Windows 95, NT, and Beyond

CHICAGO, NASHVILLE, MEMPHIS, CAIRO—the Windows we want always seems at least a year away and as remote as Timbuktu. And on the verge of '97, that's not about to change anytime soon. What's different is that it's harder to figure out *which* Windows we want. Today there are no fewer than five versions to choose from, and at least more two versions and one interface upgrade are

scheduled to ship in the next six to nine months. And that's just considering options for desktop and notebook PCs.

WINDOWS TODAY

THE VERSIONS OF Windows available now for desktops and notebooks are Windows 95, Windows 95 OSR2, NT Workstation 4.0 with its new Win 95 interface, Windows 3.x, and Windows for Workgroups 3.x. Choosing among them is far from simple.

Windows 95 vs. NT 4.0. For this month's cover story, "War of the Windows: NT 4.0 vs. 95," we tested the final shipping version of NT Workstation 4.0 with more than 60 hardware and software products and more than 15 hardware configurations. We compared it to Windows 95 in performance, compatibility, and features. Our recommendations vary, depending on where you work and the type of PC you use.

For small companies with 486 and Pentium PCs and no IS department, Windows 95 is the best bet. It works with more software and hardware than NT, and it's easier to use and (though still not crashproof) far more stable than Win 3.x.

Midsize and large companies with well-equipped Pentiums and IS departments can choose either route, NT or 95. The two versions are a wash in terms of overall performance, which varies more by application than by operating system. They're also equivalent in ease of use, now that they share the same interface. The trade-off: NT's stability and security versus Win 95's compatibility. If you're leaning toward NT or your IS department mandates NT, find out *beforehand* if drivers are available for all your peripherals, and check with vendors on software compatibility.

For notebooks, Windows 95 is usually the best choice. NT does

not yet support Advanced Power Management or Plug and Play, although several vendors including Dell, Digital, and IBM—are writing drivers to support NT on notebooks.

Windows 95 OSR2. If you're buying a new PC now and want Windows 95, what you'll get is Windows 95 OSR2 (OEM Service Release 2), which is not sold as a separate, shrink-wrapped product. Among OSR2's many updates and fixes are a new file system—FAT32—for access to hard disk partitions larger than 2GB; support for Universal Serial Bus peripherals; Drive-Space 3, a disk-compression utility; support for Intel's upcoming Pentium MMX and compatible processors; and a variety of Internet utilities.

WINDOWS TOMORROW

IN THE COMING YEAR, expect at least three more upgrades to the Windows operating system: Nashville, Memphis, and NT 5.0.

Nashville. The next version of Internet Explorer, known as Nashville, will add an optional interface to Windows 95 and NT 4.0. The beta version of Internet Explorer 4.0 is slated for December release, with the final version scheduled to ship in the first quarter of this year. More than a simple Web browser, IE4 will let you select a single Web-based view for your desktop, hard disk, intranets, and the Internet. The goal: a simpler, more visual way to navigate, no matter where your documents and files reside.

Memphis. The next version of Windows, codenamed Memphis and unofficially called Windows 97, will include IE 4.0, an assortment of features from OSR2, and other updates. The beta release is scheduled for the first quarter of this year; Microsoft says the final version will ship midyear at the earliest. Among the new features: IE 4.0's Web-centric interface; the FAT32

file system; a new Windows Driver Model, designed to provide a single set of drivers for Windows 95 and NT; and support for USB and other new hardware standards (see page 124). Unlike OSR2, Memphis will be sold as a shrink-wrapped product.

NT 5.0. Don't mistake NT 5.0 for Cairo. Some of the technologies dubbed "Cairo" are built into NT 4.0; others will be delivered in NT 5.0, which Microsoft expects to ship soon after Memphis. Like Memphis, NT 5.0 will support unified WDM drivers, Plug and Play, and Advanced Power Management. To this, it will add an array of server-side improvements for linking PCs to networks and the Internet.

And the long-promised merger of Memphis and NT? Not until next year at the earliest. Sounds like the Windows we really want.





YOUR TAKE ON: Upgrades and motherboards • Recycling RAM • Modem bug zapped

GRADING OUR UPGRADES

I RESPECTFULLY SUBMIT that you missed the boat with your upgrade article ["Upgrades: The Best for the Buck," November]. With regard to RAM, I have noticed a significant increase in speed after moving from 16 to 32MB on my Pentium-100. When running Internet applications (browser, newsgroup reader, mail program) and one other program in the background (like Word), my hard drive used to thrash while looking for information in the swap file. No more. With RAM available at about \$5 per MB, this upgrade is well worthwhile.

As you stated, 486 upgrade kits may not always be worth the money. But if a user is willing to do a little research, compatible upgrade CPUs can be had via mail order for about half the price of a kit. The user must read the motherboard manual and/or make a few phone calls to check compatibility of BIOS, voltage, and jumper settings.

There is also the risk-taker's approach to upgrading: overclocking. For example, many Pentium-75 PCs will run comfortably at 90, 100, or even 120 MHz. Certainly this voids warranty and is not without risks: People who've tried to run their chips at unreasonable speeds (a 133 chip overclocked to 200 MHz) have burned them out. But the vast majority who have aimed for a slight increase in speed have either succeeded or found that the computer would not boot correctly until the speed was set back.

DID I MISS SOMETHING? Why didn't you include the replacement of the motherboard on a 486/66 with a 486/133 (AMD)? I have seen these advertised for \$98. A user who is not "technical" can get some local tech to do it for about \$35. The total cost would be around \$135.

That is what I did when replacing a 386/40. The new motherboard comes with a CPU and fan as well as four 30-pin slots (to save some of the old memory) and just two 72-pin slots (for the recently inexpensive RAM). It also comes with both PCI and ISA slots. The built-in controller supports PCI for the disks.

I believe this is the most cost-effective way to build the new so-called NC. In fact, Intel sees the minimum NC as a "P-200 with power steering and power brakes."

I CAN'T BELIEVE YOU people tried this, much less published it!

Your November article on upgrades contains a photo and caption that could cause anyone who sees it to attempt the same thing-with disastrous results. The photo shows a motherboard with an upgrade CPU in a ZIF socket whose handle has been taped down. Not only is good contact not ensured (leading to system crashes and data loss), but when the system warms up, the adhesive in the tape will flow-allowing the handle to slip until the CPU is released. If the CPU is in a tower case, it will then fall out, probably bending a few pins or sustaining worse damage when it hits the bottom of the case. Of course, anything you were working on would be toast, too. If you have purchased

an upgrade CPU and can't close the handle all the way on your ZIF socket, return the upgrade for a different one.

When Good Vendors **Have Bad Times**

Top-rated PC company Micron runs into trouble with tech support.



NICK GLORIOSO HAD ALWAYS considered himself a patient man. He rarely lost his temper or raised his voice. Then he bought a Micron computer and logged more than eight weeks and four dozen phone calls trying to straighten out everything from a missing CD-ROM to a faulty hard drive. Now he's mad. And he wants everybody to know about it.

Once you've done your research, buying a new PC ought to be easy. But it was anything but for Glorioso, an instructor for General Motors in the Chicago area. He ordered his Micron Millennia in July

1996 and spent the rest of the summer trying to get it to work properly. His story-which took him nearly an hour to recount over the phonesounds like a textbook example of how not to conduct customer service: hold times of up to 90 minutes; unreturned phone calls; promised shipments that never arrived. Ultimately, Glorioso got so angry and frustrated that he called Micron president and CEO Joseph Dealposa at home one Sunday evening. Five days later Glorioso received a replacement system that's been humming along without a hiccup ever since.

Frustrated consumers call PC World every day with tales of poor customer service at the hands of hardware and software companies. So why does Glorioso's tale of woe stand out? Simple. This is Micron we're talking about: The company that PC World readers have consistently ranked at or near the top in service and satisfaction. The company whose customers overwhelmingly say they would buy from again. What's happening to compel Glorioso and others to solicit help from PC World? Has the Cadillac of PC service lost its touch?


WAITING AND WAITING AND ...

IN FAIRNESS. Micron's overall service stats are still impressive. It's one of only two companies (Dell is the other) to receive a Best rating for service in our December 1996 reliability and service report ("Good-Bye to Good Support?"). But look a bit deeper, and you'll find a drop in two key categories: the time it takes customers to reach someone who can help them (called "Time to Talk" in our reliability and service ratings), and the time it takes to get problems resolved ("Time to Resolve").

Micron customers who respond to our monthly Reliability and Service Monitor say it's taking longer to reach a tech support representative who can help them. For example, in May 1996 when we tallied responses for the previous six months, Time to Talk averaged 24 hours. By September, that figure had increased to 32 hours. According to recent PC World data, it's also taking Micron customers longer to get problems resolved, from an average of just over seven and a half days in our May 1996 tally to almost nine and a half days in September.

These numbers hit close to home when I bought a Micron Home MPC myself late last June. It arrived without a hitch in early July and was working fine-at first. Then I started to load my own software and ran into a series

of baffling error messages. I did what most customers would do: I called tech support-and waited 45 minutes. Then, when the first fix didn't work, I called and waited again. Thirty minutes. And again. And again. Over the next three months, I waited on hold for a total of several hours and spoke with numerous techniciansnone of whom were able to help me. Ultimately the problem was diagnosed as a bad motherboard. Great, I thought, at least now we know how to fix it. But diagnosing a problem is one thing; correcting it. I learned, is another.

I spoke to one obviously green technician who kept putting me on hold while she conferred with her supervisor; to another who couldn't stay on the line to see if his suggested fix worked because he was hungry and wanted to take his dinner break; and to a third who freely criticized the skills and commitment of his associates yet failed to follow up on promises he himself made. Over the course of several months, I was promised return phone calls that never came, a new motherboard that didn't ship, and a return merchandise authorization number that I still haven't received as of this writing.


STRUGGLING TO KEEP UP

CLAUDIA DELANEY, Micron's director of support and services, acknowledges some rough times in the tech support trenches and points to phenomenal sales as the primary culprit.

But organizational changes-in particular, Micron's purchase of Zeos Computer in April 1995-have compounded service problems. Minneapolis-based Zeos had one of the worst service records in our reliability and service ratings.

Though Micron discontinued the Zeos computer line last year, it retained Zeos's service facility in Minneapolis, where more than half of Micron's technical support specialists are now based. A significant proportion of these support staffers are new to the company, which makes operating two support sites even more challenging.

Nowhere is the lack of coordination more apparent than in the poor handoffs between the Minneapolis-based tech-



Meanwhile, what's Micron doing to fix its problems? "We're hiring new techs as fast as we can," says Delaney. But she adds that it takes about three months before a new hire can answer most customer questions quickly and independently. Micron has also revamped its knowledge basethe database tech support reps rely on to diagnose customer problems. But all these changes take time, cautions Delaney, who also points out that Micron charges nothing for technical support. "We're one of the few companies left that is doing that," she notes.

Free support is commendable, but it's not much help if you can't get through.

Let's hope Micron manages to escape the service quagmire it's trapped in. Quickly.

orporate America is fast embracing Windows NT workstation for its desktop computing as it seeks a true multitasking, robust, 32-bit OS with reliability, security, and high performance. The Pentium Pro, offering superior speed and performance, is far and away the preferred platform for NT. These were among the key findings of IDC's recent global survey of 1,500 corporate enthusiastic NT adopters and active evaluators.

International Data Corporation (IDC), the world's leading information technology (IT) research firm, recently surveyed 1,500 medium-sized and large corporations around the world about their advanced desktop PC usage and plans via in-depth telephone interviews. Primarily, the research analyzed how corporations are currently using and adopting advanced Windows NT/Pentium Pro systems and what users found as key drivers and constraints. The study focused on advanced adoption so that organizations adopting less than 10% NT systems among their total systems, within the next two years, were excluded from the survey.

The market momentum for NT/Pentium Pro systems will intensify over the next 3–18 months, especially among U.S. corporations. Key drivers for this upward migration include the accelerated price/performance improvements of the Pentium Pro; the increasing availability of 32-bit applications; and recent release and success of Windows NT Workstation 4.0. IDC predicts 1998 to be the pivotal cross-over year when U.S. Pentium Pro Processor PC U.S. sales will exceed Pentium Processor PCs overall, and when NT will surpass Windows 95 on desktops in large corporations.

Why Upgrade to Advanced PCs?

Corporate PC users are constantly seeking better CPU performance, more memory, faster data access times, and more powerful OS and

application suites. In the late 1990s, technology continues to accelerate with more intensive requirements due to the increase in the size of applications and graphics-intensive files; expanded multimedia data types (color images, audio, and full-motion video); the inclusion of more software (Web browsers, utilities); and the constant IT mandates to cut costs and improve productivity. In addition, the tremendous growth in the Internet, Web, and corporate intranets is bringing ever-greater amounts of data to the desktop.

Recent and unprecedented price/performance improvements in advanced PC systems have whetted organizations' appetites. IDC PC pricing research indicates the cost of Pentium Pro systems will decline a full one-third to nearly half (or 33–47%) from the beginning to the end of 1996, depending on chip speed. As an industry example, consider the advanced desktop offerings in late 1994 vs. late 1996 from AST Computer. AST's high-end brand series has dropped in price by more than one-third, from about \$4,300 to about \$2,850 in estimated street price, while the overall performance offering has more than doubled. In short, there has never been a time in which corporations have needed advanced desktop PCs more, nor a time in which cost justification for upgrading has been stronger for the business enterprise.

Pentium Pro-Platform for and to the Future

The Pentium Pro, Intel's sixth generation microprocessor family, released in late 1995, was specifically designed to optimize the performance of 32-bit code while maintaining backward compatibility with previous x86 code. In essence, the chip is a bridge between today's world, which predominantly uses 16-bit OS (Windows 3.X) and applications, and the emerging world of 32-bit OS (NT, Windows 95) and applications, which is fast becoming the industry desktop standard. The Pentium Pro also offers unparalleled speed and performance through its superscalar and superpipeline design; Intel's "Dynamic Execution," and its L2 "cache on-board" dual-chip module.


As prices further decline, IDC predicts that demand for Pentium Pro PCs will increase significantly, especially in the corporate environment. Current street prices for NT/Pentium Pro systems have now fallen to less than \$3,000—within the range of most corporate IT budgets. Accelerating price competition and expanded product selection will continue through 1997, which will further fuel the market. IDC anticipates Pentium shipments will peak in 1996, and the Pro, with 15 million units, will surpass Pentium sales (13.9 million units) as the dominant PC platform in the total U.S. market by 1998 (see Figure 1).

The Corporate Move to Windows NT

Migration to the 32-bit desktop enables true multitasking, improved stability, virtual memory, multiprocessing, and robustness. More than half (53%) of those IDC surveyed currently do 32-bit application development. Key drivers of 32-bit adoption cited by the IDC user base included new application availability, price declines, performance gains, and the success of NT 4.0. Within two years, three-quarters of all internal PC application development will be 32-bit.

Again, IDC user research bears out corporate America's preference of Windows NT over Windows 95 or any other OS. Corporate users surveyed included in their 12-month plans a 150% increase in the use of Windows NT. They saw a decrease of Windows 3.X or Windows for Workgroups use by about 50% and an increase of Windows 95 by only 50%. Users cited reliability, security, performance, and robustness, in that order, as the most important reasons for choosing Windows NT over Windows 95. The primary departments driving advanced desktop computer system purchases among IDC respondents are MIS/DP, engineering, and R&D-traditional eading technologists, as might be expected. Somewhat surprising, are the current applications users identified running under NT such as general office automation packages (word processing, e-mail, spreadsheets) or today's general mainstream desktop applications (see Figure 2).

Among corporations polled, the Pentium Pro was also the preferred platform to run NT. Fifty percent of respondents stated that at least half of all their new PC purchases will be Pentium Pro systems by the end of 1997.

The Call to Action

The decision of when and how to upgrade an IT infrastructure is difficult and complex. Hesitating can be even more hazardous, possibly leading to forfeited opportunity costs and lost productivity. As we approach 1997, it is clear that the U.S. corporate migration process to NT/Pentium Pro PCs is far beyond initial assessments.


Perhaps the only thing as important as choosing the right advanced PC is choosing the right vendor partner behind it. The top criterion among the survey respondents were price/value and technical support. IDC recommends users to look for PC vendors that push the

price performance ratios and offer the most complete total value package. Closely examine what prospective vendors include in:

- Hardware (components, configurations, investment protection);
- Cost of ownership (virus protection, data and system management, real time diagnostics);
- · Productivity enhancement (Internet/intranet, utilities);
- · Vendor viability;
- · Product quality and price/performance.

IDC predicts that 1998 will be the pivotal cross-over year when Pentium Pro outstrips Pentium U.S. sales overall, and NT surpasses Windows 95 on desktops within large corporations.

Given its total value, performance benefits, and headroom, the time for serious consideration of NT is here. The collective experience and insights of 1,500 corporate users—senior IT managers already in upward PC migration, can greatly benefit an organization's information technology design and planning.

Tiger ate my computer? • Gateway's modem dilemma • Kudos for askSam Systems

THE WAITING GAME

I SAW AN ADVERTISEMENT in PC World last June for a Cyrix build-it-yourself 6x86 kit, so I ordered a Cyrix P166+ kit from TigerDirect. I was told the kit would ship the next day, but it did not arrive until nearly four weeks later. I installed the hard drive, memory, and sound card from my old PC into the Cyrix PC, but the new sys-

tem locked up and gave me a boot-disk error message. I called the third-party technical support provider in Canada, called Aegis. The technician took me through various checks and diagnostic tests. Still no luck. So I was promised a new motherboard: but four more weeks have gone by, I have a PC that still won't work, and I have not heard from Tiger.

Sam Arbuckle, Pensacola, Florida Editor's response: We received eight other complaints from disgruntled consumers about Miami, Florida-based TigerDirect. The two most common problems: long delays in shipment of products and a slow turnaround on exchanges. We forwarded the complaints to Tiger and received a response from Adria Wood, customer service manager. Wood

apologized for the slow service, and Tiger issued a return merchandise authorization number directly to Arbuckle. At press time Arbuckle confirmed that he had received a replacement unit from Tiger and it was working fine. His only gripe is about the two-plus months it took to resolve a problem that could have been solved in one day.

Wood says Aegis has handled technical support for the Cyrix 6x86 line since the products were introduced in May 1996.

"Aegis was bombarded with calls

about our new product, resulting in slow turnaround times and poor communication with Tiger," says Wood. Late last summer, Aegis hired additional service staff, installed a new telephone system, and upped its tech support hours. Aegis tries to return all calls within 48 hours, according to Wood. If that

doesn't happen, however, you can now call TigerDirect directly at 800/888-4437, and Tiger will contact Aegis on your behalf.

HOW FAST IS MY MODEM?

1 PURCHASED A P5-133XL from Gateway 2000 in November 1995 and have been having trouble with my modem ever since. It is supposed to be a 28.8-kbps modem, but I get only a 14.4-kbps connection with Wavenet, my Internet provider. I have spent hours on the phone with technicians from both Wavenet and Gateway. I've reinstalled the modem (as instructed by a Gateway technician) to no avail. The fastest connection I can get is still only 14.4-kbps. I contacted the phone company, which confirmed that nothing is wrong with the phone line. Strangely, Windows 95 identified the modem as a 14.4-kbps model. Is the modem faulty, or is it actually a 14.4-kbps modem and not 28.8 kbps as marked?

Sherri Camp, Central Point, Oregon Editor's response: We forwarded Camp's complaint to Gateway, which contacted her, checked a few software settings, and promptly dispatched a replacement modem.

The old modem was sent back to Gateway, where it was tested and found to be defective, according to Carol Deeds, an executive response specialist. Camp confirms that the replacement modem works fine.

Our advice? If you experience difficulties connecting at high speeds, talk with the modem manufacturer and also contact your Internet provider and phone company for troubleshooting assistance.

ENLIGHTENED SERVICE

I WANT TO SHARE the experience I had with askSam Systems, makers of askSam Professional. This personal information manager and the customer support that goes with it are exceptional. At one point, the program's index feature kept crashing my system, askSam sent a patch immediately, and now the feature works perfectly. When I call tech support, I never get dumped into one of those endless voice mail mazes-I always reach a live person. In this age of large corporations, it's really cool to know there's one company out there with this level of customer relations. S. Murugananda, Buckingham, Virginia

Microsoft, Netscape Fix Buggy Browsers

IF YOU'RE ONE of the zillions who downloaded Netscape Navigator 3.0 last August, you may have noticed that your .wav files don't warble and your Java doesn't jive. In the race to beat Microsoft's Internet Explorer to the Web, the final versions of Navigator 3.0 and Navigator Gold 3.0 shipped with several irritating, though nonlethal, bugs, which have been fixed in version 3.01. In both programs, the new version downloads and plays streaming audio files without requiring you to click on a start button. This



As we went to press, both 16- and 32-bit versions of Navigator 3.01 and Gold 3.01 were available from Netscape's FTP server. For all Navigator 3.01 versions, check ftp://ftp.netscape.com/ pub/navigator/windows/. Not to be outpatched, Microsoft almost simultaneously released Internet Explorer 3.01, which fixes problems that the first patch missed (see November 1996 Bugs and Fixes). The new version beefs up the program's security, fixes bugs with Java applets as well as with the America Online and CompuServe versions of the browser, and adds support for World Wide Web features in Microsoft Office 97. 





Even without custom applications, MMX systems will give existing software an immediate performance boost-as much as 20 percent, Intel claims. PC World tests show Intel's upcoming MMX Pentiums should significantly improve PC-based multimedia and graphics. Will software vendors support the new scheme?

Intel will convert its desktop and notebook Pentium processor lines to MMX technology over the next year, forcing users to make some decisions. Must your next PC have an MMX-capable Pentium CPU? And if so, should you switch from your current software and CD-ROM titles to products that harness MMX?

THE FIRST MMX APPS

TO ANSWER these questions, PC World took a look at some of the first MMX software to hit the market. Our findings: An MMX processor, coupled with MMX-aware applications, can make a big difference in key multimedia operations such as image manipulation and 3-D rendering. However, the overall impact varies widely according to how much an application depends on MMX-

The catch is, current software cannot access the new instructions-vendors must add MMX-aware code to accelerate their applications. That task is arduous, so MMX technology is most likely to show up in new software, or in apps like Adobe Photoshop that accept plug-in modules.

Intel will introduce 166-MHz and 200-MHz MMXenhanced Pentium processors for desktop PCs, as well as 150-MHz and 166-MHz lower-voltage MMX CPUs for notebooks. MMX-equipped PCs should be available immediately after the rollout. Intel plans to release MMX Pentium OverDrive chips in the second half of 1997.

Some MMX applications, such as Ubi Soft's Pod racing game, won't run at all on noncache. Moreover, Intel has improved the pipelined architecture to reduce performancesapping wait states.

Microsoft has MMX support in the current OSR2 version of Win 95 that's bundled on new PCs. Key components such as the ActiveMovie media player and the Direct3D module have been updated for MMX, as has the DirectX 3.0 technology for Windows 95 games.

In certain operations, the MMX CPU delivered a clear performance advantage, such as when running a Gaussian blur (which creates a hazy effect). When we applied a Gaussian blur to a TIF image file in Photoshop, MMX boosted performance 143 per-

cent, from 51 seconds to just 21 seconds. Increasing image size improved by 33 percent with MMX. When we redrew 3-D scenes, Ray Dream Studio sped up Gouraud and Phong shading about 21 and 27 percent, respectively.

Performance improved a scant 3 percent in the rotatecanvas operation in the beta MMX Photoshop. Mundane operations such as saving and opening files saw no gain.

With MMX's focus on multimedia and graphics, it's not surprising that many of the first applications are games. In fact, Intel expects MMX to appear in home PCs soon, while many business units will use the standard Pentium CPU through the first half of 1997.

Vendors such as Fenris Wolf, Maris Multimedia, and Ubi Soft will release MMX-savvv games. These titles use MMX to provide detailed 3-D graphics and smooth animation not possible with today's Pentiums. Ubi Soft's Pod has fast 15-to-30-frame-per-second animation on a detailed 3-D race track. Mediamatics, meanwhile, will ship a software video decoder that plays highresolution MPEG-2 video.


Intel says MMX print drivers should help boost color printing speeds, while graphics chip makers say they'll combine MMX with extended video-accelerating hardware to provide MPEG-2 video playback at 30 frames per second.

Does MMX deliver? Developers may take some time to work MMX into their products, but the technology clearly boosts performance for a wide range of software. More important, MMX invites vendors to extend features and capabilities, adding richer 3-D animation and higher video frame rates. With Intel committed to making MMX a standard part of its Pentium and Pentium Pro CPUs, and competitor Cyrix planning a compatible MMX-style chip, the market seems poised to make the transition.

WITH VERSION 4.0, Microsoft has dramatically souped up Internet Explorer and positioned it as a major link in the evolution of its Windows operating system.

Integration between the desktop and the browser allows you to manage files (copy, delete, view, and so forth) and edit documents from the browser, as well as surf the Web. The screen is split into two sections. The left pane displays a Windows 95 Explorer view of your system and the Internet. A View pane on the right shows either a Web page, a Word or Excel document, or a standard folder with file icons. The toolbar changes dynamically to suit what's in the View pane-giving you a Word toolbar when you're editing a document, for instance, and an IE toolbar when you're surfing the Web. A beta version of Internet Explorer 4.0 should be available in December at http://www .microsoft.com; the product is expected to ship in the first quarter of 1997.

Judging by the features and design of these early versions, Microsoft has the advantage over Netscape in the browser wars. Besides, it's free.

MagnaRAM 97 Saves a Bit of Time Loading Win 95 Apps

QUARTERDECK'S \$30 MagnaRAM 97 is the first Win 95 RAM-enhancement utility

we've tested that truly speeds performance, though the benefit is limited to improving the time it takes to open apps. Previously, we found this class of software tended to hinder overall performance. Still, most Win 95 users should consider adding RAM instead.

Unlike products we tested before, MagnaRAM 97 is designed to make the most of existing RAM on Win 95 PCs. The vendor says its new compression technology crams more data in RAM, where it can be accessed faster than if stored on the hard drive in virtual memory. Quarterdeck claims MagnaRAM 97 speeds the loading of 32-bit apps and runs them faster on Win 95 PCs with 16MB or more RAM.

TEST REPORT

We tested the product on a Pentium-90 PC running Windows 95 and got mixed results. With MagnaRAM 97, a 16MB system loaded common 32-bit

applications up to 42 percent faster than the same system without MagnaRAM. In its finest performance, the 16MB MagnaRAM PC loaded Excel 7.0 in about 4.7 seconds, while the 16MB PC without it took about 6.7 seconds. Word 7.0 and Picture Publisher 6.0 also loaded faster with Magna-

RAM, but improvements were less dramatic. On a PC with 32MB of RAM, MagnaRAM loaded our test apps up to 21 percent faster than a PC without MagnaRAM did. However, we saw that improvement only after opening and closing apps repeatedly and performing other tasks to simulate heavy use.

In tests involving basic tasks with common apps, such as opening files and manipulating large, memory-hogging graphics, MagnaRAM's impact was insignificant. Worse, adding the program to a 16MB system slowed down some graphics-intensive tasks.

The upshot: In certain situations, MagnaRAM can speed performance. If your system has 32MB of RAM and you open apps often, MagnaRAM can save you time. If you've got 16MB, open apps repeatedly, and use large, highly compressible files, Magna-RAM also can help. Most users, particularly those with 8MB or 16MB PCs, are better off adding more RAM.



Road Troubles: Fast-Moving Technology Causes Notebook Breakdowns

CONSUMER ALERT

ADVANCES IN technology and design are making notebook PCs more popular than ever. But experts say vendors increasingly sacrifice quality in order to meet stiff price competition; shorter product cycles; and consumer demand for smaller, lighter designs. As

a result, more and more buyers are comproblems is easy to plaining about flaws ranging from marred active-matrix displays to bum batteries.

Jesse Cornell of Bossier City, Louisiana, is a case in point. He bought a Toshiba Satellite Pro so he could work on the road and exchange e-mail, but found that the system's battery failed to keep a charge when the notebook was shut down and left unplugged overnight. Fortunately, his machine was still under warranty.

SPREAD THE BLAME

THE INCREASE IN notebook problems is easy to explain, says Andrew Seybold, editor of the newsletter Outlook on

> Communications and Computing: "Blame it on Intel." Presented with three new notebook Pentium processors in the first nine

months of 1996, notebook vendors have had less time for troubleshooting. Product cycles that formerly lasted ten months now run six months or less, says Seybold.

It's not just second- and

third-tier vendors that are having these problems, says Ken Dulaney, vice president of mobile computing for The Gartner Group, a research firm. or seven months

ago. It began with Compaq having a lot of trouble with notebooks, and then we started to hear problems from Dell, NEC, and Toshiba."

To complicate matters, notebook vendors rely on offshore manufacturers, particularly in Taiwan and Malaysia. Asian manufacture is hardly newthe Taiwanese company Acer builds Apple's PowerBooks and Texas Instruments' Extensa 400 systems. But doing

AVOIDING TROUBLE

NOTEBOOK PROBLEMS may be on the rise, but you can avoid them. The best strategy: Stay away from the cutting edge. Depending on the application, a 133-MHz notebook with 32MB of RAM can match or even exceed the performance of a 150-MHz model with 16MB of RAM. The vast majority of applications run very nicely without the expensive 12.3-inch and 13.1-inch displays, which are more prone to cracking and pixel failure.

New thin-and-wide notebooks are more susceptible to damage from torque and impact than heftier models. Inspect your system thoroughly when you receive it. Examine the display for "dead" pixels that don't match others nearby; check the display hinge, the port doors, and the keys on the keyboard to confirm they all feel solid. While there's no guarantee your notebook will run problem-free, these precautions should cut your risks.



AVAILABLE IN Europe and scheduled for launch in the United States later this year, Nokia's 9000 Communicator incorporates the greatest number of PC features and offers a glimpse of the direction this technology is taking. The unit looks like a conventional cellular phone, but it opens like a clamshell to reveal a palmtop computer with a 65key QWERTY keyboard and a 640 by 200 LCD screen. It's powered by an Intel 386 processor, includes 8MB of memory, and uses the GEOS operating system. It comes with several miniapplications, including a contact list, a calendar, and a notepad.

Because of its larger screen and keyboard, the Communicator is superior to the AT&T and Mitsubishi phones for managing e-mail. The e-mail applet is straightforward, and the keyboard is as easy to use as most you'll find on palmtops. Like the AT&T PocketNet and Mitsubishi MobileAccess phones, Nokia's 9000 Communicator allows you to forward messages to a fax machine, but this function is more awkward than with its competitors: You have to copy and paste the message in-

Internet for the Jet Set? New Cell Phones Dial Up for E-Mail, Fax, and Net Access

ELECTRONIC communication devices have become something business travelers can't live with and can't live without. Many people lug notebooks around just to check e-mail, but those units require a phone jack and often need a power source too. PDAs weigh less and have longer battery life, but most of them require a phone jack. Wireless modems exist but are cumbersome. Typically, they must be connected to a cellular phone. Now several vendors have built e-mail, fax, and Internet access into a small wireless device that many people already carry: a cellular phone.

We examined phones from AT&T, Mitsubishi, and Nokia. One thing is certain: These products won't replace your notebook for the most demanding e-mail, Net, and fax tasks, nor were they meant to. Entering data on the tiny keyboards and reading messages on the mini screens can be as tiresome as using palmtop PCs. But these devices let you tap a wealth of informationmuch of it on the Web-and send and receive e-mail from just about anywhere a wireless service can reach you.

FIRST PHONES

AT&T'S POCKETNET and Mitsubishi's MobileAccess devices should be available by the time you read this. These

dual-personality units-virtually identical in features-let you switch between phone and Internet features with the push of a button. In Internet mode, they communicate over a cellular digital data service called Cellular Digital Packet Data. Almost half the people in the United States have access to CDPD service, with 54 cities offering full coverage.

The phones are a tad larger and more expensive than today's cellular phones. They weigh somewhere between 10


and 13 ounces, measure 6 inches long, and sell for \$500 to \$600—considerably more than their voice-only counterparts. In addition, AT&T Wireless charges a \$30 to \$40 monthly premium for the data service.

Composing e-mail on these phones is tedious because of their miniature keypads. As on standard phones, each key has three or four letters; for example, the 2 key has the letters A, B, and C. To enter a C, you have to press the 2 key three times. Reading messages is less challenging. Each of the phones has a small four-line screen, which is adequate for viewing short messages. Reading longer e-mail messages is cumbersome but possible. Long incoming messages are automatically broken up into 1400-character batches-the maximum size for a message. You can for-

ward long messages to a local fax machine. You can't read email file attachments. Messages are stored on the provider's network. We were impressed with the phones' ability to provide

quick access to Web sites designed for the small display. These sites contain no graphics and consist only of menus of selectable text items. The Web pages are created with a variant of the Web's HTML code called HDML (Handheld Device Markup Language). The menu system for both phones is easy to use. We



to a fax form for forwarding. Unlike the other phones, the Communicator has a fax client, so you can send, receive, and view faxes.

The Communicator is the only device we examined to provide a real graphical browser that lets you access any Web site directly. At this point, however, it's crude compared to PC-based browsers-for example, it doesn't support Java or plug-ins. And downloading Web pages takes forever because the link is only 9600 bits per second. Moreover,

most graphics look dull on its screen, which shows only eight shades of gray. The browser includes a usable textonly mode, but it too is slow for downloading Web pages.

There are other caveats. The Communicator weighs nearly a pound and stands 7 inches high—bulkier than the AT&T and Mitsubishi phones and stretching the bounds of what can be considered a pocket device. Also, it requires a cellular service called Global System for Mobile Communications that is not generally available in the United States and isn't expected to be as widespread as CDPD. Though Nokia has not yet set local pricing, in Great Britain the Communicator sells for the equivalent of a whopping \$1800.

CALLING CUSTOMERS

DESPITE THESE products' appeal, we can't currently recommend them for the casual user. If you need wireless access to corporate data and e-mail and are willing to pay for it, however, the devices merit a look. Just make sure that cell service for the phone you're considering is available in your area and where you travel regularly. By year-end, expect lower prices and increasingly widespread service. -Bryan Hastings

Paging the World Wide Web

MOTOROLA'S PAGEWRITER offers Web access and e-mail.

CELLULAR PHONES are not the only portable communication gadgets jumping onto the Internet and donning palmtop personas. This June Motorola plans to offer the first keyboardequipped pager that accesses e-mail and Web-based services. Based on the Motorola 68000 series CPU, the PageWriter has a 46-key QWERTY keyboard, a built-in pointing device, and a backlit LCD screen. It includes 1.25MB of RAM.

The PageWriter lets you send and receive e-mail and paging messages but not faxes. In addition, the PageWriter lets you access Web information made available by your paging service provider. The unit we tested had

access to national weather, stock guotes, and flight information. The PageWriter does not include a browser for general Web surfing, nor does it support e-mail attachments.

This device is not designed for composing long messages. The keyboard is absurdly small, making data entry even more of a challenge than with conventional palmtops. But this pager's message-handling prowess rivals that of the cell phones discussed above. The PageWriter has a directory where you can store e-mail, pager, and fax addresses. You can also create mail groups that mix all three. And the device lets you forward messages to e-mail or pager addresses. The PageWriter will cost between \$150 and \$250.

DVD Drives: Definitely Very Delayed

DIGITAL VIDEO DISC technology has won a spot in the vaporware hall of fame: After a year of hype, the technology still hasn't arrived. The latest word is that the DVD players won't hit stores until January 1997. These \$500-to-\$700 devices attach to a TV or PC and play 4.7GB discs that support high-quality audio and video. The first DVD-ROM drives, to be sold in PC upgrade kits and new home computers, will surface in February and March. But even with this good news, problems will remain: In March you'll find few movies or interactive titles for these devices.

At press time entertainment and computer executives had agreed on a DVD encryption scheme. Toshiba and Matsushita Consumer Electronics Company (the parent firm of Panasonic) will be first to market with DVD players. But neineer, and Samsung plan to offer DVD players later in 1997. Toshiba will likely be the first company to unveil a PC

product. It

But what about software? Today you can buy one DVD- ROM, Digital Directory Assistance's \$99 PhoneDisc Power-Finder USA One; the single disc packs six CD-ROMs' worth of listings. In early 1996 Warner Home Video, Hollywood's head DVD cheerleader, said 250 movies would be available by Christmas 1996, but the actual number will probably be fewer than 50. Moreover, CD-ROM vendors say they don't expect many interactive titles before fall 1997.

> One final issue could delay hardware and software: Microsoft is

still developing a device driver for Windows 95, and software that lets the DVD-ROM drive recognize the DVD-ROM file format. The latter software isn't done, says Bill Veghte, Microsoft's Windows Platform group manager. "We have no comment on time frame at this point," he says. Time will tell.

ESKTOP

IN THE PC MARKET, home is where the heart of design innovation may be. Consider the sleek new designs from Compaq, Sony, and Toshiba, which added consumer electronics features to fast Pentium PCs. Now IBM's new Aptiva S series delivers systems with unique space-saving designs and strong software bundles including Lotus SmartSuite, telephony applications, and games.

You won't mistake the Aptiva S for a home PC of old. The monitor sits above the desktop on a tubular base, and it sports a microphone and a pair of speakers on either side of the display. The real innovation, however, is the slim media console situated beneath the monitor and connected to the minitower via a 6-foot cable. Push a button on top of the console, and the 8X CD-ROM drive and floppy drive emerge to allow easy, desk-level access. The result: no ugly system unit on your desk, no straining to reach an out-of-the-way CD-ROM drive, and no moving the keyboard to clear access to a floppy drive.

When you aren't using the system, the Aptiva keyboard

tucks beneath the monitor. resting on top of the closed media console. A cordless mouse helps to eliminate unsightly wires. The mouse uses radio signals, which lets it work even when other objects are blocking the visual path

A ROSE BY ANY OTHER NAME

FOR ALL ITS design tweaks, though, the Aptiva S consists of the familiar PC components: A standard minitower-in black-contains the CPU. memory, hard disk, and add-in slots and bays. The \$3148 Aptiva S66 that I tested packs 16MB of RAM, a 256K secondary cache, a 3.2GB hard drive, and a 15-inch monitor. An ATI 3D Rage graphics chip provides 2-D and 3-D Windows graphics acceleration, while a 33.6-kbps voice-capable modem supports quick Internet access. The system also features a joystick for game play. In the PC World-Bench test suite, the Aptiva S displayed average performance for a Pentium-166 PC of its general configuration.

Clearly IBM has done its homework, but the Aptiva S does have several drawbacks. Most noticeably, the media console cannot accept additional drives. An internal CD-Recorder or tape drive must be installed in the minitower. Also, though the cordless radio mouse is a nice touch,

the keyboard remains tethered to the

minitower. And the mouse. keyboard, and

joystick all use separate ports, despite the presence of a Universal Serial Bus port on the back of the minitower.

The street price of \$3148 with monitor is not low: IBM figures it can get a premium for this Aptiva, as does Sony with its similarly priced Sony PCV-70 home system. Toshiba's similar Inifinia 710 costs \$700 less. Still, IBM's threeyear warranty and its strong reliability and service scores in PC World's monthly fax-back surveys add value.

Meet the Mopier-HP Laser That Collates, Staples, and Sorts

THE OFFICE COPIER isn't the hot gossip spot it used to bemany people have found they can make multiple copies of a document faster on the network laser printer. Printer companies call this mopying, "multiple original printing." Now HP has introduced the LaserJet 5Si Mopier, a first-ofbreed printer that allows multiple original printing without clogging the local area network. This 24-ppm laser with 600-dpi resolution also performs jobs other network lasers can't: It collates, staples, and sorts print jobs into a fivebin mailbox. (Some printers accept add-on mailboxes, but most are expensive and bulky.) The Mopier is street-priced at about \$8900, a big jump from HP's \$4599 LaserJet 5SiMx.

For large offices that generate a high volume of multiplepage documents, the HP LaserJet 5Si Mopier offers substantial benefits. We did not receive a shipping unit in time to test, so we can't comment on speed. But otherwise, the convenience of the unit is obvious: With two 500-sheet trays, a 100-sheet multipurpose tray, and a 2000-sheet input tray, the Mopier holds up to 3100 sheets of paper and has a duplexing unit for twosided printing. And you can use duplex printing with the included HP software to make booklets.

clog your local area network, because of HP's new "transmit once" spooling technology, which keeps the network traffic low. The unit receives and stores information on a 420MB internal hard drive: then it outputs the appropriate number of prints. You can use the hard drive to store forms, as well. The Mopier comes with an HP JetDirect printserver card (for Ethernet and LocalTalk networks) and HP's JetAdmin software. The machine has 12MB of RAM, expandable to 76MB.

HP also offers owners of LaserJet 5SiMX printers a \$1279 Mopy Upgrade Kit that adds the new capabilities to their existing units. (The kit includes software, a 420MB hard drive, and a few boards to be installed inside the printer.) To get the new paper-handling options, upgraders must pay for the 2000-sheet input

tray (\$1299); duplex unit (\$669); multibin mailbox (\$1889); and envelope feeder (\$549).







The P815 has a maximum resolution of 1800 by 1440, and its ultrahigh bandwidth and broad horizontal scan range deliver that resolution at an easy-on-the-eyes refresh rate of 76 Hz. If you need a resolution of "only" 1600 by

1200, refresh is a rock-steady 90 Hz. Not many graphics cards support 1800 by 1440, but that's changing. I tested a shipping version of the P815 with the \$695 Artist Graphics 2000I card (at 256 colors); but the newest 4MB versions of the Matrox Millennium and the Number Nine 9FX Motion 771 also support that very high resolution.

The P815 shows how far technology has come since I bought a 21-inch monitor last year. Some big screens show inconsistencies, but the P815 is bright, sharp, and uniform from edge to edge of its 20inch viewable area. The P815 has a .25mm dot pitch and employs a special high-contrast, low-transmission glass that makes the colors amazingly brilliant. And the tube comes with an effective antiglare coating.

Plainly, the P815 isn't for everyone. But if you do serious graphics work or spend your day with your PC, it can be an eye-saving investment.

This monitor won't be obsolete anytime soon.





out of an archive (just as you would move them in and out of a folder), or between two archives. You decide the level and speed of compression, assign passwords, and adjust other settings in the Preference window. Despite the simplicity of these controls, I found a few problems: For example, the Cancel and OK buttons in the Preference window did not work in the shipping copy I reviewed.

ProZip elegantly handles self-extracting files. When you double-click the file, ProZip asks for the correct destination folder and lets you browse before picking the right place to expand the file.

But in a couple of ways, this \$40 program falls short of its popular competitor, PKZip for Windows 95, which sells for \$49. Unlike PKZip, ProZip doesn't support long file names, nor does it provide

Improved Uninstaller Clears Out Old Files

MOST WINDOWS 95 PCs have a twilight zone where ghost files from deleted applications lurk. Not all new software has Windows 95's add/ remove applet built in, and programs with the applet don't necessarily remove every associated file. But Uninstaller 4, MicroHelp's newest version of this Windows 95 utility, solves the problem.

U T I I I T Y

It examines each file for recent usage and identifies any links to and from other files. It ranks files from unessential to critical (for example, it separates important system files from leftover clip art files) and then categorizes them by file type.

You can delete an application and its associated files completely or move them to another PC or drive.

UnInstaller 4 is far from automatic. You must open files to ensure that those it has slated for removal truly are "unessential." The program misdiagnosed some screen saver files on my system as unessential, so be careful what you delete. Fortunately, Un-Installer 4 also automatically compresses and backs up removed files, and it easily restores files that you've deleted erroneously.

In PC World's last roundup of utilities ("Complete Guide to Windows Utilities," June 1996), Uninstaller 3.5 did a poor job of removing files associated with long-deleted applications, but this upgrade does a better job. In addition,

MicroHelp claims that this new version is up to 20 percent more effective than its predecessor at removing certain types of files.





Business Maestro probably isn't the right program for a small business with few employees, a limited product line, and simple P&L statements. But department managers in bigger companies will find this application improves the financial modeling process and quickly pays for itself.

Suite for Small Business Misses the Mark

DESPITE ITS NAME, Big Business 2.0 for Windows is an accounting and management package designed for small businesses. It's the first Windows 95/NT incarnation of a Macintosh program. Big Business has a raft of unique features. Also, it's priced rather reasonably. But ultimately, this program is overwhelmed by some major problems.

This \$199 program packs the usual accounting tools, plus integrated personal information management, inventory management, and sales automation features. These capabilities help small business managers keep track of employees and projects. Big Business 2.0 also helps create Web-site catalogs and price lists. About the only thing missing is a payroll program—an unaccountable omission.

As with all programs in this genre, you have to put in considerable setup time to get the most from Big Business. But there are more serious problems. Big Business accepts only plain text input: It can't handle data input from other accounting programs unless they export to text format. Big

Business exports its own data in text format.

The program's heavily iconbased user interface contains a quirky mixture of standard and nonstandard Windows buttons and menus. Most data screens are shown in boring monochrome.

Worse, screens don't scale to the resolution of your display. On my 1280 by 1024 display, Big Business's screens huddled sullenly in the corner, virtually unreadable.

Big Business 2.0 for Windows is a feature-packed set of business tools, but it's hard to get beyond the truly awful user interface and the import limitations.

The vendor is already planning a revision of the program that improves the interface and addresses some of our concerns.





It takes the natural-media art instruments from Fractal's Painter image-editing program-paintbrushes, crayons, and the like-and lets you use them to decorate 3-D objects. You can apply these art materials to a flat, rectangular painting surface or to the 3-D object itself. You can't model 3-D shapes, but the program

comes with predefined shapes and can import them.

Detailer 1.0 is an innovative tool for 3-D artists; but at \$449, it's pricey for casual users.

CorelDraw 7 Offers Better Speed, New Look

GRAPHICS CORELDRAW HAS long been the 800-pound gorilla of graphics software suites, and in the past, each new version added more programs to the bundle. But CorelDraw 7 takes a different tack: It concentrates on some significant and very welcome improvements to the package's two core applications, CorelDraw and Photo-Paint.

For the first time in several years, CorelDraw's interface has changed significantly, vielding such innovations as a context-sensitive toolbar that alters according to the drawing tool you're using. The toolbar is a time-saver, although veteran CorelDraw users will need time to adjust.

Based on my experience with the prerelease version, Corel has improved the speeds

of file loading, screen redrawing, and other time-consuming tasks.

The many improvements include more accurate print preview and the ability to create semitransparent objects, such as stained-glass windows. If you have a graphics tablet with a pressure-sensitive stylus, you can draw with a calligraphic line.

Corel also has added Internet-oriented features. Now you can save files in the company's unique Barista format: It uses Java to convert Corel-Draw images precisely for use in Web pages.

Photo-Paint now has the same context-sensitive toolbar and runs noticeably faster. My favorite new features are Image Sprayer, which splatters customizable images onto a picture as you move the mouse, and a filter that automatically improves color and contrast in photos.

Several of CorelDraw 6's secondary modules have departed, including the presentation and animation modules; but this isn't a tragedy, since those modules weren't top-notch. The 3-D illustration and multimedia file manager modules remain. As usual, Corel provides an ocean of clip art, stock photos, and fonts.

High-Tech Compass Meets Digital Map

MAPPING DO YOU COUNT yourself among the perpetually lost? Compass 3800, a \$289 bundle from Chicago Map, could help: It includes the Garmin GPS 38 (a handheld global positioning system receiver) and Precision Mapping 2.0 for Windows (digital street map software).

I like both the GPS 38 and Precision Mapping, which I tested in shipping form. The mapping software let me quickly search for a location by zip code, area code, or street address, and it tracked down a number of personal and business addresses that I needed. Navigating through the maps was fairly easy, but the mechanism could be improved. For example, panning across a map in small steps required repeated clicks of the right mouse button.

The GPS 38, which is about the size of a pocket cellular telephone, proved easy to use outdoors. It worked well when I went sailing or kayaking around San Francisco Bay. However, the model failed at the one task you're most likely to need it for-keeping you on course as you drive a car from point A to point B.

To get any kind of a fix in my Isuzu Trooper, I had to set the GPS 38 up on my dashboard. Unfortunately, the kit does not include a mounting bracket. As I navigated open areas, the unit tracked my direction and speed accurately. But when I drove around hills, through city streets, or under freeways, the Garmin 38 quickly lost its tracking ability. If you drive a convertible in Kansas, the Garmin 38 will most likely work fine. For the rest of us, the better setup is to use the company's Garmin 45 package with an external antenna-but this solution costs more than \$500.

You can connect the GPS to a notebook PC, using the included 7-foot serial cable. The GPS sends your location, speed, and direction to the mapping software, which in turn displays your location on an actual map (down to a scale of a few city blocks).

Don't buy the Compass 3800 if you intend to use it mainly in a car. But if you want a map-based navigation system for diverse situations, this may be the least expensive package on the market.

ONLINE as yet, no company has copied PointCast's innovative strategy of building an information broadcast service over the Internet and projecting it onto a screen saver. Version 1.1 of the program expands on the simple concept by adding much new content, such as regional news from half a dozen major cities; stories culled from CNN, the New York Times, the Knight-Ridder newspaper chain, and Quote-.com (stock updates); worldwide weather updates; and more. Well-designed configuration dialog boxes separate these content choices into dozens of channels, which you can easily select, omit, and prioritize.

PointCast Network 1.1 has a simple embedded browser, allowing you to treat the network's ads as clickable sites (so fewer clicks stand between you and the information). In fact, it can integrate into Netscape Navigator 3.0 as a plugin, but not into Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0.



Sound Decisions for Internet Audio

THREE NEW audio-related products can enhance your aural experience on the Internet. But only one of the three offers a big enough enhancement to receive our hearty endorsement.

That's the Internet Music Kit-a nifty utility that lets Web sites on a budget add instantly playable music to HTML pages. Until now, that capability required an expensive RealAudio server. With

this utility, available from Wildcat Canyon Software's Web site, you can place any MIDI file on your Web page. You can even create one yourself with the Music Kit's simple composition utility. The file can be set up to play a musical greeting when visitors open the page or when they click on an icon.

Still, MIDI files are merely synthesized music with no vocals. The quality of reproduction can range from realinstrument fidelity to tin-can

amateurism, depending on your sound card.

LOW-BUDGET SOUND CARD UPGRADE

IF YOU HAVE ONE of the tincan cards, the Roland Virtual Sound Canvas software can help. It enhances music quality by running MIDI files through your PC's Pentium processor instead of through your sound card's FM synthesizer. The improvement can be dramatic, but the VSC has three glaring drawbacks. First,

if you already have a wavetable card. such as the Sound Blaster AWE32, use of the VSC will decrease audio quality. Second, it's difficult to com-

pose music using the VSC, due to a noticeable delay between your playing a note and hearing it. And third, it's expensive: The list price is \$99. It ships only as one element of a four-part Music Pack that also includes Do-ReMiX 2 (a music creator). Cakewalk Express (a full-scale MIDI composer), and Easy-Juke2 (a "jukebox" utility that plays MIDI files in random. looped, or selected sequence).

ADD AUDIO TO E-MAIL

FINALLY, IF YOU decide that you want to spice up your e-mail with audio and music, Midisoft's Sound Bar software simplifies the process. Using its microphone, you can create voice e-mail with a musical background, special effects, or any sound from a .wav file. The biggest drawback of Sound Bar may be its requirement that you use the cumbersome and difficult-to-configure Microsoft Exchange e-mail program.







WORKGROUP SERVERS

1 HP NetServer LH Pro

PRO: Top performance, strong software tools CON: Premium price, mediocre Oracle speed under Windows NT



THE LH PRO comes in the same short and wide configuration as all earlier NetServer LH models.

but it features a Pentium Pro-200 CPU (upgradable to dual processors), two integrated Adaptec adapters, and four hotswappable Seagate 1GB drives. It's easily the fastest workgroup server we've tested overall, and it posted the best scores for file service and Lotus Notes performance under Windows NT, plus Oracle database performance under NetWare.

The \$8527 model we tested had eight slots open-four PCI, one PCI/EISA, and three EISA-as well as three externally accessible drive bays. HP also provides a well-thought-out server installation and management tool, NetServer Navigator, that comes on a bootable CD-ROM.

2 Digital Prioris ZX 5166

PRO: Strong performance, reliability features CON: High price, slow NetWare file service

AT \$9100, THIS is the costliest workgroup server among the 11 we reviewed for this issue, but it offers excellent performance, support, bundled software, and fault tolerance options for organizations that need those extra features.

The ZX features a Pentium-166 processor with 1MB of dedicated secondary cache; you can expand to four P-166 processors with 1MB of secondary cache each. This small box also includes redundant fans, two 2.1GB Seagate hot-swappable drives, and two integrated Adaptec adapters. The model we tested had five externally accessible drive bays open and two PCI, two PCI/EISA, and four EISA slots available. Digital has updated its solid ServerWorks Manager tool.

This machine scored first in the NT Oracle test and second in all other tests except NetWare file service, where it did surprisingly poorly.

3 Compag ProLiant 1500 5/133 Model 2100

PRO: Good software tools, hot-swappable drives CON: Mediocre speed on Oracle and Notes tests THIS MACHINE has the fifth-best performance we've seen in a workgroup server, good expandability, clean design, hotswappable drives, and Compag's leadingedge software installation tools and server management software. At \$7555, it's also priced well below the NetServer LH Pro and Prioris ZX. The model we tested came with a Pentium-133 (it's upgradable to two CPUs) and two hot-swappable 2.1GB Seagate Barracuda drives. For more information, see our October review.

4 Digital Prioris XL 5133

PRO: Good performance for price, clean design CON: Limited expandability

DIGITAL'S PRIORIS XL 5133 is well engineered, reasonably fast, and bundled with very useful server management software. It's a very good value at \$5650. The Prioris runs sixth among the 11 machines in

5 HP NetServer 5/133 LH

PRO: Good price/performance and expandability CON: Mediocre application performance

THIS WORKHORSE offers a good mix of performance, features, and software tools, and it's been attractively repriced at \$5540. It comes with a Pentium-133 CPU and four Seagate 1GB SCSI drives and two integrated SCSI controllers. See our October review for more details.

ENTERPRISE SERVERS

HP NetServer LS4 5/166

PRO: Excellent performance, good design CON: No free PCI slots as tested

THE NETSERVER LS4 is no longer the fastest enterprise server we've tested, but with its aggressive \$20,400 pricing and strong features, it holds onto Best Buy honors against some very close competition. In performance, it does very well against the new Pentium Pro-based rivals, beaten overall only by the PPro-200-based Data General Aviion (see "Best of the Rest") and NetServer LX Pro.

The system we reviewed held four Pentium-166s (each with 1MB of secondary cache), 128MB of ECC memory (expandable to 768MB), and four hot-swappable 2.1GB Seagate Barracuda drives. All six PCI slots are taken by four HP 100Base-T network adapters and two integrated Adaptec SCSI adapters. For more information, see our October review.

2 HP NetServer LX Pro 6/200 SMP

PRO: Top file performance, good design CON: Mediocre database price/performance

THE LX PRO OFFERS better expandability and high-reliability features than the older LS4, but at \$31,400 it costs more than half again as much.

This is an outstanding file server, performing second only to the DG Aviion 4900-200. However, it's only 8 percent faster than the LS4 on Oracle tests and

actually 9 percent slower at Notes.

The new chassis is large; it can hold up to 12 hot-pluggable drives and 6 other storage units. Our test machine came with six 2.1GB Seagate drives and two open PCI slots. It sports three hot-pluggable power supplies, and you can buy an optional RAID controller. The system comes with the same well-regarded management software as the LS4.

3 Compag ProLiant 5000 6/200

PRO: Great database speed and software tools CON: Mediocre performance for the price

THE PROLIANT 5000 we tested is one formidable machine, with an equally formidable street price of \$30,899.

It came with four Pentium Pro-200 CPUs (each with 512K of on-chip secondary cache). It also featured 128MB of ECC memory (expandable to 4GB), specialized ultrahigh-speed processor and memory buses, dual PCI buses, four hotpluggable 2.1GB Seagate Barracuda drives (expandable to 17.2GB internally and 361GB externally), Compag's Smart-2 Array Controller (which can set up those drives as a redundant array), and other bells and whistles.

But results on our PC WorldBench for Servers suite were mediocre. The Pro-Liant 5000 posted the best times for our Oracle NT test. It also showed good speed on our Oracle test under NetWare 4.1, but overall, it trailed the four-CPU 166-MHz ALR Revolution and several other quadprocessor machines in that test.

The ProLiant's biggest selling point is ease of management, including a major upgrade of the well-regarded SmartStart installation/management software. You can outfit the system with a wealth of optional redundant components.

This large machine has five hot-pluggable drive bays behind the front panel. The side panel allows access to all slots (two PCI and one EISA were available). memory modules, and processors. The two processor cards each hold two CPUs.

4 IBM PC Server 720

PRO: Good performance, excellent upgradability CON: CD-ROM drive is on its side

IF YOU WANT expandability, IBM's PC Server 720 has it in spades. The model we tested, priced at \$26,000, came with four Pentium-133 processors (each with 512K of secondary cache), 128MB of memory, and 13.5GB of storage in six 2.25GB Quantum Atlas drives. You can boost memory to 1GB and storage (with an external system) to more than 100GB. For more information, see our October issue.

5 ALR Revolution Quad6 166/512

PRO: Blazing database speed, very expandable CON: High price, lacks software tools

THIS FOUR-PROCESSOR Pentium Pro machine is a great application server, welldesigned, extremely expandable, and easily serviced. But at \$30,499 it's half again as expensive as our Best Buy, and it lacks a complete suite of software tools. The model we tested had four Pentium Pro-166 CPUs, 128MB of ECC memory, and nine 2.15GB Conner drives. For additional details, see our October review.



Put Your Own Web to Work

Group applications get friendlier and cheaper on your organization's intranet. Here are three of the best packages for sharing information—and work.

LET'S FACE THE FACTS, shall we? Your company is busily turning its network into an intranet, making services old and new available through a common Web browser, And the point of throwing all that fabulous Web pixie dust over your computers is not to let you enjoy cool multiuser fantasy games during lunch hour, to let the gang in sales post brochures, or even to give the H.R. folks a place to distribute those reference materials you check once a year.

No, the point of an intranet is to provide new ways to actually let you work together better with other people-coworkers, contractors, even those pesky folks known as your customers.

The Internet was born to let anyone interact with anyone else, or any other group. An intranet lets your organization turn the fantastic cornucopia of Net technology loose on collaboration, the thorniest of all business problems.

With an intranet in place, you've got the raw infrastructure for group appli-

cations. You don't need to install software on everyone's PC-they can just use their Web browser. You don't have to hire programmers with bad attitudes and expensive habits-slap on off-the-shelf applications instead. And while the main costs are in employee time, the software costs have plummeted.

Here are three leading group applications for your intranet, all priced at no more than \$50 per user (not including server software). Attachmate's Open-Mind, the best tool for document distribution and group discussions, is now being remolded for intranets. Digital's AltaVista Forum tackles a

broader range of tasks than OpenMind. And the third product, SoftArc's First-Class, just wants to be your everything, furnishing e-mail, group discussions, and, soon, full Net access.

OPENMIND: GROUPWARE WITHOUT HASSLES

GROUPWARE HAS A reputation for being complicated and costly to set up, and this reputation is richly deserved. In their demands for massive amounts of hardware and crack teams of professionals. some Lotus Notes rollouts are second only to Desert Storm.

Attachmate's OpenMind 3.0 offers a low-hassle groupware alternative: about 60 percent of Notes' power for about 10 percent of Notes' complexity. The package provides discussion forums and document management functions for an extremely reasonable cost of \$75 for the server software and \$50 for each user. You can even download a free five-user version from Attachmate's Web site, a good way to give the product a trial run.

The OpenMind server software runs on either a Microsoft NT Workstation or an NT Server. OpenMind is simple enough to set up, if you can get a little help from your network administrator about how TCP/IP networking works. And the package's templates serve nicely as starting points for customized information

HERE IS A CLASSIC OPERATIONAL PROBLEM: You've got hundreds of field service employees in many locations across the United States-so how do you keep everyone in synch and get them the up-to-date information they need?

AT&T Wireless Services' Wireless Data Division, which operates a national cellular data network, uses OpenMind to help solve this problem, says Vicki Miller, director of infor-

mation systems and services. More than 300 employees share technical documents, schedules, and other key information on an OpenMind server at the group's Kirkland, Washington, headquarters.

OpenMind 2.0 "just took off," says Miller. "It does not take a lot of administration at all," she adds. She expects to roll out the 3.0 upgrade soon after it ships. "We want to allow people with any Internet browser to get to OpenMind from the field."



databases. We had discussion forums and document sharing under way in less than an hour. Starting a new discussion forum is no more complicated than creating a new folder on your hard disk.

Unlike most groupware systems, Open-Mind is also easy to keep running and to tailor to your organization's needs. For instance, you can let users add themselves to discussions, instead of requiring an administrator to create accounts.

OpenMind's client software runs on Windows 3.1, Windows 95, and Windows NT. Its built-in Web browser is no substitute for Netscape Navigator or Microsoft Internet Explorer, but it does let you build forums that display Web-based information as seamlessly as information stored by OpenMind itself. For example, a Travel Information forum can include links to airline and hotel reservation Web pages plus OpenMind documents that describe your company's travel policies.

And by the time you read this, you should be able to use any Web browser to participate in OpenMind discussions. (The OpenMind Web server add-on was not available for testing at press time.)

Besides offering easy access to Internet material, OpenMind 3.0 provides very well-rounded capabilities for information storage and retrieval. You can create simple text-based discussion messages using its rather plain editor, or you can attach documents, spreadsheets, graphics, or HTML files that can be viewed with its full-featured file viewer. Text information already stored in OpenMind can be indexed and retrieved using the high-powered Verity search engine.

You can also use Open-Mind as a shared document management system.

The program lacks the form creation and workflow mechanisms found in Notes. You can't, for instance, automatically route information to a predefined list of recipi-

ents. It also has no built-in e-mail capability, though you can set up a \$495 gateway to external e-mail systems.

What OpenMind does is make easy what other groupware makes hard.

ALTAVISTA FORUM: SUITE COLLABORATION

BORN FOR THE World Wide Web, Digital Equipment's AltaVista Forum 2.0 lets you use any browser to establish teams to work on projects or manage enterprisewide repositories of information.

The package bundles newsgroup access,

group discussion, document sharing, calendaring, polling, and general search capabilities. Some of these features are not as polished as in rival packages, but Forum benefits from being a member of the powerful AltaVista suite, and the package is easy for a network administrator to install and run. We tested Forum 2.0 with Microsoft's Internet Information Server.

Once Forum is open for business, you check in at a home page dubbed the Summit, which gives you a view of all your options. You also can have a Personal Vista that stores your personal calendar; it lets others view that calendar, drop you a note via e-mail, send you a file, join in a structured discussion with you, and do real-time "chatting." Most strikingly, you can create an individualized Newsstand service on any NNTP-based (newsgroup) server. Newsstands are front ends for the AltaVista search engine, a version of which is bundled into Forum.

A Team Vista provides similar tricks for any teams of which you're a member.

Forum's calendars are easy to use, but not terribly useful. You get either a day view or a month view. You can submit a meeting request, and other potential attendees are notified via e-mail. When they accept or decline, you receive a message via e-mail as well. Unfortunately, you must then go back into the calendar to manually update the meeting entry. In addition, the calendar can't roll personal calendars into a team or Summit calendar.

The discussion forums aren't as slick as those in OpenMind, but they are threaded to make it easy to see who said what and when. The owner of the forum can set up message categories. Your messages can be text, include a URL to a useful file, or attach the file itself.

You can also poll users on a forum topic. Anyone who responds to the topic can "vote." AltaVista tracks responses and shows them in a handy graphical view.

A document-sharing forum lets you share documents in hierarchical folders much like those in Windows 95. Doc-

news." With PointCast, the Internet news network, you can get it broadcast straight to your desktop: weather updates, world news, sports, stocks, industry news and more. And suddenly your computer screen is transformed into a dynamic, multi-colored newswire complete with flying headlines, vibrant graphics and scrolling stock ticker. PointCast is completely customizable so you can get exactly the news you want. A Firsthand introduction to FirstClass

REMEMBER THESE frustrations from your college days? You couldn't make your professor's office hours because they conflicted with your class schedule. You missed a lecture and arranged to get notes from a classmate who never showed up. You pedaled all over campus posting signs about a student meeting, but nobody saw them. (Does this remind you of anything in your current job?) Students at Emory University in Atlanta avoid such hassles by going online with SoftArc's FirstClass, thanks to the foresight of biology professor Pat Marsteller. -Editor

Students come to class prepared for the day's lecture, eager to learn from each other and from us A FEW YEARS AGO, my son Sean Murphy and I met with area high school teachers to figure out how to keep them in touch with their mentors at Emory University. Afterward, Sean and I applied for and were awarded a minigrant from Georgia Tech to find a computer program that would bridge this gap in communication. FirstClass provided everything we needed and more.

After implementing the system for the high school teachers-dubbed

LearnLink-a colleague and I decided to try FirstClass in our physiology class, in hopes it would give students more contact with each other and with us. We posted students' resumes (with photographs) and created conference folders for discussing class topics.

The students' response was exhilarating. Before LearnLink, they sat passively through lectures, then made a mad dash for the exits when class ended. Now, students come to class prepared for the day's lecture and eager to learn from each other and from us.

Today, 700 classes in all departments on campus are using First-Class. Professors distribute course materials online. Students turn in assignments and exams electronically. Professors cut their office hours by communicating with students via e-mail. And everyone taps FirstClass to access Internet resources.

Professors in the Emory Medical School, for example, post all instructional materials for first-year medical students on FirstClass. Student organizations use FirstClass to notify their members of meetings. And students and faculty at Emory's two-year campus in Oxford, Georgia, connect to the Atlanta campus via FirstClass.

Professors receive one-on-one training on how to administer and customize the software. Typically, the professors then administer a conference for their classes. Within this conference, a professor can create a discussion area, a question-and-answer session, a chat area, and a drop-box folder for assignments and exams (which only the professor can read). Professors typically leave most of their conferences open. That way, all students can learn from the class, and students who may be interested in taking the class can view

the online syllabus and browse the discussions before registering.


The free FirstClass client is distributed to students via the Web. floppy disk, or file server. Students moving into a dorm with PCs or Macs get the FirstClass client installed for them. The 60 percent of students who don't own computers can get onto the system from several large labs on campus.

Reading Ahead, Reaching Off Campus

ONE UNDERGRADUATE science research program used online discussions in FirstClass to enhance weekly seminars. Before the seminar, a professor would post a case study highlighting the topic. Program participants-students and researchers at the Centers for Disease Control-would then discuss the case.

During a course I taught on evolution, students kept an online journal in FirstClass, sharing their reactions to class readings. Across campuses, students from a biology class at the University of Virginia exchanged essays and assignments with students in a comparable class at Emory. And in my Women in Science class, I import related Usenet newsgroup discussions from the Internet into FirstClass so students can participate in them.

Our FirstClass system has increased students' interest in their classes. And that means they're learning more. —Pat Marsteller

It's easy to find your way around, and pages and menus are dynamically constructed as you click your way around the site. But often you find yourself retracing your steps rather than jumping to where you want to go. In addition, if someone else changes a page while you are viewing it, you need to reload the page or you won't see the changes.

Overall, AltaVista Forum is an impressive tool. It lacks Lotus Notes' inherent security and is a bit more difficult to navigate than Notes, OpenMind, and some other products. But the features it has are easy to set up and use, and the package is powerful enough to be a natural fit on many intranets. - William L. Rinko-Gay

FIRSTCLASS: MAC E-MAIL **EMBRACES WINDOWS AND WEB**

A VETERAN MACINTOSH e-mail system with simple group-collaboration tools, SoftArc's FirstClass has added a slew of enhancements and support for Windows, and it's now about to plunge into the Web. FirstClass offers a wide range of capabilities at a low price, but some of its quirks may puzzle Windows users.

FirstClass can't compare to Lotus Notes as a workflow tool, but it packs plenty of functionality into a more economical package and does far more than Open-Mind and AltaVista Forum. It includes full-featured e-mail, group conferencing, real-time discussions, some Internet links, forms processing, database access, and now remote support for all features.

Group conferences offer threaded messages, public chats, and connections to Internet newsgroups. Users can organize messages into folders they create with the New Folder option from the Conference

menu. Every message is signaled in the conference with an envelope icon (red for unread messages, white for unsent ones). Each group conference folder gets its own window. The First-Class administrator can establish

just about any kind of access to conferences that you might want.

FirstClass lets you combine customized access controls for individuals or workgroups with custom e-mail forms for sophisticated applications without programming. FirstClass includes forms for phone messages, information requests, and purchase requisitions. You can also use the bundled FirstClass Designer to create your own forms for more tailored workflow applications. Tight database

FirstClass bundles e-mail, group conferencing, realtime discussions, and forms processing-and will soon add full access via standard Internet clients

links let users query corporate databases via an information request form and get the results back in a graphical form.

Installation is straightforward for your net administrator, as long as he or she has some Windows NT networking savvy. Optional support is available for Macintosh clients (\$495), text-only terminals (\$495), or TCP/IP networks (\$995).

Using FirstClass's Mac-like e-mail client on Windows can be disorienting, like switching between a stick shift and an automatic transmission. For example, every time you open a nested folder you open yet another window, quickly causing massive MacWindow clutter. This should

be fixed in version 3.5 (shipping at press time), which will include such Windows features as right-mouse button support and a customizable toolbar.

Organizations with hardcore Windows users may want to wait for version 4.0, which is due early in 1997. In addition to introducing group calendaring and dragand-drop To Do lists, it will let you use any Internet e-mail package as a client, and you'll be able to access all other FirstClass services with standard Web browsers.

FirstClass is a good, economical choice for e-mail and conferencing, especially if your network is a mixed bag.





WAR OF THE

Should you make the move from 95 or 3.1 to NT?

The answer boils down to a basic trade-off: stability and security versus compatibility. By Scott Spanbauer

TIMES CHANGE. It seems like only yesterday that Windows 95 made its debut with an avalanche of publicity, a Rolling Stones theme song, and midnight lines at Egghead. But as we ring in 1997, Win 95's very name shows it's no newcomer.

The formal upgrade to Windows 95 isn't due until mid-1997, when Microsoft plans to roll out a revised edition of the operating system, which may or may not be called Windows 97. As we discuss in "Windows 97: Already Here, Sort Of," this upgrade will consist largely of features offered first as Win 95 add-ons, such as the ability to use the Internet Explorer 4.0 Web browser as an alternative to the standard Windows desktop. >

ILLUSTRATIONS BY

Even now, though, Win 95 faces competition from another, newer member of the Windows family: Windows NT Workstation 4.0. This latest Microsoft desktop operating system may not have hit the market with quite the fanfare that accompanied Windows 95's arrival, but it's still a big event in the computing world.

After all, many Windows 3.1 users-including a large chunk of corporate America-chose to skip Windows 95 altogether. Loath to switch operating systems unless absolutely necessary, these users gambled that Win NT Workstation 4.0 would combine Win 95's much-improved interface with Win NT's traditional virtues-stability and security. And even if you moved to Win 95 long ago, you may wonder if Win NToffers any overwhelming advantages.

To help you select the best version of Windows for your needs, the PC World Test Center put both Windows 95 and the final shipping version of Windows NT Workstation 4.0 through their paces with a broad comparison of features, compatibility, and performance. We found much to like about Win NT-with a few big reservations. It's a technically superior, more secure OS that can keep buggy programs from crashing the whole PC. And unlike earlier NT versions, Win NT 4.0 demands only slightly more of up-todate PCs than Win 95 does. NT requires a minimum 12MB of RAM, and Microsoft recommends at least a Pentium-60 CPU, though it can run on 486 PCs.

For most users, NT's biggest drawback is its limited hardware and software compatibility. Most of the products we tested ran under it, but there were some important exceptions, and NT's lack of Plug and Play hardware configuration didn't help.

Even in the best of circumstances, trying out a new oper-

ating system is a major undertaking, and Windows NT has its unique obstacles. First of all, you need a minimum 110MB of free disk space, which may prove a daunting amount of storage to give up unless you're absolutely sure Win NT is for you. What's more, NT isn't compatible with DOS's and Windows 95's Drive-Space disk compression. If you've compressed all your available disk space, you'll have to remove DriveSpace before installing NT.

Already Here, Sort Of

DON'T LOOK NOW, but Windows 95 is due for a face-lift. Around mid-1997, Microsoft expects to ship the successor to Windows 95, code-named Memphis and often referred to as Windows 97. The new upgrade will feature a Web-ified interface that blurs the line between desktop navigation and online browsing, while packing new technologies and tweaking established features-all to ease use and fix bugs. Perhaps most surprising, you may be running a good deal of Windows 97 already.

97 in 95. Yes, Microsoft has been quietly but consistently updating Windows 95. The company's Web site boasts many Windows 97 features, from ISDN and infrared communications capabilities, to the beta of the latest Internet Explorer Web browser (it wasn't ready when we went to press, but Microsoft



plans to have it up by the time you read this). New PC systems that ship with Win 95 preinstalled have OEM versions of Win 95 with the FAT32 file system and unified Windows 95/NT hardware drivers. Win 97 will put these incremental updates into a shrinkwrapped box, along with late-breaking features and a host of updated drivers.

A Web-like Interface. So is Windows 97 yesterday's news? Hardly. Click Windows 97's new Web View option under the View menu in Windows Explorer, and you'll be using Internet Explorer 4.0 to navigate your hard disk. File icons and the stuffy tree-andlist file system will be gone-replaced, Microsoft promises, with a three-pane visual scheme of hyperlinks and view windows that should give your screen the look and feel of a well-designed Web page. Internet Explorer 4.0 will also be able to give Windows NT 4.0 the same Web-style desktop, Microsoft's Active Desktop will use ActiveX components to put Web browsing, real-time ticker displays, and even television feeds directly onto the desktop. Microsoft says it is "decoupling" this user interface from the operating system to allow frequent surface updates without having to rerelease a whole new version of the OS every time.

Also, Win NT 4.0 requires its own drivers for devices such as video cards and printers; your existing DOS, Win 3.1, or Win 95 drivers won't work. NT comes with a healthy collection of drivers. but you may need to track down others-if they're available at all. Win 95 users face another barrier: Although you can put Win NT on a Win 95 system without wiping out the hard drive, NT doesn't pick up any of Win 95's settings. You'll have to reinstall every program and driver under the new OS.

Fortunately, one Windows NT feature does reduce the pain of OS migration-a utility makes it easy to choose between two or even three operating systems each time you start your PC. It's a good idea to retain your old operating system in case a key application turns out to be incompatible with NT. Keeping the old OS available will also let you make the transition to NT gradually.

THE FINAL ANALYSIS

EVEN AFTER YOU KNOW the whole story on the contrasting strengths and weaknesses of Win 95 and Win NT, it's not an easy choice. Read the following detailed reports on both versions' features, compatibility, and performance to see how they compare.

As long as you've got a reasonably fast PC with at least 16MB of RAM, the decision boils down to opting for NT's better system security and stability and its intranet server software; or Windows 95's near-universal hardware and software compatibility, Plug and Play, and advanced support for portable PCs. If you find that everything works with NT except for one key item, you can always choose your old OS from the boot menu when you want to use that item. But Win 95 remains a better choice if you don't have the time or patience to worry about compatibility.

One other point in Win 95's favor: For most users, it's \$200 cheaper than NT. That's because anyone with an old version of DOS or Windows qualifies for the \$90 Win 95 upgrade, but Win NT's \$135 upgrade is available only to users of earlier versions of NT. Everyone else has to pay the full \$290 street price. And while Win 95 comes with 90 days of free phone help, NT comes with just two free calls; beyond that, you pay \$95 per incident.



WIN NT AND WIN 95 HAVE THE SAME INTERFACE. But look closely, and you'll spot some different features, such as NT's utilities for managing user accounts and intranets.

There will be lots under the hood, too. Windows 97 will feature a reworked file system-the previously mentioned FAT32-that conserves disk space and increases the maximum size of hard disks to 2 terabytes, though Microsoft admits that performance may degrade slightly in some applications.

The so-called Windows Driver Model promises to let Windows 95 and Windows NT access peripherals using a single driver; this may help NT's spotty hardware compatibility, while tweaks to the Windows 95 kernel may boost the operating system's performance. The operating system will also include support for Intel's multimediasavvy MMX additions to the Pentium's instruction set.

new software to download updated components-a step toward the network PC model-as well as improve file synchronization for mobile users. For notebooks, Windows 97 will provide better power management, including the ability to shut down power-hungry PC Cards, and will support

the upcoming 32-bit PC Card standard, called CardBus.

Despite the trickle-down updates and bits-and-pieces enhancements, Windows 97, or whatever it ends up being called, promises to be a significant release. The new OS continues to sidle closer to Windows NT, with unified drivers and a shared Web-style interface that may ease things for those using PCs at home and work. But why take our word for it? Much of it is out there for you to try right now.

Features: Same Outsides, Different Insides

ANY OF THE LIABILITIES that kept earlier versions of Windows NT off most desktops have been remedied in Windows NT Workstation 4.0. The biggest improvement: NT has finally shed its aging Windows 3.1-style interface for one that matches Windows 95's almost feature for feature. Most Win 3.1 veterans won't ever pine for Program Man-

ager, which both NT and Win 95 replace with the sleeker, more flexible Start menu and Taskbar, along with a more customizable work environment. Windows NT 4.0 also has Win 95 tools such as the Briefcase file-synchronization utility, the Exchange e-mail client (which Microsoft is renaming Windows Messaging), and the HyperTerminal communications program. Unlike Win 95, NT 4.0 ships without fax software. At press time, however, Microsoft had put a free beta

version of a fax program for NT on its Web site (http:// www.microsoft.com/ntworkstation/fax.htm).

APPEARANCES CAN BE DECEIVING

WINDOWS 95 AND Win NT 4.0 may look like twins, but sub-

stantial differences lurk under the hood. Windows 95 is nominally a 32-bit operating system, but it's retained some code from its 16-bit ancestors, MS-DOS and Windows 3.1. That code makes it compatible with the vast majority of hardware and with most DOS and Windows programs. Unfortunately, it also means that Win 95 has DOS's prehistoric, insecure FAT file system and is prone to some of Win 3.1's mysterious crashes and instabilities.

Windows NT, by contrast, was designed as a fully 32-bit operating system from the ground up. Besides running on garden-variety PCs, it takes advantage of multiprocessor systems and is available for several types of RISC workstations. Also unlike Win 95, there is a version designed to run large local area networks: Windows NT Server 4.0, which competes against such network operating systems as NetWare.

NT also goes several steps beyond Win 95 to prevent software crashes and to keep applications that do crash from bringing down other apps or the OS itself. More than Win 95, it insists that drivers and other software access the display, hard drive, and various components only through the OS's official procedures, so it can monitor what they're up to and prevent them

from doing anything that might crash the PC. This setup helps keep sloppy software from wreaking havoc, but it also means that lots of pro-

New Look, New Features

SELECTING AN operating system for your PC hasn't been reduced to choosing between Microsoft products-yet. Despite years of speculation that OS/2's death was imminent, IBM con-

tinues to upgrade its 32bit operating system. OS/2 Warp 4 fixes some of the limitations of earlier OS/2 releases: Thanks in part to additional drivers, installation is much easier, and this new edition has a more colorful look, with

better online help and a new feature called WarpCenter-a powerful, customizable equivalent of Win 95's and Win NT's Taskbar.

Warp 4's biggest technological innovation is its built-in voice recognition:

You can speak into a microphone to navigate the OS/2 desktop, or even dictate documents into programs such as word processors, with surprisingly accurate results. Unlike Windows, Warp also has built-in Java, which lets you run Java applets without launch-

ing a Web browser.

OS/2 Warp 4 is an exciting upgrade for current fans of OS/2, but there's a flashing stoplight for Windows users: Although Warp runs DOS, Win 3.1, and native 32-bit OS/2 apps, it can't run 32-bit

None of this should suggest that Win 95 is a basically shaky OS. In research for this article, we spent hundreds of hours pounding on PCs, peripherals, and software and never had a crash with Win NT or Win 95a far cry from the legendary unreliability of Win 3.1.

That doesn't mean NT's extra emphasis on stability isn't a big plus for many users, especially those who simply can't afford to risk damage to, say, a vital customer database. Think of it as the equivalent of automotive safety features such as antilock brakes and safety-cage construction. With or without them, chances are you'll never total your car-but it's good to know they're there just in case.

LOCK UP YOUR DATA

CORPORATE users are likely to want an OS that can protect sensitive data from prying eyes

or accidental deletion, and here NT offers substantial advantages over Win 95. The latter's security looks good on the surface-it can be set up so that you must log in with a user name and password, and you can password-protect shared drives. But it's more bark than bite: Anyone who sits down at your PC can create a new account and password, or bypass security by pressing <Esc> at the log-in screen or booting in Safe mode.

Win NT's security is much more airtight-by default, only the system's administrator can create accounts, and you can't bypass security. Additionally, NT lets you specify who has access to disks, directories, and individual files, whether the users are sitting at the keyboard or logged in over the network. To get file-level security, you need to install NT using its NTFS file system, which provides much more security than Win 95's FAT, the aging file system that dates back to the dawn of MS-DOS. (Alternatively, you can install NT using FAT, which lets you place NT on a single drive partition along with DOS, Win 3.1, or Win 95.)

Unlike Windows 95, Win NT Workstation 4.0 also comes with tools that let anyone who's comfortable with the basics of World Wide Web authoring create an intranet-an internal corporate information system built around Internet software such as Web browsers and servers. It provides this capability through Peer Web Services, a suite of Web, FTP, and gopher servers. With these utilities, it's surprisingly quick and easy to configure a PC to deliver corporate data that networked users can view with any

One little catch with NT's Peer Web Services: Your data is visible only to local network users, not the Internet at large. If you want to create a Web site that's available to the whole world, you have to use another Web server, such as Microsoft's free IIS server. You'll also have to upgrade to the much costlier Win NT Server 4.0, since Win NT Workstation's license limits you to ten users at any one time, including Web visitors.

NT'S MISSING FEATURES

so much for major features unique to Windows NT. The bad news is that Windows NT lacks Windows 95's Plug and Play hardware installation. Plug and Play isn't perfect, but when it works, it can make upgrading or installing new hardware on

your system a breeze. Win NT will probably find your hard disks, CD-ROM drives, SCSI devices, and mouse on its own, but that's it. Installing other devices, such as sound boards, happens much as it does under Win 3.1-you must locate a driver (from the Windows NT CD-ROM or the manufacturer's disk or online site) and install it yourself. You're also more likely to need to fiddle with IRQs, interrupts, and other unpleasant realities of hardware configuration, and that's assuming an NT driver exists at all-read on for what we discovered about driver availability.

Notebook users are worse off, because NT lacks Win 95's support for hot-swapping PC Card devices (part of Plug and Play) and Advanced Power Management. Some notebook manufacturers plan to write their own Win NT PC Card and APM extensions. But if your system's vendor isn't so enterprising, you may have to wait for Win NT 5.0 to get full-fledged support for portable computing. Until then, be prepared to reboot when you exchange PC Cards, and your battery life may be brief at best.

NO PERFECT WINDOWS

ULTIMATELY, NEITHER version of Windows has a clear advantage from a features standpoint. Too bad Microsoft hasn't come up with a version that offers everything: Win 95's Plug and Play and good support for mobile PCs, and NT's better security and stability. At least both versions finally sport the same interface, so ease of use isn't a factor when choosing between them.

Compatibility: Win 95's Strength, Win NT's Weakness

IN NT's lack of Plug and Play is only one issue that helps determine how easy-or hard-it is to get it running on a given PC. The bigger issue is whether the various items that make up your system will work with NT at all. To test compatibility, we devised four representative desktop systems, as well as a portable setup built around a notebook and PC Card peripherals (see "Accident Report," below). With just the essentials installed, we loaded the OS, then installed a suite of peripherals and programs one at a time.

Windows 95 worked with all these products much more

smoothly than NT did-no big surprise there. Most new apps are designed for Win 95, and it runs the vast majority of old DOS and 16-bit Windows applications well. Finding Win 95 hardware drivers is rarely hard, and for the most part, its Plug and Play eases setup pains, although it still can't resolve every conflict.

Win NT is another story. It isn't based on the MS-DOS core code and uses a different driver architecture than Win 3.1 and 95, so the only way it will work with a particular piece of hardware is if someone has written a driver specifically for Windows NT. Consequently, a lot of hardware just isn't compatible. Seven of the 31 devices we tried failed to operate; the OS handled basic items like drives and video cards easily, but we often had trouble with other peripherals such as sound cards, tape drives, and scanners.

Before you even consider moving a PC to Windows NT, check Microsoft's guide to hardware it has successfully tested with NT (http://www.microsoft.com/isapi/hwtest/hsearchn4.idc).



Most vendors we contacted with products not yet compatible with NT have NT drivers in development, but there are some prominent exceptions, including Logitech's PageScan Color scanner and Hewlett-Packard's T1000E tape drive.

THE SOFTWARE SITUATION

IN THE LONG RUN, virtually all new business-oriented Win 95 applications will likely also run under NT. Microsoft is phasing out the Designed for Windows 95 logo and replacing it with a Designed for Windows NT and Windows 95 one; products that bear the new logo will be guaranteed to work with both versions. (Most apps that have the Designed for Windows 95 logo are supposed to run under NT, but the rules are far from strict.)

Unfortunately, Microsoft doesn't maintain a list of software that has been found to operate properly with NT, as it does with hardware. Our tests show that most programs likely to fail are in distinct categories. Win 3.1 and Win 95 utilities will almost certainly give NT fits: Because NT uses different schemes for memory and disk access than Win 95 does, utilities must be designed with it in mind; NT versions of such major utilities as Symantec's Norton Utilities and McAfee's VirusScan are available. Communications programs, too, often fail under NT because they don't interact with your PC's hardware the way NT demands.


Games are another sticky area. DOS games usually achieve fast performance by writing directly to the PC's display and other hardware-a serious NT no-no-so you can forget about playing most of them with NT. Mech Warrior 2 stood a better chance of working, since it was designed for Win 95. It conked out in our tests, however, because it uses four of Microsoft's five DirectX add-ins; as we went to press, NT still supported only two of them.

What's the final word on Win NT's compatibility? An optimist would note that it worked with most of the products we tried; a pessimist would zero in on the well-known ones it couldn't handle. You'll need to examine your PC's configuration, check Microsoft's hardware compatibility list, and talk to your software's vendors before you'll have a feel for whether you're likely to have problems when running NT.


Performance: A Few Big Differences

Performance: No Overall Winner

HEN WE SET OUT TO COMPARE how quickly Win 95 and Win NT 4.0 perform the same tasks, we chose sensible real-world hardware configurations, rather than Microsoft's overly optimistic minimum requirements. We tested each OS on a Pentium-100 PC with 16MB of RAM, again on the same system with 32MB of RAM, and on a 200-MHz Pentium Pro PC with 32MB of RAM. We performed tasks using workaday business applications (Word, Excel, 1-2-3, and Paradox) and high-end apps (AutoCAD, FrameMaker, and Macromedia's Extreme 3D graphics package). To see how each OS dealt with demanding tasks, we used large files, such as a 13.5MB Excel spreadsheet and a 6MB AutoCAD design file.

Neither version of Windows emerged as the clear performance champ. Each ran certain applications much faster than the other. Excel, for instance, ran up to 58 percent quicker with Win 95 than with Win NT, and FrameMaker was always at least twice as fast under NT than under Win 95, regardless of system configuration. But in many cases the difference for a particular app was around 15 percent or less-virtually unnoticeable in everyday use.

NT's pure 32-bit architecture helps with demanding multitasking applications.

And the total time it took for the two Windows to finish all the tests was remarkably similar on a given hardware configuration.

Conventional wisdom says Win NT demands a more potent PC than Win 95 for decent performance. In testing both versions on a Pentium-100 PC with 16MB of RAM, we found this rule may be outdated. Word, Excel, 1-2-3, and Paradox were faster with Win 95 than with NT, but only by 3 percent to 16 percent. With Auto-CAD and Extreme 3D, NT actually squeaked past Win 95; with FrameMaker it eclipsed Win 95 by a whopping 126 percent.

Bumping the PC up to 32MB of RAM affected results in different ways, depending on the program. In the case of Excel and AutoCAD, Win 95 benefited more from the additional RAM than NT did. On the 32MB machine, Excel was about a third faster under Win 95 than NT, and AutoCAD about 21 percent faster; Word ran about a third faster under NT than under Win 95 in this setup. NT's edge with FrameMaker got even more lopsided.

If you're struck by how much faster both Win 95 and NT finished our tests with 32MB of RAM than with 16MB, bear in mind that we used large files that tended to force the 16MB system to juggle data to the hard disk. The most startling example: With Win 95, sorting the 13.5MB spreadsheet—one of the tasks we did with Excel-took an hour and 21 minutes with 16MB of RAM, while the same sort with 32MB of RAM took just 39 seconds. If you work with smaller files, you'll probably see a much smaller speed gain with 32MB of RAM than we found here.

Conventional wisdom also says that NT is the logical version of Windows to run on a Pentium Pro PC, since that CPU favors purely 32-bit code (like NT's) to Win 95's mix of 16- and 32-bit architecture. But on our Pentium Pro-200 system with 32MB of RAM, Win 95 outperformed NT with Excel (58 percent faster

under Win 95), Paradox (17 percent faster), and AutoCAD (29 percent faster). NT won out with Word (14 percent faster) and once again blazed through the FrameMaker tests. The other apps ran at about the same speed on both operating systems.

These results refer to NT with the FAT file system. We also tested NT with its NTFS file system, which lets it protect data file by file. This scheme exacts a price in performance: Win NT with NTFS was the slowest OS overall on all three PC configurations we tested, and in most cases was the slowest for each individual program. The difference in speed compared to NT with FAT usually wasn't huge-often a negligible 1 or 2 percentage points, and rarely more than 15 percent. The big exception was Word, which was always at least 72 percent slower with NTFS than with FAT.

AN ADVANTAGE IN MULTITASKING

POWER USERS SHOULD NOTE that NT's pure 32-bit design gives it an advantage in high-intensity multitasking. When we tried simple multitasking of several apps at once, neither version of Windows was clearly superior. But then we tried to push both operating systems to their limit with as many calculation-intensive tasks at once as possible, including a database query in Paradox, a large worksheet sort in 1-2-3, and a 3-D scene rendering in AutoCAD. With Win 95, our PC quickly became so preoccupied with the background jobs that just navigating around the desktop with the mouse pointer became very sluggish. With NT, however, the desktop remained snappy despite the background tasks.

All in all, we can only conclude that neither OS has a meaningful natural performance edge on any of the PC setups we tested-it all depends on the specific apps you use. We mentioned all the major speed differences above, and you should consider them if you spend most of your workday in one of the affected apps. If you divide your day between a variety of programs, though, one might run a bit slowly under the version of Windows you use, but another will probably be brisk enough to compensate. Unless you perform heavy-duty multitasking, we don't think you're likely to see an overall difference in performance between the two operating systems on a reasonably well equipped PC.

How to get a grip on your finances: Top tips, products, and Web sites.

LYNN BRENTON USES QUICKEN to handle her personal finances, and overall she's very happy with the program. But the Decatur, Georgia—based computer specialist for a lighting fixture manufacturer knows the program's weaknesses: "I can't figure out how to budget with Quicken, so I still use Excel for that."

Handling your personal finances can be a daunting task, one that seems made to order for a personal computer. After all, your PC can track when bills need to be paid and even pay them via modem, track expenses and help you create a budget, and ease all the painful parts about pay-

ing taxes except, of course, actually paying them. Online services and special software can help you make and track investments, and plan for that ultimate vacation-your retirement.

But a PC won't solve your money problems, and may even cause a few new ones. Finance programs aren't as easy to use as their vendors want you to believe, especially if you know little about financial basics. If you fall months behind in tracking your spending, you'll get nothing out of it but guilt; on the other hand, tracking every penny can become time-wasting and unproductive, especially if you don't make wise use of your newly acquired information.

PC. You'll learn about the hidden features and pitfalls of the popular programs, how to find where your money is going, and which investment sites on the World Wide Web are the best. You paid a lot for your computer, and it's time you made it pay off.

GETTING ORGANIZED

BEFORE YOU CAN USE YOUR COMPUTER to get a handle on your finances, you need to start using it to record your assets, liabilities, and transactions.

Get a checkbook program. The best tools for this job are checkbook programs like Quicken, Microsoft Money, and Managing Your Money. (Disclosure: I

was one of several experts paid by Intuit to write online financial advice for the 1996 Quicken Deluxe CD-ROM.) These programs go beyond managing checking accounts and try to be sophisticated electronic financial advisers. They don't always succeed. Elizabeth Nesbitt of Fort Wayne, Indiana, a mostly satisfied Quicken user since 1990, finds that in some respects, Quicken is "not sophisticated at all. For instance, it can't compare 15-year with 30-year mortgages." (See the sidebar "Quicken or Money?")

Set it up. When you first use a checkbook program, it walks you through the task of setting up your "accounts." Set up one for important bank accounts, credit cards, loans, and investments. The program will ask

you a lot of questions, so have your bank statements, credit card bills, and other financial papers handy before you start.

Save your receipts. Set aside time every month to enter all your transactions-checks you've written, checks you've deposited, ATM withdrawals, credit card charges, and so on-into your checkbook program (see the tip "Entering your Paycheck" for details on handling this important transaction). Be extra diligent about credit card transactions; they can get out of hand.

Create logical categories. As you enter transactions, you'll be asked to assign each one to a category, such as Groceries, Entertainment, or Household. Later, you'll be able to see how much

you've spent in each cate-

Tips for Getting Organized

Splitting Transactions

A CHECK TO THE SUPERMARKET can easily be categorized as Groceries, and a charge at the gas station as Car:Fuel. But under what

category do you place a single charge at the drugstore for a magazine and prescription medicine? You split it between two categories.

In either Quicken or Money, when you get to the Category field, click the Splits button. Enter the categories and amounts in the resulting dialog box.

Entering Your Paycheck

YOUR CHECKBOOK program needs more information about your paycheck than how much money you've deposited-at least if it's going to give you accurate information down the line. You have to tell it what has been deducted, as well.


In Quicken, enter the paycheck as a split transaction as described in "Splitting Trans-

actions." In the first split line, enter the gross pay, and in the lines that follow, enter the deductions (taxes, 401(k), and so forth), making sure to use negative amounts.

Money gives you a niftier way to handle this. Click the Go To button, select Payment Calendar, then click the New button. In the resulting wizard, select the Deposit option and click Next. In the category field, type paycheck. Money's Paycheck Wizard holds your hand through the process of entering the information and asks you whether you want to track 401(k) or other pretax or posttax deductions. If you say you do, it sets up a retirement account to receive those deductions if one is not set up already.



much you're spending on your car and exactly where that money is going.

How detailed should you be with the categories? As much as necessary. If you suspect that an inordinate amount of your grocery bill is going to ice cream, you may want to create a Groceries: Ice Cream subcategory. But Groceries:Ice Cream:SuperUltraChunk is a bit extreme. And if you're happy with your expenditures, there's no need to record extra details.

Balance your accounts. If you want to keep a tight watch on your checking account, compare your monthly bank statement to your data to see if there are any errors or unforeseen charges. In Money, check the Balance button on the right of the account registry screen; the program will explain what to do. In Quicken, click the Reconcile button near the top of the registry screen.

Consider doing your banking online. Balancing your account is a lot easier if your software can call your bank via modem. If your bank offers online banking, you can get up-to-date account information into your computer at any time of day or night. You can also transfer money from one account to another. Unfortunately, you can't bank online unless your institution offers the service.

The best situation is when your bank's online service is compatible with your particular checkbook program. If your bank doesn't support your program, or worse yet, doesn't have online banking at all, there's not much

you can do except struggle along, wait for things to improve (they probably will as standards develop), or change banks.

PAYING BILLS

ONCE YOU'VE GOT A SYSTEM in place, paying your bills is a lot easier. You'll still have to use your own money, but you won't have to write all those checks, address all those envelopes, or lick all those stamps. The fact is that paying bills the traditional way costs you time and money. The alternatives also cost time and money, but if you do it right the return is greater.

Always pay your bills on time. Paying a bill late can result in interest charges, late fees, and even stopped services, but paying big bills early has its own punishment-lost interest. That's why checkbook programs have a bill reminder: Simply set it up to

remind you five days before a major bill is due, and your check should arrive just in time to avoid late fees.

But how should you actually pay your bills?

If you have a lot of bills, pay online. Rather than write a check to, say, pay your mortgage, you can tell an online service to subtract the amount from your checking account and wire the funds to the mortgage company. It's fast, convenient (no more stamp licking), and at a service fee of about \$6 a month, cheaper than using checks if you write more than 15 of them a month. Unlike online banking, you can pay bills online through your checkbook program even if your bank doesn't offer online anything.

Online bill-paying is "the fastest, cheapest way to disperse funds," says Michael Dougherty of Danville, California. He pays his bank \$5 a month to handle both personal expenses and

those of his business Kindermusik, which brings together children and music teachers. Because, as Dougherty says, Kindermusik is a "virtual company," he can get by without a business accounting program. He uses software geared to his type of company to run the business and track income, and Quicken to pay bills. "The receivable functions in Quicken

are limited, but I find it quite good for the payable end," he says. Find other ways. Justin Wells, a research assistant living in San Francisco, finds online bill payment too expensive in his situation. "There are cheaper ways to pay my bills," he notes. For no extra charge, his bank lets him pay his utility bills via a Touch-Tone phone, and his student loan and insurance payments are paid by automatic withdrawal. After that, he has to write and mail only one check per month—to his landlady. "The online bill payment services don't seem to realize that the Post Office is not their only competition," Wells says.

EXPENSE TRACKING AND BUDGETING

NOW THAT YOU'VE LEARNED THE ART of spending money, you have to master the skill of spending less of it-a much harder job. Should everyone analyze their expenses and draw up a budget? No. If you're meeting your savings goal (for most people, 10 percent of your gross income is a good target), don't worry. But if you can't manage to put anything away, or if you're going through a major life change-such as having children, starting a business, or getting a divorce—budgeting is a good idea. If you're entering your check and credit card expenses into a checkbook program, using categories that make sense to you, you're already halfway there. Follow these additional steps to wiser spending.

Note the details. Now would be a good time to add some subcategories to your checkbook program, and also to start tracking where your cash is going once it leaves the ATM. Knowing that you withdrew \$900 last month is not nearly as enlightening as knowing that \$200 of that went to lattés, \$300 to lunches out,

Easy Quicken Worksheets

TO BE EFFECTIVE, a budget must remain relatively simple and flexible. But when you open up Quicken's Budget window (Fea-

tures • Planning • Budgets), you're presented with an intimidating list of categories. Odds are you'll only use some of them in your budget. Here's how to bring the categories you need to the top of the list:

From Quicken's Budget window, click Edit and select Supercategories. Assign categories on the left-hand side of the dialog box to supercategories on the right-hand side. You should assign to a supercategory only those categories you wish to include in your budget.

click View Supercategories in the Budget window to move the categories in the supercategories to the top of the list.

Budgeting a Mortgage in Quicken ONE IMPORTANT MONTHLY BILL, your mortgage, won't show up clearly in Quicken. That's because Quicken treats part of that payment as an interest charge, in a category labeled Int. Exp., and part of it as a transfer from one account (checking) to another (your mortgage liability). Worse yet, the transfer isn't considered an expense, even if you're writing a check for it.

To include account transfers on your budget worksheet, click View-Transfers in the Budget window.

The process is a bit slower and clumsier in Microsoft Money 5.0. Click Go To and select Report and Chart Gallery. In the Spending Habits section, double-click How I'm Doing on My Budget. At the bottom of the resulting chart, click Customize, then More Options. In the next dialog box, retitle your report. Uncheck Show empty categories. For the Dates, select Current Month.

Near the bottom of the dialog box, click Select transactions. Click the Categories tab, click Selected categories, and select the category you want to track. Click OK, then View.

> Click Add to Favorites to make the new report easily accessible.



having trouble living within your means, you may find it very worthwhile to track and detail your cash spending for a few months. Set up an account called "cash" in your checkbook program, and treat each cash withdrawal as a transfer to that account.

Create a budget. Once you're satisfied that you have accurate and meaningful data on your spending habits, you can create a budget that will help you put more money aside. Be honest with yourself about your priorities. Start by cutting the categories where you get the least value for your money, and don't be afraid to spend money where it will help you save in the long run. For example, a good smokingcessation program could save you thousands of dollars on cigarettes and health care over time.

Some people find the checkbook programs' budget-making tools intimidating, and with good reason. These worksheets can often clutter your computer screen with lots of expense categories that you may not want or need for your purposes. You might want to start out by creating your budget on a blank sheet of paper or in a spreadsheet program. Later you can transfer your figures to your checkbook program in order to take advantage of its useful reporting capabilities.

Don't get compulsive. Stop tracking pennies as soon as you're happy with your savings. Expense tracking is a means, not an end in itself. "When I started using

Quicken," recalls Wells, "I would save and plug in every receipt from every cash transaction... I spent so much time keeping up that I kept putting off more important financial tasks."

TAMING TAXES

NO MATTER HOW GOOD A JOB you do trimming your budget, there's one expense you can't avoid: taxes. Fortunately, your PC can help here, too, thanks to your checkbook program, specialized tax software, and the online world. In fact, if you've used a checkbook program diligently throughout the year, you've got a good start on having a record of your expenses, and that's a big help in getting your taxes in order.

The simple solution. If you don't own property, have no business expenses, and aren't itemizing, don't sweat it. With your checkbook program on screen for easy reference, fill out some forms and be done with it.

The thorough solution. But if your financial life is a bit more complicated, do yourself a favor and buy a specialized tax program like TurboTax or Kiplinger's TaxCut. Programs such as these use a straightforward yet sophisticated interviewing process that helps you complete your tax forms correctly, highlights any deductions you might have missed, and warns you of items on your return that might attract an audit. And yes, these tax programs allow you to import financial data from the major checkbook programs (For example, TurboTax is an Intuit program and, not surprisingly, imports data quite easily from Quicken).

Answering Tax Questions in Quicken

QUICKEN 6.0, while far from a full tax program, can help you see how different scenarios (for instance, married and filing jointly or married and filing separately) will affect your bottom line. Select Features Taxes Tax Planner and start playing with the numbers.

Don't Throw Away Last Year's Data

IF YOU'RE USING the same tax program this

year as last, you can hit the ground running by bringing last year's information into this year's version of the software. Check your documentation to see how to do this with your program.

Jump Around the Interview

TIRED OF PLODDING THROUGH your tax program's interview process? You don't have to complete the interview exactly as the software program presents it.

In TurboTax's Interview tab, after you've clicked the Start Interview button, click the Interview Navigator but-



program, you should anticipate a time-consuming interview. "The first year took lots of time to key in all the information. I had to set up my account numbers and bank statements and stuff like that," says Les James, a Washington, D.C.—based engineer for the federal government. "But when the following year came, it asked if I wanted to import that information." Doing state taxes proved easy the first time around: "You just import your federal taxes, and you're done."

Once you've got your tax forms prepared, you can use the software to print out the forms for easy mailing, or you can file electronically. But filing taxes online isn't like paying bills that way. You have to navigate several layers of buttons in your tax software program, pay a hefty charge (\$19.95 with TurboTax), fill out a

form that you wouldn't have to otherwise, and you still

have to lick a stamp. Dealing with the IRS is never easy, is it? The only advantage is that you get your refund check (if you're due one) three to six weeks sooner. Unless you're expecting a big refund, it's not worth it.

Besides getting you through April 15th, tax programs can help you year-round with such tasks as adjusting your withholding and making sure the tax you're paying is on track.

Should you use a tax advisor? Yes, in specific circumstances. Use one if your situation is particularly complicated—for instance, if you're buying or selling a business. If you're sim-

ply not comfortable with the results you received from the program or are not able to interpret them, paying someone to look over your returns can give you some peace of mind.

INVESTING

once you're sticking to a budget and have your taxes under control, what are you going to do with all that extra money? You could produce a low-budget feature film, but there are surer and steadier routes to building wealth. Your computer and modem can help you sift through tons of data and information, place trades, and track your investments. There are three basic steps to smart investing: Gather the information.



WE SAW MAJOR UPGRADES last fall to both leading checkbook programs. How do Quicken 6.0 and Microsoft Money 5.0 stack up? Both are excellent 32-bit programs that are easy to set up and use, with online links and lots of help. Here's a quick rundown. (For more details, see "Money and Quicken Face Off Again," December.)

Ease of use. Both are excellent, Quicken's QuickTabs and Activity Bar make navigation simple. Money's Contents button gives you quick access to other areas of the program.

Checkbook registers. Money has the edge here, with a nicely designed screen displaying the current transaction and the last 21. But Quicken's familiar layout is still easy.

Web links. Money offers one-button access to the Microsoft Money Zone; Quicken takes

you to Excite's Best of the Web page.

Online banking. Both programs give you choices for bill paying and let you easily download your latest transactions.

Planning for the future. Both programs have retirement planners, long-term goal planners, and loan wizards to help you figure out what you're getting into. Quicken's debt reduction planner will guide you through the process of paying off all your debts.



Online treasure. There are plenty of sites on the World Wide Web and online service forums where you can research stocks and funds at little or no expense. For instance, the Securities and Exchange Commission's Web site (http://www.sec.gov) contains free information on every publicly held company and mutual fund in the United States.


Mutual funds or stocks? Once you've gotten up to speed, that's the first question you have to ask yourself. Unless you're willing to take on a new, time-intensive hobby, you're better off buying mutual funds and leaving the difficult decisions to the pros.

Fund finders. For most people, the online sites listed in "Investing by Modem" are adequate for researching funds. But if you're really serious about finding the right mutual funds, consider Morningstar's Principia Plus. This excellent program lets you plug in a description of what you're looking for (low operating expenses and above-average long-term performance, say); then it provides a list of appropriate funds, complete with a wealth of background data. But Principia is an investment in itself, costing a steep \$795 a year, \$495 a quarter, or \$295 a month. What's more, the program lacks an adequate explanation of fund and investing basics: You'll probably want



to read a book on the subject first. Consider A Random Walk Down Wall Street (W. W. Norton & Co., 800/223-4830, 1996), by Burton Malkiel.

Taking stock. If you plan to play with individual stocks, check out the Value Line Investment Survey for Windows, where you'll get on-screen access to over 1700 stocks. With an interface similar to Morningstar's Principia's, the program lets you screen for stocks that meet certain criteria, such as low price/earnings ratios and high dividend growth.

If you have a large portfolio to manage or like to do extensive news searches, you might consider paying for a first-class, highprice online eye. EyeQ (http://www.datatimes.com) searches hundreds of publications to find articles on your desired topics, but the basic cost is \$39 a month (that's \$468 a year), and there are additional charges each time you actually use the service. Dow Jones News Retrieval-Private Investor Edition (800/369-7466) offers more regional newspapers than EyeQ, as well as wire services and its own publications. If you're willing to do all your online research on evenings and weekends, you can get 10 hours of Dow Jones per month for a flat \$30; otherwise, you pay by the page, report article, or quote.

If you're looking for something less expensive, try the Internet News Alert (http://www.newsalert.com), which offers real-time quotes as well as news from wire services for \$3.05 per month. You can run searches using a Boolean search operator, though every article after the first one you retrieve in a day costs \$1.95.

Making the investment. Once you've selected some funds or stocks, of course, you have to buy them.

The cheapest way to buy stocks is through a discount broker. If you buy a few hundred shares of a stock, expect to pay a transaction fee of between \$30 and \$100. (If you buy no-load mutual funds directly from the sponsoring company, you can avoid transaction fees altogether.)

You can reduce your transaction fees by placing your trades electronically. If you're already using a major discount broker, such as Schwab (http://www .schwab.com), Fidelity (http://www.fid-inv.com), or Jack White & Company (http://www.pawws.com/jwc), check out its site on the World Wide Web; you'll save 10 percent off your fees by trading online. All of these brokers also offer online access to your account information.

Electronic brokers such as eTrade (http://www.etrade.com) cut commissions even further, typically to half or less of what larger discounters like Fidelity or Schwab charge. These prices are tempting and certainly worth considering, but they sometimes come at a price in terms of customer service. "I got no response for 26 days after sending eTrade a check to open my account," complains Joshua Fairbanks, a full-time investor from Seattle. Fairbanks finally had to call eTrade himself to get a confirmation number. Every time he called, "I got stuck on hold from 10 to 35 minutes." Fairbanks canceled his account with eTrade after about a month. According to eTrade staffers, the company received Fairbanks' application on July 1, 1996, opened his account July 5, and processed his first trade July 18; they could not explain the 26day delay. They admit to having had problems answering calls promptly last summer, but claim an

Compare Mortgages

REFINANCING YOUR HOME? You should probably compare different loan options.

In Quicken, select Features Planning Financial Planners • Refinance. This gives you a dialog box for determining whether refinancing makes sense and calculating how long it will take you to recoup the costs of refinancing.

Money includes a useful feature that lets you compare mortgages. From the Go To button, select Planning Wizards and click Mort-

gage Planner. A series of dialog boxes will ask you detailed questions about each mortgage; then you can compare the overall costs and get advice on how to interpret the comparisons.

SEC: Find the Right Company or Fund

THE SECURITIES and Exchange Commission's Web site is full of useful information-once you know how to use it.

To research a company or mutual Database' page (http://www.sec.gov/ edaux/searches.htm) and click CIK (Central Index Key) and Ticker Symbol Lookup. Type as much of the company's name as possible, and avoid using abbreviations or acronyms. For example, enter International Business Machines, not IBM.

The result will be an ungainly number. Highlight it and press <Ctrl>-C to copy it to the Clipboard. Backtrack to the 'Search the EDGAR Database' page and select Search the EDGAR Archives. In the resulting page's 'search keywords' field, press <Ctrl>-V to paste in the CIK of the company or fund you're researching, and then press <Enter>. You'll get a listing of every document that the chosen company has filed electronically with the SEC.

With the document list in front of you, scan the 'Form Type' column to find 10-Q and 10-K documents. These contain the company's quarterly and annual financial filings-an investor's primary research tools.

Track Your Investment Returns QUICKEN AND MONEY can calculate your investment returns two different ways, and it's important to know which is which. A portfolio value report calculates the cost basis of your investments, while an investment performance report shows the more accurate internal rate of return. To find these two reports in Quicken, select Reports. Investment. In Money, click Go To, select Report and Chart Gallery, and click the Investments button.

average response time of 2 minutes as of October.

Track your investments. Once you've made your investments, you can use your computer to keep track of how they're doing. Actually, if you've invested only in funds, you can skip using your computer for this and simply read the funds' annual reports, which give you your total return.

If you've bought stocks or want your computer to help you calculate your portfolio's overall returns, you should set up accounts in your checkbook program and enter the data from your quarterly statements. You might be wondering, Do I have to type in all that data? Unfortunately, you'll probably have to. Both Quicken and Money can go online and download the information for you, but the data they grab is incomplete, lacking dividends that add value to your investments.

Be careful not to misinterpret the return reports. The numbers are often confusing. Don't mistake the cost basis of your investments for the internal rate of return. Cost basis, which is useful primarily for taxes, takes the amount of your original investment and continues to add to that your reinvested dividends and capital gains, resulting in a lower-than-actual return. The true picture of how your investments are faring is the internal rate of return, which takes into account the dividends, interest, and other payments you receive as well as increases and decreases in the value of the investment.

RETIREMENT PLANNING

YOU DON'T WANT TO WORK your whole life, do you? With the decline of corporate pension plans and the uncertainty of a burdened Social Security system, the only way you can be sure of retiring in comfort is to start preparing for it now.

> Do a quick calculation. Try out the retirement planning calculator built into checkbook programs just to see where you stand. They're simplistic, but they can give you a general idea of how much you'll need to save to live comfortably during your golden years.

Get retirement planning software. To seriously plan for your retirement, however, you need something that lets you play with assumptions like your tax rate, or specify

how much of your savings is inside versus outside retirement accounts. For that, you'll want something like the Vanguard Retirement Planner 3.0 or Quicken Financial Planner 2.0. These programs allow you to test multiple scenarios ("Okay, is Bora Bora an option if I save 12 percent a year?"), offer advice, and hold your hand along the way.

When you first try one of these programs, you may be told that you need to save far more

DOW JONES BUSINESS CENTER (America Online: keyword dow jones) Here's a wealth of daily news on the financial markets and business world, including articles from Dow Jones publications: Barron's, The Wall Street Journal (U.S. and foreign editions), and National Business Employment Weekly.

BUSINESS DATABASE PLUS (CompuServe: go busdb) Before you invest in hog futures, find out about their past. Business Database Plus provides access to hundreds of businesses plus industry and special-interest publications.

SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION (http://www.sec.gov) The best collection of investment information on the Web. All publicly held companies and mutual funds must file annual and quarterly reports and other documents with the SEC, so it has just about everything-assuming you can find it.

U.S. TREASURY (http://www.ny.frb.org) If you own any old Treasury bonds with variable interest rates, you can use this site to deter-

mine what they're worth today and what current interest rate you're earning.



You can improve your longterm picture by investing more aggressively, tapping your home's equity, and scaling back your old-age spending needs. Maybe you'll even inherit something by then.

Manage your retirement. When Frank Heinisch of San Ramon, California, retired from AT&T at age 48, he was already using the Vanguard Retirement Planner, but he found it wasn't enough. So he bought the Vanguard Retirement Manager, which helped him figure a budget, manage his nest egg, and minimize estate taxes. It "confirmed what I thought I had planned out for the future," he says. "This works out much better."

THE BOTTOM LINE

REMEMBER THAT SOFTWARE and online services are nothing more than tools. If a program helps you get organized, great. If it finally motivates you to do something you have been putting off for a long time, so much the better. But if it causes you to fritter away more time on a financial task than you ever did before, use it selectively or forget it.

No program or service understands the whole of your financial needs. You have to keep the big picture in mind the whole time and make the important decisions yourself.

Tips for Retirement Planning

Reduce Inflation

BOTH QUICKEN Financial Planner and Vanguard Retirement Planner, by default, calculate your retirement needs based on an average annual inflation rate of 4 percent. Vanguard also provides data showing that over the past 30 years inflation has averaged 5.4 percent. However, 30 years is a small slice of U.S. economic history and includes the double-digit inflation years of the late 1970s and early 1980s. Consider using a 3 percent inflation rate; that's been the average annual inflation this century, and it's still higher than the 1.3 percent average of the past two centuries.

Projecting Investment Returns

OVERESTIMATE YOUR INVESTING prowess and you could fall far short of the amount of money you'll need to save. Underestimate your expected returns and your goal will seem discouragingly hopeless. As a rule, the more money you put into stocks (as opposed

to mutual funds), the greater your return will be (assuming you follow the stock market and invest wisely).

Here are some guidelines for estimating your investment returns:

Portion Invested	Average Annual Return
80 to 100 percent	10 to 12 percent
60 to 80 percent	9 percent
40 to 60 percent	8 percent
20 to 40 percent	7 percent

Figuring Your Tax Rate

YOU'LL NEED TO CALCULATE your overall tax rate to input into your retirement planning program. Get out your most recent federal and state income tax returns. Look up the total tax you paid, then divide that frighteningly large number by your total taxable income. The resulting percentage is your average tax rate, which is the number to plug into the program.

If you're expecting your income to change


radically in the near future-for instance, if you're about to retire or are expecting a promotion-you could crank different income numbers through your tax returns to come up with a better estimate.

Know the Risks

ONCE YOU COME UP WITH an investment mix. be sure you understand the risks.

With the Vanguard Retirement Planner, check out the Portfolio Planner Risk area. Here, you can see the probable downside of a portfolio similar to yours. Using historical data, the program shows you the worst years such a portfolio has had over time.

Knowing how bad things can get will hopefully increase your chances of staying the course if the markets tank.





IT WAS OSCAR WILDE who sniffed, "All art is quite useless." But he never saw what you can do with some of today's graphics packages. You can mimic Monet; take up chalk, pencil, paint, or crayons; do crazy things with photographs; and build flowcharts painlessly. If you're an artist, graphics software can help you work faster and more creatively. If you're not, a graphics package can make you look like one.

Graphics programs range from simple \$50 packages for creating greeting cards to expensive, complex programs for professional illustrators, like Adobe's \$895

Photoshop. For this review, we picked 12 low-cost Windows 95 graphics programs for nonartists who need to produce professional results quickly for business reports, home projects, or Web pages. Most are under \$150 and are very easy to use, thanks to point-and-click interfaces, wizards, and ready-to-use content. Based on the packages' tools and approaches, we divided our reviews into three categories: creative tools, business software, and graphics utilities.

If you've been itching to try your hand at electronic art, the creative tools we recommend here should put you in seventh heaven. These products handhold you through image editing, painting, sketching, and 3-D modeling projects. It was tough to pick a favorite, so we chose two: Kai's Power Goo and Ulead's Photo-Impact, two very different image editors. With its colorful interface and ability to stretch photos, Power Goo at first looks like kids' software. But it's more: It lets you create beautiful surrealistic images. PhotoImpact is a great omnibus application that does not only image editing but also Web art and image management.

Our Favorites

EVERY ELECTRONIC ARTIST wanna-be should have Ulead's PhotoImpact, a \$99 traditional image editor that also does Web art. HiJaak 95, \$50, is the utilities package you don't want to be without if you have to manage more than a few image files. Visio, \$149, is great for knocking together quick diagrams. For pure fun, get Kai's Power Goo, a \$50 image editor that stretches the boundaries of what you can do with photographs.

Need to knock off some quick-and-dirty graphics for the office? Despite its many imitators, no business graphics package outdoes Visio at meat-and-potatoes art like flowcharts and simple floor plans.

If you keep any image files at all on your hard disk, you should consider buying a graphics utilities package to catalog and view them. HiJaak 95, a junior, \$50 version of Quarterdeck's \$279 HiJaak Pro, is the best all-around image manager.

Vendors of three packages reviewed-Dabbler 2.0, Poser 1.0, and SmartSketch 95-recommend using a stylus and pressure-sensitive graphics tablet. We got by fine with a mouse, but a stylus and graphics tablet may be worth buying (most cost between \$150 and \$300) if you'd rather draw with an input device shaped like a pen rather than a bar of soap.

If the products reviewed here are still too expensive for you, you might want to try a shareware graphics program. You can see minireviews and download 12 of our favorites from PC World Online (http://www.pcworld.com).

Creative Tools

Photo retouching, drawing, and 3-D software make art fun.

DABBLER 2.0

IS ARTIST'S BLOCK stifling your inner van Gogh? Put down the cutlery and pick up Fractal Design's Dabbler 2.0, the second most amazing "natural media" graphics package after Fractal's \$379 Painter. A pared-down, simpler version of Painter, Dabbler gives you the tools you need to paint in the style of the great masters. It includes electronic chalks, pencils, crayons, markers, and stencils, more than 120 different paper textures, and filters for adding special effects.

Here's the amazing part: The tools respond like traditional art materials. Felt markers bleed, spray paint spatters, and crayon color builds up. Fractal got the sound effects delightfully right, too. The

markers squeak, pens scratch, and the charcoal rasps while you draw.

After you're done, you can use the filters for effects that turn your run-of-

the-mill picture into a ringer for great art. The Texturize command, for instance, mimics the classic Impressionist style.

Dabbler comes with 100 stock photos and great tutorials, including digital movies that teach drawing. -Richard Jantz

ANY HALF-DECENT image editing program will let you commit zany acts of art against ordinary photographs, but Kai's Power Goo is in a mischievous league of its own. This offbeat image editing program specializes in real-time photo distortion and blending effects. Just click a button (Bulge, Smear, Smooth, Squeeze, and so on) and drag the mouse over the part of a picture you want to change. Goo's superfast rendering engine (MetaTools calls it "liquid image technology") allows you to see the distortion as you move your

I found many of its photo touch-up and transformation projects useful for adult beginners-Remove Red Eye, for instance, turns a process that can be con-

fusing in Photoshop into one simple, can't-miss step. Other projects, like Disguise Your Facewhich adds glasses and moustache to a photowill appeal mostly to kids. Fortunately, you can skip the hand-holding and jump right to the manipulation tools and effects you want.





After that, however, you're all alone with Smart-Sketch's pencils and brushes.

Graphics Suites Have It All

GRAPHICS SUITES are to designers what office suites are to businesspeople. In one bundle you can buy a larger variety of graphics tools than you'll get from a single, stand-alone package. The three best graphics suites-Corel Graphics Pack, CorelDraw 7, and Micrografx's ABC Graphics Suite 95-have draw and paint programs, graphics utilities, and a generous amount of clip art. But if you decide to go with any of these suites, you'll need a Ponderosa-size hard drive. Basic installations alone require 80MB, 85MB, and 180MB, respectively.

Budget Suites. If money is tight, consider the \$100 Corel Graphics Pack, a bargain-basement suite with a wizardlike main menu. The package's Corel Photo Paint 6 image editing application is about as good as any of the standalone versions we review here. CorelFlow 3 is for business diagrams, and Corel Presents 6 is for presentations.

Micrografx's ABC Graphics Suite, \$150, includes a higherend draw program than Corel Graphics Pack, and the interface design it shares with Microsoft Office 95 makes it a wise choice for users of that suite. Designer 6 is an easy-touse draw program that boasts good technical drawing tools but not the advanced color handling and editing tools found in CorelDraw, ABC also has Picture Publisher 6, an image editing program on a par

draw program-which is also called CorelDraw-the suite includes Corel Photo Paint 7, Corel Multimedia Manager, Corel Dream 3-D, and Corel Motion 3-D, plus a gargantuan library of clip art images, media clips, and fonts. It's the best pick for anyone who needs professional tools, such as color separations.





You Say Bit Map, I Say Vector

YOU MAY HEAR some graphics programs described as vector based and others referred to as bit mapped, or raster. Which is better? It depends. If you're retouching photos or other scanned images and want to create an artistic, "painted" look, get a bit-mapped paint or image editing program like Dabbler or PhotoDeluxe. These types of packages let you edit the thousands of bits, or dots, in a scanned image and apply special effects that can turn an ordinary photograph into a work of art. The tools are fun, but file size is a drawback: A bit-map image is much larger than the same image produced in vectors. Vectorbased images, on the other

hand, are composed of distinct objects-curves, lines, circles, squares, rectangles, and such. You can easily pick, move, and resize these parts, unlike the dots in a bit-map image. Design and illustration packages produce vector graphics. These packages are better than bit-mapped graphics programs for creating smooth graphics printed at a high resolution-logos, charts, diagrams, and other common office graphics-and therefore are often preferred by business users.

SmartSketch is an anomaly: It disguises its vector tools as bit-map ones to give you the best of both worldsfun tools that produce easyto-manipulate art.

EasyPhoto **SmartPage**

IT'S EASY TO FORGET that the information on all that paper floating around your desk isn't also inside your PC-that signed contract you need to fax off right now, for example; or the photo that you need to add to tomorrow's sales presentation. Why can't you just stick a document into your PC and scan it?

Someday, most PCs will undoubtedly come with built-in scanners. One or two already do. Hewlett-Packard, for example, has a PC with a scanner for digitizing snapshots. In addition, both Compaq and HP sell keyboards with a built-in scanner. But until scanners are as common as floppy drives, your best bet for turning paper into pixels is to buy an inexpensive color scanner that sits next to your PC. Since last year, prices have dropped to as low as \$250. If you can buy a PC, you can probably afford a 300-dotper-inch color scanner to go with it.

HEWLETT-PACKARD ScanJet 4P

THE BEST BUYS Need good color scans but don't have much free desk space? Consider Storm Technology's lunch box-size Easy-Photo SmartPage (left). For heavier-duty text and graphics jobs, HP's ScanJet 4P (right) delivers the best results.

They are also getting easier to use: The software bundled with newer models is more sophisticated, with features that automatically adjust scan settings, and handy tools for quickly copying documents, annotating and sending faxes, and converting hard copy into something your word processor can understand.

We tested four sheetfed scanners from Logitech, Storm Technology, Umax, and Visioneer, and four flatbed models from Hewlett-Packard, Microtek, Plustek, and Umax. All cost under \$500, and all but one, the sheetfed Visioneer PaperPort

Vx, scan in color. The good news is that most of these scanners produce perfectly good images for presentations, Web pages,

and newsletters. The bad news?

Optical character recognition accuracy is still imperfect. Three of the sheetfed scanners and two flatbed models failed our two-column OCR test.

Of the eight devices, the flatbed scanner Best Buy, the HP ScanJet 4P, is tops in both image quality and OCR accuracy. The Storm Technology EasyPhoto SmartPage is our sheetfed scanner Best Buy. Its rugged design and sharp color scans are great for the home office.

Two scanners didn't make the review: Agfa's StudioScan IIsi flatbed arrived with the wrong drivers, and the correct ones came too late; Panasonic's new KS-300 sheetfed unit missed our deadline.

Choices: Flatbed Versus Sheetfed

WHEN YOU'RE THINKING about getting a scanner, the most difficult choice probably isn't whether to buy, but which type to buy. Compared to flatbeds,

sheetfed units are cheaper, take

up less desk space, and are easier to install. Except for the Logitech Page-Scan, the big drawback with most sheetfed scanners is

that they scan only loose pages.

Sheetfed models take up far less space. The Visioneer PaperPort Vx, for example, is 12 inches wide and only 2.5 inches deep-compact enough to put behind your keyboard. They get that

Best Buys

WE HAD A difficult time deciding which scanners deserved

Best Buys, Among flatbed models, the Hewlett-Packard ScanJet 4P won out despite a tricky setup. The 4P did the best job of delivering consistently high-quality scans and accurate OCR.

It was an equally tough choice for a sheetfed scanner. But in the end, usable color scans, a durable multipage feeder, novice-friendly software, and a rugged design earned the Storm Technology Easy-Photo SmartPage a Best Buy.

small by turning the scanner design inside out: Instead of the scan head moving over the paper, tiny rubber wheels pull the paper over the scan head. You simply slip a page into a slot, and it gets sucked through. However, the wheels don't always track perfectly, so pages may get skewed, creating a crooked scan. Sheetfed units focus more on managing paper flow than on getting an optimal scan. For example, to use your printer as a copier, simply feed a page into a sheetfed scanner, push a button, and pull the copy out of the printer.

If you do a lot of graphics or OCR

The Storm Technology EasyPhoto SmartPage scanned our samples too dark, but an image editor can fix this. Of all the sheetfed units, its scans were the brightest.



Umax's PageOffice Color scans were poor. The upper image is streaked with chunky pixels across the nose and cheek, and the dark scan below was beyond image editing help.

work, a flatbed is a better bet. With flatbed scanners, the original page stays put, so pictures scan more sharply than on sheetfed units. The larger scanning surface of a flatbed is also ideal for odd-size images. And most flatbeds offer optional document feeders that can automatically scan a sizable stack of paperwork.

By No Means Perfect

AFTER WEEKS OF TESTING, it became clear that no scanner is perfect. For example, only three of the eight models could pass our two-column newspaper clipping OCR test: Visioneer's

PaperPort Vx, the only sheetfed device to do so; HP's Scan-Jet 4P; and the Umax Vista-S6E. The other devices made so many er-

rors, we stopped counting. The lite OCR software that comes with these devices is not as accurate as full versions sold separately. Fortunately, if most of your paperwork has just one column, any of these scanners can read it.

At default settings, none of these devices scanned perfectly. Scans were darker than our originals, and colors weren't accurate. Overall, the flatbed models scanned better than the sheetfed units. The HP ScanJet 4P consistently gave us some of the better scans in all of our tests, despite a faint greenish tint. Of the sheetfed scanners, the Visioneer PaperPort Vx was tops at OCR, but it scanned photos only in gray scale. For color sheetfed scanning, opt for Storm Technology's EasyPhoto SmartPage.

Overall, flatbed scanners still scan color graphics about twice as fast as the sheetfed units-about 40 seconds versus about 60 to 90 seconds for sheetfed scanners. Scan resolution and color have the greatest effects on scan speed: You get much faster scans if you scan at lower resolutions using gray scale rather than color. More RAM doesn't help much; 16MB is plenty. In most cases, 32MB upped speeds by only 2 percent.

Storage should be a greater concern: You'll need as much disk space as you can afford. A 300-dpi 5-by-7-inch color photo averages 8.5MB, so even a 1GB hard drive can fill up fast. If you plan to scan a lot of images, invest in a

removable storage device such as an Iomega Zip drive. Try inserting a piece of black paper

Warranties? Just one year for all the units reviewed here. Considering how much these scanners are targeted at the home office, it's surprising that only two vendors-HP and Logitech-offer technical support



LOGITECH's \$399 PageScan Color is the only sheetfed unit that can scan from books. Simply detach the newspaper-size scanner from its base and place it on an open page. Rollers move the scan head briskly across the page and stop when they sense the edge of the book.

We installed the PageScan in 6 minutes-it plugs into your parallel port. The adapter is as small as a deck of cards, and on the back is a pass-through plug for your printer. However, it won't let your printer tell your PC about a paper problem unless you first adjust a few CMOS settings.

Color scans are limited to 200 dpi. That's fine for Web pages, on-screen presentations, and informal printouts. Unfortunately, every scan we got was a tad dark. We tried brightening scans beforehand using the TWAIN drivers, but without success.

The PageScan OCR module read our simple test page easily, but it couldn't decipher our two-column news clipping. The software interface kicks on when a page is fed into the scanner. You can organize scans into "drawers" and







FOR QUICK COLOR scanning, this unit delivered the best scans of any sheetfed device reviewed here. Graphics are sharp and colors are close to the original. Its high-quality scans and intuitive software interface earn this 300-dpi scanner a Best Buy. Literally the size of a bread box, the \$299 EasyPhoto SmartPage is designed to sit on a side table, not behind your keyboard like the Logitech or Visioneer. The built-in paper guide on top holds ten sheets, but we stuffed in four more pages without a snag.

Setup was easy, even though this is the only sheetfed model here that makes you install a card. During setup, an AVI video clip walks you through the process. We removed the PC cover, popped in the card, put the case back on, and installed the software, all within 12 minutes. And

unlike other scanners, this one draws power directly from your PC's power supply through the card-no need to plug an AC adapter into your power strip. Prior to each scan, the TWAIN software shows a preview, but

you have to reinsert the photo in the top of the scanner to make the final scan. Not too elegant.

Each scan appears as a thumbnail in-

side EasyPhoto's filmstrip interface. For example, to remove scratches or red eye, simply drag a scan from the filmstrip into the EasyPhoto image editor and have at it. By default, images are saved as JPEG files, but you can also save them in BMP format.

The scanner comes with Xerox Text-Bridge OCR Lite. Our simple press release resulted in only four word errors, but the two-column OCR test page proved too difficult. Unfortunately, dark scans were a persistent problem.

The PageOffice did okay on simple OCR tests, but it spit out gibberish with our two-column newspaper clipping.

The scanner's design is a mixed bag. The PageOffice's paper feeder holds 15 pages-more than any other sheetfed scanner here. The paper guides adjust to almost any page size, but these are small tabs that can easily get lost. We also didn't like how paper is dumped back onto your desk, bumping into coffee cups and other work debris.

Umax bundles decent software with its scanner. Adobe Photo-Deluxe 1.0 makes fixing images fun, while Presto PageManager integrates daily tasks such as email, faxing, and editing. FOR FREQUENT OCR chores, the \$299 Visioneer PaperPort Vx is tops. Place a page in the lip of this scanner and it gobbles it up. You can scan paperwork up to 30 inches long. The PaperPort is about the size of a rolled-up newspaper and fits behind your keyboard. If you're really cramped for space, check out keyboard scanners from Compaq, Hewlett-Packard, and Visioneer, which build the PaperPort Vx into a keyboard—right behind the function keys.

Installing the PaperPort Vx took 6 minutes. By default, it plugs into your

computer's serial port. If all your ports are filled, Visioneer will send you a parallel port adapter for \$8. One consideration is that the AC adapter hogs two sockets. If you're short on power strip space, that's a problem. To streamline paper flow, you can redirect the paper path by moving a somewhat flimsy plastic flap on the top of the scanner. You can make the paper feed in front and exit either out the back or up top.

The PaperPort's interface comes to life when a

page is in-

serted into the scanner—HP bundles this Visioneer interface with its ScanJet scanner. A row of icons at the bottom of the screen connects the scanner to your modem, printer, word processor, spreadsheet, or up to 130 popular programs including Excel, cc:Mail, and Photoshop. To edit a scanned article, for instance, simply drag the file onto the Word icon, and go for it. You can also stack scans together, store them in folders, jot down notes, highlight items, and find scans by keywords.

The PaperPort's forte is OCR. It was the only sheetfed unit to pass all our OCR tests

We cleared the hard drive on our test PCs each time we installed a scanner. We fed each scanner two test pages: a simple, 286-word single-column press release without graphics, and a complex, 566-word two-column newspaper clipping. We measured the time it took the OCR software to recognize the document after scanning. We scanned each document three times on each test PC, then averaged the word errors to get final results. Over 50 word errors was judged unacceptable.

CON: Faint green tint on scans, must download 4C drivers to perform 300-dpi scans, expensive THE \$499 HEWLETT-PACKARD ScanJet 4P is your best bet for any OCR or imaging task. Scan quality is superb, aside from an ever-so-faint green tint that took just seconds to remove. It was also the most accurate scanner in this review for OCR. HP borrows Visioneer's software interface so you can link your business applications, create copies with your printer, and enhance images using the bundled Corel PhotoPaint 5 Select.

This scanner isn't perfect. Installing the 300-dpi flatbed was easy, but we discovered that the 4P's software drivers limit all but line-art scans to 200 dpi. To scan in color or gray scale at 300 dpi, HP says you must first download drivers for the ScanJet 4C for free from HP's Web site.

Equipped with the 4C drivers, the HP 4P's scans were so sharp that we could see tiny rivets on a billboard in our Times Square test photo. And for really heavy OCR workloads, HP has a document feeder for a hefty \$559-more than the cost of the scanner itself. We were able to put 50 pages into the feeder, go around the corner and grab a coffee, and return half an hour later to a pile of scanned paperwork.

All told, although this flatbed scanner is expensive, and you'll need to download better drivers, it should be your first choice if accurate image quality and OCR are top priorities. This color scanner produced imagery that came close to the quality of the original. By comparison, the Best Buy HP ScanJet 4P was a close second to Microtek in areas of color accuracy and contrast and brightness.

Unfortunately, business users hoping to digitize important paperwork using OCR will be disappointed. For multicolumn projects, you're better off typing in the text yourself. Also, the ScanMaker E3's scan surface is only 13.5 inches long, so it clipped half an inch off our long newspaper column. Not good.

Installation wasn't a piece of cake either. The video inside the box makes setup look easy, but after 45 minutes we gave up and called Microtek's tech support line. The technician asked a few questions, had us flip three switches on the SCSI card, and we were in business.

Microtek's TWAIN drivers prescan each image so you can make adjustments before scanning. If the picture isn't perfect, never fear: The ScanMaker E3 comes with a good image editor, Ulead PhotoImpact SE. 

ly salvage images using the bundled Adobe PhotoDeluxe 1.0 image editor, but scan quality was still third-rate for a flatbed.

We had to tweak TWAIN scanner settings for half an hour before we could get a decent image that could be used for on-screen projects such as a Web page or presentation. One thing we did like about both of the Umax scanners was the software bundle-particularly Adobe's PhotoDeluxe, which walks you through everything from scanning in images to touching up photos and adding effects. For business chores, the Presto PageManager suite let us drag and drop stacks of scans into any application that we linked to the scanner. The interface is easy to use: For example, to fax a page, just drop a file on the fax machine icon. Type the number, and the fax is sent through your modem. Presto's OCR module also recognized our difficult two-column newspaper clipping. It took less than 3 minutes to correct the typos.





PCs ARE GETTING BETTER at playing both the home appliance and the office tool. Several companies are making PCs more attractive with designer colors and more comely shapes, offering better multimedia monitors, and even integrating classic domestic devices such as the radio and the TV.

At the same time, we're finding these home PCs to be as powerful as most of the traditional office PCs we've tested. The biggest

difference is that you may have to pay up to a \$500 premium for them.

This month we looked at four of the latest PCs designed to appeal especially to home users: Hewlett-Packard's Pavilion 7285, Packard-Bell's Platinum 65, Sony's PCV-90, and Toshiba's Infinia 7200. All are Pentium-200 systems, and all performed near or on par with a typical office PC of the same CPU.

Including a TV on a PC can be helpful for catching the news or other late-breaking information while you're working. But there are trade offs to the PC/TV arrangement. On the Toshiba Infinia, you take a noticeable performance hit to watch TV; informal tests showed that this Pentium-200 acted more like a P-75 when large spreadsheets were opened while the small (8-inch) TV screen was active. Also, the \$3548 Infinia is expensive for a P-200; you can save several hundred dollars by buying a more price-competitive P-200 and a separate TV set. All that said, the Infinia is the best multifunction PC we've seen so far. In addition to TV, it has AM/FM radio, a CD player, and a telephone answering machine, all controlled from a frontpanel command center and a remote unit. Packard-Bell's Platinum also came with a TV tuner. All these home computers came with 28.8- or 33.6-kilobits-per-second modems.

multimedia monitor can be a home or a private

office, considering the growing use of video and audio on the Internet. The PCV-90 and Infinia multimedia monitors are some of the best we've encountered. With a pair of tweeters and midrange speakers mounted on the sides and subwoofers embedded into their bases, these monitors provide surprisingly full-bodied sound. They still remind us more of boom boxes than Bang and Olufson speakers,

HP's \$3560 Pavilion 7285, number nine on our Power Desktops chart, was the only home PC of the four to make the Top 20 chart. Its home-oriented features include a voice modem so you can set up the PC to take phone messages, and an alternate desktop interface called "Personal Page" that lets you separate the pro-

YOUR GUIDE TO THE **TOP 1**

QUESTIONS ABOUT OUR CHARTS? The following section should answer most of them. If not, ask us; see page 12 for contact information.

How do the charts work? The Top 20 and Top 10 charts are evolving lists of the best PCs, monitors, modems, printers, and graphics boards we've tested. Every month we test the latest products in each category and compare them to the pool of items we've already reviewed. As new products earn places on the charts, those at the bottom drop off. Price cuts also cause chart changes.

Where do you get your prices? We estimate street prices based on vendor information and our own research, including surveys of retail outlets. We recheck all prices every month.

What does the overall rating mean? It's the sum of all our testsboth hands-on evaluations and automated speed tests. The scale is 1 to 100, so a product that scores in the 90s is generally considered exceptional, one in the 80s is among the best, one in the 70s is above average, and one that scores lower usually doesn't place.

What does the PC WorldBench score mean? It's a measure of how fast a PC is in relation to our baseline machine, a Dell P75t configured with 8MB of RAM, a 540MB hard drive, and no secondary cache. A PC that scores 200, for instance, is twice as fast as the baseline unit.

Where do the reliability and service and support scores for PCs come from? The reliability score and the "service" portion of the service and support score come from readers who respond to the Reliability and Service fax-back survey in each issue of PC World. The "support" portion of the service and support score is based on the vendor's support policies (such as length of warranty and support hours).

What do all those word scores mean? Word scores for performance and price are based on a product's rating in relation to other products in its category. For example, a budget PC that is rated "expensive" is high-priced only in relation to other budget PCs. Likewise, a power notebook rated "good" for performance is good only in relation to other power notebooks. Word scores for other categories, such as features, are relative to all desktops or all notebooks.

Where can I find the online version of the Top 100? Go to PC World Online (http://www.pcworld.com). There you'll find not only the current issue of PC World and reviews for the last 18 months, but some extra features you'll want to check out. For one thing, PC World Online includes reviews you won't find in print. If a product misses a chart and we don't cover it here, you can go directly to an online review by using the URL provided in each Top 100 section.

Have you ever wished you could build your own chart based on your buying criteria? Now you can, with Personal Shopper at our Web site. Personal Shopper combines your criteria with PC World's current data and test results to generate customized Top 20s and Top 10s. For instance, if you want your chart to rank notebooks that have 120-MHz processors and 28.8-kbps modems, Personal Shopper will find and rank all the machines that fit your specifications.

grams that you and your kids use, and to restrict access to your programs. Yet the Pavilion fits the corporate bill with a generous feature set, including an extra-large 3.2GB hard disk and round-the-clock tech support hours, and its PC WorldBench score of 207 puts it ahead of most P-200 desktops for home or office. The Pavilion is pricey, but according to our survey, HP systems are rock-solid reliable.

WHAT'S NEW ON THE CHARTS

TWO NEW DELL AND MICRON systems jockeyed for the top Power Desktops spot, with Micron's Millennia P166 edging out the Dimension XPS Prozoon. The Micron P166 system is the Dell Pro-200n's equal in all but performance, where it trails Dell's machine by over 20 PC WorldBench points. But the P166 is also more than \$1000 cheaper than the Pro200n. Quantex's new QP5/200 M-4 Pentium Pro-200 minitower (number 11 on the Power Desktops chart) is faster than any PC we've tested except the Pentium Pro-200 PCs from Gateway 2000 and Sys Technology.

On the Budget Desktops chart, Micron hit the top Best Buy spot with a new Millennia P133. We reviewed this model last March, but Micron has upgraded the BIOS since then, so we retested the latest unit. This is an \$1899 PC that performs like a P-166 and has a terrific graphics subsystem. Another P-133 unit that made our Best Buy ranks is Compaq's Presario 4402. It has no free bays and only two free expansion slots, and Compaq charges for tech support after a year, but if you can live with this, you might want to consider this highly reliable, reasonably priced system.

The only new Top 20 notebook this month is Gateway 2000's Solo 2100 P-133, hitting third on the Power chart. The \$4599 price is a bit steep, but it's the fastest notebook we've tested. This Solo's PC WorldBench score of 186 puts it in the league of Pentium-133 desktops. That, plus a great feature set, puts the Solo on the chart, even with reader qualms about service and support. Meanwhile, Win-

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS



THERE'S NO REST for the weary PC shopper. You've just gotten used to Windows 95 and sorted out the many flavors of Pentium chips. Now Microsoft and Intel want to make this the year of the Pentium Pro PC and possibly even Windows NT. Meanwhile, the Internet is reaching out and touching everybody, and demanding more bandwidth while it's at it.

So plan for the future, or at least for this year. Keep your chin up, and make these three resolutions:

Buy more memory now. If you don't already have at least 16MB of RAM, hie thee to the nearest memory store-prices are going up. Windows 3.x ran pretty well with 8MB of RAM, but using a Windows 95 PC with less than 16MB can be like trying to spur along an old nag. And if you're even thinking of moving to Windows NT 4.0, make that 32MB.

Get the largest hard disk you can afford. Industry pundits have a rule of thumb: You need twice the hard disk space you needed last year. This year we see every indication that hard drives 2GB or larger will be the minimum. The Internet is rife with diskravenous multimedia content that needs huge amounts of space, and software developers continue their never-ending quest to add more features. With space costing around 12 cents per megabyte and dropping, getting the largest hard disk you can is worthwhile.

Upgrade your modem to 28.8 or 33.6 kilobits per second. It's no longer a question whether you should get on the Internet, but when. Do yourself a favor and get the fastest modem available-even these can cost under \$100. Even at 28.8 or 33.6, the Net can be sluggish, but at anything less, you're playing with your sanity.

Book just discontinued its XP5 line of notebooks, causing a Power and a Budget contender to drop from the charts.

WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH PERIPHERALS

WE REVISIT 17-INCH monitors for the first time since September; the Iiyama Vision Master Pro 17 is our top choice. It offers the best graphics images we've seen yet, and it does a great job on text, too. Check out our Top 10 Monitors chart.

High-end graphics cards are getting more affordable. The 3D Xpression+ PC2TV, ATI's revamp of one of its most popular cards, hits the number one Top 10 Graphics Boards slot this month, and it's the first 4MB-equipped unit we've seen for under \$200. This amount of RAM also offers "true-color" (16.8 million colors) images at 1024 by 768 resolution. You get images with a richness of detail and hue that will take your breath away.

From the looks of the Top 10 Modems chart, 33.6 kbps is fast becoming the norm. ISDN it ain't, but when it comes to Web browsing, you should take every kilobit per second you can get. If you're shopping for a workgroup printer, check out the latest lineup in the Top 10 Printers roundup. Tektronix's new \$3495 Phaser 350 bridges the price-quality-speed chasm between ink jets and lasers with a unit that uses solid ink technology. It's a bit lame when it comes to text-small-point text is fuzzy-but it produces gorgeous images comparable to many color lasers, and it can crank them out faster than nearly all the color printers we've tested.

MICRON MILLENNIA P166

Whenever we have a system that consistently places high on the charts, we completely rereview it

several times during the course of its life.

The latest Millennia P166 replaces the unit we reviewed last April. This nicely decked-out minitower is now our most highly recommended power desktop.

\$2708 is a very reasonable price for a fast, full-featured PC. In fact, many of the more budget-minded shoppers will be able to afford it. This latest Millennia P166 scored well above the typical P-166, matching the performance of some Pen-

tium-200 units. It's cleanly designed, well assembled, and backed by outstanding support. There's remarkably little to find fault with on this system.

People who do a lot of work with highresolution images will have their needs met here. The Diamond Stealth 3D 2000 video card with a generous 4MB of EDO DRAM delivers true-color images at up to 1024 by 768 resolution, and the 17-inch

monitor does a nice job of displaying them. The Millennia's 2.1GB hard disk should satisfy most people's

needs for a while. This is a strong multimedia package, and it comes with a modem. However, the only software you get is the operating system.

When we looked inside the Millennia's minitower case, we found it to be exceptionally cleanly laid out and spacious. Having the sound chip integrated onto the motherboard reduces the clutter by one expansion card. We found the Millennia's documentation to be excellent.

Micron backs its hardware with an excellent support package. A three-year parts warranty, 24-hour toll-free phone support, and a free first year of on-site service are first-rate for consumer PCs. But support is more than just policies: Some companies with 24-hour-a-day, seven-daya-week service are still impossible to get in touch with. Not so with Micron. Judging by the many faxes we've received from readers in our on-going survey, Micron does a superb job of providing service to its customers. Readers also have registered few complaints about the sturdiness and reliability of its PCs.

replaced the Dimension unit we reviewed in August of last year, back when Pentium Pro-200 systems first appeared. This Dimension performed in typical Pentium Pro-200 fashion, cleaning the clocks of all the desktops based on other processors. The Pro200n is a top-of-the-line system through and through, from the 17-inch monitor, to multimedia with crisp truecolor graphics and snappy wavetable sound, to a hard disk that can probably hold more data than your local library. It

also includes a 33.6-kbps modem. If you're going to be venturing out onto the World Wide Web, you will want every bps of speed a modem can muster, and unless you go for ISDN, a

33.6-kbps modem is the fastest you can get. The Dell's \$3738 price is pretty much in line for this heavily loaded unit.

The XPS Prozoon's case is based on the "s" series of Dell Dimensions. The CD-ROM drive is on top, and the power and reset buttons are located in the center of the front panel, well away from the floppy disk eject button, so users won't accidentally turn off the computer while trying to eject a floppy disk. While the engineers were at it, they made the case much easier to open.

> Give a thumbscrew a few turns, and off comes the side panel to reveal an impeccable interior with plenty of free slots and bays. The motherboard is arranged so that the corner with all the

cable connectors sits right below the drive cage, which means you're not faced with the usual LA-freeway maze of ribbon cables crisscrossing everywhere and obstructing the slots. Our only complaint is that the system's interior needs better ventilation: the heat sink in our test machine burned our hand when we touched it, despite inclusion of a big cooling fan. More air could circulate if the hard disk weren't mounted so close to the front grille.

Dell's support policies are among the best, and you can usually get through to technicians without waiting. System reliability ranks among the best, too, according to PC World readers. We get dozens of fax-back responses from Dell owners each month, and few of them complain about system problems.

The multimedia setup is pretty much par for the course, with an integrated Vibra 16 sound chip, Altec Lansing ACS 31 speakers, and an 8X CD-ROM drive. The PC

> comes ready to plug into your network with an integrated 3Com ethernet adapter.

The OptiPlex GXpro's desktop design is a vast improvement over previous systems. In fact, it's one of the easiest-toupgrade PCs we've seen. The case is simple to remove, and

the internal construction is modular. Cards are housed on a vertical riser plane that slides out at the touch of a lever. Even the power supply swings aside for effortless access to the motherboard and drive bays. An easy-to-upgrade tower version is also available. Like the number five Dimension XPS P200s, the GXpro uses DIMM memory modules rather than SIMMs. People who service computers love these newer modules because they make it easier to add memory without having to remove lower-capacity modules to make room. Unlike other systems with DIMM sockets, the OptiPlex GXpro 200 has four sockets instead of two. This leaves three sockets open, so graphics professionals and other people who need lots of RAM can fill 'er up.

which in this case is a bright, crisp 17-inch monitor, the Micron 17FGx. Overall, system performance is very good, verging on outstanding. The Millennia Pro200 Plus pulled down an impressive PC World-Bench score of 230. As far as graphics goes, Micron offers a choice of the Imagine 128 Series 2 board or the Diamond Stealth 3D 2000 board.

The disk and tape drive options on the Millennia Pro200 Plus-the Jaz drive (which uses removable 1GB cartridges), a 2.1GB Seagate hard drive, and a speedy Plextor 8X CD-ROM drive-are all attached to a PCI-based BusLogic SCSI-2 controller. Multimedia is a cut above the norm, with a Sound Blaster wavetable sound card and a pair of Advent AV270 speakers. This is also one of the few systems to come with the fullest version of Microsoft Office available-Office Professional, which includes the Access database program as well as Word, Excel, and the PowerPoint presentation package.

The Pentium Pro-200 chip generates a lot of heat, and Micron wisely placed three fans inside this minitower to keep the components cool. Getting to the motherboard is a snap thanks to the system's easy-open case. You can insert up to four add-in cards (two of them PCI cards) and two externally accessible drives. The two open SIMM sockets are easy to access.

Micron covers the RAM and CPU with a five-year warranty; other parts are covered for three years. Labor is covered for one year. Tech support lines are open around the clock, though lately we've been having limited success getting through in under 45 minutes. Still, most people seem to have little trouble with Micron: The most recent results of our ongoing survey show that the company has earned the highest marks from our readers.

5 DELL DIMENSION XPS P200S

PRO: Big hard drive, 8X CD-ROM drive, fast graphics card, 28.8-kbps fax-modem

CON: A bit slower than we expected, considering use of fast SDRAM; no speakers

months. The updated Intel chip set in Dell's "s" series supports SDRAM-a type of main

memory that's faster than today's popular EDO DRAM. It's difficult to draw hard conclusions, considering the different configurations of the Pentium-200s we've tested, but SDRAM doesn't seem to have done the P200s much good. Its PC WorldBench score of 208 lags behind that of several Pentium-200 desktops that use EDO DRAM. Part of the problem simply may be that Dell hasn't finished fine-tuning the P200s. We'll retest soon to see if speed has improved. In the meantime, the P200s is still among the fastest Dell Dimension systems we've ever tested.

One thing Dell doesn't have to tweak is the graphics card. The Number Nine Imagine 128 Series 2 with 4MB of VRAM that came with our machine adds more than \$300 to the system's price, but it can handle all of your graphics chores, including high-end image editing and desktop publishing. The card even has 3-D hardware and support for CAD acceleration. Other peripherals are also the cream of the crop or nearly so: the 8X CD-ROM drive, a 512K pipeline-burst secondary cache, a crisp Dell 17-inch monitor, and a U.S. Robotics 28.8-kbps fax-modem, which rates very highly on our Top 10 Modems chart.

The system's on/off button is circular. slightly recessed, and smack in the middle of the front panel, well away from the floppy eject button. A wide foot at the minitower's base helps prevent tipping. Inside the P200s you'll find several other nice design touches: An extremely quiet fan augments the power supply fan, memory is supplied on high-capacity DIMMs, and a vertically mounted hard drive is placed just behind the internal speaker to save space. Dell bundles the Microsoft Office Professional application suite with this system but doesn't include any speakers to go with the integrated sound chip. Adding a pair of basic speakers costs you another \$36.

Printed and on-screen documentation is clear and complete. Dell's system reliability and service are highly rated by our readers, and the three-year parts and oneyear labor warranty, year of free on-site service, 30-day money-back guarantee, and around-the-clock tech support hours all are fine offerings.

If you don't want to spend quite as much and don't need Pentium-200 speed, we recommend the \$2899 Dimension XPS P166s, which we tested with 16MB of RAM, a 17-inch monitor, and a 28.8kbps fax-modem. Like the P200s, it's not the fastest in its processor class, but it's still a good performer.

9 HP PAVILION 7285

PRO: Big hard disk, voice modem

Hewlett-Packard's latest is an excellent machine for the home office. The Pavilion 7285 minitower offers a host of nifty features, including telephone answering capabilities and 3-D sound, and it has the quality feel of most HP products. It also

performs well, as you might fairly expect of a Pentium-200 system carrying 32MB of EDO RAM. Priced at

a reasonable \$3560, the package also includes a 17-inch monitor, an 8X CD-ROM drive, wavetable synthesis, Altec Lansing speakers, and loads of software, making this a terrific multimedia system. In short, Hewlett-Packard has covered just about all the bases well with the Pavilion 7285—except support. More on that later.

The Pavilion is both handsome and rugged, with some nice proprietary design touches. Most notable is an unusual stacked motherboard design in which a second board that contains just the expansion card connectors lies over the

motherboard. This separates the connectors from the rest of the motherboard, so there's less chance you'll damage other components when installing and removing adapter cards. There's an unusually high number of free slots (six), helped by the fact that the sound chip is integrated onto the motherboard. On the downside, you have to remove the top board to access the SIMMs and processor easily. The overall design and construction are clean, with cables neatly tucked aside, and little to no flex to the case. The Pavilion's 17-inch monitor is crisp and pleasant to look at, but the 15.5 inches of viewing area is a little under par for the course. It's driven by an S3 Virge PCI adapter with 3-D capabilities and MPEG support. With the 3.2GB hard drive, there's plenty of room even for big multimedia files. The voice modem lets the computer behave as a telephone answering machine.

Hewlett-Packard bundled a lot of software with this machine, including Quicken SE, one of the best programs around for balancing your checkbook and tracking your finances. HP also provides onscreen help and an alternate desktop called Personal Page that sits atop Windows 95. It's simpler and less powerful than Windows 95's main window, but it's prettier, and especially nice if you have kids: You can hide sensitive files and put their favorite programs within easy reach. This Pavilion's documentation is thorough and easy to read. And readers give Hewlett-Packard an excellent rating for the reliability of its desktop computers.

Support is the Pavilion's main drawback. Hewlett-Packard does offer 24-hour tech support, and if your Pavilion flakes out during the first year, service is free onsite. But the package doesn't include coverage of any kind after that. Most of all, Hewlett-Packard needs to shore up the quality of its support on its Pavilion linereaders responding to our ongoing faxback survey rate it only as fair.

11 QUANTEX QP5/200 M-4

PRO: Smoking performance, great price, featurerich, good expandability

CON: Poor system reliability rating and only fair service rating

Life is full of if-onlys-those niggling drawbacks that mar an otherwise marvelous thing. For instance, some people would love to cook risotto once a week-if only it didn't require constant stirring for nearly 30 minutes. In a similar vein, we have another if-only to add to the list: We would give this Pentium Pro-200 system from Quantex a glowing review-if only the company's service and reliability were better. It's been improving recently, but it still has far to go.

For an exceedingly reasonable price of \$2569, Quantex delivered a Pentium Pro-200 machine that ranked among the best performers in this month's roundup-yet it costs \$600 to \$700 less than comparable Pentium Pro-200 models. From a price/performance standpoint, this system is difficult to beat.

And it's totally packed. The QP5/200

M-4 comes loaded with enough RAM and hard disk space to handle large multimedia files.

It's also got one of the better multimedia setups you'll find on a home system, and the speakers with subwoofer produce rich, full-bodied sound. The monitor is a pleasure to use, with images looking particularly sharp and vivid. Six open drive bays allow you to add more devices, such as a tape backup drive or an extra hard drive. The company offers 15 hours of toll-free technical support each weekday, as well as weekend hours.

Quantex has got its PC formula down pretty well. Now it needs to get quality and service a little more under control. We've heard a number of complaints about faulty product and poor service. The company says it's working on these areas. We've already seen some improvement in the last few months. Stay tuned.

19 ACMA ZPOWER PRO 200

PRO: Fast, removable and lockable hard drive CON: Limited drive bay expansion

Aesthetically, Acma's latest is an unimaginative bone-beige minitower. But there are more important things to look for in a

computer than a handsome countenance. Sheer speed, for instance: This \$3395 Pen-

tium Pro-200 machine earned a PC WorldBench score of 231. It comes well equipped for multimedia and for exploring the riches of the World Wide Web.

The system ships with a 17-inch ADI Microscan monitor; unfortunately, the actual display area, measured diagonally, comes to 15.5 inches-a bit smaller than on other 17-inch monitors.

If you need extra data security or easy portability and upgradability, you'll appreciate the system's removable 2.1GB EIDE hard drive with keys and lock; there's also a useful on-screen glossary of computer terms preinstalled for novices. The system has two free PCI slots, one free 16-bit slot, and one shared slot, which should be enough for most users. The zPower Pro 200 is somewhat tight on drive bay space, however, with only one spot each for a 3.5inch drive and a 5.25-inch drive. The machine's interior cables are neatly arranged, and the fan purrs quietly. The system casing is sturdy, and the large thumbscrews make it very easy to remove the case at upgrade time.

The Acma is reasonably, though not compellingly, priced. The warranty that comes with this PC-one year for labor, three years for parts-isn't bad. Phone calls are toll-free, but technical support is available only Monday through Friday.



MICRON MILLENNIA P133

PRO: Fast, well built, great warranty, highly rated reliability and support

CON: No modem, no software



This \$1899 Millennia P133 supersedes the one we reviewed last March, and like its predeces-

sor, it's one of the finest deals around.



It's hard to find any fault in the Millennia P133. The system's design is so clean

Micron Millennia P133 and open on the inside that it leaves you wondering if everything is really there. The motherboard is easily accessible, with minimal chances for damaging other components

if you're adding expansion cards or SIMMs. There's also more space than usual to add components. Four free drive bays will let you add devices such as an extra hard disk and a tape backup drive. and there are six free expansion slots at your disposal. This Pentium-133 is quite fast, too. With a PC WorldBench score of 191, it performs as well as some Pentium-166s we've seen.

The Millennia's multimedia setup is about as good as it gets. The CD-ROM drive zips along at 8X speed. The Diamond Stealth 3D 2000 video controller comes brimming with 4MB of RAM. which means you get high-resolution images in true color-a welcome sight for graphic artists. Audio is provided by the integrated Vibra 16S sound chip and 270 series Advent speakers. The 2.1GB hard disk has plenty of room for those notoriously piggy multimedia files. Even with the smaller-than-usual 15-inch monitor (the viewable portion comes to only 13.5 inches), it's no small feat for a company to offer such a package for \$1899. The system lacks a modem, however. If you want to get on the Net, you should plan to spend another \$150 to \$200 on a 28.8-kbps or 33.6-kbps unit.

Great support has become one of Micron's fortes. Aside from a 24-hour-aday tech support hot line, there's a threeyear parts and one-year labor warranty. A free year of on-site service is also included, and the feedback we get from our ongoing fax-back survey is that readers are happy with the service provided. In our own round of tech support calls, however, we've been experiencing 45-minute and longer waits on hold; we'll continue to track this and keep you updated.

Readers have been very satisfied with the reliability of Micron's PCs, and it's clear the company put some thought into the Millennia's documentation. Micron hasn't yet joined the growing group of vendors that provide snazzy interactive on-screen help, but the hard copy manuals are easy to read and contain plenty of diagrams. Micron offers the same configuration in a Pentium-166 model that costs \$200 more. We evaluated that and found it to be an excellent value, too.

The Dimension P133v's cost has risen slightly since last month, but \$1879 is still a very good price

for what you get. This is a powerful multimedia minitower from a company that, according to our fax-back survey, gets the top ratings for service and the reliability of its PCs. Dell's P-133 doesn't skimp on performance or features. With its 16MB of

SDRAM and 256K pipelineburst cache, it scored 188 in our PC WorldBench test suite-good for its CPU class. Our test model even came with a 16-bit sound card, something you don't

(Speakers cost extra.) Dell also includes a 28.8-kbps fax-modem. Unless you confine your online activities to short e-mail messages, 28.8-kbps is the minimum speed we recommend for the Internet. With its fine stripe pitch, the Dell Trini-

usually get with a bare-bones Dell PC.

tron monitor displays crisp images and text; however, the unit that came with our system was a little dark, and we couldn't improve the brightness. On the other hand, it does offer 14 inches of actual view-

able area, generous for a monitor the manufacturer rates as 15 inches. For expanding memory, the P133v uses DIMMs, which hold more memory on a module than SIMMs. The system's two DIMM sockets can hold a

total of 64MB of synchronous RAM (two 32MB DIMMs). When 64MB DIMMs become available, the system will be able to hold a total of 128MB. One DIMM socket is free in this configuration.

If you want a little extra power, there's the Dimension P200v, which we reviewed in the November issue. It's nearly identical to the P133v, but it costs \$100 more and is about 10 percent faster.

last April. Now it has 32MB of RAM instead of 16MB. This extra dollop of RAM may have helped the system achieve a PC WorldBench score of 191, which puts the GXM 5133 not far behind the average P-166 desktop. Many network administrators shopping for new workstations will find the built-in ethernet adapter a convenient touch. At \$2245, this is a powerful PC at an affordable price.

A 2.1GB hard drive and an 8X CD-ROM drive form the disk subsystems, while video chores are handled nicely by an integrated S₃ Trio 6₄-bit subsystem with 2MB of memory. One complaint is the lackluster display quality of the 15-inch monitor. The images were not as crisp as we're used to seeing on desktop monitors these days. The actual viewing area comes out to 13.7 inches, which is pretty much par for the course for 15inch monitors.

The OptiPlex GXM 5133 we tested carried very few extras. No modem, software (apart from the operating system), or

speakers were included with the machine. Lack of a modem is hardly a negative in a computer that's meant to be networked, but bundled software is always good to get. Sound comes from an integrated Vibra 16 sound chip.

Inside the box, the case was reinforced by internal cages, giving it more strength than usual. No matter how heavy a monitor you set on this midsize desktop, there's no danger of stressing vital components. Cables were tied off, and the

interior was easy to move around in once the cages were removed. There was only minor flex to the unit with the exterior shell removed. We'd like to see another free bay or two (this PC has only two free

drive bays), but you get five free expansion slots, which will be more than enough for most people.

Dell has continually received excellent scores from readers in our ongoing reliability and service fax-back survey. These factors, coupled with a three-year parts and labor warranty, make that part of a corporate buyer's decision a no-brainer. Excellent documentation and around-theclock phone support for the life of the system are very positive factors as well.

The Dell OptiPlex GXM 5133 nicely fits the bill for a no-frills corporate desktop.

4 GATEWAY 2000 P5-133

PRO: Fast, great documentation, good design CON: No modem or sound card at this price, reliability could be better



Gateway 2000's P5-133 features a nice design, and it just got a little bit more affordable: The company

shaved the price by \$70 to \$1709. The

angular case style has a more up-to-date feel than the curvy Gateways of the past; we found it very attractive. This system is

also one of the fastest P-133s we've ever tested, turning in an impressive PC World-Bench score of 192. All this helps earn the P5-133 a Best Buy. It's a great business system, but not one that we'd recommend for home use unless



While this sounds like a single software program, it's really a suite of full-scale applications including a word processor (Word), spreadsheet (Excel), presentation graphics program (PowerPoint), and database program (Access). Gateway earns a good service and support score because of its support policies, but our readers still rate system reliability only as fair.

The Pentium-120 version of this machine, Gateway's \$1659 P5-120, is also a good budget PC.

5 COMPAQ PRESARIO 4402

PRO: Compact design, good performance, 8X CD-ROM drive, 33.6-kbps modem, Compaq's PC reliability rated very highly by readers

CON: Minimal expansion, limited video memory, no secondary cache



Despite its futuristic appearance, the Compag Presario 4402 is a throwback. Like other all-in-one

Presarios before it, this multimedia system combines monitor, motherboard, and stereo speakers-in short, everything but the keyboard and mouse-in one case. But unlike its plain, boxy Presario predecessors, this new Pentium-133 boasts an eye-catching design that would fit in at the Jetsons'. Curved speakers frame each side of the display; a built-in microphone sits atop the monitor and an infrared port below it; and the PC's front panel has more push buttons, lights, and controls-27 in all-than you'd find at a nuclear power plant. Even the keyboard has a similarly sculpted style.

So what's the problem? As with the original Macintosh, the prototype of all computers cute and completely integrated, the Presario 4402's design limits its expandability and power. Unlike other P-133 systems in its price range, the Presario 4402 has no open external or in-

ternal drive bays. It offers only one free 32-bit card slot and one free 16-bit card slot. and there is no secondary cache or space to add

any. Another disadvantage is that you can't reposition the speakers to fit your needs. When playing music CDs, for instance, you might want to place the speakers farther away from you-but you can't, because the speakers are joined to the display. Fortunately the sound quality is good.

Considering the above concerns, the Presario 4402 almost missed the Best Buy ranks. But its \$1999 price isn't bad for a system with 16MB of RAM and a 1.6GB hard drive, from a highly reputable company. A 33.6-kbps modem is built-in, and the included Compaq Phone Center software features voice mail, which means you can turn the PC into a telephone answering machine. The 15-inch monitor is clear, bright, and crisp. However, you should buy this PC with more than 1MB of video memory.

It's the company itself that makes this system especially inviting. Many of our readers own Compags, and they rate the company highly in PC reliability. Support policies are good, though our readers report that Compaq could improve the quality of the phone support they're getting. Also, while Compaq offers free onsite service for the first year and 24-hour toll-free phone support, you have to pay extra if you want to extend the support beyond one year.

PRO: Fast, inexpensive, big hard drive, 33.6-kbps modem, sturdy construction

CON: One-year warranty, no weekend support, some readers have complained about poor service There's a lot you could do with \$1650. You could fly to Europe, buy a new Giorgio Armani outfit, or start a wine cellar in your basement. Or, if you're feeling particularly practical, you could invest in this jewel-in-the-rough Pentium-133 from Diamond Technologies. This PC is one of the best bargains around-though it can't compare to Armani in the style department. The one-year parts and labor warranty is skimpy, making this system better for technical types who can figure things out for themselves. While Diamond certainly isn't alone here, most vendors these days are offering more generous warranties of at least one year for labor and three years for parts. What's more, Diamond offers only 9 hours a day of tech support during the work

week and nada on the weekend. Though we did not obtain a big enough number of responses from our ongoing faxback survey to give Diamond official scores on re-


liability and service, we have received a number of complaints from readers who have been dissatisfied with the company's technical support.

If you're savvy about the inner workings of PCs, this P-133 is a good option. It has pretty good pep, earning a PC World-Bench score of 185, which is as good as or better than that of most other Pentium-133s we've reviewed. The 2.1GB EIDE hard drive is more capacious than usual for a budget desktop, and suits it for storing lots of multimedia files. Multimedia is well covered: You get a fast CD-ROM drive and a wavetable sound card that delivers especially rich, high-fidelity sound. Net surfers should note the fast 33.6-kbps modem. If you want to browse the Web with a minimum of waiting, a 28.8- or 33.6-kbps modem is your best bet. The system is sturdily constructed, and has sensibly arranged power-on and reset buttons and an uncluttered, organized interior for easy access to slots and components. You get three free drive bays and four free slots, which is about average for desktop PCs.







IBM WASTED NO TIME after the company's five-year noncompete agreement with Lexmark expired. IBM's new Network Printer 12, debuting at third place on the monochrome chart, is hot on

the heels of Lexmark's Optra Lx+ and Optra R+. On the color chart, the Tektronix Phaser 350 debuts in second place.

How did IBM do it? Low price and fast graphics speed. The Network Printer 12's \$1250 street price is the lowest on the

monochrome chart, and its 2-pages-perminute graphics speed is one of the fastest. Its 8.7-ppm text speed is average for the monochrome lasers we've tested.

The IBM's print quality is also impressive. Its remarkably deep black toner draws sharp text and smooth gray-scale images. IBM's generous support policies include a year of free on-site service and free, round-the-clock technical support.

That said, the Network Printer 12 has some minor flaws. Its documentation is overly long-four volumes-and some of its illustrations are hard to follow. Its maximum input capacity of 750 sheets is low: Both of the Lexmarks exceed 1000 sheets. Finally, the pages we printed from the IBM tended to curl. This may have been caused by our lab's dry environment.

The Network Printer 12 we received was configured with 2MB of standard RAM. but just before IBM launched the printer, the standard was upgraded to 4MB. We'll retest the Network Printer 12 with 4MB of RAM in the March issue.

PHASER 350 WAXES BRILLIANT

WHAT'S BLACK AND white and free all over? Monochrome pages printed with the Tektronix Phaser 350, the first solidink printer we've tested for the Top 10. It debuts at number two on the color chart this month, coming close to unseating the Best Buy, HP's DeskJet 1600CM. The Phaser 350 rose this far because it occu-

pies a fairly happy medium between an ink jet that's inexpensive but needs coated paper to print its best, and a color laser that's not as picky, but costs much more. The \$3495 Tektronix is cheaper than most color lasers, and it prints its eye-popping colors on all kinds of paper. To help convince customers that it's okay to use a color printer for ordinary text documents, Tektronix will give away the black ink indefinitely-making its low cost per page even lower. But because the Phaser 350's text printing is slow and its paper handling limited, it's best for offices that print color output as much as or more than plain black.

The Phaser 350's solid ink technology melts chunky, crayonlike blocks of ink and sprays them onto paper, producing a somewhat shiny, waxlike finish and rich colors that make laser and ink jet pages pale in comparison. The Phaser 350's graphics speed is the fastest we've seen from a color printer, too, at nearly 1 ppm.

So what's not to like about the Phaser 350? Its 3.4-ppm text speed in our tests is the slowest on the chart. Text printing is less crisp than a laser's, especially with small type. The printer cannot take legalsize paper or envelopes, and you need a special tray for transparencies. The slightly raised ink printed by the Phaser 350 caused jams in our office copier's autofeeder. Finally, the printer's hot-wax smell could be annoying in an enclosed space.



THE NEW TEKTRONIX PHASER 350'S solid Ink produces exceptional color prints and decent black text. Better yet, the Phaser 350's black ink is free indefinitely.

Three other color printers we tested this month did not make the chart: The \$5999 Apple Color LaserWriter 12/660 PS and \$3399 QMS magicolor WX lasers, and Epson's \$389 Stylus Color Pro ink jet. The Stylus Color Pro is networkable and far cheaper than anything else on the chart, but it lacks the speed and paper capacity to compete. Street-priced at \$5999, the new Apple Color LaserWriter 12/660 PS costs less than the Canon, IBM, and Lexmark printers we've tested that use the same engine, but it's not as fast.

A \$3399 COLOR LASER FROM QMS

WITH ITS ROCK-BOTTOM \$3399 street price-the lowest of any color laser we've tested-QMS's magicolor WX should have been a contender. Its monochrome output is good; color images look a little washed-out. The interior is easily accessible for replacing toner and parts. Its documentation is clearly illustrated. Unfortunately, the QMS is slow. It turned in respectable times for graphics pages, but was noticeably slower than other color lasers on plain text. This is in part because the magicolor WX is a Windows-only printer-which means no PostScript or Macintosh support, and it depends on your CPU for processing power.



Crackdown in Cyberspace

AN ILLINOIS COMPANY that sold RAM over the Internet has agreed to pay \$5500 in consumer redress after failing to ship in a



timely manner-and sometimes not shipping at all. According to a complaint filed by the Federal Trade Commission, US Telemedia required payment in

cashier's checks, leaving customers little recourse when their orders never arrived. The company is one of the first Web advertisers to be charged with violating the Federal Mail and Telephone Order Rule, which establishes guidelines for when products ordered online or via phone or mail must be shipped. The FTC reports that US Telemedia is no longer in business. Remember: Always pay with a credit card. If you think you've been scammed, contact the FTC (http://www.ftc.gov).



THE MARRIAGE OF CONSUMER electronics and personal computing moves a step closer this month with the arrival of sleek new home PCs from Sony and Toshiba. But

despite solid performance and some nice features, weighty price tags kept both machines from cracking our Top 5. No other new machines made it either, so the honors this month go entirely to former winners.

At the top of the chart once again is the Dell Dimension P200v. This bare-bones muscle machine offers P-200 performance at an affordable \$2299.

Just below the Dell are Compag's Presario 4402 and Micron's Home MPC. Easy to set up and priced at a rock-bottom \$1999, the 4402 is a great choice for firsttime buyers who don't require great speed. The Micron, on the other hand, is a speed demon, scoring an astonishing 215 on our WorldBench tests. Rounding out the Top 5 are Gateway's Family PC, which provides quick performance and great value, and the Nexar 9000, which graced the Top 5 back in November, lost out to faster machines in December, but returns now thanks to a \$100 drop in price.

PC by Sony may sound like a designer cologne, but that line's PCV-90 is a solid Pentium-200 system that offers excellent

performance, 32MB of RAM, a 2.5GB hard drive, a sizable software package, and superlative software MPEG playback. It sports one of the better user interfaces we've seen and is ridiculously easy to set

up. But the PCV-90 also comes with a designer price: \$3478 when equipped with the 15-inch monitor.

Toshiba's Infinia 7200 tries to be both computer and home entertainment center, but this \$3548 Pentium-200 is just too expensive. In addition to its 32MB of RAM, 3GB hard drive, and a 17-inch monitor, the Infinia includes a cable-ready TV/FM radio card. The system is easy to set up and comes with Encarta 96, Quicken, and Mayo Family Clinic. If you're looking for a solid computer and happen to need an extra television in the den, the Infinia is definitely worth a look. (For additional information on both Sony's PCV-90 and the Toshiba Infinia, see this month's Top 100).

Nightmare on ISDN Street

I TOOK A CLOSE LOOK at my ISDN phone bill a while back, thereby opening up a huge can of worms that took me nearly a year to sort out. The good news is, I eventually ended up with a faster hookup and an enormous refund.

If you're not familiar with ISDN, it's an astonishingly fast two-channel digital communications line capable of transmitting data at 128 kbps. How fast is that?

It takes a standard 28.8-kbps modem 45 minutes to download a 9MB file. Going all out on a properly functioning ISDN line, you can get the same file in 8 minutes flat.

My story starts in August 1995, when I ordered an ISDN line from Pacific Bell (see the January 1996 Home Office for sordid details). I specified residential service-that's critical to this horror story-because its installation and monthly charges are cheaper than for a business line. For example, with a residential account, your evening, weekend, and holiday calls are free. With a business account, you're stuck paying by the minute around the clock.

OVERCHARGED

WHEN I LOOKED at the November 1995 bill, I realized I was being charged for evening calls that should've been free. Yep, Pac Bell had me on their rolls as a business service. It took a week and a halfdozen calls just to track down a Pac Bell person who could help me. I explained, she listened, and we agreed-I should be switched to residential service.

And how hard could that be? You'd think she could just click an option in a dialog box. But why make things simple? Pac Bell had to terminate my service and make me wait three weeks before a technician could come to my house to install my "new" residential ISDN line.

To add insult to injury, my next Pac Bell bill contained a fee for canceling my business service and a charge for a new service installation. All told, I'm hit for \$175. (Why am I not surprised that Scott Adams, creator of Dilbert, used to work in Pac Bell's ISDN group?)

I'm now faced with a monumental task: getting reimbursed. See, on one hand, Pac Bell is promoting the dickens out of ISDN. On the other hand, it doesn't have the staff to handle new orders, much less

deal with problems. Any time I might have saved with a fast ISDN line was lost waiting on hold (while being told how very important my call is), explaining the problem, and faxing a copy of my bill to a Pac Bell rep. I wait a month. Nothing. I call again. I'm asked to send yet another copy of the bill. Now they want me to fax the bill again, this time to a long-distance phone number.

It takes two months, I finally receive a refund of-get this-\$27. I get the feeling Dilbert's pet Dogbert must be in charge.

NO CONNECTION

IN THE MEANTIME, my ISDN line goes dead. A Pac Bell technician comes out to the house. He looks things over and fixes the problem. Then with a flourish worthy of Houdini, he plucks something from the gray telephone box and shouts, "Aha!" I hate it when repair people say that. It turns out I have something called a Maintenance Test Unit attached to my ISDN line. An MTU is a circuit board that allows the phone company to test your line auto-

matically. The repair guy, much too perky for his own good, tells me an MTU is for analog lines only. Pop it on a digital line and you get a 50 percent performance decrease. And I've had one on for well over a year. Swell.

I talked with three Pac Bell employees and learned that MTUs are standard equipment. What's troublingand true not only in California-is that because the ISDN market is a burgeoning industry, most technicians are overworked and many aren't adequately trained. The chances are high they'll forget-or not know-that the MTU should be removed from digital line installations. So hang around while your ISDN line is installed, question the

installer and, most important, ask them to hand you the MTU before they leave.

Well, it took a year and more than 5 hours on the phone with assorted Pac Bell representatives, but I finally received a refund: a whopping \$518. My ISDN connections are now faster than a speeding bullet. And the folks at Pac Bell? They can leap tall buildings for all I care.





REAL PROBLEM, REAL SOLUTION

We get plenty of requests from our Web sitehow can we respond best? — David Jaworski



DAVID JAWORSKI, whose company offers interactive software for personal and professional growth, found a way to turn hits on his Web site into sales leads—and to respond quickly.

PROVIDENT VENTURES, a developer and publisher of interactive multimedia training CD-ROMs in Bellevue, Washington, had no problem creating a Web site. But then Provident faced a real challenge: turning all those electronic queries into serious sales leads.

IF YOU BUILD A CORPORATE Web site. visitors will come.

But if you want to turn your site into an effective sales and marketing tool, you must capture information about the people who visit. And you need an automated, effective way to respond to those leads.

When my company put up its Web site a year ago, our goal was simply to disseminate information about our products. (We produce interactive training, professional development, and self-improvement programs and seminars for CD-ROM and the Internet.) That proved successful. Today, many of our customers find us through our Web site (http://www .provident.com).

But we soon found that it's one thing to get people to visit your site and another to reach them proactively. So we changed our site from a simple online brochure to an interactive marketing and sales vehicle.

The goal was to solicit Internet inquiries in an ongoing "relationship marketing" effort and increase our current database of 3000 names to 50,000 by year's end.

PROBLEM: FOLLOWING UP ON CUSTOMER REQUESTS EFFICIENTLY

WE BEGAN OFFERING a free electronic newsletter on the Web site. By filling in a simple HTML form and e-mailing it back to us, people could receive monthly information on personal and professional development topics such as stress management and team building.

We immediately ran into big problems. The first was collecting the e-mail on our Internet service provider's server. Of course, we wanted to respond immediately to people's requests for information. Several times a day, an employee or a contractor had to log on to the ISP's server and check the site for queries. We wanted our e-mail forwarded automatically to our own internal Microsoft Exchange e-mail system, but we didn't want to spend thousands of dollars on a programmer, and our ISP didn't want to install custom applications on its servers.

A second problem was getting the information from the customers' e-mail into a form suitable for WinSales, our sales automation database. Retyping the prospects' names and addresses into Win-Sales took one employee two days per month and introduced errors.

The final problem was getting WinSales to respond automatically to all the e-mail. Within four months, we'd accumulated more than 1000 queries. We needed to follow up these requests with calls or letters, but we were often too busy.

SOLUTION: E-MAIL CONVERSION AND SALES AUTOMATION SOFTWARE

OUR SOLUTION CAME in the form of Universal Outbox, an Internet-enabled companion to WinSales. Running on a Windows PC in our office, Universal Outbox captures the HTML-based data from

a Web site visitor, then translates the data into an ASCII text file that we can import into our WinSales database.

The process works like this: After the

prospect fills out the form and clicks the Submit button, the form arrives on our ISP's server as an email attachment. At regular intervals, Universal Outbox's E-mail Scanner automatically logs onto the capture information ISP server and grabs email from an account dedicated to these customer responses. (We set up the

"fetching" schedule using the System Agent scheduling application that comes with Windows 95's Plus sidekick.)

E-mail Scanner opens a message, scans it for an attachment, and translates relevant data into a text file. From there, we can import the information into our Win-Sales sales automation database.

Next, we use WinSales to sort the

prospect information by the action required. For example, if ten visitors to the Web site want to receive a printed information packet, the program triggers an

> action plan, telling us how many packets of information to send out, to whom, and when to follow up. This ability to automatically cover the next step in the process is a blessing in a small company like ours. (We set up the triggers in a program resembling Visual Basic that comes with WinSales.)

When we're ready for our paper mailings, we power up WinSales and import the records; WinSales does the rest. All we do is print and mail out the letters. When we import the records, WinSales automatically fires out information via e-mail to anyone who requests it that way, so all our work is essentially done in one step.

But Universal Outbox isn't perfect. It

supports only MAPI, so if your e-mail system isn't MAPI-compliant, you'll have to deal with workarounds.

We'll face another challenge in a few months as we start handling product purchases on the Web site. Email coming to us through the Universal Outbox is not secure, so we'll let people know that they can fax or call if we're asking them for a credit card number.

Overall, the Universal Outbox/WinSales technology replaces the equivalent work of a couple of people and improves service to our customers.

And our Web site stands out from the crowd, because we respond quickly and correctly to customer queries.







Batch file primer • Measuring a megabyte • Printing on small envelopes

BATCH FILES FROM THE GROUND UP

I'VE SEEN MANY articles about batch files, but

they all assume that the reader is familiar with DOS commands. About the only thing I know about DOS is that some games require it, that typing WIN at the DOS prompt starts Windows, and that typing EXIT in an MS-DOS prompt window takes you back to Windows. Even simple instructions.

such as 'save it in a directory' or 'insert a batch file line,' are completely foreign to me. Could you explain, step by step, how to write, save, modify, and use batch files?

BATCH FILES ARE simply text files that contain one or more DOS commands, each followed by a return. They can be very handy for automating common tasks-for example, deleting all files of a given type in a given folder.

Creating a batch file is easy. In any version of DOS starting with 5.0 and including Windows 95's various DOS command prompts, enter edit at the prompt to fire up Microsoft's bare-bones text editor (see FIGURE 1). Enter your batch file commands, choose File Save, and then give your batch file a descriptive name ending with the .bat extension.

Alternatively, you can create batch files directly from the DOS prompt by using the copy command (also shown in Figure 1). Simply

type copy con: filename.bat where filename.bat is the name of the batch file you want to cre-

> ate, and then press <Enter>. Type the batch command lines just as you would in a text editor, pressing <Enter> after each

line. When you finish entering commands, press <F6> to insert the end-of-file character on the last line, and press <Enter> again to create the file. You should see the message '1 file(s) copied'.

> To test your new batch file, type the file name, with or without the .bat extension, at the DOS prompt and press (Enter). The commands you placed in the batch file should execute one after another. just as if you entered them individually at the DOS prompt.

> That's how you create batch files, but what do you put in them? If you're still using MS-DOS 5.0 or 6.x, type help at the DOS prompt for a nifty program with hypertext links that describe each command and give examples of how to use it.

Windows 95 lacks the hypertext reference program, but you can get detailed help on individual commands by entering command /? at the command prompt in a DOS window, where command is the DOS command you want to know more about.

You'll also find a complete list of available commands in the Windows 95 Resource Kit. If your copy of Windows 95 came on CD-ROM, you'll find the Resource Kit in Windows' help file format. Look for the wingsrk.hlp file in the Admin/Reskit/Helpfile directory. If you lack the CD-ROM, download the 2.2MB help file from Microsoft's Resource Kit Tools Web page (http://www.microsoft .com/windows/software/reskit.htm).



Enter command-line commands:native in the first field, and double-click native Windows 95 commands in the second box to view the page listing Win 95's commands. Enter command-line commands:batch for a list of commands used only in batch files for program flow control and branching, and for interaction with the user.

Get Transparent GIF Backgrounds With PaintShop Pro 4.1


PaintShop Pro 4.1 (download from http://www .jasc.com/), the \$69 alternative to Adobe Photoshop, has many talents. One is the ability to create GIF files with transparent backgrounds, a must for Web graphics that you want to blend with color or wallpaper backgrounds.

To add transparency information to your GIFs in PaintShop Pro, open the file, change the image background color to the color you want to make transparent by clicking the background color swatch at the right side of the screen, then selecting the new color from the resulting palette dialog box. Choose File Save as, select GIF from the 'Save as type' list, and click Options. Then select Set the transparency

TRUE MEASURE OF A MEGABYTE

I RECENTLY BOUGHT a new system with an 850MB Quantum Trailblazer hard drive. When my PC boots, it

says 'Hard Disk O Quantum TRB 850A Installed', so I know it's got the right drive and the drive is working properly. But when I examine the drive's properties in Windows 95's Explorer or run the chkdsk utility in DOS, both report the drive's capacity as about 810MB. What happened to the other 40MB?

Kevin Anthony, Dix Hills, New York THEY WERE NEVER there, except in the minds of Quantum's marketing staff. Like many disk drive makers, Quantum defines a megabyte as 1 million bytes. Check the fine print at the company's World Wide Web site (http://www.guantum.com/ products/trailblazer/#note).

Most of the rest of the world and most disk-management tools define a kilobyte as 1024 bytes and a megabyte as 1024 kilobytes, or 1,048,576 bytes. Divide 850,000,000 (the size of your drive in bytes by Quantum's calculations) by 1,048,576 and you get about 810, the real capacity of your drive.

ONE LAST STEP TO A PASSWORD BUG FIX



I WAS EXCITED to read about the Windows 95 password cache patch [Bugs and Fixes, September 1996]

because, of course, the bug is happening to me. However, when I downloaded and installed the patch, the problem remained.

Michael A. Cuttler, Sarasota, Florida THE PROBLEM IS, your password cache file has already been corrupted by the buggy password caching module in Service Pack 1, so you can't store new passwords there even though you installed the fix. You can find the fix on Microsoft's Win 95 Updates page (http://www.microsoft .com/windows/software/passwd.htm).

The simple solution is to delete the password file and start over. You'll have to reenter any cached passwords to remote shares or servers the next time you access them, but this should be a one-time inconvenience. To delete the file, choose Start. Find. Files or Folders, enter *.pwl in the 'Named' field, and c:\windows (or the directory where you have Windows 95 installed, if different) in the 'Look in' field; then click Find Now. Delete any files found, and restart Windows 95.

If your Windows log-in password is blank (which lets you skip the log-in dialog box), you'll have to reconfirm the blank password at this time; subsequent log-ins will revert to hands-off mode. Now, when you enter a Dial-Up Networking password and check Save password, Windows 95 will save it in a new, uncorrupted password cache file.

PRINT ON ITTY-BITTY **ENVELOPES**



I HAVE AN HP 855Cse ink jet that does a fine job printing addresses on business-size envelopes, but it

won't handle 6.5-by-3.625-inch envelopes. It seems they're too small to travel through the paper feed mechanism. Is there a trick that will let me print on small envelopes?

Bill Petty, Wilmington, North Carolina I PICKED THIS TRICK UP from a graphic designer friend: If your envelope is too small to travel through the printer by itself, let it hitchhike through on a larger piece of paper.

Set up the program you're printing from to print addresses in portrait orientation in the upper middle of an 8.5-by-11-inch page. Then send the envelope through with its flap hanging over the top edge of a sheet of letter-size paper. You have to feed each envelope by hand, and I can't guarantee this will work with every printer, but it's probably faster and certainly produces better results than using labels.

IF YOU'RE ONE OF THOSE Send To junkies, here's a quick way to add destinations to the Send To menu.

The trick is simply to add a Shortcut to the SendTo folder by following these steps:

- 1. Start Windows Explorer.
- 2. Open the \Windows\SendTo folder.
- 3. Hold down the right mouse button while you drag the SendTo folder from the left pane into the right pane, and then release the mouse button.
- 4. Choose Create Shortcut Here from the resulting pop-up menu.

Now, when you want to add a program to the SendTo folder, right-click the program in Explorer and choose Send To. Shortcut to SendTo. Next time you right-click an object in Explorer and select Send To from the pop-up menu, the new destination will appear.


Hani Musallam, New York Editor's note: This tip really sends me. But don't try it with folders. Instead of creating a Shortcut to the folder in the \Windows\SendTo directory, it moves the entire folder and its contents there. To add a folder to the Send To menu, use Musallam's drag-and-drop method, or open the \Windows\SendTo folder in Explorer, right-click the right pane, choose New. Shortcut, enter the folder's path in the Command line field, click Next, then Finish.

If you employ your new Shortcut to SendTo frequently, your Send To menu will quickly balloon out of control. When it does, simply create subfolders (as shown in FIGURE 2) under \Windows\SendTo, and organize those Shortcuts to your heart's content. And if you just can't get enough Send To tips, check this month's Windows Tips for more.







Faster PostScript Printing



THE POSTSCRIPT printer description language is a standard in the desktop publishing world-

but a speed demon it ain't. If you have a PostScript printer connected directly to your computer (not to a network), you can make it print faster by sending the header code to the printer only once rather than at the beginning of every job.

Here's how: Make sure the printer is turned on. In Windows 3.x, open Control Panel and double-click Printers. Select your PostScript printer in the list of Installed Printers, and click Setup. Next click Options. In the Options dialog box, click Send Header. In the Send Header dialog box, confirm that Printer is selected. and then click Send Now. Uncheck Send Header with Each Job, click OK twice, then click Close.

In Windows 95, choose Start-Settings-Printers. Right-click your PostScript printer, and choose Properties (or select it and press <Alt>-<Enter>). Click the PostScript tab, and click the Send Header Now button (if it's dimmed, select Download header with each print job). Click OK to confirm. Make sure that the radio button 'Assume header is downloaded and retained' is selected. Then click OK.

The header will now be lodged in your printer, and each print job should come out a little faster. But any time you restart the printer, you'll have to repeat this process of sending the header to the printer. To automate that step, see the next tip.

DOWNLOAD POSTSCRIPT HEADER AUTOMATICALLY



HERE'S HOW TO automate the task of sending your PostScript header code to the printer. First

you'll need to create a file on your hard drive that contains the header code.

In Windows 3.x, open the Send Header dialog box as described in the previous tip. Select File. Type a name and location for your header file (for example, c:\windows\ header.ps). Click Send Now.

In Windows 95, open the Properties sheet for your PostScript printer, which must be set as the default printer. Click the Details tab and make a note of the current setting in the 'Print to the following port' drop-down list. Click that drop-down list, choose FILE: (Creates a file on disk), and click the Apply button at the bottom of the dialog box. Then click the PostScript tab, select Download header with each print job, click Send Header Now, and click OK to confirm.

In the Print to File dialog box that appears, select a folder for your header file and type a name for it (such as header.ps) and click OK. Back in the PostScript Properties dialog box, make sure the radio but-

ton 'Assume header is downloaded and retained' is selected. Then click the Details tab, click the Print to the following port drop-down list, and set your printer back to its original port. Click OK to close the Printers window.

Now the header code that the printer needs is on your hard

drive. You'll have to send the code to your printer each time you turn it on. To automate that process in Win 3.x and 95, open a DOS window and type copy /bc:\windows\ header.pslpt1: where c:\windows\header.ps is the name of your header file and lpt1: is the port your printer is connected to. If you start your printer and computer only once a day,

just add the line to your autoexec.bat file. Don't forget to turn on your printer first so it will be ready when autoexec.bat sends the file.



by the tips below, open the Windows\ SendTo folder in the Windows Explorer, right-click each item, and select Rename from the pop-up menu before proceeding.

- 1. Force your Send To menu to accept the order and grouping you want by renaming each to begin with a number or single letter. The menu shows items in alphabetical order, so your icons will be rearranged according to these new names. with numbers appearing first.
- 2. You can force a grouping of Shortcuts by putting an unobtrusive character at the beginning of the names of the items that you want to appear together. Windows ignores the space and most punctuation characters when alphabetizing, but will sort certain extended characters before alphabetical characters.

Here are the special characters, listed in the order that Windows will use to alphabetize them. For each one, make sure <NumLock> is on and use the numeric keypad: <Alt>-0160 (blank), <Alt>-095 (underscore), <Alt>-096 (a grave accent), <Alt>-0168 (an umlaut or dieresis), <Alt>-0145 (an open single quote), < Alt>-0146 (a close single quote), <Alt>-0172 (a hooked dash), <Alt>-0183 (a dot).

For your final grouping, don't add a special character to the Shortcut name; Windows will put these Shortcuts at the bottom of the menu. For an example of the result, see FIGURE 1.

3. Most application menus (and the

dummy Shortcut for each line: Right-click and drag any old readme or other file into the SendTo folder and choose Create Shortcut(s) Here. Then right-click each dummy Shortcut, select Rename from the pop-up menu, and enter about a dozen underscore characters to create the divider line. Use the technique in Tip

2 to get the lines to appear in the proper order between groups of Shortcuts.

For the best effect, assign a custom blank icon to these dummy Shortcuts. Windows doesn't come with blank icons. so you'll need an icon editor, which you can easily find at shareware sites on the World Wide Web.

If you have the Microsoft Internet Explorer, you'll find a blank mini-icon (the kind that appears in menus) in the iexplorer.exe file. To change the icon, right-click a dummy Shortcut, and choose Properties. Click the Shortcut tab, and click Change Icon. Type the path to your custom icon, and click OK. With Internet Explorer, type the path to iexplorer.exe, or click Browse and locate and select iexplorer.exe and click OK. Select the seventh icon (a document with a magnifying glass) or the eighth (a document with a question mark), and click OK. Click OK again to close the Shortcut's properties sheet.

grounds plus the Page background (the area surrounding the active tab). You can set a custom color to designate yourself and others in the Planner grid. When you're done, click OK.

Still not satisfied? By editing the schdplus.ini file in your Windows directory, you can also customize the color of the horizontal lines in the Appointment Book and the grid lines in the Planner.

In File Manager or Program Manager, choose File-Run, type schdplus.ini and then press (Enter) to open this settings file in a text editor. Under the [Microsoft Schedule+| heading, but above the next bracketed heading, add one line that reads ApptBookLinesColor=1 and another that reads PlannerLinesColor=1 (note that capitalization is not important). Change the 1 in each of the lines to any number from 1 to 17, as in FIGURE 2. These numbers correspond, in order, to the hues in the dropdown lists in the Display dialog box.

To make the grid and horizontal lines invisible (or nearly so), choose a number that corresponds to that window's background color. Then save the file. You don't need to restart Schedule+ to see your changes take effect; just choose Options. Display and press <Enter>.

WASH AWAY THE GRAY IN SCHEDULE+

THE VERSION of Sched-

ule+ that is included with Windows for Workgroups 3.11 has a default color scheme that may look like your laundryshades of gray and pastel yellow. You can replace that palette with one of your own making.

START APPLICATIONS AS MINIMIZED ICONS

SOMETIMES YOU don't want to use a program the minute you start it. If you have several pro-

grams you plan to use soon, it might be more efficient to start them all at once.

create divider lines.

The easiest way to do this is to have the applications start as minimized icons on the desktop (Windows 3.x) or the Taskbar (Win 95). Then you can switch to each application when you're ready.

Here's how to make an application start minimized-this is particularly useful for some applications in your StartUp group. Locate the Shortcut or Program Manager icon for the application. To set its properties, press <Alt> as you double-click it. In Windows 3.x, check Run Minimized and click OK. In Windows 95, click the Shortcut tab and choose Minimized from the Run drop-down list. Then click OK.

If you want an icon to behave this way only on demand, do this instead: In Windows 3.x, press (Shift) as you double-click an icon in Program Manager. You can do the same thing to an .exe file in File Manager, but you're better off selecting the file name before you <Shift>-double-click it to avoid selecting multiple files.

This feature doesn't work exactly the same in Windows 95; if you <Shift>double-click a Shortcut or an .exe file in

SEE THE SOUND

MY WIFE AND I use custom desktops when running Windows 95 on the same machine. Her desktop

shows the speaker icon at the right end of the Taskbar, but mine does not. How can I display the speaker icon on my Taskbar?

Bob Taylor, Internet CLICKING THE speaker icon to change your system's volume is a handy way to pump up or tone down Windows sound on the flv.

To get this feature. choose Start-Settings .Control Panel. Doubleclick the Multimedia icon, and make sure the Audio tab is selected. Check the Show volume control on the taskbar check box, as in the figure at left, and click OK. The speaker icon will appear on the Taskbar immediately.

Explorer, the application won't start minimized, but it will start without putting its window in front of the Explorer window. This allows you to stay in Explorer and <Shift>-double-click one icon after another to start multiple applications in quick succession. But this trick doesn't work with every program.

WINDOWS NT BOOTING TIPS

WHEN you install Windows NT, it politely gives you the option of choosing between it and the previous operating system on your PC. Every time you start your computer, a boot menu lets you choose which operating system to use; if you don't press any key, Windows NT starts after 30 seconds.

But what if you don't want the system to default to NT? Or what if you don't want to wait 30 seconds for the NT default to start? Fortunately, you can customize attributes of the NT boot menu.

Here's what to do: Start up Windows NT and double-click the Control Panel icon in Program Manager. In Control Panel, double-click the System icon. From the Startup drop-down list, choose the operating system you want to use as the default. In the 'Show list for' area, type the number of seconds you want the boot options to appear before your computer runs the OS you set as the default. Then click OK.

Still not good enough? You can edit the

boot.ini file in

your root directory to customize the wording of the options. In File Manager, choose View By File Type, check Show Hidden/ System Files, and click OK. Select the boot.ini file and press <Alt>-<Enter> to display its properties. Uncheck Read Only, Hidden, and System, and click OK. Double-click boot.ini

TO DESTROY OR MSCREATE



AFTER INSTALLING a Microsoft Windows 95 program, there always seem to be a lot of copies of the file

mscreate.dir scattered throughout its folders. Are these just temporary setup files that I can delete?

Tyler Bittner, America Online THESE FILES ARE CREATED by the setup program of a number of Windows 95 applications as a way of keeping track of which folders were created by Setup and which weren't.

If you later run Setup to add or remove parts or all of an application, Setup uses the presence of mscreate.dir to decide whether it's safe to delete an empty folder. If Setup can't find mscreate.dir in a folder it created, Setup won't delete the folder even though it may be empty.

So what should you do? Deleting these normally hidden files won't buy you much disk space-they're zero-byte files, after all. And it will end up handing you the chore of deleting empty, unused folders after you remove software from your system. In this case, you're better off leaving well enough alone.


to open it in an editor. Under [operating systems] you should see one line for each of the boot options you get when you start your computer; the text that appears on screen is to the right of the equal sign (=) in quotation marks. Just edit the text between the quotation marks to customize the prompt-for example, 'Joe's Wonderful World of Widgets'. Don't change the material to the left of the equal sign.

To change the order of items in the boot menu, rearrange the lines under [operating systems] to conform to the order you want. Save the file and exit your text editor. The next time you reboot, you'll see your custom option names in the order you specified.

Centering Text Vertically in Any Word Processor

OKAY, YOU'VE WRITTEN a great letterbut it's just a few paragraphs and looks really ugly on the page. You need to center it vertically to make it look good. You could hit < Enter> a few times, but there's a better way. All current word processors let you center text on a page before or after you create the document:

Word 6 and 7 Select File Page Setup, then click the Layout tab. Click the Vertical Alignment drop-down list and choose Center. Click OK to finish the job.

WordPerfect 6.1 and 7 Select Format. Page-Center. In the Center Page(s) dialog box, choose one of the available options (Current page works for one-page documents), then click OK.

Word Pro 96 Use the Page Properties InfoBox to center pages vertically. Rightclick the page, then select Page Properties from the pop-up menu. Click the Misc tab in the InfoBox, then click the center button in the Vertical Alignment group of buttons, as in FIGURE 1.

AUTOMATE REPETITIVE TYPING

HOW MANY TIMES a day do you type your name, the name of your company, or some other standard text? Most of us just repeat the work again and again without

thinking. Today's word processors can enter oft-used text automatically whenever you type an abbreviation. This feature is built into the programs, but few users take advantage of it. Here's how to set it up in your favorite word processor:

Word 6 and 7 Type the recurring phrase into a blank document and highlight it, or highlight any block of text in an existing document. Select Tools. Auto Correct. The selected phrase will appear in the 'With' box of the AutoCorrect dialog box, and the cursor will be in the 'Replace' box. In the 'Replace' box, type an abbreviation for your text, making sure it's not a word you might type for another purpose, then click Add and OK. That's it. From then on just type the abbreviation, press <Space>, and Word will insert the entire phrase.

WordPerfect 6.1 and 7 Type your phrase into a blank document and highlight it, or highlight the phrase in existing text. Select Tools Quick Correct. The selected text will appear in the 'With' box of the QuickCorrect dialog box. Type an abbreviation in the 'Replace' box, then select Add Entry and Close to store it. To insert the phrase, type the abbreviation, then press (Enter).

Word Pro 96 In this program you have to enter the text in a dialog box instead of

> highlighting it in the document. Select Edit. SmartCorrect. In the SmartCorrect dialog box, click the Add Entry button, and in the resulting dialog box, type your abbreviation in the 'SmartCorrect entry' box. Press <Tab>, then type the complete phrase into the 'Replacement text' box. Click OK twice to finish. To insert the phrase later in your documents, type the abbreviation, then press <Space>.

DRAG-FREE TEXT SELECTION IN ALL WORD PROCESSORS



WHENEVER I TRY to click and drag to select a large block of text that extends past the bottom of the

screen. Word 7 scrolls so fast that I end up selecting far more text than I want. Is there a less frustrating way to do large selections?

I GET A LOT of questions about this. In Word 6 and 7, you can slow scrolling a bit by dragging the mouse just below the document window, rather than further down the screen. That trick doesn't help on fast Pentium machines, though; Word still scrolls too fast for comfort.

Fortunately, there's a much better way to handle selecting large blocks of text; the technique works in every word processor because it's a basic Windows function.

Click where you want the text selection to begin. Use the scroll bar instead of the cursor keys to move down in the document until you can see the end of the desired selection. Hold down the <Shift> key, then click at the end of the text you want to highlight. That's all you have to do: You won't be blinded by Word's scrolling speed again.

STORING NEW STYLES IN WORDPERFECT 6.1 AND 7



I OFTEN CREATE new styles in WordPerfect 7 while I'm working on a document. I expect a newly cre-

ated style to be available to me in other documents, but it doesn't show up in the Style List dialog box. What am I doing wrong?

Alice Baxter, Boston BY DEFAULT, WordPerfect 6.1 and 7 store all styles that you create in the current document. Storing a style in a template so that you can use it in other documents takes an extra step.

Here's what you have to do. Create your new styles as you do now-by selecting Format. Styles, clicking the Create button or the QuickStyle button in the Style List dialog box, and then filling in the Styles Editor dialog box. Back in the Style List dialog box, click the Options button and select Copy from the drop-down





But you may want to turn these features off for some projects, or perhaps they just don't suit your style. Here's how to shut down all or part of this automation in the three major word processors.


To control Word Pro's automatic correction of spelling and punctuation errors and the use of true quotation marks, select Edit SmartCorrect. In the SmartCorrect dialog box, select the features you want to enable or disable, then click OK.



To disable SmartCorrect altogether, select File*User Setup*Word Pro Preferences. In the resulting dialog box, make sure the General tab is selected, click the Disable drop-down list and click SmartCorrect. (If it is checked, it is disabled.) Click OK.




Bingo! Random Numbers

I'VE RECEIVED MANY inquiries lately about generating random numbers, but I held off answering until Nilo Bonsol of Torrance, California, e-mailed asking how to generate bingo cards with Excel. How could I resist? A bingo card incorporates 24 random numbers between 1 and 100, with no repetitions.

The procedure I describe here, which works with minor modifications in any spreadsheet, shows a basic approach to generating such sets, and for referencing them in worksheet layouts.

Starting with an empty workbook, select Insert. Worksheet to create two pages. Then



double-click the first sheet tab. and enter the name Random-List: name the second sheet

BingoCard. Select the sheet RandomList, enter 1 in cell A1, and 2 in cell A2. Select A1:A2, and drag the AutoFill handle (see figure above) to cell A100.

You now have an ordered set of 100 integers. In cell B1, enter the formula =rand(), and use the same AutoFill trick to copy it to B2:B100. At this point, you can randomize your list of integers: Select a cell in column B, and click the Sort Ascending button on the

Standard toolbar a few times.

Now for the card. Select the BingoCard sheet and enter the labels and numbers shown in B1:F2 and in A3:A7 of the next figure. In cell B3, enter the formula =INDEX(RandomList!\$A\$1:\$A\$100,B\$1+\$A3), and copy it to B3:F7. This formula uses the numbers in row 1 and column A to create a series of index values that take the first 25 numbers from the list on the RandomList sheet. Select cell D5 and make sure your keyboard's NumLock is off. Press and hold <Alt> and type 0182 on the keypad. Release < Alt > and press < Enter >. You'll probably see a paragraph symbol; in the following steps, we'll reformat the cell so it displays a star.

Okay, let's dress up the bingo card. Select B2:F2, select Format-Cells, click the

Font tab in the Format Cells dialog box, and select a large, fancy font (I chose the 36-

point Footlight MT Light font). Click the Patterns tab in the same dialog box, select a light gray shade, and then click OK.

Select B3:F7, select Format-Cells, click the Font tab, and select the 24-point Arial font to match the figure. To get the star in the middle of the bingo card, click cell D5, select Format. Cells, click the Font tab, and select the Wingdings font. Click the Patterns tab, and select a gray cell shade.

Select B2:F7, select Format-Cells, click the Alignment tab, and select Center for both the horizontal and vertical dimensions. Click the Border tab, click the third line in the Style section, then click Left, Right, Top, and Bottom, and click OK.

Finally, select File Page Setup, click the Margins tab, and select Horizontally in the Center on Page section. Now click the Sheet tab in the same dialog box, type B2:F7 in the Print Area box, and click OK.

To print your bingo cards, select the RandomList sheet, select a cell in column B, and click the Sort Ascending button. Then select the BingoCard sheet and check the numbers. If you see the characters '##' in one or more of the cells, go back to the RandomList sheet and click the Sort Ascending button again. When everything is okay, select File-Print. When it's time for a game, simply re-sort the list of random numbers and call out the ones that come to the surface.

CALCULATING JULIAN DATES, REDUX

Several readers have pointed out that there's a simpler way to calculate a date's number within each year (where January 1 is day 1, September 1 is either day 244 or day 245, depending upon whether it's a leap year, and so on).

Instead of the complex formula I suggested in the September column, try this one, where the date you want to work with is in cell A1:

+a1-date(year(a1)-1,12,31)

Create Push-Button Menus

IT'S EASY TO CREATE a database menu form with push-button controls. You can start from scratch or copy a menu from a sample database and customize it. I often start with a blank form, change it a bit, then pirate some buttons from another menu. Next, I change the code attached to the buttons and call the form Menuunimaginative but easy to identify.

These steps apply to Access. For other databases, visit PC World Online at http:// www.pcworld.com/hereshow.html.

- 1. Create a new blank form: In the database window, select the Forms tab. then click the New button. In the New Form dialog box, leave Design View highlighted and click OK. You don't need to choose a table or a query for the form.
- 2. The grid area that appears represents the background of your menu. To resize the grid area, click and drag its lower right corner (see STEP BY STEP, below).
- 3. Change some of the form properties to make the form look more like a dialog box and less like a window for viewing records. Right-click the box to the left of the horizontal ruler, choose Properties, and select the Format tab. Set Scroll Bars to Neither, Record Selectors to No. and Navi-

gation Buttons to No, as in the figure.

- 4. To change the background color of the form, leave the Properties box open and click the Detail bar on the form, Make sure the Format tab is selected, and click the Back Color line. Click the ... button that appears at the end of the line to open the Color dialog box. Select a shade, then click OK. Click the Detail bar again to see how your choice looks.
- 5. Before you start adding push buttons, click the Label tool in the toolbox, drag the mouse to create a box for the title, then enter a title in the box. If you decide that using an appropriate file name for the form is enough, select File Save and enter a name like Menu.

You can add a graphic to a menu form.

Click the Image button in the toolbox, drag the mouse to create a box for the image, then select a graphic from the Insert Picture dialog box. Depending on how your software was installed, you may find interesting pictures in the c:\msoffice\clipart directory or in c:\msoffice\access\bitmaps\dbwiz.

6. Click the Command button in the toolbox, and drag the mouse to create a push button on the form. If the Control Wizard button is depressed, you'll get help from the Command Button Wizard, which offers lots of options: actions for opening forms and reports, moving through records, and other common tasks. You can also show a text label or a picture on the button.

7. To copy a button you've already placed on the form, click the button and select Edit Duplicate. Double-click the text on the new button to edit it or change its Caption property. If you copy a button, change its On Click property: In the Command Button dialog box, select the Event tab, click the ... button at the end of the line. and select Macro Builder in the Choose Builder dialog box. (It may be quicker to use the Command Button Wizard again.)

You can also copy macro buttons from one form to another. Both databases must include the macro that's attached to the command button being copied. Open the form that contains the button you want to copy, go into Design mode, select the but-

ton, and click the Copy button on the main toolbar. Go back to your menu form in Design mode, click the


Paste button, then drag the copied button to wherever you want it. This trick works when you don't need to change the action that belongs to the Command button.

- 8. Select File Save; name the form Menu.
- 9. To open the menu form automatically when you open the database, choose Tools. Startup, click the Display Form drop-

down box, select Menu, and click OK. You can also use an autoexec macro to open the form.



Beware of E-Mail Forgery

LAST SUMMER the editor of a computer magazine in Boston received a barrage of nasty e-mail messages, seemingly from me and other magazine editors. After a flurry of alarmed phone calls between network mail administrators at the magazines concerned, we traced the messages to an unknown hacker from an address in Buenos Aires. The hacker had broken into the mail servers of various magazines and sent forged e-mail messages to editors at other magazines.

Since journalists are often insulted by other journalists, most recipients of these forgeries only shrugged wearily.

The phenomenon is called "e-mail spoofing," and most e-mail systems are vulnerable to it. Even a mail server nestled behind a firewall can fall victim to a prankster who sends employees forged

Make Your Web Page Friendlier for Sight-Impaired Readers

Here are tips to make sites accessible to sight-impaired viewers:

1. Offer text-only versions of your pages. Place the hot link to the text version at the very top of the page so surfers with screen readers don't have to listen to the entire page in order to find it.

- 2. Skip the magenta fish-scale background with white letters. Aim for high contrast between text and background. White lettering on black is best for low-vision computer users. Use big, bold letters.
- 3. Avoid tables if you can. If you can't, provide a link to a text version of the table.
- 4. Include a description of each picture, or a link to a page describing the picture.
- 5. If you use an image map, provide a link to a page offering the map's links in text form.
- 6. Download NCAM's Web access symbol, shown here, from the NCAM site (http:// www.boston.com/wgbh/



pages/ncam/symbolwinner.html) and add it to your page.

mail that looks like it came from other employees or companies.

The problem is most prevalent in secondary schools. Youngsters soon learn that they can use their new Internet connection to send e-mail to other studentsand make it look like it was written by a teacher or the principal.

In an education mailing list, a junior high school administrator described how a student used his parents' America Online account to send harassing e-mail to a former teacher. By shipping it out on the Internet and redirecting it, this resourceful teen made it appear as if the mail originated from inside his school.

Is there any way to protect your mail server from pranksters? Unfortunately, no, because of weaknesses in the SMTP mail protocol. Until technology catches up to the wiles of sociopaths, you'll just have to discount as juvenile pranks all messages that don't make sense.

Especially if they're from me.

WEB PAGES FOR THE DISABLED

FOR THE SIGHT-IMPAIRED, surfing the World Wide Web can be like stumbling through a dark art gallery: You can't distinguish the pictures from the doors. Your screen reader can't tell you what's in a picture. Image maps hold no information for you. You can't correctly "hear" what's in a table, because your screen reader jumbles its content into one long sentence.

Numerous efforts are under way to make the Web more accessible to visually impaired users. They range from defining HTML standards for tagging graphics with a good spoken description, to encouraging Web page owners to offer textonly versions of their pages.

The Web site of WGBH, a public television station serving the Boston area (http://www.boston.com/wgbh/pages/ access/accessinstructions.html), offers a continuing experiment in accessibility solutions for both blind and hearingimpaired users. For those with limited vision, for example, a giant letter D precedes images on the WGBH site (see the figure below). Clicking on the D displays a two- to three-sentence description that can be heard through a screen reader.

Making your own Web site (business or personal) accessible to users with disabilities doesn't require a lot of work (see "Make Your Web Page Friendlier for Sight-Impaired Readers").



Offering a text-only version of your page is a good start. You'll find a complete guide on how to make a Web site more easily accessible at the Web site of the Trace R&D Center at the University of Wisconsin, Madison (http://www.trace .wisc.edu/world/web/index.html).

You might also check out the page for the National Center for Accessible Media (http://www.boston.com/wgbh/pages/ ncam/captionedmovies.html), shown in FIGURE 1, and the page for the Center for Information Technology Accommodation (http://www.gsa.gov:80/coca/).

As one blind Web surfer notes, "The number of solutions is proliferating. The great thing about the Web is that it offers something for everyone."



ever I log on to PC World Online, I get this message: 'The server www.pcworld.com wishes to get a cookie that will be sent to any server in the domain poworld'. What is a cookie? What are you sending me and what will it do to my PC?

Don A. Dudley, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin DON'T WORRY ABOUT IT, DON. We're only collecting data to use in scientific experiments. I can't tell you what the experiments are, only that we will know shortly what sorts of things drive our readers to pull out their credit cards and send us huge amounts of cash.

Just joking. Actually, cookies are pretty harmless, and they can save you time on a Web site or offer customized service. A cookie is merely some encoded data that a Web site sends your browser for retrieval later, when you progress to a different page in the site or when you next log on to the site. The cookie could be a number that identifies you from one visit to the next, or it may be information that you've typed into the Web site.

For instance, if you visit an online shopping site, you might select items to add to an "electronic shopping cart." When it comes time to place your order-either 25 Web pages later or during your next visit to the site-the Web site must send your browser a cookie identifying you and specifying the items you selected. In this case, your browser and the site may pass cookies back and forth many times during an online session.

Cookies have other uses as well. Cookies can generate profiles of a Web site's visitors-monitoring the pages and items

people like to access-for marketing purposes or to tailor the site better to users' interests. At Yahoo's My Yahoo site (http://edit.my.yahoo.com/bin/ login), cookies help create a personal version of Yahoo that includes your favorite Web sites and news topics. PC World Online (http://www.pcworld .com/) uses cookies to create its Interactive Top 20 feature, and in the future, cookies will help give readers personalized views of the site.

There's no risk from cookies: They can't contain viruses to infect your system, nor can they steal private data off

your disk and send it to the originating Web site.

Not all browsers support cookies, but most soon because corporate America wants them. Cookies are the only way a Web site can track users from one page to the next. They're also the only way to know how many surfers are accessing a site. Navi-

gator keeps a list of the cookies it has collected in a file named cookies.txt in your Navigator directory (see FIGURE 2).

Many people think that cookies are a violation of privacy. You can tell your browser to warn you whenever a Web site tries to send you a cookie, then forbid it from doing so, as you have done. But

> when you log into sites that repeatedly attempt to send cookies, those pop-up alerts can get irritating.

> One solution is Internet Fast Forward, a Navigator plug-in that stifles all cookie giveaway attempts. Fast Forward can also block out those annoying ads that scroll at the bottom of the screen, and graphics larger than a specific size. You can download the free beta version of Fast Forward from the PrivNet Web page (http://www

Don't look for malpractice suit filings or complaints to state medical boards, however. The AMA wants to keep such information offline.

If you swear off cookies, be aware that your favorite Web sites may start to show certain forms of brain damage. For example, you may have to register every time you visit a page.

Where did the term cookies come from? Its source is the hacker phrase magic cookies, applied to programs with seemingly magical powers.



Speed Up Dial-Up Modems

A LITTLE OVER A YEAR AGO, when the first crop of affordable V.34, 28.8-kbps analog modems hit the market, we were told that this technology squeezed every last bit of bandwidth out of the existing telephone infrastructure.

We were misinformed.

Two higher-performance features are showing up in affordable V.34 modems, thanks to new data-handling techniques: 33.6-kbps data rates and 230-kbps throughput. (Vendors are also talking about a third dial-up option said to offer rates up to 56 kbps in one direction, but at press time none had publicly shown such technology.)

The first of the options available today, 33.6-kbps rates, is not overwhelming. If you need another modem, by all means purchase one capable of 33.6 kbps; these cost little more than 28.8 models.

And if you already have a 28.8-kbps modem, check with your modem's manufacturer about upgrades. You can upgrade U.S. Robotics Courier modems to 33.6 kbps, for example, by downloading free software from the company Web site (http://www.usr.com/home/online/ upgrades.htm). For most U.S. Robotics Sportster models, making the jump to 33.6 requires swapping a \$25 ROM chip on the modem card.

But is it worth buying such a chip-or a whole new modem-just to gain 4.8 kbps? Probably not. You get, at most, a 17 percent increase in performance. And that assumes that you've got a similar modem on the other end and perfect line conditions for the transmission.

FREEDOM OF COMPRESSION

THE SECOND NEW FEATURE-230-kbps throughput through enhanced compression techniques-is a much better bet.

While we may identify modems by their modem-to-modem throughput (such as 14.4, 28.8, and so on), they can achieve much higher effective throughput as a result of compression.

When you transfer a file, your computer sends the file through a serial port (or, with internal modems, firmware that emulates a serial port) and into the modem, where it's compressed and then sent out. The efficiency of compression depends on the file type. Text and graphics files usually yield the best compression ratios, but precompressed files such as ZIP files can't be compacted much more.

The handling of highly compressible data is also limited by how fast the serial port can pump data to the modem.

Until recently, the fastest PC serial ports supported a maximum of 115 kbps, so 28.8 modems were limited to a maximum compression ratio of 4 to 1. But new enhanced serial ports that can handle rates of 230 kbps, combined with beefedup compression hardware on the modem itself, have pushed that theoretical peak

So if you're sending or receiving highly compressible data, you could conceivably double your throughput. In fact, our early performance tests of such modems appear to confirm this.

Does buying a new modem to obtain these higher rates worth it? If you send or receive lots of compressible files, yes.

WHEREFORE UART THOU

ONE CAUTION: THE KEY to an enhanced serial port is the UART chip, which controls the flow of data across the serial port. To support 230-kbps rates, the serial port should use at least a model 16650 UART; 16550 or earlier chips don't do the job.

External modems connect to a serial port that's controlled by a UART on the motherboard or on a serial card. To find out what type of chip your serial port uses, run PortInfo 4.0, a \$20 utility from Computer Telecommunications Systems.

If you're stuck with a slow UART-and even most new motherboards currently use the 16550-consider buying a highspeed serial card like the ESP from Hayes Microcomputer Products or the TurboExpress from Pacific CommWare.

Internal modems put a UART right on the modem card or emulate it in firmware. So if you have an upgradable internal modem, you don't need to worry about the UART's limitations: The software or hardware boost will upgrade the UART functions as needed.

Finally, whatever modem you buy, make sure the manufacturer has software drivers for Windows 95, since the standard serial port driver may not be able to handle the higher rates.

Talk and Listen on the Net

VENDORS OF INTERNET telephony products have come to a startling realization: Most people like to talk and listen at the same time. The technical term for this is full-duplex communication, and it's like talking on a phone. The alternative, halfduplex telephony, is like using a walkietalkie or two-way radio: Each party must take turns speaking. For a recommended list of full-duplex sound cards, see Vocal-Tec's (makers of Internet Phone) Web site (http://www.vocaltec.com/fdxbr.htm).

If you've got a half-duplex board, you're probably out of luck. But there are some




FIGURE 1: TALK NORMALLY OVER THE INTERNET by tricking your Pro Audio Spectrum board with the settings shown here.

exceptions. Among these, Creative Labs' Sound Blaster 16 and Sound Blaster AWE32 are full-duplex cards that ship with half-duplex drivers. You can download the full-duplex drivers for the SB 16 and AWE32 boards from Creative Labs' FTP server (ftp://www.creaf.com/pub/ creative/drivers/sb16awe/). For Windows 95, download sbw95up.exe; for Windows 3.x, get awedw3up.exe and s16dw3up.exe.

Media Vision's Pro Audio Spectrum products are half-duplex sound boards, but they have a unique feature that lets them function like full-duplex boards. The

Pro Audio Spectrum series (including the Pro Audio Studio) gives you Sound Blaster quality by using a separate, dedicated hardware section-it's like having two separate boards in one slot. To get the fullduplex effect under Win 95, install a Pro Audio board, then select Start. Settings. Control Panel, double-click the Multimedia icon, and click the Audio tab. Choose the Pro Audio Spectrum board, which is listed as PAS16 Record (388), as your preferred recording device, and Sound Blaster Playback (210) as your preferred playback device; then click OK (see FIGURE 1).

To see the Sound Blaster emulation as a choice in the Playback section's 'Preferred device' list, you may first need to choose a Basic configuration. Choose Start-Settings-Control Panel, double-click the System icon, click the Device Manager tab, double-click your Pro Audio Spectrum board's icon under the 'Sound, video and game controllers' branch, click the Resources tab, click the Use automatic settings box to deselect it, choose Basic configuration 1 or Basic configuration 2 from the Setting based on list, and click OK.

VIDEO CDS-ON A PC NEAR YOU!

EVER NOTICE THOSE personal TV screens in first class as you wander back to coach? If you have a fast multimediaequipped laptop, you can watch Robert Duvall in Apocalypse Now at 35,000 feet as you download your mail while everybody else suffers through Bunting's World.

Video CDs contain up to 70 minutes of MPEG-1 compressed video with quality like that of a VHS tape (see FIGURE 2), and the medium is compact and durable.

Most of the Pentium PCs sold today will play Video CDs without additional hardware. All you need is a software MPEG player such as Microsoft's free Active-Movie Player (http://www.microsoft .com/imedia/activemovie/activem.htm), or CompCore's SoftPEG 2.0 (a demo version is available from http://www .compcore.com/TESTDRIV.HTM).

Most 90-MHz Pentium systems are fast enough to play MPEG, but if you want to play your Video CD in full-screen resolution, rather than the original size of 352 by 240 pixels, you may want to invest in MPEG playback hardware. Sigma Designs' \$299 RealMagic Maxima is an ISAbus MPEG decoder that lets you scale MPEG-1 clips as large as 1280 by 1024 pixels. Several video board manufacturers sell MPEG decoder add-ons for their products that do the same job.

The toughest part of playing Video CDs today is finding them. You can order hundreds of titles over the phone from the following vendors: Philips Media, located in Los Angeles, one of the main Video CD publishers (800/340-7888); D-Media of Westminster, California (800/332-8226 or 888/236-6843); and Carl Industries of Miami (305/594-7784). Video CD titles are priced like other video media, from \$15 to \$40, depending on content.



Today's graphics cards rip through once-daunting tasks like running full-motion video, and you can often buy one for half what you would have paid a year ago. These cards can help you grind through many of your toughest jobs-or lure you away from them by making the new 3-D games even more compelling!

For buying tips, see "Upgrades: The Best for the Buck" (November 1996). For the latest review, see Top 10 Graphics Boards in this issue. One warning: Your existing monitor may not be able to handle all that a new graphics card can do. Changing your graphics card can be one of the easiest upgrades, but remember the basics shown here. For additional hints and tips, check PC World Online (http://www.pcworld.com/hereshow/).

Check your graphics. Before deciding what to buy, see whether your existing motherboard handles ISA, VESA local bus, or PCI cards-or a mixture. Check your manual, or open your PC case and find the existing graphics card (attached to the monitor). If necessary, unhook the monitor and remove the card to look at its slot. In case graphics are built into the motherboard, read the next paragraph.

If graphics are built into the motherboard instead of on a card, you can still install a card, but read your manual or call your dealer to find out how to disable the onboard graphics. With some motherboards you need to move a jumper, flip a tiny DIP switch, or change a setting in your BIOS. Other motherboards switch off the onboard graphics automatically as soon as you plug in a card.

Buy your new card. If your PC's motherboard has a PCI bus, you'll find the widest selection of cards ranging from inexpensive to high-end. If your PC has a VESA local bus or an ISA bus. choices are more limited, the performance boost won't be as great, and the chance of installation hassles increases. Given the option, always choose a PCI or VESA graphics card over an ISA graphics card.



Prepare your software. If you're running Windows 95, you don't need to make any software changes before installing the new card. If you're a Windows 3.x user, exit to DOS (don't just open a DOS box), run the setup program located in the \windows directory, and change the Display setting to VGA before installing your new card.



Install the board. Unplug the monitor, remove the PC case, and remove the old graphics card, or disable the built-in graphics adapter if that's what you have. Ground yourself by touching the metal casing of your PC, grab the new card, and plug it in. Firmly tighten the screw that holds it in. Connect the monitor to the new card, but don't put the case back on yet.



Install the software. Software drivers should come with the new card. Turn on your PC. If you're running Windows 95, it should sense that a new card has been installed and ask you to insert the proper driver. If you're running Windows 3.x, you must install the driver manually. If everything's working, turn your PC off and put the cover back on.

I'M TICKED. I'm steamed. And in case you haven't noticed, I'm really, really angry. I just wasted 6 hours over the last two days trying to get my Windows 95 machine to do one simple thing it had suddenly stopped doing-play MIDI files. Once again I'm bitterly reminded why all the money we spend on computers never seems to translate into measurable gains in productivity.

Misery loves company. Last week a friend of mine lost a couple of working days trying to get his Windows 95 machine to boot in anything but Safe Mode. His crime? He installed a kids' program that did something awful to his video drivers. He finally decided the easiest solution was to reformat the hard drive and start over.

Installing new hardware and software fouls up Windows systems routinely in ways small, big, and catastrophic. A single device driver in the wrong place, a misguided line in the registry, and your PC, or some aspect of it, is toast.

Many problems are time bombs, lurking silently until the moment when another program calls some obscure function that got obliterated months ago. Even with savvy assistance, the likelihood of figuring out what went wrong can approach the chance of your being hit by a meteor the size of Bill Gates's new house.

If anything, Windows 95 has made things worse, not better. Now not only do INI and driver files still cause trouble, but there's a whole dark registry of system settings that almost no one understands. Are you aware that some programs sneakily use the registry to install software that runs when you boot your machine? The only way you're likely to notice is to hit <Ctrl>-<Alt>-<Delete> (once only, please) and observe the strange items at the bottom of the Close Program list.

I found three such programs in my machine, but they weren't the reason my MIDI audio suddenly stopped working. Every time a program tried to call MIDI, a message popped up insisting that some other program was already using the driver.



One misplaced device driver, one misguided line in the Windows 95 registry, and your system is toast.

I don't use MIDI all that often, and I quickly determined that the message simply wasn't true. But just to be safe, I eliminated sound card support, rebooted, reinstalled all the drivers, and rebooted again. It didn't help. Neither did the newer drivers I downloaded from the Web.

The obvious suspects were two multimedia programs I'd recently installed, but their tech wizards insisted the programs couldn't be at fault. Finally a Microsoft guru spent 3 hours on the phone with me, helping me hunt down MIDI references in the INI files and the registry and reinstall every scrap of software that might lead to a solution. No dice. The guru hinted that even reinstalling Windows 95 itself might not do the trick unless I reformatted the drive first.

A minute away from hanging up and throwing the machine out the, uh, window, I attempted one last desperate hunt through the registry. Somehow I stumbled upon the cryptic term 'OldMapper' pointing to 'midimap.dry' and connected with a lousy piece of software I'd installed six months before. Hmmmm. Had that software installed its own MIDI driver and dumped 'midimap.drv', the standard file?

It had indeed. The problem resolved as if by magic as soon as I changed a single file name in a different registry entry-the charmingly named MyComputer\HKEY_LOCAL_ MACHINE\System\CurrentControlSet\ control\MediaResources\mapper\midimapper. Hey, if the guru and I can do it, you can, too!

We desperately need a system that can protect itself from pillage and plunder. System files should have clearly identifiable version numbers, dates, and descriptions and shouldn't be overwritten by apps except with your permission. When you install updates, the original files should be compressed and retained so you can

restore them. Changes to system files and the registry should be logged in detail, with instructions on how to reverse them.

And it'll never happen. Hey, that would just be too complicated for novices. Let 'em view installing a new program with the proper fear and respect! Let 'em think these problems are somehow their fault! Let 'em eat tech support!


