer, you can use PenDOS to enter simple numbers and symbols into your DOS applications by hand. PenDOS's pop-up QWERTY keyboard lets pen tablet users input letters by tapping them on the screen.

workers who need a simple text entry tool, but its usefulness for most desktop PC users is probably limited.

PCMCIA slots are rapidly becoming de rigueur in portable PCs-and soon will appear in desktops. These slots hold compact, credit card-size devices such as fax-modems, network adapters, memory cards, and miniature disk drives. IBM DOS 6.1 includes software licensed from Phoenix Technologies that lets you install and remove PCMCIA cards without rebooting, as well as receive information about each PCMCIA socket and card in your system (such as card name, socket number, and so on).

#### **Blue DOS Best**

Is IBM's DOS better than Microsoft's? My initial impression is yes. Overall, IBM's DOS offers a superior collection of utilities—unless you simply must have data compression. But IBM is expected to enhance its DOS in later versions, starting with a free 6.1 upgrade with data compression, by the end of the summer. (IBM's DOS 5.0 was bundled with Stac

Shout It Out: With any of IBM's three new voice recognition programs, your PC will follow your spoken commands—navigating Windows, retrieving database information, even taking dictation.

VoiceType Control for Windows (\$129) ships with 32 voice commands, such as "file save," "font bold," and "next window," and lets you create 32 voice commands for each of your Windows applications. The 32 preset commands are modifiable,


but IBM doesn't recommend changing them.
The software comes with your choice of a
headset or a hand-held microphone. To

If you need to dictate short documents, IBM VoiceType 2 for DOS (\$2195) fills the bill. The software's 5000-word vocabulary can be expanded to 7000 words. While the typical person's vocabulary contains around 32,000 words, 7000 should cover common business documents, says IBM. The software also has preset voice commands for Microsoft DOS 5.0 and 6.0, IBM DOS 5 and 6.1, and nine other DOS applications, including Word-Star, 1-2-3, and dBASE. You can create commands for other common DOS apps. The program requires a 386SX or better and IBM's Audio Capture Playback Adapter, which costs about \$180. The

adapter card comes in ISA and Micro Channel versions
and is standard in IBM multimedia PCs.

The high-end IBM Speech Server Series (ISSS) offers serious word power. 





# **Adobe Lets Styles Travel With Text**



ACROBAT EXCHANGE LETS YOU NAVIGATE a document via thumbnail pages, attach notes, then send it to your colleagues for review.

TEST DRIVE

It's no secret that the fast-

est, cheapest way to distribute information across a company is electronically. The trouble comes when you want to send the same document to executives who use Windows, support personnel running DOS, engineers strapped to UNIX workstations, and a graphics department that would rather die than part with its Macs.

Until recently, your only option was to give up the document's graphics, fonts, and formatting and convert it to simple ASCII text—or invest in an expensive, proprietary document management system.

Adobe Acrobat 1.0 aims to change all that by creating fully formatted documents that can be read (though not edited) on all the major desktop platforms. The Windows and Macintosh versions are shipping, and versions for DOS and UNIX are due before year-end. We looked at prerelease copies of the Windows and Mac versions and

found Acrobat to be an agile, if slightly flawed, performer.

Like the Flying Wallendas, Acrobat is a family act. It consists of four products. At the low end, Acrobat Reader lets you view, navigate, and print files formatted for Acrobat; copy text or graphics from an Acrobat file into another program; and per-

form simple text searches. Designed for the vast majority of users, Reader is priced from \$35 to \$50 per copy, depending on volume.

If you want to create Acrobat files as well as view them, you'll need Acrobat Exchange. Exchange gives you all the tools found in Reader, plus the capability to create Acrobat-readable files from inside applications, annotate them, and add navigation aids such as bookmarks.

The price of Acrobat Exchange ranges from \$195 for a singleuser package to \$14,625 for a 100-user package.

If your documents employ unusual fonts or Encapsulated PostScript (EPS) graphics files, or if you want to distribute high-quality publications such as annual reports, you'll need Acrobat Distiller, (The DOS and UNIX versions of Acrobat will also require Distiller.) Adobe sells two versions: a two-user Personal Distiller for \$695, and a server-based network version for \$2495. (A starter kit featuring ten copies of Exchange and one copy of Personal Distiller retails for \$1395.)

Acrobat works by translating files into its own portable document format (PDF), PostScriptlike ASCII code that Reader and Exchange use to re-create the look of the file on screen.

Creating a PDF file from inside your applications is as easy as printing. In Windows, you

> simply go to your program's Print Setup dialog and select the PDFWriter driver from the list of printers. Then you issue the print

command and name the directory where you want to store the file—Acrobat takes care of the rest.

Using Acrobat Distiller is equally painless. First you print each document to a PostScript or an EPS file. Then you convert files by opening them inside Distiller or by moving them into a directory that Distiller checks at regular intervals, processing them automatically.

To make PDF files truly use-

ful, however, you've got to bring them into Acrobat Exchange. There you can annotate the document with Post-it-like notes, insert bookmarks, or create miniature versions of each page (called *thumbnails*) and move from page to page simply by clicking on one.

Exchange also lets you create hypertext links to, say, cross-reference all occurrences of a word or link a chart to text on another page. Unfortunately, its linking talents are limited: There's no way to create links across documents, for example, or to link all occurrences of a word at once. This can make indexing long documents tedious.

The real test of Acrobat's success will be how well it lets you



move documents across platforms with the documents' fonts and graphics intact. In our informal tests of a beta version, Acrobat nimbly juggled graphics in a variety of formats— PCX, BMP, CGM, CorelDraw CDR, and MacPaint PICT from Windows to the Macintosh and back. When it came to moving fonts, however, Acrobat stumbled.

When you open a PDF file that contains fonts not installed on your system, Acrobat creates substitutes for them using its Multiple Master technology. While not an exact duplicate of the missing font, the new type-face is designed to retain the original's size, weight, and style—keeping the document's line breaks and overall formatting intact.

If the only typefaces you ever use are Helvetica, Times, and their close cousins, Multiple Master fonts should work just fine. But if you want to get fancy, you may have problems. When we moved our test documents from Windows to the Mac, script faces lost their cursive characteristics, and some

heavy sans serif fonts turned into wimpy serif typefaces. Adobe says that it's continually fine-tuning its Multiple Master fonts and will be coming out with enhanced versions in the future.

When document design is crucial—and you use Adobe typefaces—you can embed the fonts in a PostScript file and use Acrobat Distiller. But if you use TrueType fonts, your only options are to accept the Multiple Master substitute or else convert the font into a graphic, sacrificing some quality.

Maintaining small file sizes also makes it easier to move documents across platforms. Acrobat employs a variety of compression schemes to keep PDF files trim, but with varying success. For example, an Ami Pro 3.0 document stuffed with 400K of bit-mapped graphics shrank to a relatively svelte 85K PDF file with my beta version. However, a 3K WinWord 2.0 document containing symbolic fonts ballooned to 111K when Acrobat treated them as em-

bedded graphics. The number of notes, bookmarks, and thumbnails a PDF file contains will also affect its size—factors you need to consider if you hope to shuttle big documents across a LAN.

#### **Big Plans**

Despite its flaws, Acrobat shows promise. Adobe has big plans for future versions, including more powerful text searches, improved hypertext linking, and the capability to retain the document's structure as well as its format, making it easier to manage huge documents.

Adobe may have to share the spotlight with other vendors -such as Interleaf, which is expected to ship low-cost DOS and Windows versions of WorldView this year; Frame Technology, with FrameReader; and No Hands Software, with Common Ground. Like Acrobat, these products will spur the move away from paper toward network, CD ROM, and on-line distribution of information-bringing the longsought paperless office one step closer to reality.







# **IBM 486 Subnote Is Backlit Too**

TEST DRIVE The IBM ThinkPad

500 is about as superior to IBM's first portable computer as it could be. The inauspicious IBM Portable had all the heft of a desktop but none of the power. The ThinkPad 500, however, stands in sharp contrast: This 3.9-pound subnotebook runs on IBM's 50-MHz 486SLC2-setting a pace that's faster than the Intel 486DX-33's but not quite the speed of the 486DX2-50and holds 4MB of RAM and an 85MB or a 170MB hard disk. The unit's backlit VGA screen has 64 levels of gray and measures a comfortable 7.4 inches diagonally, making it easy on the eyes.

#### **Battery With a Plug**

IBM designed this very portable (10.1 by 7.2 by 1.6 inches) PC with travel in mind. Its most significant feature is a self-charging battery that can be slipped out of the unit and plugged directly into any U.S. power socket via an unfolding two-prong plug. As long as you don't travel internationally, you'll be able to take the system on the road without the added burden of an AC adapter.

Battery life is respectable thanks to a good range of power management functions, including a doze mode that turns the LCD screen on or off with a hot key, and a hibernate mode that acts like suspend/resume but also saves the data and system status to the hard drive. The ThinkPad 500 supports the Advanced Power Management (APM) specification, and IBM claims a battery life of about 3.5 hours from its lead acid battery.

The ThinkPad 500 comes

with a slim, light external floppy drive that plugs into the back of the unit. It's equipped with a single PCMCIA Type II slot for future expansion, an enhanced parallel port for speedy data transmission, and a serial port. A VGA output port that can operate simultancously with the subnote's screen is complemented by a full-featured keyboard that is 90 percent of regular size. I found a preproduction unit perfectly usable and had no trouble touch-typing immediately.

#### **Fashion Accessory?**

Can't tell your notebook from the others lying around the office-or you just want everyone to know who's working away in seat 2B? When you register the ThinkPad 500, IBM sends you a nameplate that fits into a small indentation at the top of the system unit cover. Besides vanity, the nameplate serves some practical purposes for security and identification. However, if you're serious about theft prevention, we recommend a thirdparty security device such as CMG's Notelock or Intelligent Security Systems' Firmloc access control system.

#### **Tracking the Point**

Yet another bonus is the Track-Point II pointing device. Resembling a red pencil eraser, it's embedded between the G and H keys. You push it in the direction you want the on-screen pointer to move. It's pressure sensitive; the harder you push, the faster the mouse pointer goes. Left and right mouse buttons are built into the front lip of the keyboard.

The ThinkPad 500 is \$1999 for the 85MB hard drive model and \$2499 for the 170MB model. You get DOS

5.02, Prodigy, and a coupon for a free upgrade to IBM DOS 6.1 when the product becomes available. Those are very competitive prices for a 486-based subnote, and ones that pit the IBM squarely against the Zeos Contenda, a similar subnotebook that's been available for a few months but that lacks a PCMCIA slot and has a slower processor and a smaller hard drive. In fact, the ThinkPad is competitive on features with most monochrome full-size notebooks and has enough power to let you run Windows

applications on the road.

Are there drawbacks to using the ThinkPad 500? Well, there's no such thing as no-compromise computing, and one of the biggest sacrifices you'll make is in dealing with the unit's small screen. It's adequate for most common tasks, but I'd prefer not to run a large spreadsheet or edit a complex presentation on it. However, most competing subnotebooks use screens of a similar size, so this isn't a major competitive drawback. Since the ThinkPad 500 is capable of driving an external VGA signal simultaneously with the built-in display, you could even use it for making presentations on the road-as long as a color monitor is available at the site where you give your presentation.

The TrackPoint II is a wonderful pointing device, although it takes about half an hour of practice to get used to it. One minor disadvantage is that to get to the serial port, you have to plug in the external floppy drive, which has an additional cable leading out of it that terminates in the serial port.

# Zeos and Leading Edge: 486s for All Budgets

wo new low-cost lines from Zeos and Leading Edge bring 486 power to you for under \$1500. Whether you need network workstations in a large office or 486s for your small business or home office, there's something here for even the smallest budgets.

Zeos built its Intel 486SXbased LiteLine PCs to be compact while still providing expansion features such as open slots and an OverDrive socket. The plug-and-play Leading Edge line includes the Cyrix 486-SLC-based WinPro 486s and the Intel 486SX-based WinPro 486e series.

#### Trade-Offs

Zeos lets you choose from four standard LiteLine configurations. With 4MB of system RAM, 512K of video RAM, and a 107MB IDE hard drive, the 486SX-25 is \$1395; the SX-33 is \$1495. With 8MB RAM, 1MB of video RAM, and a 214MB IDE hard drive, the 486SX-25 is \$1695; the SX-33 \$1795. The systems have 5½- and 3½-inch floppy drives. At such bargain prices, home offices can snap up these space-saving PCs without breaking the bank.

In tests by PC World labs, we found them to be competent performers, with the SX-25 scoring above average in our application benchmark suite. For speed, all the systems have a 64K SRAM cache. They include the same monitor as more expensive Zeos PCs: a 14-inch super-VGA noninterlaced model, with 1024 by 768 resolution and a .28-millimeter (mm) dot pitch. And the LiteLine's firm keyboard response is impressive, MS-DOS 6.0 and Windows are preloaded.

When you're ready to upgrade, you'll discover a nice bonus when you open the PC: The five available 16-bit expansion slots are easily accessible. The systems, which provide a 16.25-by-16.5-inch footprint, have four bays (one empty). They also accept up to 32MB RAM using standard SIMMs.

#### **Leading Edge**

For small or home offices, Leading Edge's WinPro series offers easy plug-and-play setup. The manual is one of the most comprehensible we've seen, and software, including Microsoft Works, Microsoft Productivity Pack, and Quicken for Windows, is preloaded on hard drive models.

The WinPro 486 systems, which originally used the 25-MHz Cyrix 486SLC but should \$449 noninterlaced, .28mm-dotpitch, super-VGA model.

All models have five 16-bit expansion slots (three open) for upgrading.

be available in 33-MHz models by the time you read this, come in various configurations: with 2MB or 4MB (expandable to 16MB) of system RAM; a 107MB, 130MB, or 213MB hard drive; a 31/2- or both 31/2- and 54-inch floppy drives; and a 512K super-VGA controller. The two 4MB, dual-floppy standouts in the pack are the 1244 (130MB hard drive) and the 1264 (213MB hard drive) for \$1019 and \$1149, respectively. Monitors are sold separately; we suggest you get at least the

25, SX-33, DX-33, DX2-50, and DX2-66 systems that come with a Western Digital-based Windows accelerator. Their 4MB RAM expands to 32MB, and the 120MB hard drive upgrades to 260MB. These systems also sport six expansion slots (four open) and four drive bays (one open). The CPU sits in a 169-pin OverDrive socket, so you can upgrade SX and DX models to DX2 speeds. The SX-25 is \$1099 with a 120MB hard drive, \$1149 with a 170MB hard drive.

# **Toshiba Enhances Its Notebook Family**



TOSHIBA'S T4600C color notebook features an active-matrix display, Intel's 33-MHz 486SL processor, 4MB RAM, and two PCMCIA slots.

ow cost or top performance? That's the question Toshiba poses with its latest round of notebooks, including two additions to its bargain-priced Satellite family and two premium notes featuring Intel's powerstingy 486SL processor.

Toshiba's T1900 and T1900C Satellites offer interesting enhancements such as a PCMCIA expansion slot, a power-conserving 20-MHz 486SL processor, and a Microsoft BallPoint trackball that plugs into the side of the notebook.

With prices starting at around \$2000, the T1900 comes with 4MB of RAM (expandable to 20MB); an internal 80MB, 120MB, or 200MB hard drive; and a 9½-inch monochrome VGA display. A single PCMCIA slot can hold Type II cards such as fax-modems or LAN adapters, or larger Type III cards, including removable hard drives.

The T1900's nickel metalhydride (NiMH) battery provides over 3 hours of computing and charges in 2 hours, Toshiba says. This 6.4-pound note comes with DOS 6.0 and Windows 3.1 and features Microsoft's BallPoint trackball.

The T1900C has all the features of the T1900 but adds an enhanced passive color display with a faster response time and a wider viewing angle than Toshiba's previous passive-color display. Its NiMH battery runs for over 2 hours between charges and recharges in 2 hours. The T1900C is priced at around \$2600 and weighs just under 7 pounds.

Toshiba's extension of its T4500 family, the T4600 is available with a monochrome or active-matrix color display and Intel's 33-MHz 486SL processor, equal to a 486DX with built-in power management.

T4600 notes come with 4MB of RAM and either a 120MB or 200MB hard drive. They include two PCMCIA slots: a Type II slot and an oversized 16mm slot for today's remov-

# **Photo-Quality Color Printing Hits a Brilliant Price**

#### Kodak ColorEase PS

Near dye-sublimation-quality printing is now available at thermal transfer prices.

ntil recently, the color printer market was three-tiered. At the bottom were color ink jets, which are affordable (in the \$500 to \$3000 range) but are technically limited to producing solid blocks of color. Next came thermal wax transfer printers, which produce finer, more saturated colors than ink jets, but typically cost \$4000 or more.

The third tier, dye-sublimation printers, was reserved for graphics professionals with wads of cash—entry-level units cost about \$10,000. These printers produce continuoustone prints by vaporizing colored inks onto the page meaning no dots and no dithering—and the quality of their output can rival color photos.

Kodak's ColorEase PS printer breaks the \$10,000 barrier with a list price of \$7999, which puts it in the thermal transfer range. But its technology, which Kodak calls "thermal dye transfer," is closer to dye sublimation. Like a dye-sub printer, the ColorEase melds its translucent dyes into the paper or transparency film, instead of just laying them on the surface. The result: near-dye-sub quality.

So who needs this high-quality color printing? Anyone who wants to gain a competitive edge by incorporating superior color reproduction into report covers and flip charts, or anyone who currently pays a service bureau to produce 35mm slides for presentations. Desktop publishers and graphics departments are also prime candidates; the ColorEase could be

used to print proofs of a new brochure before a job is sent to an offset press for production.


The Kodak ColorEase uses three color ribbons: eyan, magenta, and yellow, which it combines to pro-

duce black. In the print samples we've seen, the blacks are solid; with many three-color printers, blacks have a washed-out brownish tint. Transitions between colors are smooth, with none of the obtrusive dithering patterns you see on output from thermal transfer printers and ink jets. The ColorEase rasterizes images at 300 dpi, but these dots are blended by the dye diffusion process.

Like dye-sublimation printers, the ColorEase requires expensive special paper and transparency media. Kodak estimates that paper and dye ribbons will add up to \$2 for each paper print and \$2.50 for each transparency.

The ColorEase is equipped with a 40-MHz Spare RISC processor, 16MB RAM, and a 120MB hard drive. The printer uses PostScript Level 2 and comes with 35 resident Adobe Type 1 fonts. It has serial, parallel, and LocalTalk ports.





# Full-Power UNIX on the PC: NeXTStep and Solaris



NEXTSTEP LIVES: NeXTStep for Intel offers a variety of object-oriented tools, many of them easing the job of developing software.

t's a sign of the times. As PCs get more powerful, they're beginning to compete with low-end UNIX workstations. And how are the companies that make UNIX workstations reacting to this? In the case of SunSoft and NeX'T, by bringing their UNIX-based operating systems to the PC.

#### **Taking the NeXTStep**

NeXT, whose distinctive black boxes were once considered the next step in computer evolution, is getting out of the hardware business. Instead, NeXT will focus on its UNIX-based

NeXTStep's object-oriented design earned the environment its reputation as the easiest for developing applications. With

that in mind, NeXT is primarily targeting NeXTStep for Intel processors at Fortune 500 MIS departments that are developing custom applications. There's a catch, however: Software developed in NeXTStep can only be run in NeXTStep.

Converting to the PC will require some expensive hard-ware—you'll need at least a 486DX with 8MB of RAM. If you want color graphics, you'll need a minimum of 16MB, with 24MB recommended (our review machine came with 32MB). The fully installed system requires 120MB of hard disk space.

NeXTStep has an easy and powerful GUI interface and ships with a number of miniapplications, including a low-end word processor; E-mail; a fax reader; and the complete known works of William Shakespeare, which provides a solid demonstration of NeXT's textretrieval engine.

NeXTStep for Intel is source code-compatible with the NeXT hardware version, so developers can support it by doing little more than recompiling their code. It's therefore safe to assume many applications will be available for both platforms. NeXTStep will ship with a demonstration version of Insignia's SoftPC, which will let you run DOS and Windows within NeXTStep for 20-minute periods. A real version will cost extra, although exact pricing wasn't set at press time.

#### **Computing Where the Sun Shines**

Meanwhile, SunSoft's Solaris operating system, which runs on the majority of RISC systems, is available for PCs.

As a minimum, Solaris for x86 requires a 33-MHz 386DX, a


math coprocessor, and 12MB of RAM. That sounds less demanding than NeXTStep for Intel, but the company recommends a 486DX with 16MB of RAM. Since the operating system is distributed only on CD ROM, you will need a drive for that as well.

Still, such a computer comes cheap compared with the highend workstations that Solaris was originally designed for. And Solaris for

SPARC workstations or PCs was never intended for the average user. Solaris for x86, like its RISC-based sibling, is designed for people who use work group-related, processorintensive applications such as CAD, or for multiuser, distributed processing such as client-server databases.

Thousands of such applications are available for Solaris, and many of them may be migrating to the x86 platform. Like NeXT, SunSoft has made this migration easy by designing the two versions to be sourcecode compatible.

What you won't find for Solaris is the wide variety of basic productivity applications, such as spreadsheets and word processors, available for DOS and Windows. But with Solaris for x86, you won't have to, since you'll be able to run DOS and



Windows through Solaris. Unlike with NeXTStep for Intel, there will be no extra charge.

These operating systems may hold little interest for the average PC user. But for the users who need this kind of power, PC versions can mean big savings in hardware.

hough DOS 6.0 offers memory management that will satisfy most users, true memory hounds will still seek third-party products, such as Qualitas's 386Max 7.0. This release tries to make life easier for anyone who wants to run DOS applications from Windows and frees more memory than DOS 6.0's MemMaker memory optimizing utility.

To run character-based DOS programs more efficiently within Windows, version 7.0 offers a DOSMax feature that frees up to 736K of conventional memory for these applications. The 736K comprises the standard 640K plus up to 96K normally reserved for graphics screens.

The product also supports virtual memory, a feature that lets some DOS apps running under Windows treat hard disk space as RAM. This gives applications that support the DOS Protected Mode Interface (DPMI) version 1.0 effective access to more memory than is actually in the system.


Another significant feature is designed for users of DOS 6.0's multiple boot feature, which lets you choose from among different system configurations at system start-up. To optimize multiple configurations with DOS 6.0's MemMaker, you must create separate

CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEX-EC .BAT files for each startup situation you might encounter, optimize each one, and then combine them into a single set of CONFIG.SYS and AUTOEXEC.BAT files.

This is a time-consuming and arduous task. 386Max 7.0, however, lets you create a single set of CONFIG.SYS and AUTO-EXEC.BAT files with all the configuration variations you want to choose from and then optimize it.

Finally, Qualitas claims that 386Max 7.0 can free up to 70K more base memory than DOS's MemMaker.

# **Instant Recipes for Frugal Desktop Publishers**

nyone who's ever cracked a desktop publishing package can tell you that creating tasteful documents is no picnic—unless you've got a program like Microsoft Publisher 2.0 to lend a helping hand. This \$199 package lets even DTP amateurs whip up great-looking newsletters, fliers, and reports.

The key ingredient is Microsoft's Page Wizard Design Assistants, on-line tutorials that step you through the process of creating a document. Select the Page Wizard for a newsletter, for example, and Publisher guides you through a series of screens from which you choose a style (such as classic or modern), the number of columns, page length, and other elements. Thumbnail images of each option and bite-size design tips help ease the decisionmaking process. Once you've made your selections, just add text and graphics, then stir. Voilà! Out pops a finished document, ready for printing.

Publisher 2.0 includes 17 Page Wizards plus 35 prefab templates.

Version 2.0 also mixes in a batch of new features, such as the capability to flow text around irregular objects automatically; define paragraph styles for fast global format changes; and link text between, say, a frame on page 1 and one on page 8. You also get a table editor, a logo-creation tool, and a clip art gallery. An improved version of WordArt, Publisher's type-manipulation utility, now supports TrueType fonts—a big improvement over those funky bit-mapped fonts in version 1.0. Publisher also supports the new OLE 2.0 specification for data links between applications.

To top it off, Microsoft tosses in 20 new True Type fonts along with a copy of its low-end Draw package and Note-It, a utility for annotating documents with Post-it-like notes. You can order Publisher for \$139 until December 31, or \$79 if you're upgrading from 1.0.

he first thing you notice about the new version of Micrografx Designer is its look. Users of version 3.0 will be impressed with the completely rewritten user interface: No more flat-looking primitive tools—4.0 is a looker. And the changes aren't just cosmetic.

The new interface will be comfortable for anyone who uses other Micrografx programs. There is the familiar hint line at the bottom of the screen that tells you what each tool does as you wave the mouse over it. And to keep the workspace tidy and sparse, each tool has its own associated workspace. Click on the selection tool, and the but-

ton bar changes to tools for editing. Select the drawing tool, and tools for drawing circles, polygons, and rectangles occupy the tool bar. Pick one of these drawing tools and the tool bar changes yet again: Pick the polygon tool, for example, and you get a new group of tools relating to polygons-including a nifty one that lets you create gear-like drawings very quickly by defining the number of sides you want, drawing a shape, and pulling the edge toward the center of the object.

Perhaps the snappiest new feature is the capability to draw three-dimensional objects. Simply click the 3-D tool, drag an outline in the document, and your 3-D object appears. You can rotate the object in three dimensions, adjust the direction and intensity of the light source, and control ambient light.

Text handling is also vastly improved. Designer will align text along a curve, fill text with symbols and blends, and stretch and warp it—and the text remains editable throughout. You can fill shapes with text and

link the text containers so that overflowing text pours from one shape to the next. It will even spell-check your drawings.

If you occasionally need to do bit-map editing, Micrografx has included a complete image editing program. If you have scanned images you want to include in drawings, bring them into Designer and trace them. It will change them to vector images to reduce file size and simplify resizing. Designer even does slide shows, complete with transition effects, a slide sorter, and a run-time player.



Object layers put each element in its own layer, so you can move one element without affecting the others. The screen becomes a collage of rearrangeable pieces.

The FastBits feature lets you edit a small area of a large image

quickly. From a grid, you preview an image and pick a section to load in memory and edit. Picture Publisher combines the section back into the image. A Low Res Image Open Option quickly applies editing changes, such as color correction, to a whole image. It allows you to open an image at a low resolution, which speeds work. When you've finished making corrections, they're stored as a macro, which can be applied later to the high-res image.

We found Picture Publisher 4.0 easy to use and suitable for nondesign professionals, thanks to helpful features such as thumbnail sketches that show color balance, contrast, and brightness. For more speed, a macro recording and playback feature can automate any function. The software also supplies an image browser that stores thumbnail images in albums, with search capabilities.

There is also a suite of new

high-end features—including the capability to open, edit and save CMYK (cyan, magenta, yellow, black) files—as well as improved masking and colorcorrection options. Picture Publisher's ease of use, speed, and cost make it a smart choice.

# **Morphing Your Presentations**

orphing—short for creating a metamorphosis—is the latest special effect to become available to PC business presenters. These complex transformations, popularized in Michael Jackson's *Black and White* video and Spielberg's *Jurassic Park*, can now be done on PCs using Gryphon Software's Morph.

Morph can turn an otherwise ordinary presentation into a dazzling display of creativity. For example, an architect's proposal transforms a dilapidated building into a renovated landmark. You can review the evolution of your product line from original to the latest prototype at 60 frames in 5 seconds.

To create a morph, all you need are two images and a little

imagination. Simply select key points you want transformed on the starting image, adjust the corresponding points that automatically appear on the ending image, then let Morph create the images in between until the first image smoothly blends into the last. You can check the progress of your morph frame by frame with Morph's playback viewer. Then specify the number of intervening frames between the start and end images and save entire transformations as AVI, FLI, or FLC movies for video or film output, or as Morph stills in TIFF, GIF, or Targa format.

The quality of your morph depends on how well you prepare your start and end images, both of which must be the same size and have at least a 72dpi resolution.

Individual morph frames take about 12 seconds to process on a 486DX2-66 with 8MB of RAM. Gryphon Software recommends at least a 386-class PC with 5MB RAM, an 800 by 600 display with 256 colors, and Video for Windows.





anaging personal finances just got easier. Kiplinger's CA-Simply Money tracks where you spend your money and advises you on how to manage it better.

The program offers financial advice that is both context- and goal-sensitive. You specify your goals. As you set up accounts or enter other information, you may trigger the product's advisor, which dispenses information based on the editors of the *Kiplinger Letter*; through a popup window.

The advice is as solid and useful as that given by your banker or CPA.

Like its competitors Quicken for Windows from Intuit and Microsoft Money, CA's program lets you track spending by filling out a check on screen and allocating it to an expense account. But CA-Simply Money is head and shoulders above the others at managing a portfolio of investment securities. Setting up an investment account lets you track capital gains, interest and dividend income, and expenses such as margin interest. You can dial up an on-line

database and automatically update your stock prices.

The icons in the program are attractive—with the exception of the shifty-looking advisor. They include miniature representations of credit cards, boats, and, of course, money. There are more than 200 you can choose from to represent your sources of income, expenses, and bank and credit card accounts visually.

A scheduler allows you to set up regular or one-time transactions in the future. These transactions could range from your regular monthly car lease payment to quarterly dividend receipts from your stocks.

CA-Simply Money is aptly named. It's easy to learn and help is readily available. If you float the cursor over an icon button, you'll see a line of help at the bottom of your screen. However, a few operations could be more intuitive. For example, to change an address for a payee, you must enter the setup portion of the program. It would be handier if you could simply click on the payee's icon and modify it directly.

If you want to manage your money more effectively and track your investments, CA Simply Money fills the bill.





axWorks Pro 3.0 is a fullfeatured Windows fax program that includes extensive file management, fast fax viewing, enhanced optical character recognition (OCR) and scanner support, and a cover sheet designer. The company

also built all the fax send and receive functions into Windows, tossing out the DOS TSR found in its popular FAXit product and previous versions of FaxWorks.

The highlight of this program is FaxTracker, which lets you

view any fax file; modify, resend, or combine it with other faxes for resending; and compress it to almost half its original size for storage.

FaxTracker includes an onscreen file cabinet for managing faxes. You can give fax files full names instead of trying to squeeze meaningful titles in DOS's restrictive eight-character limit, and create folders for storing those faxes. You can even attach up to three search keywords to each file.

#### **On-Screen Fax Preparer**

With FaxTracker and editing tools, SofNet aims to provide users with complete on-screen fax preparation. For example, a real-estate agent who wants to fill out and fax a Purchase and Sales agreement to a potential buyer can perform a search for the appropriate P&S form, fill it out on screen using the program's text editor, paste a signature to it, send it, and save and store the agreement.

SofNet claims its program will display and rotate faxes in less than a second. The company also added right- and left-land-scape rotations, a very handy tool for viewing spreadsheets—a feature lacking in FAXit. Fax-Works also lets you view thumbnails of as many faxes as can fit comfortably on screen.

FaxWorks Pro 3.0 includes an OCR engine from Calera, which lets the fax program scan a fax document and convert it to editable text. You can set it to launch your favorite word processor automatically and load the newly created text file. Since the OCR process can tie up your computer for up to several minutes for just one page of text, FaxWorks saves time by

Other welcome additions include support for the TWAIN scanner protocol and a cover sheet designer so users can design and create their own templates. FaxWorks' "cuecard" help system, similar to Macintosh help balloons, pops up a minibox of information on how to use whatever button or menu item your mouse cursor is passing over.

#### **DOS and Windows**

Do you leave Windows to work in DOS? You can use FaxWorks Pro 3.0 with FaxWorks 3.0 for DOS (\$64.99) and never miss a fax. These two programs work tightly together, sharing the same phone book and log of sent and received faxes. You can schedule a fax to send in Fax-Works for DOS, and later modify the same fax from FaxWorks Pro 3.0. For example, you can use WordPerfect for DOS to write a memo and use Fax-Works for DOS to schedule it for sending. You can then go back into FaxWorks Pro 3.0, view this document, and add your signature to it. The DOS version uses a TSR, but it is automatically unloaded and reloaded when switching between Windows and DOS.

mall businesses and professionals such as attorneys, contractors, and consultants often find keeping track of telephone expenses tedious. To the rescue comes CallCost, an ingenious hardware and software combination that stores time. date, and pricing information about your phone calls.

CallCost consists of DOS software and a small buffer box that plugs into your PC's serial port. You can plug one or two phone lines into the buffer box (or you can use up to four boxes

to support a maximum of eight phone lines). When you install the software, CallCost requests your local area code; it then tabulates the charges of your outgoing calls to any city in the United States.


You can create account codes

to assist in billing calls to your clients. Simply press a predefined code during an incoming or outgoing call to assign it to an account. Or you can assign a code to a group of phone numbers, which is useful in automatically flagging a client's calls, for instance.

CallCost's buffer box stores phone call information regardless of whether the program is loaded in RAM. However, you'll periodically need to upload the data from the buffer box. After uploading the data, CallCost's software creates a detailed report listing the date, time, number, destination, length, and cost of each call. CallCost also allows you to set up flat-rate fees for your telephone time (the default setting is \$1 per minute).

CallCost is priced at \$289 and includes the buffer box, an AC power supply, software, two standard phone cables, and a serial port cable. For small businesses and professionals, it could be a good call.

# **U.S. Robotics Rolls Out High-Speed PCMCIA Modems**

.S. Robotics has jumped on the PCMCIA bandwagon with three new credit card-size fax-modems, including two high-speed V.32bis models that operate at 14,400 bits per second (bps).

U.S. Robotics has two PCM-CIA designs. The first-the company's own design-uses a detachable DAA (also known as the RI-11 adapter, or phone connector) that plugs into the modem card. The second design was developed by PNB, a French modem manufacturer that was purchased by U.S. Robotics earlier this year.

Like PCMCIA modems from Intel, Toshiba, AT&T, Paradyne, and others, the PNB model features an external DAA cable that extends several inches from the modem's edge.

The PNB-designed modems come in two flavors: the World-Port 14,400 lists for \$649, and the WorldPort 2496 (2400-bps data/9600-bps fax) costs \$349.

The top-of-the-line World-Port HST Dual Standard PCM-CIA modem includes many features you'll find in the company's pricey Courier line. In addition to 14,400 performance, you get support for U.S. Robotics'

HST protocol, which allows data communications speeds of up to 16,800 between HSTcompatible modems.

The modem also supports cellular transmission (provided you have a cellular phone and interface) and includes Quick Connect, a proprietary feature that allows two U.S. Robotics Courier modems to connect within 5 seconds, as opposed to a normal handshaking period of up to 15 seconds.

Estimated performance ratings by processor




Estimated prices for Windows NT systems by CPU (with monitor, 16MB of RAM, 200MB or larger hard drive)







Thinking about taking the big plunge into equipping your own business or setting up your own office? Maybe you're pursuing a start-up opportunity or buying a system for your college-bound child. If so, you'll need a good, basic business PC—but your needs won't end there. To make a real splash, you'll need a printer and software, including DOS, Windows, and basic business applications. The need for these starter components hasn't changed much in the last few years—but what you get and how you buy it have.

This kind of purchase used to involve walking into a broad-based computer dealership where you could ask questions and be guided to a decision by knowledgeable staffers. One of the best things about the traditional dealership was its ability to bring together all the components you needed and provide solid advice on which ones to take home. that kind of hand-holding. You're more likely to have to do your own basic research. Then you'll find yourself alone on the phone with a direct vendor or stalking through the aisles of a membership warehouse, confronted with a bewildering array of options. That leaves you putting together a jigsaw puzzle whose pieces look so similar that it's hard to spot the difference between blue sky and deep water.

Today many PC vendors are offering complete start-up packages designed to fill the gap created by the diminishing role of the traditional dealer. But how can you expect to fare with them? To find out, we sent letters to an array of direct and distribution vendors, asking each company to assemble its perfect starter system. We specified a 486 CPU and set minimum system configuration parameters: 4MB of RAM, 54- and 34-inch floppy drives, an 80MB hard disk, VGA and a color monitor, a keyboard, a mouse, and DOS and Windows. We also required at least a basic dot matrix printer, along with word processing and spreadsheet software (allowing the supplier latitude to provide these in a single integrated package). We gave vendors the option of adding extras, as long as they kept close to our \$2500 price range.

### PCs, Printers, and Software

We received a total of 27 systems that successfully ran the gauntlet of our tough Windows, DOS, and compatibility tests. All the systems' processors came from Intel: 4 486SX-25s, 3 486SX-33s, 11 486DX-33s, 3 486DX2-50s, and 6 ultrahot 486DX2-66s.

Most of the printers were dot matrix models, with 2 low-end 9-pin units joining 17 24-wire printers. Seven vendors provided ink jet printers that offer better output quality, and Epson sent us its high-quality ActionLaser 1000 printer, a July *PC World* Best Buy.

When it came to software, most vendors sent integrated packages: Microsoft Works for Windows, Spinnaker's PFS:WindowWorks, or Lotus Works 3.0 for DOS. All these products will take care of simple word processing and spreadsheet tasks. In addition, they all provide a basic database. More experienced users, or those whose needs transcend the basics, will want a more sophisticated dedicated word processing or spreadsheet program.

Nine companies provided dedicated packages: Lotus's Ami Pro 3.0 paired with 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows, or WordPerfect 5.2 for Windows combined with 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows; Digital, Gateway, Insight, MIS, and Mitac provided Microsoft Word for Windows 2.0 and Excel 4.0 as part of Microsoft Office 3.0, which also includes PowerPoint for Windows 3.0 and Microsoft Mail. Hyundai provided Lotus Smart Suite for Windows 1.2, a robust package including 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows, Ami Pro 3.0, Freelance Graphics 2.0, Lotus Organizer for Windows 1.0, and cc:Mail for Windows 1.0.

### **Best Buys**



This month's mixed bag of Best Buy DX2 and DX-33 machines all have one thing in common: VESA local bus graphics accelerators to boost their performance. But in this race systems do not win by speed alone; check out the particulars and you'll find

other sterling characteristics such as excellent design and expandability, great service and support, or outstanding software bundles. For example, our foremost Best Buy, Micro Express, took top honors in both performance and service and support.

Software is usually an individual choice. If you're inexperienced with PCs, you're likely to choose the most popular applications or take whatever's handy. If you're already practiced with a package, you'll probably want to continue using it. In most cases, PC vendors offer a limited selection: They make arrangements with individual software publishers and don't usually offer competing applications. If a vendor doesn't provide the specific software you want or need, you're better off making the best hardware deal you can and then assembling your own application suite from discount outlets.

### An Affordable Start

With all the value packed into our starter systems, it's amazing how small a dent these bundles make in your bank account. Only two vendors, Gateway 2000 and Zeos, exceeded our \$2500 target price by more than 10 percent: Gateway's 4DX-33V model ran \$2859, and Zeos's 486DX-33 Upgradable came in at \$3006. To their credit, though, both companies added value well beyond the minimum in their storage capacities and software bundles. In general, big hard disks and dedicated applications add significantly to the cost of PC bundles, and their inclusion can save you hundreds of dollars. For

example, Microsoft Office alone costs \$450 on the street, even through a bare-bones discounter.

The low-price king is Computer Sales Professional's Pro 486DX/33. Equipped with 4MB of RAM, a 256K secondary RAM cache, a 160MB hard disk, a 24-pin dot matrix printer, Spinnaker's PFS:WindowWorks 2.0, and Intuit's Quicken for Windows 2.0, this system provides an impressive value at a mere \$1899.

### **Test-Driving the PCs**

Even when you're buying a bundle, the performance of the PC component is crucial. The computer is the centerpiece of your package and the most expensive part. Chances are you'll want to avoid upgrade expenses for a few years while you work with a system that provides all the power you need.

We measured the performance of all the PCs we received by pitting them against the PC World Test Center's tough suite of test applications, starting with our Windows group and finishing with the DOS-heavy BAPCo SYSmark92. The systems' performance rankings yielded few surprises, with 486DX2-66s and 486DX2-50s locking up the top 9 positions in overall performance. The next 14 positions were taken by 33-MHz 486DXs and 486SXs, and the final 4 slots went to 486SX-25s.

One minor problem emerged from our testing, as a few machines showed anomalous results on the BAPCo SYSmark92 test. Test results on the Harvard Graphics 3.0 test only, which includes several print jobs sent to a null printer, were very slow for PCs with a June 92 AMI BIOS. Control tests with a real printer installed indicated a still noticeable degradation of performance. All but one vendor, Swan, sent a replacement BIOS version. Each of the upgraded systems showed a marked performance improvement on the Harvard Graphics 3.0 test. We could not detect a statistically significant impact on performance with other applications.

### **Upgrade Issues**

While you won't want to be forced to upgrade soon after buying a system, it's important to have a clear idea of your upgrade options. All the motherboards support a system clock that users can adjust or replace, and every PC is capable of accepting an Intel OverDrive for SX or OverDrive for DX. Not all CPU upgrades make sense; for example, if your PC is a 486DX2-50, a move to 66 MHz may not increase speed enough to warrant the cost.

If you want to ensure practical upgradability with your DX2 system, buy one that comes with the new 238-pin socket that will accept the forthcoming Intel OverDrive for DX2. Only two of the DX2 systems reviewed have these sockets: the 50-MHz Canon Innova 486 and Axik Ace Cache 486DX2-50V. But five 33-MHz systems have the OverDrive for DX2 socket: the Dell 433s/L, Eltech 4330, Insight 486-33VL Starter System, Polywell 486SX-33VZ, and Zeos 486DX-33 Upgradable. If you like a 486DX2 system and it lacks the 238-pin socket, however, remember that DX2 speed means you're less likely to need a performance upgrade.

### **Configuration Counts**

Configuration is also an important factor in ensuring good performance. Most of the systems came with our 4MB minimum RAM requirement, but the Blackship, Gateway, and ZDS systems came with 8MB. If you plan to use Windows, either buy your system with

8MB installed or extend your memory with standard SIMMs after purchase. You'll reap big benefits in increased task-switching speed and in improved performance with multiple applications.

A secondary memory cache complements the 8K internal RAM cache built into every Intel 486 and extends another healthy boost in speed. It seems that vendors agree: Only four—AST, Canon, Epson, and ZDS—sent systems without a secondary RAM cache installed. Previous PC World Test Center control tests indicate that a secondary cache boosts a system's performance by 7 to 10 percent in typical business applications. So we generally advise buying a system with at least 64K of secondary cache. Nine vendors sent PCs with 256K secondary caches, and all our Best Buys came with a 128K or larger secondary cache.

Storage needs must be evaluated carefully. Let's face it: It's expensive to add a second hard disk after purchase. Only Silicon

Valley sent a hard disk smaller than 100MB; its 80MB drive, while within our minimum, will pinch most users. At the high end, nine vendors sent 200MB or larger hard disks, with AST providing the largest, a big 240MB Western Digital Caviar 2250.

### Expandability

You need enough slots and drive bays to accommodate your peripherals. Most users will need a total of four bays, one internal and three externally accessible, and four or five free expansion slots. Your own situation may differ, however, and it's worth thinking out your future needs. Better now than after you've bought the wrong PC! Pay a lot of attention to how many externally accessible bays you have, especially if you decide to take our advice and add a tape backup drive and possibly a CD ROM drive. If you're pinched for bays, you can always buy external drives—if you're ready to pay a

Acma has been a rock-steady player in recent reviews, and the 486/33 Starter Package is no excep-

tion; at \$2195, it's one of this review's price leaders. The system provides a business-standard 33-MHz 486DX CPU, a 64K secondary RAM cache, and a 120MB Conner CP-30104H hard disk. The Acma's overall performance didn't deal us any surprises, shuffling out square in the middle of the 33-MHz pack and middle-of-the-road overall. On the DOS-heavy BAPCo SYSmark92 test, however, the system's 512K caching disk controller helped; only one 33-MHz machine turned in a better score.

There's plenty of room for peripherals in its five free full-length slots, but with just one free externally accessible drive bay, you may feel a pinch. The bundle is respectable considering the price: You get Panasonic's 24-pin KX-P2123 printer and a color kit.

Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0, a basic but functional integrated package, provides word processing, spreadsheet, database, drawing, and charting functions. Acma went so far as to throw in two boxes of floppies, a ream of printer paper, a surge protector, and a printer stand.

Service and support are reliable, including a year of free on-site service and toll-free technical support. The tech staff is generally responsive and competent, although we had to wait once for them to call back. Acma doesn't get a Best Buy this time; there are better overall deals. But bargain hunters will find this package tempting.

with Silicon Valley's 66-MHz 486DX2 Turbo VESA for second in overall performance? The Amax 486DX2/50 VESAmax beat out four other 66-MHz DX2s, and only the amazing Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66 passed them (and all the other PCs here), taking a decisive 24 percent edge over this fast 50. Granted, this is a VESA local bus system with 256K of secondary RAM cache. More important, Amax complemented the Diamond Stealth 24VL local bus video accelerator with a 2MB local bus caching hard disk controller.

This big tower has room to spare inside, and its complement of five free full-length slots and five available bays adds up to plenty of growing room, although its 200MB Conner CP-30204 hard drive should mean you won't need to upgrade soon. Amax's bundle does leave something to be desired: Its 9-pin Panasonic 1180i printer is disappointing, since business users will want at least a 24-pin model to produce acceptable letter-quality correspondence. Like many other vendors, Amax provided the solid, basic Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0.

Service and support policies look fine at first, with the lack of a toll-free support line the one glaring exception. Saturday hours, a two-day service turnaround, and a year of TRW on-site service for a reasonable \$69 sound very good. Unfortunately, Amax's lack of responsiveness diminished an otherwise pretty fair rating. We had to make repeated attempts to get our questions answered, and a number of our calls went unreturned. Amax's bundle still rates as a solid value, primarily because of the system's blazing speed. But if support response is on your list of essentials, you'll have to find it elsewhere.

premium of \$100 or more over an internal drive and give up desk space that may already be tight.

### **Putting It in Print**

If you haven't used a lot of different printers, you have to understand that all printers are *not* created equal. Start by making a realistic assessment of your needs. Do you require speed? High output quality? The ability to handle multipart invoices?

If you have to pump out reams of letter-quality hard copy, bite the bullet and shell out the extra bucks for a laser printer. While an ink jet printer can give you quality that's hard to distinguish from laser output, it can't match laser printer speed. But if fast output isn't essential, ink jets are hard to resist. If your budget's tight or your application demands an impact printer (for example, to print multipart forms), you'll have to give up some speed and quality and buy a dot

matrix printer. Demand a 24-pin model; 9-wire models are really not suitable for business correspondence.

Because they are much less expensive, printers are less important in our ratings than the PC they accompany. And printer choices didn't distinguish themselves among our Best Buys; Insight provided the best among the five: the Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer.

### Keeping Service in the Picture

Service and support issues are perhaps even more essential to the start-up buyer than they are to a major corporation. After all, big businesses have staff dedicated to maintaining and repairing PCs. Warranties on the systems reviewed here vary from one year to the impressive two-year coverage offered by Micro Express, Silicon Valley, and Swan. More companies are extending their labor warranties; for example, Polywell repairs its equipment free of labor charges for

Customers look to AST for quality and reliability and take comfort in the company's enduring presence among the top ten PC vendors. The bundle of applications AST combined with this 486DX-33 system is first-tier too: 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows, Ami Pro 3.0, Delrina WinFax Lite, a fax-modem, and a 24-pin Epson ActionPrinter 5000. Not a bad lineup for a bundle that sells for \$2308 on the street!

The Advantage Plus 486DX/33 was not among the fleetest, however, although it has storage and expandability in its 240MB hard disk, five free slots, and two free externally accessible drive bays.

This is an attractive package. AST's classy software bundle and large hard disk add big value to this system, and all you have to do to beef up the performance is order it with 8MB of RAM and 64K or more of secondary RAM cache.

If you're looking for a bundle that delivers quality components, a fine printer, and one of the best prices

in this roundup, ATS's AMI 486-33 system should grab your attention. This roomy half-size tower unit uses a 33-MHz 486DX set in an American Megatrends (AMI) mother-board. The bundled Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 is adequate, but we were really impressed to find a near-laser-quality Hewlett-Packard DeskJet 500 printer tossed in with a \$2195 bundle.

ATS installed a 120MB Western Digital Caviar 2120 hard disk, and there's room left to add three externally accessible drives and two internal drives. Seven free full-length slots should meet any desktop user's need for peripherals expandability.

ATS has an outstanding labor warranty of four years to complement the one-year protection on parts. But a year's on-site service policy is rather pricey at 10 percent of the cost of the system, and when you call tech support, you pay the toll. We have no bones to pick with the support itself, as the responsiveness was superb and our questions were answered with remarkable courtesy and accuracy. We'd like to see a toll-free line, of course, and a less expensive charge for on-site service. Still, the quality of components and the fine printer make this economy-priced package a real bargain.

winning hand, with a Best Buy payoff wrapped up in its fast, eminently upgradable system. The performance of this 50-MHz PC was good enough to score in the top 25 percent of systems overall, beating

an amazing five years, and ATS covers labor charges for four years. More than 80 percent of the vendors provide a year of on-site service for their PCs for \$100 or less, and 17 throw it in free with purchase—an extra comfort for the start-up buyer. As for printer support, check with vendors when you buy your bundle; some will provide it and some will send you to the printer vendor.

For most minor support problems, you need fast, accurate advice—and you should be able to get it without having to make a toll call. Only Amax, ATS, Quill, and Silicon Valley lack toll-free support lines. We base our tech support evaluations on company policies and on calls we make simulating technical problems. Because of the human factor, responsiveness and accuracy tend to vary from review to review. This time Micro Express, Axik, Blackship, MIS, Dell, and Computer Sales Professional proved to be the cream floating to the top.

### Huge Values in the Top Bundles

As the most expensive component in our starter bundles, the PC system was the largest single factor in our evaluation. And we were delighted by the kind of PC bargains we received. Our top overall value, the Best Buy Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66, is a 66-MHz local bus machine with the fastest performance overall. Micro Express threw in a big 2.5MB caching controller and a generous 200MB hard disk, and with the ME 486-VL/DX2/66's reasonable \$2299 price, there's plenty of room left under our \$2500 target to allow an upgrade from its pedestrian 9-pin printer. Furthermore, the company's service and support rating topped the chart, just as it did in June ("486s for \$1250").

Mitac made a big-time showing in our review as well, with its 66-MHz 486DX2-based D4466R. This nimble Best Buy just missed the top five in overall performance and placed near the top on a


one 66-MHz PC. If your needs grow and you want more speed, just flip the lever on the 238-pin ZIF socket, extract the DX2, crank up the clock, and insert Intel's forthcoming OverDrive for DX2. As it is, Axik wrings plenty from this 486DX2-50 by providing a 256K secondary RAM cache and a 1MB caching local bus hard disk controller.

Axik's motherboard has three VESA slots: One is taken by the drive controller, a second by the Diamond Stealth 24VLB graphics accelerator, and a third is free. Four other 16-bit slots and five free drive bays provide plenty of capacity for peripherals. Axik ensures you won't run out of hard disk space soon by providing a capacious 160MB Conner CP-30174 hard drive.

Design is one factor that separates top-tier manufacturers from vendors who just assemble systems from third-party components. Open a Compaq, Dell, or Hewlett-Packard box, and you'll immediately be struck by the easy access of important components. While Axik doesn't manufacture its own cases, it does a superior job of integrating components. The result is a PC that's a dream to expand, whether you're adding memory or peripherals.

Service and support are also winners with Axik, tying with Blackship for second by providing a year of free on-site service, a two-day service turnaround policy, toll-free support even on Saturdays, and BBS and fax support. Best of all, we found no fault with Axik's responsiveness or accuracy. This system doesn't come with a delectable array of bundled goodies—just vanilla Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 and the 24-pin Panasonic KX-P2123. But Axik hits the jackpot in the fantastic value of its fast, super-upgradable PC.

Blackship does a superb job of showing how best to spend your money to fit an

application-and wins a Best Buy in the process with its BLK 486/33 LB bundle. For a reasonable \$2495, Blackship provides an attractive package. While the 24-pin Panasonic KX-P1124i is just a good basic printer, 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows and WordPerfect for Windows 5.2 are high-class apps. Blackship got fine performance out of this 486DX-33 minitower system by putting together an optimum configuration: 8MB of RAM, 256K of secondary RAM cache, an Orchid Fahrenheit VLB VESA graphics accelerator, and even a local bus drive adapter to run its 160MB Conner CP-30104H hard drive. As a result, its overall speed surpassed all except two other 33-MHz PCs, and it wound up just 16 percent behind the 66-MHz leader on our Excel 4.0 spreadsheet benchmark.

Despite its thoughtful configuration, this system is by no means maxed out. The upgrade path extends to 66-MHz OverDrive for DX, and its two free externally accessible drive bays and six free slots give you room to grow. Service and support are wonderful, tying with Axik for second position with a year of free on-site service; a two-day service turnaround policy; prompt, correct toll-free support; and BBS and fax support. Considering the great software bundle, intelligent configuration, fine performance, and super service, how could we *not* recommend this outstanding Best Buy?

### Canon Innova 486





The Canon Innova 486 is a bargain compact workstation—priced at an incredible \$1934, which includes

number of benchmarks. Mitac placed its software bundle among the best, offering the classy and complete Microsoft Office 3.0 with its impressive array of useful business applications. Blackship's Best Buy 486DX-33 BLK 486/33 LB also made a terrific impression. The company tied with Axik for second place in service and support, and Blackship's combination of the popular WordPerfect 5.2 for Windows and Lotus's 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows makes for a software offering that's hard to resist.

Insight's Best Buy 486-33VL Starter System was another smash hit. This 486DX-33 provides an affordable VESA local bus package with an impressive bundle, including Microsoft Office 3.0 and a Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer. Our fifth Best Buy is from Axik: Its Ace Cache 486DX2-50V comes with an appealing combination of 50-MHz 486DX2 performance and great service. Like the Insight Best Buy, this local bus system offers an upgrade path to the forth-

coming Intel OverDrive for DX2.

Whether you're treading the entrepreneur's road to riches or sprucing up your skills with a retraining course, you can't get going these days without PC assistance. Longtime PC users reminisce about the heyday of the full-service dealers. But these dealers lost their foothold as a result of powerful competition from vendors like the ones in this review. And the values you'll find here outmatch anything the old-line dealers ever had to offer.

modem, Delrina WinFax Lite, and the excellent Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer. But you get only three free expansion slots and one free drive bay. The system does come with a substantial 160MB Conner CP-30174E hard disk.

Canon's Innova bundle is wrapped around a 33-MHz 486SX processor; this is a reasonably quick CPU that will equal a 486DX-33 in any application that doesn't require a coprocessor. That means that you can easily handle light spreadsheet work; if you have to build big, recalculation-heavy worksheets, however, you'd better stick with a DX or DX2. This particular model

lagged a little in our tests: Only 3 of the 14 33s ran our benchmarks more slowly. If you decide you really want next-generation speed, this system has a 238-pin Intel Over-Drive for DX2 socket. Just be careful about moving this PC around when you have the top off; the case must be closed to provide real rigidity.

Service and support are basically good, with one full year of on-site service provided at no extra charge, dependable toll-free technical support, and BBS support. All in all, this setup is a pretty fair value—but only for those installations that have limited need for growth.

### Late List Prices

Our late list price research for this review occurred near the anniversary of last summer's earthshaking, price-slashing announcement from Compaq that sent PC prices everywhere through the floor. In a year's time, prices have settled and remain low. Only seven systems in this review showed changes.

At press time Zenith Data Systems had upgraded its standard Z-466X+ model to include a 256K secondary cache and raised the price to \$2922, \$240 more than the model sent us for review.

fourth place overall, joining a tight pack of systems clustered in positions two through six—that started about 24 percent behind the extraordinarily fast Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66 and varied less than 4 percent from each other. A 256K secondary RAM cache, integrated local bus video, and a 160MB Western Digital Caviar hard disk are all desirable features on a starter system, and CompuAdd Express included the fine Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer. The software selection is not quite as strong: You must choose among Lotus Organizer, 1-2-3 for Home, Lotus Write, or Lotus Works, an unintegrated DOS package.



slots and three drive bays free. Two other externally accessible bays are occupied by the receptacle for an optional 60MB removable hard drive, a choice you'll appreciate if you plan to generate high-security data that needs off-site storage.

CompuAdd Express offers a year of free on-site service and toll-free tech support.

At press time, the company informed us of plans to enhance this product line with a local bus IDE adapter and a 238-pin Over-Drive for DX2 ZIF socket. The new line will be called Centura and should replace the current models by the time you read this. This sounds like a good improvement to an already solid package.

Computer Sales Professional has you covered. The Pro 486DX/33 gives you 33-MHz 486DX power, a 256K secondary RAM cache, a 160MB Western Digital Caviar 1170 hard disk, a no-frills 24-pin Panasonic KX-P1124i printer, Spinnaker's basic PFS:WindowWorks 2.0, and Intuit's popular Quicken for Windows for just \$1899 direct. Not bad for a system with STB Power-Graph VL-24 VESA local bus video, especially considering that the no-surprises performance figures ended up right where you'd expect, in the middle of the pack.

This midsize tower model has plenty of room for peripherals, with one free VESA slot and four free 16-bit slots. Want to add drives? Not a problem: You have three bays free that will take an externally accessible drive and another five free bays inside the case. Even the accessibility is good. CSP placed a heat sink with a cooling fan on top of the 486DX-33: While it's probably not necessary on this relatively cool-running CPU, it'll help when you decide to upgrade to a 66-MHz OverDrive in the future.

Whether buying a pricey system or an inexpensive one, good support is a must. And CSP gave us no cause for concern. The year of free on-site service, terrific one-day service turnaround, and 12-hours-a-weekday toll-free support combines with outstanding responsiveness, accuracy, and a 45day money-back guarantee to win Computer Sales Professional a service icon. Power users will want a stronger spreadsheet and word processor, and the printer included is pretty basic. Balanced against these factors, however, is another plus: Many home offices will be able to use Quicken for Windows to keep their books. If you have to keep your expenditure under \$2000, this is your best deal here.

CompuTrend's Premio VL486DX2-66 66-MHz local bus system is a good performer, but it took longer than any other 486DX2-66 system to complete our benchmarks. That surprised us at first: The system has a 256K secondary RAM cache, and even two 50-MHz machines were faster. When we popped the top, we noticed that Compu-Trend had installed a standard 16-bit Western Digital Paradise graphics accelerator rather than a VESA card. CompuTrend reasons that the 16-bit board keeps initial costs down while allowing a future upgrade to a 32-bit accelerator. Unfortunately, that hurts graphics performance now and increases vour eventual cost.

The case has room for two additional externally accessible drives, and everything is well laid out inside. This rosy picture is flawed by a deficiency in the way Compu-Trend installs its tiny motherboard, however. The end where the VL extensions and CPU socket reside is completely unsupported. We shudder to think of the stress and flexing the motherboard will endure every time you insert a VESA card. Placing peripherals in the other four free slots, however, shouldn't cause undue strain.

Service and support is good, although we received incorrect answers to some of our inquiries. The one-day service turnaround policy is great, a year of on-site service runs \$140, and it's easy to get a technician on the toll-free support line. The software bundle is the solid and basic Microsoft Works for Windows, and CompuTrend supplies the good Panasonic KX-P1123 24-pin printer. Actually, this package presents a solid overall value, but it's marred by the flimsy support of the motherboard, so we can't encourage you to go out and buy it.







thumbscrews, and externally accessible drives snap in and out without your having to twist any screws at all. Even the motherboard is installed with quick-release attachments. And the well-conceived design extends to every facet; as always, you have perfect access to every component. The 486SX-33 system has its cache filled out to 128K, and it's surprisingly quick. Among the 33-MHz machines, only Gateway's pricey 4DX-33V beats the 433s/L on overall performance. And the Dell really turned our heads on our Paradox benchmark, with a third-place finish just 24 percent slower than the blazing 66-MHz Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66. That's outstanding performance from a system without a caching controller or local bus drive control. And you're definitely not at a dead end when it comes to upgrades: You can go either to a 66-MHz OverDrive CPU or use the 238-pin socket as a future home for an Intel OverDrive for DX2.

This system has integrated local bus video. and Dell bundled Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 along with a nice 24-pin Epson LQ-570 printer. Expandability is not this system's strong point, however. Although you shouldn't feel a storage pinch with the 160MB Western Digital Caviar 2170 hard disk, you had better pick the next drive you

add carefully, because you have only one bay left. Fortunately, it will accept an externally accessible drive. The peripherals picture is similarly darkened by the limitation of just three free expansion slots.

Sometimes it seems Dell wrote the book on providing great service, and its superb, free on-site service seems old hat now precisely because Dell was the first to offer it so long ago. The company provides 24-hour technical support seven days a week for this model. Do the technicians answer promptly and give correct advice? You bet. Does all this add up to a service icon for Dell? Of course. But despite this machine's superb design and great service, its limited expandability keeps us from giving it an A+ as a starter system-we'd suggest buying a more expandable model.

Digital puts out an attractive software bundle for the start-up buyer. Its DECpc 425sx LP offering comes with Microsoft Office 3.0, which includes Word for Windows 2.0, Excel 4.0, PowerPoint for Windows 3.0, and Microsoft Mail. The high-quality dedicated word processor, super spreadsheet, and fine presentation graphics package should be a big help to just about any start-up business. The DECwriter 95 24-pin printer completes the bundle in respectable fashion,

> and Digital Equipment outfitted this system with a 128K secondary RAM cache as well as a 120MB Digital hard disk.

> The Digital 25-MHz 486SX DECpc could not match the standard of performance set by

the lion's share of systems in this review, however. As you might expect, all four of the 486SX-25s wound up at or near the bottom on every speed test. Furthermore, this system looks as if it's aimed more toward a LAN environment than a home office. There are only three free slots, one free internal bay, and no place to put a tape backup or CD ROM drive.

One factor Digital really scores on is buyer confidence. For most buyers, there's no question that a company with Digital's reputation and longevity in business will be there to support them. It's hard to put a price on that kind of security. When you buy this package, you get a two-year warranty on the printer to complement the year of protection for the PC. The company provides the first year of on-site service free

and toll-free technical support. Responsiveness could have been better this time, and some of the advice we got strayed a bit from the mark. Looking at this deal as a whole, we love the great software offering. But a PC with this little expandability will be of limited use in most start-up circumstances, and you can buy other systems with similar bundles and much faster processors.

We must admit we had more fun with Eltech's setup than with many faster machines that came

bundled with burly business apps. The \$2299 Eltech 4330 is not only priced well, it's a multimedia PC par excellence. This 33-MHz 486DX system comes with a Sony CD ROM drive; a Thunder Media sound board; CS-150 speakers; and a mess of software on CD ROM, including Microsoft Bookshelf, Works for Windows, and a variety of audio software and games. If you find enough time in between playing with the CD ROM applications, you can print something on the nice 24-pin Panasonic KX-P1123 printer. Eltech even supplied an internal fax-modem.

When you get inside, you'll find a pretty businesslike box, with an upgrade path all the way to Intel OverDrive for DX2 ensured by the 238-pin ZIF socket. As configured, however, the system fell on the lower end of the 33-MHz section of the performance scale despite its 128K of installed secondary cache. The 120MB Maxtor 7120 (AT) hard drive should be adequate for most start-up users.



are good: The three-day service turnaround policy is pretty fair, and the toll-free technical support, available weekdays during business hours, yielded outstanding help. There's no on-site service option, however. Eltech has been working to recover from the Chapter 11 protection it sought last fall, and the fact that the company is still taking orders and shipping products speaks well for its potential to survive. It's encouraging to see the company continue to produce enjoyable and useful products.

The best printer in this review by far is the excellent ActionLaser 1000, which Epson tossed in as part of its \$2316 Equity 4SX/25 package. This printer is so good that it earned a Best Buy in July. Epson also bundled Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 as an all-in-one solution.

The PC box itself is a trim, handsome design that's brand-new and incorporates a ZIF socket to accommodate its 25-MHz 486SX CPU. That translates into a very easy upgrade path to OverDrive for DX; unfortunately, the system as configured significantly underperformed every PC in our review, even the other 25-MHz machines.

Expandability is a problem with this PC as well, as both of the externally accessible drive bays and the internal one are already taken up by the two floppy drives and the 120MB Conner CP-30104H hard disk. Having four free expansion slots isn't bad, although one of them is obstructed by the 4MB SIMM. You would need to save this position for a short card, such as an internal

modem, because even a half-card won't fit.

Service is decent: Epson provides a year of free on-site service, two-day service turnaround, and toll-free support. Although we wistfully dream of hooking up to a great printer such as the ActionLaser 1000, with all the fast, expandable systems in this review, even the ActionLaser can't make us ignore this system's shortcomings.

#### Gateway 2000 4DX-33V



Even some top vendors seem unable to keep technical support response up to snuff lately. For several reviews, we've had trouble getting through on Gateway's toll-free lines, although representatives tell us that phone staff has grown to 200 and the company is adding 15 technicians a week. Support promptness is crucial, however, and Gateway's formerly superb ratings have plunged. On the positive side, Gateway offers a year of free on-site service and lifetime phone, BBS, and fax tech support.

Gateway's \$2859 package comes with 8MB of RAM, a 160MB Western Digital Caviar 2170 hard disk, Microsoft Office 3.0, a utilities collection, and a 24-pin Panasonic KX-P2123 with a color kit.

This local bus 486DX-33 was the fastest 33-MHz machine overall. If you don't need a coprocessor, you can save \$150 and get comparable performance with Gateway's 4SX-33V—or pay \$50 more to bump speed up a notch with the coprocessor-equipped 4DX2-50V. Despite its high price, this bundle's quality makes for a deal that really turns us on. We're hoping we can soon say the same once again for Gateway's support.

#### Hyundai 433DP



Is a poor-response bug sweeping the PC business? If so, Hyundai seems to have been bitten. We were unable to get through on multiple tries, but when we finally made a connection, a technician answered our question correctly after just 5 minutes on hold. We can't kick about the rest of Hyundai's service picture: An 18-month system warranty, a year of free on-site service, toll-free weekday tech support, two-day service turnaround, and BBS and fax support all sound good.

The compact, low-rise Hyundai 433DP comes with a 128K secondary cache, a capacious 200MB Conner CP-30204 hard drive, and integrated local bus video. As with most small boxes, you're pinched for storage expansion, and only one drive bay is free. But four slots remain free, even with Hyundai's fax-modem installed, although only two accept full-length cards. And a future CPU upgrade would be a snap thanks to the ZIF CPU socket.

This package really shines in its software bundle, which is so bright that you can hardly see it all at once: You get Lotus SmartSuite for Windows 1.2, which includes 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows, Ami Pro 3.0 for Windows, Freelance Graphics for Windows 2.0, cc:Mail for Windows 1.0, and Lotus Organizer for Windows 1.1—along with a nice 24-pin Epson LQ-570 printer. Now that's a setup that should really get you started. While this system lacks storage expandability, its super application bundle makes it hard to resist. Imagine how attractive it would be if it were paired with prompt technical support.

Ooohs and aaahs aside, what can you say about a communications product that combines incredible flexibility with the awesome performance and rock-solid reliability of OS/2\*? You might say it's ... dynamic. Inspired would be equally appropriate.

TalkThru for OS/2 provides powerful, easy-to-use terminal emulation and file transfer capabilities. Since it was designed for OS/2, it functions in a graphical environment

> that really makes the most of the object-oriented Workplace Shell." And by taking advantage of OS/2's

32-bit architecture and true, preemptive multitasking,



you can work in other applications without interrupting your communications session.

Along with advanced communications capabilities like DDE, you also get AUTOPILOT - TalkThru's own full-function programming language for building communicationsbased workstation applications. There's support for IBM, HP, DEC (including VT 340) and most other major emulation protocols. File transfer is possible through X, Y and ZMODEM, IBM IND\$FILE, KERMIT and CompuServe B. And TalkThru supports the IBM EHLLAPI interface, providing access to outside services, non-IBM hosts and asynchronously connected hosts from any development language, such as REXX or VISUAL BASIC.

Of course, to really understand how much TalkThru for OS/2 has to offer, you have to see it in action. That'll speak much louder than



Insight put it all together this time-and the result is one of the most irresistible Best Buy combos

here. This 486DX-33 has a 128K secondary RAM cache, a 200MB Western Digital Caviar 2200 hard drive, and local bus video and drive adapters. The compact desktop case has room for two more externally accessible drives, and you get four full-length slots. Performance lands in the middle overall, but on the upper arc of the 33-MHz curve. And if you need to step up your speed in the future, you'll be able to make an easy move to a 66-MHz OverDrive or a giant step to OverDrive for DX2, thanks to the nifty 238-pin ZIF socket.

We really got excited when we unpacked the terrific Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer, Microsoft Office 3.0's wealth of applications, Dr. Solomon's Anti-Virus Toolkit, Stacker 2.0, and MirrorFax by SoftKlone to complement Insight's fax-modem. It's hard to believe Insight can stuff all these goodies into a package that costs just \$2499.

Insight's accurate, responsive toll-free phone support is available 24 hours a day on weekdays, 10 hours a day on weekends. Insight doesn't offer an on-site service option, however, preferring to plow its resources into its fine technical support. Although Insight doesn't specify a turnaround policy, it promises to make every effort to get service jobs back out the door in 48 hours. So what do we have here? A great PC, a slew of super software, a free modem, a terrific printer, and (you guessed it) a Best Buy.




Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66 is a 66-MHz 486DX2, but how does it beat five other 66s and three 50s by 24 percent or more on overall performance? Well, this system not only has a 256K secondary cache and a 200MB Western Digital Caviar 2200 hard drive; it also has a 2.5MB SuperIDE caching controller and an ATI/VLB Mach32 local bus graphics accelerator. You won't lack for growing room, either, with five free slots-including one VESA local bus slot and four free drive bays.

Micro Express winds up with the top service and support rating too. Its excellent tech support department is ready 24 hours a day; technicians are paged after business hours. The PC warranty lasts two years, and a year of on-site service costs just \$50. The rest of the bundle is less imposing. We suggest spending an extra \$75 to upgrade from the 9-pin printer to a 24-pin Panasonic KX-P2123. Although Spinnaker's PFS:Window-Works and PFS:Publisher for Windows are serviceable, they're not top of the line.

Micro Express has won Best Buys in a number of past reviews, and as in June, it rules the roost as the top-ranked Best Buy here. Let's face it, you won't buy this bundle for its applications or printer-you can find better. But if you want fantastic service and support backing an incomparable system that's so fast it could almost have won without any help-here it is.

MIS really delivers on service and support. A lot of companies here can match or better a year of on-site

service for a reasonable \$20 and toll-free support available 10 hours a day on weekdays, but only two others provide a one-day service turnaround policy. Where MIS really stands out is on its snappy and unerring responses to all our technical inquiries. MIS's service and support are so good, in fact, that it really lifts the value of this setup.

The biggest handicap the M4SX has to overcome is its pedestrian 486SX-25 CPU. You could get more out of this PC by boosting the RAM to 8MB and installing a larger secondary cache, but performance will still be limited by the 25-MHz processor. MIS did include a solid Diamond SpeedStar 24X video accelerator and a quality 120MB Quantum ProDrive ELS. We're just afraid you'll feel the need too soon to take the OverDrive upgrade path to 66 MHz.

We did notice one design flaw: The corner of the motherboard under the CPU socket is poorly supported. Fortunately, the ZIF socket mitigates this oversight. And MIS's bundle is outstanding. Microsoft Office 3.0 includes Word for Windows 2.0, Excel 4.0, PowerPoint for Windows 3.0, and Microsoft Mail. You also get BitCom and BitFax for DOS, a fax-modem, and Panasonic's fine KX-P1124i 24-pin dot matrix. That makes for a terrific starter packageespecially at the moderate \$2395 price. But as with the other 25-MHz systems, we suspect you'll be dissatisfied with performance.

Mitac has put together a quick, well-designed system and combined it with a dynamite starter

bundle. Does that sound like a Best Buy to you? It does to us! With its torrid 486DX2-66 CPU and 256K secondary RAM cache, this PC ended up right on the border of the Best Five in overall performance, with a consistent showing on all tests and an outstanding second place on Word for Windows, just 7 percent behind the leader.

The Mitac box sports a convenient cover that you simply lift off the top-forget having to fiddle around in the back every time you want to add an expansion card. One look inside will tell you why we really like this design: You have easy access to the ZIF socket and to almost everything else you need to get to. The only exception is that you have to hold back some cables to get to the memory sockets. And only one drive bay is available. If you want to add a tape backup unit and a CD ROM drive, one will have to be externally accessible. The system has six slots free, one of which has VESA local bus extensions. Another local bus slot is filled by a Diamond Stealth 24VLB VESA graphics accelerator.

The printer and software bundle included with the Mitac system played a big role in our Best Buy decision. The Citizen GSX-230 24-pin dot matrix printer does letter-quality output with the best of them, while the Microsoft Office 3.0 software bundle is a terrific package.

Mitac's central service and support program is strong; its technicians answered all our questions impeccably, although there was a lag in getting a couple of calls returned. As the company phases out its direct-sales division, it will discontinue its 30-day money-back guarantee and allow dealers to set their own service policies. But Mitac will continue answering its toll-free support lines 9 hours a day, even on Saturdays. Speed and service and support form the core of this package; this great bundle ties for a Best Buy award.

The Polywell 486SX-33VZ's CD ROM bundle—a Sierra Vquest CD ROM drive, a MediaVision 16-bit ProSpectrum sound card, Labtech CS-150 speakers, and a King's Quest V game—adds luster to an already well-appointed 486SX-33 VESA minitower. This PC is ultra-upgradable, with a 238-pin ZIF CPU socket ready for a future upgrade to Intel OverDrive for DX2. Polywell also supplied both a local bus drive adapter and a 32-bit Orchid Fahrenheit VLB local bus graphics accelerator. If not for a so-so showing on Paradox, this unit's overall performance rating would have been high in the 33-MHz pack.

Polywell's solid if unexciting business bundle includes Microsoft Works for Windows and the Star NX-2430 24-pin printer. Service and support, with an unusual five-year labor coverage plus a one-year service warranty, just missed our Best list. On-site service costs \$75 for the first year, and responsive and accurate toll-free tech support is available even on Saturdays. With that kind of backing and the CD ROM

bundle to sweeten the deal, the Polywell 486SX-33VZ package moves beyond its showing on Paradox to take its place among the convincing values in this review.

Quill Computers loaded its 486DX-33 Qtech Startup system with a spacious 200MB Maxtor 7213 (AT) hard disk. And the company didn't stop there—it put everything into a case that accommodates both sizes of floppy drives and the hard disk and still has room for you to add up to three externally accessible drives. Four 16-bit slots, one of which has a VESA local bus extension, allow elbow room for adding full-length peripherals—especially when you consider that an internal fax-modem is already installed.

Despite its 128K secondary cache and local bus video, performance is just decent with this system. But its Epson Stylus 800 printer is a terrific 48-nozzle ink jet with lovely output quality. And the software bundle just gets started with Spinnaker's PFS: WindowWorks, a basic integrated package. If you're into serious financial calculations and need super graphing capabilities, you can really get the job done with Borland's excellent Quattro Pro for Windows 1.0. And Quill provides Delrina's WinFax UltraLite as a complement to the fax-modem.

Service and support are good, with only one glaring exception: Calls to technical support are on your dime. Although support is available only on weekdays, to Quill's credit, responsiveness to our calls was very good, and answers were correct. A year of

Despite the unexceptional performance numbers and toll call for tech support, the nifty printer and great spreadsheet help make this setup very tempting.

#### Silicon Valley 486DX2





No doubt about it, the Silicon Valley 486DX2 Turbo VESA knows how to bring in the fast one. It hurled a

virtual tie with the Amax 486DX2/50 VESAmax for second place on overall performance, 24 percent behind the superfast Micro Express ME 486-VL/DX2/66. This hot local bus PC also hit for extra bases by providing a 2MB VESA local bus IDE caching drive controller and a 32-bit Paradise local bus graphics accelerator. Under the compact desktop hood, the extremely compact motherboard is very accessible.

You get four free 16-bit expansion slots, and all the bays accept externally accessible drives. Two free bays are just right for adding a tape backup unit and a CD ROM drive. With all the batting power, however, the 80MB Conner CP-30084E hard disk—although within our minimum guidelines—is barely adequate. But the software bundle is more than decent: Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 is augmented by Publisher for Windows and Central Point's Anti-Virus 1.0. The fine Hewlett-Packard DeskJet 500 ink jet printer also puts runs on the scoreboard. Silicon Valley's service and support rating

was helped by a two-year system warranty. But to get Silicon Valley's central support, you have to buy direct; otherwise, all service and support must come from your dealer. Although we had to pay the toll on our calls, the company should have toll-free support in place by the time you read this. We got through easily, but some answers strayed outside the strike zone. To be fair, Silicon Valley only recently started offering support to end users, so accuracy should improve. This fast, good-looking slugger almost earned a Best Buy, which indicates the value packed into this bundle. If the tollfree lines had been up and running, this system just might have hit a home run.

Swan bundles something with its 486SX/25DB that you won't find with any other system here: two years of free on-site service. Add to that a two-year warranty on its system and printer and quick access to precise telephone tech support 12 hours a day on weekdays and 8 hours on weekends. In addition, Swan takes advantage of the latest trend in service, giving its customers the extra option of remote diagnostics by throwing in the terminal portion of Triton's CO/Session, along with a modem.

Unfortunately, this system is built around the ho-hum 486SX-25 CPU. Even with a 128K secondary cache and a Diamond Stealth 24VL local bus graphics accelerator, this system wound up with its three 25-MHz classmates as cellar dwellers on overall performance. Swan decided to stick with its June 92 AMI BIOS, although a number of

other machines using it improved their performance on the BAPCo SYSmark92 test when they switched to other BIOS versions. To its credit, however, Swan's PC far exceeded the performance of the last-place Epson Equity 4SX/25.

To provide storage, Swan gives you a healthy 170MB hard drive along with a combination floppy drive that puts both formats in one half-height bay. This sprawling full-size desktop machine features four free bays, any of which can handle an externally accessible drive. A modem is already installed, so with four 16-bit expansion slots free, including one with VESA extensions, you're sitting pretty when it comes to adding full-length peripherals.

Swan puts the personal touches on its PCs: The assembler even signs a label on the back, and the general level of Swan's quality control is excellent. While the Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 integrated software package can't stack up against a muscular array of dedicated applications, the Panasonic KX-P2124 24-pin dot matrix printer is an able workhorse. Considering the less-than-scintillating performance of this 25-MHz machine, the fact that this package still rates as a respectable value speaks volumes about Swan's quality, expandability, and service.



#### Methodology

All units were configured with 4MB or 8MB of system RAM and DOS 5.0. If we had to install Windows, we chose the default installation. We configured Windows with a Hewlett-Packard Laserlet III as the default printer, disabled Print Manager, and attached a null printer to LPT1. Using vendor-supplied video drivers when provided, we set the resolution to 800 by 600 pixels in 16 colors. On systems unable to support 16 colors, we used 256.

Word for Windows 2.0 We spell-check and scroll through a 27-page document; create, format, print, and save a single-page business letter; and open a business proposal document, add a paragraph, then preview and print it.

Excel 4.0 We perform several data extracts; build and format a financial statement from scratch and print it; and open a mortgage analysis, scroll, move blocks, change the interest rate, print-preview the statement, and save the file.

Freelance for Windows 1.0 We load a single-page starter file, enter preformatted text in preset headings, add a second page, and enter text as bulleted items. We add three pages, each with a single 3-D bar chart, and import data from a WKI file; then we add a sixth page with four 3-D pie charts and preview a slide show using a vertical-louver fade effect between each slide. We apply various views to the presentation and preview the slide show four more times, applying a different fade effect between slides each time. Finally we save the presentation to disk.

> need, and there's plenty of room left over to put additional drives in this compact desktop case as well, with two externally accessible and two internal positions available. The free slot count is generous at six. USA

Flex's software bundle of Spinnaker's PFS:WindowWorks integrated package is only adequate, but Computer Associates' Up To Date 2.66 for Windows scheduling program is a nice extra. And we really liked the Canon BJ-200 ink jet printer with its terrific near-laser-quality output.

USA Flex machines have received wellearned accolades in many *PC World* reviews. Service and support, speed, and expandability all contribute to a successful mix. While this package didn't *quite* make a Best Buy, it is still a fine value.

worth the extra dollars. Special features such as integrated local bus video and cleanly integrated ports make more room for adding full-length peripherals to the five free 16-bit slots. The 66-MHz CPU sits in a ZIF socket and uses an extra-large heat sink to dissipate heat. At press time, ZDS raised the ante to \$2922 and added a 256K secondary cache and a dual combo floppy drive to free a drive bay.

All these goodies are backed by a solid service and support plan that includes a year of free on-site service, two-day service turnaround, a toll-free connection to knowledgeable tech staffers who are available 16 hours every weekday, and BBS support.

The applications bundle doesn't measure up to the superior quality of the rest of the offering, however. Microsoft Works for Windows 2.0 looks pretty plain sitting next to this quality PC, and the Okidata ML-380 24-pin dot matrix printer is good but not outstanding. So if you buy this package—and you may well choose to—you'll base your decision more on the system's speed, quality, and service and support than on the merits of its bundle.

#### Zeos 486DX-33



The Zeos 486DX-33 Upgradable earned top honors in both design and expandability. The first thing you'll notice when you open the case is the clean, thoughtful layout, from the integrated ports to the sparkling jewel of a 238-pin ZIF socket, ready for

the forthcoming Intel OverDrive for DX2.

There's plenty of room for peripherals in the seven free slots, one of which has VESA local bus extensions. The other local bus slot is filled by a Diamond Viper VLB VESA graphics accelerator. Zeos even integrated a SCSI port. With its roomy 200MB hard drive, the big Zeos scored well on all our performance tests, marching into the middle of the 33-MHz ranks.

When you consider the quality of design and great software you get, the \$3006 price doesn't seem so high. Zeos's bundle of both 1-2-3 1.1 for Windows and Ami Pro 3.0 add \$249 to the price, but Zeos also throws in Lotus Organizer for Windows 1.0, worth about \$100 on the street.

Zeos continues to offer one of the best service and support lineups, including 24-hour toll-free lines. The only blemish was somewhat slow responsiveness. But a year of on-site service costs just \$49, and Zeos provides three-day service turnaround. With the highest price in this roundup, this is not a bargain-hunter's special. But it is a combination of super design, fine support policies, good performance, and terrific applications.





## POWER

Just three years ago, 386DX computers were hailed as the first true Windows machines, and vendors sold them by the truckload to power users. Now that high-power Windows apps are in regular use and with the advent of demanding GUIs such as Windows for Workgroups, your 386DX may be straining in a way you never noticed before. Those spreadsheet recalculations take too long, and database searches leave you time to reflect on your looming deadline while sand trickles through Windows' hourglass. You've seen the performance others are getting with 486s, and you want to know how to get it for yourself.

Future performance is also a motivation for moving to a 486. Even if your 386DX is managing just fine right now, one day your company may talk about standardizing on Windows NT and want you to move to more powerful Windows applications that your current ma-

chine can't handle. You don't want to throw your investment in this system away—so can you turbocharge it?

#### Three Paths to PC Power

You have several options to get to 486 power. The easy solution is to replace your system. You could run out and buy a new 486-based PC-if you have the spare cash. Alas, instead you may be stuck with the same box on your desk for the next few years while you or your company wrings every last drop of depreciation out of it. Understandably, your company may not be so eager to buy new systems when it spent big money on 386DXs last year or the year before-especially if it invested in the expensive IBM PS/2s. If you do move up, your company can recoup some of the old system's value by selling it, passing it along to other employees, or even donating it to charity and writing off some of the cost. But none of these options will help you avoid that initial cash outlay.

Are upgrades the answer? Can minor equipment improvements hide from the auditor's beady gaze under a different line item on the department's budget? Replacing your PC's processor with a 486DX-based upgrade card (which sells for a fraction of the cost of a new system) will get you a big performance boost without eating a big hole in your capital-equipment budget. Another, more radical option is to replace the system board. This option will take work but should get you slightly better performance and keep your system a little

more up-to-date. Finally, software solutions and minor hardware improvements can give your machine extra fizz in exchange for a little cash.

Which option is preferable—new system, system board replacement, or CPU board upgrade? For our February 1993 feature "Are Upgrades Worth It?" *PC World* interviewed dozens of businesspeople who grappled with the decision of whether to buy new systems or upgrade current ones. For this article, we took our research one step further. We collected CPU upgrade

boards and two system boards, performed the upgrades in our lab, and compared the costs and hassles of upgrading to those of buying a new system.

#### **Checking the Choices**

We reviewed the system replacement, system board replacement, and CPU board upgrade scenarios for both ISA (Industry Standard Architecture) and MCA (Micro Channel Architecture) PCs. Systems with ISA expansion slots

account for virtually all 386DX clones, while most IBM PS/2s have MCA expansion slots. The PCs we upgraded were an ISA Compaq Deskpro 386DX-20 and an MCA IBM PS/2 Model 70, based on a 386DX-25. These two models are among the best-selling PCs from a few years ago. The Compaq's performance can be regarded as representative of most IBM-compatible PCs, although it does use a nonstandard system board. Our aim was to pump up each of these PCs so it was as close as possible to a full 486DX-33 desktop, the typical high-end business computer.

#### The Upgrade Dilemma

Is PC upgrading for you? First you need to decide whether or not you need the performance of a new 486DX system. If so, then forget about upgrading and replace your system: In no case is upgrading either the most economical or the most convenient way to get full 486 performance. Will you be satisfied with a fair to significant boost in your 386DX's performance? If so, then a careful shopper may find that a CPU or system board upgrade may be the cheapest and fastest way to achieve that aim. This is especially true for owners of systems that have proprietary upgrade paths. Also, PS/2 owners get a relatively sweeter deal when upgrading than do owners of ISA-based PCs. Whether you upgrade or not, "Other Options" tells you how you can further improve your system's performance.

#### **Your Upgrade Options**



Requires minor effort to back up and restore files, provides best speedup, and costs about \$1100 after sale of old system.



Requires serious effort and knowledge of PC internals, gives system fairly good speedup, and costs about \$550.



Requires minimal to moderate effort, results in only minimal to moderate speedup, and cost of boards varies widely.

If you decide to upgrade, bear two points in mind. First, when shopping, demand a list from the upgrade vendor specifying the exact makes and models of computers it has *verified* will work with its upgrade card or system board. If you are thinking of upgrading many machines, buy one card first and put it through a pilot run. Second, make sure the person performing the installation feels comfortable delving into the inner workings of a PC.

Most of the 486DX CPU board and system board companies told us that the bulk of their sales were volume sales. This stands to reason. Since upgrading offers only a slim savings in cost and time over desktop replacement, the benefit becomes significant only when revamping many PCs at a time. So much the better if all the machines to be upgraded are the same. If your budget for new systems is drained, then upgrading may be the only path you can take to get significantly increased performance out of your old machine.

If you want to tread the processor upgrade path, scope it out as much as possible beforehand. Make sure that the vendor has tested its product in your machine and offers a good return policy. Then, unless you feel comfortable rummaging around the insides of your PC, let a dealer install the upgrade. Depending on your PC, a CPU upgrade board can offer you an easy, low-cost method to semi-486 power or to an Excedrin headache—or anything in between.

#### SYSTEM REPLACEMENT: SIMPLE, NOT CHEAP



ur first scenario is simplest: replace the desktop. The work involved is still not trivial, however. You have to decide what to buy. Then you'll have to back up your hard drive and restore the data to the new system's hard drive.

According to the Boston Computer Exchange (BoCoEx) and the National Computer Exchange (NaComEx), leading brokers in used computers, a used 20-MHz Compaq Deskpro 386 sells for \$900 on average. Our target 33-MHz 486DX ISA-bus computer sells for around \$2000 in a standard configuration with 8MB of RAM and a 160MB to 250MB hard drive. The net cost for replacing our ISA system is \$1100, and you get slightly more than twice the performance of the original machine. We should point out that you can buy a perfectly good 486-based system for under \$1000 nowadays-but that's for a 486SX, and one with a smaller hard drive and less RAM than the system we are using as a comparison.

Replacing a PS/2 system is more expensive. Even though the 25-MHz 386DX-based Model 70s started at \$6000 several years ago, BoCoEx and NaComEx put the current value of our test Model 70 at only \$1100. A new PS/2 Model 76 486DX2-66 (the PS/2 that IBM offers that's closest in power to our goal 33-MHz 486DX) sells for \$3100, including the 14-inch XGA-2 monitor. Thus, the net cost of replacing the PS/2 system is \$2000. We found the Model 76 to be almost three times faster than our unimproved test PS/2.

#### **Replace System**

COST: \$1000 to \$1500 after selling old system

PERFORMANCE IMPROVEMENT: 100 percent to 200 percent

TIME TO UPGRADE: Several hours for backing up and restoring files

PROS: Most-improved performance, up-to-date peripherals, upgrade has longest future life

CONS: High cash outlay, expensive if you can't sell the old computer

SUMMARY: Probably the most costeffective way to upgrade in the long run, unless you own a proprietary system such as a PS/2



Replacing the system board is like rebuilding a car's engine. It is the most radical of PC improvements, and it can come with a minefield of installation snags to tiptoe through—from BIOS incompatibilities with your pe-

ripherals, to wedging the system board into a nonstandard box, to figuring out where you should plug in every unmarked cable.

To sum up the process: You will have to open your computer, unplug every power and ribbon cable, and carefully remove and set aside each expansion card. You'll probably also have to take out the floppy and hard disk drives just to make enough room to remove the system board. You'll want to take out the electrostatically sensitive system

RAM and unplug the power supply from the system board. You should also label every cable before you unplug it, just to make sure you don't put it back in the wrong place or upside down.

You'll need to check whether the RAM in your old system will fit on the new system board (if not, you'll have to spend more money). Then you'll need to slide the new system board into the case, making sure that it really fits, that you'll be able to screw it into the case, and that all the expansion card slots line

up with the brackets and cable holes at the back of the case. Then you'll have to put all those boards, cables, and peripherals back into the new system board.

Once the swap is done, potential problems include setting the CMOS of the new board to match your peripherals, and making sure the BIOS works, (fire up the upgraded PC to check). The whole job could take anywhere from half a day in the best case to a worst case of weeks of troubleshooting and ordering replacement parts.

If you're willing to wage this battle with high technology, you stand to save

a lot of money. DataExpert's product is a case in point. The company sent us an ISA system board replete with 486DX-33 processor, two VL-bus slots, and 128K of secondary cache RAM. In testing this board with the test Compaq's hard drive, plus a Diamond VRAM video controller and generic ISA disk controller, we got about a 90 percent increase in performance over the base system, or slightly more than three-quarters of the power of the average 486DX-33, for a respectable \$495. Of course, that's with regular VGA video, not SVGA, and you don't get any extra hard drive space. We also tested an American Megatrends (AMI) system board with almost identical specs (it had only 64K of secondary cache) and got nearly identical performance numbers.

If you want to make up the remaining performance, you'll have to spend a lot. If your old system's RAM isn't transferable to the new system board, you'll have to shell out \$250 to \$300 for new RAM (8MB is standard for 486DX systems). If you have a typical VGA subsystem, that's another \$500 for an SVGA system to match the video performance of a typical 486. Add another \$400 for the hard drive and controller. As described, the peripherals could add \$1000 to \$1500 to your cost. Your total outlay would be twice the net expense of replacing your system.

The only PS/2 system board vendor we found was Reply Corporation, which puts out a range of 486-based PS/2 system boards. Reply makes it easy to upgrade the peripherals by offering many such options with its system board. As with the other upgrades, however, you'll pay more to get the full power of a new system if you upgrade. To upgrade the Model 70 with a 486DX2-66 system board stocked with 8MB of RAM, a 200MB hard drive, 256K of secondary cache RAM, and an integrated SVGA video subsystem with a graphics accelerator would come to nearly \$3000-almost \$1000 more than the net cost of selling the Model 70 and buying the Model 76 486.

Your original peripherals are crucial in

determining how cost-effective a system board upgrade will be. The better armed your 386DX is with very high performance peripherals and components, the better value a system board upgrade will seem.

#### Other Options

You can transfuse your system with at least some new blood in a number of ways. Some involve software tricks and practices, while others require minor hardware improvements.

The first and usually the cheapest upgrade is a software disk cache. Such a program is generally very cheap and radically improves average disk access time, enhancing overall system performance. Caching works by pulling large chunks of data from the disk into cache RAM with each disk read. The next time an app requests data, the caching

software checks for it in the cache. If the data is there, reading the disk, which is time-consuming, is unnecessary. You likely already have one of the best disk caches going. If you run Windows 3.1, DOS 5.0, or DOS 6.0, you received a disk cache called SmartDrive for free. Like most other software caches, SmartDrive selects a good cache size automatically.

Another improvement can be achieved using a memory manager. Such a product allows you to make the most of the memory you have. With Windows every

last byte can count, and the availability of a few extra K can improve the way Windows operates. Refer to "Top Ten Utilities

vs. Dos 6.0" for details on some popular memory managers.

Windows users

who like to keep a lot of applications open will see a marked speedup if they add cache RAM. In a recent review of DX2-66 systems, we noted that on average 8MB-equipped PCs ran PC World Test Center tests 10 percent faster than equivalent systems with 4MB of RAM. Currently, RAM costs about \$40 per megabyte, and it is truly a worthwhile investment for heavy-duty Win-

dows users.

Beyond RAM, your hardware enhancement options get more expensive. A video accelerator board will set you back about \$200, and you may want to invest over \$300 more in a new monitor to make the most of it. For your

#### **CPU UPGRADES: A SPECIALIZED OVERHAUL**

f swapping the system board is like rebuilding a car's engine, upgrading your CPU is like changing your car's oil. It's not rocket science, but depending on the car, it can be a breeze or a royal pain in the neck. On some cars, the oil filter and drain plug are easy to find and remove; on others, they are recessed or hidden behind masses of cables, making it difficult to get a wrench in there. So it is with processor upgrades.

Our two test PCs happen to be relatively easy to upgrade-none of the cards reviewed took more than a halfhour to install. In both the Compag and the IBM, it was easy to lift out the drive bay to expose the CPU underneath, pry out the CPU, install the upgrade card, and then install either a BIOS chip or a software driver to enable the 486's internal cache. But installing these cards into other clones is going into uncharted and sometimes hazardous territory. Since clones come in all shapes and sizes, there's no telling what obstacles you'll face, from not having enough room to pry out the processor comfortably, to having a processor card block valuable expansion slots. Some clones simply

money, you'll see an improvement of about 10 percent in most standard Windows applications.

For about the same cost, a newer, larger, and faster hard drive might be a better bet. For about \$300 you can get a 200MB hard drive that should give you a noticeable speedup in access times and data transfer rates over any drive of a past generation.

Most of these choices cost considerably less than a processor upgrade. While they won't give you as much extra speed as a new system or even a CPU or system board upgrade, they may give you enough of a lift to satisfy you for now.

don't have the room to accommodate some processor upgrade boards.

Extracting the old CPU can be especially tricky. Since this is not a \$6 oil filter but a sensitive several-hundred-dollar component that you will need in case your upgrade card is defective, take extra care to remove it in one piece. While all the upgrade kits we looked at came with a small flat-tined fork specifically designed for CPU removal, you must work the chip out gently and s-l-ow-l-y, or risk snapping off its contact pins. Even when you've got it out of the socket, you're not out of the woods. If there's a lot of static electricity around, a brush of a finger or a sweater sleeve across its pins can lobotomize the processor in a flash. If your upgrade board fails, you're left with a brain-dead PC.

Some manufacturers—AST, Compaq, PC Brand, and others—provide specialized mechanisms for upgrading systems to new processors. These specialized upgrades typically cost more than third-party solutions but are usually engineered well enough that they also give you a better performance boost. They are worth considering as an alternative to a new system but are obviously limited to those systems whose manufacturers offer them.

CPU upgrade boards for the Compaq ranged from \$399 to \$1100. None of them single-handedly infused the test systems with the full performance of our target desktop. Nor could they. A PC's performance depends on the performance of its peripherals—the speed of the RAM and video and hard drive subsystems—as well as on the processor. The processor upgrade only speeds the CPU; you're still using your original peripherals. And if they're old and slow, you won't see much improvement.

For the Compaq, the All Computers product gave us the most bang for the buck. It boosted the Deskpro by 20 percent to slightly more than half the speed of a new 486DX-33. This boost cost \$399, about one-third the net cost of a new system. Further increases to



system performance, however, require upgrading peripherals. You'll get about 10 percent improvement by adding 4MB of RAM for another \$160. A new, faster hard drive and controller will probably add about 20 percent more

speed for \$400. Upgrading the monitor and video card to SVGA level will certainly ease your eyes but will probably give you only another 10 percent or so of performance for about \$500. In the best case, using the ALL DX 486, you've spent \$1450-\$350 more than the net cost of a new system as described earlier. And despite the higher net cost, you still don't get full performance, since this product is based on Cyrix's 25-MHz 486SLC chip, which has a slower clock, offers only 1K of internal cache compared to the 8K in the Intel 486DX, and lacks the latter's internal math coprocessor.

What about Kingston's 33-MHz 486DX CPU upgrade, which is based

on the same processor as our target upgrade PC? This upgrade board sells for \$695, which means you pay \$1745 for the upgraded system once all the peripherals are added—\$645 over the net cost of system replacement. It turned in performance numbers roughly equivalent to those of the All DX 486, ahead in some areas, behind in others.

Our top-performing CPU upgrade

128K of secondary cache RAM. At \$1395, MicroMaster is the more expensive of the PS/2 upgrades we looked at. While it has the advantage of painless installation and better performance, you still don't get the performance of a new PS/2. The MicroMaster made the old PS/2 perform with up to twice the speed; for Windows applications it was about twice as fast as the Performance

upgrade cards can let you get more depreciation out of your 386DX computers. With the fast pace of computer enhancement, computers become obsolete before their full value can be depreciated. CPU upgrade cards offer a way to extend the useful life of your 386DX.

Finally, the upgrade *can* be a faster and simpler solution than buying a new PC. The last point comes with a big caveat, though. Adding a CPU upgrade board is often not for amateurs, no matter how easy the vendors make it sound. It *might* take 15 minutes, in which case it's faster and easier than copying all the files to a new machine and reconfiguring them for the new system. Or the upgrade could take all afternoon, making it much less time-effective. Or the upgrade may not fit in your PC at all.

Beware of any vendor's claim that its card will upgrade all 386DX machines. Our research has yet to turn up such a card. Kingston sent us a list detailing exactly which PC models its cards work in. All Computers, on the other hand, refused to furnish a list of the computers it has verified will accommodate its cards. In fact, the company told us that the 33-MHz version of its All DX486 upgrade board will fit into the Model 70, when in fact it doesn't. You can't be too careful when shopping for a CPU upgrade card.

board for the Compaq was Performance Pursuit's product based on the hefty DX2-50 processor. This board alone brought the Compaq within two-thirds to three-quarters of the performance of our target computer, or about 80 percent faster than the original Compaq Deskpro. It's reasonable to expect that with the peripherals upgrades described here, the final result would surpass the performance of our target 486DX-33. Unfortunately, so does the final cost. Adding the \$895 Performance Pursuit card and all the peripherals, the resultant machine costs over \$2100, or \$1000 more than net system replacement cost.

We looked at two CPU upgrade boards for the PS/2. Performance Pursuit's DX2-50 board for the PS/2 plugs into the processor socket like the others previously discussed. The results were not as good as for the Compaq Deskpro version, principally because the original PS/2 test PC, the 25-MHz 386DXbased Model 70, is itself considerably slower than the Deskpro. Overall the Performance Pursuit boosted the original PS/2 speed by about 50 percent. So for \$895 direct—a little over half the net cost of selling the Model 70 and buying a new Model 76-the Power Up gets you at most a third of the way to the performance of the Model 76.

The other board, from Kingston, is a full-length bus-mastering card that plugs into an expansion slot. (The original processor remains in its socket, but MicroMaster shuts it off and takes over the system.) Unlike the CPU upgrade boards, MicroMaster comes with sockets for RAM and cache RAM—our test board came with 8MB of RAM and

Pursuit, but it was only slightly faster on DOS apps. If you are upgrading mostly for Windows performance, this board could be a smart way to go.

#### When to Use a CPU Upgrade

It's clear that apart from specific cases, CPU upgrade cards aren't a cost-effective way to get the full power of a new 486DX. So why use one?

There are four good reasons. The first is a cost savings to get some performance enhancement. CPU upgrade boards can be cost-effective for someone who needs significantly increased power, but who is willing to settle for less than the power of a new 486DX. They may be just the ticket for light-to-moderate-duty Windows users. If you work mostly with one or two applications, adding the 486DX upgrade and selectively upgrading peripherals to accommodate those programs may be cheaper than buying a new system. Do you spend most of your time in databas-

es? A CPU upgrade and a new hard disk and controller can make a dramatic change in database performance. The better your original peripherals, the better the performance increase you'll get.

Then there's the budget "stealth" angle. In most company budgets, funds for new systems and for system improvements are separate line items. CPU upgrade boards offer a way to get a beefier PC when there's nothing left in the budget for new systems.

The third reason is that

## YOUR E-MAIL?

Remember that E-mail message you sent to your pal in sales last week? You know, the one complaining about the new vice president? Do you know who else read that message? What if it fell into the wrong hands?

Every day more than 10 million business professionals rely on electronic mail to communicate with co-workers. But few of us ever think about the possible ramifications of sending those messages. We tap them out as casually as we pick up the phone, "talking" about everything from sensitive corporate issues to what we're doing this weekend.

Should we assume that E-mail messages are really private? Probably not, say most experts. "A lot of people are getting into trouble," says privacy advocate and employment attorney Cliff Palefsky. "They feel that a message is private. They press a button and think it's gone, but it's not."

The issue of E-mail and privacy has recently come to prominence through a series of high-profile incidents. After last year's beating of Rodney King, the Christopher Commission, investigating practices of the Los Angeles Police Department, found some 700 offensive messages sent between officers. During the Iran-Contra trial of Marine Lieutenant Colonel Oliver North in 1987, North's E-mail messages were one of the principal sources of the information used against him.


More recently, Eugene Wang, a former vice president with software firm Borland International, was charged with passing sensitive company documents to one of Borland's chief rivals, Symantee Corporation. After Wang left Borland for a position at Symantec, Borland management looked into Wang's corporate MCI Mail account and discovered evidence that ultimately led to Symantee president Gordon Eu-

banks being named a defendant in the case.

#### **A Patchwork Quilt**

These celebrated E-mail controversies are not isolated incidents. They are, in fact, indicative of the confusion surrounding employees' and employers' rights where E-mail is concerned. Laws governing internal E-mail communications "are like a patchwork quilt," says Marc Rotenberg, Washington director of Computer Professionals for Social Responsibility (CPSR), a group that debates the social and political implications of technology.

The Electronic Communications Privacy Act (ECPA) of 1986 establishes clear guidelines for monitoring E-mail messages sent over public systems such as MCI Mail or CompuServe. But no such regulations govern the monitoring of internal E-mail mes-



- Read your company's E-mail policy. If no such policy exists, work with your human resources staff to create one.
- . Change your password at least once a month.
- · Don't use an obvious password, such as your name.
- Know whom you're sending a message to. Double-check addressees and avoid inadvertent, potentially embarrassing broadcasts.
- Don't send highly sensitive, confidential, or potentially embarrassing messages over E-mail. Think twice before sending inflammatory messages, which you may later regret.
- Exit E-mail when you leave your desk, or use a password-protected screen saver.

sages sent on a company-owned system.

In Protecting Electronic Messaging: A Guide to the ECPA, authors John Podesta and Michael Sher state that private businesses' E-mail systems are not subject to the same laws that govern public E-mail services. From a corporate perspective, that means managers can legally review E-mail communications as they would paper memos.

But doing so can cause a range of problems, from employee discontent and distrust to time-consuming and expensive litigation. In California, for example, employees have filed lawsuits alleging that their employers violated their right to privacy by monitoring their E-mail communications. But even in this state, which has a constitutional right to privacy, it's still not clear where employees' rights stop and employers' rights begin.

"We can all agree that you have a right to privacy when you're in the restroom. That's an easy one. But does an employee have the right to assume that a locker, a desk drawer, or an E-mail message is private? That's not so clear," says Jeffrey Kingston, a partner with the San Francisco law firm of Brobeck, Phleger, and Harrison, and author of Privacy in Computer Networks.

The absence of laws inevitably leads to confusion, anger, and mistrust when an employer's actions run counter to an employee's expectations. Consider this scenario: A administrator network routinely monitors E-mail traffic to make sure the system doesn't get overloaded. During the course of that review he discovers an "inappropriate" message that eventually leads to disciplinary action against an employee. The employee, who believes his or her right to privacy has been violated, files a lawsuit. Litigation of this

type takes years to wind its way through the courts—and so far, none of these cases has resolved the privacy rights issue. "It's never a pleasant circumstance when you discover E-mail is not as private as we might have thought," comments Rotenberg of CPSR.

#### The Need for Policies

Employers, civil libertarians, and communications experts hold a variety of opinions when it comes to employers' versus employees' rights. But there's one point on which they all agree: The best way for employers to respond to the absence of clearly defined laws is to establish a policy, publicize it, and stick to it.

According to E-mail privacy expert Walter Ulrich, managing director of the consulting firm Arthur D. Little, fewer than 10 percent of U.S. companies have a policy on E-mail

privacy and security. Most businesses don't consider it a priority because they haven't had problems. But waiting until you're hit with a lawsuit, says Ulrich, is "foolhardy."

Until the Borland/Symantec case, Symantec Corporation had no written policy on E-mail privacy. Then the company was slapped with subpoenas. Now Symantec has a policy warning against the use of corporate E-mail for private correspondence. Borland, for its part, still does not have an explicit E-mail policy, though access to corporate information of all types is covered in the employee manual, according to company spokesperson Steve Grady. Reviewing the E-mail of current or former employees is not standard practice, says Grady, emphasizing that Wang's MCI account was reviewed after a series of "extraordinary and suspicious events."

#### One Size Doesn't Fit All

Policies can run the gamut from the draconian ("E-mail messages are the property of the company and can be accessed at any time and for any reason, without notice") to the permissive ("Employees can be assured of the privacy of their messages and no employee is permitted to review another employee's message without the permission of the originator"). Both kinds of policies are flawed, says Ulrich. The first creates an atmosphere of mistrust and inhibits the use of E-mail. The second can cause unnecessary headaches for co-workers and managers. "If I'm exchanging E-mail messages about a proposal that's due and I go to the hospital, it can create problems if my mail is considered strictly private," says Ulrich.

A productive policy, say E-mail experts, is one that is enforceable, that fits the company's culture, and that allows for the incidental and occasional use of E-mail for person-

al communications. A good E-mail policy should state that while the company reserves the right to

review all electronic records, it prohibits employees from reading other employees' E-mail except in those situations that require access for legitimate business reasons. And even under these circumstances, attempts should be made to obtain the originator's consent. A company's E-mail policies should be updated regularly and communicated to all employees.

#### **Encryption: The Ultimate Protection?**

Imagine checking your E-mail in-box and finding a message that read, "mQA/AivFw-WYAAAEBeQ8dG9tQHRoZy5ob2JieS5ubD4 ==F7CL"

Gibberish? A scrambled file? Neither of the above. In fact, your E-mail system receives mail like this all the time—messages that have been encrypted (coded so that they can be read only by their intended recipient). You're just not aware that it's happening.

Data traveling over networks is highly vulnerable. Messages can be intercepted, altered, or copied, whether as acts of corporate espionage, as part of a regular automated backup routine, or by supervisors or managers monitoring an employee's work. Digital encryption schemes provide an electronic shield to protect communications from prying eyes. Network administrators can encrypt the central database of an Email system so that even if messages are intercepted, they will be unreadable. And individual users-if they're equipped with the proper tools-can encrypt each message separately, using a secret code available only to them and the intended recipient. (Such schemes will also play a critical role in authenticating electronic messages by setting up "digital signatures," encrypted blocks of code that only the person "signing" has the key to encrypt.)

Encryption schemes range from simple strategies to complex theorems that even the National Security Administration would have a hard time cracking. But at the most basic level, all involve using a key—an alphanumeric sequence—as the basis for the transformation of characters or bits of

key systems use a single secret code to encrypt and decrypt a message. Public key encryption uses what are called public/private key pairs. A message encrypted using the public key, a widely known code, must be decrypted using the private key, known only by its owner—and vice versa. In both scenarios, encryption and decryption often happen automatically; users don't have to invoke a code to read or send E-mail.

#### Who's Doing What?

Leading E-mail vendors handle encryption differently, providing users with different levels of control and security. Lotus cc:Mail and Microsoft Mail store every message in a database on a server, and the entire database is encrypted. Messages are decrypted on the fly, as data is sent from the database to your screen. In each of these cases, encryption is completely automatic. Encoding and decoding are driven by the use of individual user passwords, and a single key protects the entire database. The downside of this approach: Messages in these systems are only as secure as individual passwords.

In contrast, Lotus Notes uses a more elaborate and flexible encryption scheme. Encryption is activated when users click on the Encrypt button before sending a message. The system encrypts the outgoing message by applying the public key of the intended recipient. When the intended recipient reads the message, his or her account knows the private key associated with the sender's public key and can decrypt the message. Since private key information is associated with each user's indi-

vidual ID file (maintained on the user's own system and not on the server), an illicit reader would

need to know a user's password and log in at that user's workstation in order to read his or her messages. For an even higher level of security, a user could keep his or her ID file on a floppy disk.

In addition to this initial level of protection, Notes users can assign a special, sep-(continues on following page)

a message. The resulting output is an unintelligible stream of characters—unless, of course, you know the key. Keepers of the key, like young sleuths using a decoder ring, can decipher the contents of the otherwise secret message.

There are two major types of encryption schemes: private key and public key. Private

WordPerfect Office 4.0 implements encryption using an internally developed standard shared by various WordPerfect products. Virtually every component of the mail system is automatically encrypted at all times. Users can also password-protect individual messages or file attachments, in effect double-encrypting a message. Some-

one who tries to impersonate a user logging on at the right workstation and using the cor-

rect password still couldn't read a message for which he or she did not have the right password.

The above systems offer the strongest security against an outside intruder who simply tries to capture messages in transit or on a server. As far as we could determine, none of the systems offer any protection for message transmission through gateways into other systems.

#### **Encryption Pitfalls**

Are there potential problems with encrypting electronic communications? In some cases, yes. For example, with such packages as cc:Mail and Microsoft Mail, network administrators can read any mail regardless of encryption by changing a user's password. This limits the security and privacy of messages (although the user would know that the password had been changed the next time he or she logged on).

On the other hand, an encrypted message can be made unreadable until the recipient applies the correct password or key. This level of protection is possible, for example, in both Lotus Notes and WordPerfect Office. Although messages may remain private in these systems, this scenario is not problem free. For example, if an employee is using E-mail to run another business or send next year's marketing plans to your division managers, and the human resources and legal staffs. In researching other companies' E-mail policies, Burkard notes, "I found that no one had ever heard of Email actually getting audited."

#### **Using Good Judgment**

The 5000 E-mail users at Nordstrom, the Seattle-based fashion retailing chain, adhere to a policy that has been carefully crafted to protect the rights of both employees and management. "We pride ourselves on the use of good judgment, and we wanted to create a policy that lets our employees know we trust them. We knew that an absolutist policy would not be successful," says Network and Computer Operations Manager Bob Hatch.

> Hatch and other managers developed a policy that dovetails with Nordstrom's corporate culture. The

policy, which is posted quarterly on the Email system, states: "Electronic mail is a company resource and is provided as a business-communications tool. Employees with legitimate business purposes may have the need to view your electronic mail messages. It is also possible that others may view your messages inadvertently, since there is no guarantee of privacy for an electronic mail message. Please use your good judgment as you use the electronic mail system."

While it might seem that an E-mail policy that is broadcast quarterly would deter widespread E-mail use, the opposite is true. A few users at Nordstrom have asked whether their messages are being read, says Hatch, but most are satisfied with the policy. "The policy has not had any dampening effect on E-mail traffic," he notes.

biggest competitor, you may never find out-or be able to prove it. Similarly, if an employee who works with valuable information is fired and decides to encrypt all your records before he or she leaves, you may never be able to retrieve the information.

One company we spoke with gave perhaps the ultimate example of this problem: The Clinton White House, it said, has been calling a lot lately. It seems that many of the Bush administration's old E-mail messages are still on the White House servers. The only problem is that they're encryptedand the key, needless to say, may not be forthcoming.

#### **When Big Brother Backfires**

While having some kind of E-mail guideline is better than having none, a poorly written policy can create new problems. At Brown Group, a footwear and specialty retailing company in St. Louis, Manager of Office Applications Diane Burkard is revising the company's strict E-mail policy.

In 1991, Brown Group management developed the following E-mail directive: "All computer programs, hardware, and data are the sole property of Brown Group Inc.; any use of the computer or application for other than company and business purposes

is expressly prohibited. Contents of E-mail communications will be monitored by our audit department as deemed necessary."

The policy backfired when employees protested that their messages were being needlessly monitored. Problems started, Burkard says, "when people got in trouble for using E-mail for personal reasons." As a result of the auditing, she notes, "employees became paranoid and were very careful about any message they sent. They felt like Big Brother was watching."

Having learned from its mistake, Brown Group is asking for input from end users,

#### Where to Go From Here

Ulrich advises companies to be proactive when it comes to setting an E-mail policy. "Companies without a policy should make it a priority for 1993," he notes. "Once you start thinking seriously about the issue, you need to do something about it."

"Some companies may be afraid to address the issue for fear of employee backlash," observes Bill Moroney, executive director of the Electronic Mail Association. But by doing nothing, he adds, companies open themselves to employee dissatisfaction and to possible litigation. In addition,

#### The Pundits Speak Out

Where do you come down on the issue of E-mail and privacy? Should messages be monitored? Should personal notes be barred? We asked business leaders, politicians, and pundits. But not everyone was eager to share their views. Ross Perot, Lee Iacocca, and American Airlines CEO Robert Crandall all said the issue was too loaded and declined comment. Even notables typically quick to comment on a host of political and social hot potatoes begged out, among them Peter Drucker and Senator Bill Bradley. Here's what those who dared to comment had to say.



"If you received a sealed letter addressed to you in your mailbox at work, and your employer opened the letter and read it, you probably would consider it an invasion of privacy. As Americans, we feel that our mail is privileged and private, regardless of where or how we receive it."

-Paul Simon, U.S. senator and author of The Privacy for Consumers and Workers Act

"People expect exactly the same thing from E-mail that they expect from voice mail or from a conversation-that is, no monitoring or bugging. If the employee doesn't want an E-mail message or a conversation passed along, they should indicate that to the recipient."

-William Gates, chair and CEO, Microsoft Corporation

"Employees should be allowed to use electronic mail the same way they use the phone. That, of course, means there will be some personal use, which is fine, as long as it's kept to a reasonable level. I can't think of any business needs that necessitate the monitoring of employee E-mail. I think it's wrong to monitor people. You have to trust them to be reasonable in using all of the company's services responsibly, whether you're talking about car rental policies or electronic mail and the phone system."

-Ray Noorda, president and CEO, Novell

"My personal expectation of privacy is not all that great with E-mail.

It's not greater than if two people went into the restroom and had a conversation about a blatantly illegal act. If the boss were in the next stall, I would hardly call that a private conversation. Still, it's important to stress that the whole idea of monitoring E-mail is bullshit, strategically. If senior management start act-



ing like cops, then they are going to destroy the potential of the system. Of course, if you're doing something illegal and you leave an audit trail, that's fair game when it's significant to the courts or to the company. Despite being a privacy freak, I think that anything other than that is expecting too much."

"If you're doing something for your company on company time, then I suppose the company has the right to look at what you've done. But anything else, including private mail, ought to be totally removed from any eyes but your own. Personally, though if I had a sensitive communication, which had to be put on the record, I wouldn't want to use E-mail. I'd prefer to put it in a sealed envelope. Very, very heavily

"John or Mary Doe should not lose any personal privacy rights in the



electronic age. But since electronic systems are almost always shared, devices need to be established that provide means of assuring others' privacy in communal computers. Once those devices have been established, you would hope that people would not poke about, any more than they would do so to read someone

else's mail lying on the desk. It would be a pity to have to ask each employee to encrypt personal messages, but in offices fetid with voyeuristic curiosity, this might be necessary."

"until a larger number of companies do establish policies, the issue will remain murky and ripe for legislation."

Such legislation is already in the works. The Privacy for Consumers and Workers Act, introduced in 1992 by Illinois senator Paul Simon, would require employers to provide employees with prior written notice of electronic monitoring. Although not explicitly mentioned in the bill, E-mail monitoring would be covered. Simon intends to reintroduce a revised version of this legislation during the current session.

According to Simon, the need to establish

policies is made even more imperative by the dizzying speed of advances in technology. E-mail privacy is just one of a host of issues, he believes, that will come to the forefront as we grow increasingly dependent on technology. "Just beyond the horizon are more breakthroughs and refinements that we can't even envision today," says Simon. "Weighing these issues now will allow us to be the masters of the technology, instead of its slaves."



## Top Ten Utilities

DOS 6.0 comes with a full set of utility programs, but are they good enough?

DOS 6.0 doesn't promise to revolutionize the way you use your PC. But it does offer a passel of goodies, including stripped-down versions of utility heavyweights from Symantec and Central Point, plus a full-blown operating system, all for \$129.95. Need disk compression, a memory manager, a virus checker, a disk backup program, and a disk defragger? DOS 6.0 has them all. If you've never used one of these utilities, DOS 6.0 is a cheap introduction. But are these tools good enough for the average user—or for you?

We decided to put that question to the test, by pitting DOS 6.0 against a gaggle of third-party utilities, including some of the very programs that DOS 6.0's simplified versions were cast from. In the disk compression arena, DOS 6.0 squares off against Stacker and SuperStor Pro; in memory management, against QEMM386 and 386Max; in virus

checking, it's DOS versus Norton AntiVirus and Virex for the PC; in backup, PC Tools and Norton Backup for DOS; and in disk defragging, DOS challenges The Norton Utilities and PC Tools. The two compression programs are market leaders; the rest are all past *PC World* Best Buys or runners-up.

Our evaluations are based not only on recent performance tests conducted by the PC World Test Center, but also on ease of installation, configuration, and use. For example, "Software and Hardware Caches Pay Off" (July 1993) clearly showed that most cache programs, if properly set up, will boost your PC's performance by about the same amount. But configuring some cache utilities is a royal pain—enough for you to consider simpler alternatives. We've applied this same

to those offered by third-party vendors.


Note: Many of these products come in both Windows and DOS flavors and are sometimes included as part of a larger bundle. For example, Norton Backup appears in stand-alone DOS and Windows versions as well as in Norton Desktop for Windows and Norton Desktop for DOS. In this roundup, we examine only the latest versions—stand-alone or bundled—that reflect the developer's most current technology.

#### Simplify, Simplify

Ease of use is the first rule—and maybe the second and third. System-level programs such as disk compressors and virus checkers must be simple, foolproof, and exceedingly clear. On this score, DOS 6.0's utilities generally beat most comers. Installation requires minimal user intervention, with only one or two menus to dig through and a handful of options to pick from. Of course, the simpler the program, the less you can fine-tune it. But I suspect most users—even PC pros—will be relieved. DOS 6.0 does 90 percent of what you need, and much of it automatically.

Nevertheless, there are plenty of reasons to consider the third-party packages reviewed here. For example, DOS's memory manager frees up far less conventional RAM than QEMM does. Tape backup isn't part of the DOS deal, and Microsoft's online help is rather sparse. And while DOS's virus checker is plenty capable, most experts think you should run at least two checkers to cover all your bases.

Finally, don't fall for Microsoft's pitch about the superior safety of its products. As millions of Windows users can attest, Microsoft products can be mercurial, and DOS 6.0 is no exception. If your system is a little out of the ordinary (if you use a CD ROM player, dual

hard disk drives, third-party disk caches, or some other disk compression program), running DOS's memory manager or disk compressor may require a lot of work. Before you do anything, play it safe: Create a boot disk and back up your system.

#### DISK COMPRESSION

#### Twice the Space, Twice the Trouble?

Winner: None With 340MB hard disks selling for under \$500, does anyone really need disk compression software? Microsoft apparently thinks so. It has joined the ranks of market leaders Stacker and SuperStor Pro with DoubleSpace, a disk compression program built into DOS 6.0.

The allure of disk compression is certainly considerable: Select a few commands, and after an hour of digital squeezing, your hard disk has twice as much capacity. From then

on, you can run all your Windows and DOS programs as before (open and save files, use standard DOS commands such as DIR and CHKDSK, and copy files to and from your hard disk transparently) while compression program automatically expands outgoing files and shrinks incoming ones.

But take advertised compression ratios of 2:1 or 3:1

with a grain of salt (a 2:1 ratio means that a 10MB file will be squeezed into a 5MB space). Although DoubleSpace and Stacker initially claim to double usable capacity, it ain't necessarily so. As you save new files, you discover that compression varies wildly by file type (see "Average Compression by File Type"). According to PC World's tests, DoubleSpace's real-world compression ratio is about 1.6:1, and Stacker's 1.9:1. Desktop publishers and graphics mavens take special note: TIFF files barely shrink, and at best, Stacker can deflate EPS and PCX files by a factor of 2.5:1.

Managing a compressed drive is a pain, too, because free space is calculated on an estimated compression ratio. If the estimate is 2:1, but you're packing the disk with TIFF files, the difference between reported and true space can be huge. DOS's Double-Space is especially vulnerable to this shell game, because it doesn't automatically recalculate its estimates; as the disk fills up, you

may get erroneous outof-space error messages when megabytes of space remain. The solution? You must periodically defrag the disk and run utilities that scan your files and update estimates with real compression values.

Still, disk compressors are a lot faster, safer, and simpler than they used to be. Although some applica-

tions will drag a bit during disk access, most will zoom right along; in fact, some operations may even be faster. Reliability and compatibility of compressors are also much improved. You can run Windows, databases with compressed indexes, PKZip (which won't compress things further), and just about anything else on a compressed drive without a hiccup. Even more impressive: If a power outage strikes while you're creating, resizing, or defragging a DoubleSpace, Stacker, or SuperStor drive, your data is usually secure. If an error does occur, Stacker and SuperStor have disk repair tools just a menu option away. DoubleSpace doesn't, which means you'd better pray for a disk error CHKDSK/F can fix-or have a copy of The Norton Utilities nearby.

In the ease-of-use sweeps, though, DOS's DoubleSpace comes up a winner. Type a command or two and DoubleSpace runs

CHKDSK, defrags your disk, and in under an hour, creates a speedy compressed drive. Unlike SuperStor, DoubleSpace doesn't require you to keep an eye on duplicate AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files or to disable all your TSRs and drivers during installation. To later create, expand, or shrink a drive, you select a menu option or two, enter the desired size, press <Enter>, and it's done in a flash.

Stacker takes a similar if more convoluted approach; it analyzes your disk over and over again and reboots to activate new settings. But Stacker can be installed from Windows and even offers some measure of control from there. You can check gauges that actively calculate compression and free space, refresh a third gauge to view file fragmentation, and click icons that drop you down to DOS so you can create and manipulate compressed drives. Stacker also offers far more goodies than DoubleSpace. You can fine-tune compressions (trading speed for space), create compressed floppies that can be read on non-Stacker systems, and easily uninstall the program.

On the other hand, SuperStor Pro is a challenge to get going. Although it matches Stacker's advanced features, SuperStor is crippled by a ham-fisted installation process, confusing prompts, and a misleading manual that omits vital information—following these instructions you can't even install SuperStor. Later, if you want to resize a compressed drive or run SuperStor's built-in defragger, you must disable your disk cache once more—even if you use DOS's own Smart-Drive. With Stacker and DoubleSpace

> around, there's little reason to put up with such hassles.

So which package gets the nod? None, for now. Stacker offers better file compression, disk repair, and uninstall, but it's somewhat difficult to use. That may change, however, with the release of Stacker 3.1, which is intended specifically for use with DOS 6.0 and is due out before you read this.

Like DoubleSpace, Stacker 3.1 will be much more tightly integrated with DOS, which means no duplicate AUTOEX-EC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS files, and generally more streamlined operations.

AddStor also has a DOS 6.0-specific product on the way: Double Tools. (SuperStor will be aimed at DOS 5.0 and earlier setups.) The company claims Double Tools will enhance DoubleSpace, providing Windows-based controls, background defragging, better compression, more accurate disk stats, and advanced disk repair. Let's hope it also provides a sensible in-tallation program and better documentation.

And what about DoubleSpace? It ast, simple, and seemingly stable, but it last an

uninstall option, which should give pause even to experienced users. Worse, a casual scroll through various CompuServe forums reveals that DoubleSpace can sometimes screw things up royally, from failing to install properly, to scrambling video, to even trashing your hard disk. Until Microsoft figures out what's causing the growing thicket of problems, it's best to wait a bit.

#### MEMORY MANAGEMENT

#### Finding a Place for Everything

Winners: DOS 6.0 and QEMM386 For most people, managing memory ranks up there with getting a root canal. Small wonder—your typical 386 or 486 has five different kinds of memory to keep track of, from conventional (the fabled first 640K) to the megabytes of extended. That's why memory managers were invented. Memory managers such as past Best Buys QEMM386 and 386Max ("Memory Managers," July 1992) can also ferret out memory and configure it for optimal use, something that DOS 5.0's memory manager couldn't do. With DOS 6.0, Microsoft has added MemMaket, a program designed to do just that job.

Memory managers have their work cut out for them. After the first 640K of conventional RAM-where DOS, drivers, TSRs, programs, and data are stored if your PC has no other memory-come upper memory blocks (UMBs). UMBs encompass the memory addresses between 640K and 1MB reserved for video RAM and the ROM chips that control your PC, video, hard disk, and other adapter cards. Many of these addresses aren't used, so memory managers "remap" pieces of extended memory into those unused addresses, then stuff that memory with drivers, TSRs, and other special programs that normally take up conventional memory. Then there's the high memory area (HMA), the first 64K of RAM above 1MB. This is where a chunk of DOS is relocated when you place the DOS= HIGH statement in CONFIG.SYS. Finally. there's extended memory-any memory above 1MB (which Windows, disk caching software, and some large DOS applications can use)-and expanded memory, a fading standard that is typically required by older DOS programs.

Of course, few users worry about these

distinctions. They simply need as much conventional and extended memory as possible, with the fewest hassles. Unfortunately, these two desires are seldom satisfied by the same memory manager. Although DOS 6.0's MemMaker program optimizes memory with just a few keystrokes, it doesn't liberate much more conventional memory than DOS 5.0 did. Fire up QEMM or 386Max, however, and you discover (albeit with some effort) that there is more RAM to be had—lots more.

Whichever manager you use, the process of optimizing memory (especially ferreting out UMBs) is pretty much the same. The manager's optimizer program analyzes your system, determines how much memory the drivers and TSRs in your AUTOEXEC-BAT and CONFIG.SYS will probably need, and reboots your computer several times to figure out which programs will fit into upper memory and in what order.

When the manager finishes, AUTOEXEC. BAT, CONFIG.SYS, and Windows' SYS-TEM.INI are modified. You'll find a memory manager listed in CONFIG.SYS, new commands inserted before certain programs, and your drivers and TSRs now loaded into upper memory, leaving more conventional RAM free. The next time you add a new driver or TSR to your system, just run the optimizer again and let it reshuffle the deck. You don't have to fuss with extended versus expanded memory either—the manager provides them to applications on demand.

How well and easily these managers do the job varies considerably. MemMaker, QEMM, and 386Max are simple enough to install and run. The programs prompt you

along the way, automatically find and remove conflicting memory managers, and back up AUTO EXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS before making any changes to your system. All three come with memory analysis programs, but OEMM's Manifest is the best at identifying which drivers and TSRs are loaded and where.

Novices will likely

prefer DOS 6.0's MemMaker. The manual is about 20 pages, the prompts are unambiguous, and there are few choices to make. QEMM's prompts are sometimes confusing, and it's easy to confirm the wrong option. Worse, QEMM's manual mixes techno-jargon in with the basic instructions, has sparse illustrations, and is out-of-date—there are no specific references to Windows 3.1, for example.

But if you have a lot of TSRs and device drivers, and MemMaker can't find UMBs for all of them, QEMM is the best game in town. Although I hesitate to use the words intelligent and software in the same sentence, QEMM is clearly the smartest program when it comes to recovering upper memory and moving drivers and TSRs out of conventional memory. QEMM recovered nearly 211K of upper memory and relocated our entire test suite of drivers and TSRs. 386Max matched QEMM byte-for-byte in


finding upper memory, but it wasn't always quite as successful at relocating our test suite. Mem-Maker uncovered only 155K, and it stranded even more programs in conventional RAM, If you usually run text-only applications, QEMM can boost conventional RaM to 715K. Now this memory opringation with a vereance.

Just keep in mind that none of these memory managers is bulletproof. If the system hangs or is accidentally rebooted while QEMM is scrutinizing memory, the manager may pick up where it left off—or it may not. If it does continue optimizing, you may discover at the end that nothing has been changed. However, if you exit to DOS and run QEMM from scratch, optimization is properly performed.

DOS's MemMaker is only a little less flaky in the same situation. It notes that there's been an interruption and will start the optimization process over again. But in some cases, CONFIG.SYS is only partially modified; in others, every time you boot up, AUTOEXEC.BAT displays an error message. And on still other occasions, MemMaker picks up the beat and finishes optimization without a hitch.

Previous Best Buy 386Max has a good reputation, an appealing interface, and a great manual. But the version I looked at, 6.03, was an interim bug fix in desperate need of an interim bug fix. The installation program stalled in the middle of operations, sometimes failed to open CONFIG. SYS properly, and insisted that the program be installed on drive C:. Worse, on one of the three test systems, a 33-MHz Gateway 386, 386Max obliterated the CMOS settings, rendering the hard disk temporarily inaccessible. Qualitas already has a fix for the CMOS problem and promises to squash the other bugs before releasing version 7.0 this summer. Laterand earlier-versions of 386Max may be fine, but steer clear of 6.03.



continued from page 178 feeling cramped in the lower 640K, and you're ready for a little book work, buy QEMM. Just remember: Even idiotproof memory managers such as MemMaker require patience to get the most out of them.

#### ANTIVIRUS PROGRAMS

#### One Deal, One for Real

Winner: Norton AntiVirus Antivirus programs are the sentinels at your PC's gate: They keep the software barbarians from entering your system and pillaging your hard disk. If you log onto BBS's, swap floppies with office mates, or even buy supposedly sealed software from retail and mail-order outlets, you need protection.

A capable virus checker isn't foolproof. There are thousands of known viruses, and dozens of new strains are created every week. But it can foil many intruders. DOS 6.0's Anti-Virus, PC World Best Buy Norton AntiVirus, and runner-up Virex for the PC ("Search and Destroy: Antivirus Software," May 1993) all provide basic protection and then some. They can detect viruses that infect executable files, hard disk boot sectors, and partition tables, and write-protect these areas from attack. These programs also fix or at least remove infected files and load memory-resident TSRs that actively scan for suspicious activity and prevent infected programs from running. In our tests, conducted with 13 common and uncommon viruses provided by the National Computer Security Association, all three virus checkers caught the lion's share of these software intruders (see "Antivirus Program Performance").

However, Norton AntiVirus didn't win May's Best Buy by accident. Its streamlined interface (a rarity among virus checkers) can be handled even by PC novices, and its virus detection and prevention are among the best. The program does things almost intuitively; for instance, it immediately offers to inoculate a suspect file it finds during a scan. Installation and setup are just as thorough and straightforward. Like any good virus checker, Norton scans your system's memory and drives before installing itself, then edits AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG.SYS so memory and disk scanning are automatic every time you boot up. The program comes with both DOS and Windows user interfaces, making it easy to use in the environment of your choice (Norton Desktop for DOS and Norton Desktop for Windows each come with the appropriate single-interface version).

With DOS 6.0, however, you must crack open AUTOEXEC.BAT and CONFIG. SYS and manually add references so that memory and disk scanning run at start-up. DOS does install its disk scanner onto the Windows desktop, but to receive messages

from the TSR, you must add a command to WIN.INI or an icon to the StartUp group.

Virex is even clunkier. You can install either Virex or VirexPro (a more thorough and configurable version), but not both. For some reason, Virex insists on nestling at the bottom of AUTOEXEC.BAT—curious, since an antivirus program should be the very first thing your system runs. Another quirk: When installation is complete, only the memory-resident virus monitor is referenced in your AUTOEXEC.BAT; you must add the disk scanner manually.

Configuring Norton is a snap—you just type NAV at the DOS prompt or click the Windows icon and pick the options off a

few menus. DOS 6.0's Anti-Virus (which is based on Central Point's Anti-Virus) is even simpler, offering a few on-screen buttons that reveal a half-dozen check boxes. Virex is configured with a handy menudriven shell, while VirexPro forces you to run the installation program again. Finetuning either program is complicated by an ambiguous and maddeningly repetitive manual. Key technical details, such as inoculating files or adding DOS-level switches, are explained fuzzily, and the manual isn't indexed-a sin no matter how slim the tome. But don't write off Virex vet; a new version that integrates both programs and fixes the manual should be released by the time you read this.

Compatibility is another key issue. Both DOS's and Norton's TSRs are easily loaded

into upper memory via Mem-Maker, but Virex's is not (you can, however, manually use the LOADHIGH command to load Virex high). And since most virus experts strongly suggest you run two checkers to ensure

system integrity, your second program should at least work with DOS's Anti-Virus. Norton's Anti-Virus runs merrily with either DOS's Anti-Virus or Virex, but Virex and DOS's Anti-Virus together are like gasoline and matches.

When it comes to keeping your checker up-to-date, all three vendors offer good deals. If you've got a modem, you can download new virus definitions free from each company's BBS (Symantec and Datawatch also post updates on CompuServe and other on-line services). Monthly floppy updates from Norton cost \$12 a month or \$69 a year; Virex's annual subscription runs \$50. Microsoft will provide two updates for

\$19; after that, support will come directly from Central Point Software.

But cheap updates do not a virus checker make. Although DOS's Anti-Virus is a solid contender, this is one area where I'm not inclined to skimp. Buy Norton. For starters, Norton detects over 1400 viruses, while Virex flags about 1300 and DOS about 1000. Second, Norton automatically scans memory and drives for viruses when installed, and completely edits AUTO-EXEC.BAT, CONFIG.SYS, and SYS-TEM.INI, while Virex and especially Anti-Virus do not. What's more, an antivirus program that ships with DOS is a big temptation for the antisocial types who write viruses; as one Microsoft insider admitted, "Adding a virus checker to DOS was like painting a big bull's-eve on our backs." So when you upgrade to DOS 6.0, go ahead and install Anti-Virus-then get the latest version of Norton AntiVirus and double your protection.

#### DISK BACKUP

#### Floppy Madness

Winner: Central Point Backup Backing up is no longer hard to do, thanks to Best Buy programs such as Norton Backup and Central Point Backup for DOS and Windows ("Backup Software," July 1992), which set the standard for both ease of use and copious features. DOS 6.0 follows in these Brobdingnagian footsteps with Microsoft Backup, a DOS and Windows tool that resembles a slim and

trim Norton. My only reservations are that MSBackup doesn't support tape drives, a rather crucial omission in a world where 200MB drives are becoming the norm. Nor can it schedule backups—a useful feature for prodding lackadaisical workers.

But if you don't mind collecting floppies (and a lot of them; MSBackup requires a

fresh disk for even incremental backups of just a few files), MSBackup is still a good deal—the equivalent of Norton Backup's basic mode. It doesn't offer the big-time goodies—superfast backup, multiple data compression techniques, configurable backup sets, or macros. But it's a meat-and-potatoes program that most users can probably use.

Installing Microsoft Backup in DOS or Windows is a breeze—you're prompted at every juncture, it does a quick backup and restore to verify system integrity, and that's it. Click the Backup button, select the mode (full, incremental, or differential), tag desired files in a directory tree, select Start Backup, and just pop in the floppies. As with Norton, you can verify and compress backup data, use error correction, and slap on password protection. The Windows version can also conduct backups in the background. A final advantage: If Norton Backup is your company's program of choice, MSBackup is a cheap way to spread Nor-

ton-like backup around the office while keeping support costs low.

But Norton Backup and Central Point's latest backup program (found in PC Tools 8.0a and PC Tools for Windows 1.0) offers a much wider range of features for power users and novices alike. The simplest backup in the world is a full backup to tape, which MSBackup doesn't support. And with the tools built into Norton and PC Tools, the office guru can easily create a one-click backup system that anyone can run. The program you choose is a matter of taste, because both offer very similar features, from tape drive support to unattended backups.

If you have your own way of doing things,

you'll find Norton Backup more flexible than Gumby. You can create reusable setup files that tell Norton to back up only certain files and file types, such as worksheets. With a little work, you can even create a Windows

icon that runs the whole show with a double-click. That's a backup system any novice can master. If you fill out a simple electronic schedule, Norton will remember to run a backup on a specific day or at regular intervals. What's more, DOS 6.0 MS-Backup users who want this automation can move to Norton and find a familiar interface.

Central Point's edge? It matches Norton's features and tries just a little bit harder. For example, Central Point's facile directory tree has everything you need in one place. You can tag files, pop open a menu and exclude specific file types, reconfigure the windowpanes, split the screen to view files, and more. Central Point can also automatically scan backup files for viruses and back up NetWare bindery files (if you have a SCSI tape drive), and it even sports a friendly calendarlike scheduler.

In short, Central Point Backup is just a shade more intuitive and powerful, and it beats Norton by a hair.

#### DISK DEFRAGGING

#### All You Need Is DOS

Winner: DOS 6.0 Defragging or optimizing a hard disk is a pretty straightforward affair. All the programs reviewed here suggest the best defragging approach, execute the chore quickly and efficiently, and include more than enough options (see "Defrag Time"). DOS 6.0's DEFRAG command, based on The Norton Utilities' SpeedDisk program, is the simplest of the lot, and the recommended buy. DEFRAG does all the basics: The full option defrags each file, puts all files at the front of the disk, and moves all free space to the back; a quick option just defrags each

file; and there's the capability to sort files by date, size, extension, and so on while defragging them. If you haven't bought a disk defragger, don't—DEFRAG is enough.

Power users may want to consider The Norton Utilities 7.0's more capable and upto-date SpeedDisk, or the Compress program found in PC Tools for DOS 8.0a and PC Tools for Windows 1.0, all Best Buys in last month's disk utilities roundup ("The Complete Hard Disk Toolkit"). DEFRAG's workspace is limited to conventional RAM, so it may have problems defragging drives over 300MB; SpeedDisk and Compress can tackle drives in the 1 to 2GB range.

Note that although the SpeedDisk found in the Norton Desktop series is similar to The Norton Utilities 7.0, the latter incorporates the latest technology, including compressed disk defragging. Symantec won't confirm whether or when this version of SpeedDisk will appear in a Desktop product.

Other Norton and PC Tools talents, such as moving selected directories or files to the front of the disk for faster loading, may look good on paper, but they do little to speed up your hard disk. You can't beat their superb disk repair tools, however, and they may come in handy if your optimization is interrupted by a power failure.

When it comes to the pull-out-the-plug test, all three programs flag the disk errors that result when an optimization is rudely interrupted. Norton and PC Tools fix the disk errors on the spot; DOS 6.0 lamely suggests you get your hands on a disk repair program—such as Norton or PC Tools.

But at \$179, The Norton Utilities and PC Tools are overkill if all you need is a good defragger and your disk isn't huge. DOS 6.0 wins this round—for now.

#### By Any Other Name

If you already have DOS 5.0 and a garland of powerful add-ons such as Norton AntiVirus and QEMM-386, don't waste your money on DOS 6.0. But if you're two or three programs short and cash is tight, DOS 6.0 is a tempting solution. It's not a Best Buy; it's more like a Good Deal.

Just remember that although our informal tests showed DOS 6.0 to be relatively stable, compatible, and bug-free, complaints are coming in. Of course, not all the blame can be laid at Microsoft's feet. By their nature, disk compressors and memory man-

agers push your operating system and hardware to the limit, and with the myriad BIOS, video, and software combinations, problems are bound to crop up.

But that doesn't let Microsoft off the hook. When confronted with DOS 6.0's faux pas, including growing complaints about Double-Space, the lack of disk repair or tape backup, and poor integration

among the tools, the response is often a shrug and a "Well, we ran out of time." That's a weak excuse from a company with hundreds of millions of customers. DOS 6.0 is still a good deal, but think of it as training wheels until you're ready for the likes of Norton Backup, QEMM, and PC Tools.







# Are PIMS Ready for Prime Time?

You wouldn't dream of writing a report on a typewriter. And if you assembled a budget proposal using an adding machine and ledger paper, your officemates would probably put you in a padded room and take away all the sharp objects.

#### WINDOWS PERSONAL INFORMATION MANAGERS

Yet it's a safe bet that you keep all your important phone numbers in a Rolodex and your schedule in a datebook

or on a wall calendar. And when you really need to remember something, you stick a Post-it note on the closest available surface—probably your computer screen. And you wonder why it takes so long to get your work done.

#### PROMISE TO ORGANIZE YOUR BUSINESS LIFE. IMPOSSIBLE?

While word processors and spreadsheets have made crunching words and numbers

easier than ever, another genre of software, personal information managers (PIMs), has taken on all the other niggling details of your average business day. If the examples we've seen lately are any indication, PIMs could soon become

as essential to your working life as your word processor and spreadsheet.

Exactly what is a PIM? While no two are exactly alike, any PIM worthy of the name should have four basic components: a database to hold names and addresses, a calendar for appointments, a to-do list to keep track of your projects, and some kind of word processor or notepad. The best PIMs

also help you tie all this information together—linking, say, a

name in your address book to an appointment in your calendar, and attaching notes and data files you'll want to review before a meeting.

PIMs today are both easier and more powerful than BY DANIEL TYNAN

#### WINDOWS PIMs

ever. The biggest reason for the change—and stop us if you've heard this one before—is Windows. Windows PIMs have several advantages over their character-based DOS counterparts:

- The graphical interface, which can be made to imitate familiar items such as Rolodex cards or appointment books, makes Windows PIMs much simpler to learn.
- The Windows interface can help make the PIM more customizable, so it can be made to fit the way you want to organize your work space.
- Multitasking makes it easy to use your PIM while juggling spreadsheets, word processor, and E-mail.
- Windows' ability to link data from application to application makes PIMs much more powerful than they could be under DOS.

#### Picking the Perfect PIM

To find out which Windows PIMs are best, we picked nine of the top products—including a prerelease copy of Arabesque's Ecco—and put them through a workout re-creating all the things you'd do with a PIM in the course of a typical overstuffed business day. Our product list ranged from straightforward PIMs like Lotus Organizer to full-fledged contact managers such as Act and Maximizer. (Contact managers typically require you to tie every bit of information to a name in the address book.)

Of course, we weren't able to look at every PIM that will be available by the time you read this. For example, two new products from Symantec and Parsons Technology weren't available for review. The eagerly anticipated PackRat 5.0 was available to us only in a beta version; for our initial impressions, see "Do the Rat Thing."

#### The Windows Advantage

We're suckers for a graphical interface. Most of these programs use some kind of familiar visual metaphor, such as a Rolodex, an index card, or an appointment book. Some programs take fuller advantage of Windows than others, using iconized tool bars and exploiting


drag-and-drop. As for customizing the interface by redefining buttons and tool bars, Commence and Ecco are the most malleable.

We also like programs that take advantage of Windows' ability to link different applications. Both Lotus Organizer (cc:Mail) and Ecco (Microsoft Mail, cc:Mail) will check your E-mail in-boxes and alert you to any new messages; Ascend plans to support E-mail in an upcoming release. Several of these programs let you link their address books to Windows word processors for easy mail merging. Ecco's Shooter utility, however, is the ultimate in linking information from your PIM to all your other Windows apps. For ease of use, Lotus Organizer was the obvious choice.

#### Addressing for Success

You may already keep your contact information in a database or even a simple text file, which is why all PIMs let you import data from one or more common file formats. Good PIMs let you map

your data file's field names to theirs and even add new fields.

No electronic address book would be complete without an autodialer and a phone log. The best auto-dialers let you specify dialing prefixes and suffixes for long-distance carriers and credit card calls. The phone log should record the time and date of both outgoing and incoming calls and let you take notes as you gab. For handling phone book data, Act for Windows and Ecco Professional are best, with DeskTop Set for Windows a close second.

#### Well-Appointed Scheduling

Quick—what does your schedule look like next month? If you were using a PIM, you could view or print a monthly calendar faster than you could find your datebook. These electronic calendars also let

you see your schedule in daily, weekly, monthly, or even yearly views; set alarms to remind you of appointments; and find blocks of free time quickly.

All PIMs allow you to set recurring appointments (such as a staff meeting every Monday at 2 p.m.). Most also let you set

more complex *conditional* recurring appointments, such as on the third Tuesday of each month. A PIM should be alert to scheduling conflicts, especially with recurring appointments, since you usually set those up without looking at the days in question. It should also let you know if you missed any alarms while your PC was turned off. Finally, a few PIMs let you do group scheduling by accessing other users' calendars across the network (as long as you're all using the same PIM, of course).

For our money, no PIM does a better job of scheduling than Ecco, though Above & Beyond is also quite good.

#### **Much Ado About Noting**

Anyone with a pen, a piece of paper, and two brain cells to rub together can create a to-do list. But reorganizing that list in order of priority or by due date gets a mite trickier. PIMs excel at this brand of task juggling. While all of these PIMs let you sort your to-do list PIMs come in two basic flavors: easy to use and powerful. That's why we picked two Best Buys. For our money, the best easy-to-use PIM is Lotus Organizer—it looks just like an appointment book and is just as easy to use. It will get you up and running in no time. If you want more power (and have the time to learn to use the program), Arabesque's new Ecco is your best bet. Using its powerful outlining tools, you can organize any information you want—appointments, names and addresses, to-do's—any way you want.

by due date, we prefer those that also let you sort by project, priority, and completion status. Among the PIMs we looked at, the ablest task masters are Commence and Ascend.

In addition to to-do functions, most PIMs let you take notes and produce simple output using their notepads. The top built-in notepads are found in contact managers such as Act and Maximizer.

You also want a PIM to be portable. Products such as Act and Maximizer make it easy to keep their associated data files consistent on your notebook and desktop ma-

chines. If you use a datebook such as the Day Runner, FiloFax, or Franklin Day Planner, you'll want a PIM that lets you choose those formats as options on the print setup menu. When it comes to printing, DeskTop Set and Lotus Organizer are the best PIMs here.

#### PIM and Proper

Is there such a thing as the perfect Windows PIM? Not yet. If you could combine Lotus Organizer's ease of use and Ecco's power with the reporting talents of Act or Maximizer, the scheduling smarts of Above & Beyond, the extensive feature set of DeskTop Set, and the interconnectivity of Commence, then maybe you'd have something approaching perfection.

Two programs come closer to the ideal than the others. For a simple, quick solution to your contact and scheduling needs, buy Lotus Organizer. Even if you've never cracked open a Day Runner, let alone a PIM, you'll find this \$149 program remarkably easy to use. If you're in the market for something meatier, try Ecco. Though it requires some learning time, Arabesque's groundbreaking outliner/address book/scheduler gives you unprecedented power for sharing information across applications. For truly powerful personal data management, there's nothing better.

Contact Software's Act for Windows is a solid third-place finisher, particularly for salespeople and executives whose jobs consist mainly of staying in touch with others. But project- or appointment-oriented managers may find it too contact centered to be useful. You should also keep an eye out for PackRat 5.0. Once it's in shipping shape, it may well give our Best Buys a run for your money.

As our two Best Buys prove, there's no longer any excuse for doing things the old-fashioned way. Your most important information is your personal information—and a personal information manager on a personal computer is the perfect tool for managing it.

#### Above & Beyond for Windows 2.1

PROS: Excellent scheduling skills

CONS: Limited address book, phone accessories, and notepad, poor interface

Above & Beyond made a name for itself with its scheduling flair and stylish accessories. These days, however, this \$149 package is surpassed by newer rivals like Ecco and Lotus Organizer.


Above & Beyond still knows its way around a calendar. Doubleclicking on the blank daily view calls up a dialog box where you can fill in an event description, add notes, set an alarm, and create virtually any kind of recurring appointment you could imagine. Don't like your new appointment time? Drag the meeting to a new slot or let Above & Beyond juggle it earlier or later in the day or the week.

Above & Beyond is the only program we looked at that tells you how much free time you have between appointments and what percentage of your day is filled with meetings. The program's builtin group scheduler lets you search for free time on all active users' calendars. And a unique timer module lets you associate a dollar figure to each minute or hour so you can keep track of how much that phone call is going to cost, or how much to bill a client for the time spent working on a project.

Unfortunately, Above & Beyond falls below and behind in other categories. The address book is a slightly enhanced version of Windows' Cardfile with straight text input—there are no data fields, and thus no way to sort or filter records except by name. It offers virtually no phone skills beyond a rudimentary auto-dialer. Call up the notepad in Above & Beyond and you get Windows' Notepad; the program provides no links to full-fledged word processors and no mail merge capabilities. Finally, it doesn't have any predefined appointment book formats for printing,


Above & Beyond is also in dire need of an interface-lift. It uses text characters like -a and -r to mark alarms and recurring appointments, and its pulldown menus—some of which stretch from the top of the screen to the bottom—are downright scary. If you need a low-cost scheduler for you or your work group, Above & Beyond is a powerful, if unexciting, solution. But if you want a full-featured PIM, it won't win you over.



#### Act for Windows 1.1

PROS: Strong contact history, excellent mail merge/word processor

CONS: Awkward scheduling

If you need to enforce order on your daily chores, Contact Software's Act for Windows will do it. But whether this \$395 contact manager is a good fit for you depends largely on how much time you spend meeting with or talking to people.

In keeping with its contact orientation, Act's address book is like a massive Rolodex, with more than 70 pieces of information on each card, including your latest call or meeting with each person. You can define up to 15 custom fields per record and create pop-up lists of possible entries. Once your data is entered, you can perform sophisticated searches and save your search criteria.

An icon tool bar gives you access to a variety of powerful features. Clicking on the letter tool, for example, brings up a letter template with the name and address of the currently selected person in place. Yet another icon calls up an activities list with this contact.

Act really sweats the details of staying in touch with people. Make a phone call? Act will ask if you reached the person and prompt you to schedule a follow-up call. Print a letter? Act will ask if it was an intermediate draft or a final copy, then prompt you to print an envelope. Each activity goes directly into the contact's history log automatically.


Act is also a fine traveling companion. You can download records to a notebook and merge them with existing records on your return, or write letters and print them later. And you can swap information with a miniature version of Act that runs on HP's hand-held 95LX.

Unfortunately, Act's scheduling talents are only so-so. You have to tie everything you do in Act to a contact. Keeping track of personal chores, for example, means setting up meetings or tasks with yourself, which may take some getting used to.

Act is ideal for people whose jobs are contact heavy and who need detailed, thorough histories of each transaction. If your job is more task or project oriented, however, you may find Act's insistence on contacts a little overbearing.

#### **Ascend for Windows 4.0**

PROS: Attractive interface, extensive task lists and reporting

CONS: Scheduler module is unusable

Ascend is more than a software package, it's a way of life. Along with the \$199.95 program, you get a complete organizer/binder with three years' worth of blank schedules and audiotapes of a Franklin Institute time management seminar—not terribly surprising since Ascend is the software companion to the Franklin Day Planner.

Ascend can help you articulate your basic values, formulate longterm goals, and then structure your daily life to attain those goals. Thanks to its goal orientation, Ascend boasts some of the best to-do tools of any of the PIMs here. You can create up to five master task lists and a prioritized daily list and set the program to shuffle tasks between them after a certain amount of time.


The letter-tabbed address book is also handy. The data entry form holds dozens of fields of data and a built-in notepad. Once your names and addresses are entered, Ascend sorts them by individual and company names automatically. If you enter a record for a new contact at a company already in the database, Ascend fills in the address, phone number, and other essentials automatically.

Ascend's calendar, on the other hand, is less appealing. While you can type directly into time slots on the appointment schedule, descriptions are limited to 30 characters each. To set meeting durations, you must either specify a number of 15-minute "blocks" or drag the mouse along a time bar in the weekly view.

Setting recurring appointments is also a hassle. You can't customize default settings for durations, dates, or times, so you have to set up each new recurring appointment from scratch. And the daily calendar displays only recurring appointments or cheeks for conflicts up to 30 days in advance.

Ascend has some features you won't find in other PIMs; in keeping with the self-improvement theme, it has tools for storing favorite quotations and positive affirmations about your overall values, both of which can be set to display at start-up. If you're ready to change your life, Ascend is definitely the PIM for you. Otherwise, you're better off choosing a PIM with better scheduling.

### Commence 1.0

PROS: Excellent linking between items, tracks resources

CONS: Bare-bones interface, difficult to master

In a former life, Commence was IBM's Current. The \$395 package's pedigree is obvious: Its buttoned-down look screams Big Blue. The address book is unadorned, and the daily calendar is a barebones list of times and dates—Commence's interface is the software equivalent of a white shirt and black wingtips.

While Commence may not look very interesting, it's certainly powerful. The package's greatest strength is its ability to make connections between different pieces of information. When you enter an event in the calendar, for example, fields inside the appointment dialog box let you link it to other people, appointments, projects, to-do items, and conference rooms. You can select from a list of existing contacts or projects or add new ones on the fly. Each new item can also be linked to other items. This is the only package that lets you factor in travel times for appointments; Commence also boasts sophisticated search and reporting capabilities.

All this power comes at a price: To get the most out of Commence, you'll have to learn to think its way. A prime example of this is Commence's "agents." These macrolike routines perform a task when certain conditions are met—for example, you can create an agent to print your next day's to-do list each afternoon at 4:30. However, uncovering these agents' secrets is no trivial task, and the program's obtuse on-line help system doesn't make the process any easier.

Unfortunately, some of the basic functionality you want from a PIM—such as the ability to notify you of passed alarms at start-up—is available only through these agents. Other features, such as a speed-dial list, a weekly view of appointment details, and predefined printing formats for common appointment books, aren't available at all. Also, the program hasn't taken full advantage of Windows, so you won't find any drag-and-drop scheduling or dialing.

Commence could well be irresistible for corporate users once it adds group scheduling (due in version 2.0) to its resource tracking and interconnectivity features. In the meantime, version 1.0 is a good, if thorny, start.

# DeskTop Set for Windows 4.0

**PROS:** Customizable address forms, great printing options, phonetic searches, excellent phone accessories, highly portable

CONS: Inconsistent interface, poor integration between modules, no conflict checking

Working in DeskTop Set 4.0 is like preparing a gourmet meal in the kitchen of a brilliant but eccentric chef. While the \$89 program is well stocked with clever features, its idiosyncrasies may make it hard for new users to get cooking.


Because DeskTop Set's free-form daily calendar looks like a blank piece of notebook paper, you can enter appointments anywhere on the page. That means it's easy to see all of your schedule at once. However, DeskTop Set won't sort your schedule unless you tell it to, and it offers no conflict checking.

DeskTop Set's highly mousable interface lets you schedule appointments without typing. You can drag a name from the address book to the calendar—up pops a dialog box where you can choose start and end times by clicking on a time bar, set an alarm by clicking on a clock face, and even choose an event description (such as "Business meeting") from a scrollable list.

DeskTop Set's phone book also provides plenty of ways to slice and dice your data, with 58 fields per record. You can then add up to 32 custom fields and 128 keywords per record and use them to sort and search the database. And DeskTop Set is great at whipping up schedules to go, producing attractive printouts in a variety of formats and downloading data to hand-held devices like the Sharp Wizard and HP 95LX.

However, these sweet features are soured somewhat by DeskTop Set's inconsistencies. For example, you can link files to phone book entries and to-do items but not to appointments. Even worse, commands sometimes vary from one module to the next. All of this is guaranteed to send you running for Help (which, inexplicably, is hidden under the File menu).

If portability is your cup of consommé, and you're willing to put in the time, you may develop a taste for Desk Top's idiosyncrasies. Otherwise, it's a case of a few too many quirks spoiling the broth. Okna, 201/909-8600. Reader service no. 733

CONS: Difficult to master




Arabesque's \$395 Ecco gives you the world in an outline, and we were so impressed with this

powerful approach to information management that we awarded it a Best Buy.

Because everything in Ecco is an outline, you can store tons of information inside any of the modules and then expand or collapse them with a click of the mouse. Take, for example, Ecco's phone book. In addition to the usual letter-tabbed list of names and numbers, you can expand the view into a table with up to 50 columns for addresses, alternative phone numbers, and any other categories you want to add. You can also add information below each person's name—text notes, file names, spreadsheet data, even graphics and tuck it away until you need it.

To create an appointment, simply select a name in the address book and drag it over to the calendar with the mouse. Ecco attaches a record of the meeting beneath the person's phone book entry automatically. (You can also create appointments by typing directly on the calendar, but Ecco won't link it to the contact.) A pop-up dialog box lets you adjust the time or date, set a multitude of alarms, create recurring appointments, add the item to your to-do list, and more. As with the phone book, you can add notes and other items beneath the appointment.

Ecco's third major component is folders. Folders let you organize data by project, person, or any other way you want. Simply drag items from the address book, calendar, or to-do list into a folder icon. The data doesn't actually move or copy from its original location; Ecco just gives you a different way of looking at it.

# Do the Rat Thing

For years Polaris Software's PackRat has been one of the ablest Windows PIMs around—and one of the most aptly named. If a feature existed, PackRat had it stuffed away somewhere in its bag of tricks.

Unfortunately, all this power made the learning curve a tad slippery. PackRat 5.0 promises to change all that with a highly customizable interface that's also extremely powerful. Judging from the prerelease copy we looked at, it may well succeed.

The first time you fire up the new PackRat, you can choose from a list of more than a dozen professions—administrative, managerial, legal, medical, and so on. PackRat will then start up with the modules it thinks you need already loaded. Lawyers, for example, will see a five-day calendar, a contact list, and a phone book. A manager, on the other hand, will get an employee directory and a list of

assignable to-do's. You can also choose to add or delete modules at start-up or customize the PIM later to your heart's content.

The key to PackRat's malleability is its folders. With version 5.0, folders are more than just places to store related bits of information—they can be custom work spaces. For example, you can store all your to-do's and contacts for each project in a separate folder. Or you can have your to-do list and Gantt chart in one folder, and your address book and speed-dial list in another. You can also run other Windows applications on top of a folder, or have each application iconized in every folder and call it up with a click. In essence, Pack-Rat becomes a substitute for Windows' Program Manager.

PackRat's support for OLE data links gives you another way to use folders. You can link charts in one folder to master spreadsheets

You don't even have to be inside Ecco to use it, thanks to its Shooter utility. The Shooter icon plants itself in the title bar of every active Windows application and lets you copy data from other programs and "shoot" it directly into an Ecco module—as either a simple cut and paste or an Object Linking and Embedding (OLE) object with live data links. You can use Shooter to send data from Ecco to your apps, or even from one Windows program to another. Another nice touch: You get predefined templates for printing in several popular appointment book formats.

However, as with many high-end PIMs, power comes at a price. Though adding records and entering calendar events are fairly straightforward, taking full advantage of Ecco's power requires some careful study. Fortunately, the on-line help is superb, with plenty of screen shots, a handy hypertext glossary, and a slide-show tutorial.

In the case of Ecco, the extra work pays off. It may be the first PIM that truly manages personal information—which is why it earns our recommendation as a Best Buy.


PROS: Gorgeous interface, easy linking, hooks to E-mail
CONS: Sparse, uncustomizable address book, won't allow overlapping
appointments, no monthly view



Looking for a quick, painless cure for your personal info woes? Look no further than Lotus Organizer. This \$149 Best Buy won't strain your brain or your budget—all it will

do is make your life easier.

Organizer's interface looks just like what it's trying to imitate—a paper-based datebook. Colored tabs on the side of the book make it

on the network server. Every time you open the folder, the charts update with the latest information-turning PackRat from a PIM into an executive information system.

All of this functionality is supplemented by a slew of hot new features, such as hooks to popular E-mail packages, drag-anddrop printing, and support for hand-held computers.

Whether PackRat can balance all this power with the ease of use necessary to attract large numbers of users is hard to judge; fully functional copies of the program were not available at press time. But if PackRat delivers on its promise, it (along with Ecco and Organizer) could be the program that will finally

make PIMs as necessary and popular as word processors and spreadsheets.

You can create live DDE links between Organizer's notepad and other Windows applications. You can import spreadsheets, text, graphics, and more to notebook pages, where they will be updated automatically as the original data changes. You can also set up a notepad page as a launching pad for other programs, which along with the program's

link to cc:Mail could let you use Organizer as your main Windows interface. As for portability, this is the only PIM we found that can print in every major appointment book format as well as Rolodex cards and user-customizable formats.

If Organizer has a weakness, it's the address book. There's no way to customize the address form, which contains only three userdefinable fields and no fields for city or state, making it difficult to sort your contacts by region. It also lacks monthly views and weekly time lines and won't let you set overlapping appointments.

However, these are relatively minor faults that we can live with easily. If you need to manipulate tons of data, you'll want something stronger. The next version of Organizer (due to ship by the time you read this) promises to include group scheduling, using cc:Mail as the connection. You won't find an easier way to bring order to the chaos of your professional life than Lotus Organizer, which is why it earns a Best Buy recommendation.



easy to jump among the program's address, calendar, to-do, notepad, anniversary, and year planner sections.

To create an appointment, open the calendar and click on a day. Up pops a dialog box where you can enter a description of the appointment and click icons to set alarms, make it a recurring event, mark it confidential, and even run another program at a specified time. You choose meeting times by sliding two clock faces up and down a time line. And to delete the appointment, just drag it over to the trash can, where it's consumed by an animated ball of flame.

Organizer has brains, too. When the program detects conflicts for recurring appointments, you can jump to the day of the conflict and tell it to find the next available time slot. This is the only PIM smart enough to warn us against scheduling recurring appointments on

PROS: Good reporting, simple expense tracker, built-in macro recorder, easy mail merge

CONS: Unfriendly interface, weak scheduling

Maximizer gives you the basics you need for managing contacts and creating reports, but as an all-around PIM, this \$249 program is a bit of a hard sell. As with all contact managers, everything in Maximizer revolves around the phone book-which, in this case, consists of a table of names and numbers with other contact data displayed in customizable columns alongside it. You can create new fields when

you import data or add them individually later, but there's no way to assign new fields to all of your existing records at once without using the program's macro facility.

The day calendar and to-do list look like the phone book but have slightly different columns. You can drag names from the phone book to the calendar or to-do list, or from the to-do list to the calen-

dar. But there's no easy way to get a person's contact information from inside the calendar if, say, you need to reschedule a meeting. You have to find the name in the phone book or hunt through lists.

Maximizer is full of such extra steps. When you create an appointment, you always have to type in an end time—there's no way to set up a default duration. You can create simple recurring appointments—daily, weekly, and so on—but not on more complicated dates like the third Tuesday of each month. But if you set a recurring appointment, there's no way to change it other than by modifying each appointment individually.

Fortunately, Maximizer does a good job of keeping records and producing reports. Its expense reporting module is a snap to use and customize, providing cumulative monthly and yearly totals and day-by-day printouts. The Editor module is a mini-word processor, complete with formatting tools, and prefab mail merge documents for invoices and letters. Like Act, Maximizer lets you download your contact and schedule info to a notebook, make changes on the road, and then merge the changed records with the existing ones when you return to your desktop PC.

This portability makes Maximizer a good choice for traveling salespeople and executives. But for busy managers who need to keep track of their appointments as much as their contacts, hassling with Maximizer's calendar tools is too much work.

# YourWay 3.2

PROS: Easy-to-use calendar, displays all tasks and appointments on one page CONS: Limited conflict checking, limited links between modules

While many people may find the \$99 YourWay a capable-enough PIM in most respects, we don't think it can match the ease of use of Lotus Organizer or the flexibility and strength of Ecco.

YourWay offers some of the best to-do-list tools in the roundup. There's a task list for long-term projects and a daily list for jobs that need to be done right away. To each item on the list, you can assign several levels of priority, due dates, categories (such as the name of a project or a client), and the person responsible for the task.

YourWay's address book is also well designed, if somewhat limited. It looks like a desktop business-card holder, with letter tabs across the tops of the cards. Each card contains data fields you can shuffle and customize and then sift using Boolean operators. Since the cards are fairly small, you'll be able to view only about ten fields at a time without scrolling.

The daily calendar page is split into separate lists of calls, events, and tasks. However, the crowded screen makes it hard to see more than a few hours of your schedule at a time. You can type directly into a time slot or call up a dialog box, where you can scroll down a list of predefined events and link one directly to an address record.


You can reschedule events by dragging and dropping, but the

method is far from obvious—you first have to select the event, by holding down <Ctrl>, double-clicking on it, then clicking once more in the item's far left column. You can set up recurring events, and YourWay will search for conflicts automatically. But unlike Organizer, if you choose not to overwrite

the existing appointment, YourWay doesn't give you the opportunity to reschedule your event at another time.

For some users, especially those who need to manage small projects, YourWay may be the right way. But if you are looking for the best PIM around, you would be better off buying either Lotus Organizer or Ecco.



# Electronic Forms Fill the Bill



BY SCOTT SPANBAUER

You'll never get rid of paper entirely, but with these four Windows programs you can bypass your file cabinets—and save a few trees in the process.

Invoices, bills, tax forms, expense reports, employment applications, reviews, terminations—virtually every company, large or small, relies on forms. Employees spend hours printing, filing, tracking, reproducing, and ultimately getting rid of forms. Forms processing software can move these piles from in-boxes and file cabinets to the network, saving time and trees and changing organizations for the better.

#### **Ending the Paper Chase**

Electronic forms processing offers significant print cost savings and the capability to revise forms easily whenever necessary. You may also enjoy lower data-entry costs as well as greater productivity, because forms data is available to anyone with access to the network. And you can still print data on paper forms when necessary.

Linking the worlds of printed and electronic data is forms processing's raison d'être. Using design modules reminiscent

of draw programs, you create on-screen versions of the paper forms you currently use and link them to database files. For example, while most large companies keep track of employee information (such as salary, performance evaluations, and accrued vacation time) by means of a database, related transactions such as vacation requests are usually performed manually—you fill out a paper request, route it to personnel, and hope it gets the necessary approval before your plane takes off.

Simple forms processing allows employees to fill in the form on screen, see how many vacation days they have available through an automatic database lookup, and enter the number of vacation days requested. The department head then reviews the form and approves it using a password-protected electronic signature field. The vacation leave, once approved, is automatically subtracted from the number of available days stored in the database.

#### The Good, the Better, and the Ugly

We evaluate the four top Windows forms processing packages: Spinnaker Software's FormWorx 2.01, JetForm's JetForm Design 3.1, Delrina's PerForm Pro Plus, and GDI's WindForm 1.0. The four include a range of prices and features, from Wind-Form's base bases approach to PerForm Pro Plus's Those I

Form's bare-bones approach, to PerForm Pro Plus's complete application development environment.

The capability to link forms to data files separates **IOTMS** I forms processing applications from those that merely let you design and print blank forms. All four programs dynamically link on-screen forms to underlying database files, although with widely varying dexterity.

We chose to review Windows applications only, because the WYSIWYG display and greater ease of use enhance your ability to create and use forms. JetForm is the only program reviewed that has a character-based filler program for offices with a mix of Windows and DOS PCs.

JetForm and PerForm Pro Plus both earned Best Buys. Along with E-mail linking, JetForm offers two unique features—multipart forms and the capability to combine portrait and landscape pages in a single form. PerForm Pro Plus offers better design tools, data management, and programmability at a lower price. Delrina's Form-Flow program, which should be shipping by the time you read this

but was not ready for our review, adds sophisticated E-mail routing capabilities to the excellent feature set it inherits from PerForm Pro Plus (see the sidebar "On the Horizon").

#### **Match Function to Form**

The application that's right for you depends on the number and type of forms you use now. At the very least a program should give you a range of basic tools for drawing forms using lines, shapes, shading, text labels, and graphics. FormWorx boasted the most complete selection of tools, with PerForm Pro Plus and WindForm close behind. Only JetForm contained noticeably fewer tools than the others.

You also need to assign data entry fields to your form easily, select a font size and style, and set the order in which users fill in fields. Better programs augment the basics with compound objects—prefabricated tables, rows, and columns of fields—along with the capability to group and duplicate objects and align them with one another. Again, FormWorx provided the most options, JetForm the least.

#### Forms Design Made Easier

Designing your own forms from scratch is not a terribly exacting process. You'll want a program that gives you a lot of control over the measurement systems and displays object positions and sizes accurately at all zoom levels. All the programs here include libraries of predesigned forms you can use as is or customize—a real timesaver. FormWorx's warehouse of 500 sample forms looms largest; PerForm Pro Plus and WindForm offer 150 and 166 samples, respectively, while JetForm has 12.

A forms-tracing utility, which converts scanned images of printed forms into editable electronic ones, can cut hours from the design process. All the reviewed programs offer some tracing capability, but Delrina's PerForm Tracer add-on is the best.

# These programs should give you the basic tools for drawing forms using lines, shapes, shading, text labels, and graphics.

Reproducing printed forms also calls for the very best in text formatting controls—the kind you're used to in a Windows word processor. Look for the capability to set text size, style, and line spacing; the capability to include multiple text formats within a text block will simplify and speed the design process. FormWorx and WindForm lacked this versatility.

#### Color My Form

Hard-copy forms are usually black and white, but color can play an important role in distinguishing different form areas on screen. All the programs included in this roundup except JetForm can display forms in color.

The capability to import graphic images easily may not seem crucial—until you discover you can't import or manipulate the file containing your company's logo. As a minimum, forms design packages should read TIFF and PCX files; only PerForm Pro Plus adds the capability to crop and size imported images.

One of the key benefits of forms software is its ability to act as a front end to your company's existing data files, or as a stand-alone data manager. Even if you already use and plan to keep using a relational data manager, you'll need a forms program with some relational capabilities if you want to access multiple database files simultaneously. Currently, only PerForm Pro Plus fills this need.

If you plan to link to existing data files, make sure that the program you choose is able to read and write your data and index files' format and that it offers tools for browsing the file structure during the forms design stage. Applications that support Windows' Object

# Forms needing approval by a number of people can now be programmed to route themselves via E-mail to each person in order.

Linking and Embedding (OLE) or Dynamic Data Exchange (DDE) standards enable you to maintain updated links between your forms and other Windows applications. Both JetForm and PerForm Pro Plus allow you to establish such links.

To ensure accurate and complete data entry, you'll want a complete selection of input controls. Validation ensures that data entered matches an expected data type and pattern, such as a 10-digit phone number, and prompts the user to retype inconsistent entries. Lookup tables let users choose from a list of possible entries stored in the form itself, or an external data file, and can either prohibit or allow entries not listed in the lookup. Masking automatically inserts characters, such as parentheses or spaces, in an entry. A macro language can let you automate complex operations.

#### **Electronic Forms Reshape the Office**

Forms processing is changing in ways that should attract networked businesses as never before. E-mail application programming inter-

faces (MAPIs) recently developed by Microsoft, Lotus, and Novell allow other applications to reach anyone with an E-mail address. This means that forms needing approval by a number of people can be programmed to route themselves to each person in

order. Dealing with forms could end up being as easy as reading and replying to E-mail. Sooner than later, electronic forms will transform static, paper-based business procedures into dynamic methods for collecting and conveying information.

## FormWorx for Windows 2.01

PROS: Comprehensive set of drawing tools

CONS: Clumsy interface, buggy program, badly written documentation

FormWorx's \$99.95 price, prefab design objects, and large library of predesigned forms are attractive on the surface. But FormWorx suffers from bugs; a nonstandard Windows interface; and conflicting, vague documentation and on-line help. Even Spinnaker's tech support personnel admitted that FormWorx is difficult to use.

Windows compatibility notwithstanding, FormWorx's design model is flawed. After you create a form in FormWorx itself, you must save the file and load it into a companion program, Fill & File, where you painstakingly create links to database files and set up field attributes one field at a time. Should you need to change the forms design, all the work done in Fill & File is lost when Form-Worx writes a new filler file.

FormWorx's best feature is its toolbox, which is filled with easy-to-customize draw objects—from simple boxes, circles, and arrows to complex invoice grids complete with colored title bars and row numbers. But the nifty toolbox doesn't make up for FormWorx's frustrating interface. It's hard to select objects, and on-screen rulers display in units of inches only. Often the screen won't redraw properly, even with the Auto Redraw feature enabled.

FormWorx frequently places text differently at different zoom levels, defeating the purpose of zooming to align objects carefully. The PrintView option, which the manual says causes line endings to display properly on screen, turned out to be buggy (confirmed by tech support) and crashed Windows.


Text handling is flawed as well. Type is limited to only eight fixed sizes, even for True Type fonts. And blocks of text must be all one size, style, and type, which means you can't underline or boldface a particular word in a sentence.

FormWorx comes with a forms library, called Forms-On-Demand (FOND), containing 500 generic business forms and government agency forms. Theoretically, you can add your own form creations to the library. We were unable to test that feature, however, because FOND repeatedly crashed our test machine. Spinnaker Software's technical support claimed that the problem lay with Windows or a lack of memory. But with more than 600K free, FOND still corrupted Windows consistently.

You might be able to accomplish useful work with FormWorx for Windows, but only if you avoid anything complex, and only if you're willing to spend a lot of time.

# **JetForm Design 3.1**

PROS: Fast printing, E-mail routing

CONS: Some forms design and data management limitations



JetForm is a solid, well-executed forms processing program and the only one, at press time, offering the convenience of E-mail routing. Thus it earns one of two Best Buys in this

review. It doesn't, however, offer as many design and data management options as our other Best Buy, PerForm Pro Plus. Most notably it does not incorporate a fully relational database, so if you need one, look elsewhere.

JetForm's design tools and commands are easy to find and use, and the program has a customizable command button bar. Zooming is easy—just hold down the right mouse button and drag, and the display responds in a snap. With the variable grid you can place objects precisely on the form and modify the grid values at any time during the design process. Selecting objects is also quick and easy.

Text formatting and graphics tools are less impressive but adequate. You can use multiple fonts and styles within a single text block, but only one spacing. Although JetForm uses a color to highlight tracing templates and selected objects, forms are limited to black and white. JetForm lets you import PCX, PIC, MSP, and

TIFF images, as long as they contain no more than 16 shades. Color images convert to black and white, and large images display very slowly. Plus, there's no way to crop or resize bit maps.

JetForm's semiautomatic form tracing function is convoluted, but it works. You first convert a scanned image into a JetForm-compatible template file using a DOS command-line utility. Back in JetForm, you open, scale, and position the template on screen, then adjust the grid to match the pattern of the template's lines and boxes. Next, using either the line or box drawing tools, you simply click on the parts of the template you want to trace. JetForm does its best to duplicate the original. The result is fairly accurate, especially if you set up the grid properly.

Most of your data management tasks are performed within Jet-Form, so revisions to your form won't wipe out links to data files. You can set up sophisticated lookups from multiple files, but a form can write data to only a single file. You can link form fields to a single external dBASE or Paradox data file, and JetForm Design provides a list of fields to choose from. Or you can use JetForm-Filler/G (sold separately at \$495 for a 5-user license), the Windows-based form filler module, to create new files in those formats, comma-delimited ASCII, or JetForm's own format. (In addition, a character-mode filler program should be available by the time you read this.) JetForm also lets you set up password-protected electronic signature fields, if you

hree Windows-based forms programs, still in beta testing at press time, push the state of the art in forms software. They go beyond the simple electronic replication of paper-based forms, into the realm of custom network application development, and all three incorporate E-mail forms routing capabilities.

Delrina Corporation's FormFlow, which started shipping in late June, unites the company's excellent PerForm Pro Plus application design and database management tools with sophisticated E-mail routing capabilities. WordPerfect's InForms, scheduled to

ship sometime this summer, takes a page from the Delrina/JetForm book with its design tools and database compatibility. Microsoft's Electronic Forms Designer, which should be available by the time you read this, adds E-mail-aware forms design to the company's Visual Basic Professional Edition 2.0

development environment, targeting professional in-house developers who aren't afraid of BASIC coding.

#### FormFlow

Take a PerForm Pro Plus form application, add conditional E-mail routing logic to fields and compatibility with Microsoft Mail, cc:Mail, and Novell's MHS standard, and you have an application that could replace your LAN database and a good portion of your company's paper trail. Delrina says the \$399 FormFlow will replace PerForm Pro Plus as the company's flagship forms product when it ships, and

PerForm Pro Plus's price will be reduced. FormFlow will work seamlessly with PerForm Pro Plus's filler program, according to Delrina.


FormFlow gives you a smorgasbord of options for routing forms over a LAN. Should you send the form, or just the data, or both? All linked databases, or just the main file? Should graphics files in the form travel with it, or will a simple reference to the file's location on the LAN suffice? Most users will give up

before they figure these choices out. Fortunately, FormFlow's Intelligent Form Language (IFL) scripts allow form designers to embed any FormFlow menu command in a routing macro to automate many of these decisions.

#### WordPerfect InForms

WordPerfect's entry into the forms market is clearly informed by a close study of existing programs. It aims to outdo others with broad database linking support and bonus features. InForms' \$495 designer module offers a toolbox comparable to that of leading programs such as PerForm Pro Plus and JetForm, with compound form design objects such as check boxes, drop-down lists, and radio buttons, as well as drawing tools, electronic signatures, and graphic support. Unlike those programs, the design program lets you create 256-color forms, and it comes with a stand-alone file manager/viewer that would make a good replacement for File Manager. InForms' applications can read and write dBASE, Paradox, Btrieve, and FoxPro files, as well as a number of SQL database file formats.

The \$199 filler program offers a button-bar user interface similar to that of its competitors and will support E-mail forms routing with

like. The program is light on data file tools, however; you can't index, sort, or otherwise alter file structure.

JetForm's custom printer drivers support multipage forms containing more than one page size or orientation and are faster than Windows', according to JetForm officials. Even without downloading a forms macro in advance, printing a form and data took only seconds; using a downloaded macro further accelerated printing.

JetForm-E-Mail/G is an extra-cost (\$495 for a 5-user license) modified version of JetForm-Filler/G that can embed forms in cc:Mail and Microsoft Mail messages. The program allows you to attach forms and data files to your message if necessary, along with a note. Recipients see a form as an icon in an inbound message. All they have to do is double-click the icon to load JetForm-E-Mail and open the form.

If you do leap into E-mail forms routing, which currently only Jet-Form offers, check first for compatibility with your company's mail package. E-mail routing should let you pick and choose which elements to send, including the form, the form data, or multiple data records—the entire linked database if necessary. The elements you decide to send will depend on whether recipients have network access to forms and data files.

At \$495 JetForm is the most expensive program reviewed, but it won't shortchange you. Although its design and data management tools leave room for improvement, its E-mail module raises forms processing to a new level.

WordPerfect Office, cc:Mail, and Microsoft Mail. Initially the InForms form filler will be available in Windows and DOS versions, with Macintosh, OS/2, UNIX, VMS, and PenPoint versions due later this year.

InForms' form-design module comes with a spelling checker and a thesaurus, as well as a copy of Adobe Type Manager, and lets you

store forms design elements in a library for reuse in other forms. You can link data among forms and choose from more than 100 forms templates for a head start on your designs. The filler module includes a Query language that lets you store and reuse data queries and supports links to multiple database files.

#### **Microsoft Electronic Forms Designer**

Microsoft's \$395 Electronic Forms Designer is a programming tool kit that works with the company's Visual Basic Professional Edition 2.0 application developer. It lets you write programs that send what Microsoft calls "structured messages" over supported E-mail systems. Like Borland's ObjectVision, Visual Basic isn't geared to replicating paper forms electronically, aiming instead at custom Windows application development. Unlike other

forms applications, there is no need for a separate filler program—routable forms run in place of the E-mail program's interface, while using the program's underlying messag-

FormFlow, InForms, and Electronic Forms Designer all incorporate E-mail forms-routing capabilities.

ing architecture.

The only E-mail program supported in the beta version we received is Microsoft Mail, although Microsoft says its electronic forms will work with any messaging application program interface (MAPI)—compliant mail application. Unfortunately, there are no other MAPI-compliant E-mail applications available, and few vendors have announced plans to add MAPI compatibility to their products. Microsoft promises that an extended version of MAPI due in late 1994 will make any Windows program MAPI-compliant.

To design forms, you need both the tool kit and the \$495 Visual Basic Professional Edition 2.0—quite a hefty price tag if all you intend to do is create an electronic phone message slip. Electronic Forms Designer's collection of predefined functions lets Visual

Basic programmers add E-mail functionality, such as controls for addressing and sending messages. The tool kit includes sample electronic forms and a generic forms template

> that project developers can modify. Visual Basic is the most painless way to write general Windows applications, but still requires complex program-

ming for anything other than interface design.
As a result, Electronic Forms Designer is best suited to professional programmers, and most part-time forms designers will probably stick with easier-to-use products such as Jet-Form, FormFlow, or InForms.—S. S.

## PerForm Pro Plus

PROS: Richest feature set, best data management

CONS: No E-mail support (due late 1993)




Delrina's \$399 PerForm Pro Plus is the most sophisticated forms processing package in this review. Sample forms applications included with the program resembled stand-

alone Windows programs more than single electronic forms. Everything about this program is well designed, well executed, and easy to use, thanks to a flawless interface. Just sit back and enjoy the program's top-notch tools and superior data management capabilities, all of which earned it our Best Buy.


PerForm Pro Plus has the most current interface of all the programs reviewed, allowing you to work on multiple documents and customize the button-based design toolbox and command button bar. Your designs may materialize quicker, thanks to compound object tools for creating rows, columns, and tables of fields. As with JetForm, every line in a text block must use the same spacing. You can import, scale, and crop almost any graphic, including TIFF, PCX, BMP, EPS, and GIF files. Any object can be set to one of a handful of basic colors or shades of gray.

PerForm Tracer, a \$99 extra, does an outstanding job of converting TIFF, PCX, or MacPaint files into PerForm files and is worth the money if you plan to replicate many preprinted forms. PerForm Tracer scans images for horizontal and vertical lines automatically, then converts them to objects in a form. Editing tools let you combine, break apart, and delete objects. PerForm Tracer had no trouble recognizing most of the lines in a badly skewed, hand-scanned form.

PerForm Pro Plus's built-in macro language allows you to create custom applications—much as you would using any programmable database. And since the program supports OLE, forms-based applications can also contain other data objects, such as voice annotation, animation, or AVI movie clips. PerForm Pro Plus's electronic signature fields can lock and/or hide data entered into other fields and can be protected so that only the original signer is able to unlock the secure data.

WINDFORM ALLOWS YOU TO SCAN in existing forms. Its dearth of design and data features make it suitable for only the simplest applications, however.

The program's relational database manager sets it apart from other forms programs. A single form can read and write data stored in multiple linked files, and you can set up one or many relationships. PerForm Pro Plus also gives you control over data files, letting you set up complex relational systems from scratch or restructure and manipulate existing files. The program is also unique in its capability to generate a form based on existing linked data files.

PerForm Pro Filler lets you download a macro for each form page in a print job, in addition to separate macros for graphics that repeat on every page. For HP LaserJet-compatible printers choose Fast or Extra Fast printing modes, which will take a few shortcuts in drawing graphics on your printout.

As we went to press, Delrina had plans to ship an E-mail-aware forms program, Delrina FormFlow, in late June (see "On the Horizon"). Although PerForm Pro Plus's lack of E-mail support at the time of this review stops it just short of perfection, that missing link is scheduled to ship by late 1993. Add that to the program's superior design and data management capabilities, and you have a real forms processing Best Buy.

# WindForm 1.0

PROS: Locks forms designs with password protection CONS: Bare-bones feature set, limited data management

Graphics Development Int'l's \$99.95 WindForm, aimed at the small-business market, is far less ambitious than its industrial-strength competitors. In fact, the program's design and data tools are about as lightweight as you can get. It lets you whip up simple designs and link them to a single data file with nary a bell nor whistle to get in the way.

WindForm's toolbox contains just the basics, along with a tool for drawing columns of fields. Your options in formatting objects are likewise limited. Text that's contained in a box must be all one size and style, and WindForm doesn't give you any line spacing controls. However, you can import and resize PCX and TIFF graphics and apply color to everything but text. Grid and ruler measurement units are easy to customize, and you can group and align objects as you please.

WindForm is the only program reviewed here that actually scans forms directly, using an HP ScanJet, but it doesn't convert them automatically into electronic forms. The program also lets you import a TIFF or PCX file to use as a template for manual tracing, as long as it matches the size of your WindForm page. The program also promised to convert PCL PRN files produced by other applications, including PerForm (which version is unclear) and Page-Maker. We tried this feature using PerForm Pro and PerForm Pro Plus files, with unusable results.

The program comes with plenty of predesigned forms, including generic, office-related, and standard government forms. It's also the only program included in this review that allows you to password-protect your form designs.

WindForm lets you save form data to ASCII files, but that's it-

no masking, data validation, calculations, field order, or other controls. When creating fields, you can type in some optional help text, including suggested field entries, for a kind of lookup table, but there's no way to create real form- or file-based lookups. When it's time to print, you have only two options: print the current form and data or all records in the attached data file.

WindForm is a poor relation to the more advanced forms processing applications in this review, but it doesn't pretend to be more than it is: a no-frills, base-level forms processor.





# Tip of the Month

DOS 6 INSTALLATION OPTIONS: DOS 6's installation command, SETUP, provides many handy alternatives to its standard routine. Run SETUP by inserting Disk 1–Setup into drive A: or B: and typing the drive letter and a colon followed by one of the commands discussed below.

To create a bootable rescue floppy disk that includes critical DOS programs such as FORMAT, CHKDSK, FDISK, and others, type SETUP/F. DOS will ask you which floppy drive to use. If you're installing DOS 6 on a PC with a small C: partition and a larger D: partition, you can use SETUP/M to make drive C: bootable, then use SETUP/Q to copy the rest of the files and SETUP/E to install the Windows and MS-DOS optional programs to your D: drive (use BUSETUP/E if you originally installed DOS 6 by booting the Setup disk). There's more: If you want to stop SETUP from creating an uninstall disk, use SETUP/G (you can use the /G switch with SETUP/M, just put a space before it). Installing on a monochrome notebook? Add a space and /B to any of the commands to force SETUP to display in monochrome. And one last trick: Type SETUP/? to get a look at the complete list of setup options.

#### **Use DOSKEY Macros for Risky Commands**

I have a BAT file in which I use the command ERASE A:\*.\*. When I run the batch file, I get the expected 'All files in directory will be deleted! Are you sure (Y/N)?' message, which requires me to enter Y to proceed. Is there a way to have the batch file supply the Y and let the file run nonstop? Kerry Shea, via PC World Online

There are several ways to accomplish this. The simplest is to replace ERASE A:\*.\* with ECHO Y | ERASE A:\*.\*, which uses DOS's pipe (the |) to feed ECHO's output (the Y) to ERASE.

But before you fire up DOS's editor, stop and think. Batch files that bypass the confirmation message built into a potentially destructive command like ERASE (or DEL—the two are identical) can backfire. If you inadvertently issue the command when the wrong disk is in the floppy drive, you'll have to restore the files from a backup (and how many of us really back up our floppies?), or use a third-party undelete utility. Running other sensitive batch files (such as one that searches your hard

disk and deletes TMP files) at the wrong time can also have disastrous results. As a precaution, at least rename the batch file with a nonexecutable file name extension, such as TXT, when you're not using it. Better yet, execute your batch file as a DOSKEY macro.

In addition to letting you redisplay and edit past commands, DOS 5's and 6's DOSKEY utility lets you load batch-like macros into memory. DOSKEY macros execute faster than batch files because they are already loaded into memory. Also, you can remove them from memory when you are done.

To load your file-deletion command as a DOSKEY macro, type DOSKEY DELA=ECHO Y \$B ERASE A:\*.\* at the DOS prompt and press <Enter>. The \$B is DOSKEY's equivalent for the pipe. Entering DELA at the DOS prompt will now run your macro. If your original batch file contained additional commands, you can create a multicommand macro using \$T (DOSKEY's equivalent of the <Ctrl>-T command separator introduced in DOS 5) between each of the macro's DOS commands, as in: DOSKEY DELA=CLS\$Trem\$Trem

\$Trem\$Trem Insert disk to wipe clean in drive A:\$Trem\$Trem\$TPAUSE\$T ECHO Y\$BERASE A:\*.\*\$TDIR A:. Bear in mind that DOS commands are limited to 127 characters.

To remove the macro from memory, simply redefine it without any associated commands by typing DOSKEY DELA=, or press <ali>Alt><F10> to remove all DOSKEY macros from memory.

Once the macro is in memory, you can easily copy it to a file for reference and with a little editing, use that file to reload the macro. Enter DOSKEY /M >filename.BAT (filename should be a name you'll easily remember) to copy all the currently loaded DOSKEY macros to a batch file. Load that file onto an ASCII text editor and add DOSKEY plus a space to the beginning of each line. You could even add a warning to the end of the batch file, such as @ECHO Attention! Dangerous macros now resident in memory! Unless you know what you're doing, press Alt-F10 now. Finally, save the file and move it to a directory listed in AUTOEXEC.BAT's PATH command. Whenever you want to reload the file's DOSKEY macros, just run the batch file.

#### Upgrading From 486 to Pentium

Later this year I will be buying a new 486-based PC. In about a year I would like to upgrade to Intel's Pentium chip. I understand that processor card upgrades can be expensive, so is the 238-pin upgrade socket on most DX2 systems a good alternative?

With a 238-pin socket, you'll never Even if your system board comes be able to yank your 486 chip and plug in a real Pentium processor. That socket is intended to house an Intel processor that uses some of the technology that's in a Pentium. That chip, which will be called the OverDrive for DX2 and is expected sometime in 1994, will include many of the Pentium's internal advances, including the ability to execute CPU instructions one and one-half to two times as fast as the 486. But if you want to take full advantage of the Pentium's rumored power, including tight links with Intel's PCI local bus technology, save your money for a system built from the ground up around the new CPU-it won't be cheap.

#### Hard Disk Noises, Good and Bad

My Maxtor hard drive's making a sound similar to feedback from a speaker—very different from the usual drive-access sounds. When I asked about the whine, I was told it's "normal hard drive noise." Is this true?

Anytime your hard disk makes a sound other than the gentle sputtering during read/write operations, you should be concerned—and backed up. Any loud crunching is a sure sign that something is wrong with the drive's bearings, and the whine you describe could signal just that. If you hear either of these sounds, stop what you're doing, back up important files, and contact the company that sold you the drive.

Having said that, some drive sounds, although they may send a chill up your spine, may not presage a hard disk crash. An occasional intermittent whine in a new hard disk like yours could simply be a sign that the drive's bearings are wearing in, and the sound may disappear after a few weeks or months. In a perfect world, drive bearings shouldn't require a break-in period, and your drive should make the same sounds every time you use it. In the real world, however, drives often make noise, either consistently or intermittently, and continue to function for years.

Maxtor's technical support says that anytime your drive makes an unusual noise, you should call them (800/262-9867). They'll try to identify the noise and will replace the drive if necessary, providing it's still under warranty. They'll even ship you a new drive before receiving the old one if you give them a credit card number as insurance, so you can replace the questionable unit with minimum downtime. If your drive is still under warranty, just crossing your fingers and hoping for the best is probably an unnecessary gamble.

#### **Put Color in DOS**

I use MS-DOS 5 and sometimes find it difficult to read the standard white-on-black display. Is there some way to alter the appearance of the screen by changing the text and/or background colors without having to buy additional software?

DOS's ANSI.SYS driver lets you do exactly that. First, add the line DEVICE =C:\DOS\ANSI.SYS to your CONFIG.SYS file. You issue ANSI.SYS commands by sending them to the screen, but because they begin with the Escape character (ASCII 27), which causes DOS to erase the command line, you can't just enter them at the DOS prompt. Fortunately, DOS's PROMP'T command affects what's sent to the screen (the DOS prompt itself) and provides a code (\$E) for the Escape character, giving you an easy way to set the color of your DOS text and background.

A PROMPT CHANGE OF PROMPT: Personally, I like my DOS prompt to display more than the typical C:\current directory>, so I've configured it as two bright-blue lines with the date, the time, and a friendly message on one line and the current drive and directory on the other. But when other users are on my computer, they're sometimes overwhelmed. And even I find two-line prompts annoying when there's a lot to read on screen.

Fortunately, I have discovered that the command ECHO OFF quickly removes my complex DOS prompt and that the ECHO ON command just as quickly brings it back.







ANSI.SYS must be in C:\DOS, and your CONFIG.SYS must contain the line DEVICE=C:\DOS\ANSI.SYS or the line DEVICEHIGH=C:\DOS\ANSI.SYS.

Type COLOR and your choice(s) of text color and intensity and background color (indicated by the B prefix), selected from these parameters:

For color displays:

BLACK
RED BRED
GREEN BGREEN
BROWN
YELLOW
BLUE BBLUE

BLUE BBLUE
MAGENTA BMAGENTA
CYAN BCYAN
WHITE BWHITE

For color and monochrome displays:

NORMAL BRIGHT REVERSE

For example: COLOR RED BRIGHT BGREEN

Your AUTOEXEC.BAT probably contains the command PROMPT \$P\$G, which instructs DOS to display the current path (\$P) followed by the > (greater-than) character (\$G). You can

simply insert \$EI followed by the ANSI-.SYS command codes for the text and background colors you want (with a semicolon separating any two) and a lowercase m to terminate the command. For example, PROMPT \$E[30;46m\$P\$G sets your DOS screen to black on evan. You can even set the prompt to one set of colors and the rest of the screen to another by following \$P\$G with more ANSI.SYS codes (PROMPT \$E[37;1;44m \$P\$G\$E[0;30;46m yields a bright-white-onblue prompt on a black-on-cyan screen). The 0 (normal attributes) before the 30 (black text) is needed so that the 1 (bright) following the 37 (white) doesn't turn the black text gray.




FIGURE 1: A TRICKY WAY TO CLEAN up redundant labels in a spreadsheet by seemingly suppressing the duplicates.

Trying out all the permutations of these codes would be tedious. Instead, use EDIT (DOS's editor) to create COLOR.BAT and COLOR.HLP (FIGURES 1 and 2) and save them in a directory listed in your AUTOEXEC.BAT's PATH command. COLOR.BAT is one long column and assumes that directory is called C:\BAT; if you save the files to a different directory, change that reference in COLOR.BAT's second-to-last line. Now at the DOS prompt you can issue commands such as COLOR RED BRIGHT BGREEN to see what bright red on a green background will look

like (note the B prefix denoting green as a background color). COLOR.HLP lists the parameters COLOR.BAT accepts (you can see COLOR.HLP's contents on screen by entering COLOR without any parameters). There are even some commands for black-and-white (or LCD) screens.

Note that bright brown is the same as yellow; what you see depends on your monitor. Also, yellow cannot be a background color, and COLOR.BAT does not protect you from misspelled parameters, which may leave you temporarily without a DOS prompt. When you settle on text and background colors, look up their codes in COLOR.BAT's listing, and put them in your AUTO-EXEC.BAT's PROMPT command.

## SPREADSHEETS Q&A

#### Just Skip It

I like to create a label column in my Excel spreadsheets so when I sort my data, similar information is grouped together. The problem is, I end up with an entire column that repeats the same labels. It would be nice if I could easily clean up this column so only the first occurrence of a label shows. Crosstabs do this, but only for summary data. Do you know of an "identical suppress" macro for this kind of thing?

While it's not exactly an identical suppress macro, there is a simple way to accomplish this task. Let's say you have two columns, as in FIGURE 1. One column contains regions, the other states-like the ones shown at the upper left of the figure-and you want to suppress the duplicate regions. First, insert a column to the right of your sorted column. To do this with the example, select column B and select Edit Insert. In cell B2, enter the formula =IF(A2=A1,"",A2). This formula displays a blank whenever the label in the current row of column A is identical to the one just above it; otherwise it displays the label itself. Copy the formula for each state: Highlight cell B2, select Edit • Copy, highlight cell B3, and select Edit • Paste. Now highlight cells B2

through B10 and select Edit•Fill Down. To tidy up your report, put the cell pointer in column A, highlight Format•Column Width, and click Hide to hide the redundant column A.

#### Vanishing Printer Setup in 1-2-3 for Windows

How can I save printer settings with my work in 1-2-3 for Windows? In 1-2-3 release 2.3, I could choose the page size (legal or letter) using WYSI-

> WYG and save that setting with the worksheet. With 1-2-3 for Windows, I have to change the printer setup every time I switch from letter to legal or back again.

A Unfortunately, 1-2-3 for Windows doesn't provide direct control of paper size. Its File• Page Setup dialog box lets you set the page header, page compres-

sion, and so on. And these settings are stored with your worksheet. But the File Printer Setup dialog box—where you change the paper size—is not really a 1-2-3 for Windows dialog box. It's a general Windows dialog box, accessible from most Windows applications. And its settings are not saved with the worksheet. Most other applications provide document-specific controls that override the Printer Setup selections. 1-2-3 for Windows provides controls for page orientation, but not for paper size.

You can create an auto-start macro that brings up the printer dialog box when you open the worksheet. In a suitable cell, enter (Alt)ft[Tab]\*. Select Range • Name • Create, enter \0 in the Range name text box, and press < Enter>. Save your worksheet, and the next time you open it, you'll be in the default printer setup dialog box ready to change the paper size. Be sure to change the paper size back for the next worksheet.

month. Although 1-2-3 has an @TERM function, this problem would call for it to accept the present value (the current loan balance) in place of its normal future value argument. How can I perform this calculation using 1-2-3? Manish Umarwadia, Gurnee, Illinois

In 1-2-3 release 2.01 and later, you nean use a negative number as the @TERM function's third argument (the future value). Let's say your client has a \$100,000, 30-year mortgage at 8 percent per year, and her monthly payments are \$733.76. Let's say she has paid off 180 of the 360 payments. First you would calculate the remaining balance using the formula @PV(733.76,.08/12,180). The result is \$76,781.08. Assuming an extra payment of \$100 per month, you can calculate the remaining term using @ABS(@TERM(833.76,.08/12,-76781.56)).

To let your client see how different payments would affect the mortgage's

term, put the formula @ABS(@TERM(A1+ 733.76,.08/12,-@PV(733.76,.08/12,180))) in B2. She can enter an amount by which she might want to increase her payment in A1 and see the term's remaining number of months in B2.

#### **Data Labels in Excel Charts**

I'm trying to build a bar chart with Excel that shows special text labels above each bar, the way my 1-2-3 graphs used to be. The only way I've

# Master Class: Arrays That Count

Array formulas are one of Excel's least understood, least used, but most elegant features. They can reduce what would otherwise require several formulas to a single, simple formula that works on several cells at once. This month we'll introduce array formulas and use them to perform a couple common spreadsheet tasks. First we'll show how to count the number of times an item appears in a list or table-which would normally require either the Crosstab Wizard or the database function DCOUNTA-using a single array formula. Then we'll use the array function FREQUENCY to count the number of times certain values occur in a range.

An array is simply a range of cells containing a set of values. Array formulas work with these ranges in two ways. A single array formula operates separately on every cell in a range, and an array formula outputs a set of results to a range of cells.




FIGURE 1: ARRAY FORMULAS can do what would otherwise take several formulas and many cells with a simple formula and a single cell.

Let's take a look at two examples of array formulas, using the worksheet in FIGURE 1. The first counts the number of employee evaluations for the Training department, and the second finds the number of evaluation ratings that fall between certain scores. To follow the examples, first enter the labels and numbers in the shaded cells of the sample worksheet or download the file ARRAYCT.XLS from the Featured in August folder on PC World Online. Next, build the set of logical formulas in column C: In C2, enter =(A2="Training")\*1. The expression A2="Training" has the value TRUE when the word 'Training' appears in cell A2; multiplying it by one converts that logical value to a numeric one, as shown. Now-to copy the formula into cells C3 through C14-select the range C2:C14 and choose Edit . Fill Down. The result is a 1 in column C wherever 'Training' appears in column A. Now put the cell pointer in C15, and double-click the sum button (shown at left) on the tool Σ bar. Excel puts the formula =SUM(C2:C14) into cell C15 to add up the number of times 'Training' appears in column A.

Wouldn't it be nice if you could combine all those individual logical formulas and the sum function into a single cell? Well, you can with an array formula. Go to cell F5 and type the formula =SUM((A2:A14="Training") 1). Then, to enter it, hold down the <Shift> and <Ctrl> keys at the same time and press <Enter>. This key combination converts an otherwise ordinary formula into an array formula-notice the special braces ({}) that Excel has added to the beginning and end of the formula.

To understand the array formula, note that it works the same way as the formulas in column C: It compares each item in the array A2:A14 with the string "Training", multiplies each logical expression to convert it to either a 1 or 0, and then adds up the entire set of values. Neat. You can get a count for the Operations and Accounting department by typing in their sum formulas in cells F6 and F7, respectively. Just remember to replace "Training" with the proper department name in quotes and enter each formula with <Shift>-<Ctrl>-<Enter>.

Now for our second example of an array formula, let's turn to the numerical scores in column B. Here we're not interested in the absolute number of 12's, 7's, and so forth; we want to know the number of employee evaluation ratings that fell between 0 and 5, between 5 and 10, and so forth. A single array formula can produce all the answers at once. Select the range F10:F14, type the formula =FREQUENCY(B2:B14,E10:E14), and press <Shift>-<Ctrl>-<Enter>. Now peruse the formula bar for each cell (F10 through F14). What appears to be a set of five formulas is really a single formula, spread across all five cells. Again, notice the braces that denote an array formula.

Arrays aren't hard once you get the knack, and with a bit of experience, you'll find yourself using them more and more.




FIGURE 2: USE EXCEL'S 1-2-3—COMPATIBLE MENU to attach a text label above each bar in a chart.

found is to use the chart menu command Chart • Attach Text and enter the text for each bar individually. But I have about 40 bars to annotate. This method seems unnecessarily tedious. Isn't there a way to tell Excel to pick up the labels from a range of worksheet cells?

A Irritating, isn't it? Especially since this was so easy to do with 1-2-3's Data Labels command. Hey, wait a minute! Doesn't Excel have a 1-2-3-compatible menu system that can perform that same command? Yes, indeed, and therein lies the solution.

Let's say you've entered the data shown in FIGURE 2 in the range A1 through C6. Select Options.

Workspace, and make sure that the Alternate Menu or Help Key box has a backslash (/) in it and that the 'Lotus 1-2-3 Help' radio button is filled. Click OK. Now, select cell A2 and type /. The 'Help for Lotus 1-2-3 Users' dialog appears. Make sure the Demo radio button under Help Options is filled. Type G to select Graph, then press X, select

the range A2:A6, and press <Enter>, then A. Select cells B2 through B6 and press <Enter>. Press T for Type and B for Bar chart. Ignore the screen activity that ensues. Then type 0 for Options, D for Data Labels, and A to attach the labels to the first scries. Select cells C2 through C6 and press <Enter>. Now type /G again, then S to save and A to attach. Drag a rectangle in your worksheet to display the graph object and press <Enter>. Press Q to quit the menus, and there's your graph, complete with labels over each bar.





CREATE NESTED PROGRAM MANAGER GROUPS by making customized copies of PROGMAN.EXE and PROGMAN.INI.

Then in File Manager make another copy of PROGMAN.EXE—this one with a different name—by selecting it, pressing <f8>, and in the To text box, typing a new name that ends with the EXE extension, such as PROGMA2. EXE. Make a copy of PROGMAN.INI in the same manner, making sure the new name keeps the INI extension and has exactly the same number of characters as PROGMAN.INI—PROGMA2. INI, for example.

Next launch Windows Write, open PROGMA2.EXE, and when asked to convert the file, click No Conversion. Choose Find • Replace and type PROGMAN.INI in the Find What text box and PROGMA2.INI in the Replace With text box. Click Replace All.

Now, to customize your new subgroup's title bar, type Program Manager in the Find What text box. In the Replace With text box, type a descriptive name. This name must have the same number of characters as 'Program Manager' (15, counting the space). For example, if you enter the name 'Graphics Apps', you must follow it with two spaces so the field holds exactly 15 characters. Click Replace All. Then click the Glose button, and select File Save.

Now you'll need to edit the INI files. Open PROGMAN.INI in Write and click No Conversion. Locate the [Groups] section and remove any Group= lines that refer to groups you're turning into subgroups. In this example, you would delete the line for the Accessories group, Group1=C: \WINDOWS\ ACCESSOR.GRP (the group number will vary). Now renumber the remaining lines in the list in sestarting quence, with 1 (Group1=, Group2=, and so on). Finally, jump up to the Order= line in the [Settings] section and make sure that the

numbers following it correspond to the numbered items in your group list (the order of their appearance here isn't important). Save PROGMAN.INI.

Open PROGMA2.INI and click No Conversion. Go to the [Groups] section and remove every Group line that's already in PROGMAN.INI. Leave only the ones that refer to your new subgroups—in this example, the line for C:\WINDOWS\ACCESSOR.GRP. Renumber the groups in order, starting with 1. Jump to the [Settings] section and make sure the numbers that follow the Order= line match the group numbers listed below. In this case, Order=1. Save PROGMA2.INI and exit Write.

If you normally have Save Settings on Exit checked on Program Manager's Options menu, uncheck it now. (If you leave it checked, Windows will undo the changes you just made to PROG-MAN.INI.) Exit and restart Windows. After restarting, you can check Options • Save Settings on Exit again.

Now select the group that will hold your new subgroup, in this case, the Applications group. Choose File New, select the Program Item radio button, and click OK. In the Description text box, enter the subgroup name, such as 'Graphics Apps'. In the Command Line text box, enter PROGMA2.EXE. For the final, cosmetic touch, give your subgroup a group icon. Click the Change Icon button, scroll to the eighth icon to the right (or any other icon that eatches

your fancy), and click OK twice to confirm your changes. You're finished.

Some caveats: When you doubleclick the new subgroup icon, you'll discover that you're essentially loading a complete copy of Program Manager. If you close this copy (as opposed to minimizing it), you'll be invited to exit Windows. If you have any programs listed on the load= or run= lines of WIN.INI, Windows will also attempt to launch them every time you open a subgroup. But aside from these quirks, you now have fully functioning subgroups in Program Manager. Enjoy.

#### Slipping Through the Norton Search Net


I like Norton Desktop's extra functionality, but I've discovered a problem with the SuperFind function. When I search for a file that I know is on my hard drive, the program digs through every directory and comes up blank, saying '0 Found'. I clicked the More button and made sure that the Attributes check boxes were all empty so it wouldn't take those file attributes (Read Only, System, Hidden, and so on) into account, but to no avail. Why does it find some files and not others? Hal Ashton, Boston

A You don't want the check boxes to be blank; that tells SuperFind to locate only those files that do not have these attributes. To make sure SuperFind ignores all attributes, the check boxes must be gray. Click each box in the Attributes section once or twice until it turns gray. Then try running your search again.

entry, I selected File • Template and specified that glossary entries be available in all documents, but it didn't work. If I use another template, my signature block glossary entry doesn't appear. What am I doing wrong?

Eric Rigby, Fernie, British Columbia

A You left out just one step. No doubt you saved the template file, but that's not quite enough. Here's the correct procedure for creating and saving a global glossary entry that will appear in every template:

Start by typing the text that you want to include in the glossary entry, and then select the text. Choose Edit• Glossary, type an abbreviation for your text in the Glossary Name text box, and select Define. Next, select File• Template, check the Global (Available to All Documents) radio button, and click OK.

And now for the missing step: Select File • Save All. You can choose No when you're asked whether to save changes to the current document, but answer Yes when you're asked if you want to save the global glossary and command changes. Once you've done this, you'll find those elusive glossary shortcuts in every template.

#### Over the Line in Ami Pro

Q I use Ami Professional 3.0 for all my word processing and occasionally need to add a line over some text. It's just like an underline, but instead of being under the character, it needs to be just above the character. I could do this in the equation editor in WordPerfect 5.1 for DOS, but that doesn't work here. I tried putting the text in a frame, then adding a line to the top of the frame, but it's not the effect I want. Can Ami Pro do this job?

Absolutely. Here's what to do: Type the text you want overlined as you normally would, then select it. Now choose Text • Special Effects. In the Special Effects dialog box, click in or tab over to the empty box to the right of the Overstrike character checkbox. Hold down the <Alt> key while you type 0175 on the numeric keypad (the top-row numbers won't work). Release the <Alt> key and click OK. You'll see the line over your text on the screen, and it will print correctly.

Unfortunately, Ami Pro's otherwise outstanding Fast Format feature won't copy this overline formatting, and there's no way to add it to a style. Consequently, you'll have to manually format text this way each time you want to produce overlining.

Note that not all fonts contain this overstrike character. If the text on your screen looks incorrect after you perform the steps above, you'll need to find a font with the correct character. Most normal TrueType and PostScript text fonts include an overstrike character. Try experimenting with different fonts to get the effect you want, since the spacing of the line above the text will

vary from font to font.

#### From Footnotes to Endnotes

Several readers wrote about an answer I gave in the March 1993 issue. I offered a method for converting Word-Perfect 5.1 for DOS footnotes into endnotes. While my solution worked fine, I neglected to notice that WordPerfect ships two handy macros, FOOT-END.WPM and END-


If you want a bar code or another graphic on an envelope but want to avoid the complicated routine of modifying the envelope macro, try this easy solution in WordPerfect for Windows 5.2. Open the document that includes the graphic you want to use/import, then select Macro · Play · envelope.wcm. In the Options section of the resulting dialog box, check Append to Document and uncheck Print Envelope. Type in an address if necessary, then press OK. WordPerfect will insert your envelope at the end of your file, where it's a simple matter to copy and position the graphic and then print that page.



#### **OLE Gone Astray**

I have recent copies of Excel and Word for Windows and upgraded to Windows 3.1 to take advantage of Object Linking and Embedding (OLE). But now I can't get the OLE features to work. What's going on? Brad Smith, Glendale, California

If you upgraded to Windows 3.1 after installing OLE-compatible software, chances are Windows' registration database doesn't have the information it needs for OLE to work correctly. However, it's a simple matter to update the database file (REG.DAT) in the same directory as Windows.

First, open the Registration Editor, found in your WINDOWS/SYSTEM directory. In File Manager or Program Manager, choose File Run, type REGED-IT, and click OK. When the Registration Editor opens, choose File Merge Registration File. In the dialog box, locate the appropriate REG file for Word for Windows-WW20.REG, found in the directory in which you installed Win-Word. Select it and click OK. Repeat for

Excel, using the file

XL4.REG in Excel's main directory. Then exit the Registration Editor when you're done. This should solve your problem.

#### The Invisible Calendar

Why can't I print the actual calendar (not the daily appointments list) in Windows' Calendar accessory? If I print while the month view is on screen, all I get is a blank page with 'Untitled' at the top.

The Calendar was designed to output only the daily list of appointments. To generate the actual calendar grid, you must perform a print screen, then dump that image into another program that can print it.

Open the Calendar, press < F9> to display the grid, and press <Alt>-<Print Screen> to copy the image to the clipboard. Switch to a Windows word processor or desk-

top publishing program that can accept graphics from the clipboard (most can), open a new file if necessary, and press <Shift>-<Insert> to paste in the picture. If the program allows it, crop and resize the calendar, then output it on a printer that supports graphics.

You could paste the calendar image into Windows Write, but if you use a high-resolution video driver (anything above 640 by 480 resolution), Write will probably choke when you try to print. Switching to Windows' generic VGA driver would fix the problem, but a simpler solution is to paste the calendar into Windows Paintbrush instead. Just make sure you maximize Paintbrush before you paste the image, or it will be whacked off at the bottom. Select File. Print and voilà-vou're donc.

However, if you want the calendar printed full-page and minus the clutter (like Calendar's menu bar), select just the calendar with Paintbrush's seissors tool, then click Edit . Copy To and supply a file name, like CAL.BMP. Load CAL, BMP back into Paintbrush using File Open, select File Print Setup, select the Landscape radio button, and click OK. Select File Print, set Scaling to 200 percent, and click OK. You'll get a jumbo version that's easier to read.

#### **Create Groups Within Groups**


My Program Manager is cluttered with hundreds of icons in dozens of groups. Can I nest some groups inside others for neater organization?

Not in Windows 3.1, although shells Ilike Norton Desktop offer this function. But by making custom copies of Program Manager, you can simulate subgroups and eliminate some clutter.

Say you want to place the Accessories Group within the Applications Group. First, save copies of PROGMAN.EXE, PROGMAN.INI, and all your GRP files (they're in your WINDOWS directory) to a floppy or another directory.



## WORD PROCESSING Q & A

#### Font Sizes in WordPerfect for DOS

I have trouble getting WordPerfect 5.1 for DOS to print in different sizes. I use a Panasonic KX-P1124 printer, but when I specify different font sizes using the <Ctrl>-<F8>S command, I don't get what I want. For example, the Large, Very Large, and Extra Large settings produce the same size of type. I'm not sure what to do here. Can you help me print the larger type I need?

WordPerfect tries to give you what you want but is limited by your printer. Since WordPerfect can't *create* fonts, it can use only the fonts on your printer. In your case, the largest size available shows up in all three of the large settings you mentioned.

Assuming you don't want to switch to a Windows word processor that includes built-in 'True'Type fonts, you could get a program like MicroLogie's \$99.95 True-Type for DOS. The program works directly with WordPerfect to produce 36 fonts, all of which can be scaled from 2 to 999 points, and even offers special effects like shadows and outlines. You can use normal WordPerfect commands to access all of the fonts. Contact Micro-Logic Software at 800/888-9078.

#### Where's the Repeat Key in WordPerfect for Windows?

One of my favorite features in Word-Perfect 5.1 for DOS lets me repeat a keystroke or macro by pressing <Esc>, then typing a number at the Repeat Value prompt to indicate how many times I want to repeat the action. Now I've switched to WordPerfect 5.2 for Windows, and I can't find this function in the program. It's hard to believe WordPerfect would leave out such a useful feature. Is there an equivalent command in the Windows version?

A To the dismay of many users like yourself, WordPerfect eliminated the Repeat feature from its Windows versions. The problem is that the <Esc>key is reserved in Windows and can't be

reassigned by a program. Since the function no longer exists in WordPerfect for Windows, you'll need to write a macro to do the same job.

Start WordPerfect for Windows with a blank screen, and type the lines in FIGURE 1 exactly as they appear. You can indent lines while entering the macro by pressing <Tab>.

Before you can use the macro, you have to save it in the directory in which WordPerfect stores its macros. To find that directory, select File • Preferences • Location of Files, Make a note of the directory listed in the Files field, then select Cancel to return to the editing screen. Now, choose File • Save As, type REPEAT.WCM in the Save As text box, select the macro directory you noted in the Directories text box, and select Save. Select File • Close to remove the macro code from the screen. Now you have an equivalent for the old WordPerfect Repeat command, which will work in WordPerfect for Windows versions 5.1 and 5.2.

To make the macro easier to use, assign it to the WordPerfect for Windows Macro menu. After saving the macro, select Macro • Assign to Menu. In the dialog box, select Insert, then type REPEAT.WCM in the Macro Name text box, and Repeat in the Menu Text text box. Select OK twice.

To use the macro after assigning it to the menu, select Macro • Repeat. In the first dialog box that appears, type the number of repetitions you want, then click OK. In the next dialog box, type a character or phrase you want to repeat, or leave this text box blank if you want to run a macro, then select OK. Any characters you've typed will appear in your current document repeated the number of times you specified. If you left this dialog box blank, you'll see a new dialog box. Type the name of the macro you want to execute here, then click OK. The macro you chose will run the number of times you specified. Note: New macros must be run from the Macro menu (to compile them) before this Repeat macro can use them. Also, some macros, such as the BUL-LET.WCM macro included with Word-Perfect, contain internal commands that prevent them from being repeated.

#### Missing Glossary Shortcuts in WinWord

Word for DOS's Glossary feature lets me store fragments of text I use often and then insert them in documents by typing a keyword and pressing <F3>. But Γm confused by the way Word for Windows 2.0 handles glossary entries. After creating a signature block for my letters and making it a glossary



#### Getting Out of a Jam With dBASE Labels

Every now and then, my printer jams when I'm using dBASE III Plus to print labels. When I get the printer back on line, is there some way to make dBASE restart the printing where it left off, rather than at the beginning of my database? I do all my printing either in alphabetical order or by ZIP code.

A Printer jams can waste a lot of labels, especially if you have to print your whole list over again. Here's a short program that lets you start printing from any name or ZIP code in your database. To create the program, enter the text in FIGURE 1 in an ASCII text file called RESTART.PRG; to use the text editor that comes with dBASE, enter MODIFY COMM RESTART at the dot prompt. As you

enter RESTARTPRG, replace the field names "Last" and "Zip" in the third and fourth lines with the names of your last name and ZIP code fields, retaining the quotation marks, and replace the word 'Labllist' in the last line with the name of your label format. You can also download RESTART.PRG from PC World Online.

Next time your printer jams, correct the source of the problem and enter **DO RESTART** at the dot prompt. RESTART-.PRG first asks you if your records are ordered by name or by ZIP code, then it has you enter the name or ZIP code of the last record that printed successfully. If you're working with names, be sure to enter the name exactly as it appears in your data file: If the name is Brown, typing brown or BROWN won't work. The program assumes that the proper data file and index are already in place from your earlier printing attempt.

You didn't say how you're selecting which records to print, so I couldn't incorporate that in the program. You can change the last line of the listing to place additional restrictions on how dBASE determines which records it should print. For example, if you're printing labels only for people in Schaumburg, change the last line to LABEL FORM Labllist FOR &fldname > startval .AND. City = "Schaumburg" TO PRINT.

#### Colorizing dBASE III Plus

Each time I load dBASE III Plus, the screen colors are gray and white. I know that I can change the colors to pleasing blues and blue-greens if I use the command SET COLOR TO W/B, W+/BG, but I haven't been able to figure out how to make these the default screen colors. Is there a way to do this?

Frank Conrad, Littleton, Colorado A You can use the ASCII text file CONFIG.DB, located in your DBASE directory, to customize your setup. Edit or create CONFIG.DB with any text editor (enter MODIFY COMM CONFIG.DB at the dot prompt to use the one built into dBASE). When you have the file up, add a new line: color = w/b, w+/bg, save the file, and exit the editor. Next time you load dBASE, you'll get your preferred blue and blue-green screen. CONFIG.DB's color = command takes the same arguments as dBASE's internal SET COLOR TO.


#### **Eliminating Duplicate Records in Paradox**

I use Paradox 4.0 to track bills and payments. At the end of each month, I copy the records in my BILLS table to another table called OLD-BILLS, then I empty BILLS to start the new month. But I accidentally added one month's records to OLDBILLS twice. Is there an easy way to delete the duplicate records?

Judy Greenfield, New Orleans

A If you add a primary index to OLD-BILLS, you'll both eliminate those duplicate records and prevent the problem from happening again. A Paradox primary index keeps records sorted according to one or more key fields and insists that the combination of all key fields be unique for each record. First, look at OLDBILLS' structure and decide which fields make up a unique key. For example, if you have a Due Date field and a Payce field and you don't have more than one bill due to the same person on the same day, you could make both of these key fields.

The next step is to set up your key fields and the primary index. Select Modify • Restructure, and load your OLDBILLS table. Your desired key fields must be the first fields listed in the table structure. To move a field, go to the top of the field list and press <Insert>, which creates a place for a new field; then in the Field Name column, type in the name of the field you want

to move. When you press **<Enter>**, Paradox will move the existing field. To make the field a key, enter an asterisk (\*) after the field type. Press **<F2>** when you've moved and identified all your key fields, and Paradox will update the form. As soon as you've saved the new structure, Paradox will move any records with duplicate key values to a temporary table called KEYVIOL, which will automatically be deleted when you exit Paradox.

The next time that you use Tools•More• Add to add records from BILLS to OLD-BILLS, Paradox will display a menu with the choices New Entries and Update. New Entries places any duplicate records in a KEYVIOL table, while Update replaces any old records with new records that have matching keys. Either way, you won't end up with duplicates in OLDBILLS.

#### Avoiding Duplication of Data With FileMaker Pro

I'm a librarian, and I use FileMaker Pro to catalog books. Each book needs a complete set of cards: one author, one title, one shelf list, and several subject cards. I haven't been able to figure out how to input multiple subjects without ending up with multiples of each eard. Can you help me? Francine Heiks, Mobile, Alabama

A FileMaker Pro lets you report on only one file at a time, so you'll have to type your author, title, and shelf information on each subject card record, duplicating the information. But FileMaker can do the grunt work of copying the data.

First, fill out a form for a book's first subject card. Then, if you need to create another subject card for the same title, select Edir Duplicate Record from FileMaker's menus. This step will create a new record with the same data as the old one, and all you have to do is change the subject.

This sort of duplication is never really a good idea—it wastes disk space and makes future changes in the data difficult—but with FileMaker there's really no other solution. A more relational database program such as Approach Software's Approach or Microsoft Access would let you store subject information separately from everything

else, bringing everything together when you print the eards and thus eliminating the duplication problems. Of course, a more relational program would probably be harder to set up and learn, so it's a trade-off.

In your case, the duplication shouldn't be too much of a problem—book information isn't likely to change much. Just be sure to change every record for a particular book if its shelf location (or other information) needs to be updated.

#### PageMaker Copying Made Easy

I want to copy multiple blocks of text from a PageMaker 4.0 document and paste them into other PageMaker documents. But the copy-and-paste method I'm using—open document 1 and copy the text, close document 1, open document 2 and paste the text—is tedious. Can you suggest a faster technique?

A First, I recommend that you upgrade to PageMaker 5.0. It lets you open two or more documents at once so you can copy and paste text blocks more easily from one document to another.

In the meantime, however, try Page-Maker's Place command. It includes a filter that lets you view and import text from other PageMaker 4.0 documents (files with PM4 extensions) without making you open the original document. To use this technique, open the PageMaker document you want to copy text into and follow these steps:

- Select File Place to open the Place File dialog box. Locate and select the PageMaker PM4 file you want to copy text from, and click OK.
  - 2. In the Place PageMaker Stories

dialog box, select the story that contains the text you want to copy, and click View. PageMaker will display the text in a pop-up View Story window. If you aren't sure which story to select, click the Select all and View buttons, and PageMaker will display as many as ten of the text files in cascading windows.

- 3. In the View Story window containing the text you're after, use the mouse to select the portion you want to copy, and choose Edit•Gopy from the View Story menu bar. Press <a href="#">Alt><F4></a> to close each View Story window, then click Cancel in the Place PageMaker Stories dialog box.
- 4. Back in your current PageMaker document, select the Text tool, insert the cursor where you want to paste the text, and choose Edit • Paste.

You can also use this method to import an entire story from one document into another by clicking *OK* (instead of *Cancel*) in the Place PageMaker Stories dialog box in step 3.

#### **Multiple Indexes With Ventura**

I use Ventura Publisher 4.1 to produce a movies-on-video catalog. In addition to a title index, I want an actor index. But Ventura doesn't support

multiple indexes. Got any ideas?

Alt's true that Ventura won't do multiple indexes. But you can use Ventura's sort key to get a single index that groups the actors together and the movie titles together.

The sort keys override an entry's alphabetical position. For a title index, for instance, you can use a sort key to alphabetize The African Queen under A. If you use numbers with the sort keys, you can divide entries into separate groups within the same file. The following steps explain how to produce indexes for the movie catalog. You can do the same for any publication that requires multiple indexes.

- With your Ventura chapter open, select the Text tool and insert the cursor before or after the text you want to reference in the first part of the index such as the actors.
- 2. Select Text Insert Special Item Index Entry to open the Insert/Edit Index Entry dialog box. For this example, we'll create a reference for Katharine Hepburn in The African Queen. Type Katharine Hepburn in the Primary Entry text box, OHepburn (the actor's last name preceded by a 0) in the Primary Sort Key box, The African Queen in the Secondary Entry box, and African Queen in the Secondary Sort Key box. Click OK.
- 3. To reference an entry that belongs in the second part of the index—in this case, the movie's title—insert the cursor before or after the text you want to reference, and repeat step 2, this time without adding a 0 to the sort key. For example, type The African Queen for Primary Entry and African Queen for Primary Sort Key, Click OK. No secondary entries are required.

Repeat step 2 or step 3 for each additional index entry. After you've inserted all the index entries in your document, generate the index file. All the actors will be listed first (the zeros won't show). Now simply load the index file into your document and format the text. You can easily break this one long index into two indexes.

#### Flashy Freelance Graphics Presentations

I use Freelance Graphics for Windows 2.0, and I want to liven up a presentation by creating a sequence of screens in which each successive image reveals a new line of bulleted text. I also want to add a clip art symbol, such as a hand, that points to each new bulleted line when it is revealed. What's the best way to create these effects? Mindy Mellini, Carmichael, Galifornia

## Steady Mouse in CorelDraw

When moving an object in CorelDraw, you can lock the motion to a vertical or horizontal axis by holding down <Ctrl> while you drag the mouse. But if you're moving the object a small, precise distance, Corel isn't sure whether you want to lock out horizontal or vertical movement. The object jumps back and forth as you try to place it exactly.

The solution is to hold down <Ctrl> while you quickly move the object a longer distance on the axis than you want it to go. With <Ctrl> still down, release the mouse button, click the object again, move it back to the area you moved it from, and do the fine placing. Only then should you release <Ctrl>. If you clearly set an axis and keep <Ctrl> down, Corel will remember whether to lock the motion vertically or horizontally.

Try using Freelance's build feature, which creates several slides from a single one, with each successive slide adding a bulleted item. To create a typical build sequence using a symbol as you described, open Freelance and begin a new presentation. Select a SmartMaster (we used one called ELEGANCE.MAS to create the

example shown below), and click OK.

In the Choose Page Layout dialog box, select Bullets & Symbol and click OK. Click in the appropriate text block and type a title. Click in the 'Click here to type bulleted text' block and insert your bulleted lines. (You must type at least two lines.) Click the 'Click here to add symbol' box to open the

Add Symbol to Page dialog box, choose *HANDS.SYM* for the symbol category, choose the hand with pointing finger (two of four), and then click *OK*.

Select Page • Create Build, and Freelance creates the build sequence automatically. All that's left to do is to adjust the position of the symbol until it points directly at each new bullet. Go to each page in the


build sequence, select the symbol using the Selector tool, and use the mouse to move or rotate it (by first choosing *Arrange®Rotate*).

#### **DOS Communications Under Windows**

I do background downloads under Windows at 9600 bps using a DOS communications program. The problem is that standard packet sizes of 80 or 90 bytes transfer too slowly. I use Columbia University's MS-DOS Kermit, which supports extended packet lengths, but it loses characters and errors out. Any suggestions?

Dave James, Irvine, California

A High-speed communications under Windows is a perilous venture, and you may have one of a number of problems. When Windows is running, it intercepts your transmissions and sends them to its communications driver, which can't keep up at high speeds. Lost characters are common, especially at high speeds.

If you have a 16550 UART chip on your system board, make sure you're

using Windows 3.1 and give it a new communications driver. The UART (universal asynchronous receiver-transmitter) is the central control of communications in the PC—every PC has one. Windows 3.1's driver, COMM.DRV, won't allow DOS communications programs to utilize a 16550 fully. One that will is TurboCom. It's \$47.50 from Pacific CommWare, 503/482-2744.

Or your computer may have an old UART chip. Older UARTs send the PC's microprocessor an interrupt signal every time they receive a byte of data. If the PC doesn't respond before the second byte comes in, the first byte is lost. If you're multitasking while receiving files, your PC's processing resources won't have enough time to attend to hardware interrupts from the serial port, and information will be lost. New UARTs have a 16-byte buffer and are

able to accommodate a fast flow of data.

An up-to-date UART can be had for around \$15 from just about any place that sells computer supplies. Just drop the UART into the appropriate socket on the system board (assuming the old one isn't soldered in). A pricier alternative is an intelligent serial card, such as the Hayes Enhanced Serial Port, which goes for about \$200 on the street. Among other things, these cards provide a 16550 UART and high serial port speed. If you install a 16550 chip or board, check the documentation to make sure your communications software is 16550 aware.

For an internal high-speed modem, lowering the connect speed may be the only way to prevent lost characters.

Here's one more thing you can do to make Windows safe for high-speed traveling: Create a Windows program information file (PIF) for DOS commu-

> nications. Some programs, like Procomm Plus, come with a PIF, so just make sure you use it instead of the program's EXE file when you create an

icon in Program Manager. If you need to create a PIF, load Windows' PIF Editor. In the Program Filename text box, enter the path and file name (with the EXE extension) for your communications program. If the program is in a directory other than your WINDOWS directory, enter that directory in the Start-up Directory text box. Check the Background check box. Then boost the value of foreground and background priorities by clicking Advanced and replacing the numbers in the Background Priority and Foreground Priority text boxes with higher ones. The numbers that work depend on your software and modem, so you'll have to experiment. Check the Lock Application in Memory box to prevent Windows from swapping the communications software out of memory while characters are arriving. Then click OK, select File • Exit, and click Yes when you get the Save Current Changes dialog box.

Finally, in your communications package's setup screen, activate hardware flow control. This will regulate the flow of data over the serial port. Look for a line like 'Hardware Flow Control (RTS/CTS)—OFF/ON' and set it to ON. Also, if you're running error correction, the computer's port speed should be set to four times that of the telephone line speed.

#### **Host-Mode Hiccups**


Whenever I set up my communications program to answer calls in host mode, the log-in prompts scroll across the screen ad infinitum. What's wrong? Andy Blackstone, River Falls, Wisconsin

Your computer thinks calls are com-A ing in when they're not. The dataterminal-ready (DTR) signal on the connection between the modem and the PC is probably set to send a high signal. If your modem has DIP switches, look in its manual to see which switch controls DTR, and set it so it's not forcing the signal high. If your modem supports the command &D2 (most modems of speeds of 2400 bps and higher do), insert the command in your modem's initialization string: In your program's configuration screen, look for 'Modem Initialization String'. Insert &D2 after the 'AT'.



## HARDWARE Q&A

#### **Those Old Monitor Blues**

I have an NEC MultiSync 3D monitor that's served me well for a couple of years. Recently I bought a super-VGA video board that claims to do 1024 by 768 resolution. They work fine at 800 by 600 resolution, but when I try them at 1024 by 768, the image flickers. Elena Otero, New York City

What you see is what the NEC MulntiSync 3D was designed to do. The higher the resolution, the more sean lines a monitor draws and the longer it takes to complete a screen. At 800 by 600, the NEC 3D draws 60 screens every second (60 Hz); at 1024 by 768, it manages only 43.5 screens per second (43.5 Hz). The fewer the screens per second, the more noticeable the flicker.

Many of the latest models can run all their resolutions flicker free, which means they produce 70 or more screens per second. (The screen still flickers, but at that speed, most people don't see it.) Flicker-free monitors do reduce eyestrain. You can buy a 14-inch monitor that can do 1024 by 768 flicker-free for about \$350 on the street. Don't run a 14-inch monitor at a resolution higher than 800 by 600, because the screen characters at 1024 by 768 are too small to read comfortably.

#### **PC Versus TV**

My home office doubles as the TV room, but if I turn on the PC and the TV at the same time, my TV reception goes haywire. My PC is FCC Class B, which I thought would let me avoid this kind of problem. What gives?

All PCs generate some radio frequency interference (RFI) no matter what the Federal Communications Commission rating. To earn Class B certification, a device must not disturb the reception of a radio or TV farther than 10 feet and one wall away. In other words, the FCC is concerned about

your PC interfering with your neighbors' TV set, not yours. Often slight adjustments in the position of either the TV, the PC, or the PC monitor can solve the problem. If not, you may have to give up running Quicken and watching Unsolved Mysteries at the same time.

#### Two Drives In One

My system came equipped with two floppy drives, a 5% inch and a 3%

inch, and I need them both. I want to add a tape backup, but I can't -the front of the machine provides access to only two half-height drives. Am I stuck with

buying an external model tape backup? Tom McFarland, Seattle, Washington

You have a couple of options. The TEAC America combination FD-505 integrates a 51/2-inch and a 31/2-inch floppy drive into one compact, halfheight unit. You can pick one up at a superstore for about \$150. (This means you must remove your existing floppy drives.) Installing the TEAC is easy: Just slip the drive into an open, externally accessible bay, serew it into the drive cage, and hook up the power and data cables. You don't need to mess with your system's setup software, since your system BIOS will recognize the unit as two separate drives and think that nothing has changed. Now you have a free bay for your tape drive.

Another way to make the most of those two bays is to go the floptical route for your backups. Floptical drives use 31/2-inch disks that look like the usual 1.44MB or 720K standbys. In fact, the magnetic media inside the plastic shell is quite different, offering a data capacity 14 times greater than the usual 1.44MB. Depending on the type of floptical drive, either an LED or a laser helps position a magnetic read/write head so precisely it can pack 1245 sectors per track instead of the usual 18, for a grand total of 21MB per 3½-inch disk.

And guess what? These drives are compatible with ordinary 1.44MB and 720K 3½-inch disks.

I tried installing the latest laser-based floptical from Iomega (800/456-5522) just to get the feel of it. The PC Powered Floptical Subsystem costs about \$350 on the street and installs like a floppy drive-except that it hooks up by ribbon cable to its own expansion board instead of using your system's


floppy drive cable. A bundled utility helps you set up the board so it doesn't conflict with other devices, and you don't need to run your system's setup software. Part of the installation routine extends DOS's FORMAT command to handle the new media. All in all, it's pretty much plug and play.

You can find a cheap tape drive for about \$200, with preformatted 120MB tapes costing about \$25 each. Compare that with a \$350 floptical and its 21MB disks (about \$20 each), and floptical doesn't look as attractive. On the other hand, most people back up only changed files, and have you ever tried to find a specific file on a 120MB tape? Many believe that in an era of ballooning graphics files, 21MB floptical disks are the floppies of the future, and some software vendors are already distributing applications on floptical media.

#### **Press Here for What?**

Along with the hard disk light, the power-on indicator, and maybe a reset button, every PC I've used has had a "turbo" button and light. I first thought it was some kind of booster, like the computer equivalent of an afterburner. But when you push the button, the light goes off, and your PC runs slower. What's the point?



## HARDWARE Q&A

A Probably the real point is to impress you with the word *turbo*. But the turbo button also has a practical use. Old software programs, particularly games, run much too rapidly at the high speeds of today's machines, and some may not run at all. Most "turbo" systems let you slow down to the equivalent of an old IBM AT or even an XT so that the most antiquated software will run. Afterward, you can kick into turbo mode again—your PG's normal speed!

All the systems in our office have 1.2MB floppy drives except a few old, reliable IBM XTs, which have 360K floppy drives. For some reason, the XTs give me an 'Abort, Retry, Ignore' message if I try to read a 360K floppy disk that's been written to by a 1.2MB drive. Aren't 1.2MB drives supposed to read and write 360K disks? Blake Thomasson, New Haven, Connecticut

A Sure they are, and they do so nicely. But as you so shrewdly deduced, 360K drives fail miserably when they try to read 360K disks that 1.2MB drives have written

to-though they don't fail all of the time.

The problem occurs because tracks written by a 360K floppy drive are twice the width of tracks written by a 1.2MB disk drive. When a 1.2MB drive overwrites data written by a 360K drive, the new data is like a stripe inside the old, wider track. The 1.2MB drive has no trouble reading that stripe. But the 360K drive, whose read/write head is twice as wide, reads both the new data and some of the old data—a mess that gives you your fatal error message.

If you want to keep swapping floppies between the two drive types, you need to follow two rules. The first is obvious: Never write to a 360K disk using a 1.2MB drive unless the disk has never been written to before—not even formatted, because formatting involves writing data—by a 360K drive. This means all 360K floppies used in both drives must be formatted right out of the box (or after they've been erased by a bulk eraser) by a 1.2MB drive. The command to format a 360K disk in a 1.2MB drive is FORMAT A:/4.

You have a choice of second rules. Either

you'll never be able to delete files on these disks (deleting simply marks an area to be overwritten, and you know what that means), or you can never write to them again with a 1.2MB drive after you've formatted them.

Many people skip the second rule, but if you transport floppies between drives often, sooner or later you'll have problems. If you do, slip the disk in a 1.2MB drive and do a DISKCOPY; the 360K drive will read the duplicate disk just fine, since the 1.2MB drive won't copy any overwritten data.

## STAR-DOT-STAR TIPS

#### WinWord: Blank in the Fills

If you're like me, you need to create forms or questionnaires occasionally with underlined blanks for people to fill in: 'Name:\_\_\_\_\_\_' and so on. Typing all of those underlines can get to be tiresome, so here's a Word for Windows macro that will find and underline a string of tabs (FIGURE 1). This macro is especially valuable if several questions need blanks, since it eases the mind-numbing task of underlining them all.

To create the macro, select Tools.

Macro, enter the macro name UnderlinedBlanks and press <Enter>. A macro edit
window will open with the first and last
lines of the macro ('Sub MAIN' and
'End Sub') already there. Type the rest
exactly as shown. Exit the edit window
with <Ctrl>-<F4>, then Y.

To use the macro, type all the questions in the form, inserting tabs where you want the blanks. For instance, to create a fill-in-the-blank statement like "I have not had my eyes examined in\_\_\_\_\_\_years," you would type I have not had my eyes examined in, press <Tab>
repeatedly until you have a blank space that's as long as your desired line, then type years. When you're ready to create the underlines, run the macro. The cursor will find each series of one or more

tabs and ask you if you want that particular series underlined.

Editor's note: This macro is a big time-saver when you're creating any kind of form or test. I altered the code a bit to make it work in a loop, finding and asking about each series of tabs in your document.

You can launch the macro by selecting Tools • Macro • Underlined Blanks • Run, but for easier access, you'll want to attach the macro to a toolbar icon, a menu, or a key combination. You can affix the macro to any of these from the Tools • Options dialog box, which is pretty self-explanatory. Underlined Blanks is available, as an ASCII file called UNDRBLNK.WWM, in the Featured in August folder on PC World Online.

#### Shifting C:'s

I sometimes have the office CD ROM drive or Bernoulli Box or both attached to my system. I also use a RAM disk for certain applications. But every time I change the system configuration, the disk drive letters shift. Since most devices always take the first available drive letter, I'm never sure whether my CD ROM drive is D;, E;, or F;.

Unfortunately, varying drive letters

wreak havoe with batch files and give Windows' Program Manager fits. Whenever the letters change, Program Manager is suddenly unable to find program files or directories, resulting in "blank screen" icons and error messages. Batch files give you just the error messages.

Luckily, I've discovered a solution: I use environment variables to steer each program to the right drive. For instance, I had one configuration where the CD ROM drive is D:, and another where it's E:. I needed separate AUTOEXEC.BAT files anyway, so I put the command SET CDROM=D in one and SET CDROM=E in the other. In the Windows Program Manager, I altered the Command Line setting in each program that ran off the CD ROM drive (by selecting the program's icon and pressing <Alt>-<Enter>), replacing the drive letter with %CDROM%:. Now Program Manager sees '%CD-ROM%:' as 'D:' when the CD ROM is configured as D:, and as 'E:' when the drive is configured as E:. I also used the variable names and percent signs to help my batch files learn their way.

This trick isn't limited to the CD ROM drive, either; I use the environment variable BBOX to identify my Bernoulli Box, whose drive letter also shifts. Once this system is in place, it's a breeze to adapt to any rearrangement of drive letters, whether the variation is caused by an upgrade or a temporary hardware change.

Editor's note: I use a similar system to keep track of drive letters on my computer. One caveat, however: Some programs, such as ETA's Enterprise Computing Database CD ROM, hard-code drive letters into their configuration files when you install them, and therefore can't be helped by this technique. If you find that one of your programs has this problem, the simple solution is to put that program on the first partition of your first permanent hard drive, C:, so the program can find itself.

#### Think Twice

In the February 1993 issue, you showed how an EXIT command in a batch file could keep you from accidentally running programs in Windows that you shouldn't ("Windows Detection Redux"). However, there are several potential problems with that approach. First, you need to create a batch file for every prohibited command. Second, if the program file is in the current direc-



tory and the BAT file is not, the batch file will do no good. And, a batch file can't override a DOS internal command, such as DEL.

A better solution is to use DOSKEY macros. DOSKEY, a RAM-resident program that comes with DOS 5.0 and later, allows you to assign any command to any other command. Since one batch file can load several DOSKEY substitutions into memory, you don't need to create a battery of batch files. Also, DOSKEY macros take priority over all commands, including DOS's internal commands and programs located in the current directory.

I've written a sample batch file (FIGURE 2) that sets up three macros, each effectively stopping you from running a particular program from a command prompt. The batch file then loads Windows, and when you exit Windows, it turns off the macros. When you attempt to run one of the prohibited programs in a Windows DOS box, a message tells you of your error. You'll need about 4K of memory for DOSKEY.

Editor's note: Yang's technique is extremely useful in any situation in which a command must be executed with caution. Besides the advantages Yang mentions above, using DOSKEY has a few others. First, DOSKEY macros do not take precedence over batch file commands, which presumably know what they're doing. Second, users who know what they're doing can simply type a space at the beginning of a command to override a DOSKEY macro and run the original command. A power user can also wipe out *all* current macro definitions by pressing <Alt>-<F10>. All in all, this batch file is a good way of issuing a

warning without tying a knowledgeable user's hands or interfering with the operation of batch files.

To use Yang's batch file or one like it, type Figure 2 into an ASCII text file. You can modify it to include other programs that shouldn't be run in a DOS box. Save the file as WIN.BAT in a directory in your AUTO-EXEC.BAT's PATH statement. You'll find WIN.BAT in the Featured in August folder on PC World Online.

#### **Quashing Quotes**

In the October 1991 Star-Dot-Star, you described a way to display the < and > characters in batch file ECHO commands, which normally can't accept them ("Drawing a Blank in a Batch File"). The trick was to place quotation marks around the string, preventing DOS from interpreting the special characters as redirection instructions. While this works, it leaves the quotes visible, making for an ugly message.

Luckily, you can hide those quotation marks by making DOS backspace and overwrite them with other characters. If you use the line '@ECHO '^HPress <ENTER> to Continue"^H\_', where ^H indicates a backspace and \_ a space, your on-screen message will not have quotes in it.

Of course, you'll need to know how to enter embedded backspace characters with your text editor. If you're using DOS's EDIT program, press <Ctrl>-P<Backspace>. In EDLIN, use <Ctrl>-VH.

Some text editors delete trailing spaces from the ends of lines, making it impossible to end a line with a space. If your text editor has this problem, just move the closing quotation a character or two to the left, as in '@ECHO "^HPress <ENTER> to

Continu"^He'.

Editor's note: Bringing your GW BASIC programs into QBASIC will give you far more options for changing and improving them. IBM's BASICA is virtually identical to GW BASIC, and Hillbrand's tip applies to BASICA programs too.

Once you've translated your code into ASCII form, there are a few other tricks that might prove handy. To make QBASIC read and write GW BASIC binary data files (not programs), start QBASIC with the /MBF command line switch. Also, if your program uses any of the GW BASIC commands listed in FIGURE 3, you'll have to do some rewriting; these commands are not in QBASIC. ### Taking a Gamble

ife, love, business—it's all a gamble. Which is one reason why a casino is increasingly likely—say, a probable 12-to-7—to move into your state, or even your city, before the century's end. And if that isn't soon enough, a casino is ready to move into your PC right now.

Unlike Microsoft's marvelous Dr. Black Jack (reviewed in May 1993 as part of Entertainment Pack 4), Capstone/IntraCorp's Trump Castle 3 won't teach you how to win, but it will teach you how to play. All the major casino games are included: blackjack, roulette, keno, craps, baccarat, four kinds of poker, and 36 different slot machines. There's even a waitress in an abbreviated uniform who comes around and asks if you want a drink—although Intra-Corp has not figured how to make Absolut martinis pour from your computer.

While the comprehensive collection of casino games is impressive, Intra-Corp's implementation of them is not. It takes about 15 minutes of swapping floppy disks to install Trump Castle 3, and if you're unlucky, it may be longer. As soon as I tried to play one of the games, my computer crashed. Half an hour (and five crashes) later, I determined that the sound board setting was the culprit. For some reason, Trump Castle's Sound Blaster setting didn't work with my board's sound board emulation. No big deal: It happens all the time. I went looking for the Preferences menu to reinstall the sound driver. The menu was there, all right, but it did not include a sound board selection. In the end, I had to reinstall the entire program from scratch. Heaven help me if I'd had to do it more than once!

Even when I had Trump Castle 3 running reliably, I wasn't very impressed. The poker game is typical. You can play up to four opponents at once; in fact, you can create their on-screen

images yourself, using a design menu that lets you choose everything from hats to glasses, eye color, and names. The other players are controlled by the computer-except for one person who can join the game via modem. So far so good. But once the cards have been dealt, you'll find yourself stuck with a losing interface. For instance, you use your mouse to grab chips

and push them into the pot—but you can't read the denomination on the chips. If you want to avoid accidentally betting \$1000 on that lousy low pair, you have to click on the base of your chip stack before every wager to confirm what they are worth!

Worse yet, it's almost impossible to follow the betting. When another player makes a bet, a small window at the bottom of the screen opens to announce the bet and closes instantaneously. If you happen to be looking at your cards, or checking the other hands around the table during the moment when the bet window opens, you have no way of knowing what the bet is. Your only choice is to click on the Call box and hope you have enough to cover the bet—whatever it was.

All the games include an on-screen explanation of the rules, but graphics are unexciting, sound and speech effects are primitive, and performance is slow. Trump Castle 3 is not a winner.

#### The Mother of all Computer Games

For gamesters with a yen to mow down armies of villains, SSI's A Line in The Sand offers destructive power far beyond sword-and-sorcery adventures that let you skewer only one bad guy at a time. This detailed simulation of the



Gulf War offers all kinds of heavy weaponry as well as a nuclear option (but beware—dropping the big one doesn't necessarily mean that you'll win the game).


There are six scenarios, everything from Desert Storm (the basic game) to variations such as Holy War and Israel Surrounded. You can take the role of any participant you wish, but be advised that some smaller countries aren't counted individual-

thing, you can choose from 36 different models in Trump Castle 3.
Another slot room offers five-wheel machines—and the same lousy odds.

ly—they are combined in either of two groups, Moderate Arabs and Volatile Arabs (unfortunate stereotypes). You can definitely play as Saddam Hussein (Iraq) if you're in a bad mood. Once you choose the scenario and the country you want to play, use your mouse to deploy air power, ships, and ground forces on a fairly detailed map of the Middle East, or let the computer do it for you. The other countries (which can be controlled by human players or the computer) do the same.

The action starts when you decide where you want your air forces to attack. If they survive antiaircraft fire,

they'll soften up the enemy ground troops with bombs and air-to-ground missiles. Then you send in the grunts to capture strategic assets such as oil fields, airports, weapon plants, and so forth. When you've completed your turn, each of the other countries or groups involved will take the opportunity to have at you in return.

Many optional factors come into play to make the simulation more realistic. If you play as the Allied side, "war fever" at home can keep domestic support highbut random terrorist attacks may derail your carefully laid plans. Arab countries can raise fighting spirit by means of a Jihad, or holy war. Rebellions and revolutions have a substantial effect on fighting capabilities. The Iraqi commander may employ chemical

weapons if he or she wishes; U.S. and Israeli warriors can make use of tactical nukes—but you lose points if you use one, and there are political penalties as well. If you're feeling diplomatic, you can even make speeches at the United Nations or enter into an alliance with other countries.

Air-to-air combat and ground warfare are

shown on screen by a series of animated icons, enlivened with realistic sound effects; but you'll still need to use your imagination to bring the battles to life. The game's limited graphics reflect the fact that A Line in The Sand is basically a computerized version of a board-based war game. Even so, the action is pretty fast in this battle simulation, and the drama is intense. I intended to spend only a short time exploring the game, but before I knew it I'd been at the controls for almost 10 hours! And even if you disapprove of war in general, or the Gulf War in particular, A Line in The Sand provides terrific hands-on background on Middle East geopolitics.

### The Burglarproof Office

like working at home. The commute's a snap, the restaurant's good, and I don't have to wear a tie. But home offices can be burglarized; mine was, despite the presence of my faithful dog, Kirby. That's why I've taken a few precautions.

Protecting your home office and its contents is a two-step process. Step one is securing the hardware, making it difficult-or at least time-consuming-for a thief to cart it away. My local sheriff told me that most home burglaries are over in 10 minutes; the crook wants to get in and out as quickly as possible. So I've nailed things down with Secure-It's Kablit cabling package, a \$49.95 kit that comes with a 10-foot cable, a lock, and a clever system of fasteners. The fasteners attach to the computer and peripherals, and the cable threads through the fasteners and then wraps around an immovable object. Since Kirby is marginally movable, I strung the cable behind my desk between the leg and a lower shelf. Don't worry if your desk doesn't have legs-Secure-It offers several fasteners for different situations. . Kablit \$34.95 to \$49.95; Secure-It Inc.; 800/ 451-7592, 413/525-7039, 413/525-8807 (fax). #### Making the Insurance Assessment

Step two is to review your homeowner's or renter's insurance and assess your needs. My homeowner's replacement policy covers the usual stuff plus up to \$5000 worth of computer equipment. But even at today's prices, \$5000 may not cover all your peripherals, so consider an extra, specialized computer policy. Most include coverage for things your homeowner's insurance wouldn't touch, such as power surges and virus attacks. The yearly cost for a typical system—computer, monitor, and printer—is about \$70 to \$100 for roughly \$5000 of coverage. I know of two nationwide

Because 1 run my business from home, I opted for a combination home-office and business policy. Most homeowner policies won't cover business liability or interruption, or assets like inventory and business equipment. After a considerable amount of searching, I finally found a firm

with a home policy that would: Powell-Walton-Milward Insurance, a Kentucky-based outfit whose coverage focuses on home businesses with a lot of computer equipment. • Powell-Walton-Milward Insurance; 606/254-8023, 606/254-8020 (fax). Reader service no. 604

If you live in a high-crime area and want to boost your existing policy, check out the Federal Crime Insurance Program (FCIP), a specialized policy you might want to get to supplement your homeowner or computer policy. Underwritten by the federal government, it provides secondary coverage at a subsidized rate and ignores noncrime-related losses like fire and liability. If your primary policy doesn't cover your burglary losses completely, the secondary kicks in, up to an additional \$10,000. Because some states have their own program, the feds offer the coverage only in Washington, D.C.; Florida; Illinois; Kansas; Maryland; New Jersey; New York; Pennsylvania; Puerto Rico; Virgin Islands; and, thank goodness for me, California. To find out more, call FCIP or your state's insurance commission. • Federal Crime Insurance Program; 800/638-8780

I know what it's like to be vietimized by burglars—and claims adjusters. To protect myself, I've videotaped every



blessed component for proof (photographs will do as well). I've also inventoried my equipment, both to see how much coverage I really need and to make it easier if I ever have to fill out another burglary report. I use Nolo's Personal RecordKeeper 3.0 to record every component, including add-in cards, memory, and hard disk size, and I update my inventory monthly. You can use a regular database program for the job, but be sure to set up fields for serial number, purchase price and date, manufacturer, and model number. Then print a report and keep it in a safe place; the inventory won't do you much good if it's stolen along with the computer. · Nolo's Personal RecordKeeper 3.0 \$49.95; Nolo Press; 800/992-6656, 510/549-1976, 510/548-5902 (fax). Actually, you should make sure that all your data is safe. Back up your system, and keep the backup off-site. That way, if your home is burgled or is hit by a natural disaster, you won't lose anything but the hardware.
